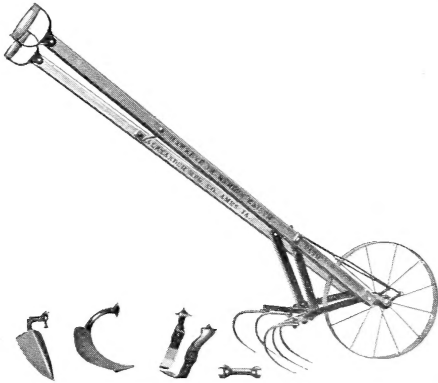


Fig. 1—Hawkeye Jr. Garden Raiser

HOW TO ORDER.—Always use order sheet and printed envelope sent with each **Catalogue**. Write plainly; keep a copy of your order. Do not order C. O. D., as it is an unnecessary expense to customers, as cost of collecting is added to all bills.

REMITTING MONEY.—Cash should always accompany the order. Remittances may be made at our risk by either of the following methods: (1) **Postoffice Money Orders**; (2) **Express Companies' Money Orders**; (3) **Draft on New York or Chicago**; (4) **Registered Letters**. Money sent by either method is absolutely safe, and will cost from three to fifteen cents. We will bear the expense of sending money in either of these ways, and customers may select **additional seeds free** to the amount of cost of remittance.

STAMPS received same as cash for small orders, or when notes are not obtainable, and they must be **clean and in good condition**, but will not be responsible for sums of **One Dollar** or over sent in this manner. Send the regular stamps, 2c, 5c and 10c stamps preferred.

POSTAGE PAID.—We deliver free, to any Postoffice or Express Office in the United States, all seeds quoted by the **Packet, Pound, Ounce, Pint, or Quart**. Seeds offered by the **Peck, Bushel**, or in 5, 10 or 100 lb. lots, purchasers have to pay **Express or Freight** charges.

SHIPPING INSTRUCTIONS.—When goods are to be shipped by **Freight or Express** give plain shipping directions; otherwise we use our best judgment in regard to the matter.

PREPAID RAILROAD STATIONS.—Customers who live at such points where there is no agent should send enough money to prepay freight charges, when too much is sent will return balance. Else will have to send to nearest station where there is an agent.

NAME AND ADDRESS.—In sending an order please be particular in giving **Name, Postoffice, County and State**, in full, distinctly written. Not many new varieties of real merit have been offered lately. This list contains special selected strains of the later introductions.

Most varieties have been carefully tested in our trials, or obtained from such reliable sources that we can recommend them as worthy of a trial by our patrons and we feel sure that they will give satisfaction.

Sudan Grass

A New Forage Crop of Immense Value to the Middle West

SUDAN GRASS was introduced into the United States in 1909 from Africa. After thorough tests in all parts of the United States the Department of Agriculture reports that Sudan Grass will be of the greatest value in the Central States, especially in those portions that are deficient in rainfall during summer. These dry regions have no other satisfactory hay crop and Sudan Grass will be of immense value there.

Sudan Grass is an annual and dies each year like Millet, so there is no danger of spreading over your land like Johnson Grass will do. It grows tall, reaching a height of about seven feet; the stems are very small and rarely thicker than a lead pencil. The plants stools wonderfully and produces under favorable conditions as many as 100 stalks from a single root.

Sudan Grass yields a good crop of first-class hay, all stock relish the hay and thrive on it, the quality of the hay is superior to millet. Yields of from two to four tons per acre are common and under favorable conditions, six to eight tons per acre have been grown.

Sudan Grass should not be planted until soil has become warm. It can be sown any time during the summer as a catch crop.

It can be sown in rows 18 to 36 inches apart and cultivated, or can be drilled with a grain drill or sown broadcast by hand.

Seeded in rows, it takes from 3 to 6 lbs. per acre, depending on the width of row; drilled or broadcast, from 12 to 15 lbs. is used.

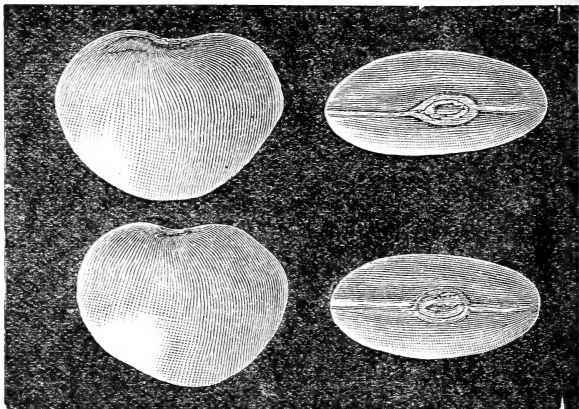
Sudan Grass is easy to cut with a mower and cures readily like millet. For hay it is best to cut just after full bloom and will give it more time for a second growth, and in 40 to 50 days another cutting is ready. Ordinarily two to three cuttings may be expected when season is long enough. Every farmer in the middle west should experiment with an acre or so to give it a thorough trial the coming season.

