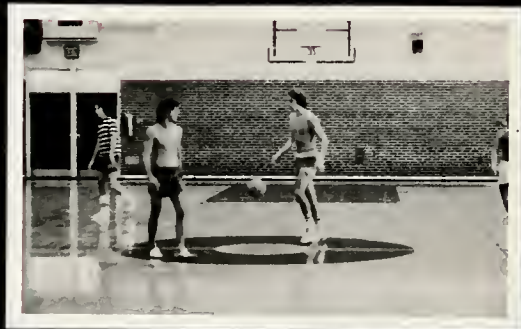






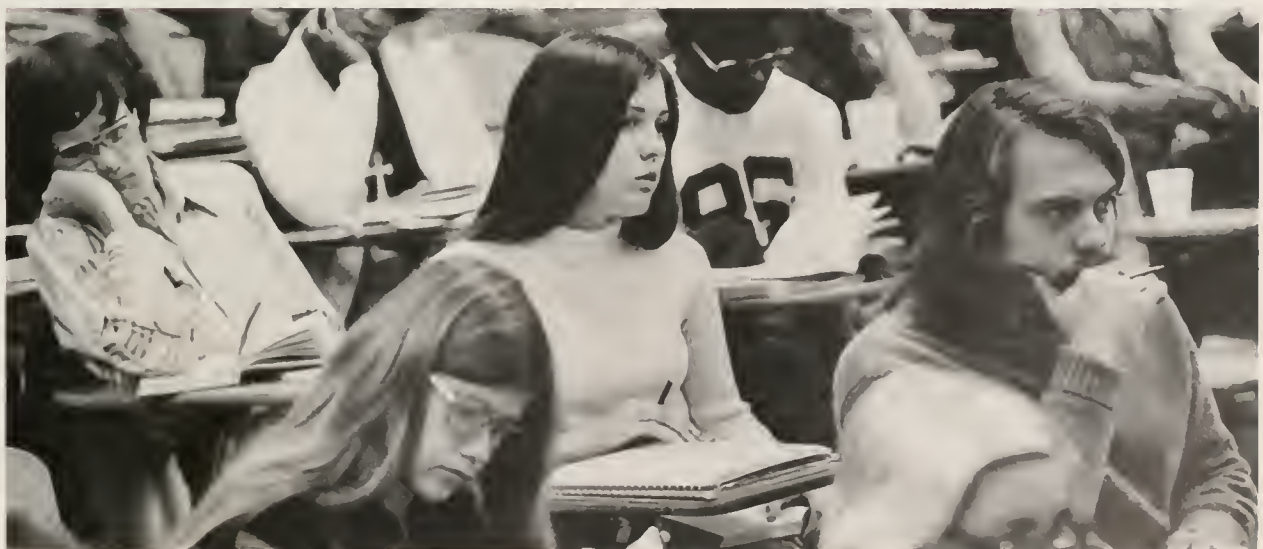
