This year Dr. Harwood announced his resignation from Wesleyan to accept a position at California State Polytechnic College of Pomona, California.

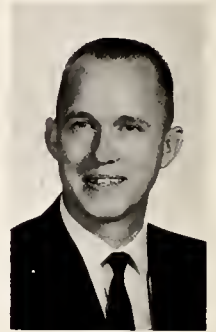

Membership in the Baptist Student Union is open to any interested student who has attended two consecutive meetings.



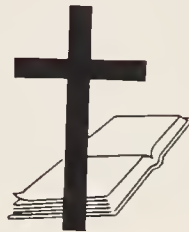
# Methodist Student Movement

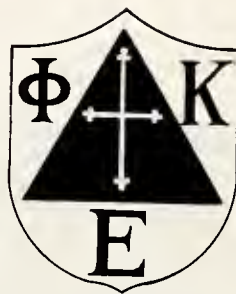

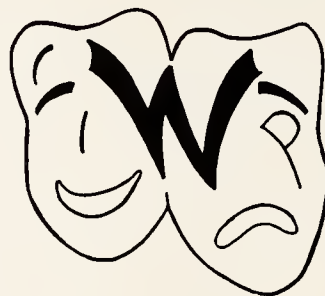

Among the highlights of the program this year was the promotion of the annual Wesleyan "powderpuff" football game, won easily by the upperclasswomen.



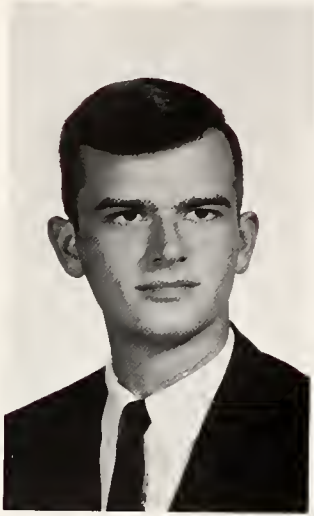

The Circle K Club has gained much through excellent leadership and planning.

