

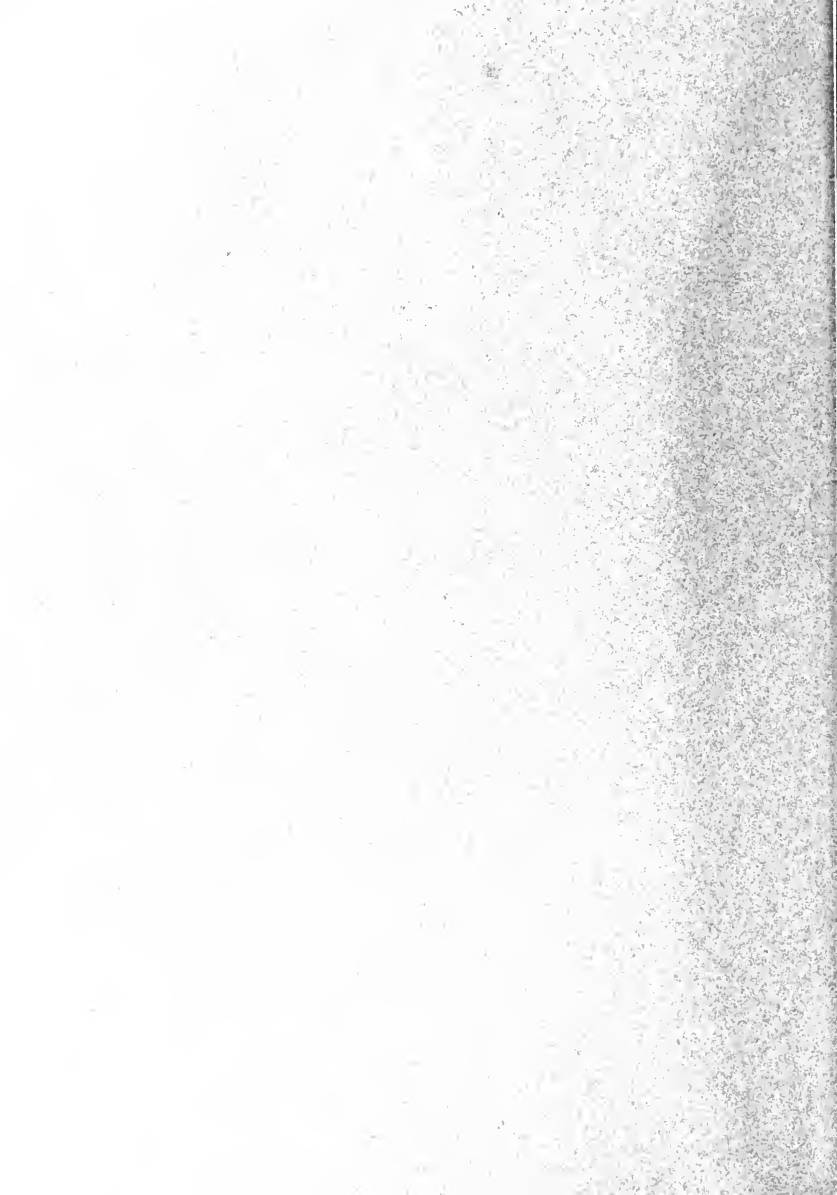

Northern Ireland came to life in Elizabethtown as the Department of Fine and Performing Arts presented Brenden Bohan's *The Hostage* on November 12, 13, 19 and 20. This 1958 play encapsulates the realistic saga of surviving in that war-torn society. The audience experiences a poignant day in the slums of Dublin.

The Hostage revolves around the title character, Leslie Williams, a British serviceman held captive by the Irish Republican Army.

The play is set in a seedy boarding house, but four walls can not contain the breadth of this emotional journey. The plot meanders through the humorous antics of a motley assortment of characters, and a bittersweet romance is glimpsed between the Hostage and Teresa, the house maid, until crashing to the heartbreakingly violent conclusion.

Memorable performances were turned in by a cast filled with many players taking their first bows on Etown's stage. The production was also the first in the newly redesigned Alumni Theater.

The Names Project

3 Goals:

1. to illustrate the enormity of the AIDS epidemic by showing the humanity of the statistic.
2. to provide a positive and creative means of expression for those whose lives have been touched by the epidemic.
3. to support the raising of funds and encourage support for people living with AIDS/HIV and their loved ones.

The Names Project was started by Cleve Jones in San Francisco.

The first year it was displayed, more than 2,000 panels were spread on the Capitol Mall in Washington, D.C.