UPWARD BOUND

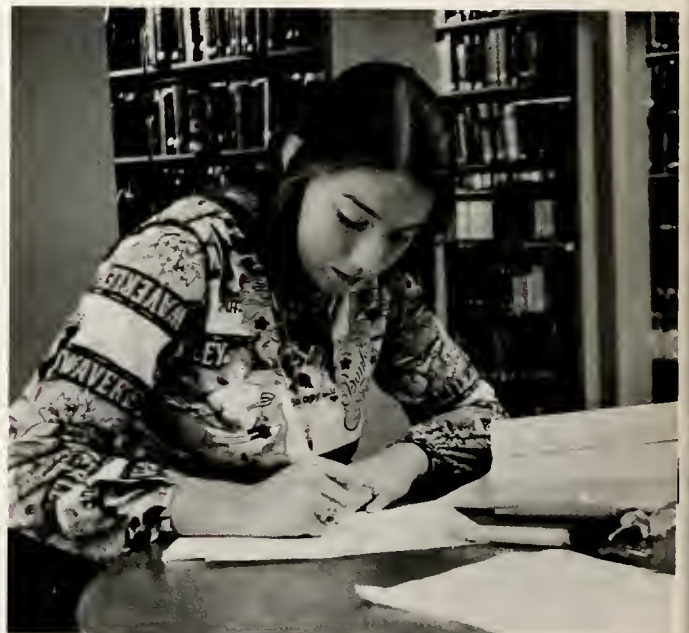

PARENTS WEEKEND

