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
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

This is the first volume of the "Elements," although not so numbered, with approbations dated March 25 and April 28, 1877, and copyright of 1877 by Benziger Brothers. In the preface (undated) a supplementary volume was promised, which appeared in 1882, and a third volume in 1888.

Shortly after publication of the first edition, several articles in criticism of the work appeared in the "Catholic Universe," of Cleveland, Ohio, under the signature of Rev. P. F. Quigley, D.D., which were reprinted in pamphlet form under the title, "Points in Canon Law," to which Dr. Smith replied in his "Counterpoints in Canon Law." In order to have the disputed points determined by authority, a copy of the book was sent to Rome, to His Eminence Cardinal Simeoni, Prefect of the Propaganda, to have it thoroughly examined. The examination was made by two Consultors, doctors in Canon Law, and their recommendations for revision were scrupulously followed in this third edition, the preface of which gives an account of the controversy and includes the two reports of the Consultors, accompanied by a letter from Cardinal Simeoni, dated 21 April 1879, all of which were reprinted in the later editions.

The Third Plenary Council of Baltimore was held Nov. 9-Dec. 7, 1884, and its decrees published in 1886 (our no. 72900, vol. 17), exhibit the actual canon law of the Church in the United States. This sixth edition was therefore revised to conform to these decrees, with new imprimaturs dated 14 and 17 January, 1887, new copyright 1887, and preface to the sixth edition, Paterson, N. J., February 20, 1887. A new section was also added, called Part IV, the new Diocesan Consultors in the United States, according to the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore; also supplementary notes.

"The subject of these pages—the marriage process—is comparatively new in this country. Down to the year 1884, marriage disputes, even those involving the validity of marriages already contracted, were, as a rule, decided, with us, by the bishop, or also by rectors of parishes, and sometimes even by assistant priests, without any judicial formalities whatever. This mode of procedure was naturally open to serious inconveniences, and was calculated to imperil, in many cases, the stability and indissolubility of marriages. To obviate these disadvantages, the S. C. de Prop. Fide, in 1884, issued the Instruction Causae Matrimoniales for this country. This Instruction or law substantially lays down and makes obligatory here, in matrimonial contentions involving the validity of a marriage contracted, the manner of proceeding which is prescribed by the general law of the Church and obtains throughout the entire Church. This mode of deciding marriage disputes is judicial, and is to be conducted by the bishop's court for marriage causes. ... The stability and sanctity of marriage require that valid marriages shall be protected against wanton and malicious attacks, and that invalid ones shall be either rendered valid or judicially declared invalid. The almanac for 1825 was by David M'Clure; the above is the second, and the first by Smith. Continued annually until 1837, the later issues having the words, "Calculated by Seth Smith," in the imprint. In 1829 the title reads "Desilver's United States Almanac," and from 1830-1837, "Desilver's United States Register and Almanac," published by Robert Desilver, No. 110 Walnut Street. In some years two or more editions were issued. There is a complete series in the library of the American Antiquarian Society, this and the following title being obtained through the courtesy of Clarence S. Brigham.

The "Washington Almanac" for 1846 was also calculated by Smith. The almanac for 1847 has not been seen; that for 1848 was calculated by Charles F. Egelmann.

The name of Seth Smith appears for several years as a teacher in the Philadelphia

directories, and in 1833 as teacher at the Franklin Institute.

Besides his activities on the stage, Sol. Smith had learned the printer's trade at Louisville, Kentucky, and started "The Independent Press" at Cincinnati in 1822, selling it in 1823, and beginning his theatrical career at that time. He was later part owner of "The Mercantile Advertiser" of Mobile, from 1837–1838, and according to the sketch of his life in De Menil's "Literature of the Louisiana Territory," 1904, pp. 95–97, wrote many uncollected articles for the New York "Spirit of the Times," the St. Louis "Daily Reveille," the St. Louis daily "People's Organ," and other papers published in the forties, fifties and early sixties.

Among Dr. Smith's professional works are his "Hand-book of Surgical Operations," of which five editions were published in 1862-1863; "Manual of the Principles and Practice of Operative Surgery," 1879, a new edition of which, "The Principles and Practice of Operative Surgery," appeared in 1887; and "Who is insane?" 1916, etc. His first contributions were published in the "New York Journal of Medicine," and he was connected editorially with that journal, 1853-1860, first as co-editor and from 1857 as editor in chief. His name appeared also as editor of its continuation, the "American Medical Times," from 1860-1863. He was for some years New York correspondent of the London "Lancet," and a frequent contributor. He contributed historical articles to Bryant and Buck's "American Practice of Surgery," 1906-1911, and to Stedman's edition of the "Reference Handbook of the Medical Sciences," 1913-1917, and an article on Hospital Construction and Organization in the Johns Hopkins Hospital's "Hospital Plans," 1875. Dr. Smith was instrumental in founding the American Public Health Association, being its first president. As a member of the Council of Hygiene in New York he worked toward the establishment of the city's Board of Health, and was for some time a commissioner. He drafted the law which created a State Board and also that for a National Board, becoming a member of the latter. A letter from him, giving a history of the National Board and a plea for conferring upon it all public health duties and powers exercised by the central government, appeared in one of the Board's publications, "Remarks before the Committee of Public Health of the House of Representatives," 1884. He was also for many years a member of the State Board of Charities, and Commissioner of Lunacy. A sketch of Dr. Smith by M. P. After the first half year it passed into the latter's hands in that city, and the last number was published on March 15, 1826, the month before the first issue of the new series of the "Herald."

In the Library of Congress copy it is evident that an earlier inscription on the engraved title has been erased, and the imprint of Willig substituted. Mr. Sonneck in his "Bibliography of Early Secular American Music," 1905, described a copy in the possession of the Hopkinson family of Philadelphia, in which the earlier imprint could be distinguished as that of I. C. Moller, 136 [?] North Third Street Between . . [?]. John Christopher Moller, professor of music, was, according to Philadelphia directories, at 163 North Third Street in 1793, at a different address in 1791, and does not appear at all in the list for 1794, so that it is probable that the first issue which had his name in the imprint was published about 1793. Willig's address in 1796 was 165 Market Street. In 1798 he was located at 185 High, which according to the street directory was commonly called Market, Street. As the directoring to the following years use the name "High," in preference to "Market," it seems likely that the reissue was before 1800, possibly in 1797. Mr. A. J. Wall states that the Buckingham Smith Collection of manuscripts was, through the bequest of the latter, acquired by the New York Historical Society in February, 1872. It consists for the most part of transcripts and abstracts from original documents in Spanish archives, dating from 1500 to 1786, and relating chiefly to the early settlement of Florida, but also to Central America and the West Indies. There are in all nineteen bound volumes, and three boxes of miscellaneous manuscripts. The principal volumes of the collection may be listed as follows: North American Manuscripts, 1500–1560 (64 transcripts); the same, 1561–1593 (69 transcripts); the same, 1607–1786 (47 transcripts); Florida Manuscripts, 1526–1743 (90 transcripts). Also included in these volumes are copies and tracings of important early maps of America and of signatures affixed to the original documents. After Mr. Smith's death, his library of printed books was offered for sale to the New York Historical Society, by the administrators of his estate, and was purchased and presented to the Society by John David Wolfe in 1872.

Mr. Smith died in September of the same year, and the remaining partner being unable to discharge the debts, the Senate initiated a measure empowering the Secretary of the Treasury to make a compromise with the agent of the firm. This was also reported favorably by the Judiciary Committee of the House, and in June, 1832, an act to that effect was passed by Congress. Offers made by the agent were at first unsatisfactory, and different from propositions presented before

the passage of the act, amounting merely to release of claims against the government for seizure of property, estimated at about \$171,000, and to surrender of debenture bonds at about \$90,000. The matter, with documents relating to the case, was referred to Congress, which refused to interfere. The negotiations were continued until finally in 1835 the affair was settled by the agreement of the agent to pay in addition, the sum of \$200,000 in money.

It was continued until 1831, when the board directed its removal to Indian Territory, to work among the Shawnees. Many of the Indians wished to follow him, and this movement was opposed by the Catholic missionaries who had come into the region. "A worthless fellow, not a Catholic, whose tongue, as far as he was personally known, could not injure any body, was prompted to publish a pamphlet, complaining of mismanagement at Carey during its existence. This poor creature had, no doubt, been encouraged to hope that he could sell his pamphlets, so as to realize some moneyed "reward of iniquity," in which he doubtless was disappointed. The style of the book was wretchedly bad, and the story contained its own refutation: and we could not, therefore, notice it by a reply." Smith stated in his "Dissertation on Indian Treaties," that he moved from the state of New York to Fort Defiance, on the Maumee River, in 1819, and was appointed Post Master there. Besides his trading with the Indians he held a number of other local offices in that region. He settled in the neighborhood of Carey in 1826, and might have been among the traders who are mentioned by McCoy as demoralizing the Indians with whiskey. In the introduction to the 1858 edition, Smith states that the work was first published in the second session of the 32d Congress (1852-1853), at Washington. Some of the depositions are dated in January, 1853. Mr. Smith's pamphlet and the memorial of Mr. Wells presented the claims of the father of the latter, Horace Wells, a dentist of Hartford, to being the first to discover the practical value of anæsthesia when he made use of nitrous oxide in 1844; it was also urged that his heirs should receive any financial reward incidental thereto. The occasion was the agitation in Congress toward the appropriation of the sum of \$100,000 to purchase from Dr. William G. T. Morton of Boston the surrender of patents issued to him and Dr. Charles T. Jackson, after their introduction of the use of ether in surgery in 1846. The superior claims of Dr. C. W. Long of Georgia who had operated with ether as

early as 1842, and of Dr. Jackson, who had suggested its use to Dr. Morton, were also brought forward by supporters. Mr. Victor Smith was the former collector of customs of the Puget Sound District, to which office he had been appointed as a protégé of Secretary Chase. The charges are embodied in letters of Dr. A. G. Henry, later surveyor general of Washington Territory, addressed to the President, and written in Washington in March, 1863, and in other documents, including an indictment in the Third Judicial District of the Territory, also a "memorandum made by the President after a ful! examination of the case," which is dated March 16, 1863. Mr. Smith had made himself disliked in various ways, and especially by forcibly removing the custom house from Port Townsend to Port Angeles, the site of a new city to be called Cherburg, which he was interested in developing. On May 8th, 1863, Mr. Lincoln wrote to Mr. Chase: "My mind is made up to remove Victor Smith ... I do not decide that the charges against him are true. I only decide that the degree of dissatisfaction with him there is too great for him to be retained." A new collector was therefore appointed for the district, and when Mr. Smith was sent back later as a special agent of the Treasury, he constructed at Port Angeles a building which was leased to the government for the custom house. In 1865, however, both Dr. Henry and Mr. Smith were lost at sea on the steamer Brother Jonathan, and in the same year the custom house was moved back to Port Townsend. The Onondaga Salt Springs Reservation, which originally included much of the site of the present city of Syracuse, and other territory around Onondaga Lake, was among the lands acquired by the State through treaties with the Indians in 1788 and 1797. In the latter year the legislature passed the first law regulating the leasing of land and the manufacture of salt in the reservation, and the first superintendent was appointed. The actual manufacture was carried on by private companies under state supervision, with duties on each bushel inspected. The superintendent was to report annually to the legislature. These reports were printed regularly in the state documents, and also issued separately. The first report was that for 1797, and though the State disposed of the last salt lands in its possession by sale to manufacturers in July, 1908, a final report was issued for 1909 in which the superintendent stated that he expected to wind up the business of the state during the coming year. For a list of the reports and other documents relating to the Onondaga Salt Springs, see A. R. Hasse's "Index of Economic Material in Documents of . . . New York," 1907, pp. 274-279. A sketch of the history of the springs from the time of Lallemant's mention of them in his "Relation," 1647, is found in Clark's "Onondaga," 1849, vol. 2, pp. 7-44. Mr. Vivus W. Smith, after a brief newspaper experience in western Massachusetts became a prominent journalist and politician of central New York. He bought the "Onondaga Journal" in 1827, and in 1829 united it with the "Syracuse Advertiser" to form the "Onondaga Standard," which with John F. Wyman he edited for a few years. In 1839 he was one of the founders of the "Western State Journal" which became in 1844 the "Syracuse Weekly Journal." This paper was connected with his family for many years. He was also for a few years on the staff of the "Ohio State Journal," and was connected with other newspapers in New York City and elsewhere. Biographical sketches are found in Bruce's "Onondaga's Centennial," 1896, vol. 2, pp. 191-192, and in the "National Cyclopædia of American Biography." See

Elisha Baxter and V. V. Smith were elected governor and lieutenant governor respectively in 1872, as candidates of one of two Republican groups. Joseph Brooks, the gubernatorial candidate of the other group, forcibly disputed the election, but in May, 1874, Baxter was recognized by Grant. Thereupon Baxter turned his back upon the carpet bagging element, and approved a bill passed by the legislature calling for a constitutional convention. The constitution adopted by the convention was ratified, and in accordance with it, an election was set for October 13, in which A. H. Garland, a Democrat, was elected governor. In his letter dated Oct. 1 of that year, Smith claimed that the new constitution was illegal, and that the election when held would be invalid; that if Baxter wished to retire from the governorship before his four year term had expired, he, Smith, would be the only legal successor. He went to

Washington, but received no support from the Republican leaders. On November 23rd Governor Garland offered a reward for his arrest, but he was never taken. Professor Smith, who was formerly the headmaster of the Leeds School of Art in England, was invited by the city of Boston in 1871 to organize its instruction in drawing, and in the same year was appointed by the State Board of Education as an agent to promote art education in Massachusetts. On the establishment of the State Normal Art School in 1873, he also became its director. His service to the city continued till 1881, and to the state until 1882, when though his valuable contributions to art education were recognized in the report of an investigating committee of the legislature, his opponents were able to bring about his dismissal. Of special interest is his "Report" to the School Committee on the condition of drawing in the public schools of Boston, 1880, which contains a summary of his work in that city. As State Director of Art Education he prepared annual reports for the years, 1872-1876, and 1879-1881, which were printed in the "Annual Report" of the State Board of Education, and separately. In 1882 Professor Smith returned to England and became the head of the art department of the Technical College at Bradford. A description of his work and influence and reprints of many of his reports and papers forms a considerable part of vol. 1, 1885, of Clarke's "Art and Industry," published by the U. S. Bureau of Education, while an appreciation of him written after his death is found on pp. xlii-xlviii of vol. 2, 1892. Hildeburn, who bought this copy from the bookseller Charles L. Woodward for the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, several years after the publication of his "Issues of the Press in Pennsylvania," which accounts for its not being included in that record. A comparison with Moses West's "Treatise concerning Marriage" (Hildeburn no. 590), printed about the same time, shows similar type and style of pagination; and the square star shaped ornaments which serve as a tail piece on page 91, were often used by Bradford, as in the "American Weekly Mercury" for August 31 and September 21, 1738, and in the title border of Leeds's "American Almanack" for 1733. Although Mr. Smith's Opinion was delivered first, on the 7th of June, and Mr. Murray's on the 12th, the latter was printed first, as shown by the two lists of errata on the same page. The publication was advertised in the "New-York Gazette," no. 465, September 16-23, 1734. Following the title and synopsis of Mr. Smith's Opinion, the advertisement reads, "To which is added The Opinion of Mr. Murray, ... Printed by order of the General Assembly, and, Sold by William Bradford."

Because of the efforts of the opposition party to have the court of exchequer abolished, Mr. Smith and Mr. Murray were asked to give the arguments for and against its legality as established by prerogative. Mr. Smith took the ground that English courts had always been under statutory regulation, and that with the abolishment of the Star Chamber a "decisive pronouncement had been made against prerogative tribunals." In the colonies it was even more important that the judges should have the support of the legislature, as they were more dependent on the executive. Mr. Murray argued that courts of equity had come in as part of the body of English laws. See Osgood's "American Colonies in the Eighteenth Century," 1924, vol. 2, pp. 457-458.

Improved title of our no. 19341, vol. 5, and according to Prof. Osgood, very likely to have been written by William Smith and James Alexander. De Lancey's "Charge" on libels, our no. 19340, related to the legality of the court of exchequer as a court of equity, a question brought up in Smith and Alexander's "Arguments of the Council for the Defendant," in Rip Van Dam's case, 1733. He took the position of the Governor's party that the court of exchequer had long existed in England, and had heard equity suits, and that this jurisdiction had come in to the colony with the rest of the English common law. These "Observations" give the view of the party to which Smith and Alexander belonged, that a court of equity could not be established by common law but should have a statutory basis. See Osgood's "American Colonies

in the Eighteenth Century," 1924, vol. 2, pp. 449-450.

