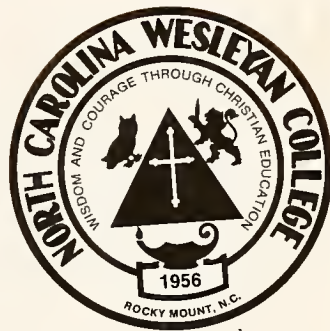

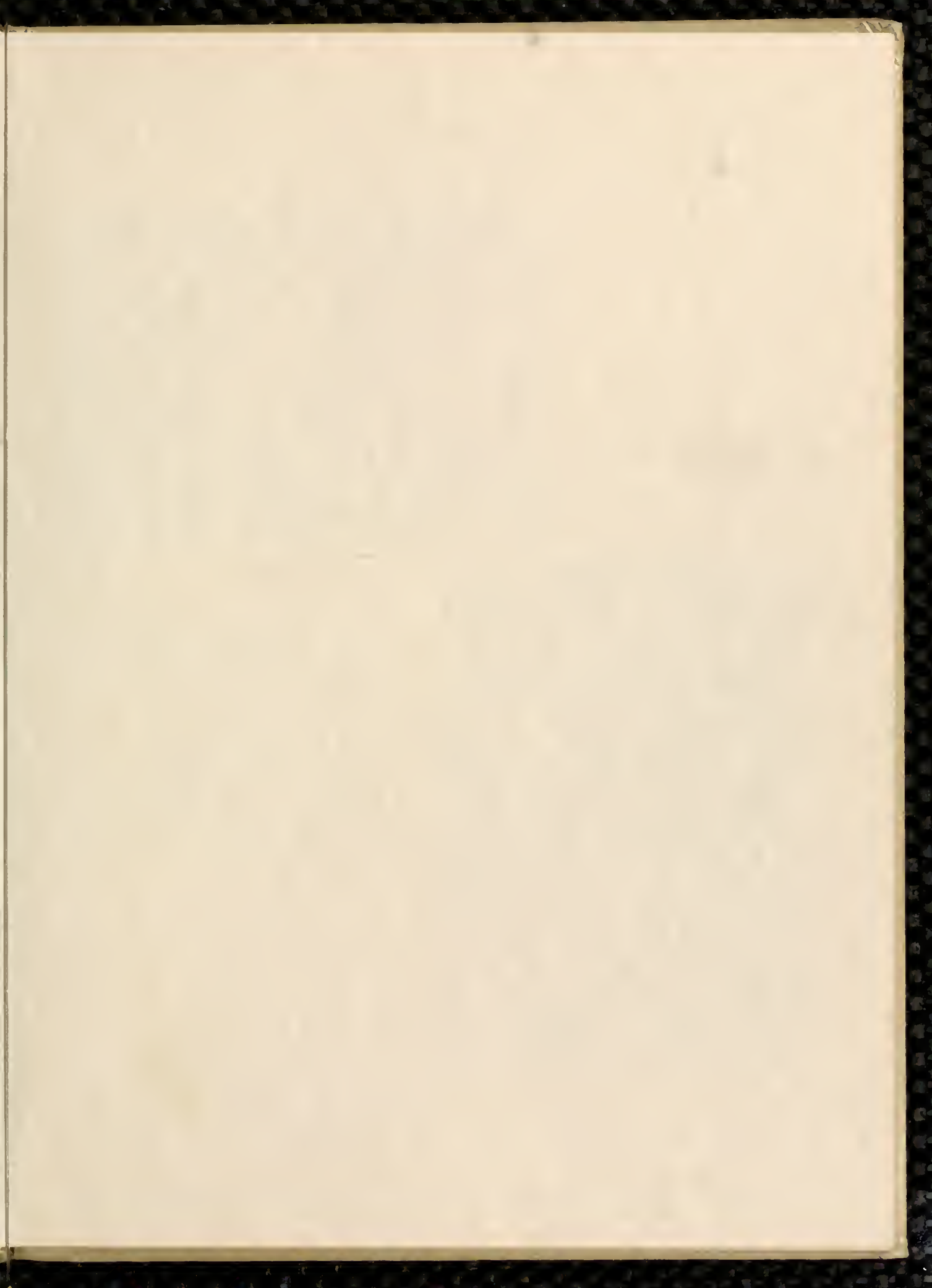

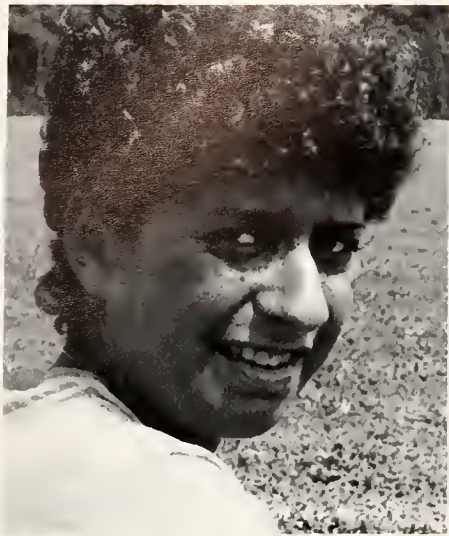

Summer Olympics Boycotted

A boycott of the 1980 Summer Olympic Games in Moscow fast became a reality for the United States. According to the Raleigh News and Observer, "the reasons for boycotting the Olympics ranged from economic to moral principles to worries that the athletes could be in danger in Moscow." The feelings concerning the Olympic boycott were strongly mixed. Many opponents felt that the politics of countries should not be a part of the Olympics. Supporters of the boycott said it would be the most visible way of showing U.S. displeasure of Soviet action.

There was a feeling of sympathy for those athletes who had trained so long and

hard, but we were confident that the boycott would prove to be a safety measure for our athletes and beneficial for our nation.



Olympic Athlete Dies at 66

The year 1936 marked an eventful time in U.S. history. Adolf Hitler gained power in Germany and Jesse Owens prevailed as the prominent track and field star. On March 31, 1980 Mr. Owens died at the University of Arizona Hospital.

Jesse Owens, who had been battling against lung cancer, was named the top athlete of the first half of the century by the American Press. He gained world wide fame in the 1936 Summer Olympics held in Berlin, Germany. Owens' accomplishments included a gold medal in the 100 yard dash and long jump, another in his world record 200 yard dash, and yet another as a member of the winning 400 meter relay team. Owens was 66 when he died.

American Embassy Siezed

On November 4, 1979 the U.S. Embassy in Tehran fell into the hands of militant Iranian students. The day began just like the previous days had with the students demonstrating outside the front gate. The demonstration grew and between 10:15 and 10:30 am the Iranians came over the walls.

