Junior Class History

September 10, 1925, the School Board issued a call for recruits to train for the first Crusade, to conquer High School. The Recruits started their training with Miss Webster, Miss Holton, Mr. Rhodes, and Mr. McBain as Generals. They elected as their Colonel, Carlos Pennington; their Lieutenant-Colonel, John Whitley; and their Major, Helen Fowler. During this period the recruits were drilled in the fundamentals of learning and athletics. The discipline proved to be too intense for some, and they fell out, giving up the attempt to conquer Latin, Algebra, English, Civics, and Science. For nine long months they trained for this Crusade. At the end of this time they were given a furlough of three months.

Those who survived returned from their furlough and were promoted to the rank of private. Their Generals this year were Miss Webster, Miss McQuarie, Miss Carroll, Miss Shepard, Miss Kernodle, Mr. Osborne, and Mr. Leonard. The privates elected as their Colonel, John Whitley; as their Lieutenant-Colonel, Frank Holt; as Major, Harold Trollinger. Under these efficient leaders the privates accomplished much in the second year of High School. All the clubs in High School were beneficially influenced by the work of the privates. They were also very active in athletics. Many members won varsity letters and others made the varsity squads. The privates also ran a close third in the Inter-Class Athletic Contest. At the end of this training in scholarship, club work, and athletics, the privates were given another three months furlough.

September 4, 1927 the privates returned so thoroughly experienced that they were immediately given a rating of Corporal in the Army of the Burlington High School. This year they had as their Generals Miss Shepard, Miss Kernodle, and Mr. Rhodes. The Corporals elected as their Colonel, Allen Mebane; as Lieutenant-Colonel, Carlos Pennington; as Major, Edwina Laws; and as Captain, Sam Warlick. With these leaders they have accomplished much in scholarship, club work, and athletics.

The Junior Party was held on Hallowe'en night, October 30, 1927. This proved to be a very enjoyable event and helped to provide the funds for the Junior-Senior Banquet.

The next achievement of the Corporals was the Junior-Senior Banquet held March 9, 1928 at the Fisher Street School. In the opinion of the Corporals, this banquet was one of the best ever held and every one seemed to enjoy the occasion.

Many Corporals have received varsity letters, and they are planning to win the Inter-Class Cup.

The Corporals had a very successful year and they are looking forward to their furlough of three months so that they may return next September to be fully commissioned officers in the Army of the Burlington High School.

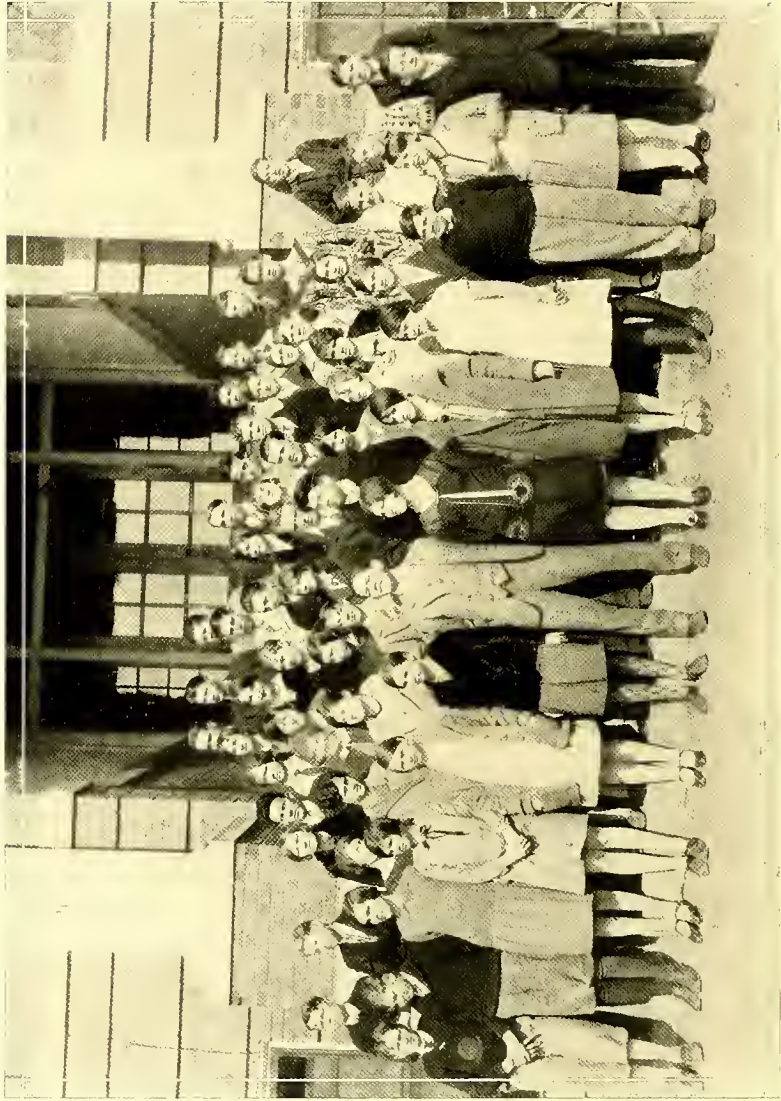

History of the Sophomore Class

On September 8, 1926, the submarine "Ambition," with one hundred and twelve passengers, began its journey from the thickly populated City of Ignorance to the growing City of Knowledge through the Ocean of High School. The Chief Engineers for the first quarter were Misses Webster and Glasson and Mr. Osborne. The passengers elected Charles Holt, Captain; Dorothy Sellars, First Mate; Fletcher Moore, Log Keeper; and Ethel Qualls, Purser. The waves of Biology, Algebra, Latin, History and English again took their toll. Even though we were well organized and guided, some of our passengers took the terrible disease called detention room slips.

"It will not be long before we shall have another three months of fair weather and calm sea," says the weather prophet. After these three months, we are going to go into port before starting on our third voyage across the great Ocean of High School.

Intra-Mural Athletics in Burlington High School

Last year Burlington High School, always a believer in clean, wholesome athletics for every student, renewed her interest in inter-class competition in order to enable all those incompetent for varsity interscholastic games to participate in a general physical education program which included the varsity sports.

The Kiwanis Club of Burlington entered whole-heartedly into the plan and donated a large loving cup which was for the first time won by the Senior Class of 1927. To win the cup a class must excel in a scored majority of sports such as the following: basketball for boys and girls; track and field events for boys; tennis singles and doubles for boys and girls; league and indoor ball for boys; volleyball for boys; hockey for girls, and a general physical ability test for boys and girls. The physical ability test is based primarily on the best motor ability tests that have been provided to date.

Each respective sport carries a total score of seventy points. For first place 25 points are awarded; for second place 20 points; for third place 15 points; and for fourth place ten points. The class having the highest grand total at the end of the year will be entitled to keep the cup for the following year and can put its numerals on it. The cup will remain permanently in the school.
