

INTRODUCTORY.



IN BEGINNING the collection of these notes in 1869 the Author's only thought was to trace his own line of descent, but as the task advanced he became interested in other branches of the family, and these have been more or less completely followed out.

It is to be regretted that some one of the past generation, when there were so many still living whose memories reached back of the Revolutionary period, did not undertake the task. That it could then have been more successfully accomplished is plain, and much of interest relating to the Revolutionary and Colonial experience of our ancestors would have been preserved to us.

The discovery and early settlement of this country is justly regarded as one of the greatest events in the world's history, and in view of the vast immigration of the past half century, those of the present generation who can trace their lineage back to that period may well feel an honorable pride in their ability to do so. Those of our name now in the United States have come for the most part from the Newbury settlers who came with other colonists from England to Massachusetts Bay about the middle of the seventeenth century, whence their descendants scattered at an early time to New Hampshire, Vermont and Connecticut, and again later from those States to other parts of the Union.*

They were of Puritan stock, and in character were doubtless like those with whom they came.† They shared with their neighbors in the hardships and trials incident to those early times, and we know from tradition, as well as from their affiliations, that they feared God, loved their country and were respected. So far as I have learned, no one of the name became pre-eminent during the Colonial period, but later, in the time of the Revolutionary War, three at least achieved considerable fame. Chief of these was Dr. Eliphalet Downer, of Brookline, Mass., who was known as "the fighting surgeon." His encounter with a sturdy Briton, who was returning from Bunker Hill, and his subsequent career as a surgeon on a privateer, made him famous. (See ¹⁷²Eliphalet.) Another was John Downer, of Bennington, whose fame as a skillful marksman won him a place in local history. (See ²¹⁵⁹John.) Still another was Silas Downer, of Providence, who used his gifts as an orator in protesting against British aggression and gained an honored mention in the annals of his adopted State and

These dissenters were of two kinds—the Pilgrims, who were separatists, and who, after some years of exile in Holland, landed at Plymouth, and the Puritans, who, under Winthrop and others, settled the towns upon Massachusetts Bay.

city. (See ²¹⁴Silas.) Nor were these all. History tells us that when the affairs of Lexington and Concord occurred, great excitement ensued throughout New England. Couriers were dispatched everywhere, alarming the people and summoning them "to the relief of Boston." Among those who responded to the call were several of the name of Downer. They gathered with their neighbors, armed as each man was best able, and hastened to Boston, where some of them remained to join the first army of the war, which was organized by General Washington in that city in July, 1775. (For names see appendix.) Passing by the 1812 and Mexican wars, in which several of our name were volunteers, and coming down to the conflict between the States, we find that not a few of the descendants of these Revolutionary sires were quick to answer President Lincoln's call in 1860 for help to repel the attack on the integrity of the Union, and many of them gave their lives to preserve their national heritage. Among them was one whole family in Vermont, consisting of a father, two sons and two sons-in-law, all of whom responded to the call. (See ¹³⁶²Rockwell C.) But what of our kindred in the South who opposed? For them we have no word of censure. They were not less brave than were their brethren at the North, nor less patriotic as they understood patriotism. Indeed, Georgia furnishes a notable example of this in a family consisting of the father, born in 1799, and his six sons, all of whom were volunteers in the Confederate service and followed its fortunes to the end. (See ¹⁵⁴⁰John of Elberton.) Who shall say our nation is not safe in the keeping of such true men?

Since the Revolutionary War our numbers have so increased and scattered that descendants of the old stock—more than two thousand in number—may be found in almost every important locality of the land. Individual members have become honorably prominent in their respective communities, two or three towns and one institution of learning* bear the family name, and we have kept pace with others in contributing to the wonderful growth of this great nation.

In bringing his work to a close the author realizes that it has been imperfectly accomplished. This has been caused—first, by the limited time he has been able to devote to it; second, by the scantiness of town and church records; and, third, the very great difficulty experienced in obtaining records and help from private sources. It is offered in the hope that some one else, with more opportunity, will undertake a revision before the present generation shall have entirely passed away.

Care has been taken to guard against errors, but some will doubtless be discovered. Of these the author desires to be notified.

EARLY HISTORY.



THE Newbury (Mass.) Downers previous to their coming to this country, about 1650, lived near the city of Salisbury (possibly in the vicinity of Downton), Wiltshire, England. This statement is based on a tradition in the author's own branch of the family, which is confirmed by the historical fact that both Newbury and Salisbury, Mass., were settled by colonists from Wiltshire, and by the fact that the name is still quite common in that part of England.*

We can learn nothing from the published passenger lists of the name of the ship on which our ancestors came to America. This, however, is not surprising, as Hotten in his lists of emigrants (1600 to 1700) states that ships left England almost daily and no record of their passenger lists can be found. He adds that thousands changed their names and destination to escape the stringent laws which impelled them to leave their home.

The name of Downer is Anglo-Saxon (see Lower's English surnames) and originated in the fact that those to whom it was first given had their home in the "Downs" in the south of England. As surnames were not introduced into England until the time of the Norman conquest, in 1066, we may assume that the name does not antedate that event.

