Before entering into the strictly practical field, we ask the indulgence of our friends whilst we take them on what we hope will prove a pleasant journey into the realms of the upbuilding of this present great industry-the largest of its character in the United States-and give them a glimpse of "Sixty years among the Roses" in the form of a brief history of our establishment.

For twenty-three years it has been the writer's privilege to be associated with the founder of our Company, Mr. Charles Dingee, and through this contact he has absorbed, in a large measure, many of the traditions which have to do with the past history of our Company. At the age of eighty-four, Mr. Dingee, while not actively engaged in the management of this business, yet is vitally interested in its welfare and in the high moral business principles through which its success has been achieved. Referring to the early life of the Dingee \& Conard Company, we can do no better than quote from an open letter written by Mr. Dingee some years ago, addressed to his "Kind Friends," who constituted at that time 300,000 Dingee patrons, as follows:
"Nearly fifty years ago, three young men bought out a small nursery here and went to work, determined, if possible, to succeed. I was then thirty-three. Our post-office was served only once a week - Saturday. Our nearest railroad station was fifteen miles away. Now our post-office is served four times daily and our railroad station is within a quarter of a mile of the office. The years gone by have wrought some changes. We wanted Roses for our customers, but they were hard to get, mostly English-grown and budded. No dream then of growing them on own roots by the present methods and sending them safely in growing condition by mail from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the St. Lawrence to the Gulf!
"Out of this want, and determined to supply it, The Dingee \& Conard Co. was born. My original partners have been long years in their graves. The Dingee \& Conard Co., now a corporation, is still very much alive and still at the same old stand. The book in which this letter comes to you is sent with the hope of cementing old friendships and making new ones. I think it the best book of its kind the Company has ever issued. I hope you will like it. I do, but I must be honest,-I did not make it. It is altogether the work of young men who have grown up with me and who, in common with myself, will spare no effort to make the patrons of The Dingee \& Conard Co., old and new, better satisfied this year than ever before.
"With very grateful remembrances for past favors, and wishing you one and all a prosperous and happy New Year, I am,

## The Home of Dingee Roses

## West Grove, Pa., "Independent"

"Home of the Rose. Sketch of The Dingee \& Conard Co., Pioneer Rose-Growers of America. Has made West Grove famous. The original wellspring that brings joy to hundreds of thousands of flower-lovers. Over half a century's honorable record.
"Where the broad, beautiful ribbon of stoned road tops the Dingee hill, a half-mile south of West Grove, arise to the left a veritable city of glass, its area of shimmering roofs hemmed in by a massive hedge of Arborvitæ a half-century old. To the left of the road that passes through the estate, arise ihe big, roomy, modern offices-opposite the stables, and to the left and rear the glazed roofs of seventy odd greenhouses, standing rank by rank like a battalion on parade. Between these ranks and down the whole length of the columns of glass stand the big packing and propagating sheds, all in the pink and neatness of perfection.
"If you happened along that $\$ 6,000$-per-mile road any morning about 9.30 o'clock, you would witness the Rural Free Delivery carrier making haste up the hill, surrounded by mail bags, one of which, and a very heavy one, bears the label 'D. \& C.' The bag is taken in charge by James D. Headly, the cashier, and the letters, in bundles of sixty, assorted and opened in the front office. They come in hundreds and thousands from every part of the United States, Canada, Mexico, Philippines, Cuba and European countries. Ninety per cent of them bear orders for live Rose plants, with cash accompanying.
"At once is applied a system of checking, marking up and filing of orders, so thorough and exact that ten years later every order can be laid hands on at a moment's notice. In the private office sits P. J. Lynch, the treasurer. His duties are to supervise and oversee, institute inquiries, make contracts, purchase supplies and generally finance the Concern, requiring a heavy correspondence. M. Henry Lynch, the vice-president, has charge of the big inner office, where a score or more of nimble-fingered girls attend to the details of marking up and dispatching the avalanche of business.
'By actual count, we have close to one million growing plants now under glass,' said Edwin Parker, the superintendent and head propagator, as he guided the scribe through his labyrinth of introduced by us, such as Helen Gould, Mrs. Robert Peary, Golden Gate, Marion Dingee, Virginia, Henry M. Stanley, and others, but our greatest triumph is yet to come, for we will introduce in 1909 the most beautiful and best of all garden Roses, yet unnamed.' [This variety originated by Mr. Parker now bears the name Charles Dingee.] Mr. Parker added, "We are always looking out for and propagating new varieties, for fashions change in Roses as they do in everything else. Down the center of one of the big packing sheds half a dozen men were busily cutting up Rose branches into three-inch pieces. This is how it looked, but closer inspection showed each cutting carefully clipped at an angle just below the 'joint' of the parent stem. Off to a specially constructed propagating greenhouse were the cuttings carried, where in long, spotlessly clean, white beds of moist river sand they were inserted by the chief propagator, who, by the way, can plant 10,000 cuttings a day.
"With the flood of mail orders that begins in February, ruthless hands begin to strip the houses and cast aside the pretty blooms that appear. So it seemed to the scribe. In the principal or main packing shed, scores of busy hands assemble the plants, which, when removed from their pots, wrapped in damp moss, labeled and packed in neat mail and express packages, are ready for dispatching to the host of distant, waiting customers. As an evidence of the amount of business done, it is known for this firm to have sent by mail alone over a ton per day.
"It is a business of infinite pains, infinite care and vigilance. The temperature, moisture and infection must be ever watched, night and day, year in and year out. A careless fireman can lose $\$ 10,000$ worth of stock in one night. Carelessness, leading to dirt or infection, may lose a whole year's business. It is the pride of the chief fireman to know that the seventy great steam-heated houses do not vary two degrees during even zero weather. The Dingee \& Conard Co. were the originators of sending Roses by mail, and through energy and honorable dealing, have made themselves a leading power in America's floral trade."