The authorship has also been attributed to Lewis Morris, the deposed chief justice, by Livingston Rutherfurd in his book on John Peter Zenger, 1904, p. 34. It would seem more probable, however, from the following extracts, that it was written by one of his close associates like Mr. Smith, as the extracts refer to himself and to his removal from office. From page 1: "Tho' what I have to say on it will be very far short of what may be said; the late Chief Justice (as I am well informed) haveing it under Consideration, and intending to be very particular, both on that and the Judgments given by the Honourable Judge Phillipse on that Head." From page 18: "And the late Chief Justice was as much of that Opinion as any other, and perhaps had so continued had there not been a Plea to the Jurisdiction of that Court, which put him upon makeing a more strict Enquiry, by which he found it neither had, nor could have such a Jurisdiction; and that the Exercise of it in the Supream Court was much less to be prohibited, should they exceed their Bounds, than the Chancellor was; and that it was of dangerous Consequence to the Liberties of the People: His Arguments

on this Head are publick [our no. 50849, vol. 12], and to this Day remain unanswered. It is supposed the Promoters of the Contrary Opinion would answer them if they could, and show wherein the late Judge has been mistaken in any Thing he has advanced in those Arguments, that he may have an Opportunity of Retracting or maintaining what has been there delivered, that the World may judge who is in the Right: For what ever his Adversaries may think, or how much soever they or the Governour may be pleas'd with the Displaceing of him, and doing what they can to crush him, the Inhabitants of this Province will not be easily brought to think, That the Displaceing of him is any Answer to his Arguments. It may possibly deterr all his Successors from declaring what they take to be the Law, where the Governour or the King is concerned, lest such Declaration prove Fatal to them," etc.

Corrected title of our no. 731, vol. 1, and no. 30380, vol. 8; being a reply to our nos. 30379 and 30378. On verso of the title are six lines of errata; the Vindication is signed on page 15, "Ja. Alexander, Wm. Smith, New-York, April 9th, 1734;" and is followed by the Supplement, pp. 16–20. See also Van Dam (Rip), The Arguments of the Council for the Defendant, 1733, William Smith and James Alexander being the counsel.

In Dexter's "Biographical Sketches of the Graduates of Yale College," vol. 1, p. 211, there is included among the publications of William Smith "A Protest in Council [concerning the founding of King's College], May 30, 1754." As members of the Provincial Council of New York, William Smith and James Alexander dissented from the report of a committee of the Council, which on May 30, 1754, approved the petition of the trustees of King's College for a charter. This dissent, ac-

cording to Fernow and van Laer's "Calendar of Council Minutes," N. Y. State Library Bulletin, no. 58, 1902, was among the New York colonial manuscripts at Albany, vol. 78, p. 126. The calendar stated that it was "not to be published." Under date of October 31, when the Council approved the patent of the college, the minutes note again Mr. Smith's dissent, which alleged that the charter had been drawn in such a manner as to favor the Church of England to the disadvantage of the Dissenters. In November of the same year William Livingston brought before the General Assembly, a bill embodying the ideas of the dissenting party, with the title, "An Act, further to establish and to incorporate a College within this Colony, for the Education and Instruction of Youth in the liberal Arts and Sciences." This was dropped, and an act substituted for raising money for the College by means of a lottery. See "Journal of the Votes and Proceedings," vol. 2, 1766, pp. 404, 412-423. In the papers of William Smith, the historian, now in the New York Public Library, is a "Dr. of Protest intended to have been made by Messrs. Alexander and Smith in case the College Bill in Decr. 1754 came up from the House and was rejected by the Council." The draft does not appear to be in the handwriting of James Alexander, or of either of the Smiths, father or son.

Among the Jay Papers in the possession of the New York Historical Society is a manuscript in the hand of Justice Smith of an "Agreement made among Lawyers," dated 28th July, 1729, and signed by Wm Smith, S: Clowes, Jos: Murray, Ja: Alexander, Jno Chambers, and H. Wileman. This is printed in full in Stokes, vol. 4, 1922, p. 513, and according to that authority furnishes information as to requirements for admission to the bar in New York during the first half of the eighteenth

century, which would otherwise be lacking.

The book relates partly to the Company's trade in supplying negroes from Guinea to the British plantations in America and the West Indies. Mr. Smith was sent by the Royal African Company in 1726, to "take exact Plans, Draughts, and Prospects of all their Forts and Settlements; as also of all the principal Rivers, Harbours, and other Places of Trade, on the Coast of Africa, from Gambia to Whydah." He re-

turned in 1727, and published at about that time "Thirty different Draughts of Guinea," described below. According to Astley's "New General Collection of Voyages," vol. 2, 1745, p. 464, "on Examination, the Performance seems to be a Work rather made-up from some imperfect Materials left by Mr. Smith, and supplied from other Quarters, than a genuine Relation composed by himself... the Customs and Manners of the Gold Coast, and the whole Account of Benin, are taken from Bosman," etc.

Some copies contain a slip of errata. Mr. Smith's full name is taken from the document found on p. 214 in which he is instituted as minister of St. John's Parish, Nevis, and which is signed by Walter Hamilton, the governor of the Leeward Islands, and dated the 18th day of April, 1716. The author was born at Yarmouth in Norfolk, and matriculated at Queen's College, Oxford, in 1707, aged 17, receiving his B.A. in 1710, according to Foster's "Alumni Oxonienses," vol. 4, 1892. It appears from the document that he arrived in Nevis in 1716, and he states that he remained there for upwards of five years, settling later for some years in Lincolnshire. The letters which are undated were written after his return to England, and are chiefly desultory reminiscences of his observations both in the West Indies and elsewhere. A manuscript note in the Library of Congress copy gives 1749 as the date of Mr. Smith's death.

The "Candid Retrospect" fills pp. 3-14, and Appendixes I to VI, in smaller type, pp. 15-30. Title and description from a photostat reproduction in the New York Public Library, from the British Museum original. The authorship of the pamphlet was revealed in the extracts made by Dr. A. Everett Peterson from entries in the manuscript diary of Mr. Smith, now in the New York Public Library, for the Chronology included in Stokes's "Iconography," vol. 5, 1926, under various dates of 1780 and 1781. Justice Smith wrote on January 6th, 1780: "I can not be satisfied that it is even yet prudent to publish the Paper I have long had by me under the Title of the Candid Retrospect, as it exposes the writer to the violence of both Parties." On July 20th of the same year there is an entry in the diary that he had sent the manuscript to Mr. De Rossett in Charleston, to bring out in that city, as "it may be useful to publish there to work a Change in the Whiggs. It is best to have it believed here to be a composition there." On November 17th he wrote that it was published on Saturday, September 30, as "I find by the Carolina Papers," and that he had forwarded one of the pamphlets to Rivington, later the publisher of the New York edition. See Stokes, pp. 1100, 1113, 1118, and 1122. Mr. Lewis Henry De Rossett was a loyalist who had been expelled from North Carolina (Sabine's Loyalists, vol. 1, p. 376), and was at this time with General Sir Henry Clinton in Charleston as Commissary of

Prisoners. See his memorial preserved, with other papers relating to the American Loyalists, among the Audit Office Records in the Public Record Office in London; or, the New York Public Library transcripts of the same, vol. 47, pp. 468-492. The pamphlet was reprinted as follows:

The following entry appears in the author's manuscript diary for November 17th, 1780: "Yesterday I wrote to Rivington & inclosed him one of the Pamphlets De Roset has published at Charles Town. I recommended ... the Republication of 10 Thousand Copies at the Charge of the Public or by Subscription to be given away and advised that the Appendix be taken in as Notes—to prevent Disconnection in the Perusal . . . he promised me an answer upon the Subject." On November 22nd he noted that he had written to General Robertson urging that ten thousand copies be printed, this being at Rivington's suggestion. "Rivington says if he prints 5000 he will be obliged to charge 1/ for each & if less more, so that the more he prints the less he can sell them for." A copy was sent to General Robertson, and another to General Clinton. On December 6th Mr. Smith wrote that the latter had authorized him to speak to Rivington about the republication "& intimate that it should be at the public Expence." The following day the printer sent for a copy of the pamphlet as he had just received "Orders from Head Quarters for the Edition of it." On January 30th following is the entry: "At last the Candid Retrospect is out. Rivington this Instant sends me 100 copies." On February 1st he states that "Rivington has struck off 3000 Copies ... & given out 50 to Mr. Shoemaker & 60 to the Board of Directors of loyal Refugees & 100 to me & made up 400 for Genl. Arnold." In this edition, following the author's wishes, the material in the appendix of the earlier edition was distributed as footnotes through the text.

The pamphlet recounts what the author considers mistakes on the part of both Great Britain and the colonies, and urges compromise and reconciliation. An analysis of the work by Dr. Peterson is printed in Stokes, vol. 5, pp. 1126-1127. It was reprinted whice in Rivington's newspaper, the "Royal Gazette," first in the issues for March 28, 31, and April 4, 1781, and again in the same paper for August 29, September 1 and 5 of that year. See the Chronology in Stokes, vol. 5, pp. 1122-1127, especially under the

The dedication "To the Right Honourable George, Earl of Halifax, Viscount Sunbury, First Lord Commissioner of Trade and Plantations, &c. &c." is dated New-York, 15 June, 1756. The author states in his preface that the work is based chiefly on the Provincial Laws, the Minutes of the Council, the Journals of the General Assembly and other government records. He also acknowledges his indebtedness to Colden's "History of the Five Indian Nations," and to Charlevoix. The history proper covers

pp. 1-180, while a description of the province, geographical, political, etc., forms pp. 181-255. The folded plate has the title, "The South View of Oswego on Lake Ontario," an explanation, and the inscription, I. Mynde sculp. The "View" gives the forts and buildings on both sides of the Onondaga River, where it empties into Lake Ontario.

The Lenox uncut small paper copy in the New York Public Library has a leaf measurement of 11 by 8½ inches, with an inner margin seven eighths of an inch in width. The W. L. Clements Library copy of the same size is in the original bluish paper covers.

On June 3d, 1902, there was sold at Sotheby's in a miscellaneous collection, no. 188 of the catalogue, a copy described as the author's own, which was bought by Francis Edwards. In the same year it passed into the hands of Dodd, Mead & Company of New York, and then into the library of Henry F. De Puy, at whose sale in April, 1920, it was bought by the Rosenbach Company, who still owned it in 1930. Mr. Luther S. Livingston wrote to Mr. De Puy, on January 2d, 1903, that he had been informed by Mr. Edwards that the book was reputed to have come from a member of the Smith family in Warwickshire. The volume is interleaved with writing paper containing some additions by the author, and there are also corrections on the printed pages. According to the De Puy sale catalogue, 41 of these interleaves are covered with neatly written manuscript notes and additions; and 42 pages of the printed text contain marginal notes for interlineations. In addition to this there are many corrections in spelling, such as the crossing out of the "u" in the words "honour," "labour," etc. The book is in contemporary board covers without any back strip to cover the sewing, and it does not contain the plate of Oswego. In a prefixed note, dated at the Manor of Livingston, 6 Decr. 1777, the author wrote: "Twenty Years are elapsed since this Work was published, in all which Time I have had no Leisure to read it. Some Years ago I had this Volume interleaved, with a View to correcting the Impression, and making Additions. When the MSS was sent Home in 1756, I trusted the Examination of the Proofs, to my Friend Doctor [Benjamin] Avery of Guy's Hospital, London, who changed the Orthography to his own Taste.—In running over it within two Days past, I have corrected it in some Places. If there is a Continuation of the History, it should precede the Chapters beginning at page 183; but I am surprized at the great Alterations, which the Changes since the Publication will render Necessary. I have Materials for a Detail of our Transactions to the present Time; and last Winter put it into Form from 1731 to 1762. From that Period, I have the Materials in two Books of Memoirs, and Letters of Correspondency, with a Collection of political MSS. What is prior to 1762, I propose to finish in Draft this Winter for a fair Copy. The subsequent Matters would carry me into a prodigious Extent and I do not mean to reduce them to the Form of a Narrative like the former published & unpublished Part of the History." The manuscript which was sent to England in 1756 for the printing of this edition has not been found, and perhaps it was not preserved. The manuscript of the continuation from 1732 to 1762, now in the New York Public Library, is described below under the date of its printing in 1826.

A few copies of the 1757 edition were printed on larger and thicker paper, with wider inner margins. Descriptions follow of three such copies which have come into

the market:

1. Huntington Library, San Marino, Cal., measuring on the leaf 1118 by 918 inches, with inner margin 1½ inches in width. On thick paper, bound in contemporary red morocco, richly ornamented with gilt tooling, gilt edges, and containing the folded plate of Oswego. Formerly in the library of William Beckford, Esq., at Fonthill Abbey, Wilts., it passed at his death into the hands of his daughter, the Duchess of Hamilton, and was no. 2063 of the third portion of the Beckford part of the Hamilton Palace Collections, sold at Sotheby's in July, 1883. Bought at that time by Ellis & White, it was no. 303 of the F. S. Ellis sale at the same galleries in November, 1885. It was later acquired through Robert H. Dodd by E. D. Church, and was bought with the rest of his collection by Henry E. Huntington in April, 1911.

2. William Evarts Benjamin, New York City, has a leaf measurement of 121/8 by 93/8 inches, with inner margin 11/2 inches in width. On thick paper, bound in crimson

levant morocco by W. Pratt for H. Stevens, edges entirely uncut, and with the folded plate from a small paper copy inlaid and inserted. On the inside of the front cover is the book-plate of Robert Hoe. The book was bought by Robert H. Dodd as no. 3101 of part 1 of the sale of the Hoe library, in May, 1911, and later sold by him to the present owner.

3. The Rice-Menzies copy, probably on thick paper, bound in green levant morocco by W. Matthews, elegantly tooled, gilt edges, and containing the folded plate, which was no. 2088 of the John A. Rice sale at Bangs's in March, 1870, and later no. 1863 in the catalogue of the William Menzies sale at Leavitt's in November, 1876, where it was described as a "splendid large paper copy, believed to be unique." At the latter sale it was bought with the small paper copy in purple morocco, no. 1864, and other books, for Mr. Stephen Whitney Phænix of New York. On his death in 1881, most of his library, with the exception of heraldry, genealogy and local history, was bequeathed to Columbia University, but we are informed that the large paper Smith was not included with the rest.

Cadwallader Colden, whose sympathies were with the executive in the controversies of the period, while Mr. Smith's were on the side of the assembly, criticized the work as partisan. See his correspondence with Mr. Smith and other papers on the subject, printed in New York Historical Society's "Collections," second series, vol. 2, 1849, pp. 193-214; also those to his own son, "Collections," Publication Fund vol. 1, 1868, pp. 177-235, vol. 2, pp. 203-212. A new printing of several of the letters is found in the "Letters and Papers of Cadwallader Colden," vol. 5, "Collections," 1921, pp. 283-295, 310-319. In the author's manuscript continuation of his history, later edited by his son and first published by the New York Historical Society in 1826, he left a reply to Colden's criticisms of January 15th and February 17th, 1759, which is found in a footnote on p. 51 of the published work.

The dedication to the Earl of Halifax and the plate are omitted in this edition. The printer evidently divided the work which he was printing from the earlier edition into three takes which were set up simultaneously. He estimated that the first would take only 160 pages, and had the second compositor number his first page 161; similarly in the second case he estimated that the amount given would require 195 pages, pp. 161-256, and the third compositor began with page 257. In each case twelve more pages were required, and were supplied by inserting signatures \*L and \*R, the first 12 coming between 160 and 161, and the other 12 between 256 and 257. The re-publication of this volume is the first part of a plan undertaken at the desire of several gentlemen of taste, who wish to supply their libraries with histories of their native country. Should the design meet with public encouragement, the most valuable histories of the other provinces shall be re-published in regular succession by the public's humble servant, Mathew Carey. Philad. April 9, 1792."

A copy at the New York Historical Society, in old calf, has the signature [A] as originally printed in four leaves, the second and third leaves being blank and intended to be cancelled, as not included in the pagination. Inserted in the same copy is a frontispiece "View of Columbia College in the City of New York," Anderson Del., Tiebout Sculp., from the "New-York Magazine" for May, 1790, but with the name

of the magazine erased from the top margin.

Covers the period from 1732 to 1762, in seven chapters. This continuation was left in manuscript by the historian, and was edited with a few verbal alterations and corrections by his son William, the historian of Canada, according to the latter's "Advertisement," dated Quebec, August 4th, 1824. His dedication to the Earl of Dalhousie

is dated Quebec, August 10th, 1824.

The original manuscript of this part of the work is owned by the New York Public Library. It is a part of the collection of William Smith Papers, which includes one atlas folio volume, seven folio volumes and one portfolio of loose papers secured in 1915 by the Library from the London bookseller Francis Edwards, with the addition of six boxes of miscellaneous papers secured in 1919. The manuscript of the "Continuation" fills 230 unnumbered pages of vol. 1 (the atlas folio) and includes the period 1732–1758, or pages 1–272 of the published work. The manuscript is continued on pp. 421–475 of vol. 2 of the Smith Papers, covering the period 1759–1762, or pp.