That our ancestors in the fourteenth century were land owners of more or less importance may be inferred from the

fact that an English law of that period required all freeholders to adopt family arms; and works on heraldry describe two such belonging to those of our name. (See Burke's Heraldry.) These arms, or escutcheons, became the family insignia and were put to various uses, such as being affixed to legal documents as seals, &c.

There is reason to believe that during the period of the disturbances in England in Cromwell's time (say 1643 to 1653) the family were more or less scattered; some of them came to this country, others went up into Scotland, where the name is not uncommon at the present time; and others sought refuge in Ulster, in the north of Ireland, whence representatives of the name have come to this country during the present century.

A manuscript written in 1790 by ⁷¹²Joseph Downer gives the history of his own branch of the family as follows:

"In the persecutions against the Huguenots, Hannah Vincent, from Paris, France, made her escape together with her brother, a Protestant preacher, to England, where she soon after married Robert Downer. They had two sons, Robert and Joseph. In the time of Cromwell's war Joseph came to Newbury in Massachusetts Bay and settled. He married Mary Knight of that place, by whom he had two sons, Joseph and Andrew. Joseph (2d) left Newbury and came to Norwich where he married Hannah Grafton.

This account, it must be remembered, was written about one hundred and forty years after the coming of the first Joseph to this country, and it bears evidence of having been based on tradition. If the date of the persecution referred to be fixed approximately at the time of the massacre of St. Bartholomew in 1572 (the later persecutions which raged so violently in France from 1666 to 1685 are hardly to be considered) it would appear that a whole generation had been left out of the story, and that Hannah Vincent was more likely to have been the *grandmother*, than the mother of Joseph.

The town of Newbury was first settled in 1635. Later, some of the people formed a new settlement two miles distant, and called it Salisbury, after the English town whence they came.

The name of Robert Downer appears early at Salisbury. He had previously been of Newbury and was doubtless the

brother of Joseph. The names of Moses and Mary Downer also are mentioned in the early Newbury town records. They doubtless were related to Robert and Joseph, but just how is not clear. Joseph remained at Newbury, married, acquired considerable property and died there. The earliest record of him which has been discovered, is in "Emery's Petition," the date of which is probably 1658, where he is classed among minors living with their parents and servants. (See p. 274 N. E. Reg. for 1854.)

Robert's name, or that of his son Robert, is frequently found on the Salisbury land records up to 1719, after which the name disappears altogether. On May 2, 1692, during the time of the witchcraft excitement, he was a witness at the Susanna Martin trial. The poor woman was condemned as a witch and hung. On the 22d of July following, his wife Sarah joined him in signing a petition in favor of Mrs. Bradbury, another witch, who was also condemned to die, but for some reason the sentence was not carried out and she went free. The Newbury records show that Robert was a member of a military company at Newbury, and took the oath of allegiance to the King October 22, 1677. Joseph took the same in 1678 at Newbury. The records also give Joseph's tax list for 1684 and 1685, by which it appears that in addition to his town and county tax he was assessed 9s and 9d, in the former year, for "the support of Mr. Richardson for preaching." In 1708 he paid a tax of 8s for the same purpose, and out of a list of 347 persons likewise taxed, but 59 paid as much or a larger sum. This shows that he was in comparatively good circumstances. He was a member of the Newbury church previous to 1674, and in the new meeting house built in 1700 he occupied the "first seat west," and his son Joseph, with his growing family, "the fourth seat north." In 1686 Joseph, Sr., had a lot of 15½ acres laid out to him by the town, and this is the earliest Downer land date found. In 1701 he sold his son Andrew 4 acres of land on Plum Island. In 1710 John Bartlett gave to Andrew Downer, his "loving kinsman who for some time dwelt with him," a deed of the 59th lot of 30 acres next the Bradford Road." In 1713 Andrew Downer, mason,

bought for £31 a lot of marsh land from the widow of John March, which formerly belonged to Robert Downer. This may have been the same "marsh land" which on the 26th of March, 1686, Robert Downer, house carpenter, had bought for £10 silver money, from Nathaniel Clark, cordwainer, of Newbury.

It seems probable that Joseph the elder died at Newbury in 1715, for on November 15th of that year "Joseph Downer, yeoman, for £18, sold to Anthony Morse, Jr., cooper, a wood lot, the 43d lot in the first division, being two miles twenty rods in length and three rods in breadth;" also to the same, on the 15th of the following month, "for £5, freehold right and privilege, in ye common and undivided lands in Newbury;" also rate rights granted to his father. These last two acts evidently marked the final closing up of his father's estate, and he probably used his share of the proceeds in the purchase, on May 5th following, of farm land in Norwich. He without doubt had gone there some time before, as the birth of his son Caleb, in 1710, is the last one of his children found recorded at Newbury. His brother Andrew remained at Newbury, where his descendants are recorded for some generations.*

From Newbury and Salisbury members of the family went at an early period to other parts of Massachusetts, also to Vermont, New Hampshire and Connecticut, whence later their descendants migrated to all parts of the country. It is not improbable that one or more of them may have gone even to Virginia and North Carolina, and became the progenitors of the numerous families of Downers now living in the South.

