Professor Don Scalf came to North Carolina Wesleyan College in 1962 to teach Physical Education and coach basketball. He soon added golf and cross country to his coaching duties, and in 1974 Don helped organize and coach the program for women's athletics.

Don's basketball squad won the Dixie Conference Championship in 1966 and his golf teams won championships in 1970, 1971,1972 and 1973. He was named the Conference's Golf Coach of the Year each of those years as well.

While he was successful in the athletic department, teaching was Professor Scalf's primary responsibility. His skills in teaching and in human relations are outstanding. Students will always be first in his commitments. He never was too busy to stop and listen to problems or just "chat". Professor Scalf was named the Alumni Distinguished Faculty of the Year in 1994.

He motivated all those around him and contributed in countless ways to the growth and excellence of North Carolina Wesleyan College. Former colleagues Jean Edge and Coach Moe Bauer both declared with great pride and sad testament that Don was the last of a generation of Wesleyan's pioneering faculty. He will be greatly missed, but we wish him a long, happy retirement.





The Men's Soccer team headed into the '97 campaign knowing they had to take a step forward in continuing to build this program. That they did! finishing with an overall record of 9-10, The Battling Bishops had the best season the school has seen since 1989.

The Bishops started season off by claiming the championship of their own tournament with two straight wins vs. Cabrini College and York College. This also marked the first time the Men's Soccer team had been 2-0 in over a decade. The team went on to score 36 goals this season, and finished second in the Dixie conference behind First Place Greenshoro



Burch brought her athleticism, enthusiasm, and expertise to the team. Burch entered the season rehabilitating a shoulder surgery. She was slowly moved into the line-up three weeks into the season starting in the backrow and eventually taking over the middle position.

The season was a success as we held a winning record for three quarters of the season before dropping below 500 after meeting two regionally ranked teams, Emory (2nd) and SCAD (5th). This was the best season since 1989 as the Bishop's made it past the first round of the Dixie Conference Tournament

finishing third in the Dixie.

Christina Burch, and co-captain, was named to the first team All-Conference and the Bishop's MVP. Jennifer Neugebauer, senior and co-captain, was named to the GTE All-America District III team. GTE recognizes athletes who excel on the court, in the classroom, and in the community. "Jennifer's accomplishments have been many over the past four years with our program," said Coach Lubbers. Her leadership and caring personality has given many of the players cofidence and comfort over the years."

Morrison, Pachner, and Hilbert will be the core of the team next year as we lose two seniors and return two juniors. The Bishop's sights continue to be set on the conference championship as we enter the 1998 season with six returners.

The Brothers Gurganus: Three Artists - One Family

Rocky Mount's native sons Allan, Craig and Gary Gurganus made an art exhibition in memory of their beloved mother who died in Tarboro in 1996. There was a New York style public reception with piano music and half of Rocky Mount to honor and enjoy the company of the three talented bothers.

When Ethel Mae Morris Gurganus died in 1996, she left four sons and a surviving legacy of her own interest in art and commitment to actively educating her sons. She provided them with opportunities for firsthand cultural experience as well as plenty of art materials, all toward becoming the open-minded, creative and productive men they are. Today, Allan Gurganus is an internationally recognized author, who once in childhood followed his mother's creative example and tried his own needlepoint variation of a Matisse painting. Brother Craig transformed his athletic passion for surfing into a successful sculpture career, fashioning art from discarded surfboards. Gary is the co-manager of Sunset Nursery and expert counsel to many needing gardening advice or better knowledge of plants and trees. Gary is an imaginative folk-carver whose works are in quite a number of important regional private art collections. Brother Bruce works as a psycho-therapist in California.

The Brothers Gurganus art exhibition pays tribute to family, community and the creative spirit. Allan Gurganus's book illustrations are confidently drawn supplements to some of his richly written short stories. Craig's imaginatively recycled surfboard sculptures are whimsical and fun. Gary's animated and colorful folk-carvings in wood are full of ideas from playful commentary on sates of mind to scriptural interpretation.

The College purchased Gary Gurganus' nine part carved and painted narrative reliefs titled: "Story of Jonah" to be included in the Four Sisters Gallery of Self-Taught Art which opens in the fall of 1998 in the renovated Pearsall Building which was the old SAC Building.

He has worked with the Raleigh Ensemble Players, Crystal Coast Amphitheater, and Cape Fear Regional Theater amongst other theatrical venues. Zarr was scenic artist for the Tom Hank's film Forrest Gump. He is a member of International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees and Southeastern Theater Conference.

John Mc Illwee is the Chief Technical Director of all North Carolina State University theaters. David Blakely is the Technical Director for the City of Rocky Mount Theater.