272-308 of the published work, with five explanatory paragraphs omitted at the end. The four following volumes and parts of two others contain the further continuation of the history under the title: "Historical Memoirs of the Province of New York, or, Journal of Public Events, from 1753 to 1783." This material remains entirely unpublished. It is followed by a variety of historical material, notes, transcripts and a few inserted printed documents and newspapers relative to the history of the colony, chiefly in the autograph of William Smith, whose bookplate appears in two of the volumes. It seems probable, from a comparison of the published part of the manuscript with the printed text, that a clean copy was made for the use of the printer, who did not preserve it after the work appeared in print. The few improvements in phraseology to be found in the manuscript in another hand (probably that of the author's son) were included in the fair copy furnished to the New York Historical Society for publication. The printed text is, almost without exception, a verbatim copy of that in the original manuscript as corrected, only a very few verbal changes having been made. Nothing is omitted or added except the five paragraphs omitted at the end. These consist of a brief personal explanation of the reasons for writing the continuation, written by the author for the information of his son, and form no part of the history itself. There are, however, scores of passages of the original manuscript, crossed out by the author, which remain unpublished and which contain much of historical importance.

The Continuation was first issued independently, as vol. 4 of the Collections, but when the Society decided to issue a reprint of the history of 1757, that volume number was assigned to the original work and the Continuation was renumbered vol. 5. Some copies of the Continuation were issued exactly as above except that before the title of the Collections for 1826, was placed a new title of the Collections for 1830,

In this issue it should be noted that there is no copyright on the verso of the title; the pagination of the Notice [v]-vi allows for the Collections title as well as the title-page of the History; as in the earlier volumes 1-3 of the Collections there are no regular running headings, each page merely bearing at the top the number of one of the Parts I-V of the History; printed on somewhat thinner paper than the 1830 thick paper edition. The Lenox copy in NYP. of this issue has in vol. 1, following regular History title-page, a copy of the History title-page of the second issue with copyright notice on its verso; and in vol. 2, following regular Collections title-page, a Collections title-page reset in different type and printed on a yellower, stiffer paper, with a pencilled notation on its upper margin: "Reprint of the title, for George H. Moore," [then Librarian New York Historical Society.] Both these title-pages are inserted and not a part of the original work.

page of text, History of New-York on pp. 2-249, and Appendix on remaining pages. Generally printed on somewhat thicker paper than first issue but there is an impression on thin paper in NYH. With exceptions noted, printed from same setting of type as first issue. In this edition the dedication to the Earl of Halifax and the author's preface are omitted. The Memoir was written by the author's son, William Smith of Canada and treats briefly of the public and private life of his father. A change contemplated by the author was carried out when the description of the Province, pp. 181-

255 of the first edition, was placed at the end as an appendix, pp. 251-320.

The "Notice" by the Committee of Publication of the Society, dated, City of New-York, Nov. 16, 1829, and signed by John W. Francis, John Delafield, and David Hosack, states that the "present volumes, now for the first time associated, contain the History of the State of New-York from its first discovery to the year 1762 ... with the author's last alterations and additions from the original manuscripts." The first volume is a reprint of the original edition of 1757, and carries the account to 1732. The source of the changes in this first part of the history has been discovered to be the author's own copy of the first edition with manuscript notes. A comparison of that volume with this one published by the Society in 1829, shows that a large number of the author's corrections and additions were incorporated in the latter work. The changes in orthography made by Mr. Smith were mainly in modernizing the spelling of words such as governour, publick, etc., with a few corrections of errors. Some such changes indicated by him were not introduced. Many of his long notes were added sometimes following closely, and sometimes varying in form. On the other hand many of his notes were not printed, especially in the latter part of the book where whole passages written on the margins and inserted leaves are disregarded. It seems probable that the author's own corrected copy of the first edition was not used for printer's copy but that another volume, possibly of a later edition, was prepared for that purpose by someone, no doubt William Smith, the son, editor of the Continuation, who only reproduced the notes which he felt would add value to the new edition. Additional indications of this are the clean appearance of the book, the fact there is nothing to show that some notes are not to be printed, and occasional alterations of spelling in which the author's revised spelling is not used though more in accordance with modern usage than the form actually printed, e. g. the author on page 46 corrected Messilimakinae to Michilimakinack, while the form in the 1829 edition, page 63, is Messilimakinac.

The issues of this edition are, except for the Memoir, from a larger size of type than that of the preceding edition. The other preliminary pages are reset, as an examination of the Notice, pp. [v]-vi, makes clear, marked differences appearing in the number of lines on the two pages and the fact that the date follows instead of precedes the names of the committee. Many of the longer footnotes are taken from the text and placed at the end, vol. 1, pp. 383-390 and vol. 2, pp. 377-390. The running headings are in roman instead of italic type, the wording of the headings in vol. 2 having been changed to read uniformly with those of vol. 1. Both vols. issued with half titles, though frequently they have been removed in rebinding. The paper of both volumes is thicker than in any previous edition in most of the copies issued, though there are thin paper copies in NYH. and NYP.

Numbers 2-4 paged consecutively 5-16, were published on Sept. 14 and 21, and Oct. 5 of the same year. On p. 14 of the anonymous "Preface" written by Livingston in 1754 for his reissue of the "Independent Reflector," he states that "thro' the irresolution or corruption of the Printer [Parker] and his various devices to embrace the Reverberator, that paper was not continued beyond four Numbers."

That Smith was a moving spirit in the publication is made evident by a manuscript in his hand in the collection of his papers, in the New York Public Library, having the heading: "The Reverberator. Number I Thursday Sept. 1753." Below is a prefatory note or prospectus of the proposed publication which is practically the same as the following which appeared in the first issue of "The Occasional Reverberator:"

"The Enemies of Liberty, and a Freedom of Reflection, having by the most iniquitous Arts, engrossed the New-York Mercury, and utterly excluded their Antagonists from a fair Hearing in that Paper; and the Printers of the Gazette declining the Insertion of any Thing, that savours of political or religious Controversy; the Author has thought proper to set up this, and proposes to continue it on Fridays, as often as occasion shall require.

"From the Independent Reflector, against whom the most foul-mouthed Invectives are perpetually disgorged, which the Design of his Paper prevents him from answering, I hope, for frequent Assistance...

"As it cannot be expected, that the Author should support this Paper at his private Expence, he has fixed the Price for Subscribers, at Ten Shillings per Annum, for fifty two Papers ... and those who decline subscribing may purchase them of the Printer at Three Pence each."

As is evident from the above, the "Reverberator" was published in support of "The Independent Reflector," the organ of William Livingston, John Morin Scott, and William Smith, our no. 34452, vol. 9. Smith's connection with the latter weekly is made very clear by another draft in his hand, also in the New York Public Library, of an article with a heading above for a projected periodical, "The New York Guardian," to be published "Thursday November 1752." The "Guardian" was never brought out but the first number of the "Independent Reflector" appeared on Thursday, Nov. 30, 1752, and the number for January 18, 1753, contained Smith's article, signed "A". The same signature is found at the end of many of the contributions to that paper. For "Independent Reflector," see Clarence S. Brigham's "Bibliography of American newspapers," in American Antiquarian Society Proceedings, 1917, pp. 443-444.

The "Independent Reflector" in its series of articles on public and religious questions had antagonized the Church of England group so influential in the colony, especially in the discussions relating to the preponderance of that body in the government of King's College. Replies were published in Gaine's "New-York Mercury." Other articles supporting the "Reflector" were published in Parker's "New-York Gazette," and one signed by "Philo Reflector" caused the withdrawal of some of Parker's subscribers. Finally when neither Gaine nor Parker would longer print the contributions in support of the "Reflector," in their papers, the "Occasional Reverberator" was started, but as stated above, Parker refused to print more than four numbers. For an account of the controversy, see Ford's "Journals of Hugh Gaine," 1902, pp. 9-19, and Sedgwick's "Memoir of the Life of William Livingston," 1833, pp. 74-06.

"Philo Reflector" was a composite of Livingston, Smith, and Scott. Among the William Smith papers in the New York Public Library, is a manuscript of the preface to the edition of "The Craftsmen," our no. 17350, vol. 5, republished by them in 1753, and the handwriting of all three can be distinguished in various parts of the draft, which is signed "Philo-Reflector." Information as to the above manuscripts from Wilmer R. Leech.

The first number of the "Occasional Reverberator" was an attack on Hugh Gaine,

and the later ones carried on the dispute with the Episcopalians.

The volumes of the "Laws of New-York," published in 1752 and 1762, our nos. 53730 and 53732, vol. 13, were digested by William Livingston and William Smith. For an account by Victor H. Paltsits of the collection of the papers of Chief Justice Smith sold en bloc at Sotheby's in June, 1919, and acquired shortly thereafter by the New York Public Library, see Stokes's "Iconography," vol. 6, 1928, p. 229. A memorial of Mr. Smith dated 8th September, 1782, and other papers relating to his claims against the British government for his losses incurred as a loyalist, are found in vol. 3, pp. 349-354, and vol. 5, pp. 75-76, 131-132, and 395, of the series of transcripts prepared for the New York Public Library of papers relating to the American loyalists preserved among the American manuscripts in the Royal Institution. A later memorial of his, dated 17th March, 1784, with evidence on the memorial, is included in the similar series of transcripts of papers on the same subject among the Audit Office papers in the Public Record Office, vol. 44, pp. 607-631.

Improved title of our no. 96, vol. 1. Dr. Smith was one of the agents appointed by the Illinois and Wabash Land Companies to manage their affairs in Congress. The 1802 prospectus of his "Works" includes, among writings to be printed in the later volumes of that collection, papers on the Illinois and Wabash lands. The historical introduction of thirteen pages gives a sketch of the purchase of lands on the east side of the Mississippi River, from the Kaskaskia, Peoria, and Cahoquia tribes of the Illinois Indians, by William Murray and others for the Illinois Company, in July, 1773; and of the purchase of lands on both sides of the Wabash River, from the Piankashaw Indians, by Lewis Viviat and others for the Wabash Company, in October, 1775; together with an account of the merging of the two companies by Articles of Union, and Constitution, ratified April 29, 1780, under the name of the United Illinois and Ouabache Land Companies.

The two Indian Deeds of 1773 and 1775 form pp. 1-26; and are followed by a "State of Facts," dated December, 1791, 27-30; with arguments, documents and memorial submitted therewith to the Senate and House by the committee, James Wilson, William Smith and John Shee, 31-51; and the reports of the Senate and House committees on the preceding memorial, 52-55. Bound in the same contemporary bluish gray paper covers are a Memorial of January, 1797, and three additional statements relating thereto, which had evidently also been issued separately at different times, for distribution to the members of Congress. They are on three different kinds of paper, and of two styles of typography, no. I. being printed apparently by the printer of the "Memorial," and nos. II. and III. by a different printer. The titles of these four documents formerly entered briefly as our no. 34294, vol. 9, are as follows:

The three statements are unsigned but at the close of the third is a note that the "Agents appointed by the Illinois and Wabash Companies to manage this business in Congress, are the President and Council, viz. James Wilson, Esq. President, Robert Morris, Esq. William Smith, D.D. John Steinmetz, and John Nicholson, Council." The supply of the three statements following the Memorial evidently gave out, and a new printing of that part of the pamphlet was included in the copies which were issued later, paged continuously with the Memorial, pp. 9-26. There appears to have been a second issue of the Account as well, for there are several type changes in that part of the work in the second issue in HEH. The Boston Athenxum Library has a separate issue of the "Memorial" of January 13, 1797, without imprint, and bound in a volume of the House Documents, 4th Cong., 2nd sess., 1796-1797.

The charter had been withdrawn by an act of November 27, 1779, because of the clauses insisting on the allegiance of its officers to the British government, and because of the alleged pro-British attitude of Provost Smith and others. Its estates were given to the newly chartered "University of the State of Pennsylvania," and Dr. Smith devoted himself to the development of an academy in Chestertown, Md., into Washington College. In March, 1789, the Assembly restored the charter of the College of Philadelphia, stating that the Act of 1779 was "repugnant to justice, a violation of the constitution of the commonwealth, and dangerous in its precedent to all incorporated bodies, and to the rights and franchises thereof." Dr. Smith returned to Philadelphia as head of the revived College. In September, 1791, the two Philadelphia institutions were united as the "University of Pennsylvania," under a charter drawn by him, Dr. John Ewing being elected provost. Title from Hildeburn, no. 1614, where the date is given as about 1759. Our change is made for the following reasons. Alexander McNutt, the promoter of colonization in Nova Scotia, visited Philadelphia in 1764, and aroused interest in his projects among numbers of prominent Pennsylvanians. In March of the following year he returned to Nova Scotia, with a few families of settlers, and agents of those interested in obtaining grants of land. On April 30, 1765, Governor Wilmot of Nova Scotia wrote to the Lords of Trade, enclosing a list of applicants for lands, in which appear the names of ten Philadelphia companies and individuals, with the amount of land applied for in each case. Among them are "William Smith [possibly the Provost of the College of Philadelphia] & Co., Philadelphia, 100,000 acres," and "Dr. [Benjamin] Franklin & Co., Philadelphia, 200,000 acres." The Grant Books at Halifax show that grants of land, in what is now New Brunswick, were issued to William Smith and others, on October 31st, 1765. A vague reference to the failure of settlers destined for this property "of Dr. Smith & Co.," because of insufficient preparation, is found in the copy of a letter from Jno. Eagleson to Rev. Dr. Alison, dated at Hali-

fax, October 23, 1767, which is in the collection of the Franklin papers in the library of the American Philosophical Society. Franklin wrote in 1772, in his reply to the Report of the Board of Trade, that those "'many principal persons in Pennsylvania,' as is observed in the representation, 'whose names and association lie before your Majesty in Council, for the purpose of making settlements in Nova Scotia,' have, several years since, been convinced of the impracticability of exciting settlers to move from the middle colonies and settle in that province; and even of those who were prevailed on to go ... the greater part of them returned with great complaints against the severity and length of the winters." The dedication to "His Excellency George Washington, Esq. General and Commander in Chief of the Armies of the United States of America," is signed and dated, William Smith, G. Secretary, June 24, 1782. According to the preface, the "design of the following work... is only to extract, abridge and digest under distinct heads, the several parts of Ahiman Rezon, so as to be most intelligible and useful to Operative: Masons in America." The digest is preceded by a letter of John Locke containing "Certayne Questyons, with Answeres to the same, concernynge the Mystery of Maconrye," said to have been originally written by the "Hande of Kynge Henrye the Sixthe of the Name," together with a glossary for the same, pp. 1–12; the Ahiman Rezon, itself, comprises pp. 13–114; a collection of Masons' songs, pp. 115–144; the Smith Sermon, which had been printed separately in 1779, see no. 84668 below, forms pp. 145–162 and has a separate title-page as follows:

Improved title of our no. 1133, vol. 1. Published in thirteen monthly numbers, that for October, 1758, being called a supplement to vol. I., and the last number published. The discontinuance is explained on p. 656, "as several of the principal hands who first engaged in it, are now obliged to give their constant attention to other matters, the carrying on the work falls too heavy on the remainder, so that it has been determined to discontinue it, at least for some time." Smith is well known to have been the editor. On November 10, 1757, he wrote to George Washington asking his assistance in procuring subscribers, and furnishing material for the account of the war to be published in each number. "Send the Subscribers Names for the Magazine to me, but do not mention my name to any Body ... W. Smith." See S. M. Hamilton's "Letters to Washington," vol. 2, 1899, pp. 233-234. Besides editing the magazine, Smith wrote for it several series of articles: "The Antigallican," "The Planter," "The Prattler" (authority: T. H. Montgomery's History of University of Pennsylvania, 1900, p. 334), and "The Watchman" (reprinted from newspapers, according to Mott's History of American magazines, 1930, p. 81). "The Hermit," which appeared in eight numbers, was reprinted in his "Works," 1803, part 2 of vol. 1, pp. 93-152. "An earnest Address to the Colonies," no. 5 of "The Watchman," in April, 1758, was reprinted in the 1759 and 1762 editions of his "Discourses," and in H. W. Smith's "Life" of the Provost, 1880, vol. 1, pp. 188-192. According to the 1802 prospectus of his collected "Works," which credits him with all of the above works except "The Prattler," Smith had intended to reprint some of the other series also.

On the title-pages of the first twelve numbers appears a woodcut of an Indian, with a gun, standing between two colonists. The Englishman is apparently offering him a Bible and a legal document, and the Frenchman, a tomahawk and a bag of money. Below is the proverb, "Prævalebit Æquior." A facsimile title-page of the first number (October, 1757) appears in Oberholtzer's "Lit. Hist. of Phil.," 1906, p. 65. The magazine was printed on two kinds of paper. There are a number of mispagings which are different in the thin paper and thick paper copies, and the sheetmarks differ on what should be pp. 281 and 283. Nevertheless the pages do not appear to have

been reset.

In the preface to the first number it is stated that "the society of managers here, as well as their correspondents abroad, are persons whose talents and views in life are very different, and that neither religious nor party distinctions, nor any other consideration but the intrinsic merit of those concerned, had any share in pointing them out to bear a part of the work. Some are accordingly of one temper and disposition, and some of another. Some are grave and serious, while others are gay and facetious; some have a turn for matters of state and government, while others are led to the study of commerce, agriculture or the mechanic arts; some indulge themselves in the belles-lettres and in productions of wit and fancy, while others are wrapt up in speculation and wholly bent on the abstruser parts of philosophy and science."