We have but little information concerning Robert and his children. The family apparently died out, and all traces of them, beyond the first generation at Salisbury, is lost. As to Joseph and his sons, thanks to the notes left by ⁷¹²Joseph, we have positive information and are able to trace their lines

*On page 348 of Currier's "Ould Newbury" may be found a description of the land occupied by Joseph Downer, the title of which had come from the proprietors of the town. The same book contains a map made in 1729, which shows that the road leading from Newbury to Indian Hill was called "Downer's Lane," and house No. 146, next to the line which separates the East and West Parishes, was then occupied by Andrew Downer, son of Joseph.

with comparative ease and certainty. Joseph (2d) married Hannah Grafton at Newbury about 1692, and removed to Norwich, Conn., where he became a landholder in 1716.

The Norwich records show that Jonathan (probably ¹⁵²John), Joseph's second son, who then would have been twenty-one years of age, was admitted a resident of the town in 1716. Samuel was admitted in 1721 and Andrew on some date previous to 1723. The three were doubtless brothers and the sons of Joseph.

That Joseph's sons were stirring men, who shared in the activities of the associates, as the Norwich settlers were called, is evident from the number of deeds on record in which their names appear as grantees and grantors.

The local history of the town says that "at that time to be admitted a resident of the town carried with it a certain dignity, and it was considered a guarantee of respectability." It is related, however, that one bearing our family name—a certain John Downer—grievously failed to live up to the high standard set by the citizen rulers of the town. He had the temerity to go after oysters with a companion on a Sabbath day, and both, on July 12, 1738, were summoned before the good Justice Huntington and fined five shillings and costs for profaning the Sabbath. But John, it appears, was not the only offender against the religious sense of the community in which he lived, for we read that the same Justice fined a young woman a similar amount for failing to attend church on the 24th day of September following.

The history also states that a general fever for migration to other parts of the country seized the good people of Norwich during the early stages of its existence. Indeed, the same might be said of the people of the whole State of Connecticut at that time. They scattered everywhere, and it was natural that the younger and more active members of the Downer family should have shared in the prevailing temper and set about finding new homes for themselves. For the second time in the family's short American experience there seems to have been a general breaking up and migration to other parts; some

went from Norwich to other sections of the State; others to New Hampshire and Vermont, whither relatives and neighbors from Newbury, Mass., had some time before gone, and another (¹⁵⁴Samuel) went to Elizabethtown, N. J., to which place we are told that "many Puritans from Connecticut," and also a colony of Newbury (Mass.) people had preceded him.

NUMBERING.

The system of numbering, for convenience in tracing a name, will be found simple. Numbers are given consecutively to each Downer name in the book, except that in a few cases, where names were sent in too late, the number is omitted. Large numbers are placed before the head of the family, and the small numbers over a name immediately following, denote the father's name, thus: 154 Samuel of Norwich (¹³Joseph) indicates that the latter was father of the former.

THE + MARK.

The + mark following a name indicates that the name is taken up again in a future part of the work.

OLD DATES.

To render the old style of dating into the new style, ten days should be added to all dates back of 1700 and eleven days to all dates between 1700 and 1752.

GENEALOGICAL.



ROBERT DOWNER and wife, Hannah Vincent, of Wiltshire, England, had two sons, Robert and Joseph. The sons both evidently came to Newbury, Mass., about 1650, although (^{1st} Joseph, see appendix) only mentions Joseph. It is probable that both Moses Downer and Mary Downer, wife of Thomas Sears (a corruption of Sayre), of Newbury, mentioned in the early Newbury records, were of the same family.

- 1 ROBERT DOWNER, house carpenter, first of Newbury and later of Salisbury (probably s or g s of Robert of Wiltshire), d at Salisbury 12 Feb, 1720-1. He m 6 May, 1675, Sarah, dau of John and Martha (Rowlandson) Eaton, of Salisbury. She b 28 Dec, 1654, and was admitted to the Salisbury church 17 Sept, 1693. Had all recorded at Salisbury.
- 2 ROBERT, b 23 July, 1676. No trace of him has been found.
- 3 MARTHA, b 1 Oct, 1678. She m 18 Oct, 1704, Richard Palmer, of Bradford. The marriage was published at Salisbury 26 Mar, 1702-3, but is found recorded at Hampton, N. H., an adjacent town, as given.
- 4 JOHN, b 1 Apl, 1681, probably same John who was admitted to the Salisbury Church 7 Apl, 1728, and who d at Salisbury 13 Apl, 1736.

THE DOWNERS IN CONNECTICUT.

NOTE.—It should be remembered that the early settlers of the present towns of Lebanon, Franklin (then West Farms), Bozrah, Lisbon and Preston were originally citizens of Norwich, these towns having been wholly or in part set off from Norwich at a later period.

