A SHORT HISTORY OF DECATUR CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL

CATHOLIC HIGH FOUNDED IN 1919

History of Catholic School Written by Margaret Mylott, DCHS $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Qrad}}$.

Miss Margaret Mylott, a graduate of Decatur Catholic high school in 1923, being a member of the first high school class, prepared the following interesting history of the school. It was published in "The Tattler" last June (1924) and is published in this edition with the permission of the staff of the high school paper.

To revert to the days of 1881 seems quite a jolt to our modernized minds: for great and wonderful things have astounded and bewildered the world since this time.

Back in 1881, when St.Mary's was yet an infant parish, struggling though lusty, the good pastor, Rev.Theodore Wilken, turned his fatherly attention to providing a school for the small charges of his growing parish.

He built a school facing Madison Street, and was fortunate enough to secure a band of Sisters of St Agnes to take charge of the promising school. Four pioneer Sisters filled with zeal came to brave the trials and tribulations of a new mission, an infant school.

This dauntless pioneer was SR.AM Aloysia, who labored in the schools of St. Mary's parish for 38 years, and her efforts were well-spent, for every pupil who was fortunate enough to feel guidance of that wonderful Sister, is moved to tears of gratitude for the splendid work she did in cultivating his mind and lifting his heart to higher things.

Sr.Aloysia left Decatur in 1919, but her memory is still revered by each and every one in St.Mary's parish and all ardently long for her return. Sr.Aloysia is now located in Hays, Kansas.

Sr. Augustine, another pioneer, endeared herself to all with whom she came in contact, and performed great work for souls. The good nun passed to her reward just recently after 54 years in the service of her God-a noble life-well spent.

Sr. M.Borgia, the third member of the pioneer band, is still laboring in the fields of religion and we know that she still watches interestedly the progress of her school of days long past.

Sr. Euphrosine, the 4th member of the little band, is also sitll active in the service of her Master, and we know that Decatur and St. Joseph's school hold a warm corner down in her heart.

We take this opportunity to invite this band of three survinging members to the dedication of our new school so that they may have the opportunity to witness personally the fruition of their pioneer endeavors.

The school ably sponsored by good Father Wilken and the stout hearted Sisters flourished and expanded. Pupils entered, learned, and laughed, and were graduated, all carrying with them the uplifting ideals that were so ably instilled into their hearts. The first graduates were the Misses Blanche Adelsperger, deceased, and Nora Holthouse, no Sr. M.Dolores C.S.A.

After years of beautiful service to his God and fellowmen, good Father Wilken was called to his reward. However, his last days were gladdened by the wonderful progress his school had made, and surely from his place in Heaven, he still looks on and smiles complacently at the solendid strides his school is making.

"Rev. J.A. Seimetz, his able successor, proved to be an equally firm and ardent support of Catholic education, and encouraged the teachers and pupils in every conceivable manner.

"Rev. J.A. Seimetz dreamed of some day having a Catholic High and the dream was bound to materialize. In the spring of 1919, Father Seimetz, with the assistance of Sr.Aloysia worked out a plan of procedure. Although Sr.Aloysia was not destined to stay in Decatur to see the dream materialize; nevertheless, she has followed the success of the High School Department with the deepest interest.

At this juncture of 1919 the pioneer days of the second era begin. Rev J.A. Seimetz, Rev A.J. Kroeger, Sr.M Antonita and Sr. M. Odelia compromised the first faculty board of D.C.H.S. That first year was wonderful. Everyone was zealous and eager to make everything a "go".

The next year, Sr. M.Vera, our present competent principal came to bless our school with her presence. She was so zestful, so full of ambition, that all of us mentally resolved to live up to her high hopes, and, to make a long story short, that second year was glorious.

Pioneering was great fun. Our assembly room was picturesque. We scorned the regular school desks, and gloried in the tables and folding chairs that were provided for us. We laughed, we learned, and we came out winners. Our faculty that year included Rev. J.A. Seimetz, Sr.M.Vera, Sr.M. Antonita and Sr.M Odelia. Rev. Otto Peters, our capable assistant, then made things look bright by injecting some athletic spirit into our school: and Rev Otto Peters by his splendid initiative and encouragement well deserves the title "Patron of D.C.H.S. Athletics."