The students rushed in and seized the embassy without incident. At this point, it was not clear what the militants were trying to achieve, nevertheless the U.S. Marines were ordered by their commanding officers to back up. The ranking

officers' decisions were made to minimize any bloodshed, but because of this, the takeover was hastened.

The Iranians worked their way through the embassy to the second floor, where most of the marines were. By the use of threats, the doors to the floor were opened and the marines were ordered to come forward. They were bound and blindfolded and led to adjacent rooms. Some of the hostages were later released, but approximately fifty hostages remained in captivity inside the embassy for hundreds of days.



Carter Proposes Reinstatement of the Draft

The years of 1979 and 1980 were filled with many events. The Iran and Afghanistan crises topped the headlines and because of these events the United States was forced to evaluate the strength of their armed forces. After finding that the forces were not adequate, President Carter proposed the reinstatement of the Selective Service Act, commonly known as the draft. Carter suggested to Congress that nineteen and twenty year olds, both men and women, be required to register for the draft and that eighteen year olds be required to register the following year.

Many people, both pro and con, voiced their opinions concerning the act of including women and the draft itself. The major concern was that a woman's place was not in the armed forces and definitely not in combat. However, Carter said, that women would be drafted only for noncombat duty. The president rein-

forced his position when he said, "registration for the draft is needed to increase our preparedness and is a further demonstration of our resolve as a nation and to help maintain peace and to prevent conflict in the region of the Persian Gulf and Southwest Asia."