13 JOSEPH DOWNER, of Newbury and Norwich ("Joseph and Mary Knight), m Hannah Grafton at Newbury in 1692. She d at Norwich (West Farms dist), 12 Oct, 1741. The land rec at Norwich show that Joseph bought land there 5 May, 1716. The deed as recorded is from John Wiborn to Joseph Downer, yeoman, of Newbury, Province of Massachusetts, and calls for 360 acres of land and buildings "situated on Middle Hill, on the Windham road, partly in Norwich and partly in Lebanon." In Oct of the same year both he and his s Joseph were among certain inhabitants of Norwich who signed a petition to the General Court at New Haven, asking that the West Farmers be set off as a distinct society, declaring that their "only motive was the flourishing of religion upon the publick institutions of which, it was scarce possible for us to attend, being from four to eight miles distant from the place of publick worship." Their petition was granted. The children of Joseph and w Hannah were:

151 + JOSEPH, b 29 Sept, 1693. He d at Franklin, 23 Nov, 1756. He was made administrator of his father's estate, and upon the death of his father came into full possession of the homestead and entire farm, except seven acres, which had been reserved to his brother Samuel, the blacksmith. The deed was made in 1721, and the consideration "love and good will." Here he lived and d, much honored by all. He was affectionately called "Deacon Downer" by his neighbors, but the Franklin church records do not show that he had been elected to the office.

- 152 JOHN, b 15 Mar, 1695. He may have been the Jonathan admitted a resident of the town in 1716, when he would have attained his majority. If this is so, ⁷¹²Joseph was in error in stating that he d at the age of 16. Possibly, however, there may have been another Jonathan, of whom we have no account.
- 153 + ANDREW, b 14 May, 1697. Probably lived for a time at Pomfret, but no rec of him found there; was made a resident of Norwich in 1723, and is referred to in the Conn. Colonial recs as living at Lebanon in 1735-38.
- 154 + SAMUEL, b 12 Apl, 1699. He was admitted a resident at Norwich in 1721. On 30 June, 1722, his father, "in consideration of ye love, good will and fatherly affection yt I have and do bare unto my well beloved son, Samuel Downer, of Norwich, and as a part of his portion of my estate, do give him seven acres of land which is in ye Middle Hill, on the southeasterly side of the highway which leadeth to Windham, partly in Norwich and partly in Lebanon, adjoining his (Samuel's) blacksmith shop." These seven acres Samuel sold, on July 22, 1727, and about the same time he bought four acres "on Wauwecos Hill, in the little plain of Norwich." This land was located in the westerly side of the town, about six miles from his old home. Here he doubtless lived until he sold the plot, in 1729. The last reference to him found at Norwich is in a list of ratables for the year 1731, after which he rem to Sunderland, Mass., near Deerfield, to which place some of his Lebanon neighbors had already gone. Later he returned to Lebanon, was living there in 1790, and d in 1797, probably at Lebanon.
- 155 + RICHARD, b 11 Feb, 1701-2. Rem to Colchester, Ct., some time after 1742.
- 156 HANNAH, b 16 Feb, 1704; probably same who m, 10 Dec, 1730; John Barrett, at Franklin (church rec.)

Probably had the following: (i) Darkis, m 18 May, 1766, Benjamin Tuell, of Providence. (ii) Mary, (probably) b at Newport, 25 Feb, 1759, d 14 Aug, 1835, m 25 Jan, 1783, Louis William Jouvett, of Paris, France, he b 13 July, 1751, probably at Paris; d at Newport, 31 Aug, 1815, had dau Susannah, 13 July, 1790, d 25 Feb, 1868, m Lewis Barlow at Newport; (iii) William, m Rachel —, had Katherine, Rachel, Ann, Rebecca, Elizabeth, all bap 7 Jan, 1770, Eliza, b 1770, Elizabeth (2) bap 7 July, 1776, and was possibly father of Esther Downer, who m at Newport, 10 Sept, 1810, William Bentley Oman.

Newport probate recs give Sarah Downer as administering estate of her late husband, John Downer, mariner, in 1763. She is also noted in census of 1774 as head of a family of one male and two females, presumably herself, William and Mary, above. (From R. I. Vital Statistics and notes furnished by Edith May Tilley, of Newport.)

- 162 + STEPHEN, bap at Franklin, 26 May, 1717. Same also found at Lebanon. He d in the fatal expedition against Havana, Cuba, 26 Aug, 1762. (Conn. Colonial Recs, Vol 2.) After his death his heirs received his share of the prize money which accrued from the government. He also may have been the same Stephen who joined a Suffolk Co (N. Y.) Reg in 1759. He is described as 5 ft 7 in. in height and of dark complexion. He also had enlisted previously in Capt. Dimock's Co, 16 July, 1755. (N. Y. State Rep, 1896.)
- 163 ELIZABETH —, b about 1719. She probably same who m, 8 Nov, 1739, Bailey Bishop. (Franklin church recs.)
- 151 *Deacon* JOSEPH, of Norwich (¹³Joseph, of Newbury, and w Hannah Grafton); m 14 Oct, 1724, Mary Sawyer, of Norwich. She d at Norwich (Franklin dist), 5 Dec, 1758, in the 54th year of her age. Both he and his w lie buried in the old Franklin burying ground. Their tombstones are in a most excellent state of

preservation, and bear the following inscriptions which are literally copied:

Here lies the body of Mr.