The "Pennsylvania Journal" for November 1, 1764, contained a "Protest" signed by John Dickinson and nine others against the action of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania in choosing Dr. Franklin to serve as agent of the province in England. Isaac Hunt in his anonymous "A Humble Attempt at Scurrility," 1765, pp. 10–11, wrote that the "Protest" was "well known to be drawn up by the pitiful Mr. D—n, revised, corrected and amended by the Rev. Sentiment-dresser-General of the Pr—ry Party," [Dr. Smith]. See also Hunt's "No. III. A Continuation of the Exercises, in Scurrility Hall," 1765, p. 7: "Pr. . . . . But tell me, did the Black Smith write the answer? Sir J. What is it 'to you or P' who did it? May Bee would ha' done it better: but they would not trust him. It was 'fundamentally conceived' by cousin Ned: and the Doctor lent the obstetrick Hand."

Reprinted by H. W. Smith in his "Life" of the Provost, vol. 1, 1879, pp. 587-590, and also issued separately in 1878 with title beginning "The Reasons on which were founded, The Protest offered by certain members of the Assembly." It was also included by Ford in his edition of the "Writings of John Dickinson," vol. 1, 1895, pp. 147-154. Dr. Franklin published in reply his "Remarks on a late Protest," [1764], our no. 25576, vol. 7. A German translation of the "Protest" and the "Remarks" upon it was printed by Sauer at the time, our no. 66215, vol. 15. Though Mr. Dickinson prepared in manuscript "Observations on Mr. Franklin's Remarks," printed by Ford, pp. 155-167, the "Answer" by Dr. Smith was chosen to carry on the printed controversy. This was included by H. W. Smith in the list of his ancestor's works found in the "Life," vol. 2, 1880. William Franklin wrote to William Strahan on February 18, 1765, that since his father had left for England "Mr. Allen one of the principal Propy Tools in Pensylvania has employ'd that Miscreant Parson Smith, and two or three other Prostitute Writers to asperse his Character . . ." and that Mr. Hughes, one of his father's friends, had published an advertisement offering to pay £10 to the Hospital for every charge they could prove, provided they would pay £5 for each which they failed to prove. "But this Challenge they were afraid to accept, and therefore still kept their Names concealed; but they endeavoured to turn all Mr. Hughes's Challenge into Ridicule ... by an anonymous Answer. He, however, published a Reply with his Name subscribed, in which he has lash'd them very severely for their Baseness. Not being able to answer this, they employ'd one Dove ... to publish a Print with some Verses annex'd, vilifying my Father and some of the most worthy Men of the Province. By way of Revenge some Writer [Isaac Hunt in his "A Humble Attempt"] has attack'd them in their own Way, and turn'd all Dove's Verses against Mr. Allen ... ." See Smyth's "Writings of Benjamin Franklin," vol. 10, 1907, pp. 219-220.

The type was kept standing for some time, slight differences being noted in three copies, which may be called A, B and C, in the New York Public Library, and which are in the main from the same setting of type. The most marked differences are as follows: p. 3 of copy A ends with the word "Protesters." The other two copies, B and C, have two lines from p. 4 moved back to this page to make room for a few additional words on line 20 of page 5 and for a new clause at the foot of that page. On p. 21, line 23, of copy C there is a change in wording, and at the foot of that page two more lines are given in the quotation, the reference to Churchill being transferred to p. 22, which ends with an N. A translation of Smith's "Answer to Mr. Franklin's Remarks," 1764, above. Sauer is given as the printer in Hildeburn, and in Seidensticker's "First Century of German Printing in America," 1893, and though some of the ornaments in this work resemble

those in the Sauer quarto "Bible" of 1763, we cannot say with absolute certainty that this pamphlet was from his press.

The Society as formed in 1754 consisted of fifteen persons headed by the Earl of Shaftesbury, and with Dr. Samuel Chandler as Secretary. Lieutenant Governor Hamilton, Chief Justice Allen, Richard Peters, Benjamin Franklin, Conrad Weiser and William Smith were asked to serve as the trustees in Pennsylvania. In a letter of May 30th, 1754, Mr. Smith in accepting the responsibility for himself and the others dwelt upon the political value of assimilating the Germans rather than allowing them to be drawn off by the French into their settlements on the Ohio. The purposes of the society were to be accomplished by "encouragement of pious and peacable ministers and schoolmasters," and by establishing schools. See H. W. Smith's "Life," vol. 1, passim.

By her charter of 1662 Connecticut was granted jurisdiction over the lands included between lines formed by the extension of her northern and southern boundaries, westward to the South Sea, with the exception of that lying in New York. She claimed that these lines included land which Pennsylvania believed to be hers under Penn's charter. In 1753 the Susquehanna Company of Connecticut bought lands of the Indians at Wyoming. In 1768, however, the Proprietaries of Pennsylvania obtained an Indian deed for land claimed by this company. These contradictory claims led to violence by the Connecticut settlers on one side and the Pennsylvania lessees on the other, and finally to disputes between the governments of the two provinces. The difficulties were not settled until 1782, when the Commissioners appointed for the purpose by Congress, decided in favor of Pennsylvania. See Winsor, vol. 5, p. 180, and vol. 6, 680. On p. 84 appears a quotation from the "Monthly Review," vol. 4, pp. 37-38, November, 1750, as follows: "That even both our Universities (not forgetting that in the Metropolis of a neighbouring Kingdom) are render'd of little Use to the Public, or to the Welfare of Religion, by the idle Doctrines and corrupt Manners which prevail in them, is a Truth equally notorious and melancholy: and [an] effectual Scheme for a thoro' Reformation, or (if this is impossible, thro' the Perverseness of their Members) a total Abolition of them, wou'd merit the Attention of every Lover of his Country, every Well-wisher to true Christianity, and to civil and religious Liberty." In Smith's copy, now belonging to the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, he wrote in the margin opposite these lines, "This Quotation was raz'd out of most of the Copies before they got abroad; the author considering it as injuriously applied." This erasure, found in one of the Library of Congress copies, is described by Ernest Kletsch,

as follows: "The quotation has pasted over it a piece of blank paper. The sentence just preceding the quotation beginning, 'But ...' has been obliterated with a wavy ink mark beyond the word 'But' to the end of that line. The connection is made twelve lines below with the last two words of the line, 'The Risque.'"

Franklin wrote on May 3rd to Smith in commendation of the allegorical pamphlet with its scheme of education, but expressed a wish that not only the quotation from the Review had been omitted, but also other expressions of resentment on pp. 65 and

Formerly attributed by Rich and Allibone to Thomas Hutchins, the maker of the maps, who was assistant engineer on Bouquet's expedition and later geographer of the United States. Bouquet himself has also been called the author. The authorship was first assigned conclusively to William Smith of Philadelphia by Mr. A. R. Spofford, former librarian of Congress, on the strength of a letter in the Force collection written in Smith's own hand, addressed to Sir William Johnson, and dated "Philada. 13th January 1766." In this he speaks of raising money for "our college," and in closing says: "Mr. Croghan set out the Day before I expected he he would, else I purposed sending you a Copy of Bouquet's Expedition to Muskingum, which I drew up from some Papers he favored me with; & which is reprinted in England, & has had a very favor-

able Reception ... "

The introduction describes Bouquet's successful expedition of 1763, to relieve Fort Pitt from the siege of the Shawnees, Delawares and other Indian tribes. Because of lack of men he was unable to follow up his victory at Bushy Run, and depredations by the Indians continued. He was despatched again by General Gage in 1764, to force them to make treaties of peace, and to release their prisoners, in both of which aims he was successful. The appendices, pp. 61-71, contain: I. Construction of Forts against Indians; II. Account of the French Forts ceded to Great Britain in Louisiana; III. Number of Indian Towns, situated on and near the Ohio River, and its branches ...; IV. Names of different Indian Nations in North-America, with the Numbers of their Fighting Men. The list in the final appendix was used by J. F. D. Smyth without acknowledgment, and with the order reversed, in his "Tour in the United States," 1784, copied in turn by Trumbull in his Indian Wars, and by Buchanan in his "Sketches of the History, Manners, and Customs, of the North American Indians," 1824. The folded map contains: 1. "A General Map of the Country on the Ohio and Muskingham Shewing the Situation of the Indian-Towns with respect to the Army under the Command of Colonel Bouquet by Thos: Hutchins Asst: Engineer;" 2. "A Topographical Plan of that part of the Indian-Country through which the Army under the Command of Colonel Bouquet marched in the Year 1764. by Thos: Hutchins. Asst: Engineer." The former occupies the center of the map and is separated by a design of acanthus leaves from the topographical plan and illustrations of Indian life which surround it. A process reproduction of the whole on a reduced scale faces p. 374 of Avery's "History of the United States," vol. 4, 1908. Plate II. gives diagrams of the plan of encampment, line of march, "Disposition to receive the Enemy," and general attack. Plate III. is a "Plan of the Battle near Bushy-Run Gained by His Majesty's Troops, commanded by Colonel Henry Bouquet over the Delawares, Shawanese, Mingoes, Wyandots, Mohikons, Miamies & Ottawas, on the 5th: and 6th: of August, 1763. From an Actual Survey By Thos: Hutchins Assistant Engineer." For modern reproductions of the plates, see notes on the London edition, 1766. H. W. Smith in his "Life and Correspondence of the Rev. Smith, no modern bibliographer consulted has mentioned the paper and no copies on finer paper have been examined.

An appendix, "Rout from Philadelphia to Fort-Pitt," is added in this edition. For a French translation, see below "Relation Historique." The plates of the earlier edition are re-engraved, the map and the plan of the Bushy-Run battle being on a reduced scale. The acanthus leaves and illustrations of Indian life are omitted in the map and the "topographical plan" (re-named a "survey") is below the general map instead of surrounding it. There are two copper plates of drawings by Benjamin West added, the second of which has his signature. The first has the following inscription: "B. West invt. Grignion sculp. The Indians giving a Talk to Colonel Bouquet in a Conference at a Council Fire, near his Camp on the Banks of Muskingum in North America, in Octr. 1764." The second is inscribed: "B. West invt. Canot sculp. The Indians delivering up the English Captives to Colonel Bouquet, near his Camp at the Forks of Muskingum in North America in Novr. 1764." Process reproductions on a reduced scale of both plates are found in Avery, vol. 4, pp. 374 and 375; and one of "The Indians giving a Talk" in Winsor, vol. 6, p. 695. Re-engravings of this plate appeared in Knox's "A New Collection of Voyages," 1767, vol. 2, facing p. 198, and in the "Royal American Magazine," for December, 1774, the former by Basire and the latter by Paul Revere. Reproductions of the plates in this edition have been noted as follows: An adaptation of the plate giving the plan of the Bushy-Run battle, in Rupp's "Early History of Western Pennsylvania," 1846, facing p. 145, and a process reproduction on a reduced scale, in Winsor, vol. 6, p. 693; an adaptation of the whole map, with no attempt at making it a facsimile, in Hildreth's "Pioneer History," 1848, and a process reproduction on a reduced scale of the upper part, in Winsor, vol. 6, p. 696; a re-engraving of this part, between pp. 198 and 199 of Parkman's "Conspiracy of Pontiac," vol. 2, 1875; a re-engraving by J. "Annals of the American pulpit," 1859, vol. 5, p. 160: "In 1791 a company was incorporated to make a canal from the Delaware near Philadelphia, to the Schuylkill, about seventeen miles away from the city. In this project Dr. Smith took a deep interest. He was, from the first, one of the Board of Directors, and for a time its President. The matter became a subject of controversy, and a Committee of the Canal Company sent an Address or Memorial to the Legislature, of which the Doctor, though not the Chairman of the Committee, is understood to have been the author."

An advertisement, dated "Monday, March 2d, 1795," appeared in "Dunlap and Claypoole's American Daily Advertiser" of the same date, as follows: "... This Day is Published, and to be Sold by Zachariah Poulson, jun. No. 80, Chesnut street.—And at the Philadelphia Library. An Historical Account of the Rise, Progress and Present State of the Canal Navigation in Pennsylvania ..." According to the copyright notice engraved on the map of Pennsylvania, it was copyrighted June 13, 1791, by Reading Howell, the cartographer, as "copied from his larger Map." It has the inscription J. Trenchard Sculp.

The title is endorsed on the lower part of p. 4, so as to appear on the outside of the document when folded. The appeal, addressed "To all Charitable Persons, and Patrons of Useful Knowlege," is dated, London, 1762, and was prepared by Dr. Smith after his arrival in England in March of that year, when sent by the Trustees of the College to raise money for the institution. The statement was based to some extent upon a similar address "To all Charitable Persons, Patrons of Literature, and Friends of Useful Knowledge," given him by the Trustees at this time, and which according to Stille's "Memoir" of Dr. Smith, 1869, p. 24, was the work of Richard Peters, their president. Dr. Smith's appeal dwelt upon the importance to the mother country of keeping up the standards of culture in the colonies, and counteracting the influence of Roman Catholic Institutions, by such Protestant "seminaries" as the College of Philadelphia. A reprint, omitting the footnotes which give lists of the Trustees and Chief Masters and a brief note as to the subjects taught in the College and Academy, is found in the "Life" by H. W. Smith, vol. 1, 1879, pp. 295-298. Dr. James Jay arrived in England in the early summer committed to a similar effort on behalf of King's College in New York, and on the advice of the Archbishop of Canterbury, united with Dr. Smith in an application for a Royal Brief. On August 12th, according to the Minute of the King's Council, the Brief was ordered to authorize Drs. Smith and Jay "to make a Collection throughout the Kingdom from house to house, for the joint and equal benefit of the two Seminaries, and Bodies corporate aforesaid." The King started the subscription with £400 for the College of New York, and £200 for that of Philadelphia. On August 24th Smith and Jay signed a power of attorney appointing three persons to print and distribute copies of the Brief, and to receive the money collected thereon. 11,500 copies were printed to be sent to all the clergy of the kingdom, and were accompanied by a circular addressed to them, adapted from Dr. Smith's earlier appeal. At the same time a similar address was printed for use in approaching the general public. See the following title. Humbly offered to the impartial consideration of the publick," and dated Ab[e]rn[eth]y, Nov. 5, [1749.] A final note states that "One of our number is to go up to London to petition for leave to bring in a bill for the above effect, and will set out about the 25th of November." No doubt the memorial of January 31 relates to the bill in question.

The oration antagonized John Adams and his party because Smith urged reconciliation with Great Britain. In C. F. Adams' "Familiar Letters," 1876, p. 167, he says: "The oration was an insolent performance. A motion was made to thank the orator, and ask a copy, but opposed with great spirit and vivacity in every part of the room, and at last withdrawn, lest it should be rejected, as it certainly would have been, with indignation. The orator then printed it himself, after leaving out or altering some offensive passages. This is one of the many irregular and extravagant characters of the age. I never heard one single person speak well of anything about him but his capabilities, which are generally allowed to be good. The appointment of him to make the oration was a great oversight and mistake."

The dedication to John Dickinson follows the title, and the fourth leaf contains an introduction, on the verso of which is the following: "Memorandum. Only a small number being Printed of this first Edition, is one reason why it is retailed at no less than Three Shillings. N.B. Large Allowance to those who buy per the Hundred or Dozen. If a numerous Second Edition (upon Small Types) should be desired, the Price will then be determined in proportion to its Number; especially to those, who are pleased to engage with the Printer for some certain Quantities, before it again goeth to the Press." The text forms pp. 1-66, and is followed by a "Publication of Rationalis," also relating to "Common Sense," pp. 67-78, and an "Extract from the second Letter to the People of Pennsylvania; being that part of it which relates to Independency. By a Writer under the Signature of Cato," dated Philadelphia, March 11th, 1776, pp. 79-84. The latter is one of a series of letters so signed, which were written by Smith, and appeared in several newspapers in the spring of that year. See our final note on Dr. Smith. Although the address of the printer, the first leaf of signature [A], found in the copy belonging to the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, is included in the collation on the Library of Congress printed card, according to information from Ernest Kletsch, curator, it was not in the copy when catalogued. The Boston Public, Harvard, and New York Public Library copies also lack the address, but the Huntington copy has it laid in at the end, pasted at the inner margin to two other leaves, the first with the caption title, "A few more Words, on the Freedom of the Press, Addressed by the Printer, to the Friends of Liberty in America..." and the second, "A Short Answer to some Criticisms, which were Exhibited under the Signature of Aristides..." Information from Willard O. Waters.

This reply to Paine's pamphlet had been variously assigned to Alexander Hamilton, Rev. Charles Inglis, Joseph Galloway, and others. Mr. Hildeburn, after examining the evidence, attributed the authorship to George Chalmers, but Mr. P. L. Ford states that Chalmers had left the country in 1774. He gives among others the following reasons for assigning it to Smith: Oliver Wolcott wrote on the title-page of his copy which is now in the Library of Congress, "Dr. Smith of Phila."; one of Cato's letters which were written by Smith is included in the pamphlet; and "an examination of the matter proves ... that the author is both a Pennsylvanian and Episcopalian; that he is a warm admirer of Dickinson and General Montgomery; that he dislikes Franklin and the New Englanders; that he approves of the proprietary government; that he sympathizes with the colonies up to the point of independence; and that he very cagerly argues the right of Pennsylvania in the land question between that State and Connecticut." See "The Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography," vol. 12, 1888, pp. 421-424. Although it is not certain that Dr. Smith was the author, this and the following titles contain improvements and additions to our entries under Candidus and Plain Truth, see our no. 10671, vol. 3, and p. 176, vol. 15.