Note.-In addition to the officers of The Dingee \& Conard Co. as mentioned in the above article, special mention should be made of Alfred P. Reid, Esq., the president, who also serves as the legal counselor of the business. Mr. Reid is also p esident of the First National Bank of West Chester, and is widely known throughout Pennsylvania as a most prominent citizen.

## A Visit to West Grove

"Grandmother's Garden" holds for me the sweetest of the memories of my boyhood home in far-away Dixieland. There was "sanctuary" from all the troubles of my very early years-for even needed punishment by parents waited if only I could reach my refuge in time!-and there I first learned the love of flowers which, in after years, led me to visit West Grove.

Most striking and most intimately remembered of all the flowers of that garden was a great, sturdy clump of Roses. What kind they were, I don't know, but I do know that never since have I seen them surpassed. The heavy masses of fragrant, rich crimson blooms decorated most of the neighborhood "events" of the season, and slips given away by the generous grandmother started many another Rose-garden.

All this was so long ago that I am loth to tell just when, but I readily recall the time I asked grandmother where the Roses came from, hearing from her the legendary lore of their origin, supplemented with the solidly practical fact that the start of her Roses had come to her, away "before the war," in the good old days, from up in Yankeeland. Bringing from a place of honor in her cupboard the current copy of the Dingee Catalogue, she explained how she had sent to West Grove her order for a plant or two of the first Roses offered by mail, and how she had been treated so well in all her dealings with the Dingees that she counted them as her friends, even though they lived in the North.

So it happened that, when, twenty years later, I found myself in the North, and closely associated with the Rose-growing trade, it seemed quite familiar to hear Dingee of West Grove talked of as the Rose pioneer of the world, and to note that Dingee Roses were regarded as the standard of perfection by which others were judged. As time went on, I became a direct competitor in business of one of the branches of the Dingee enterprises, but I never found that the standard of Rose perfection had been lowered. By and by I became acquainted, at my office in a western city, with the genial present general manager of the Dingee establishment, and that acquaintance increased the desire for a visit to West Grove.

The opportunity came at last, and, on a fine autumn day, it was my pleasure to make the long-deferred trip. The less said about the railroad service from Philadelphia the better, but, whatever the faults of the road, the way to West Grove certainly leads through forty miles of continuous beauty. From the station up the long two-mile hill to the Dingee Nurseries and Greenhouses, one can see the most attractive part of the far-famed farming section of southeastern Pennsylvania. Half-way up the hill you pass the handsome residence of Charles Dingee, founder of the great business which bears his name. The sloping lawn in front and the grove of magnificent trees surrounding, bear witness to his love of outdoor beauty.