Fordhook Bush Lima Bean

The Fordhook Bush Lima is altogether unique, being an improved erect bush form of the popular "Potato Lima." Mr. Burpee, the introducer, says: Nothing like it has ever been seen before. Of strong, erect, true bush like growth (never prostrate or running), the bushes average 20 to 30 inches in height by 20 to 24 inches across the top. The foliage is of heavy texture and very dark green in color.

The stalks that produce the blossoms are thrown out from the lateral and main stalk; the pods are borne in "clusters" of from four to eight. The pods resemble those of the Dreers Bush Lima, but average more than double the size, measuring from four to five inches long, about one and a quarter inches wide. The pods contain three to five large beans with an average of four. In the illustration you will note the extreme size and thickness of the beans.



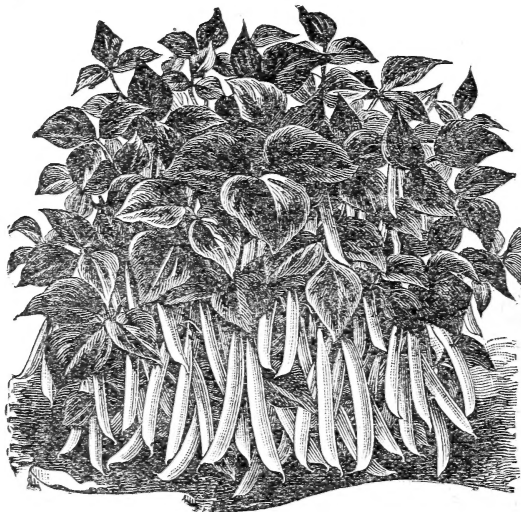

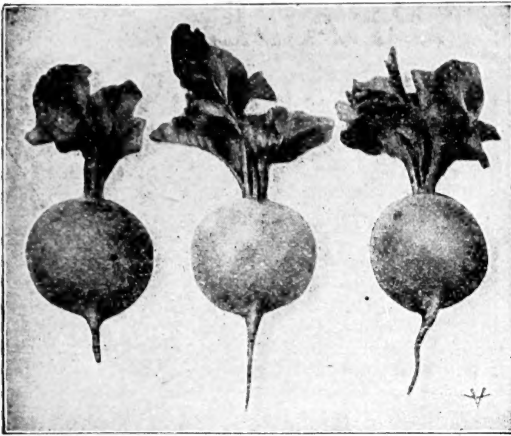
New Hodson Wax Bean

The requirements for a good crop are rich soil, deep plowing, high manuring, good seed and thorough after culture. For early use, sow seed of the early kinds in the hot-bed, or in a box in the house, early in February, and transplant them in the open ground in April, in rows two feet apart and eighteen inches between the plants in a row; or sow in a seed-bed outside as soon as the soil can be worked, if you do not care for real early cabbage. These may be transplanted in about four weeks. For second early cabbage, sow in April and transplant in May. For late cabbage, sow in May and transplant in June, in rows three feet apart and two feet apart in the row. In transplanting cabbage or cauliflower it is important that the plant is set down to the first leaf; that the stem may not be injured in case of frost; be careful not to cover the heart of the plant. Hoe every week and stir the ground deep. As they advance in growth, draw a little earth to the plants until they begin to head. To prevent splitting or bursting of cabbage, go frequently over the ground and start every cabbage that appears about to mature, by pushing them over sideways, which breaks some of the roots and checks its growth. To prevent the attacks of cabbage fly on small plants dust thoroughly with plaster, air-slacked lime, or wood ashes freely over the young plants. For the cabbage worm, try "Slug-Shot."

Cucumbers succeed best in warm, rich, sandy loamy ground. They should not be planted in the open air until there is a prospect of settled warm weather; about the middle of May. The hills should be previously prepared by mixing thoroughly with the soil of each a shovelful of well rotted manure. When all danger from insects is past, thin out the plants, leaving three or four of the strongest to each hill. The fruit should be gathered when large enough, whether required for use or not, as if left to ripen on the vines, it destroys their productiveness. For pickles, plant from June to middle of July. When small sprinkle the plants, when the dew is on, with ashes or air-slacked lime to protect them from bugs. One pound is sufficient for an acre.

Keep clean by frequent hoeing and weeding; observe not to hoe deep, for the more onion rises out of the ground the finer it is and better it keeps. The onion will ripen in August or early in September crop year after year. The ground should be thoroughly enriched with fine, decomposed manure, and their full maturity will be indicated by the perfect decay of the leaves or top. The soil should be very rich and light; sow the seeds in drills one foot apart and cover half an inch deep; thin while small from two to three inches apart; hoe often; for a succession sow at intervals of two weeks. To keep the beetle from destroying them sprinkle with ashes or air-slaked lime. The winter varieties should be sown in August; they must be taken up before severe frosts and stored in a cool cellar and covered with earth. Put them in cold water an hour before using. Every family should raise a supply of winter radishes.