Smith concluded his sermon before the 18th, or Royal Regiment of Ireland, on May 8, 1768, with this speech of a Creek Indian, and it is reprinted with the sermon in his "Works," 1803, vol. 2, pp. 201-224. In a note on p. 214 concerning the Indian speech, he states: "How I came to the possession of it, and published it in London among some other writings of my own fifty years ago; what right I had then to publish it, and afterwards to conclude this Sermon with it, ... will appear from the following introduction to a republication of it, in the Columbian Magazine for June 1790, p. 367, &c. running as follows, ... 'The first draft of this celebrated Speech is said to have been taken, in short-hand, in a council of the Creek Indians, about the year 1748. It came into the hands of a deputy of Sir William Johnson, Secretary for Indian Affairs, a gentleman of the name of Wraxal, in the year 1752; who communicated his notes of it to a gentleman (then living at New-York) who has long been honourably distinguished in the republic of letters, in Pennsylvania, who is particularly eminent in rhetorical compositions, and whose writings, even now, notwithstanding his advanced age, discover all the fire and energy of the most lively youthful imagination. After having been first published in a New-York Gazette, it was, by the same gentleman, republished with some other Indian compositions, in London, about the beginning of the year 1754; and a very high character is given of the work in the Monthly Review for April, of that year [vol. 10, pp. 285-293]." For a later issue from the same setting of type, with a new title, see "Some Account of the North-America Indians," above.

Dr. Smith mentions in a letter of April 12, 1763, that 11,500 copies of the Royal Brief were printed, which suggests that an equal number of the appeal prepared to accompany it were issued. They were approved by the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, in 1789, but on account of the yellow fever epidemic, and the death of three members of his family, Smith postponed the publication of the sermons until he began to print his collected "Works" in 1803.

The order of the issues as given above is suggested for the following reasons: Since the prospectus of the collected works describes the portrait, it is evident that the earliest issue would contain it. A shorter imprint would probably be sufficient for a second issue, as the interest in other cities lessened. Possibly the first impressions of the portrait were exhausted so that an issue was published without it. Undoubtedly the more striking title-pages were added, and new impressions of the portrait were struck off

to stimulate sales of the remaining copies. After the type for Sermon xx in vol. 2, pp. 444-482, was set up, it appears that Dr. Smith thought of making some additions to the text, as a variant of the set of pages containing that sermon is found separately in the library of the New York Historical Society. The page numbers of this excerpt are as follows: 443-482, 482A, 482B, 483C, verso blank. Beginning with p. 479 the running headings are omitted. Three pages of additional matter take the place of the three final lines of the second paragraph on p. 480 of the "Works," this accounting for the duplicate numbers. Of the seventeen copies of the "Works" which have been examined none contain the additional pages. The portrait has the inscription: G. Stuart Pinx. D. Edwin sc. William Smith D.D. Æ1. 75. The same portrait re-engraved by Iohn Sartain is included in H. W. Smith's "Life" of the Provost.

Although Dr. Smith's "Proposals for Printing by Subscription, a Body of Sermons," 1789, were approved by the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in that year, it was not until 1800 that he undertook the task of preparing his collected writings for publication. The two volumes here entered were still in press at the time of the author's death, but he had been able to read most of the proof, according to H. W. Smith's "Life" of his ancestor, vol. 2, p. 447. The latter also states that they form but a small part of the publications which Dr. Smith had in mind, and gives a list of other items. The publisher's prospectus, no. 84677 above, had suggested that five or six volumes might be needed to complete the work. Bishop White of Pennsylvania, who, according to Wilson's "Memoir" of him, 1839, p. 312, wrote the preface of the "Works," explaining therein that having been presented by Dr. Smith with the copyright of all of his compositions, he felt under obligation to proceed with the remaining volumes. Though the plans were not carried out, that some work had been done on a third volume is apparent from the fact that the pamphlet, "Select Sermons," described above, which closely resembles in style of printing the "Works," has sheet marks vol.

III K to vol. III Cc, and the collation, pp. (2), [65]-196.

In H. W. Smith's list of the printed works of William Smith, included in his "Life" of the Provost, 1880, is noted an "Essay on the Liberty of the Press," London, July, 1750, evidently a contribution to some magazine. He also mentions an "Essay on Education," published in a New York paper, Nov. 7, 1752. This doubtful title would seem to refer to a commendatory notice, signed Philopatriæ, published in the supplement to Parker's "New-York Gazette" of that date, relating to Smith's own anonymous "Some Thoughts on Education," 1752, advertised in the "Gazette" for October 23rd preceding. It included further suggestions as to the proposed college to be established in New York. The above mentioned list includes several essays also upon the subject of education, said to have been published by Smith during 1754 in the "Antigua Gazette." The publication in Antigua was no doubt due to the connections in that island of Josiah Martin of Long Island, in whose family Smith was tutor from 1851 to 1853. A number of other anonymous contributions to newspapers of the time were from his pen. Smith's "A Philosophical Meditation, and Religious Address to the Supreme Being," which, according to a note in his "Discourses," 1759, p. 235, "was first composed for the use of young Students in Philosophy, and published in London 1754, at the end of a book of Ethics, written by the Rev. Dr. Samuel Johnson, president of the college of New York," (Probably Johnson's "Elements of Philosophy." Third Lition. London, 1754.) is reprinted in his "Discourses," 1759, pp. 235-246; in the appendix of "Discourses," 1762, pp. 147-160; and, in his "Works," 1803, part 2 of vol. 1, pp. 153-164. A letter written by Smith, "concerning the Office and Duties of a Protestant Ministry ... " forms pp. v-xx of Barton's "Unanimity and Public Spirit," 1755. See our no. 3849, vol. 1. This letter is reprinted as the first appendix of Smith's "Additional Discourses," 1762, pp. 3-19; in the appendix to his "Discourses," 1762, pp. 3-19; in his "Works," 1803, vol. 2, pp. 1-16; and, in H. W. Smith's "Life" of the Provost, 1880, vol. 1, pp. 110-118. Henry Scougal's anonymous "Das Leben Gottes in der Seele des Menschen ... Philadelphia, 1756, has a preface signed in the name of the Trustees-General of the Charitable Society by "Wilhelm Schmidt," who, according to the Pennypacker sale catalogue (S. V. Henkels auction no. 943, Dec. 14, 1905, part 1, lot 94, was Provost William Smith. Hildebrand 1500, our no. 78449, vol. 19. B., HSP.

In 1756 Dr. Smith prepared for the use of his students an adaptation of "Alfred: a Masque." The original work by James Thomson and David Mallet, with Dr. Arne's music, had been published in London in 1740, and a revised version by Mallet in the same city in 1751. Dr. Thomas L. Montgomery states that a copy of the latter with interleaved alterations in Dr. Smith's hand is in the library of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania. An account of the piece, which is said to have been performed several times during the Christmas holidays, was published in the four numbers of the "Pennsylvania Gazette" from January 20 to February 10, 1757. It includes long extracts with the alterations by the "Writer of this Account" indicated, and a new prologue and epilogue. A briefer description in the "Gentleman's Magazine," vol. 27, 1757, pp. 177-179, contains a few extracts, and the prologue and epilogue said to be written by "the Rev. Mr. Smith, Provost of the College of Philadelphia;" also poems addressed to Miss Hopkinson and to Miss Lawrence by Jacob Duché and Francis Hopkinson respectively, on their performance of the "vocal parts" on the occasion, which had previously appeared in the "Pennsylvania Gazette." It has been suggested that Hopkinson was the author of the altered parts of Alfred, but for a discussion of his part in the performance, see his "Life and Works," 1926, by G. E. Hastings, pp. 52-55. Smith's "Account of the College and Academy of Philadelphia" was first published in "The American Magazine" for October, 1758, a summary of his new curriculum having appeared in the "Pennsylvania Gazette" for Aug. 12, 1756. The Account was reprinted with slight changes, in his "Discourses," 1759, pp. 215-233; in the 1762 edition, appendix, pp. 107-127; in his "Works," 1803, vol. 1, part 2, pp. 230-248; in H. W. Smith's "Life," vol. 1, 1880, pp. 54-64; and, in Montgomery's "History of the University of Pennsylvania," 1900, pp. 519-529. When Thomas H. Montgomery was preparing this "History," he examined two pamphlets relating to the courses of study in the Universities of Aberdeen, printed in 1754 and 1755, and came to the conclusion that Smith was much influenced by the curriculum of those institutions in preparing his own for the College of Philadelphia. See "Scottish Notes and Queries," vol. 1, p. 137, Feb. 1888. Dr. Smith wrote the preface to Dickinson's "Speech," 1764, our no. 20049, vol. 5, this being evident from the fact that it is included among those writings mentioned in the 1802 prospectus of Smith's collected "Works," as to be published therein. It did not appear in the two volumes actually published. Isaac Hunt in his anonymous "An Humble Attempt at Scurrility," 1765, p. 13, refers to it as "Parson Pe [te]rs's, Parson S[mi]th's, Parson Al[lis]on's, and Parson Ew[i]n[g]'s anonymous Preface to Mr. Dic[kinso]n's Speech. Smith's interest in young poets is shown by the fact that he was instrumental in publishing after the death of their authors, Godfrey's "Juvenile Poems," 1765, our no. 27658, vol. 7, and Evans's "Poems on Several Occasions," 1772, our no. 23179, vol. 6, to both of which he wrote introductory notices. See Fisher's "Some Account of the Early Poets and Poetry of Pennsylvania," pp. 86-88, in Hist. Soc. Penn. "Memoirs," vol. 2, pt. 2, 1830.

A series of nineteen communications by Smith, entitled "The Anatomist," and written in reply to nineteen numbers of "The Sentinel," appeared partly in the "Pennsylvania Gazette," and chiefly in the "Pennsylvania Journal," from September 8th, 1768, to January 12, 1769. These were reprinted together with pieces called forth by them in "A Collection of Tracts from the late News Papers ... On the Subject of the Residence of Protestant Bishops in the American Colonies," 1769, vol. 2, pp. 9-149, our no. 14395, vol. 4. The 1802 prospectus of Smith's "Works," mentioned these papers as to be included in that collection, but they are not in the volumes published in 1803. Smith was a member of the sub-committee, of which John Dickinson was the chairman, appointed by the Pennsylvania Committee of Correspondence, to prepare a draught of instructions for their representatives in assembly, July 16, 1774. A part of this draught was published as "An Essay on the Constitutional Power of Great Britain," 1774, our no. 20040, vol. 5. A series of eight letters by Smith under the signature of Cato appeared in the newspapers in the spring of 1776. These were among the writings mentioned in the 1802 prospectus of his collected "Works," though not published in the two volumes of 1803. In April, 1776, John Adams wrote that they were reported to be by Dr. Smith, ("Familiar Letters," 1876, p. 167). Francis Hopkinson also attributed them to "Dr. S——h," ("Miscellaneous Essays," 1792, vol. 1, p. 94). These letters were published in the "Pennsylvania Gazette," March 13—April 24, in "Dunlap's Pennsylvania Packet," March 11—April 29, in the "New-York Gazette," March 18—May 6, and in other papers. Cato advocated a conciliatory policy toward Great Britain, and replied to some of the arguments in Paine's "Common Sense." Many answers appeared, including those of James Cannon, and Paine, writing under the signatures of "Cassandra," and "The Forester." See Adams' "Familiar Letters," 1876, p. 167.

Smith was the chairman of the committee appointed by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, in 1785, to suggest alterations in the Prayer Book, made necessary by the American Revolution and the consequent separation from the Church of England. Later with Dr. William White, President of the Convention, and Dr. C. H. Wharton, he was appointed to publish the revised book, with a preface explaining the changes. This edition referred to as the "Proposed Book" with the preface written by Dr. Smith, was published in 1786, our no. 6349, vol. 2. This preface in a shortened form still appears in the present standard version of the "Book of Common Prayer." See correspondence between White and Smith, in H. W. Smith's "Life" of the Provost, 1880, vol. 2; also, "Journals of the General Conventions of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the United States of America; from ... 1784, to ... 1814," 1817, pp. 5-6, 15. "The short-lived 'Proposed Book' was printed in Philadelphia, Hall & Sellers, MDCCLXXXVI, 8vo, and 4,000 copies of it were ordered to be published. A few of these were handsomely bound in red morocco with gilt ornamentation. It was reprinted in London, England, M,DCC,LXXIX, 8vo, and from a manuscript note in Bishop Stevens' copy, as mentioned in "The Historical Magazine," vol. 1, p. 221, we learn that there were only fifty copies of this English reprint published, and these were probably for the use of the English Bishops, who were then considering the request of the American Church for the 'Succession.'"-Mc Garvey's "Liturgiae Americanae," 1895, p. Iv. The first volume of the "Transactions" of the American Philosophical Society, 1789, contains four papers on astronomical subjects by Smith, in the preparation of two of which he was assisted by others. His "Account of the terrestrial measurement of the difference of longitude and latitude, between the observatories of Norriton and Philadelphia" forms pp. 114-120 of vol. 1 of Amer. Philos. Soc. "Transactions," 1789; on pp. 162-180 of the same volume appears his "The Sun's Parallax deduced from a comparison of the Norriton and some other American observations of the transit of Venus, 1769." With the assistance of John Lukens, David Rittenhouse, and John Sellers, Smith prepared an "Account of the Transit of Venus over the Sun, June 3d, 1769, as observed at Norriton, in Pennsylvania," in the same volume, pp. 8-39; and with the assistance of Lukens, Rittenhouse, and Owen Biddle, he prepared an "Account of the Transit of Mercury over the Sun, Nov. 9th, 1769, as observed at Norriton," in the same volume, pp. 158-162.

Several pieces were composed for the work by Messrs. Taylor and Carr of Philadelphia. The last chant was composed by Revd. W. Smith. Page 8 contains a recommendation by Benjamin Moore, Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of New-York, to whom the book was dedicated. The musical score has the imprint E. Riley Engraver, 31 Dey Street, New York. An uncut copy, said to be on Large Paper, was no. 2102 at a sale of books relating to America, the West Indies, etc., at Sotheby's May 25-June 2, 1860. No other record of the sale of a large paper copy has been found. The internal evidence shows the author of the letters to be Joseph Frederick Walsh, or Wallet, Desbarres, 1722-1824, author of our nos. 3606, 3608, vol. 1, and 19685, vol. 5, as he states, for instance, on p. 11 that he was appointed Lieutenant Governor of Cape Breton in 1784, at which date Desbarres was appointed to that office. Information from T. Franklin Currier. Smith was formerly a surgeon of the 33d Regiment when stationed at Sydney in 1784, and held a seat in the Council under Governor Desbarres. The Duke of Portland wrote in October 11, that William Smith had been appointed Chief Justice to put an end to internal disorders and re-establish the due administration within the island. He continued in office until September 1801, when he left for England without leave, later notifying the Duke that he did not intend to return. In the Advertisement dated, "Hopewell, (New-Jersey;) near Trenton, 1806," is the following statement: "The Publisher of this work meeting with great encourage-ment in the first edition of the "Easy Instructor," is induced to publish a second edition, and having added the flats and sharps, so that the singer may take his choice, either to sing by characters or by line and space, he hopes to meet the approbation and patronage of the friends to Vocal Music." The pages with the music are engraved, not printed. The "Easy Instructor, or, a New Method of teaching Sacred Harmony," of which the above title forms the second part, was prepared by William Little and William Smith. An "Advertisement" appears in all the editions of that work, signed by them, and dated Philadelphia, August 15th,1798. It states that upward of three thousand subscribers had been obtained and that a favorable reception was hoped for. No edition for that year has been seen and it is quite possible that none appeared until 1802 when the work was copyrighted in New York by William Little. It is advertised in the New York "Morning Chronicle," for December 22d of that year as published by G. & R. Waite, No. 64, Maiden Lane. The copyright was in the hands of Websters and Skinner and Daniel Steele of Albany, and they brought out many editions, the imprints of some showing that it was widely sold in various parts of the country. Editions were published in Harrisburg in 1818, in Utica in 1818 and 1820 and in Albany as late as 1831, a copy of which edition is in the American Antiquarian Society. Nearly all copies seen were from entirely different printings, with many changes and with the addition of many new tunes. F. J. Metcalf's "American Psalmody," 1917, p. 27, mentions eighteen editions and states that there were probably many others. There are several editions of this work in each of the following libraries: AAS., LC., NYP., Y. Later editions of the Easy Instructor include selections from the tunes in this [1806] edition of Part II.

The preface, dated New-York, July, 1813, stated that the object of the book was to show the purposes of the London Missionary Society, to describe the history of the first missionary ventures in the Pacific Islands, and to give some account of the islands and their inhabitants. The voyage down the east coast of South America forms pp. 9-13, p. 12 relating to the slave trade. After his stay in the islands, the writer returned to England in one of the East India Company's ships in 1802. Pp. 275-278 contain an account of his coming to America in 1804. After engaging in business for a while, he opened a school at 222 Greenwich Street, and because of his reputation as a schoolmaster was engaged as the superintendent of the first school started by the Society for establishing a Free School in the City of New-York, in 1806, on Bancker Street. The author is mentioned in Palmer's "The New York Public School," 1905, p. 24, as said to be a well-qualified teacher, the statement being evidently quoted from "An Account of the Free-School Society of New-York," New-York: Published by Collins and Co., 1814, p. 8.

