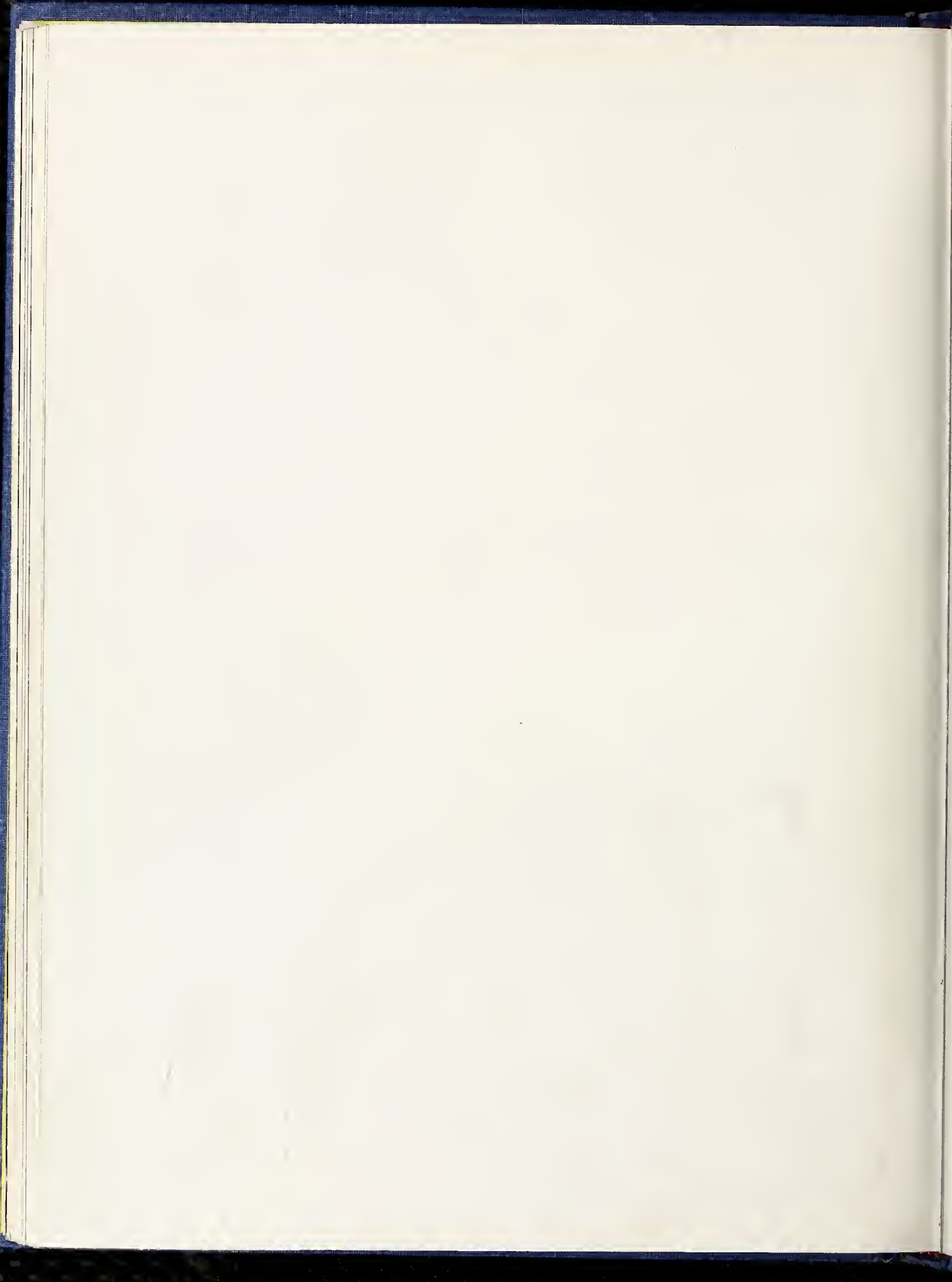