Since 1987, there have been over 1,000 displays of the Quilt in churches, schools, prisons, and malls.

The Project has received over \$1.5 million in donations.

AIDS QUILT

Students and faculty alike became more aware of the danger of AIDS during AIDS Awareness Week. The activities included the opening ceremony, a candlelight vigil, several speakers, a non-denominational church service, and the closing ceremony. The featured event, though, was the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt which was displayed in Hershey Hall for three days. Campus members and the public were invited to view the Quilt, which consisted of 65 units made of 520 panels. Although this was only a portion of the 27,000 piece quilt that had been laid out on the Capitol Mall in Washington, D.C., few

who entered Hershey Hall and read the inscriptions left with dry eyes. The effect was tremendous.

An estimated 3,000 people paid tribute to the Quilt, and a total of \$11,000 was raised during the weekend. The money will be distributed among three local beneficiaries.

The Quilt honors the thousands who have been killed by the AIDS disease. Its panels will continue to travel, informing viewers of the severity and importance of AIDS. In bringing the Quilt to Elizabethtown College, everyone was touched by it and will always remember "Not a Number, But A Name."

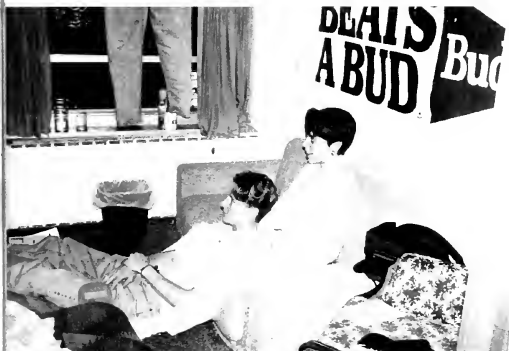

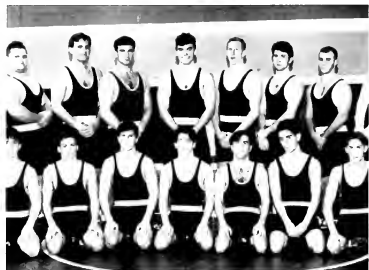

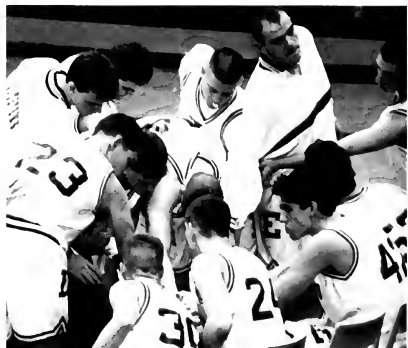

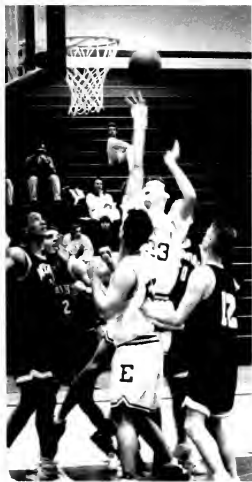
This year also marked some important events in the history of E-town hoops.

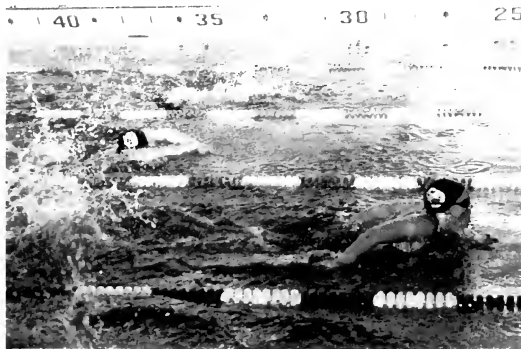
Making Waves

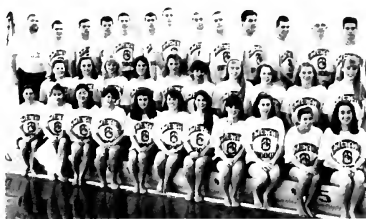

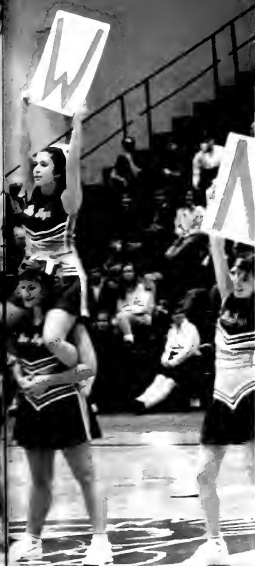