It is evident from the preface that the author's original intention was to carry the account no further than the peace of 1763, the period covered by vol. 1, and the text: of this volume ends with the word "Finis." The first sheet, including the title which had "Vol. I." upon it is of a different paper than the text and may have been printed. after the plan was enlarged. On December 12th, 1811, Smith wrote in a letter to S. Sewell, printed in the magazine "Canadiana," vol. 1, no. 7, pp. 101-102, July 1889, that the work was to appear about the fifth of January of the following year. The date 1815 appears on the titles of both volumes but an examination of that in the first volume gives evidence of an erasure under the number 5, which is also out of line with the rest of the date. Moreover the impression of the figure 5 is found on a few succeeding leaves showing that it was put in with single type after the book had heen folded. Probably the title-page had originally been printed with the date 1812: or one of the other years previous to 1815. Gagnon states that his copy had the following inscription in the hand of S. Neilson: "Sam Neilson 20th July 1826. This work printed in 1815 was not published before this time from motives not exactly known. The true motive was probably interest. Some expressions and opinions might affect his prospects or character. It was Mrs. Smith who at last gave orders for its publication at the moment that the author and she were embarking for England." The words, "End of the second volume" on p. 235 of that part, suggest a possible third volume, and Bibaud in his "Bibliothèque Canadienne," published about 1859, after describing the work in two volumes, says that there was a third volume covering the period to 1815. Gagnon has no record of this third volume. See his "Essai de Bibliographie Canadienne," 1895.

Smith states in his preface that his work is based on the "Colony Records, the Jesuits' Journals, and Charlevoix's History . . . and other authentic sources." He refers to these and other sources in the notes and prints a number of official documents, journals, etc. in the foot-notes of both volumes and in the appendix to vol. 1. William McLennan, F. R. S. C., in his note on the book in Larned's "Literature of American History," considers the interest greater in the later part of the work as nearer the period of the author's own life. The history was unpopular with the French Canadians, see La Terrière's "Political and Historical Account," 1830, p. 214, which speaks of its being well compiled but prejudiced. According to the selections from notices found in vol. I of the first issue listed above, the work appeared originally in numbers, the fourth and last part of vol. I being the historical introduction found at the beginning of the complete volume. It was noted that the general map was to be issued upon the conclusion of the work, and this bearing the date, 1852, is in vol. 2 of the first issue, but in vol. 1 of the later issues. The copyright notice dated 1851 is included first in vol. 2 of the earliest issue, while appearing in both volumes of the later issues. The part of the business directory found in vol. 1 of the first issue covered only the counties treated in that volume. The author states in his preface that he has been led by the inaccuracy of the works relating to Canada, previously published, "to devote a year or two to the collection of a few more facts, that intending emigrants and future historians may have a correct view of the Province, as it exists at the present day; and also, that our own people may obtain some information respecting the productions and capabilities of places beyond their own doors. We have endeavored to accomplish our task, as far as relates to the present, by personally visiting all localities likely to yield any matter of sufficient interest to the public .... " He regrets the scantiness of material relating to the past; as for the future, "with a fine climate, a fruitful soil, an inexhaustible supply of water power, valuable minerals in abundance," Canada requires nothing but the industry and perseverance of her sons. The introduction contains a history of Canada from its discovery to 1849. The author cites as authorities the writings of Champlain, Charlevoix, Kalm, La Potherie, Heriot, Warburton, Christie, and Bouchette. A number of tables of statistics are included, relating to population, revenue, shipping, imports and exports, and property subject to taxation. The main part of the book takes up the various counties, individually or in groups. Concluding pages give general information about the Province, and a comparison between it and the United States and the other British colonies for the benefit of intending emigrants from Great Britain. The added title-page engraved in line contains an unsigned view of Niagara Falls. Several of the county maps have the imprint of Thomas Maclear, but they bear the name of no cartographer. The general map, however, has the following title: "Map of Canada West or Upper Canada, compiled from Government Plans, Original Documents, and Personal Observation. By William H. Smith .... Toronto. Published by Thomas Maclear. 1852." The plates added in the third issue are woodengravings of views of Canadian towns and villages, and of a few other scenes, several being unsigned and others having the names of F. C. Lowe, Allanson, J. Dynes, or E. Whitefield. Another issue of the map on a smaller scale was prepared "with alterations and additions to the present time for the Canadian Almanac 1855. Maclear & Co. Toronto." The almanacs for 1857 and 1858, also published by Maclear, contain other adaptations of the same map without Smith's name.

In the earliest issue, the locations on the map, which is dated 1846, are marked with numbers, and pp. x are prefixed to the title, giving the place names to which they refer. By the second issue a new map with place names and the date, 1847, is substituted, and the key to the numbers omitted, while three plates are added. The third issue has four plates, and the fourth has six, one of them being a view of Oshawa, C. W., not included in the 1849 issue, which has only five plates. The author, in his preface to this work which he claims to be the first gazetteer of Canada ever attempted, makes the statement: "I have spared neither trouble, expense, nor personal fatigue; and, in the course of my travels, I have walked over more than three thousand miles of ground, through both the heats of summer and the snows of winter...." He hoped by spreading accurate information to prevent immigration from being diverted from Canada to the United States. Both editions of the folded map have the title: "Smith's Commercial and Travelling Map of Canada West, compiled expressly for Smith's Canadian Gazetteer." The earlier, printed by a lithographic process, and dated 1846, is without imprint, while the later, from a copper plate, has the date 1847, and the imprint, Published by H. Rowsell, Toronto. Probably the latter was also published separately, as an advertisement in the first issue announced that Smith's Pocket Commercial and Travelling Map of Canada West was in process of engraving on copper and would be put up in stiff covers. The plates are chiefly views of public buildings engraved in wood by F. C. Lowe.

The piece was produced under direction of Mr. Smith, in the winter of 1844, and performed that season for upwards of one hundred and forty times, and is by all acknowledged to be the most successful play ever acted in Boston."

Crawford's "Romantic Days in Old Boston," 1910, p. 253, "On the bills for 1844 a prize of \$100 was offered by the management 'for the best moral domestic drama adapted to the stock company of the Museum.' To win this prize there was sent in a play called 'The Drunkard' the authorship of which has never been accurately known, but which John Bouvé Clapp—who has made a special study of the Museum's history to which I am indebted for many of these facts—attributes to Rev. John Pierpont, then pastor of the Hollis Street Church. Pierpont was an ardent worker in the movement for temperance reform, and he was wont to thunder from his pulpit, Sunday after Sunday, against those who had built up fortunes by liquor manufacture... Perhaps it was in the belief that he could preach temperance to a larger audience through the theatre than through the church that Mr. Pier-

pont turned his attention to the writing of a play."

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The first edition was published in Charleston in July, 1795, and a copy was formerly in the Library of Congress, bound in a volume of pamphlets which is now missing. For a title, see our no. 10663, vol. 3. From the title-page it is known that the author was a South Carolinian, and from the added "Eyes Opened" title-page, that he was a member of the House. As all the representatives from that state voted against the treaty on April 30, 1796, except Smith and Harper, and as the latter in December, 1795, published under his own name the reasons for his position, Smith is apparently the author of the above pamphlet. See Matthews' "Journal of William Loughton Smith," 1917, p. 80. Announced in the New York "Daily Advertiser" of August 26, 1795, as follows: "This day is Published, and sold by James Rivington, The Eyes Opened . . . Under the title of A Candid Examination of the Objections to the Treaty, Lately effected with the Court of Great Britain, by his excellency Governor Jay, which was last week ratified by the President, and is now on its passage to London. On the appearance in print, of this valuable performance, the change produced by the perusal of it, in the opinions of the most violent of 12000 inhabitants of Charleston, opposed to the treaty, was incredible. It is read with equal avidity and conviction." Dated August 26.

The ratification of the treaty took place on August 15, 1795, after the title-page and first sheets had been printed, and it was decided to add a new title and a postscript both calling attention to the event. The half title of the postscript is part of the preceding signature, F, but the text, which with the following blank leaf, forms a complete sheet, is printed on different paper, now noticeably browner. Besides the announcement of the ratification of the treaty, the postscript contained extracts of published letters of Jay and Pinckney, written in November, 1794, the latter dated in error, 1795; a note from the New York "Minerva," of August 17, 1795, that the late British minister had sailed for England with the ratified treaty; and a letter from William Stephens Smith of New York, with two from Washington, reprinted from the New York "Daily Advertiser," of the 18th of that month.

Dr. David Ramsay questioned the legality of Smith's election to the House of Representatives in November, 1788, because he had not been a citizen of the United States for seven years, and on April 15th, 1789, presented a petition to the House to that effect. On May 22, Smith explained to that body that he was born in Charleston of a South Carolina family, and that his absence in Europe was due to his education and to delays for which he was not responsible. The introduction, dated Charleston Courier-Office, June, 1806, states that there had been such a demand for the newspapers containing the numbers of Phocion that it had been decided to republish them separately. This series of articles signed by Phocion is written against the violation of neutrality by American ships in the carrying trade between France and her colonies, then at war with Great Britain. According to Matthews, they were published in the "Charleston Courier," from February 18 to May 31, 1806. On p. 5 it is stated that the first four numbers and part of the fifth were not reprinted as they did not relate to Colonial Trade. For an English reprint see above "American Arguments for British Rights," in the preface to which it is stated that the author is William L. Smith.

The authorship has been most generally attributed to Smith, from the time of publication to the present, and it is to be noted that he later used the same pseudonym in his "Numbers of Phocion." For a careful study of the question, see Matthews' "Journal of William Loughton Smith," 1917, pp. 83-86. Among authorities cited is William Cobbett, a bookseller and publisher in Philadelphia, who had advertised an edition of the pamphlet in his "Porcupine's Gazette," July 17,1797, and after his return to London, quoted passages from it stating that they were "Extracted from the Letters of Phocion, written by William Smith, Esq. of South Carolina." See "Cobbett's Annual Register," vol. 1, 1802, column 961-972. Matthews also includes quotations from numbers of the Charleston "City Gazette," of November and December, 1796, showing that Smith was mentioned as a possible author in his own home. One of the copies in the library of the New York Historical Society has an inscription on the titlepage of the first part, stating that the pamphlet was "presented by Oliver Wolcott 30th Sept. 1813," which is in the handwriting of John Pintard, Recording Secretary at the time. He also wrote above the imprint "by Oliver Wolcott," and evidently later added "and William Smith of S. C." This indicates that Oliver Wolcott, who was Secretary of the Treasury in 1796, assisted in the composition.

This pamphlet is made up from a series of articles by "Phocion," which appeared, according to Matthews, in the "Gazette of the United States," October 14-November 24, 1796. They were written, according to part 1, p. [3], in answer to "a writer under the signature of Hampden, in the Richmond paper of the 1st instant," who favored Jefferson's election. The "Gazette" also published a series of letters in reply signed, "A Federalist," which were later issued in a separate pamphlet, our no. 23994, vol. 6.

The appendix, "Vindication of Mr. Adams's Defence of the American Constitutions," is signed and dated, "Union. Eastern Shore, Maryland, 26th Oct. 1796," and forms pp. 39-42 of part 2. It is reprinted from the "Gazette of the United States," for November 5, 1796. It is said that in the copy formerly owned by Smith, now in the collection of the Charleston Library Society, he wrote under the appendix "by William Vans Murray, now Min. Res. in Holld." This is a reply to Madison's seven resolutions proposed January 3, pp. iiivi of this pamphlet, and which are prefixed by the statement that "the interest of the United States would be promoted by further restrictions and higher duties, in certain cases, on the manufactures and navigation of foreign nations, employed in the commerce of the United States, than those now imposed." These regulations were intended as a retaliation for the British navigation laws, but Smith claimed that antagonizing Great Britain would react unfavorably on American commerce. Jefferson's opinion, which is generally accepted, that Smith was merely a mouthpiece for Hamilton is shown in the following extract from his letter to Madison, dated Monticello, Apr. 3, 1794: "I have been particularly gratified by the receipt of the papers containing yours & Smith's discussion of your regulating propositions. These debates had not been seen here but in a very short & mutilated form. I am at no loss to ascribe Smith's speech to it's true father. Every tittle of it is Hamilton's except the introduction. There is scarcely anything there which I have not heard from him in our various private tho' official discussions. The very turn of the arguments is the same, and others will see as well as myself that the style is Hamilton's. The sophistry is too fine, too ingenious, even to have been comprehended by Smith, much less devised by him. His reply shews he did not understand his first speech, as its general inferiority proves it's legitimacy, as evidently as it does the bastardy of the original." It may have been printed by James Humphreys, as the style of printing resembles that in several similar pamphlets relating to British claims which were printed by him.

Only vols. 1 and 3 were published. The work was compiled under grants from the legislature, and published at the expense of the state. "Part I.—Historical. Vol. I." takes up the narrative in 1512, giving a sketch of the history of the Mississippi Valley of the Northwest Territory, and carrying that of Wisconsin down to 1836, the date of her admission as a territory. The notes, pp. 301-432, are chiefly extracts of sources. "Part II.—Documentary. Vol. III." reproduces documents relating to the history, with some summaries by the author. Translations from the Jesuit Relations form pp. 9-112; an account of the Black Hawk War, pp. 113-186, contains extracts from Black Hawk's own narrative; pp. 187-354 are in the main other individual narratives, but include descriptions of Indian remains, pp. 236-265, and Annals of the Legislature and of the Constitutional conventions, 1836-1854, pp. 287-314, etc.; a history of the Milwaukee and Rock River canal, pp. 354-443, concludes the volume.

It was the author's plan to complete the first part in a second narrative volume, vol. 2, to be accompanied by another volume of documents, vol. 4 of the whole work, which would have been the end of the second part. The third part, which would have been vol. 5, was to have followed, and to have been a detailed description of the state at the time of publication. According to a letter from Lyman C. Draper, Corresponding Secretary of the Wisconsin Historical Society, dated, Madison, Wis., Apl. 28, 1864, the "Legislature of the State . . . refused to order the intended continuation, & thus the 2d & 4th vols. were never prepared; & Gen. The counsel for the defense attempted to show that Smith and Ogden, though they had taken part in the affair, had not actually begun it, that members of the government, including even Jefferson, were cognizant of Miranda's plans, and that moreover Spain and the United States were at the time practically in a state of war. Secretaries Madison and Robert Smith, and others in Washingon, who were subpoenaed as witnesses for the defense, refused to appear, but the defendants were finally acquitted. The firm name of Smith & Forman, printers and stationers, appeared in the New York city directories for the first time in the issue for 1806-07. Smith was Daniel D. Smith, and under his own name was entered as a bookbinder and stationer, at 70 Vesey Street, one of the two addresses given for the firm. Forman appears to have been Aaron Forman, a printer, whose address under his own name in this directory was on Dey Street, corner of Greenwich. By 1811-12 Aaron Forman was located at 213 Greenwich Street, and Smith at 195 Greenwich, both numbers being given in the address of the firm. They evidently kept up two establishments, called after 1812-13 the Franklin Juvenile Bookstores. Smith & Forman almanacs for 1817 were printed, but the partnership appears to have been dissolved in that year as the name of Smith & Forman was not in the directory for 1817-18, though the partners were each listed separately at 190 and 195 Greenwich Street respectively. The next year Forman's name had disappeared. From 1807-1811 the names of Smith & Forman are found in the imprints of some issues of "Oram's Almanac" and "Hutchins' Revived Almanac" printed by others. Smith & Forman, themselves, printed issues of "Hutchins' Revived" for the years from 1812-1817, the calendar pages and some other pages from the same type as that of their New-York and New-Jersey Almanacs. Smith continued in business as bookseller and stationer and sold almanacs, having his name as publisher in the imprint of an issue of "Hutchins' Improved Almanac" as late as that for 1838, but the directory for 1838-39 gives his address as Peekskill.

## SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION

The works listed below under Smithsonian Institution are not a complete list of publications of that institution, most of which will be found entered under the individual authors or editors of the scientific papers, reports, etc. Amongst those of which the Institution itself may be considered the author, those which have a definite American interest are included and those which possess an historical value as early specimens of the types of publication which they represent. The greater number of circulars, instructions, lists, etc., are omitted. These may be found in the lists of publications published by the Institution. See below, Catalogue of Publications. After the first years, the publications which formed part of a regular plan were each given a serial number as Publication no. — of the Institution. Sometimes these numbers appear in the book or pamphlet, but sometimes that information can only be supplied from the official lists. Some of the early publications, not in this regular series, and with dates from 1846 to 1853, were afterward designated as Publications A-Q in these lists. A few titles, mostly of ephemeral interest, were published, which have no letter or number assigned to them.