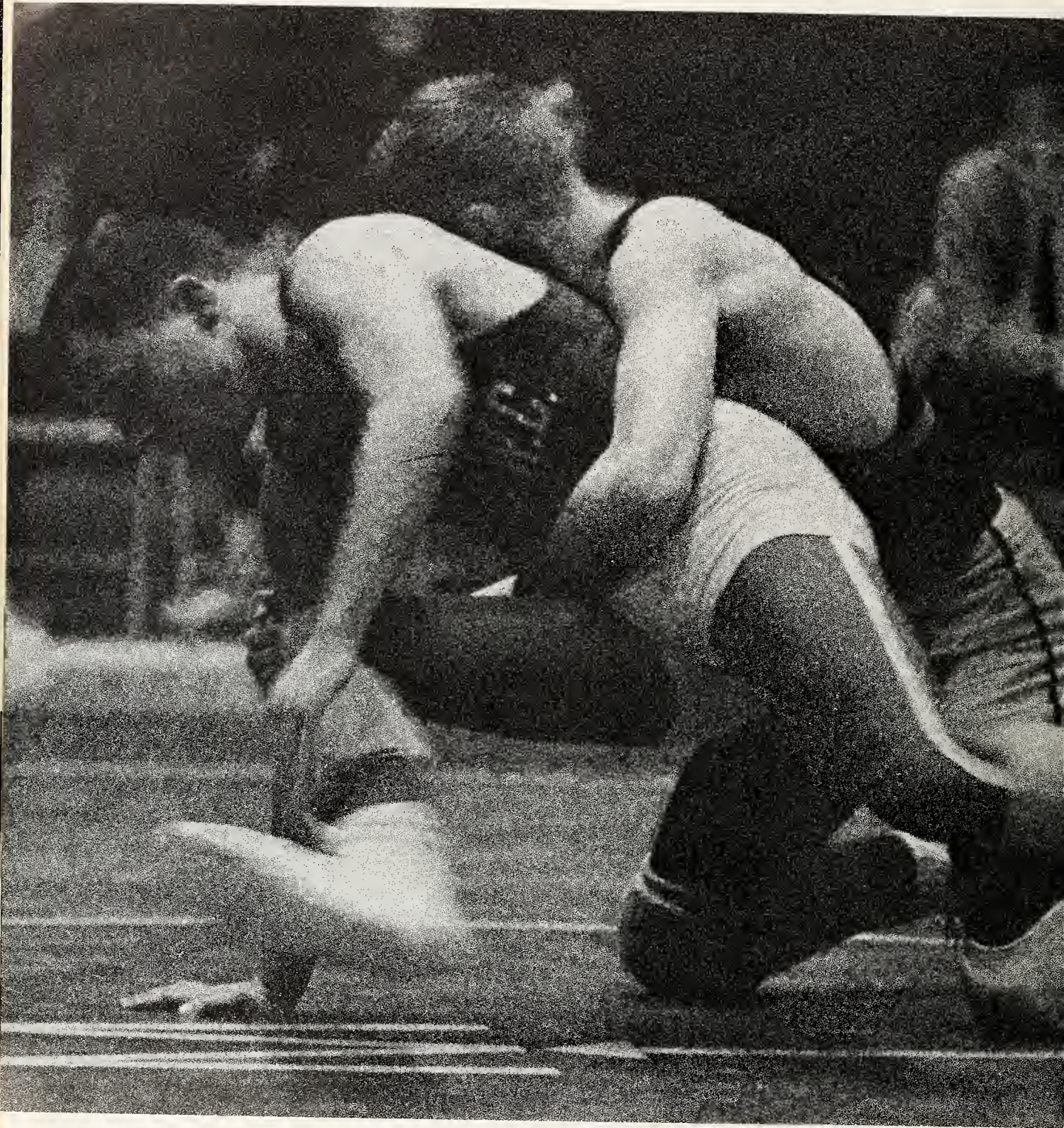

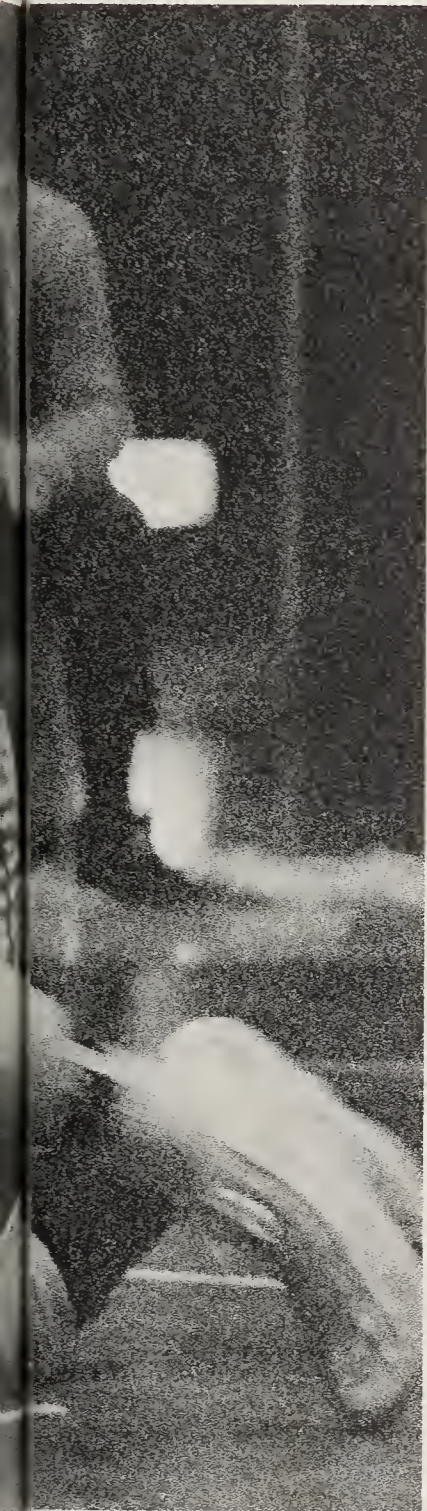

Individual team honors can go only to Don Hines. But, for a great season, the honors must go to the team.

