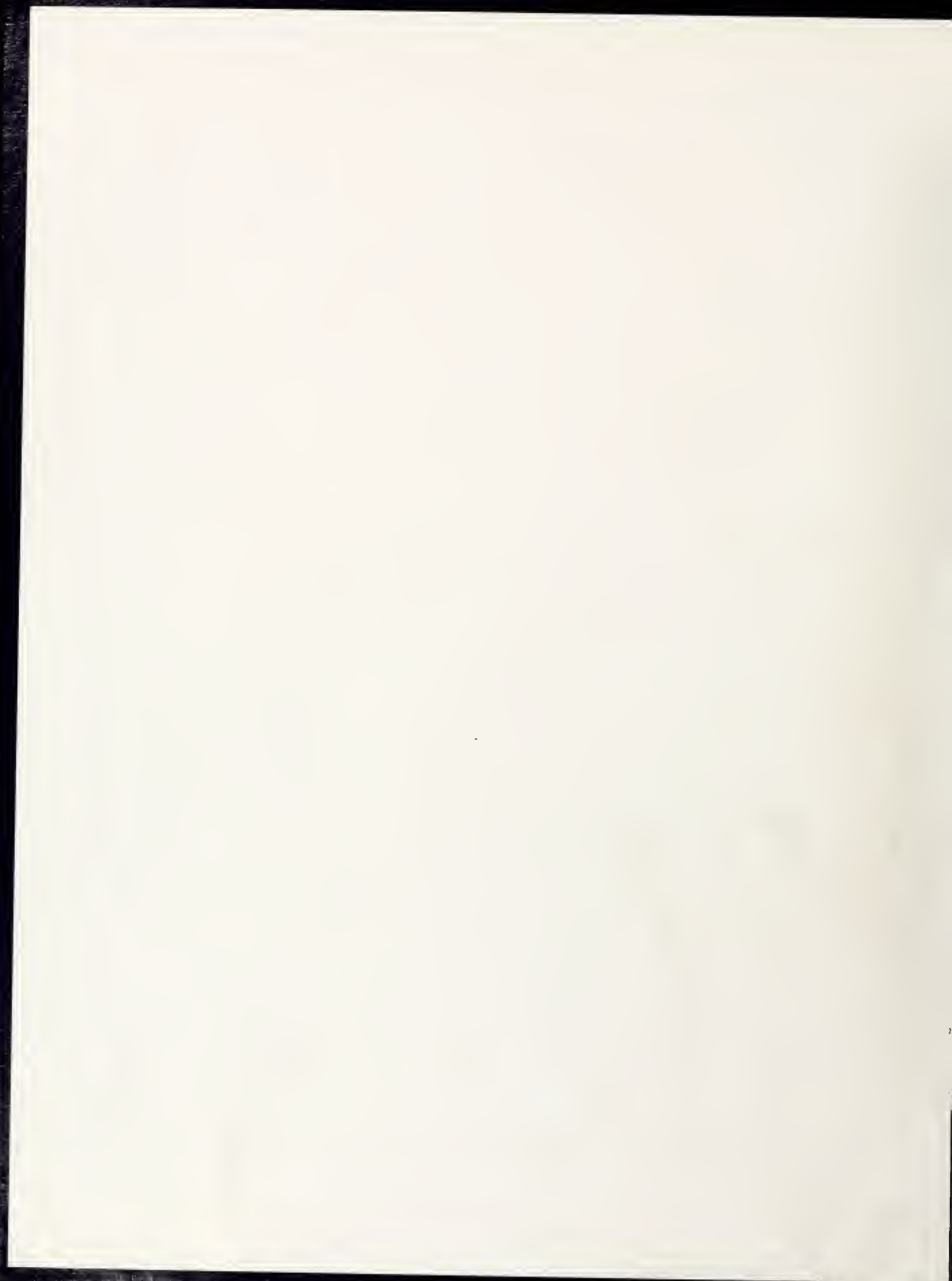

SYMPOSIUM

Fourth President Dr. John B. White assumes office after a weeklong series of symposia and celebration events.