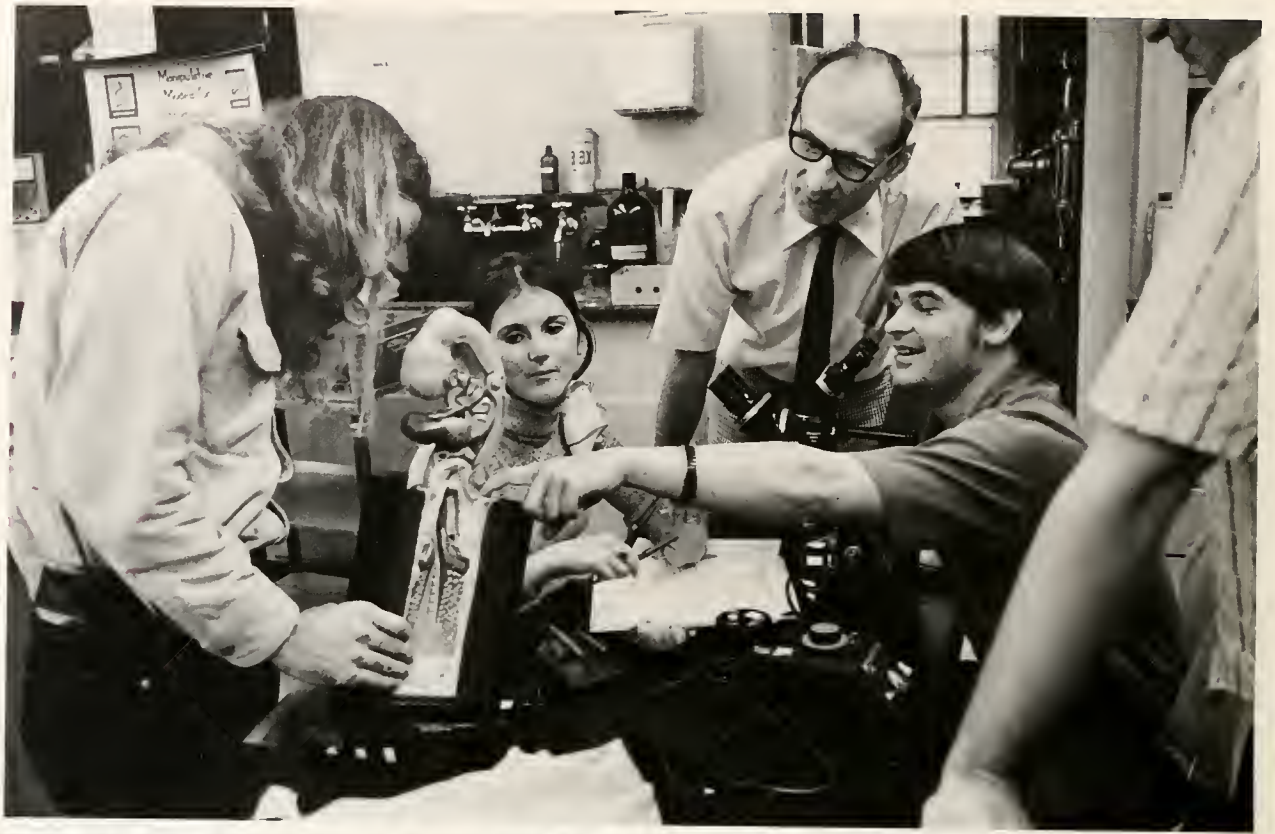

PLAYS

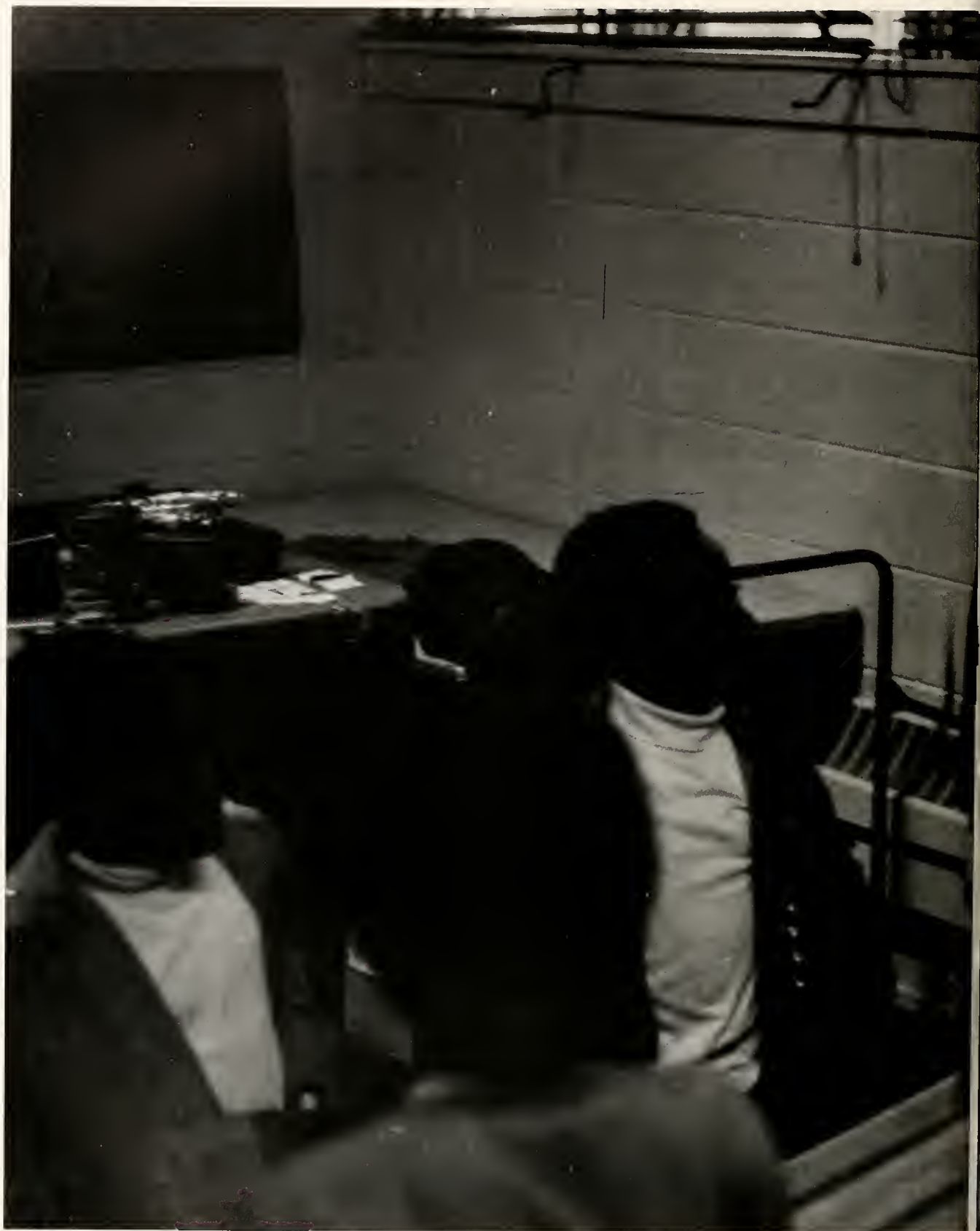