Our third and fourth years of High School, the trial years, went on merrily. Sr.M sylvester was added to the faculty in the third year, and Sr. M. Almeda in the fourth year. Sr. Slylvester left after the third year, accompanied by the best wishes of the scholars, for she helped us pioneer, and our hearts are warm with praise for her. Sr.M.Almeda is still with us. She also captured our admiration by the splendid way she goes after things.

In September, 1922 we had the distinction of being honored by affiliation with the Catholic University of America, which was a boon to teachers and students alike.

With the graduating of the five Pioneer High School Students: Aloysius Schneider, Andrew Appleman, Charlotte Niblick, Irene Holthouse and Margaret Mylott, the High School was a thing complete. It was a reality.

Today, the beautiful, new Catholic School, that will house both the grad and High School departments, is being constructed, and it is a wonderful monument to those wh dream of things that make life worthwhile.

D.C.H.S. offers a classical course as well as a Commercial course. The present faculty of D.C.H.S. is composed of REV.J.A. Seimetz, Rev. O. Peters, ST.M.Vera, Principal, Sr. M.Antonita, Sr. M. Almeda Sr. M.Beata and Sr. M. Claude. What can we say to express our appreciation of the efforts of those sacrificing teachers? Sr. M. Vera has devoted herself, heart and soul to the success of our High School, and has succeeded wonderfully. Sr. M. Antonita, our first High School teacher, is still with us. Her splendid faith in all of us has always given us added impetus. Sr. M. Almeda's three years with our school has endeared her to all who know her. Sr. M. Beata is a new member of the faculty this year. She has already won a favored spot in the hearts of students. Sr. M Claude, who has been added to the faculty this year, has seen her enthusiasm for music kindled a like love of harmonious sounds in the hearts of her pupils. Under her guidance we are looking forward to great things in music for the future.

The School is growing. The Pioneer days are glimmering and fading into the distance, and a wonderful vista of advancement lies before us. The former students, Alumni, have ever the best interest of the old Alma Mater at heart, and plans are being discussed now for the founding of an Alumni Association for the purpose of "Carrying On."

So, a dream has materialized, and stand today, embodied in fullest reality, a glorious tribute to our noble pastor, his assistants and his co-workers, the Sisters, the great-hearted people of St.Mary's Parish, and the students and alumni of the grand old school.

D.C.H.S. BEGAN ATHLETICS, 1920

Rapid Progess Made In Athletics Despite Small Number of Boys

In the fall of 1920, a mere handful of girls held a meeting with Father Peters and organized a basketball team. This marked the beginning of athletics in D.C.H.S. The pioneer athletes were Margaret Mylott, Irene Holthouse, Charlotte Niblick, Helen Gass, Marie Foos, Anna Baker, and Anna Dowling.

Not to be outdone by the girls, the boys (although only two in number) linked themselves with the eighth grade boys, who later showed such great prowess, and formed a team. This was in the season of 1920-21.

SEASON OF 1921

In September, 1921, the boys definitely organized a basketball team for they had six freshmen join them. Father Peters proffered his services as coach. No definite schedule was arranged, but the coach managed to secure eight games for the boys. Although they lost five of the games, they felt they had gained much in the way of experience.

The girls reorganized their team and progressed under the guidance of Father Peters. they played several games with D.H.S. and the St.Catherine girls of Fort Wayne, and always made a splendid showing.

SEASON OF 1922

In 1922, athletics were given a decided boost when the services of Lawrence Linn, former D.H.S. star, were secured. Mr. Linn proved an efficent coach, for his charges made very creditable showings against teams representing schools with a far larger enrollment than that of D.C.H.S.

The girls' team, having learned the fundamentals of the game, enjoyed the priviledge of competing with six or seven out of town teams. In the majority of the games, they had the short end of the score, but this was undoubtedly because of their lack of experience. Nevertheless, their spirits never ebbed and they persistently stuck to the rope until the end of the season, and made plans for a bigger and better girls team in 1923.