Prior to January 23, students, faculty, and staff dashed here and there preparing for the upcoming Presidential Inauguration.

Dr. John Bradley White was sworn in as North Carolina Wesleyan's fourth President on Thursday, January 25, but many events took place prior to the formal swearing-in.

These events gave faculty, students, staff, and the community a better insight into the current conditions at Wesleyan and for White's plans for Wesleyan's future.

The first event on January 23 was the Inaugural Symposium with the theme: "What Should Liberal Education Be At Wesleyan?"

After the welcome by Leon A. Dunn, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Dr. White introduced the keynote speaker, Robert E. Calvert of De Pauw University.

Although many students enjoyed the symposium, some still questioned why a member of Wesleyan was not chosen to speak about liberal education at the college.

One student, who asked not to be named said the symposium "was very semi-politically correct. The topic went around the important issues at the college. They talked about what liberal education should be at Wesleyan, not what it is or how we planned to obtain it."

Other students, who weren't so much into the symposium itself, found everything enjoyable because there was something to do on campus.

On January 24, at 9 a.m., two more discussion groups with panel discussions were held.

One was "Clarity and Charity: The Life and the Spirit and Liberal Education". Members of the panel were Dr. Rexford Tucker, Professor Emeritus of Religion; Rev. Kirk Oldham, College Chaplain; Fred Grissom, Associate Professor of Religion; Kelly Wilson, a fourth year student; and Sigrid Bonner, Student Life and Resident Director. The moderator was Dr. David Jones, Professor of History and Religion.

Many of those in attendance were very pleased with the panel and their speeches, but the mention of Wesleyan's being a "party school" sparked a lot of conversation among Wesleyan students.

"This is not a party school," says one student. "These are small gatherings of students who stay on campus on the weekends." Many students go off campus on weekends to find entertainment, because nothing big is happening on campus.

Another student responded by saying, "If we are such a party school, why are the students of Wesleyan not being invited?"

One panelist mentioned that students have no morals and another panelist said students have disregard for morals. Some students felt that though the panelists felt this needed to be said, these statements belittle the students of Wesleyan.

Also at 9 a.m., another discussion panel focused on "Technology in the Liberal Arts". Members

of this panel were Dr. Kenneth Finney, Professor of History; Dr. Charles Creegan, Associate Professor of Philosophy and Religion; Faye Kucera, Assistant Professor of Biology; and Kenneth Stolorick, a senior. The moderator was Dr. Cal Wynkoop, Professor of Business.

Students who attended said they thoroughly enjoyed the discussions and wished more students could have heard it.

Two more discussion panels were held at 10:30 a.m.. One panel was on "Arts and Smarts: A Conversation on Humanities", moderated by English Professor, Dr. Linda Flowers, joined by panelists Alan Felton, Anneliese Hatcher, Charlotte Pettitt, Ellen Stanton and Tamara Tyner.

"At first it was scary, but it was a lot of fun. It was more interesting to hear everyone's different opinions on liberal education, how they defined it and how they applied it," said Anneliese Hatcher when asked how it felt to be on the panel.

Mike Ingerick was impressed by the panel. He felt the discussion was excellent and was proud to see that the panel was made up of students.

The other 10:30 a.m. discussion was on "Business at a Liberal Arts College: Who Gains?" Kathy Winslow, Assistant Professor and Librarian, was moderator. Panelists were Dr. Robert Bussom, Dean of the College and Vice President of Academic Affairs and Professor of Business; Christina Mc Shain, a senior; Steve Felton, an alum from 1984; and Joyce DeBaux, a senior.

Other discussions were held at 2 and 4 p.m. beginning with "Celebrating the Past: The Founding and Early Years", which gave the first two presidents of Wesleyan, Thomas A. Collins and Dr. S. Bruce Pettaway, a chance to speak, followed by "Looking to the Future: The Opening of the Dunn Center" which gave Dr. Leslie Garner Jr., the College's third president, and Dr. John B. White a chance to speak their views.