The two things that impressed me most on my first visit to West Grove (and subsequent trips have only served to strengthen the impressions) were the abounding knowledge of Roses which seemed to be in the very atmosphere, and the wonderful system which regulates the movements of the vast Dingee interests. Nowhere else have

I found a plant-growing enterprise conducted upon more modern business lines. It would appear that from the time Charles Dingee conceived the novel idea of growing good Roses on their own roots and selling them throughout the country, making deliveries by mail, there has been kept the closest possible record of the character and performances of every Rose introduced, so that its actual value for home-garden growing is here fully known.

It seemed most remarkable to me, several years ago, that a man who had entered into a business career of national magnitude ten years before the war, should still be hale and hearty and full of Rose love and Rose lore, even though no longer actively concerned in the daily details of the enterprise he founded; but it now seems almost marvelous that Charles Dingee, eighty-four years of age. should today retain a large proportion of the physical vigor that has marked his long life, and, seemingly, every iota of the wonderful mental strength which has made him such a power among his fellows. On the other hand, it has not been surprising to note the deep regard in which Mr. Dingee is held by the younger men on whose shoulders now rest the responsibilities he once carried, nor the consideration which they give to his ideas and advice. The sturdy French Huguenot blood in its American application never produced a stronger character than that of Charles Dingee.

Some time ago I began to urge upon P. J. Lynch, general manager of The Dingee \& Conard Co., the importance of preserving in some permanent form the important things in reference to Rosegrowing, learned by the Dingees during their three-score-years-and-ten of daily attendance upon the "Queen of Flowers." It has been finally decided that the sixtieth anniversary year of The Dingee \& Conard Co. affords a most appropriate time for the presentation in concrete form of an epitome of the Rose-growing lore which has made West Grove famous. In making the plans for the mechanical form of their book, in which this matter is to appear, and arranging for its illustration, I have asked the privilege of writing this introduction, which has been graciously accorded me. l'pon looking over the material for the book, which is herewith presented to you, the Rose-loving millions of America, there again came over me the fragrant memories of the Dingee Roses in grandmother's garden. I feel perfectly assured that the book will be warmly weleomed by the scores of thousands of Dingee customers throughout the United states, most of whom have been privileged to visit West Grove in desire only, and, that, with thousands of new patrons, they will be led by its attractive form and valuable contents to order so many of the splendid Roses it describes as to make this sixtieth anniversary year surpass in volume of business any other in the honorable history of " Dingee."

## Where the Dingee Roses Go and Grow

We have sent our Roses to every nook and corner of the universe. We say "our" Roses, because in them we take almost childish pride. Just as the parent watches tenderly over the child, so do we keep a jealous eye on the production of our skill. Night and day, with zealous care, we watch over them, and when they go forth with their youthful promise of beauty and pleasure, we part from them with almost filial reverence, because their success in life means much to us, and so it has been since the beginning. All has not been sunshine. These children of Nature have not escaped adversities almost akin to human ills. The weakest have sometimes developed into the strongest, while the sturdiest have at times been the objects of our most solicitous care.

After all, the greatest pleasure is brought forcibly home to us in traveling in the various sections of this country of ours, when strangers tell us in enthusiastic terms about their success with Dingee Roses,-pleasure which brings with it the pride of deeds well done, far beyond the mere mercenary consideration of having sold the Roses. In every county, in every state of the Union, in the gardens of the rich, and in more modest homes, where, perhaps, they are more favorably cherished; in the lonely compounds of the far West, in the most remote parts of Europe, Asia, even in the Congo Free State, the missionary tells how Dingee Roses have lightened darkest Africa; in the botanical gardens of Continental Europe - everywhere, Dingee Roses are today growing, and are a living monument to skill, perseverance and enduring belief in American energy and the product thereof. As years go, our experience has been long. Our business has been our pleasure. If we have added in a small way to the joy of living, if we have helped beautify our native land, then, indeed, do we feel, apart from the commercial success of this business, that "Our Friends and Patrons" is not an empty phrase.

