

In September 1943, about three hundred students embarked on a four-year flight in the super-airship, Burlington High School. Our destination: Graduation, to be reached after much shedding of blood, sweat and tears. Our pilot on the first leg of the flight was Irwin Glenn. Other offcers were: co-pilot, Ed Ballard; hostess, Barbara White; and navigator, Earl Massey. Directing the trip were Superintendent L. E. Spikes, Principal James A. Gerow, and the high school faculty.

Highlights of the year were the Victory Corps and WBHS, our radio program presided over by master-of-ceremonies James A. (Harry James) Gerow. The going began to get tough for several passengers, who either got off at the first stop or parachuted to earth between fields. The majority, however, were resolved to see it through and to receive the reward, a sheepskin to be presented to each passenger at the final landing-field.

In the fall of 1944, after a long and much-needed rest, about two hundred seventy students returned to continue the trip. This time the pilot was Ed Ballard, and the other officers were Barbara Mangum, Mary Elizabeth Lindley, and C. T. Foster. We sometimes didn't quite know whether we were sophomores or juniors, as we had sophomore subjects and junior activities. Our trip was made sad during this year by the death of our beloved cheer leader and fellow-student, Ray Jarrett. He left us on February 19, 1945.

In the spring sixteen of our members were inducted into the National Honor Society and several, after a week of pain, were taken into the Hi-Y or the Monogram Club. Again Mr. Gerow's radio programs kept us laughing, although the boys did lose the battle of the sexes. (I'm sure that was an accident.) In May, after much planning under the able direction of Miss Lela Aycock, we gave the Seniors a Prom which they should long remember. Again we rested between trips, this time to come back as Juniors in the Senior chapel seats.

Back again, and didn't we feel big! There was no one to be looked up to by underclassmen except our class. Whoops! Our balloon was suddenly deflated by loads of homework. This was to be a year of work. There was no Prom, no Move-up Day, and no DOE-WAH-JACK.

Student Council officers included Irwin Glenn as president and Max Isley as vice president. We were proud to receive our class rings, and there was plenty of time to lose them before graduation. Editor of the *Barker* was John Howard Sykes; and athletic stars of our class included Bill Barger, Earl Wrightenberry, and Bud Pickard in football and Herman Mason, Max Isley, Bill Johnston, and Bill Aldridge in basketball. In June we began our vacation before the last lap of the journey.


In September 1946, two hundred thirty students boarded the plane for the destination. Our officers were Mary Elizabeth Lindley, Ed Ballard, Marion Chapman, and Ruth Simpson. President of the Student Council was Bill Aldridge and vice president was Jimmy Sartin. Our new principal was Mr. C. C. Linnemann. We really had a top-notch football team, Bobby Stutts making All-Southern and Nick Long playing in the Shrine game at Charlotte. The editor of the *Barker* was Marian Tickle and of the DOE-WAH-JACK, Barbara White. Dick Barnwell was National Honor Society president, and Curtis Jordan was president of the Hi-Y.

Toward the end of the year time seems to fly. The Prom, Move-up Day, and Class Day pass; and we are at last at Commencement. Goodbye to B.H.S. It's been a swell trip!