SEASON OF 1923

In 1923, athletics were given an added impetus by the addition of football to the curriculum of sports. This was made possible by the active interest and generosity of many local business men, who contributed the magnificent sum of \$500 for the purchase of football equipment. France Conter, local, wide-awake, you business man, accepted the difficult task of working with raw material. Raw, indeed, for many of the boys had never before enyaged in even a practice game of this famous sport. However, Mr. Conter more than fulfilled his contract as is readily seen by comparing the team's first defeat, 56-0, with its second, 24-7. the team closed the season without a victory, but they were not discouraged and looked forward to the bright prospects of the coming year.

Soon after Thanksgiving, th boys and girls opened the basketball season. Since the former coach, Lawrence Linn, was now a student at the University of Indiana, France Conter,, graduate of the U of I and football coach, became the director of the boys' team. Father Peters, the manager, arranged a schedule of sixteen games. The team made an enviable record that year, losing only three games. Two of these were lost to C.C.H.S. by scores of 14-10 and 13-12.

The 1923-24 basketball season was a great improvement over past seasons for the girls as well as the boys. The Varsity (girls) won eight out of twelve games played.

SERSON OF 1924

The football season of 1924 was a failure as far as victories is concerned, yet it cannot be considered a failure in every respect. Experience had been gained in each game, and valuable material was uncovered for the next team.

Prying off the lid of the '24-'25 basketball season was somewhat more successful than a similar event in football. Father Peters, manager, arranged a schedule of twenty games. These included Pennville, C.C.H.S., Cathedral of Indianapolis and others of importance.the first game with Pennville was a thriller, but D.C.H.S. proved itself winner by the close score of 19-18. At this game the boys displayed new uniforms of green and gold.

This season proved to be the most successful ever played by the warriors of the green and gold. They came through a series of 18 games, undefeated, the most brilliant record any school could wish for its team. Some of the victims of their prowess were: Pennville, St.Mary's of Huntington, C.C.H.S., C.H.S. of Indianpolis, Gibault of Vincennes, St.Patricks of Ft.Wayne, and Sts Peter and Paul of Huntington.

ENTER NATIONAL TOURNEY

Since the team came through the season without a defeat, the were invited to compete in the National Catholic Basketball Tournament, held in Chicago at Loyola University. Local fans furnished the necessary funds for the trip. The players, accompanied by Coach Conte and Father Peters, left for Chicago on the 2:22 A.M. train Wednesday morning, March 15 (1925). Those who made the trip were E. Christen, R. Voglewede, B. Meyer, H.Holthous, G.Laurent, F.Schultz, A.Voglewede, C.Gass and A.Wemhoff.

We entered the tournament unknown and unheralded. No one seemed to care about Decatur, nor think they had a chance. The team gained recognition and praise by winning it's first game over last year's champions, Spauldig Institute of Peoria, Illinois, 24-23. Next, the team was scheduled to play St. Thomas Academy of St. Paul, who had been the favorites of the dopesters, the team rallied after trailing 8-5 at the end of the half and came through with a 21-16 victory, the third opponents happened to be St. Viator's College from Bourbonais, Illinois. This was a very interesting tussle, and D.C.H.S. again proved itself the better team, leading in the final score, 18-12.

Finally came the St.Mels game, which proved fatal to the D.C.H.S. boys, who were becoming the favorites of the dopesters. The local lads were far in the lead when Lady Luck frowned upon them and put Gass out of the game with a sprained ankle. The team was lost without Gass. Their opponents took advantage of the lack of defense and added six points to their score. With twelve seconds to play they tied the score 11-11. This made a five-minute overtime period necessary. St.Mel's, hot from their rally, scored the winning two points. this gave St.Mels the game as they prevented D.C.H.S. from scoring again.

This defeat was the first suffered by the locals in twenty-two games. It was a heartbreaking defeat for both fans and players, but everyone in "the old home town" was more than satisfied and proud of the wonderful record made

by the wearers of the green and gold.

Too much praise could hardly be given to this team when on considers that the many teams represented schools with an enrollment of several hundred boys. D.C.H.S. had eight boys last year.

The girls, also, had a successful season in 1924-25. Although greatly outweighed and often smaller in stature, they defeated eight of twelve opponents. They lost only one player, G. Smith, by graduation, so that they are confident of having an all-star team this season.