## The Rose-Queen of all the Flowers

Mankind and Flowerkind are old acquaintances. When man first moved into his earthly habitation he found it already furnished with flowers. ## How to Grow Roses

PREPARATION OF THE SOIL. Should the soil you have at disposal be naturally poor, it may be made fertile by substituting a quantity of loam, which can be readily obtained from the sod by the roadside or from the fields. To still further enrich the soil, where it is accessible, add to each wheelbarrow-load of loam about one-third of its bulk of well-rotted stable manure: also some sand, if there be a lack of this constituent; or use fine, well-decomposed stable manure, which is the best fertilizer for general purposes. If this cannot be obtained, fine ground lone or commercial fertilizers may be employed, but if used too freely they are likely to injure the piants. None but such fertilizers as are free from acids should be used. Manure applied in the fall will serve as a partial protection over winter, and in the spring it will be beneficial as a mulch. An excellent plant-food, which may be used at all times with entire safety, is Bonora, offered elsewhere in this book.

Having prepared the ground, set the plants about 12 to 18 inches apart. Do not hesitate to place the roots well below the surface of the soil, arranging them as far as possible in their natural position. Cover the roots, pressing firmly down upon them and in around the stem. After planting, water freely, and if the sun be strong, protect them for a few days with a covering of newspapers or other suitable material. Cut off all withered wood and foliage. Water judiciously -that is, not too freely-and daily, until they show signs of having become established. Do not plant if the ground is wet, as the soil will become baked, and thus endanger the safety of the plants. During the presence of protracted drought, the plants should be watered daily in the evenings.

UNPACKING PLANTS. When the plants are received, if, for any reason it is desired to defer immediate planting, place the plants in the cellar or any moderately warm place, protect from the sun, set them upright, admitting the free circulation of air, and water freely from time to time. A slight covering of soil around the roots will be beneficial. Soak the roots in lukewarm water or thin mud for an hour or so before planting, to restore their vitality.

PLANTING. The proper time for planting in the various sections of the country largely depends first, upon the location, and, second, upon the character of the plant. In the warm climate of the Pacific coast, southern and southwestern states, in fact, all sections where frosts are infrequent and the winters mild, pot-grown as well as dormant Roses may be planted in the late fall, as well as in the early spring. In the southern states fall planting of both these classes of Roses is considered desirable, but, if the conditions are such that it cannot be accomplished then, in the early spring months they may be set out with entire safety.

As to where the preference lies between plants that are pot-grown under glass, and dormant, field-grown plants, it is not easy to discriminate. Our own experience has been that in the southern and southwestern states, as well as on the Pacific coast, the planting of the one-year-old Roses during the months of February, March and April, according to the location, may be accomplished with splendid satisfaction. In the states north of Virginia, and even in the greater portion of Virginia, and throughout the middle section of the country, as well as in the states in the northwest. the best time to plant is during the spring or early summer months. In many of the moderately cold states dormant Roses may be set out with safety during the fall months, but in the section of which we have latterly spoken, dormant Roses-and when we say "dormant" we mean Roses that have been lifted from the field, which, when sent out, have neither foliage nor soil around the roots-may be planted in early spring, just as soon as the ground can be dug.

Everything considered, however, our pot-grown Roses are the most satisfactory of all. They are invariably on their own roots, and, when sent out, they have the adrantage of being equipped with strong, fibrous, active roots, which take hold and establish themselves in their new homes almost immediately. They should be set out during the spring or early summer months, after all danger of frost is past, or, to quote a homely expression. after corn-planting time. For planting in the open ground ordinary garden soil will suffice. Select, if possible, the most sheltered and sunny location for planting: avoid the close proximity of large trees, whose dense foliage and extending ronts absorb all the life and slistaining nutrition of the soil; young trees and dwarf shrubbery will not be hurtful.

PRUNING. All Roses are helped by pruning. Roses of the type of Harrison's Yellow, Soleil d'Or, Sir Thomas Lipton, Rugosas,--in fact, all Roses of this extremely hardy class,-are henefited very much by pruning, more so than any other class. From our own experience, we find that the Hybrid Perpetuals in many varieties, such as Mad. Masson, Mad. Charles Wood, Cieneral Jacqueminot, and others of this type, frequently bloom two and three times during the season when the flowers

are kept cut off and the plants pruned in to induce new shoots being thrown out, which produces the flowers. The average planter is extremely timid in pruning because he is afraid of the injury it will possibly do. This idea should be discarded, because, as we have said, the pruning of all Roses is beneficial.

