Our Past

1941 . . .

For two hundred and fifty boys and girls 1941 was the beginning of a long and happy adventure. We had arrived—high school at last. No longer, in our eyes were we children, but we were on the long road that leads to adulthood. Perhaps in spite of this conviction, we were a little scared deep down inside of what lay ahead of us. The coming vacation in the spring brought to a close a year filled with memories of lessons and games and that never-to-be-forgotten Junior-Senior Prom.

The year has drawn to a close, marred only by a group of our boys leaving for the armed forces of our country. Then the Senior prom, class day, banquet, are over and we are receiving those hard-earned diplomas. No longer will we greet the halls of old B.H.S., but we will face the battles of life ahead with no turning back. Due to the ideals implanted within us by our school, we can look ahead with a clear vision, with no reason for turning back. Au-revoir—dear alma mater—our hopes and dreams will always be with you.

HONOR SOCIETY

The first high school honor society was the Phi Beta Sigma, organized in Chicago, in 1903, under the direction of Dr. William B. Owen. The organization still exists as a separate society with rules and regulations very similar to those of the National Honor Society.

Outscored 25-0 in the first half, the Bulldogs, led by John Cashion and Jim Burns, came back with a flourish of power to run the Durham team ragged, doing everything but scoring.

Sanford, the first home game, was likewise spotted a few points. But this time we got a few points ourselves. A long pass from Fred Miller to Nick Long did the trick. Soon after, Andy Glenn caught another pass, giving us the ball game 12-6. Line play was sparked by Bud Jackson and Clarence Pickard

Encouraged by this victory, the Bulldogs went to High Point with the determination to win. With Miller tearing up the Bison line, it was all Burlington the first quarter. After that, the game was practically an even match with High Point getting the breaks to win 20-6. Playing his best game of the year Robert Mitchell led the B.H.S. defense. Following this game, the Bulldogs traveled to Mt. Airy where they played bang-up ball despite the absence of several regular players. With sub Donnell Bain leading the offense they scored the first touchdown made against Mt. Airy in the entire year. Although the home





The girls met once a week, in the classroom, for four months to discuss boy-girl relationships. A great deal was gained by these meetings.







Thus ended an ideal (?) day at B.H.S.