The draft ended in June 1973 after the conclusion of the U.S. involvement in Vietnam and had been dormant since registration ended in 1975.

Comedian Milton Berle said, "I lost a dear friend and I think the theatrical world has lost a legend."

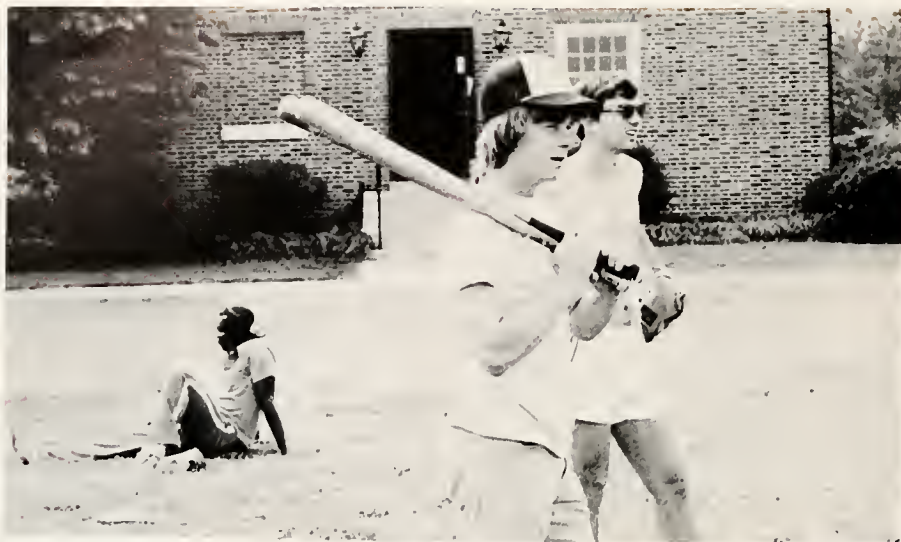
Comedian Rich Little added, "I realized early on that Jimmy Durante's voice was easy to imitate; what he accomplished as a human being, very few can duplicate."

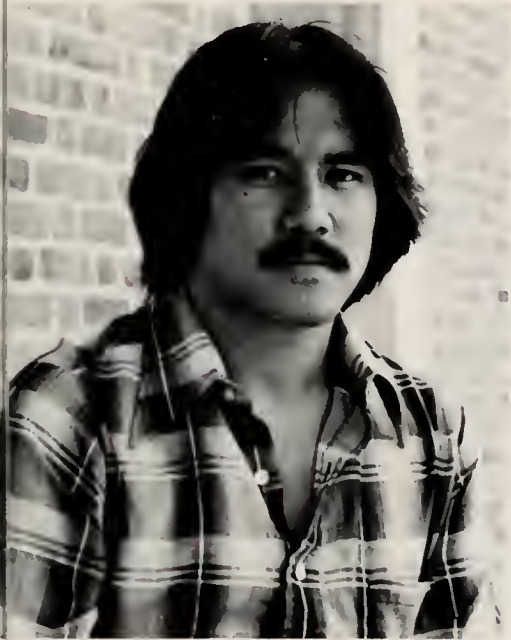

Symposium '80



Because of modern technology words such as; nuclear power, meltdowns, nuclear reactors and Three Mile Island became common to our vocabulary. Three days in mid-February Wesleyan students and local residents attended three symposiums entitled, "Promises and Perils." The symposiums provided an overall view of the advantages and disadvantages of nuclear power.

Doctor Bell and David Martin were two of the experts on hand. Both agreed that the purpose of the symposiums was to generate interest in the subject and to provide a greater amount of information concerning it.