*The following account of Dr. Eliphalet Downer is taken in part from the Biographical Cyclopaedia of Mass., from "Brookline in the Revolutionary War," published by the Brookline Historical Soc., and from original letters furnished by his descendants:

Eliphalet Downer resided at Brookline, Mass., within a short distance of the celebrated "Punch Bowl Tavern," and became widely known as "the fighting surgeon." Major-General Heath, in his Memoirs (p. 14), describes him as "an active, energetic man," and Drake, in his History of Roxbury (p. 348), speaks of him as a skillful surgeon, but a hard, rough man. He first came into prominence on the 19th of April, 1775. The night before, Paul Revere had set out on his famous ride to notify the people that the British troops had crossed the Charles River, on their way to Lexington to seize the military stores at Concord. The people of Boston and vicinity were intensely aroused. Among the patriots from Brookline who, on the day following, volunteered to oppose the British, was Eliphalet. Accounts differ somewhat as to the part he took in the events on that day. One account states that he shouldered his musket and sallied forth on a guerilla expedition against the enemy. Meeting them on their retreat

to Boston, after the purpose of their expedition had been accomplished, he was singled out by a British soldier, who accosted him with the words, "You d——d rebel! do you dare face?" He did dare to "face," and the two approached each other in the spirit of deadly hostility. When quite near they fired simultaneously. Both missed. A hand-to-hand conflict with bayonets ensued. The soldier's gun was the longer, and his acquaintance with the bayonet exercise so familiar that the surgeon's chances of victory seemed to be very slight. Nevertheless he was equal to the emergency. Stepping backward for a few paces, he reversed his musket, and fortunately succeeded in planting a stunning blow upon the head of his adversary. The weapon was broken in his hand. Casting it aside, the doctor seized the soldier's musket and ran him through with his own bayonet. The triumph only whetted his appetite for further achievement, and when, at night, he related his experience, he added: "It was not ten minutes before I got another shot."

Another statement is that while the Doctor was passing a dwelling house during the afternoon, two British soldiers ran out toward him. Just then one of the men was shot from behind, and the Doctor and the other man exchanged shots; both missed, although they were but a few feet apart. This exasperated the Doctor, who rushed at the Red-Coat with his gun, and in the scuffle which ensued his opponent was killed. Once during the same afternoon he came upon a British soldier lying in a barn. The Doctor asked him if he wanted his wound dressed, but the man, seizing his gun, rolled over and exclaimed: "Damn yer, I'll dress yer wound for yer!" The Doctor would probably have been killed but for the presence of a friend, who stepped forward and shot the man as he was taking aim.

During the siege of Boston the Doctor received his appointment as army surgeon. He was with the army there, going from point to point wherever there was fighting. Gen. Heath, under date Dec. 18, 1775 (see p. 32, Memoirs), wrote: "Our General was ordered to prosecute the work

he became prominent before and during the Revolutionary period. He became a land owner there Oct 30, 1758, was admitted a Freeman in 1759, and was honored by being "made a citizen" at the May (1779) Session. The earliest public mention of him is in the "Acts and Resolves," Feb, 1761. It is there stated that "for copying several letters from the Governor, writing warrants to call the Assembly, and making billeting rolls for the year 1757," he was paid £34 9s. In 1763 he was librarian of the Providence Library. In October of the same year he advertised the fact that his office was in the new house which he had built, and being about moving in, he was "prepared to do all kinds of writings with the utmost fidelity effect and accuracy," and would give advice gratis in reference to difficult and intricate contracts, provided the writings were done in his office.

In 1764 he is referred to as being one of the four leading lawyers of Providence County, who signed a card printed in the Providence *Gazette*, notifying such of their clients as were entitled to executions on judgment to apply to the clerk of the court, and take out the same; paying down the bill of costs to him, "for it cannot be expected that besides being out of our fees we can afford to pay any more money for recovering other men's debts."

In August, 1765, at a special town meeting, Silas was appointed one of a committee to draft instructions to the town's representatives in the General Assembly in opposition to the Stamp Act. On the 7th of the same month the Sons of Liberty dedicated a "Liberty tree," from a summer house of which he delivered a patriotic address, which was

begun at Leechmore Point (one of the defenses of Boston). It was expected to have been a bloody day, and Doctor Downer was ordered down, with a detachment of 300 men, with his instruments, &c., to assist the wounded."

Fighting was in perfect harmony with the surgeon's tastes. Soon after the evacuation of Boston by the British he enlisted as surgeon in the first or second privateer fitted out in New England. The naval warfare which followed was rewarded by the capture of so many prizes that the supply of prize crews to the captured vessels seriously endangered the safety of the captors. The number of prisoners far exceeded that of the privateers' crews. It is said that while on board the sloop "Yankee" he worked one of the guns in the cabin below, when two sloops loaded with rum and sugar were captured. The number of prisoners taken exceeded the number of the privateersman's crew. An insurrection followed, and the captors in turn became the captives. Our accounts of this affair are

published, and a copy is preserved by the R. I. Hist. Soc. He was afterwards appointed one of a commission to revise the laws of the Colony, and their work resulted in the Digest of 1767.