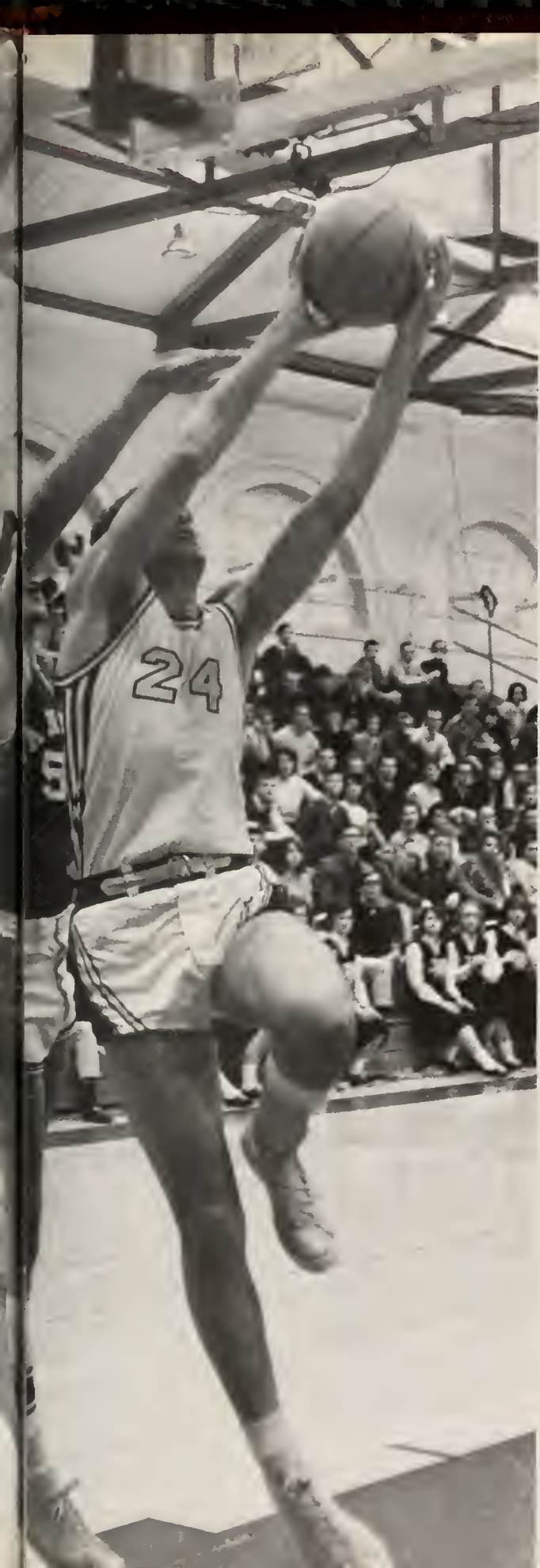

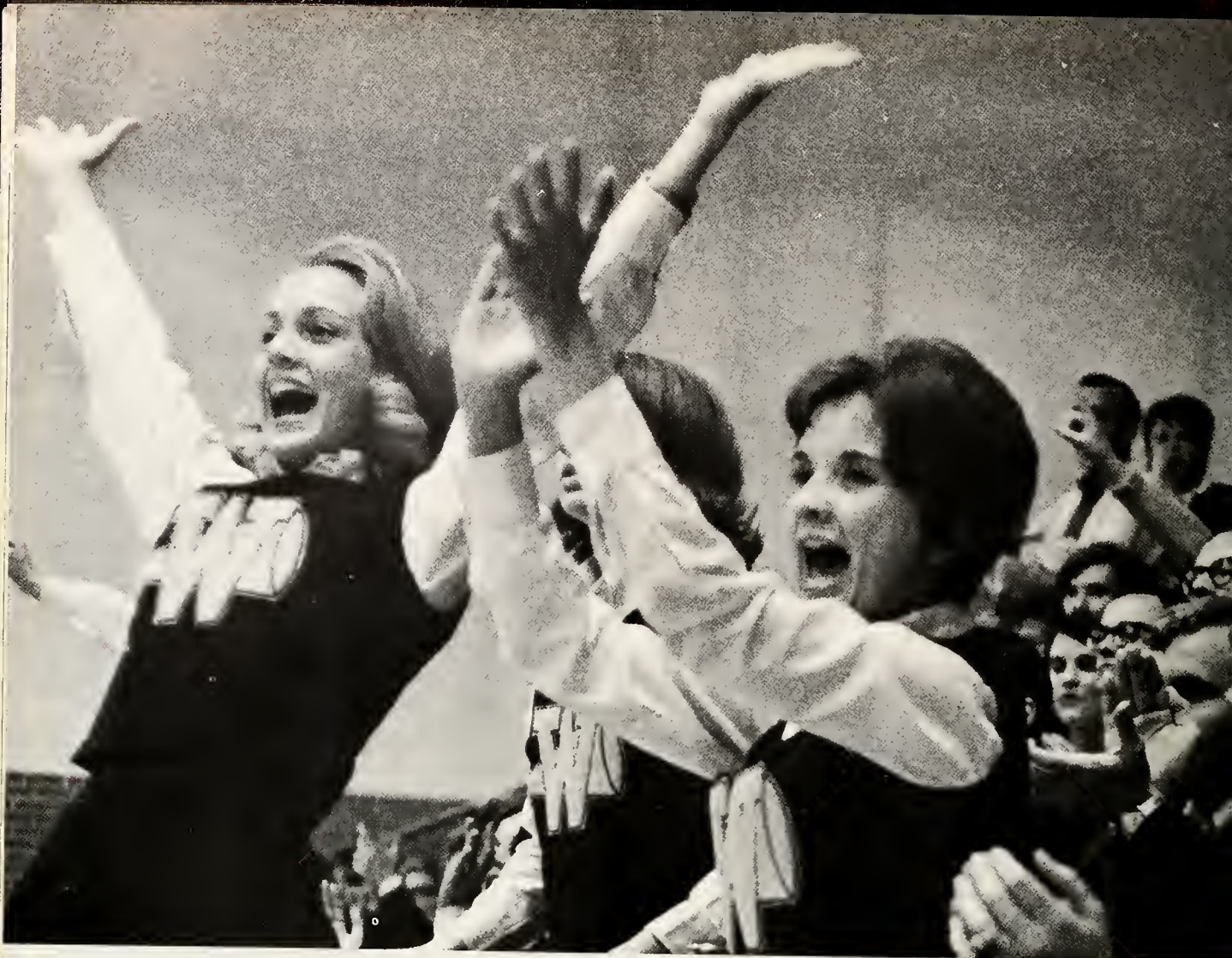

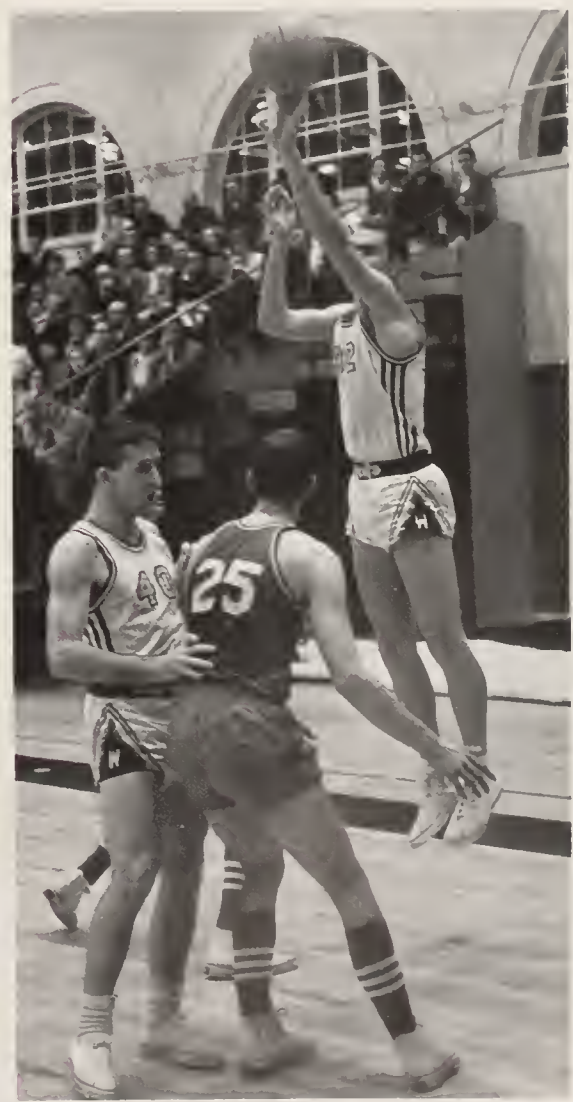

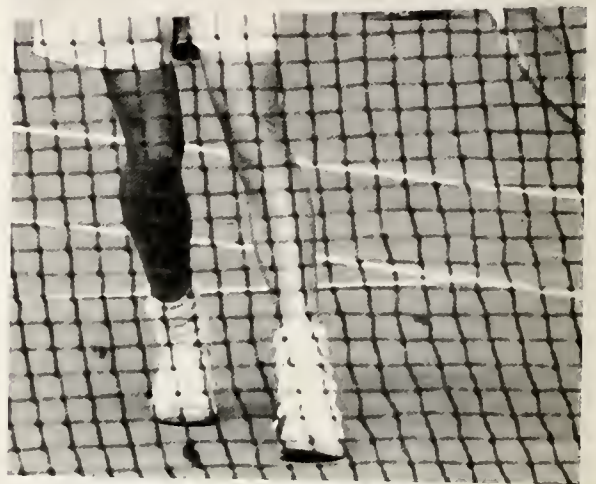


Above is the 1965 cross-country team, pictured are Railey, Gordon, Hurst, Vaughan, and Hall.