Within the large series of Publications, most, though not all, works are issued in one or other of the three minor series, the Annual Reports of the Board of Regents, the Smithsonian Contributions to Knowledge, or the Smithsonian Miscellaneous Collections. In the two latter, the different articles are published each with its own dated title-page which has a series heading, and with separate paging, and may be had separately. Occasionally the individual papers are also issued separately without a series heading or number, but from the same stereotype or electrotype plates. When all the articles planned for a given volume have been printed, the complete volume is issued with its title-page, which may bear a date later than that of the individual papers. From time to time, though not regularly as in the case of the other two series, reprints of items in the Annual Reports are published. The Library of Congress in its printed cards has analysed the Contributions and Miscellaneous Collections, and some parts of the Reports. Certain publications, however, do not fall

in any of the three minor series, though possessing a number in the general series of Publications.

Besides the regular reports and the scientific contributions, which form the bulk of the publications, certain types of pamphlets are issued from time to time for reference, lists of various kinds, circulars, instructions to observers, handbooks or guides to the Institution, etc. Those with information of the same kind may be issued differently in different years, sometimes appearing only separately, and sometimes as articles in one or another series, not always the same series. The titles also vary slightly so that it may not always be apparent that they are the issues for different dates of the same type of pamphlet.

The act establishing the Institution required that the Board of Regents report annually to Congress, and the reports have always been printed in the Congressional documents. At first the usage varied as to the series in which they were issued. Found as a rule in the Miscellaneous Documents of one or both Houses, they, nevertheless, appeared a few times in the Executive Documents of the House. Since 1885 they are published in the House Miscellaneous Documents. The reports for 1849, and from 1853-1858, appeared in both Senate and House sets, and except for the fact that there were two editions of the report for 1853, and that the House set did not contain the full report for 1856, they were in general from the same plates. According to Rhees's "Catalogue of Publications of the Smithsonian Institution," 1882, the report for 1850 was first issued in an edition of 145 pages. It appeared later in an "extra edition" which contained a list of "Copyright publications prior to 1850," pp. 146-325. The House edition of the report for 1853 contained the minority report of the Special Committee of the Board of Regents relative to the distribution of the income of the Smithsonian fund, which had not been presented before the adjournment of the Board. This is not found in the Senate edition. Beginning with 1884, the Annual Report of the National Museum has been issued as a second volume. See also United States, National Museum. Extra copies of the whole report are also furnished for distribution by the Institution.

The first seven volumes of the annual report of the Board of Regents, as issued for the Institution, were in paper covers, the eighth report, that for 1853 being the first to be bound in cloth. This contained as an appendix, reprints of the Secretary's report for the preceding six years, furnishing the most important material for the earlier years of the institution, and thus being sometimes considered as a satisfactory beginning to a set of the reports. It should be noted, however, that the first annual report of the Board of Regents which did not contain a Secretary's report is not represented

and that other reports and articles are not reprinted.

The earliest reports contained chiefly the reports of the Secretary, and of committees, plans for future work, and a few brief scientific papers. In the report for 1854 was a General Appendix continued as a regular feature, and which came to include such items as reports of lectures, extracts from correspondence, translations of scientific articles, information about scientific organizations, reports of and instructions to observers, accounts of the progress of science, and scientific memoirs. For a number of years annual summaries were given of the progress in various fields of science, but in 1889 these summaries were given up, and more attention paid to the memoirs. American archæology and ethnology have been emphasized in the reports.

The letter, pp. 1-2, is followed by the report and documents of the committee of five of the House to which it was referred with instructions to inquire and report whether the Smithsonian Institution had been managed and its funds expended in accordance with the law establishing the Institution, and whether any additional legislation were necessary, etc. Mr. Choate's resignation was caused by the repeal by the Board of Regents of a compromise between those members who advocated the development of a library, and those interested in promoting scientific research and publication

resulting therefrom. The act of establishment had made no definite provision for apportionment of appropriations except that a sum not exceeding 25,000 dollars was to be spent annually for the library. The compromise had divided the income evenly between the two lines of development, and the resolution adopted in its place provided that hereafter the appropriations should be apportioned according to the judgment of the Board in compliance with the law. Charles C. Jewett, the Librarian, had been removed by Secretary Joseph Henry because of his insistence on the development of the library. Mr. Choate, who agreed with Mr. Jewett, resigned because he felt out of harmony with the policy of emphasizing research at the expense of the library.

Mr. Upham, chairman of the committee, reported, pp. 3-27, in favor of restoring the compromise, of putting the Secretary in charge of scientific research and publications, the Librarian being made responsible for the library and museum, both officials to be subject to a common head, possibly the Secretary of the Interior, or the Board of Regents. Mr. Witte, another member, with the concurrence of Mr. Taylor, reported that the Regents were not exceeding their powers under the act in developing the research side, but working in conformity with Smithson's will, that no additional legislation was required, and that charges of maladministration brought against the Secretary because of his removal of Mr. Jewett, etc., were unjustified. This second report, pp. 27-43, was also issued separately, see Report of Hon. William H. Witte, below. Two members of the committee preferred not to sign either report. The Trumbull Phalanx was founded near Warren, Ohio, in 1844, and lasted until 1847. According to Hillquit's "History of Socialism in the United States," 1903, p. 115, it was the most successful of the five Fourierist experiments in Ohio.

"Awful Treason against the Will of God" and "Christ's Peaceable Reign or the universal Republic of Truth and Righteousness," two pamphlets mentioned by Smol-

nikar in his "Proclamation of the True Union," have not been located.

Mr. Smolnikar established "Peace Union" on Tuscarora Mountain, Perry County, Pennsylvania, in 1859. He claimed to be a messenger of a new era of happiness, in which all people would live in harmony, each contributing his share to the common welfare. This first center was only a provisional one, incapable of accommodating all who might want to reside there, but anyone could join the Peace Union Association, "a union of co-operation for establishing peace," attend the conventions, and send their children there where "all intellectual and moral faculties ... will be harmoniously developed." Every person who entered into the community was compelled to donate all his property. Robert D. Eldridge, the other trustee, and Smolnikar were unable to reside there all of the time, so Peter Bunney, a Philadelphia shoemaker, was appointed as watchman. They discovered later that Bunney was transforming their settlement into a Mormon center. Bunney died in 1863, and his wife and daughter robbed the Peace Union of some property in May, 1864. Smolnikar sought settlement in court, but received an unfavorable decision on October 31, 1865. In 1866 Eldridge and he were sued by Levi Carstetter, a farmer who was then taking care of the land at Peace Union, for unfairness in the division of the farm products. Smolnikar intended to establish a printing office at the settlement and publish a periodical called the "Peace Union Message," but it is improbable that this was ever accomplished. According to a quotation from the Phalanx of April, 1844, in Noyes's "History of American Socialisms," 1870, pp. 251-252, Smolnikar made an unsuccessful attempt to start a Peace Union Settlement in Limestown township, Warren County, Pennsylvania. The work is in the main a reissue, without acknowledgment, from the stereotype plates of the Buffalo edition of Simmonds's "Sir John Franklin and the Arctic Regions," our no. 81152, vol. 19. The "Introduction to the American Edition," pp. vii-xvii of that work, which is not found in Mr. Smucker's issue though included in the table of contents, would have supplied the gap in numbering between the preliminary pages and the text. Pp. 25-410 are from the plates of Simmonds's work, omitting his pages 358-362 and his last paragraph, a new heading being substituted on p. 361 of Smucker's issue. The latter adds on pp. 411-517 an account of expeditions in search of Franklin from 1852-1855.

The issues found respectively in the Library of Congress and in that of the Wisconsin Historical Society are both in original binding. The former copy lacks three of the plates mentioned in the list but includes two others not mentioned therein, while the latter omits eight of those listed, and includes two not on the list. As in the case of the issues copyrighted in 1857 some of the plates included in the pagination are inserted wrongly, so that there appear to be gaps in the numbering of the pages, though the text is consecutive.

Of the copies of this first issue of Part First which have been examined, the only one which is accompanied by a second volume is that belonging to the American Antiquarian Society. In this case the second volume lacks the title-page, and in the appendix the date Nov. 1, 1863 is mentioned, so that probably it is a copy of Part Second as copyrighted in 1864. Mr. Smucker died after the publication of the first volume which carried the history up to July, 1862. The copy at the University of Texas is the only one examined which has sixteen plates. According to Mrs. Mary R. Reynolds, the American Antiquarian Society copy in original binding has fourteen plates. The rebound copies in the Library of Congress, the New York Public Library, and in the Ridgway Branch of the Philadelphia Public Library, have six, twelve, and eight respectively. It seems probable that the volume was issued with varying numbers of plates. According to F. J. Shepard in Larned's "Literature of American History," 1902, the account is "undiscriminating, and ... was written too early for the authors to know what was going on behind the scenes, especially on the Confederate side. But it presents the story of the conflict as it was read in the newspapers of the period and in a reasonably compact form."

Mr. Smyth was pastor of the First Congregational Church in Toledo from 1847–1850, and then became superintendent of schools in the same place, holding office until 1856, when for one year he edited the "Ohio Journal of Education" in Columbus. As Commissioner of Common Schools of Ohio, he issued the Annual Reports for the years from 1857–1862. From 1863–1866 he was superintendent of schools in Cleveland, and his "Christian Culture in Public Schools" is among the "Lectures" for 1861, published by the American Institute of Instruction, in 1862. He was also the author of an "Introduction to the American Edition" of Mrs. D. M. Mulock Craik's "A Woman's Thoughts about Women," Columbus, 1858, pp. v-xxiii. According to the "English Catalogue," the work was published by McLean in 1839, at two prices according to whether the plates were colored or not. Counting the vignette on the title-page, the work consists of 23 lithographs of scenes in Canada, together with a dedication leaf addressed to the Earl of Durham, which has a list of the plates on the verso. Gagnon states that the artist was in the employ of that nobleman

during his mission to Canada in 1838. In the later issue the plates and the title-page are mounted, the imprint below the title being cut away, and in some cases at least, are laid not bound, in a portfolio, which is lettered on the front cover: "Sketches in the Canadas by Coke Smyth." The leaf with the dedication and list of plates is omitted in this issue. In Nagler's "Neues allgemeines Künstler-Lexikon," vol. 18, 1911, p. 531, the name of Charles Bentley is mentioned as cooperating in the work. James Everett, on the other hand, who had worked with the papers of William Green of Rotherham, definitely declared that it was from the latter. The author of the recommendation lost his curacy at Ballyculter as the result of identifying himself with the followers of Wesley. Dr. Smyth, with four of his colleagues at Andover Theological Seminary, Professors Tucker, Harris, Churchill and Hincks, founded the "Andover Review" in 1884 and continued it through 1893. In 1886, at the complaint of some conservative Congregationalists, the editors were tried before the Board of Visitors of the Seminary for their theological views, and the verdict ordered the removal of Professor Smyth. With the encouragement of the Trustees, the case was appealed to the Supreme Court of the state, and in 1891 was laid aside on a technicality. It comprises an claborate account of the canals, forts and defensive works of Canada, &c. then existing, with the recommendations of the Committee for placing the whole of the British Provinces in a complete state of defence." Following the heading of paragraph 52 on p. 135, "Vulnerable points of America," is the note, "His Grace the Master General has ordered that this paragraph is not to be lithographed." Miss Margaret Ray, who furnished information as to a copy in the Public Library of Toronto, states that according to a manuscript note in that copy it is "of extraordinary value as it contains a manuscript transcript of the lengthy paragraph ... which was ordered not to be lithographed." The four appendices contain: "A. State of the different Fortifications, Barracks, Hospitals, Magazines, and Storehouses, in His Majesty's Provinces of Lower

and Upper Canada, as they appeared upon inspection in the Summer of 1825;" "B. On recto of the leaf preceding the title: "N. B .- This Volume is printed by desire of His Grace the Master-General [the Duke of Wellington], for the use and convenience of Official People only. It is requested it may be considered as confidential by those Persons to whom Copies may be sent." The dedicatory letter addressed to the Duke is signed by the author and dated, "Nutwood, Reigate, 15th August, 1826." General Smyth, a military engineer, was selected by the Duke of Wellington in 1825, to make a report on the military defences of Canada, and to offer recommendations as to the fortifications and works required along the frontier. Of his unpublished communications on the subject the most important is a report, dated March 31, 1826, which together with several others is listed in Cruikshank's "Inventory of the Military Documents in the Canadian Archives," 1910. He states in the dedicatory letter of the "Precis" that a study of past military operations in the province had been needed for an understanding of the present requirements for defence. The results of these researches are submitted to the Duke, with recommendations as to the strategic positions to be newly fortified or strengthened, in order to make impossible the conquest of Canada by the United States. The outlines of the plan "had been already traced by your Grace's own Hand."

On page 34 are two poems "by Lady Jane Smyth Cate wife of Sir John Smyth." In the preface to his "Select Poems," the author states that he was born and bred in Canada, followed the plough until he was forty-four years old and had never written a poem until that time. According to a manuscript note in a copy of that work in the Public Library of Toronto, "M. Teefy [a collector of Canadiana] knew poor old John Smyth well; he was at one time a sort of Land Agent-had an office in King Street, Toronto-but never was an active intelligent man; -was weak and silly—given to poetry? and lovemaking—and became a butt for the 'young men about town -in the latter years of his existence he was not able to walk; he had a carriage so constructed that he could propel himself along sitting in it-whenever he wished to go from one side-walk to the other, some person would assist him to cross the street by drawings him in his carriage over the 'crossing.' He assumed the title of 'Sir John' and everybody consented to recognise him (when speaking to him) as a Baronet (?)-and 'Poet Laureat' etc." According to Innis's "History of the Canadian Pacific Railway," 1923, p. 67, "In 1835 Sir John Smyth in the Christian Guardian suggested the possibilities of a short and direct line from New York to Montreal, thence to Toronto, the Mississippi, the Rocky Mountains and the Columbia River in developing the western trade as well as trade with India and China. Ten years later as a result of the rapid expansion of the western states, of the growth of the Red River Settlement and of the more promising situation in Canada after the Union, he elaborated on the earlier proposal." According to H. Scadding's "Toronto of Old," 1873, p. 177, "he brought out a lithographed map: its peculiarity was a straight black line conspicuously drawn across the continent from Fort William to the mouth of the Columbia river."

The Harper copy in the Huntington Library contains between pages 16 and 19, as a substitute for pp. 17–18, a leaf without page numbers, having the heading "Different Tracts and Surveys of most valuable Lands, ... belonging to J. Ferd. Smyth, Esq." and at the foot of the verso, the imprint of Cox, Son, and Baylis. The two copies of the "Case" at the Huntington Library, one purchased from Mr. L. C. Harper and one from the Museum Book Store, have additional leaves containing certificates, recommendations, depositions, etc., bound in. The arrangement of these leaves differs in the two copies. The Harper copy lacks three leaves containing pages numbered 3–10, found in the Museum Book Store copy. It contains, however, an unpaged leaf of recommendations, etc., which has an imprint of Cox, Son, and Baylis, and is not included in the latter copy. A detailed collation of each follows:

The copies of the "Case" which have been examined appear to have been issued bound following the poem, "Destiny and Fortitude," 1808, as is the case with the Huntington Library copies in apparently contemporary boards, the descriptions of which were furnished by Willard O. Waters. Probably it was first issued separately in

The "Explanation of the names of Smyth and Stuart (J. Ferdinand Dalziel Smyth -Ferdinand Smyth Stuart)," is embodied in two letters to the Earl of Moira, dated at Billericay, Essex, on August 2 and 26, 1806, and signed, Ferdinand Smyth Stuart. These describe his descent from the house of Stuart through his grandfather, the Duke of Monmouth. The father of the writer had received the name of Smyth from his foster father, a friend of the Duke. Dr. Smyth, himself, states in his letters that about ten years previously he had added the name of Stuart to his own, "for, indeed, what was the name of Smyth to me?"

The petitioner brings forward his claims for losses incurred as a loyalist officer during the American Revolution. The Board of Treasury and later the Commissioners for American Claims, on the close of the war had allotted him a pension, but in 1784 it was discontinued because, as he claimed, he had refused to give secret information in regard to other loyalists before the Commissioners. The vouchers are signed by both American and British persons of influence, including Peyton Randolph, General Andrew Lewis, the Earl of Dunmore, Lieutenant-Colonel Connolly, General Howe, Ex-Governor Tryon, Lord North, the Earl of Carlisle, and others. For other papers relating to his claims, see his "Memorial," of 1784, and "Petition," 1811.

The folded map has the title, "North America and the West Indies with the latest discoveries," and the imprint, London, Published by Laurie & Whittle, Fleet Street.

"Verses Addressed to Ferdinand Smyth Stuart, Esq. on the poem, entitled Destiny and Fortitude," signed D. E., form pp. iii-iv, and in the New York Public Library copy are followed by two unnumbered leaves containing a satirical poem, "The Bursted Chase," not found in the other copies examined. This is mentioned on page 51 of the author's notes as "very rare and scarce, but strictly and literally true." It is listed in the table of contents as beginning on page 53, and was possibly misplaced when this copy was rebound. As the two Huntington Library copies, which according to Mr. Waters are in old boards, and the Historical Society of Pennsylvania copy do not contain the satire, some copies may have been issued without it.