The different varieties of Roses differ very much in habit of growth; many are neat and compact, requiring little or no trimming, while others of the same class are vigorous and straggling, sending out long shoots which tend to outrun the limits assigned them. Pruning, therefore, is a matter to be governed by the judgment of the possessor of the plants. We will add, however, that plants of persistent growth should be trimmed back each fall or in early spring about one-half to two-thirds of the season's growth. Where plants, apparently healthy, fail to mature the buds which they bear, remove a large percentage of the undeveloped buds and imperfect blooms and prune severely. Also trim back about one-third, when, after planting, they shed their leaves and exhibit signs of weakness; this gives the roots a chance to become vigorous.

INSECTS AND INSECTICIDES. Healthy, vigorous Roses are less liable to the ravages of insects than weak specimens which do not have the vitality to resist the onslaughts of the pernicious parasites. Our Roses are singularly free from insects, owing to their vigor, but should they become infested, a few applications of a good insecticide will exterminate them at the outset, after which very little or no trouble will be experienced. One of the most common of insects is the green-fly, which will be found usually on Roses of weak growth. We, at times, find them attacking our Roses, but they are readily removed by syringing with clear water or smoking with tobacco stems, but where these accessories are not to be had, we recommend kerosene emulsion or tobacco insecticide soap, which. when applied with a Tyrian Sprinkler, will usually destroy them effectually.

The red spider is an insect so small that it is not discernible to the naked eye, infesting the underside of the foliage, and turning it, as a rule, an unhealthy coppery red color. Where the plant is in vigorous growth, this insect is not to be found to any appreciable extent, except on the old foliage, which can be removed, but, should it attack the growing foliage, frequent syringing with the insecticides named above, should be resorted to. The rose hoppers or thrips are not so prevalent, and a syringing will effectually exterminate the Rose-hopper, while the leaf rollers, which resemble butterflies, of yellowish white color, roll themselves up in the leaves of the Roses, and can be picked off by hand. The Rose bug is common in some localities and which appears during the early growing season, is one of the most pernicious insects and can only be removed by vigilant and unceasing syringing with insecticides.

Rose grubs, which live in the ground, where they hatch out innumerable offspring, are found only in some localities, but they are very destructiye, feeding on the roots of the Roses, and before one knows that the plant has been destroyed they have accomplished their work. The only remedy is to dig into the ground and destroy them. If the soil is continuously affected with them, a good coating of air-slaked lime spaded in well will prove helpful. We receive quite a few complaints of the foliage of Roses being covered with a white flour-like substance, and asking for a remedy. This is
mildew, which some varieties are subject to, notably Crimson Rambler after it has finished its period of bloom. Mildew does not seriously damage, but makes the plant unsightly. The remedy is to dust the foliage in the morning while the dew is yet upon it with flowers of sulfur, which may be had at almost any grocery or drug store. A few applications will suffice to kill the mildew effectually. The following recipes and preparations are good. They should be applied both to the upper and under surface of the foliage by means of a good sprinkler. We can supply the Tyrian Plant sprinkler, the Auto-Spray and New Era Sprayer at prices given elsewhere in this book. All of these are inexpensive and very satisfactory.

Kerosene Emulsion. To two parts of kerosene add one of slightly sour milk; agitate until the compound unites in the form of a white jelly; dilute with twenty parts of soft water.

Tobacco Solution. Made by boiling the leaves or stems of tobacco. The liquid should be made about the strength of weak tea.

Tobacco Insecticide Soap. This preparation is put up in cakes, with directions for use printed on labels. It is a standard remedy, and one of the best. Two sizes. Price 13 cts . and 2 x cts. each, postpaid.

WINTER PROTECTION. As to the classes of Roses that are hardy and those that are not hardy, this information is given in the introduction of the individual classes. Where it is possible, we would advise that the benefit of the doubt be given by protecting all varieties, irrespective of the class, for it will not be harmful to protect even the Moss or Hybrid Perpetual Rose. Do not cover your plants ton soon; a nip of frost will not hurt them, but will help to ripen and mature them. Such material as leaves, hay, straw, light manure, street sweepings, pine or cedar boughs, corn fodder, etc., will afford excellent protection. Sufficient should be given to prevent the roots from freezing, but considerable light and circulation of air should not be excluded. In the spring, wait until the weather is settled before uncovering; then prune the plants, taking care to cut off all dead or discolored wood.

