* This plant is now attracting much attention throughout the country, and will certainly supersede all others for hedging, it grows rapidly, and if regularly clipped at midwinter and midsummer respectively, will, in a few years, make a compact impenetrable fence; the rich glossy green of the foliage (which it retains longer than any other deciduous tree) makes it very ornamental, and the numerous strong, rigid thorns with which it is armed, is a certain preventive against depredation.

It delights in a moderately rich soil, and one foot apart is the proper distance for planting. The maclura is undoubtedly the cheapest hedge plant that has been introduced into cultivation.