In the *Gazette*, May 2, 1767, he contributed an article urging the building of a public market. The site he selected was "the town lot near the Bridge." The building which was the outcome of his article was finished in 1773, is still in existence and in use by the Board of Trade. Mr. Downer was clerk of the R. I. Council of War in 1777, and as such signed official documents. There are many public papers written by him on file at Providence, the chirography of which is wonderfully clear and distinct, and the language well chosen. His record is a good one, and it is unpleasant to record that after the war he became unfortunately "involved" at Providence and went to Georgia. Later he visited his brother Samuel at Elizabethtown, N. J., and d at Roxbury, as above.

somewhat confused, but it appears that Dr. Downer and his associates were carried as prisoners to Halifax, thence to England, where he was thrown into prison. He was, however, soon removed to become a hospital assistant, and in the course of a year escaped into France. He afterward joined the "Alliance" for a cruise in the English Channel. She secured 18 prizes. He subsequently sailed for home, but was again captured at sea after the vessel he was in had fought seven and a half hours, lost both her masts, and fired her last round. He was severely wounded by grape shot and thrown into Portsea Prison, near Portsmouth, from which he and several others made their escape by tunneling a hole forty feet in length under the prison walls, their only tool being a jack knife. It seems that the surgeon was stout, and unfortunately stuck fast in the passage, and was not relieved until more earth had been removed. Some of the fugitives were retaken and sent back to the "black hole," but the Doctor found friends, among them a Mr. William Downer and Mr. Thomas Wren, who

aided them in reaching France. He afterwards entered into service with the famous John Paul Jones on the "Bon Homme Richard."

In many of the battles of that redoubtable hero, Dr. Downer acted as surgeon, and in others as volunteer with the title of surgeon.* His experiences were varied and exciting. On two occasions he was captured by the British and was imprisoned, once at Dartmoor and once in the Forten Prison, at London, but from both ingeniously effected his escape.

During the whole of Dr. Downer's three years' absence from home his wife received but one letter from him. Anxiety about his welfare was aggravated by domestic distress. The half-pay order he had left with her, through some informality, turned out to be valueless. Their family consisted of three sons, between the ages of four and ten years, and of one daughter. How to obtain necessary food was a question that awakened great anxiety. Not infrequently the mother did not know whence the next meal was to come. The boys did the best they could, and by

catching pigeons in nets, scooping smelts out of the brooks, and raising strawberries for the officers who were sick in the hospitals at Boston, contributed to the needful supplies. In the solitary letter from the absent husband and father that reached his struggling family he complained of the cruel and inhuman treatment of the American prisoners confined in the Forten Prison, and added: "It is a little better since they have heard of the surrender of Burgoyne." His own sufferings were augmented by a severe wound, inflicted while directing the operations of a gun pointed out of a cabin window. "A grape-shot," he stated, "broke my arm so badly that the bone projected beyond the flesh; but it is better now."

The *Massachusetts Spy* of August 21, 1777, contains "the deposition of Eliphalet Downer, surgeon, taken in the Yankee privateer," which exhibits in vivid and forceful style some of his experiences while in the hands of the British, and which runs as follows:

"That after he was made prisoner by Captains Ross and Hodge, who

took the advantage of the generous conduct of Captain Johnson of the confidence he placed in them, in consequence of that conduct and their assurances he and his countrymen were closely confined, yet assured that on their arrival in port they should be set at liberty, and these assurances were repeated in the most solemn manner; instead of which, on their approach to land they were, in hot weather of August, shut up in a small cabin, the windows of which were spiked down and no air admitted, inso-much that they were all in danger of suffocation from the excessive heat. Three or four days after their arrival in the River Thames they were relieved from this situation in the middle of the night, hurried on board a tender and sent down to Sheerness, where the deponent was put into the 'Ardent,' and there falling sick of a violent fever, in consequence of such treatment, and languishing in that situation for some time, he was removed, still sick, to the 'Mars,' and notwithstanding repeated petitions to be suffered to be sent to prison on shore, he was detained until, having the appearance of mortification in his legs, he was sent to Hester Hospital, from whence, after recovering his health, he had the good fortune to make his escape. While on board those ships he was informed and believes that many of his countrymen, after experiencing even worse treatment than he,

The foregoing was only one of several depositions, and gave rise to a highly characteristic correspondence between Benjamin Franklin and S. Dean and Lord Viscount Stormont, at Paris. It is dated April 2, 1778. The American representatives "take the liberty of sending copies of certain depositions which," they add, "we shall transmit to Congress, whereby it will be known to your Court that the United States are not unacquainted with the barbarous treatment their people receive when they have the misfortune of being your prisoners here in Europe; and if your conduct towards us is not altered, it is not unlikely that severe reprisals may be thought justifiable, from the necessity of putting some check to such abominable practices. For the sake of humanity it is to be wished that men would endeavor to alleviate as much as possible the unavoidable miseries attending a state of war. It has been said that among the civil-

ized nations of Europe the ancient horrors of that state are much diminished; but the compelling men by chains, stripes and famine to fight against their friends and relations is a new mode of barbarity, which your nation alone has the honor of inventing; and the sending American prisoners of war to Africa and Asia, remote from all probability of exchange, and where they can scarce hope to hear from their families, even if the unwholesomeness of the climate does not put a speedy end to their lives, is a manner of treating captives that you can justify by no other precedent or custom except that of the black savages of Guinea."