# THE DISSENTER

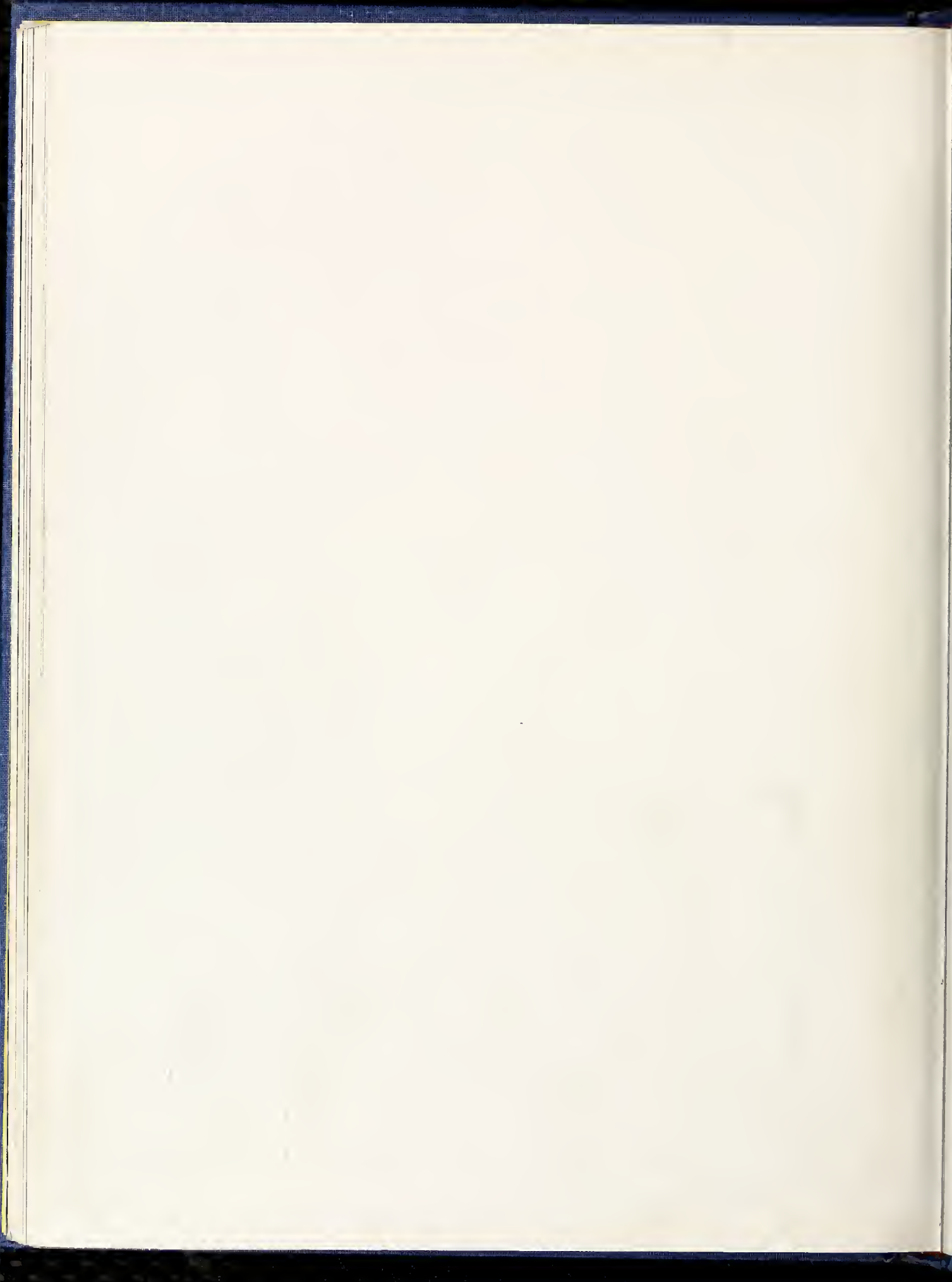

