







## Dissenter 1983-84

The early and middle years of the seventeenth century were times of non-conformity and dissent. Both grandfathers of John and Charles Wesley were among the ejected clergy of 1662. However, Samuel Wesley preferred the ministry of the establishment and was, from 1695 to his death, rector of the rough country parish of Epworth. Nor did his son John have any intention or desire to break with the Church of England.

When North Carolina Wesleyan College was founded, a committee, chaired by Dr. Edwin Harwood, was formed to name the yearbook of this new college. It seemed appropriate in those early years of the sixties (also a time of non-conformity and dissent) to reach back into the ancestry of the Wesleys for a term that would reflect the feistiness and determination of the young college. Thus — "The Dissenter."



### ANNUAL FUND RAISER

### "A Day For Wesleyan '84"

North Carolina Wesleyan College's annual fund raiser, "A Day for Wesleyan '84," held September 20 in Rocky Mount and neighboring communities, netted \$307,720 for the college.

This figure compares with the "A Day for Wesleyan '83' total of \$305,123

The final record-setting tally was announced during a victory celebration for campaign volunteers at the home of Jack A Laughery, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Hardee's Food Systems, Inc., and general campaign chairman. "I'm very excited and thrilled with the fact that we've exceeded last year's pledges," Laughery exclaimed following the final announcement. "This total reflects the community's support of the college; it's obvious that they embrace Wesleyan, as they have proven in the past as well as tonight."

The final tally was the culmination of the efforts of 163 volunteers in raising funds for the college in Rocky Mount, Nashville, Tarboro, Pinetops, Whitakers and Enfield, Funds raised help underwrite current operating expenses of Wes-

leyan.

The one-day fund raiser began early in the morning of September 20 with a kick-off breakfast in the college cafeteria. Following the breakfast Laughery announced that \$197,695 had been raised in advance calls by volunteers. Volunteers reported the results of their morning calls during a report-in luncheon where a total of \$238,695 was announced.

Following the announcement of the final tally, which was preceded by a last minute flurry of pledges, Richard B. Dollar, vice president for development and campaign director, said, "North Carolina Wesleyan College is overwhelmed with the tremendous vote of confidence expressed by the community who gave so generously to make this campaign a success. This could never have happened without the dedicated leadership provided by Jack Laughery and the entire Hardee's organization.

"The executive committee, which included J. Dewey Weaver, Jr., Betsy B. Strandberg, J. Claude Mayo, Jr., John J. Ferebee, William H. Kincheloe, Gene L. Lewis and B. Mayo Boddie, Sr., set the pace with their thorough planning. "Of course," Dollar added, "the success of the campaign was dependent upon our volunteer force. Our 163 volunteers accepted their challenge with enthusiasm and

carried out their mission."

The "A Day for Wesleyan" fund raiser is the kick-off for the college's annual fund. About 25 percent of the college's operating budget is generated through funds provided by the private sector.




They gave generously and often at great sacrifice. They labored and prevailed against incredible difficulties and barriers. They founded a College.



North Carolina Wesleyan College ended its 27th anniversary of the institution's chartering Saturday with the graduating of 188 seniors.

Students received their degrees during Wesleyan's Twenty-First Commencement Service. The Rev. Dr. John K. Bergland, executive vice president for the Office of Planned Giving of the Methodist Foundation, Inc. in Raleigh, served as commencement speaker.

"It is your day," Bergland told the graduates, "come from your education in the liberal arts with a grand respect for it ... you are true professionals; not simply technicians ... I want you to be prosperous in every way, but most importantly, prosperous beneath the sovereignty of God."

One-hundred and twenty-one students earned their bachelor of arts degree, 65 students earned their bachelor of science degree, and two students earned their science in technology degree.