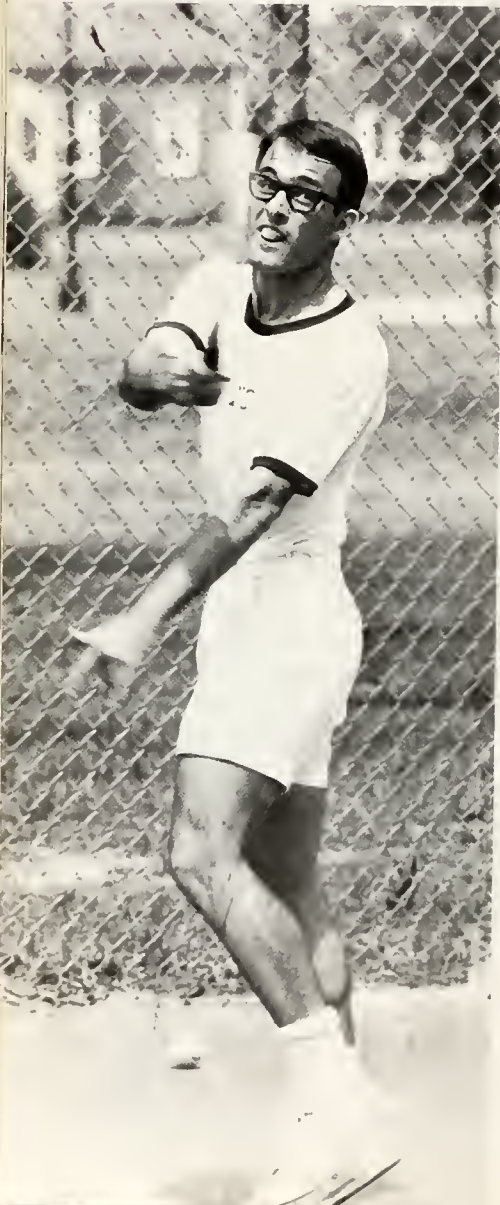


# Tennis

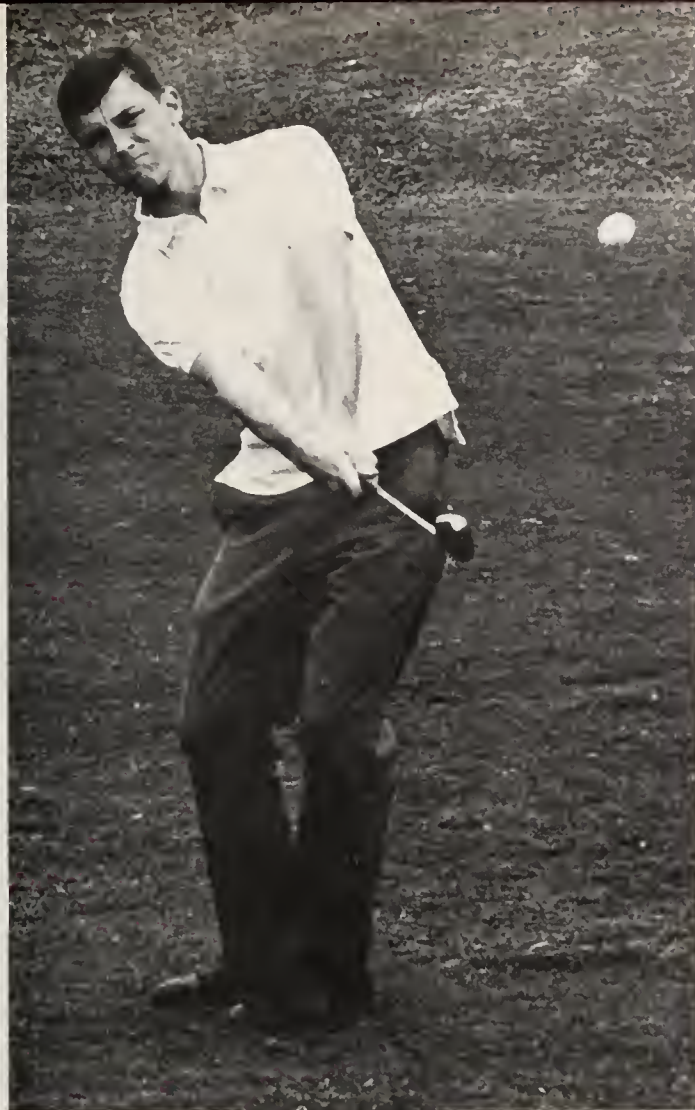

