BICYCLING













The annual spring bicycle race was a slightly smaller attair than in previous years and its name was changed from the Rocky Mount Open to the Rocky Mount-Wesleyan Criterium. Instead of three races in two days, culminating in a fifty-mile race around the beautiful Weslevan campus, there was only one fortymile race. The competition was also scheduled a month later than the year before, coming on Saturday, May 8, rather than the first week in April. Falling as it did on the day before the annual Mother's Day Race in Raleigh, Weslevan's race attracted riders from all over the eastern United States.

This year's competition featured 87 riders, including those in the four preliminary races. We were especially honored to have participating once again John Howard of Houston, Texas, the current national road race champion. Despite being favored to win, he was defeated by the team tactics of three members of the powerful National Capital Velo Club of Washington, D.C. Australian native lan Jackson came in first.

Coming two months after the racing clinic conducted at Wesleyan by U.S. Olympic Coach Jack Simes, the Rocky Mount-Wesleyan Criterium was the climax of another big season of Wesleyan bicycle racing and kept Wesleyan among the country's leaders in that demanding sport.