On the evening of January 24, the North Carolina Symphony, led by Music Director/Conductor Gerhardt Zimmerman; Assistant Conductor Michael Jimbo; and Director of Education, Jackson Parkhurst performed in the Dunn Center.

The Symphony played a mixture of mellow and upbeat tunes, including works by Berlioz, Mozart, and Vivaldi. Minges Auditorium was filled to capacity as students, staff and faculty were joined by many of the citizens of Rocky Mount.

Besides the symphony performance, many students also enjoyed a student-body sponsored "Celebrating the Past, Looking To the Future" Inaugural Ball in honor of the inauguration of Dr. White.

The semi-formal dance was held on the stage of Minges Auditorium at the Dunn Center. It was attended by students, faculty and staff. Those who attended said they had a fantastic time, even dancing "step" steps as one group, including the well known "Electric Slide".

Inauguration Day finally arrived on

Thursday, January 25, as Dr. White was formally installed as the College's fourth president.

The invocation was given by Rev. Kirk Oldham, College Chaplain. Greeting the President were Terrell Adgers, representing the student body, who challenged Dr. White to encourage the strengths and correct the weaknesses of the College; Dr. Perry-Sheldon, representing the Education Department; Phyllis R. Rudolf, representing the Adult Degree Program; R. Bruce Sharer, Class of '68 representing the Alumni Association; Edward F. Hill II, Class of '73 representing the Board of Trustees; Mary English of DePauw University, representing the past co-workers of Dr. White; Frederick E. Turnage, Mayor of Rocky Mount, representing the community; and Bishop Carlton P. Minnick Jr., representing the United Methodist Church.

Finally it was time for the President to be formally sworn in. Following tradition, a medallion was presented to Dr. White, depicting the College Seal upon which reads Wesleyan's motto, "Wisdom and Courage Through Christian Education".

The seal, designed by J.W.E. Joyner of Rocky Mount, includes five symbols arranged within a circular coat of arms design. An owl is shown for wisdom, a lion for courage, a triangle for the Trinity, a budded cross for Christianity, and a lamp for education. The medallion is worn by the college president at all academic functions.

Also, again following tradition, the "mace" was presented. The mace is an ornamental staff born as a symbol of authority. In academic use, the mace is the symbol of a college as a corporate body of learning. The mace is carved from walnut from the banks of the Cape Fear River and is distinguished by the carved flame at its top representing the lamp of knowledge and the affiliation of the College with the United Methodist Church. The Faculty Marshall carries the mace during all academic ceremonies.

Although the ceremony was lengthy, students afterwards said they enjoyed the speakers.