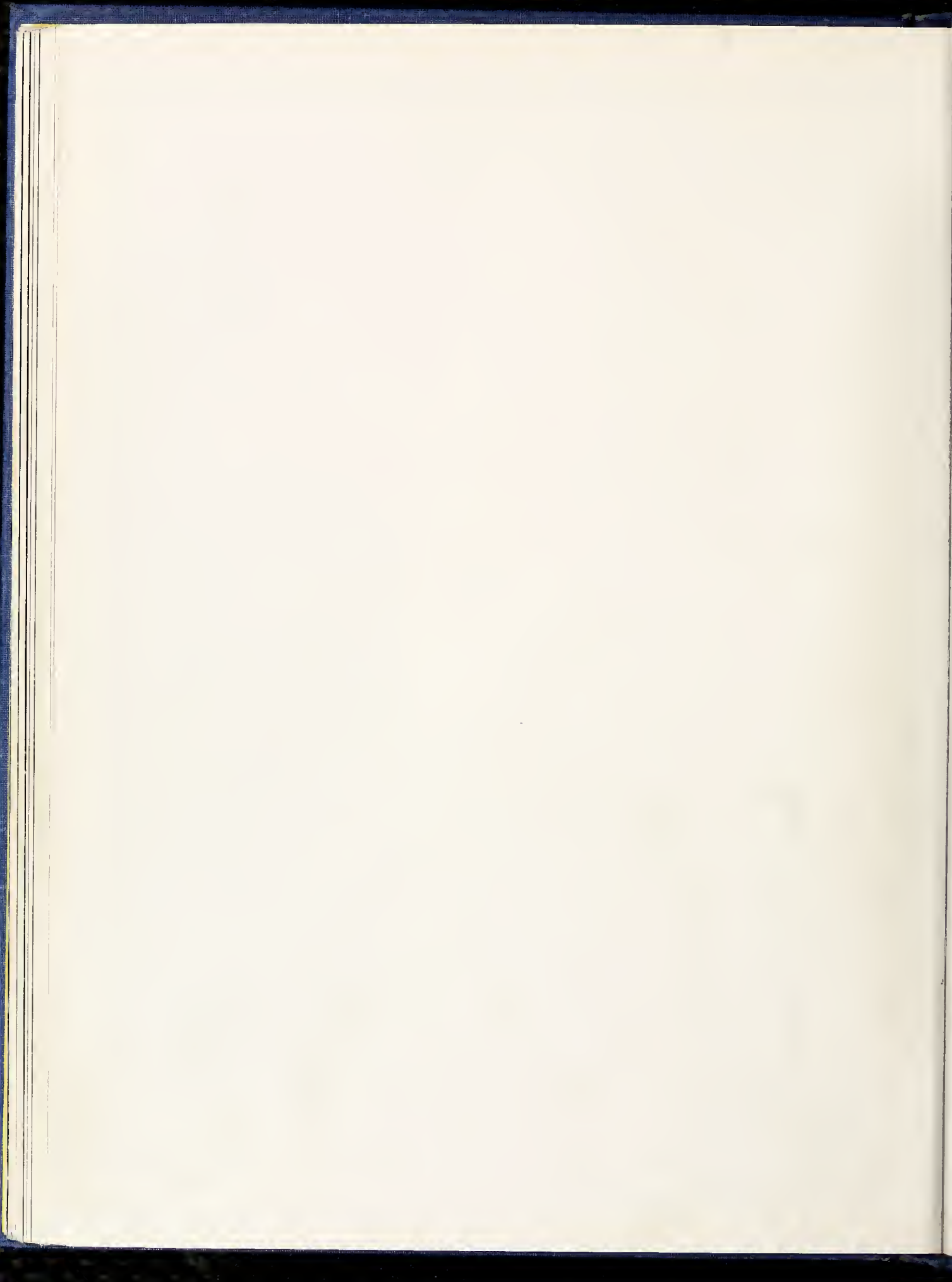


