


If the buildings pictured here could speak, they would tell a story of challenge and achievement. The "old" building, pictured above at the right, would speak with pride of the hundreds of Wilson young people who have trod its halls since the big front doors swung open in January, 1923, to admit the nearly three hundred students who were to attend "Wilson High School." It would recall the splendid records achieved by that first group and emulated by succeeding groups of students. Its tale would bring to mind Mr. Charles L. Coon, pioneer educator, who was its first superintendent, and Mr. J. Shephard Bryan, its first principal. A highlight in the story would be the completion of the auditorium wing, pictured at the right, where twenty-one graduates of the class of 1923 held their commencement exercises.

OUR SCHOOL REFLECTS US



Memorable events of the second year would include acquisition of the gymnasium wing, shown at the left, and of the present athletic field, which was cleared of its final cotton crop in time for fall football practice. Further reminiscing would bring to mind that solemn occasion, shortly after Mr. Coon's death in 1927, when the school was renamed "The Charles L. Coon High School."

The story would mention no further details of significant structural additions until 1951, when the "new" building, pictured above at the left, became available. A credit to school administrators and to the people of Wilson, it marked an important step in a building campaign designed to care for increasing enrollment and an expanding educational program.












WRANGLER'S CLUB


MONOGRAM CLUB


RESUME

Coach Madden's gridmen got just a taste of the schedule facing them when they lost to the Kinston Red Devils 14-0 in the opening game of the 1951 season. In their second game, against Goldsboro, the Cyclones handed the Earthquakes a 21-14 loss. After this win, the Cycs lost to Raleigh 20-0, following that with a hard-won 7-6 victory over Edwards Military Institute.

Their fifth game saw the Cyclones traveling to Durham, only to be turned back 26-13. The next contest, against Smithfield, resulted in a 33-20 victory. The following week the Cyclones again took to the road, this time to Fayetteville, where the Bulldogs won by a 32-0 score. In the Wilmington game, played in the cold, rain and mud, the Cyclones took a stinging 34-0 setback at the hands of the larger club. At the Wilson Homecoming game against Rocky Mount, the Wilson team was handed a 20-6 loss, thereby losing the Shelton Looms trophy for the second consecutive year.


By way of summary, the Cyclones scored 80 points against their opponents' 186. These figures do not consider, of course, the spirit and pluck of our players as they fought against heavier and more experienced teams. Averaging only 146 pounds in the line and 155 pounds in the backfield, the Cyclones were further plagued by injuries to several key members of the club.






JUNIOR BASKETBALL