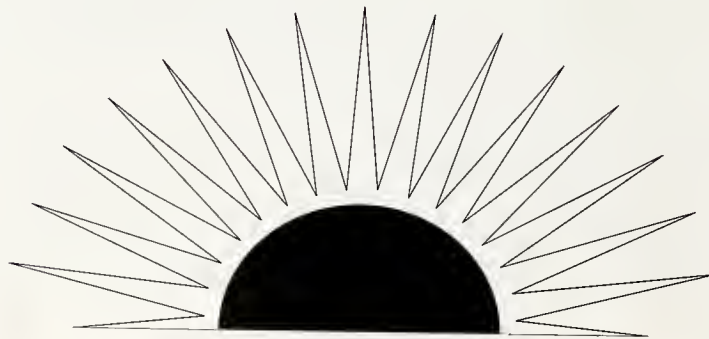

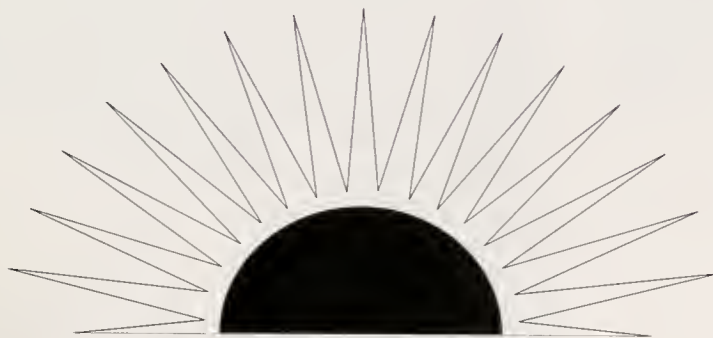

Holly Roberson, a Senior English major, read from her collection of poetry *Painted by the Sun in Shades of Tranquility*. Holly's poems are written both in English and French.

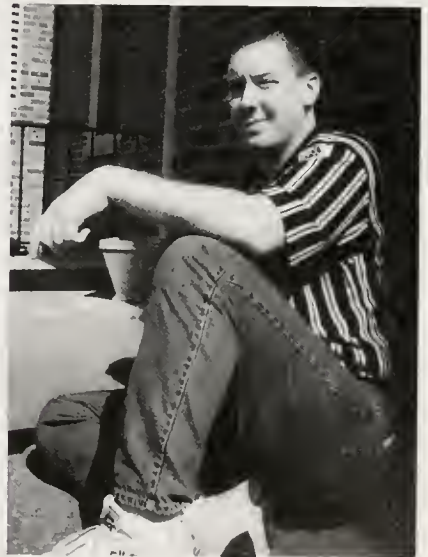

The "Angel Fish" is a perfect example. It is a piece of painted driftwood so beautifully and naturally designed. For a mind and spirit to come together and choose just the right colors to highlight this beautiful creation, is supernatural. 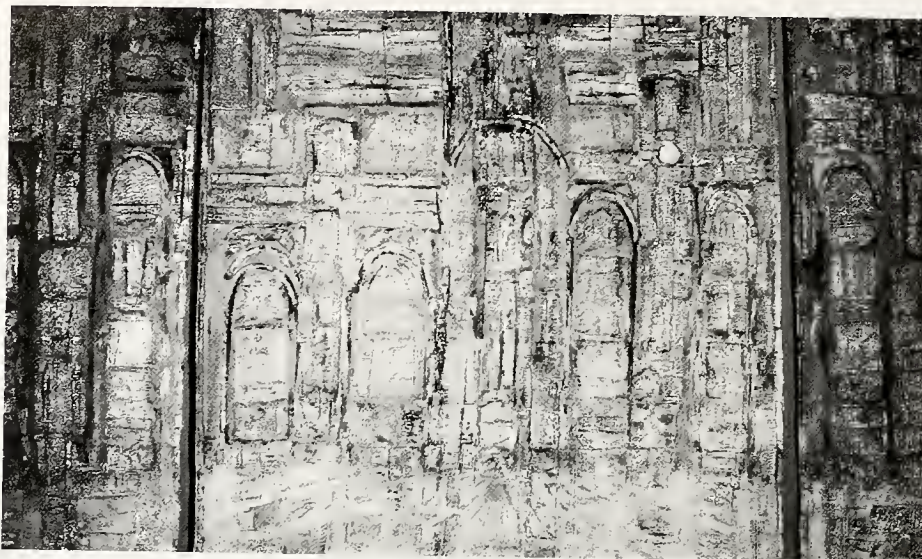

M.W. PETE RICKARD

On March 14, North Carolina Wesleyan College welcomed the artist M.W. Pete Rickard.

Ms. Rickard's pieces were displayed in the South Gallery of the Dunn Center until April 12.

Rickard, an 84-year-old abstract expressionist, began creating her masterpieces 35 years ago in Connecticut. From there she has studied and exhibited in Sarasota and Venice, Florida.

Most of her pieces belong in private collections, while other pieces belong to such collections as the one at Barton College.

Rickard works in collage. She says, "working with collage hides my mistakes."