WHAT THE TERM "HARDY" MEANS. Right here let us make it plain that the hardiness of any Rose is a matter which no one can speak of with positive certainty, because the conditions of the winter, as a rule, prescribe the hardiness of the plant. Where the winters come on gradually, the plant goes into a semi-dormant state naturally, and if the winter be continuously cold, then the most tender Roses very often survive; but when, as is frequently the case, an unseasonable cold snap comes in the early fall, followed again by warm weather, the plant is not sufficiently hardened to withstand the sudden change, and if this is followed by what we know as an open winter, where the weather is alternating periods of severe weather, followed by thawing, it is then that the damage is done, because it keeps the plant in a vacillating condition, between the two extremes, and not only the young eyes near the roots, but the roots themselves are seriously injured. This condition can be, in a measure, controlled, by careful protection, but we make this explanation in response to a great many letters which come to us stating that we recommend a Rose as hardy, which has been winter-killed.

Our point of view as regards the hardiness, therefore, of a Rose is under ordinarily favorable conditions, but we or no one else can be responsible for the vagaries of old Dame Nature when she appears in some of her curious moods, as she is wont to do.

ROSES IN POTS OR BOXES. The conditions most favorable for growing Roses in pots or boxes are good rich soil, plenty of sunshine and heat ranging from 50 degrees at night to 75 degrees during the day. If Roses are purchased in the spring and summer for winter bloom, they can be planted in largesized pots-one-year plants in pots whose inside diameter at the top is 4 inches, two-year-old plants in 6 -inch pots. Plunge the pot in open ground, in some partly shaded place; cultivate and keep


Rosa Rugosa on The Dingee \& Conard Co.'s grounds healthy during the summer; water sparingly and pinch off all buds as they appear. Upon the approach of cold weather, take up the pots and remove as much of the surface soil as can be done without disturbing the roots, replacing with fresh soil. Bring into a warm room and water freely. After the period of bloom is over, cut back and remove to a cool cellar; the following spring they will grow with renewed energy, either in open ground or in larger pots.

GROWING ROSES FOR CUT-FLOWERS. In answer to those who contemplate taking up this branch of Rose-growing, or, in fact, the growing of any kind of cut-flowers, we would recommend "Practical Floriculture," a thoroughly practical book, giving all the information required pertaining to the culture of flowers in general. THE BEST VARIETIES OF ROSES. This is an all-important subject and must be determined very largely by personal preference. It is impossible for any one to set a limitation upon the varieties of Roses that will prove successful in the various parts of the country, and we have never yet seen the recommendations of any two persons in this regard that have not differed very materially. There are some points that may be well defined and which our patrons may follow with entire safety. To our minds all Roses are desirable, but tastes differ materially. To enumerate the varieties that we consider the most desirable for the various sections of the country would be to simply duplicate, in a large measure, the descriptions of the varieties which follow in this book. We might say, in a general way, that it has been our endeavor in making each page of it to set forth prominently the most desirable varieties, which we have thoroughly tested, but we are frequently told, with a great deal of reason, that there are so many varieties offered that it is sometimes impossible to make an intelligent selection, or one that the writer feels confident in making.

In the South, where all Roses are hardy and need little or no protection, it is entirely a matter of personal preference. All classes do well, but it is impossible for the planter of the North to grow, unless the situation be very exceptional, such Roses as the Climbing Teas and Noisettes, which include Marechal Niel, James Sprunt, Chromotella and others of that type, but in more moderate climates these Roses frequently do very well and continue to grow and increase in beauty year after year, notably Gloire de Dijon, which we have seen here in Pennsylvania growing to wonderful perfection. Therefore, we would say to our friends in warm climates, that all classes, so far as safety during the winter is concerned, will thrive. To our friends in the belt of states in the middle and western localities, where the winters are not so severe as those in the extreme North, in a general way, Tea Roses, Hybrid Tea Roses, Polyanthas, Bourbons and Chinas, with proper protection, will, in nine cases out of ten, come through the winter safely. The Hybrid Teas, of course, are more hardy than the Teas, while the Polyanthas we have seen growing to perfection year after year in the open ground in northern New York. Climbing Roses, such as Climbing Meteor, Climbing Clotilde Soupert, Climbing Wootton, Mrs. Robert Peary, Climbing Helen Gould and Tausendschon also come under this class.