The boys have not organized a football team this year, because of a lack of players and no definitely arranged schedule. However, they are anxiously awaiting practice in the new gymnasium which will probably start next week. The outlook for a successful basketball season is bright. Three first string men, Voglewede, Holthouse, and Christen, and two subs, Schulte and Laurent, were lost by graduation. Nevertheless, D.C.H.S., with veterans, Gass, Meyer, Wemhoff and A.Voglewede, hopes to establish such a record as will justify their entering the National Catholic Tournament again next March. Coach Conter will continue his excellent work and Father Peters has already arranged many games with prominent Catholic high school teams.

This was the most successful season in Decatur Catholic's short history. Two of their three losses were to Fort Wayne Central Catholic. Catholic's other loss was to Fort Wayne St.Patricks, and they avenged that loss later in the season.

With seven minutes remaining Carl Lose, forward, slipped under the net to tie the score and in a few seconds, Petie Mylott, star guard of the Commodores threw the Decatur fans into a pandemonium by slipping the ball through the nests from midfloor to put Decatur in the lead for the first time during the game. This was followed by field goals by Gass, Wemhoff and Gage, while the best Vincennes could do was score one fielder in the remaining nimutes of the game.

The game was wild throughout and the fifty some odd Decatur fans never gave up, always cheering the Commodores on.

Wagner, Gibault center, was the mainstay of the losers, hitting the net six times from the field and four times from the free throw line. Little and Delisle, Vincennes forwards, each counted three time from the field and Delisle added a free throw.

Every Commodore regular counted from the field. Gage scored once, Gass hit the nets five times; Wemhoff scored twice; Carl Lose snagged three, two from a distance and one from under the basket on a pass from Mylott and Petie Mylott, winner of the Feeney medal for being the most valuable player to his team at the tourney here two years ago, got four field goals and four free throws.

The Commodores continued to pile up a lead and went into the finals as the 75 Decatur fans went wild with enthusiasm and swarmed out on the floor to congratulate the "tourney dark horses."

Decatur's opposition in tonight's game will be either Cathedral or Jasper. At 3:30 o'clook Cathedral of Indianapolis and Jasper were scheduled to play. Dope favored Cathedral to fight it out with the Commodores in the finals.

Cathedral won a great battle with Central Catholic of Fort Wayne this morning to move on to the afternoon bracket. The game was close and it was not until late in the game that Cathedral took a commanding lead and won the battle 12-16. Washington defeated Catholic Central of the Calumet district and Jasper defeatd Richmond.

Decatur Catholic high school Commodores returned to this city Sunday afternoon with the state Catholic basketball title tucked safely away. It was the first time in the history of state Catholic tournaments that Decatur won the title.

The Laurentmen defeated a tough Jasper Acedemy team Saturday night in the finals to win a free railroad ticket to the nation Catholic tourney at Chicago which starts a week from Wednesday.

The Commodores entered the tournament as a decided "dark horse" largely because of the up and down season's record. Early in the season the Commodores began suffering various injuries. First Pete Mylott was injured. Then Bill Gass was sick, then someone else would be out of a game. As a result the Commodores lost several games, but whatever they did all season was forgotten at the tourney, and headed by Gass and Mylott the Commodores tore through three of the toughest Catholic teams in the state Saturday and returned with the championship.

In the final game with Jasper about half of Decatur had moved down to the National Guard Amory at Indianapolis. In the opening half, Bill Gass, who was the outstanding forward of the tournament, grabbed the ball and tossed four times at the basket from mid-floor and four time the ball rang through without even hitting the backboard.

This with the accurate passing ability of the Laurentmen took the heart out of the team from Dubois county, which had been a strong early-tourney favorite and the Commodores led all the way.

The score at half time was 18-11 in favor of Decatur. In the second period Wemhoff, who had been playing great basketball all day crashed through the Jasper defense with three field goals and Petie Mylott, bad leg and all dribbled for 4 two pointers.

As the final minutes arrived the Decatur crowd was wild, and when the timer ended the game and the score stood 35-24 in favor of Decatur, the hundreds of local fans went wild with excitement.

Each member of the Commodore team received a minature gold basketball and the school received a silver loving cup. The team will also be sent to the national Catholic tourney at Chicago by the state association.

COMMODORES WIN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

(The following article was reprinted from the 1930 TATTLER, DCHS yearbook.)