Students reaction was mixed, but the anti-nuclear people voiced their opinions loudly. They staged a protest march in front of the gym, carried posters and handed out leaflets. Both faculty and students participated in the rally. Professor Finney, Doctor Walton, Jack Wiemer, Monica Best, Jeff Bynum, Cathy Ballou, Hal Swindal, Jody Tuttle and



Andy Wimberly were just a few of the participants. Some of the slogans read like this: "Energy Conservation For Human Preservation," "Storage — Give Us The Problems," "The Firefly Generation" and "Nuclear Waste Poisons Our Planet." Andy, the groups' leader stated it like this, "Put both oars in the water before you start to row." The major concern was that the development was moving at a rate much faster than was needed. There was no room for error, however the construction of the plants was primitive and this put a lot of helpless people in grave danger. The leaflet stated it in another way, "A cost of exercising power is much unwanted heat, so victory is found to be a species of defeat, and no amount of slick brochures can cultivate a taste for dead and tepid rivers and for radioactive waste."

Spring Fling — 1980

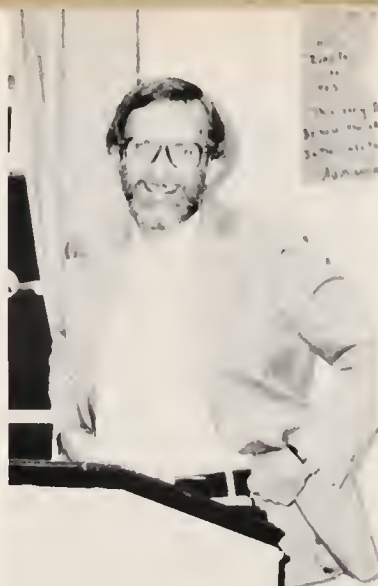

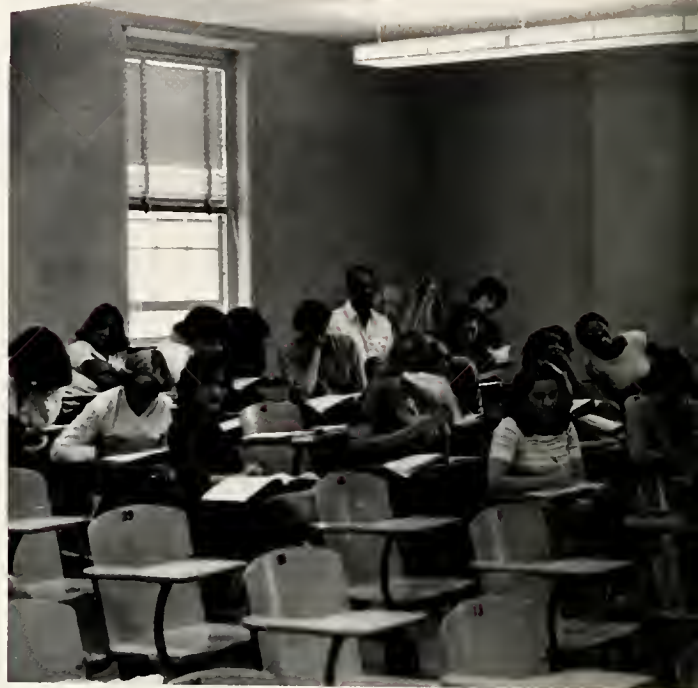

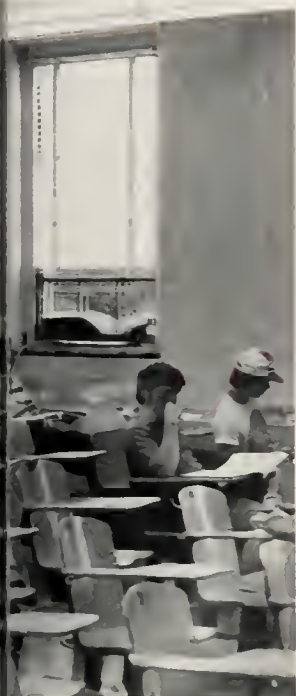


Faculty Roast

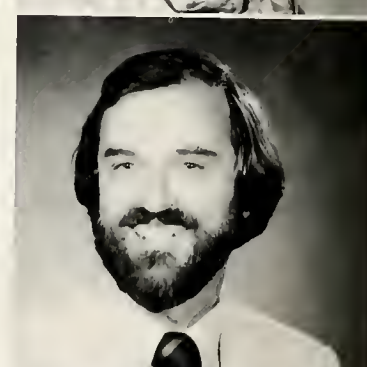

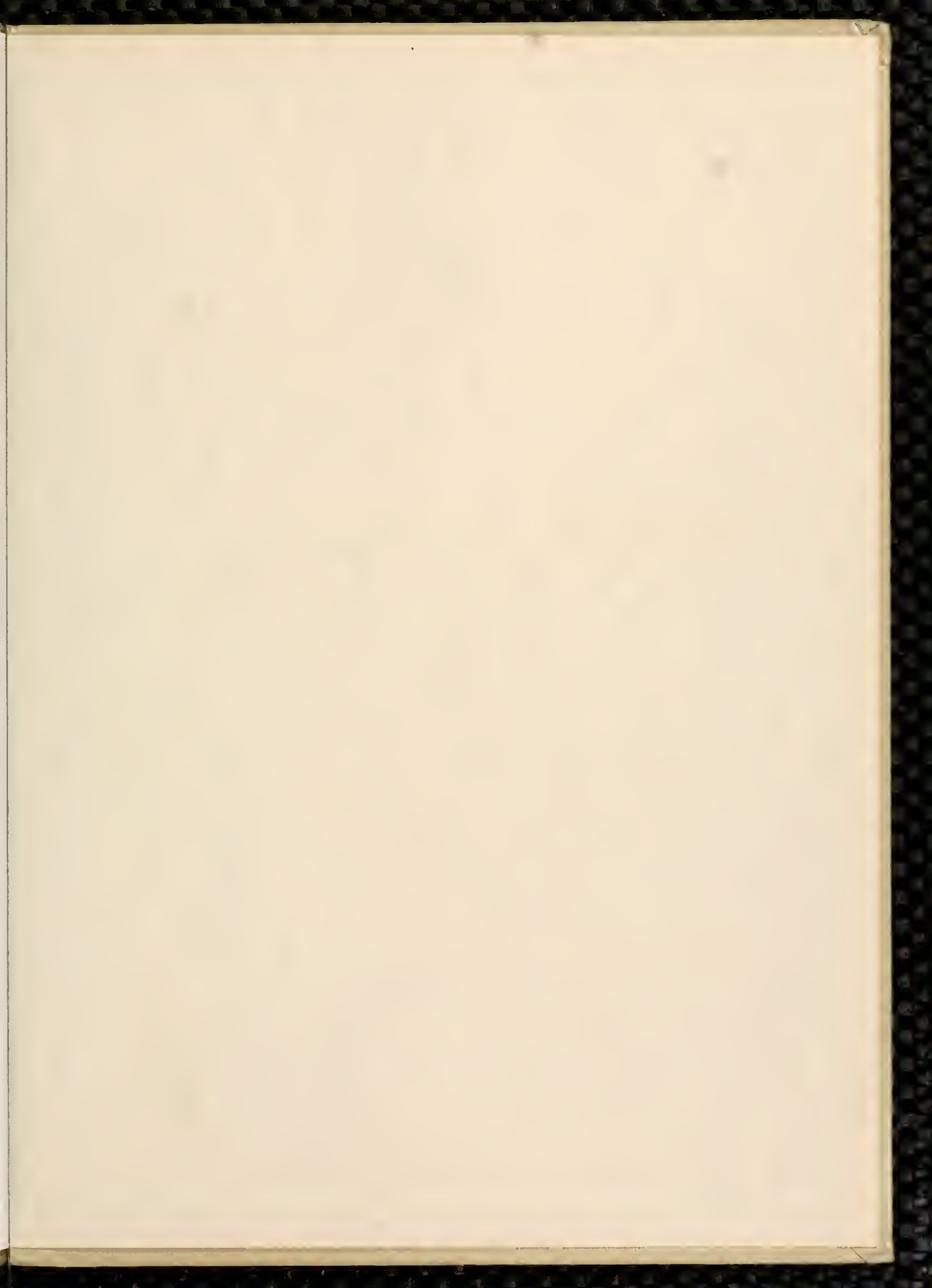

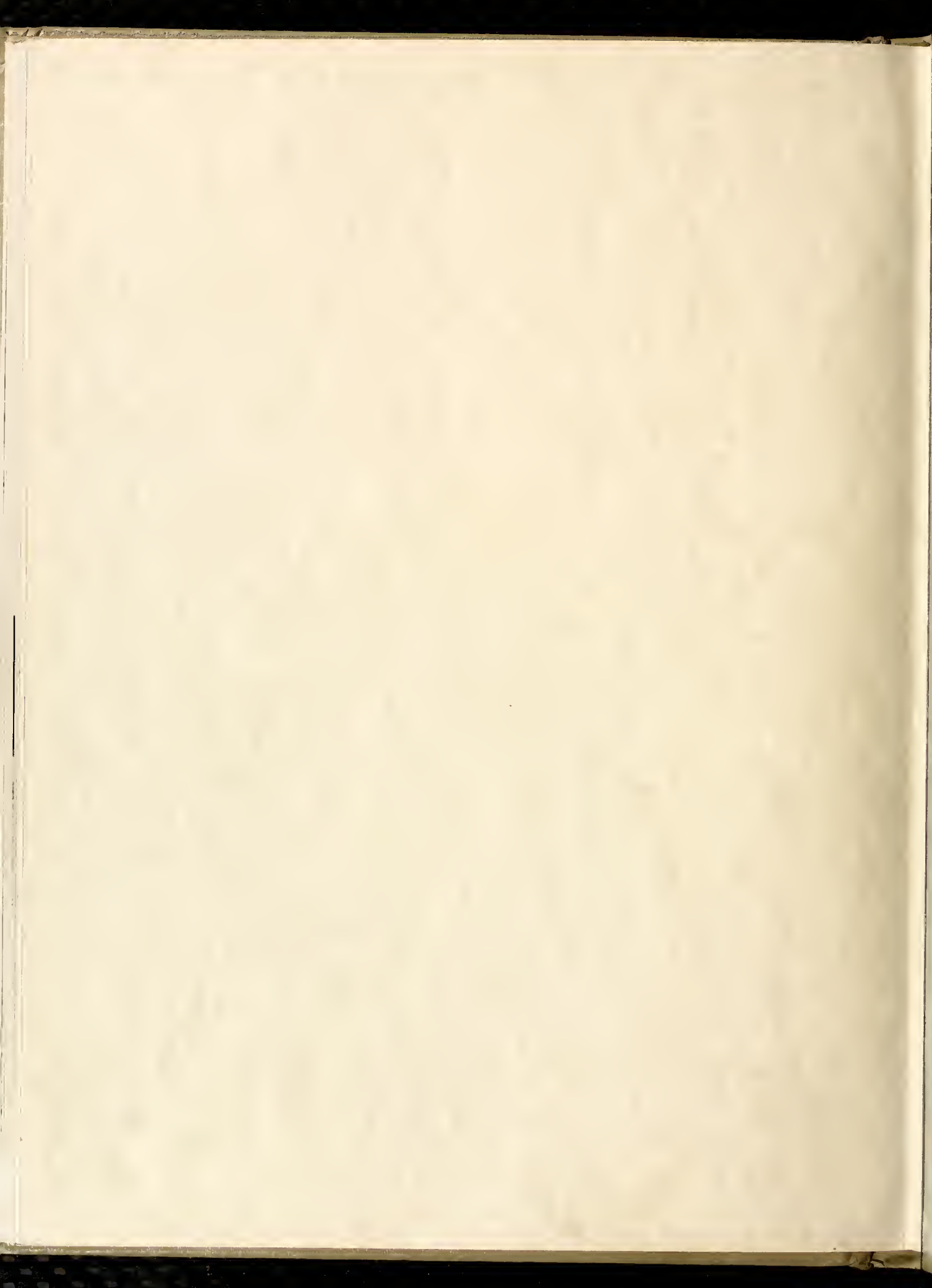