Rickard's work has been shown at several exhibitions, including the Florida Art League, Barton College, Chowan College, Goldsboro, and the Rocky Mount Art Center.

Rickard's collages cost anywhere from \$400 to \$5,000 and the size of her canvas ranges from 17 x 43 inches to 94 x 109 inches. Her favorite size to work with is a 24 x 24 inch canvas.

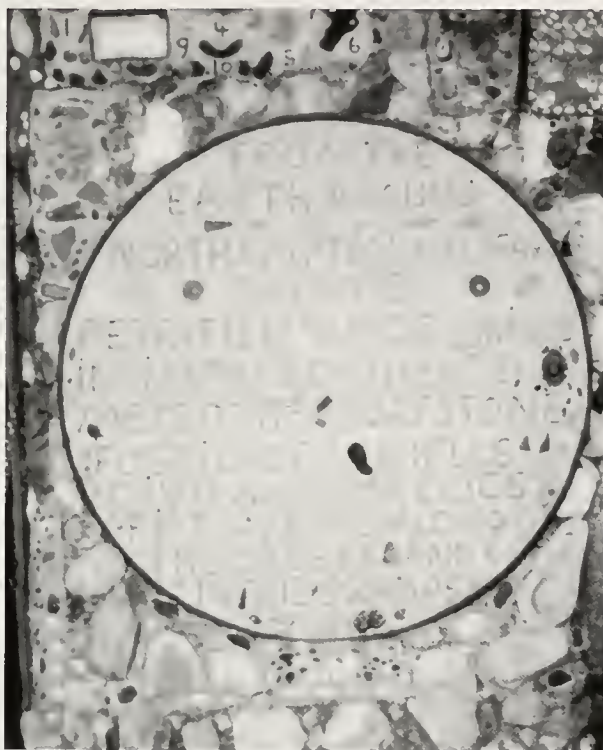
One of Rickard's 48 x 48 inch canvases, called "Eye Trouble" was created when she had a clot in her eye. It was a colorful acrylic painting without any of her "signature" collage work on it. She said the painting reflected what she saw when her eyes open and closed before corrective surgery.

"Garden Party," a 72 x 216 inch work, is figurative and uses mixed media and assemblage to create a sense of texture. With this collage-painting she started with a sketch and from there worked from the top right-hand corner down.

Rickard uses bright colors to create a sense of happiness and contentment. Her favorite colors are thalo blue and thalo green.

THE WRITTEN WORD: SELF TAUGHT AND SELF-PUBLISHED

That the forms and meanings signified by the written word can include or exclude people has always vitalized language as an anxious social dynamic. To be able to supplicate, persuade and command by word is power, even if the look of the word alone and its formal significance is all the word-crafter has to work with, should they be illiterate yet artistically motivated.

Some of the art work, letter, and word crafting in this exhibition ranges from hand-made art with words to self-published books in mass printed editions. Some of the work has been wonderfully, even urgently made by people without the advantage of any formal schooling. Illiteracy in our time and circumstance unavoidably relegates someone to an outsider status, even if it is an anxiously kept secret, as it often is.

Featured in this exhibition was the work of Quentin J. Stephenson, whose artwork is included in Wesleyan's Lynch Collection of Outsider Art, and often features the written word. Stephenson, called Q.J. by his friends and admirers, has paid tribute to mother nature in most of his various artwork. Stephenson, like others included in this Fall 1995 exhibition, writes without the benefit of a high school education.

Much of the artwork included in this exhibition was selected from the College's world-class collection of mid-southern coastal plain folk art found in both the Robert Lynch Collection of Outsider Art and the Collection of the Daisy Thorp Gallery (currently an unbuilt facility).