The sixteen elegies which form the main part of the book relate chiefly to the author's own misfortunes, and incidentally to those of various members of the house of Stuart, to which he claimed to belong as a grandson of the Duke of Monmouth. Pp. 33-52 contain explanatory notes. Elegies 6-9, and 14, are especially connected with his American experiences. In the note on elegy 15 a reference is made to the author's claims against the British government which are "related and explained in the annexed Case." See the preceding title, some copies of which were issued with the poem. The final leaf contains: "Proposals for publishing A Genealogical Chart of the Descendants of the Royal House of Stuart ... down to the year 1809 ... Accompanied by an interesting poem, entitled Destiny and Fortitude: being an historical detail of the misfortunes of this illustrious family; Embellished with a fine Portrait of Mary Stuart, Queen of Scotland and France. By Ferdinand Smyth Stuart, the nearest descendant. . . . Orders and Subscriptions are received by Messrs. Nornaville and Fell, New Bond-street; Mr. Egerton, Whitehall; Mr. White, Fleet Street; and Mr. Hatchard, Piccadilly; where authentic information concerning any part of the Family will be considered as a favour. Cox, Son, and Baylis, Printers, Great Queen Street." Prob-

ably not enough subscribers were obtained to warrant the publication of the "Genealogical Chart."

The plates are both stipple engravings. The portrait of Mary, Queen of Scots, which is said to be from an "Original Painting in the possession of (J. F. Smyth) Ferdinand Smyth Stuart Esq.," has the inscription, Fred. Zuchari Pinxt: I. Singleton Sculpt: The portrait of "(J. F. Smyth) Ferdinand Smyth Stuart, Esqr." is unsigned.

Signed and dated on page 85: "Ferdinand Smyth Stuart. London, 19th January, 1807." It is probable that it is from the sheets of the first edition, and identical with it except for the edition note on the title-page, and only entry in Watt having the same date. Contains an attack on vaccination as opposed to inoculation. One of Dr. Smyth Stuart's children had died after a long illness following vaccination in 1802. A letter by him describing the case and his own treatment of it had been published by Robert Squirrell in his anti-vaccination tract, "Observations ... on the Cow-Pox," 1805. Robert John Thornton, in his "Vaccinæ Vindicia," 1806, pp. 335-344, ridiculed the inferences drawn from the case by the unfortunate father, who it was reported "might have been a negro-doctor in America," and by Dr. Squirrell, and implied that the death was due to the ignorant treatment of the case. The above contains a reply by Dr. Smyth Stuart and a further attempt to prevent legislation in favor of vaccination. In the course of the work there are a few American references, including on page I a quotation from a letter to Congress printed in the author's "Tour," 1784, which he declares had saved the life of a British officer twenty-eight years before; a brief account of experiences with the yellow fever in San Domingo and the United States between 1795 and 1796, pp. 29-30; and a reference to a description by Mr. Daniel Stephenson of Baltimore of the safety of inoculation as practised in America, p. 74.

The final leaf contains: "Proposals for publishing a Genealogical Chart of the Royal House of Stuart ... From James VI. and I. down to the Year 1807. With Tables of Descent above 2000 Years back ... Accompanied by an interesting Poem, entitled Destiny and Fortitude . . . By a Descendant . . . . " A leaf similar to but differing slightly from that in the author's "Case" of the same year.

The frontispiece is entitled "Vaccination," and has the inscription, Pubd. by Fd Smyth Stuart Esqr No. 63 Fleet Street. It is an engraving colored by hand of a terrible monster with wide opened jaws into which Dr. Jenner and his fellow workers in the guise of demons are emptying baskets full of infants. The approach to the Temple of Fame in the background is defended by the anti-vaccinationists, Mosely, Squirrell, Rowley, Birch and Lipscombe. Description from the folded plate in "£30,000 for the Cow-Pox!!!," a later issue of the same sheets with an appendix. The copy in the library of the Academy of Medicine lacks the frontispiece, but it is probable that this is the "emblematic frontispiece" mentioned in the title.

The 4th and 7th leaves are wrongly numbered 14 and 17. The memorial, pp. (2), follows the title, and is signed: "J. F. D. Smyth. Milbank-Row, Westminster, Jan. 1, 1784." After this is No. 1 of his accounts, those numbered 2-6 being omitted. Manuscript notes, evidently written by Dr. Smyth, in the Library of Congress copy, state that "No. 2, No. 3, No. 4, No. 5, No. 6 and the different Estates in land are not inserted here." On the next page is a printed statement that "The surveys of the greatest number of these lands are at present in the hands of Lord Southampton," followed by another manuscript note, "of which His Lordship gave a certificate in 1784-but as they were then mislaid they could not be produced-but they have all been since then found by His Lordship and returned in Jan'y 1795." Although only 22 testimonials are listed on the title-page, there are 27 in the pamphlet, the last three being printed on the large folded leaf with a certificate: "True copies compared with the originals. T. Uncle. American Office, Sept. 13 1784." A draft of the "Memorial," including the missing accounts and the Estates in Land, but lacking the testimonials, is found among the manuscript "... Transcripts of the Manuscript Books and Papers of the Commission of Enquiry into the Losses and Services of the American Loyalists ... preserved amongst the Audit Office Records in the Public Record Office of England 1783-1790," made for the New York Public Library. The author first describes his arrival in America, his travels in Virginia, the Carolinas, and Kentucky, his voyage down the Ohio and Mississippi to New Orleans, his coasting trip along West and East Florida, and his return through Georgia and the Carolinas to Virginia. After mentioning his brief settlement in that province, he tells of taking up farming in Maryland. He includes a short account of the Dunmore War of 1774, in which he served under General Andrew Lewis. The latter half of the second volume relates chiefly to Dr. Smyth's experiences as a loyalist during the Revolution, his wanderings and imprisonments in Virginia, Pennsylvania and Maryland, his escape in a British ship off Delaware Bay to join the British army in New York, and the impressions he formed of New York and New Jersey while in that service. New England, which he had seen only while taking part in the Danbury expedition, is covered in a brief chapter.

John Randolph in 1822 wrote on a flyleaf of his copy, "This book, although replete with calumny and falsehood, contains the truest picture of the state of society and manners in Virginia (such as it was about half a century ago) that is extant. . . . "See the reprints of extracts relating to Virginia in the "Virginia Historical Register," vol. 6, 1853, pp. 11-20, 77-90, 131-148. A contemporary criticism in the "Monthly Review," vol. 72, 1785, pp. 112-121, stated that "though this performance by no means answers the high expectations designed to be raised by the title-page, yet those who only wish to know enough of America, and its late revolutions, to enable them to join in the conversation of the day, may here be supplied with information that may possibly be sufficient to answer that end." Besides describing the Indian tribes met during his travels, the author includes in chap. 44 of vol. 1, "A List of the Names of all the different Indian Nations on the Continent of North-America, with their Situations, and the Number of Gun-men or Warriors in each Nation." This he claims to have taken "from the best authority I have been able to collect." Winsor states that the source is unknown, and notes that it is essentially the same list as those appearing in Trumbull's Indian Wars, and Buchanan's "Sketches of the History, Manners, and Customs, of the North American Indians," 1824. Some differences in the latter lists may be explained by errors in copying. An examination proves that Dr. Smyth has taken his statistics from Appendix IV of William Smith's anonymous "Historical Account of the Expedition against the Ohio Indians," 1865, which was "drawn up by a French trader, a person of considerable note who has resided many years among the Indians, and still continues at Detroit ...." This would not at first be suspected as the order in which the tribes are given is reversed, and the spelling of the names varies, but the estimated number of fighting men is the same in all but a few cases, while many even of the phrases describing the tribes are either the same or similar.

On p. 296 of the list of Dr. Smyth's works in his "Autobiographical Notes," 1914, a Glasgow 1844 edition is included, but as the British Museum, the Faculty of Advocates, and the University of Dublin have his other British printed works, and not this, it seems possible, at least, that there was no Glasgow edition actually published, and that the editor of "Autobiographical Notes" assumed there was from the following statement by Dr. Smyth, which appears on p. 217 of the "Autobiographical Notes": "When I arrived in Glasgow in 1844, I found Mr. Collins, ... had already published my work on Presbytery and Prelacy, and was then reading my work on the Apostolical Succession with a view to publish it." On the final page of advertisements in the author's "Ecclesiastical Catechism," fourth edition, 1844, an abridged edition of this work prepared by the Rev. Joseph Tracy is mentioned as "preparing for publication," but we have been unable to prove that such an edition was ever issued by locating a copy. On the leaf facing the half title of Smyth's "Unity of the Human Races," 1850, appears a list of "Works by the same Author," which includes "Apostolical Succession. 8vo. Boston. 1842," but it seems probable that this is an error for 1841, as we have found no other record of an 1842 edition.

Boren, near Pomona, for running cane-mills and threshing-machines, was purchased and placed in position in the rear of the printing office, which was in the brick building 218 West Market street. A horse was purchased—C. F. Thomas, now one of Greensboro's leading job printers, was a lad and acted as motorman. Thus equipped, with Joseph H. Fetzer, Wm. H. Curtis, and D. N. Sherwood as printers, the work of issuing books began . . . There was no limit to the sale, as few other school books were printed in those troublesome days—and there were many thousands of each book printed. . . . The greatest trouble the firm had was to get paper—white rags not being on the market save for hospitals. Much of the paper was made at the Salem and Wake Forest Mills, and mostly from raw cotton, damaged chiefly by water or fire in its owner's effort to keep it out of harm's way. The firm sent J. J. Griffin of the Library of Congress, dated December 9, 1920: "The Copyright records show that the work\* [Ye Sneak yclepid Copperhead] referred to in your letter of November 19, was entered on July 30, 1863 by Rev. I. J. Stine as author." Joseph Jackson states in his "Bibliography of the Works of Charles Godfrey Leland," 1927, p. 42: "Although this work was issued anonymously, it is not only known that Leland was its author, but the copy in the library of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, bears an autographic inscription from him, presenting it to the institution." Two copies in HSP. have been examined, but on neither has been found this inscription. Since Mr. Jackson also states that the work was illustrated by Leland, this may account for the presentation inscription.

Snethen, in the following excerpts from his sketch of the author in Sprague's "Annals of the American Pulpit," vol. 7, 1861, pp. 243-253, mentions some works by his father which we have been unable to locate: "In the winter of 1800-01, he proposed to give a course of Lectures on 'Preaching the Gospel,' but his health was so feeble that he only finished his 'Introductory,' which was published in 1822.... In July, 1802, he preached a sermon, the first which has been preserved, in Light Street Church, Baltimore, on the 'Education of Daughters.' ... The Methodist Protestants of New York, in 1836, stirred up by his appeals in behalf of Education, essayed to start a College for the instruction of candidates for the ministry, and invited Mr. Snethen to take charge of it. Mr. Snider, a religious and patriotic fanatic, was born in Rushville, New York, and spent most of his life as an itinerant preacher in the East and South. He served as a private in the Civil War. In 1868 he issued at least three proclamations and petitions, which he "freely distributed," but no copies have been located.

A Col. Jacob Snively, in command of about one hundred and seventy-five other Texans, made an unsuccessful attack on a caravan of Mexicans traveling along the Santa Fe trail in the spring of 1843. See H. Yoakum's "History of Texas," 1856, vol. 2, pp. 399-405; and also, Col. Snively's official report to the Department of War and Marine, dated "Camp on Elmn Creek, July 9th 1843," which appears in the "Annual Report of the American Historical Association for the year 1908," vol. 2, 1911, pp. 218-220. The 1828 edition is in the main a reissue of the sheets of the 1825 edition, but, aside from the preface, pp. iii-iv, being rewritten, the addition of the "Summary of

Events since October 1825," pp. 395-424, the changes in the index, and the omission of the list of plates and cuts, a few pages of the text were reset—i.e., the title-page, pp. 41-42, 55-56 in the later issue of the second edition, 379-380, 385-386, and 393-394.

The chief difference between the two issues of the second edition is that in the first issue pp. 55-56 were not reset. Probably only a few of these were published before the publisher decided to correct the error in line 6 of p. 56, which is listed in the errata

on p. 398 of the 1825 edition.

Although the "Errata" is omitted in both issues of the second edition, some of the mistakes remain uncorrected, while others are corrected in the "Notes to the Index" on p. 427. The error on p. 42 is the only one which is corrected in the text in both issues.

Mr. Bowen issued several "Proposals" concerning the publication of the work. In one of those dated "April 17, 1824," in which the author is referred to as "A Citizen of Boston," Mr. Snow's name not being mentioned, Mr. Bowen states that "It is about two years since proposals for a History of the City of Boston, were issued by the subscriber, and a contract made with Mr. John Foster, Jr. to write the same, but it was soon found that a good and correct History could not be written without infringing on the Copy Right of Mr. Shaw's work, which, together with the refusal of Mr. Foster, to complete and furnish the copy according to agreement, has delayed the work until the present time. Having purchased the copy right of Mr. Shaw's Description of Boston, and engaged the assistance of Literary Gentlemen to compile and write a New History, the work will soon appear ..." Mr. Snow mentions in the preface that Mr. Bowen "was disappointed in his expectation of the assistance of other gentlemen ..."

The maps and sixteen of the plates were engraved by Mr. Bowen, the publisher. "The Plan of Boston in 1722" was reduced from the one drawn by Capt. John Bonner, engraved and printed by Francis Dewing, and first issued by Bonner and William Price in 1722. See Shurtleff's "Topographical and Historical Description of Boston," 1872, p. 92. Because of the fact that several organizations with more or less similar names took part to a considerable extent in evangelistic work in the American colonies of Great Britain, it is proposed here before entering the titles under this the more important of them all to give a list distinguishing those which are most frequently confused.

1. "Corporation in England ... by the name of the President and Society for propagation of the Gospel in New England," London, created by act of Parliament, 1640.

Founded by English Puritans under the Commonwealth, and losing its legal status by the Restoration in 1660, the same group with others procured from Charles II., in 1662, a charter in which the name appears as:

"Company for propagation of the Gospell in New England, and the parts adjacent, in America," chartered, 1662.

These two organizations are practically the same body, usually known as "The New England Company," which is described in Winship's "The New England Company of 1649 and John Eliot," Publications of the Prince Society, 1920, pp. v-lxvi. As The New England Company it is still engaged in missionary work in eastern Canada, adjacent to New England.

This Corporation, later Company, published the sixth to eleventh of the group of narratives commonly called the Eliot Tracts, beginning with Whitfield's "Strength out of Weaknesse," 1652, and ending with Eliot's "Brief Narrative," 1671. For a list of these tracts variously entered under author, etc. in this Dictionary, see no. 458 of the Church Catalogue.

3. "The Society for Propagating the Gospel among the Indians and others in North America," incorporated in Massachusetts, 1787.

After the "New England Company" had refused to resume the support of mission work in the revolted United States (1782), a number of gentlemen in the neighborhood of Boston were asked by the Society in Scotland for Propagating Christian Knowledge, here described as no. 6, to administer certain funds. This stimulated them to organize an American society to take the place of no. 2. It carried on work among Indians and illiterate whites. See "A brief Account of the present State of the Society," 1790, and Hunnewell's "Society for Propagating the Gospel among the Indians and others," 1887.

4. "The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge," founded 1698.

This well-known Anglican society was formed by Thomas Bray and others in England. The same group with other "Persons of Distinction in Church and State" was incorporated as the "Society for the Prapagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts," in 1701. This second society at that time was especially interested in mission work in the American colonies. As members of the original body were interested in home missions and in work in other parts of the world, they continued the parent organization as well. Among its activities were the printing and distribution of religious books. The special American interest lies in the fact that Bray and the society were instrumental in sending libraries to clergymen in this country. It also furnished assistance to the Salzburger colony in Georgia. See "An Account of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge," 1740, and Steiner's "Rev. Organized by Scotch Presbyterians "about the year 1700," for work in Scotland, the society later administered funds given for the instruction of Indians in America. David Brainerd was a missionary of this body, which also assisted Eleazar Wheelock in his Indian school. Although the "Polyhistora" of Solinus was first printed in Venice in 1473, this 1520 edition edited by Camers is the first to have any American interest. It contains the woodcut map of the world prepared by Petrus Apianus, which was considered until the discovery of the somewhat similar Waldseemüller map of 1507, to be the earliest engraved map on which the name "America" appeared. It has the following title: "Tipvs Orbis Vniversalis ivxta Ptolomei Cosmographi traditionem et Ame | rici Vespvcii aliorqve Ivstrationes a Petro Apiano Leysnico Elvevbratvs | An. Do. M.DXX." North and South America are represented as narrow strips of land separated by a wide channel. The northern continent is called merely "Terra incognita," but the southern has the inscription: "Anno d 1497 haec terra cum adiacētibus insulis

inuenta est per Columbum Ianuensem ex mandato regis Castellae America prouincia." In the above inscriptions we have filled in several of the abbreviations. A facsimile of the map is found in part 1 of the old John Carter Brown catalogue.

There were many later editions of Solinus. BM. has over 30, 27 of which were issued before 1600. The first English edition was that of London, 1587. The maps in

these later issues have no importance for American cartography.
