OUR PAST

1934.

In the fall of 1934 two hundred fifty-four pupils entered the country of Burlington High School, declaring war on ignorance. The war was to be divided into four major battles, each battle to be on a different battlefield.

The first major battle was on the freshman battlefield, lasting from September until May. The officers elected were: President, Jack Faucette; Vice President, Gladys Gammon; Secretary and Treasurer, Earl King, with the aid of staff officers Superintendent H. M. Roland and Principal C. E. Buckner. These officers were to govern our movements during the first battle. Two of our privates, Glenna Teer and Marjorie Hunter, were promoted to the *Barker* Staff, another, Elwood Pearce, to the Annual Staff. Just a few days before Christmas a few of our members were granted a furlough to attend a party at the home of Miss Sara Trollinger. In the spring another group was given a furlough to attend a party with Billy Walters as host. In May after a very beneficial year, the Know-it-all freshmen were granted a truce of four months to prepare for the coming major battle that was to take place on the Sophomore battlefield.

1935.

In the fall of the year 1935 two hundred sixteen students returned to begin the second major battle in the war on ignorance to take place on the Sophomore battlefield, with the following officers: President, Gladys Gammon; Vice President, Jack Faucette; Secretary, Mary Elizabeth Hanner; and Treasurer, Kenneth Tacker, with a new principal, E. C. Leonard, to aid them. With a loss of thirty from our ranks we were smaller in number but more determined than ever to gain our victory over ignorance. Our members of the *Barker* Staff were Marjorie Hunter and Oakel Barton with Juanita Owens on the Annual Staff. Many of the "privates" were elected to the ranks of Latin Clubs and Dramatic Clubs. During the Book Week Festival we presented the elected to the original play, "Caesar Bringing Cleopatra to Rome," written and directed by Mrs. W. Albert Graham and Rebecca Lighthourne, and we won first and second prizes for the most artistic costume and largest cast. The most important social of that campaign was a trip to the home of one of our teachers to see his collection of foreign articles. This trip was educational and entertaining. In May this battle was over. The sophomores had gained much ground against ignorance. A second truce was declared to recuperate and prepare for the third major battle.

1936.

In the fall of 1936 we came back again, this time on the Junior battlefield, to engage in our third battle with one hundred eighty-eight members in our rank. Our officers were: President, Dexter Collins; Vice President, James Cross; Secretary, Mack Leath, and Treasurer, Pearl Waynick. To aid them our staff officers were new superintendent L. E. Spikes and E. C. Leonard, our principal. Our army became very important to Burlington High School for many of our members were elected to various organizations. Ty Cobb Alexander, Margaret Anthony, Marjorie Ball, Marjorie Hunter, Glenna Teer, Sara Frances Trollinger, Joyce Black, and Millicent Moore were elected to the Honor Society, the highest honor our school can confer. To the Annual Staff Royal Spence and Marjorie Hunter were added. Mr. P. L. Irvin organized a Hi-Y with three of our members, Jimmy Lighthourne, Elwood Pearce and Worth Coble charter members. Efficient in their work on the *Barker* Staff were Virginia Fowler, Mary Fowler, Hilda Somers and Nancy Walker. Our Cheer Leaders were Catherine Evans and Nancy Walker. In the fall of this battle the Juniors witnessed and took part in the first Social Standards Conference. Some of the privates were granted a furlough to attend a party at Billy Haseman's at Christmas and a picnic at Kimesville Lake at the end of the year. The important social of this campaign was the Junior-Senior Prom which was one of the best entertainments of Burlington High School. As a reward for our work the past three years we received our class rings, which we thought were very handsome. At the end of the third campaign a truce was declared so the soldiers could prepare for the fourth and final battle.

1937.

In the fall of 1937 we came back to the Senior battlefield to begin the fourth and final major battle on ignorance with one hundred and seventy-eight members in our ranks. Our officers were: President, James Cross; Vice President, Glenn Pickard; Secretary, Mack Leath; Treasurer, Royal Spence, with the aid of the staff officers Superintendent L. E. Spikes and the new principal, F. M. Biggerstaff, who were to guide us through this battle.

Many of our privates were outstanding in sports this year, especially football and basketball. Quite a few of our privates were elected to the various organizations, with Moeile Day, Editor-in-Chief of the Annual, Hilda Somers, Editor-in-Chief of the *Barker*, and Dexter Collins, President of the Student Council. The Social Standards Conference was one of our most outstanding victories with the Seniors taking an active part. A most beautiful achievement was the Christmas pageant in which our privates worked very hard and presented for the students and public an artistic and inspiring program. Twelve more of our privates achieved the most coveted honor: membership in the Honor Society; these worthy privates were: Edith Riggsbee, Moeile Day, Inez Malone, Doris Fonville, Worth Coble, Francis Atwater, Helen Rudd, Mozelle Pennington, Hilda Somers, Royal Spence, Hazel Handy, and Hope Patterson. Our Mascots were Brodie Hood, Jr., and Jane Austin. As we come to the end of this war with all eyes turned toward Victory, "Commencement," we hope that every member of our ranks will attain the goal, his sheepskin, and none fall by the wayside.

To sum up this war of four years on ignorance: It has not been won by outstanding events but by patiently sticking to our guns. It would have been impossible for us to accomplish what we have done, had it not been for the untiring efforts and love of all the faculty members of Burlington High School for which we are indeed very grateful.

ATHLETIC RESUME

Burlington High School Athletics improved for the year 1937-38 due to two things: the addition of two new coaches and the reinstallation of Girls Basketball and Golf for girls. The two new coaches are Blaney G. Rackley, head football coach, and Hoyt T. Hambright, head basketball coach. These two men with John O. Reynolds, baseball coach, give a coach for each of the major sports.

The Girls Basketball, the first for five years, under the direction of John O. Reynolds, had 75 girls out for practice, 25 of whom remained out the entire season. Only two games were won, but the progress of the first year was gratifying, and another year the B. H. S. girls should have excellent teams.

Golf for girls is planned for the spring, with some 6 or 8 matches scheduled.

Coach Rackley did a fine job as football coach. Burlington was one of the two teams to score upon the State championship Reidsville team.

Coach Hambright with only two experienced players from the '37 team built a fine squad which was barely nosed out in the finals of Western District one in the State race by defending State champion, Pilot Mountain. His team won

the first Burlington Invitational Basketball Tournament by defeating a fine team from Hillsboro in the finals.

The inauguration of the Burlington High School Basketball Tournament in which 21 teams participated, was one of the highlights of the Athletic season. Prospect Hill Girls won the girls division from Liberty, who defeated Burlington girls in the semifinals.

The baseball team of 1937 failed to reach Chapel Hill for the first time in four years, but had a successful season. The squad for 1938 promises to be one of the best Burlington has had. The 1938 schedule will include a two-day trip to Roanoke Rapids for two games.

Coach Percy Cooper with the assistance of Coach Rackley developed a good boxing squad. The Bulldogs won decisions from Durham and Cary, and lost a one-point decision to Fayetteville in two matches.

Coach Pete Garrett's Soccer team again won the county championship, but lost out in the State race.

The Golf team for 1938 has several matches scheduled. Granville Sharpe of the 1937 team lost out in the State tournament by one stroke.

The Tennis team had a good season in 1937 and plans several meets for 1938.
