It was decided to change the colors to purple and gold and the flower to a violet. We have stars in athleties and in dramaties. The band, orchestra, and glee club could scarcely exist without some of the Juniors.

And the best is yet to come! The Junors gave a banquet to the Seniors that will not soon be forgotten. On the evening of February 1t, the Junior and Senior boys and girls, all looking their best, went to the Hotel Alamance and spent an enjorable evening. Red and white, the Senior class colors, were used as color motif. The program was well arranged and well carried out, and, frankly, I don't believe any future class can surpass the class of ' 28 .

I could write a book on what the Junior class has done, is doing, and will do; but I suppose 1 had hetter wait and let the future take care of itself.
