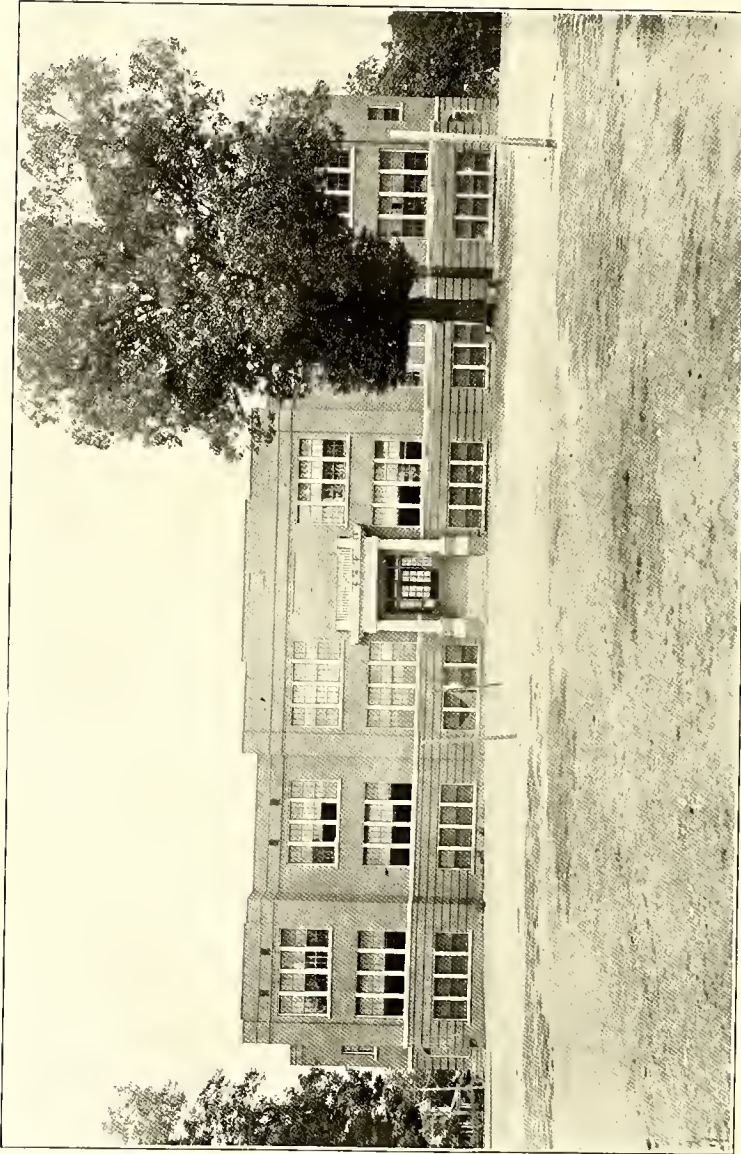

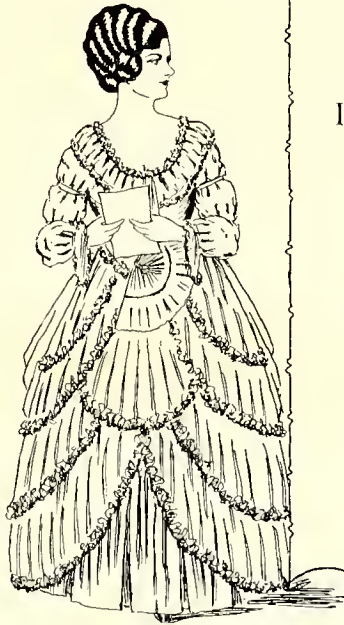

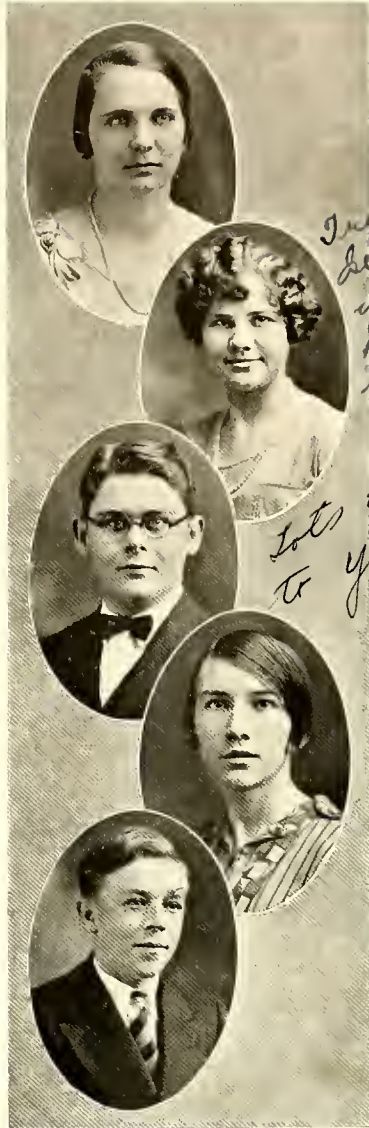

NINETEEN TWENTY-SEVEN  
AT SCHOOL  
BURLINGTON, N. C.