The Decatur Catholic High School Commodores have completed another basketball season, which, was in the end, crowned with success.

During the first half the Commodores were crippled by injuries of several of last year's veterans. When the team finally did get together they were unable to hit their stride. They played championship basketball in one game and then for two or three games almost any kind of a team could have defeated them. Different combinations were tried, but to no avail. finally, about the first of February, when all championship teams begin to bear down, the Commodores fell right in line and did the same. They began their campaign by trouncing an Indiana team and then swept past four strong Buckeve teams.

They then faced a task which only a good team can tackle: that of winning the State Catholic basketball title. Decatur was not given much of a chance by anyone, except by the members of the team and those immediately connected with it. They knew that the Commodores could and would win, because they were playing only the brand of ball which wins tournaments. When it came to a showdown the Commodores proved the surprise.

In their first game the met Gibalut High of Vincennes. The Green and Gold received the closet call of the tournement during this game. Apparently slightly over-confident, they were unable to hold the Vincennes team for the first three quarters. However, they staged a rally in the last quarter to overcome a seven-point lead and win 39-33.

The Commodores did not play in the second round due to a break they received in the drawing. They entered the semifinal game with Washington Catholic, determined to break their semi-final jinx. Using a slow-breaking offense, which they worked to perfection they defeated the southern team 24-15. They were the firs Commodore team to enter the finals of any tournament.

Spurred on by several hundred fans from Decatur the home team entered the final game against the strong Jasper Academy team. Jasper had previously defeated Anderson, Richmond, and Cathedral of Indianapolis. The Commodores gained a lead in the first guarter and were masters of the situation thereafeter. The Jasper team felt the effects of their battle with Indianapolis during the afternoon. Gass put fire into the entire team by sinking seven field goals. Sage and Mylott both played good defensive games. Wemhoff and Lose both found time to drop in several field goals each.

The Commodores are now in possession of the cup which goes to the team winning the championship. They received a permanent trophy and each member of the team received an individual souvenir. As a result of winning the State Catholic Net Title they were given an invitation to compete in the National Catholic Tourney at Chicaso.

Wemhoff, regular center, who played an important part in winning the State Title, was out of the lineup due to illness. However, the Commodores proved that were not yellow by defeating the Pennsylvania champions 21-16.

St.Louis University High was the next obstacle. It was a bigger and rangier team than the Green and Gold outfit. Harris was in the lineup in place of Wemhoff who was still unable to play. The score was 19 to 17 in favor of Decatur, but the game was much closer than the score indicates. Harris played a great defensive game and found time to score four points.

The Commodores were now ready to enter the third round against the strong De LaSalle team of Chicago. They were forced to battle a team which averaged six feet in height and two hundred pounds in weight with Wemhoff on the bench during most of the game. The game was almost a repetition of last year's semi-final game. The two teams fought on even terms and De LaSalle eked out a 20 to 16 victory in the closing minutes. De LaSalle incidentally won the tournament for the second consecutive time by defeating Charleston, South Carolian in the semi-finals and Jasper Academy, of Jasper, Indiana in the finals. Jasper was the first Indiana team to reach the finals in the National Tourney.

COMMODORES' STATE TITLE MARCH RECALLED

(The following article appeared in the September 17, 1994 issue of the Decatur Democrat)

Editors note: Phil Loranger is a resident of South Bend and a free lance writer. He submitted the following article to the Democrat after a conversation with Mary Colchin Becker, his neighbor in South Bend. Becker is a former Decatur resident who attended Decatur Catholic High School from 1929-1932.

Marv Wood, head basketball coach at Saint Mary's College has garnered his fair share of media attention while directing his Belles to a long string of succussful seasons.

Of course, Wood is most remembered for leading little Milan High School to the Indiana State basketball Championship in 1954, defeating some of the state's powerehouses along the way. The "Milan Miracle" was the feat that inspired the hit movie "Hoosiers".

But Coach Wood would be among the first to aknowlede that an even smaller high school captured a state basketball title two decades earlier than his Milan squad, and , while overcoming odds that would have made drawing to an inside straight look easy, the little school received only local mention in its community newspaper.

It's time to correct that oversight.

