The band, orchestra, and glee club could scarcely exist without some of the Juniors.

And the best is yet to come! The Jumors gave a banquet to the Seniors that will not soon be forgotten. On the evening of February 14, the Junior and Senior boys and girls, all looking their best, went to the Hotel Alamance and spent an enjoyable evening. Red and white, the Senior class colors, were used as color motif. The program was well arranged and well carried out, and, frankly, I don't believe any future class can surpass the class of '28.

I could write a book on what the Junior class has done, is doing, and will do; but I suppose I had better wait and let the future take care of itself.




# Intra-Mural Athletics in Burlington High School

Burlington High School believes in clean, wholesome athletics for every student. In addition to the interscholastic sports promoted for those desiring to participate, a general physical education program includes athletic sports for all of those not capable, or inclined, to participate in the varsity sports.

This year marks the beginning of competition for a large loving cup that is to be given to the class winning it by excelling in the following sports: baskethall for boys and girls, track and field athletics for boys, tennis singles and doubles for boys and girls, baseball for boys, volleyball for boys, and a general physical ability test for boys and girls which is based primarily on the best motor ability tests that have been provided to date.




