## DIVERSIFIED OCCUPATIONS

Under the guidance of Mr. Robert W. Hyde, co-ordinator for the past tivelve years in our school, the Diversified Occupations Class launches its annual program at the beginning of each school year. This class, commonly identified by its initials "D. O.," extends to senior boys who do not plan to go to college or attend a business school, the opportunity for training in a skilled trade at the same time that they are pursuing a prescribed course of study at school in order to graduate.

School mornings find these industrious students engaged in regular classes such as English IV, science, economics, or geography; plus "book learning" that rclates to their personally selected jobs. Some of the boys choose meatcutting, refrigeration, projectionist and movie work, mechanics, dairy work, printing, mercantile work and such jobs as the community affords for them. After lunch the students go to their respective places of business, and there they are under the close supervision of their respective employers. Not only do they gain the knowledge and training of the job, but they receive wages as well as scholastic credit.

The "D. O. boys" take an active part in whatever activity of the school is popular at the moment, and they can be depended upon to help repair furniture, put up the Christmas trec, move furniture, put up the telephones at the stadium for football games, do all kinds of odd jobs, and make themselves generally useful around the school.

Although the "D. O. boys" are definitcly a part of the school, they have their own organization, and they carry out projects of their own, such as helping the sick and needy at special holiday times, and having banquets and parties of their own.

After having received the training in the Diversified Occupations Class, the students are better prepared to choose and go into the careers which appeal to them.

Rocky Mount and Haywood Evans, the leading circuit scorer, handed Wilson a 58-46 defeat, and Wilson lost at Raleigh 89-56 to round out the first half of circuit play. In the remaining six matches, the Cyclones were not able
to pull out a victory, although they fought gallantly and almost pulled the upset of the year in losing to Durham by only two points in a double overtime affair. Wilmington won 56-41, Durham 43-41, Goldsboro 55-54, Fayetteville 68-52, Rocky Mount 65-57, and Raleigh 94-71. Wilson wound up last in the conference with a $1-10$ record and was led in scoring by A . W. Faris with an 11.8 average.

The Cycs lost two close games in overtimes, and another by one point in the regulation game, showing that a few breaks could have produced a winning season for the hustling shorties.