The school was Decatur Catholic High School, the title was Indiana Catholic High School Basketball Champions. The date was March 30, 1930. The team was named the Commodores. The coach was a dairy worker. And the squad's tallest player was a "giant" at 5-foot-9.

The newspaper that gave the team some "ink" on its accomplishment was the venerable Decatur Daily Democrat.

Decatur Catholic High School is gone now. So, too, is the State Catholic High School Basketball Tournament. Their memories are simply cherished relics of an era that cannot

be recaptured. That in itself is a shame.

The school had a short life span. It was established on West Monroe Street in 1919 and closed its doors in 1964. (Note: Decatur Catholic's first basketball team was fielded in 1923.)

When the basketball season of 1930 rolled around, the school boasted an enrollment of less that 90 students, of which fewer that 40 were boys. Coach George (Shorty) Laurent, an employee of the Cloverleaf Creamery and a member of the school's 1925 graduating class, welcomed 11 youngsters for basketball tryouts. Six of the fellows had played in the past, five were first-time players.

Shory Laurent did not envision a winning season. Any nopes he had that his green and gold clad Commodores might even enjoy a few victories were further dampened when several of his slated starters came down with severe injuries and nagging illnesses.

As expected and much to the chagrin of the Decatur Catholic fans, the Commodores compiled a miserable four-win, nine-loss record mid-way through their season. Shorty Laurent was dismayed. In his third year at the helm of the team, his coaching was being critically reviewed.

Even Fr. J.A. Hession, the school's athletic director, began to fend off criticism of the team and its coach by bragging about the scholastic standings of our players. Truthfully, the fledging girls' softball team, under the tutelage of Jeannette Clark had a much higher grade-point average. Drawing to an inside straight started looking easier and easier.

Student managers Marcellus Miller and Julius Baker tried to console their down-in-the-mouth coach by telling him the team would jell in the second half of the season. And that's exactly what happened.

After absorbing a bitter 39-29 loss to New Haven, the team caught fire. Led by starters Bill Gass, Jerry Gage, Pete (Wemmie) Wemhoff, Fred Mylott and Otis Lose, the Commodores whipped Kirkland, 36-16. Somewhere in Decatur, a bell rang. It wasn't ta loud bong, more like a ping, but a bell nonetheless.

Bolstered by some reserves from the "B" squad, fellows like underclassmen Leo Schultz, George Harris, Bob Holthouse, Eddie Hess, Bob Kleinhenz and Edward Vian, Coach Laurent actually gained the capability to insert a substitute into his lineup now and then.

Next up on the schedule of the struggling Commodores were four of the most talented squads from Ohio. In an age when every score was followed by a center-court jumpball, the youths from Decatur Catholic beat Catholic Central of Toledo, St.Rose of Lima, Chaminade High School of Dayton, and St.John of Lima.

Suddenly, the Commodores had a season ending record of 9-9.

Sister Marie Vera, C.S.A., principal of the diminutive high school, lit a candle in the chapel and then she pulled the rope that snet the school bell pealing. Heck, it was tournament time and her beloved boys were on a five game roll.

While the Senior Debate Club argued over the subject, "Be it resolved that it is better to attend a small college than a large one," (the large colleges won) the basketball squad entered the State Catholic Basketball Tournament.

The Decaturs, boasting a mediocre regular season record were given about as much of a chance to cop the title as Wabash College had of defeating the Notre Dame football team. (Actually, Wabash gave coach Knute Rockne's squads as much as they could handle in those days.) Few Jave the Commodores a chance to survive the first game, but the players, most of whom were so much shorter than their opponents they could have used radar to launch their shots at the goal like a pilotin a cloud bank, surprised everybody but themselves.

In their opening game of the tournament they met vaunted Guilbault of Vincennes. Unable to hold their opponents in check for the first three quarters, the Commodores staged a furious rally in the last stanza to claim a 39-33 victory.

If ever a team needed a break, it was the Decatur Catholic squad, and a break is exactly what it got, drawing a bye in the second round to reach the semi-finals, where the team was pitted against heavily favored Washington Catholic.

Using what Coach Laurent dubbed, "My slow breaking offense, the scrappy Decatur boys upended their taller rivals, 24-15, to become the first Commodore team ever to reache the finals of any tournament.