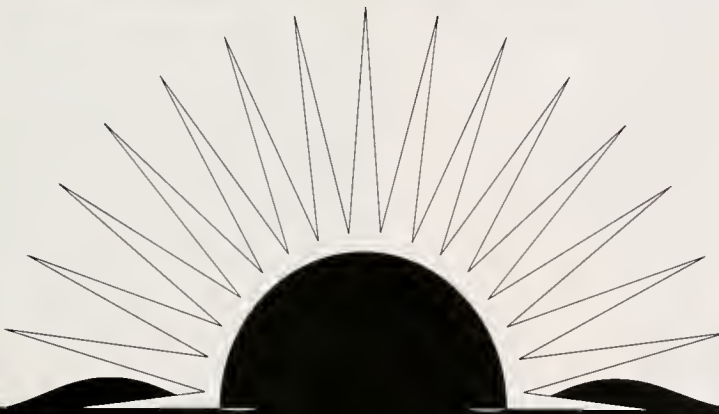

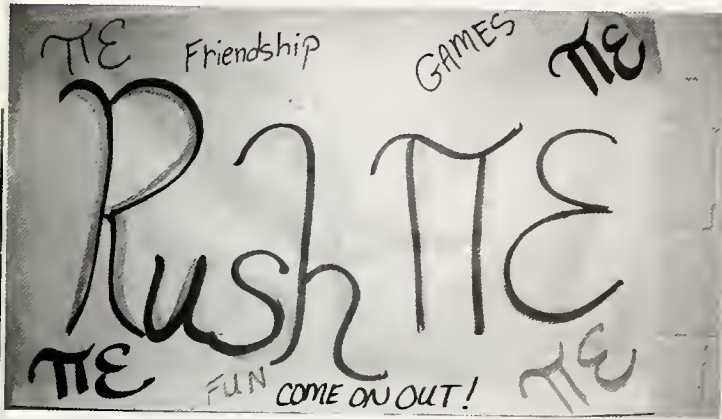

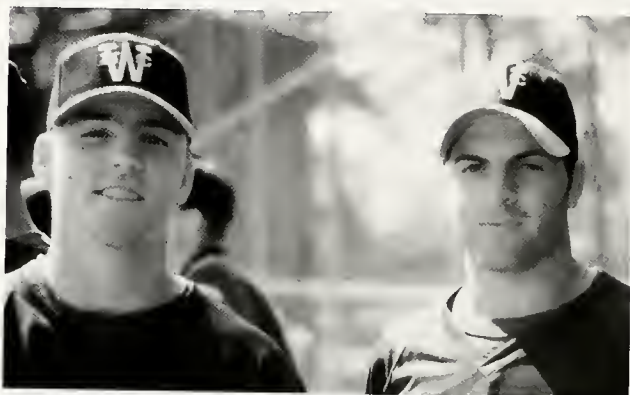

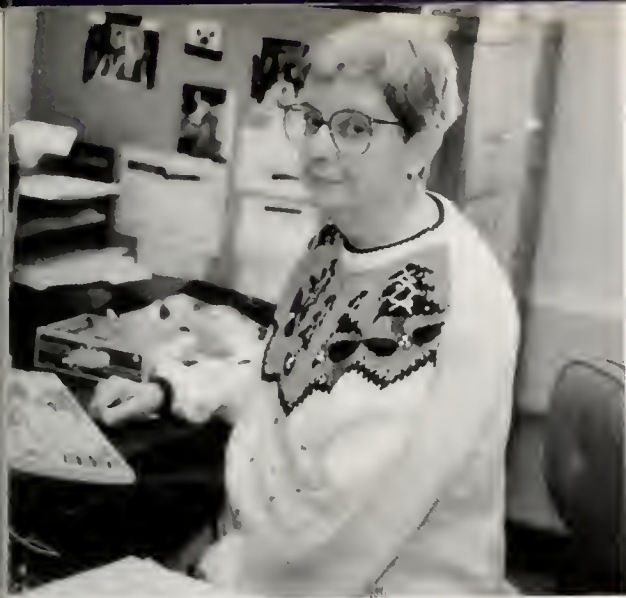