*Dear Madge:*

You can't possibly know what you have missed by having left the jolly class of '28 just before we entered high school. We have missed you very much and are sorry that it was necessary for you to leave our town and school. Of course, I suppose by this time, you are feeling loyal to the school that you are now attending, but I don't believe that I am far wrong in presupposing that you would like to know just what your former classmates have been doing since you left.

On September 10, 1924, one hundred and nine of us started into the Freshman year, as carefree and as "green" as any bunch you ever saw. I don't know whether our courses of study were the same as yours or not. We were offered Algebra, English, Science, Latin, Civics, Spelling, Music, and Sewing. There were also societies in which we took an active part. Some of our members became stars in the different fields of athletics in the first year. It seemed that Luck certainly was with us every way we turned, for Miss Webster, Miss Holton, and Mr. McBane were our teachers. I suppose you could almost guess without my telling you who our class officers were, because the ones who showed qualities of leadership while you were with us were the very ones to whom the class turned for its officers. Walter Sharpe was elected president; William Bowman, vice-president; William Shoffner, secretary; and Martha Lou Stokes, treasurer. We selected "B<sup>2</sup> and BY's" as our motto with pink and white as our colors and with a pink rose as our flower. This briefly covers all that we did in our Freshman year.

All of us except those who failed in the course and those who quit school for one reason or another started on September 9, 1925, into the Sophomore year. Miss Carroll, Miss Scarborough, and Miss Shepard were our teachers that year. We went serenely on our way, laughing a little, singing a little, playing a little, working a little, and crying a little (just at the regular periods for reports). Jule Holt was our president; Sara Murray, vice-president; George Kinney, secretary; Brinson Rouse, treasurer; and Walter Sharpe, critic. We had a very full year's work and were really happy when we realized that three month's vacation was at hand.

In September, 1926, we started back into high school, renewed with vim and vigor. Miss Kernodle and Mr. Rhodes were our teachers. We organized our class this year with Goley Marlette as president; Martha Coble, vice-president; Martha Lou Stokes, secretary; John Vernon, treasurer; and Harrison Goodman, censor. ## *Intra-Mural Athletics in Burlington High School*

Burlington High School believes in clean, wholesome athletics for every student. In addition to the interscholastic sports promoted for those desiring to participate, a general physical education program includes athletic sports for all of those not capable, or inclined, to participate in the varsity sports.

This year marks the beginning of competition for a large loving cup that is to be given to the class winning it by excelling in the following sports: basketball for boys and girls, track and field athletics for boys, tennis singles and doubles for boys and girls, baseball for boys, volleyball for boys, and a general physical ability test for boys and girls which is based primarily on the best motor ability tests that have been provided to date.

Each sport, including the physical ability test, in which the classes compete for the cup carries a total of seventy points. For winning first place, 25 points are awarded; for second place, 20 points are awarded; for third place, 15 points are awarded; for fourth place, 10 points are awarded. The highest grand total points at the end of the year determines which class will be entitled to keep the cup for the ensuing year and put numerals on it. The cup will remain permanently at the school.

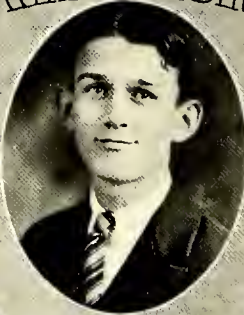

## *The Senior Hi-Y Social*

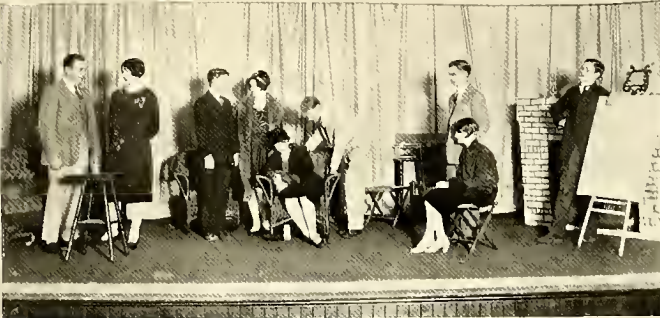