This was vigorous, emphatic and truthful language, and evoked the following insolent reply: "The King's ambassador receives no letters from rebels, except when they come to ask for mercy." Neither Franklin, Dean, nor Downer was in any mood for asking mercy. Downer, notwithstanding his broken arm, resumed active hostilities after his return home. Monarchy he found to be oppressive, and democracy to be technical and ungrateful,

but his bellicose patriotism did not flag for a moment. His application for a pension was refused, on the ground, "that, as a surgeon he had no right to be in command of a gun. His services were welcome, but only within the limits of prescribed regulations. Outside of them all, militant risks were exclusively his own."

On July 9, 1779, Dr. Downer was commissioned as Chief Surgeon in the "Penobscot expedition," which ascended the River Kennebec, but which had the misfortune to be overcome by a superior force of British and Indians. In this he served three months, and lost his surgical instruments, which the Massachusetts Legislature afterwards appropriated fifteen dollars to pay for.

When the end of the Revolution was achieved by the extorted acknowledgment of national independence, he retired to private life, with a soldier's portion of the Marietta Reserve in Ohio and a peck-basket full of Continental money. Professional pursuits were resumed on a large and prosperous scale.

DEAR SIR—After so many Years of Calamity and War, I was gladly Surprised with your kind letter in Answer to that of mine, tho by it I find you have Rec'd but one from us. It gave my Father & Mother great Pleasure to hear of your Familys good Wellfare and Happyness. My Father and Mother return their Thanks to you for your kind offers, but as to them it is too late in Life for them to think of crossing the Atlantic ; should I or any of my Sisters or Brothers come, that Time alone can Discover ; as to myself, Numbers have been the Offers, but all to the South'd. I make no Doubt that you will expect News. All I can tell you is that the definitive* Treaty is not signed, and it remains a Doubt Whether it will or

Letter from Dr. Thomas Wren, of England, grandson or grand nephew of the great architect who built St. Paul's of London to Doctor Eliphalet Downer—from an acquaintance made at the Forten Prison, London, where Dr. Downer was a prisoner in the War of the Revolution:

PORTSMOUTH (Eng.), Nov. 25, 1784.

DEAR SIR—Exceeding happy in your correspondence, I take the opportunity by Mr. Knox to inform you that I received your long and excellent letter of 29th of June on 4th of Sept. last, on my return from what I account a long journey into different parts of the North of England, being from home abt. 3 months & travelling abt. 1200 miles. I had not been in those parts for sevl years.

I discover by your last that you have received all my letters, as I have yours, & if it please God to spare us a little, we may now expect to exchange a letter occasionally & communicate our similar sentiments without interruption, from the confusions of war, or the tools & spies of despotic ministers.

Your repeated & repeated acknowledgements for my attention to your country's captives, but too long survives all the worth & value of the service. And I am not capable of putting such a flattering estimate upon that which always appeared my duty. I trust however that I shall not fear the face of man whenever I can relieve oppressed innocence. Your remarks on the state of things preceding the detestible war, and of the modest claims of the Americans and the Tyrannic views of the British ministry, are extremely just. What a glorious lesson Kings & princes received by the progress & issue of the war, if they were wise to learn. If the people had spirit suitable to the rank God had placed them in, Kings would value their own heads too well to attempt to abridge the peoples privileges.

There still subsists in this country among the disappointed and envious much railing at your countrymen. The consideration of your triumphs & emancipation rouses their madness, and drives them sometimes even to frenzy. In my last journey, a few innocent words as I imagined them, respecting your rights & success set a number of men at Manchester into the most horrid swearing and outrage. They cursed & damn'd America, and American people till their wind failed them. But that which is more lamentable is that we have never yet had any ministers since the war that

Mr. Howel, once of Poole, now lives at Yeovil, in Somersetshire. He has only had poor health, and not met with the best of treatment from the people. He is a fine fellow, a gallant spirit, & much better fitted for your country than this. Mr. Duckett lives at Guilford. Wm. Downer, Junr., went this summer to Philadelphia to Captn Woodward, who has most generously employed him & sent him supercargo to Cadiz. I doubt not but he will do well. Mr. Clement Sharp, a youth of my acquaintance, is settled at Boston, & I shall be much obliged to you look in upon him & ask him how he does. Wishing you everything good, I am,