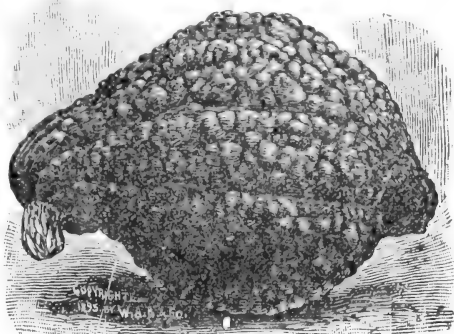

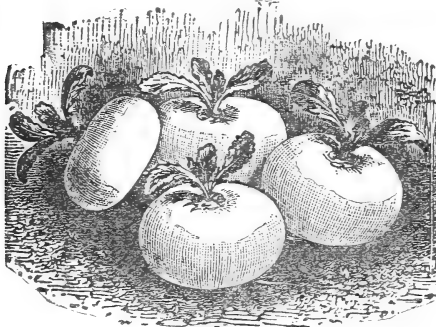

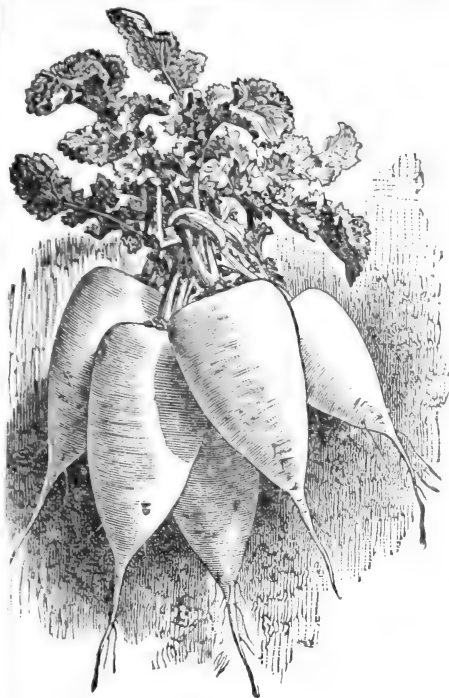

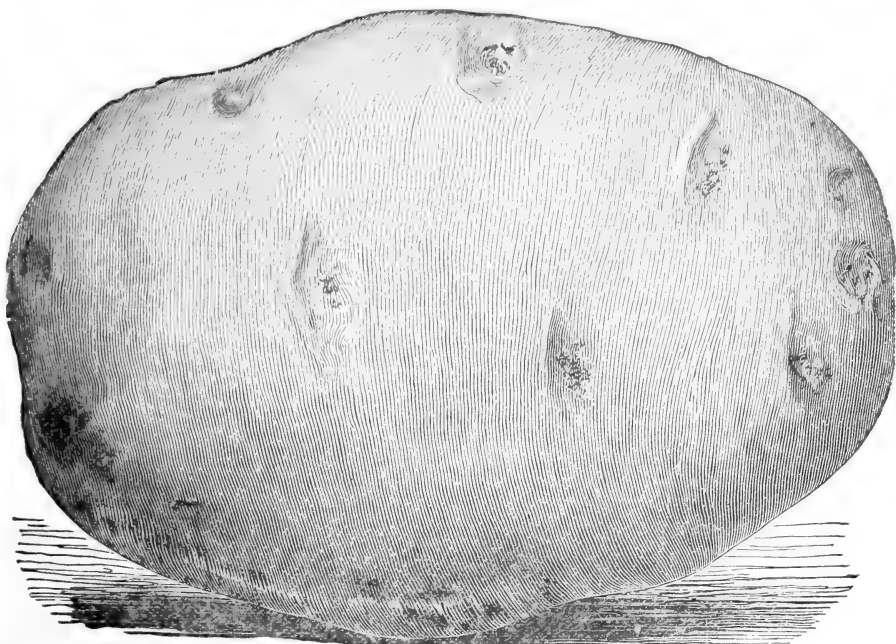

Culture. Fall bulbs can be planted outdoors till ground freezes up. Select a sunny place of rich mellow soil, where water will not stand. Plant Hyacinth and Tulip bulbs from 5 to 6 inches apart and from 4 to 5 inches deep. They can be left in the bed for 2 to 3 years or taken up every summer after tops have died. Cover with manure or leaves after ground freezes up.

Narcissus ought to be planted 10 to 12 inches apart and 6 inches deep; they can be planted in any place and be left in the ground as they increase in beauty every year.

Scilla and Crocus, plant about 3 inches apart and also that deep. Crocus do well planted in the grass.

House Culture. Use the largest bulbs for this purpose, the 4 or 5 inch pots are large enough. Use good rich mellow sandy soil, set bulb deep enough to cover with dirt, give a good soaking and set pots in a cool dark place for 4 to 6 weeks, so bulbs can make a good root growth, water occasionally if dry. When brought into the window they should be kept near the light, but not in full sunshine for any length of time. A cool temperature suits bulbs best.