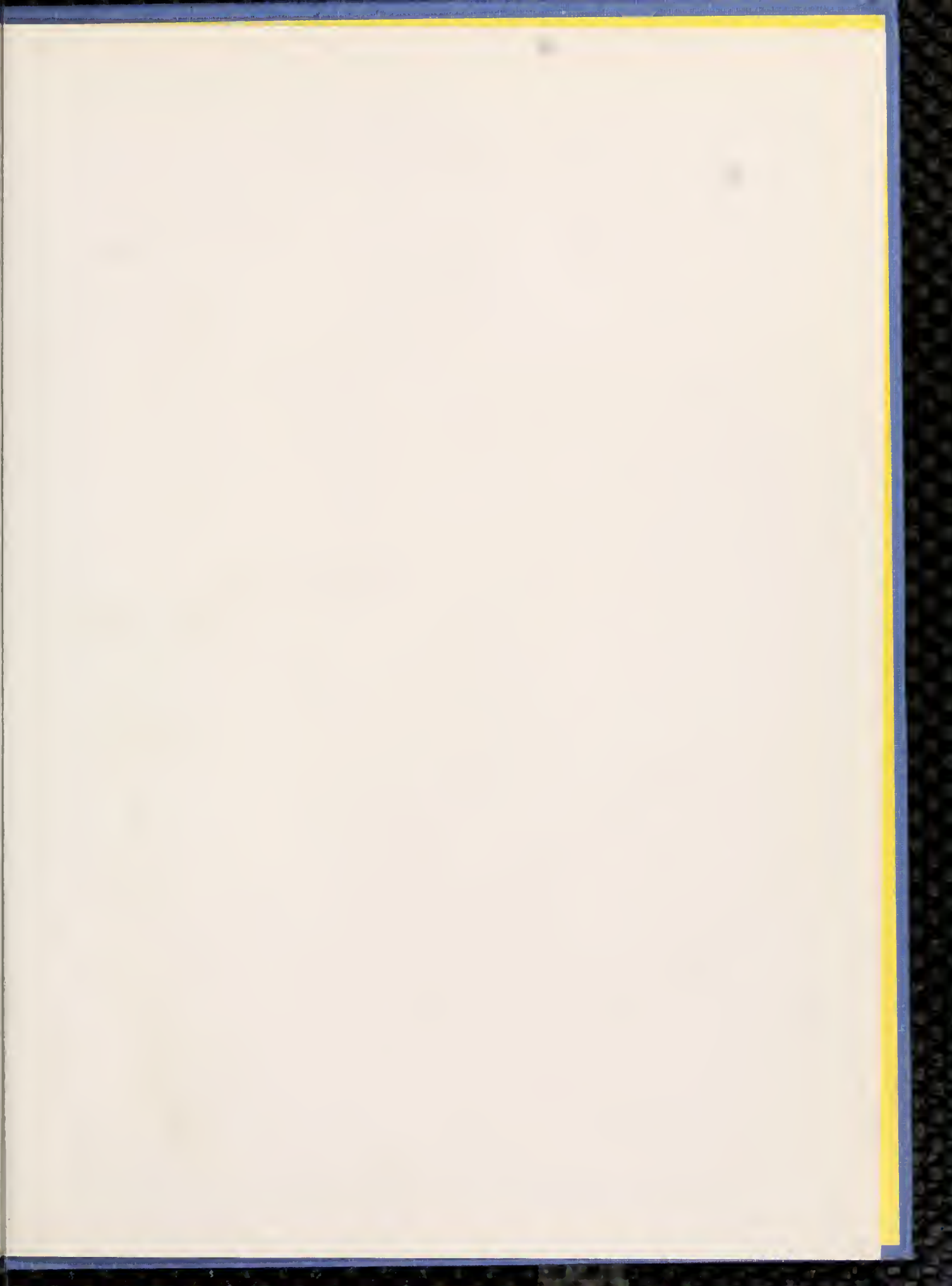