We call particular attention to the hardy type of Climbing Roses, such as Wichurianas, and the Rambler Roses, which are hardy everywhere. We also desire to make special mention of the Cochet Roses, and we recommend them as the best of all garden Roses of any class, and are hardy pretty generally in all sections of the country. No matter where you live, either in the North, South, East or West, this wonderful class, including our new Rose Charles Dingee, should be planted. Not infrequently we have customers tell us of the hardiness and vigor of these Roses, even in the extreme North, and for that reason we recommend them as hardy, outdoor Roses for all localities. If we were limited to five varieties of Roses we would at once select the Cochet Roses, which we show in colors
on the front cover page of this book, as our preference: but, as our great new Rose, Charles Dingee, is the greatest type of Rose ever introduced, we would have to find a way to include this in our selection, and, if that were not possible, we would then eliminate Etoile de France, because the collection, including Red Maman Cochet or Helen Gould, would still represent five distinct colors. In the extreme cold states where the thermometer remains for prolonged periods below zero, the Hybrid Perpetual Roses are the first selection, because in this class are included Sir Thomas Lipton, the Rugosas, Soleil d'Or, and especially we recommend the large plants of the "Iron-Clad" Hardy Hybrid Perpetual Roses, offered on pages 51 to 54 of this book.

Having made this explanation, which we hope is clear, we will proceed to give a list of desirable Roses of the different colors, but we do not wish to be understood as saying that this list includes all the Roses which, in our judgment, are the best of their color and class. They are simply among the best

Abel Chatenay, rosy carmine; good in some sections, but not so good in others; Bessie Brown, one of the finest of all varieties, pure white, flushed pink: Meteor, splendid in the open ground, none better; velvety crimson; Prince of Bulgaria, flesh-color, Lady Joy, immense, crimson; Perle von Godesburg, good yellow; President Roosevelt, grand pink: Mad. Caroline Testout, satiny rose, especially good in the South; Mad. We wish to add that the Hybrid Tea Roses, increasing as they are in numbers so rapidly, are taking the place as the best Roses for general planting, combining, as they do, the beauty of the Hybrid Perpetuals with the freedom of bloom of the Hybrid Teas.

There are so many splendid Tea Roses that it is difficult to say which we would recommend most, but among the choicest varieties are Aline Sisley, red; Bon Silene, a grand old variety, deep rose, shaded rosy crimscn; General Robert E.

Roses differ in size according to their habit, so do not expect all of them to be exactly the same size

## Canadian Customers

Canadian laws prohibit sending dormant Roses or Shrubs into Canada except from March 15 to May 15, and from October 7 to December 7, through the following custom ports, where they will be fumigated:St. John, N. B.; St. Johns, P. Q.; Niagara Falls and Windsor, Ontario; Winnipeg, Manitoba. All other goods, including our pot-grown Roses grown under glass, are admitted at any time.

## Foreign Orders

Ten per cent extra should be added to orders going outside of the United States or its colonial possessions, ineluding Canada, to pay extra cost of packing and postage To countries with which we have a parcel's post, goods can be sent by mail. They also can be sent by express, but the party ordering must give the name and address of some one in New York who will receive the goods, prepay the ocean charges and forward them. We pack lightly and safely and the charges, even to the most distant points, are very reasonable.

The best Lawn Grass Misture for general sowing, as proven by careful experiment and comparison. It produces a smooth, velvety green sward of attractive appearance. In preparing the ground for seeding, break it 10 to 12 inches deep with plow or spade and pulverize thoroughly. The surface should be raked perfectly level to prevent the formation of pools after heary rainfalls. Sow the seed carefully and evenly at the rate of one quart to a space equal to $1.5 \times 20$ feet: two bushels will sow one acre. After sowing, cover the seed by raking or harrowing it. Rolling is also in general practice.

Seeding may be done at any time during spring, summer or fall, but the best results are obtained by sowing during April, May, September or October. Where fall sowing is practised, a top-dressing of manure is recommended to protect the roots of the young grass during the winter. In the spring, the gross matter should be removed, leaving the surface clean. To renovate lawn, loosen the soil on the bare spots with a steel rake, and, after sowing a liberal quantity of seed, roll or rake again to cover the seed.