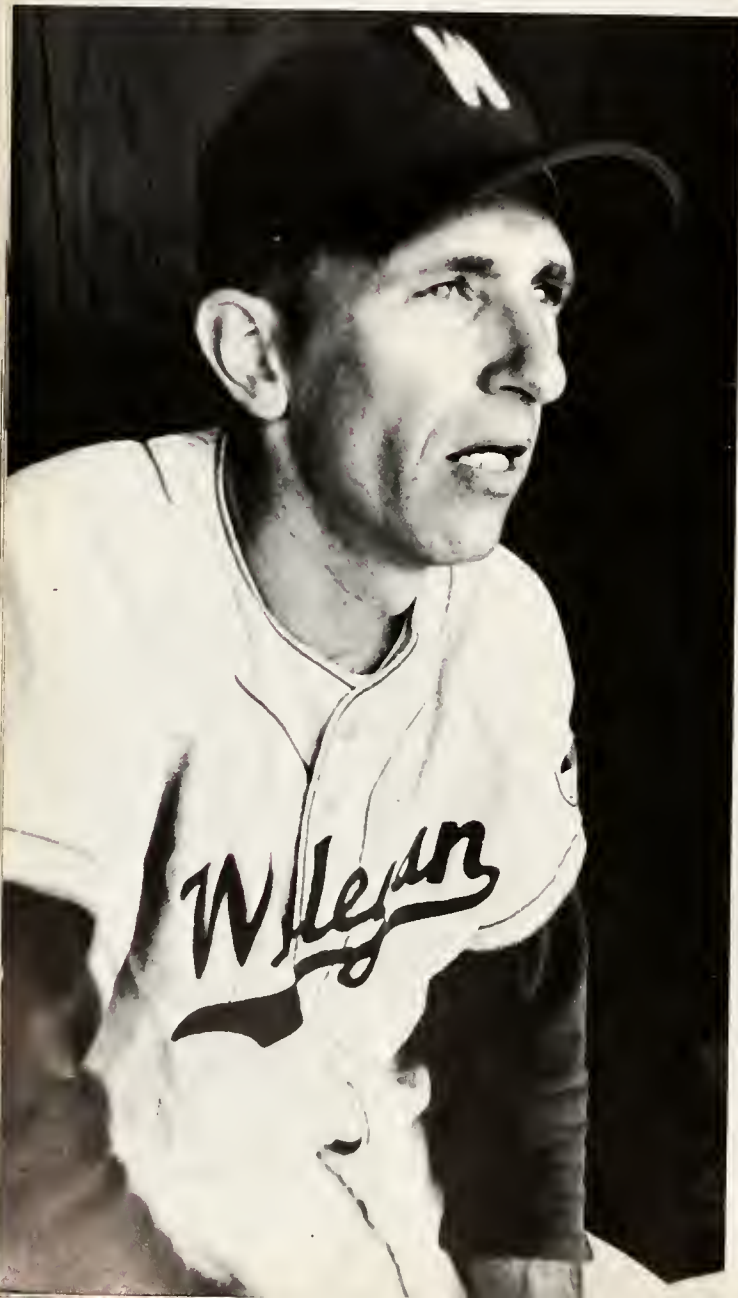

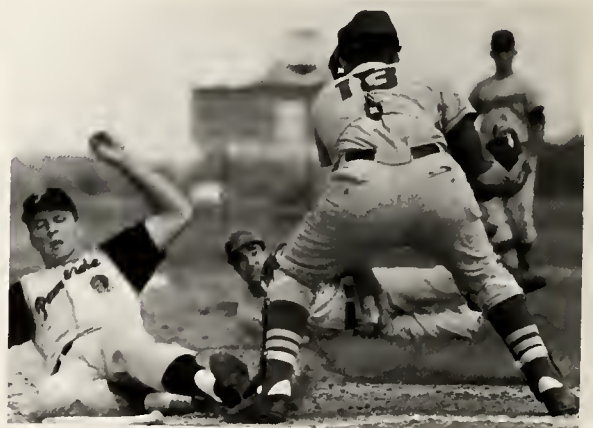
# Baseball

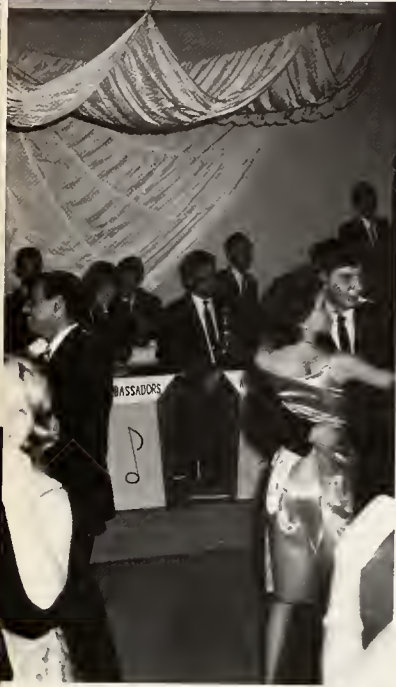

# FIRST ANNUAL N. C. WESLEYAN TALENT SHOW

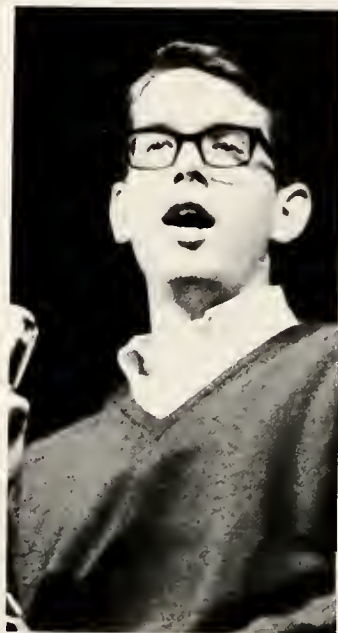