Spurred on by several hundred hometown fans, who had made the trip to Indianapolis, the Commodores completed their whirlwind season by thoroughly outplaying Jasper Acedemy and inflicting a 35-24 defeat on their foes to capture the State Catholic net title. In the final game, Bill Gass tossed in seven field goals, while both Mylott and Gage scored three field goals each.

The school received a permanent trophy, which still rests in the display case at St. Mary's and each player received a miniature of the prestigious cup.

As a result of winning the state championship, the team was invited to play in the National Catholic Tournament in Chicago.

In the first round, the Commodores defeated Altoona Catholic High, the Catholic champions of Pennsylvania, 21-16. Next, they stunned St.Louis University High of Missour: by a count of 19-17, but lost their encounter with Thicago's DeLaSalle High 20-16. The Chicagoans eventually won the national tournament.

The loss was a heartbreaker, but the little Commodores could still look at their state trophy and know they had accomplished what few persons had ever thought they could. They had hit that elusive straight, and in Decatur all the church bells rang out in a salute to their success.

The idea for the venture came about two years ago when Bob vissted the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in New Castle.

Upon his investigation, he found there was almost no available information on smaller schools which had not achieved the fame and status as programs at Marion, Muncie Central and New Castle.

"What I found was a lot of information on programs which had a lot of success over the years but almost no information on programs which had not enjoyed as much success," he said.

With that in mind, he researched the availability of what information and other data had been compiled and published about Adams County basketball

Upon finding no complete history being published in book form. Bnb decided to undertake the task of authoring a book about the complete history of Adams County basketball

His search began at the Decatur Public Library where he examined two published history books of Adams County, "From there, I got what high schools ever existed and if they had any success in basketball during their existence," he said.

With a list of schools and basic information diagrammed, he then began examining library microfilm of old newspapers detailing each basketball team's history and story, "I just recorded what each team did, their records, coaches, players, leading scorer, tourney results and other general information which the average reader would enjoy knowing." he said.

After going through all newspaper microfilms from 1920 until 1960. he then expanded his search to go through old yearbooks and began

contacting all of the former coaches who had connections with Adams County haskethall.

"I've just been contacting DECATUR-Bob Adams is mak- coaches over the past couple of months and response has been good. I have received a lot of information from them. A lot of the former with me and like to relive their glury day in Hoosier Hysteria," he said.

As a member, Boh meets with knowledgeable persons throughout Indiana about basketball's past. Through this association, he has gained a lot of information about Adams County hasketball from other authors who had gained other information which has helps Bob while writing their own books about basketball in other parts of Indiana.

The two authors' research I've used most has been that of Harley Sheets and Joe Ouigley," he said.

Sheets wrote "Where in the World is Westview, Wanahani and Wes-Del" volumes one and two. He also wrote, "Lebanon Basketball: A Tiger Passion."

Quigley is a former sportswriter from South Bend who is currently writing a history of Catholic High School basketball. He also publishes a newsletter about state tourney that he sends to Indiana natives who now reside in the south

From these two authors. Bob gained lists of past Bluffton and Adams County boys and girls sectional winners as well as a few season records and names of past coaches.

The purpose of the IHSBS is to supply the Indiana Baskethall Hall of Fame with information on the smaller schools which are not currently logged in the Hall of Fame's records

He has also been going through past copies of the Berne Tri-Weekly (old Beme Witness copies) and other county newspapers taking available information from the Sports pages he will be able to incorporate in his the 1960s to present because records



ule existed in Decatur in 1908, I found a picture of a girls team from 1906. The earliest mention of Beme basketball is from 1907," he said.

From his research. Bob has determined that C.E. Beck was the first basketball coach hired in Berne as a teacher and coach of all boys sports.

In Decatur, Bob found that a man named "Brown" was the first teacher coach at the old Decatur High School in 1908 Later M.E. Worthman, father of former Decatur football and basketball coach Boh Worthman, who went on to become a superintendent, also coached foothall and hove baskethall.

The first girls basketball coach at Berne was J.D. French in 1915, who was the school principal, and left there in 1921 and became superintendent of schools in Wells County.

Bob feels he will have little trouble researching basketball from are easily obtainable from past copies of newspapers and yearbooks. "Former coaches are also still available to gain information from," he