It appears that after his death the Ohio property passed into other hands, who, in consequence of some disagreement among the heirs, are said never received a proper title. Mr. Downer was a musician and organ builder of reputation, and it is said that the first pipe organ built west of the Alleghanies was of his own construction. He built altogether three organs, the first of which was disposed of to the Cook family, the second to the Brownsville Catholic Church; the third and last was retained by himself, and may still be seen at the home of his daughter, the late Mrs. John Thirkeild, at Fayette City. We are told that his first organ was a wonder to the people of Western Pennsylvania. People came from far and near to hear it played. On one occasion a party had come from a distance of 15 or 20 miles for the purpose, and seeing an old-fashioned warming pan hanging on the wall, asked if that was the organ. "Well," said Mr. Downer, "I am somewhat bashful about playing the organ before people, but I will take it into the next room and there.



to the navy of Gen'l William Walker. He was attached to the sloop "Granada," Capt. J. C. Fassoux. Rialdo sighted the gun which blew up the magazine of the Costa Rican "Duze DeAvril," and was promoted. His time expiring he sought Gen'l Walker, who was then besieged at Rivas, for a discharge, but was captured, carried to Costa Rico and released on his promise to leave the country. In the Civil War in 1861, while living at Summit, Pike Co, Miss., Rialdo aided in forming the "McNair Rifles" and was chosen Orderly Sergeant. His company was attached to Major Hardcastle's Third Battalion (Mississippi troops), and sent to Bowling Green, Ky., and was engaged at Shiloh. On the first day of the battle Capt. McNair was killed, also the First Lieutenant. On the second day, owing to the absence of the other officers, he (Rialdo) commanded the company in a charge against the Federals and was badly wounded. The Major rewarded his gallantry by presenting him a Captain's sword, which had been captured from the enemy. This sword is now preserved by his brother, the Rev. B. Downer, at Vossburg, Miss. Thirty days after the battle he died at his brother's home in Vossburg and lies buried near McComb City.

His mother had been brought up a Roman Catholic in Baltimore, but just previous to his birth had been converted to Protestantism and devoutly consecrated her boy to the ministry. He was educated in the New Orleans public schools, but being injured by a buggy accident, causing the use of cane and crutch for life, his education was completed by private tutors. In 1858 he was admitted for trial in the Mississippi annual conference, ordained Deacon 1860, Presiding Elder in 1862, and has continued to preach in the southern half of Mississippi and the Florida parishes of Louisiana until the present time. He has lived at Ocean Springs and other places in Mississippi, and is now at Vossburg. He has in his possession a valuable relic, a sword which belonged to his g g f Dr. Eliphalet Downer, of Rev. War fame. The Doctor, before his death, gave the sword to a friend in trust for her son. The son grew to manhood, but not being deemed worthy of such a treasure he never received it. Upon the death of the mother, her dau, a maiden lady, fell heir to the sword, and for forty years steadfastly refused all offers to part with it, until Mr. James C. Downer, the father of the Rev. Robert B., persuaded her to sell it to him for \$20 in gold.

*The name of Samuel Downer, of Boston, was identified with the development of one of the greatest industries of the century, and to him, as much as to any other one man, was due the rapid introduction of mineral oil illuminations; nor was he altogether a man of business. Like his father, he was public spirited and found time to interest himself in the affairs of his city and country. Among his intimate friends were Horace Mann, Charles Sumner, John P. Hale, Rev. Theodore Parker, Dr. Samuel G. Howe, his w Julia Howe, and others prominent in New England in his time. He was from the first actively identified with the Free Soil party, which in 1848 was formed to resist the encroachments of slavery, being led thereto by the shameful treatment which William Lloyd Garrison and his friends received in Boston. He drew up the resolutions passed at the meeting in Dorchester which was called to choose delegates to the Buffalo convention, at which the party was formally organized, and at which Martin Van Buren and Charles Francis Adams were nominated for President and Vice-President. In 1887 Mr. Downer conceived the idea of having a reunion of the old leaders who had lived to see the full fruition of their labors in freeing the nation from slavery, and in accordance therewith he sent out 220 invitations for a gathering to be held at his summer home at Downer's Landing, Boston Harbor. Nearly all the invitations were accepted and the occasion proved of great interest. Mr. Downer presided at the dinner and delivered an address replete with interest to the student of history. Charles Francis Adams, E. Rockwood Hoar and others followed with characteristic speeches, and a telegram of greeting was received from the poet, John G. Whittier. A full report of the reunion has been published and copies are preserved by his family.

The business career of Samuel is of interest. When 21 years of age his father took him into the firm. In 1844 his father retired and he carried on alone the business of manufacturing sperm and whale oil, and sperm candles. About 1854 his attention was called to the hydro-carbon oils. He spent much time and money in inventions which were designed for refining these oils. Indifferent financial success attended his efforts until the discovery of the Pennsylvania and West Virginia oil wells furnished such an abundant supply of crude petroleum that he and his associates were able to place a refined illuminating oil in the market at such a low price that made it at once immensely popular. The price dropped from \$1.15 per gallon, wholesale, to 25 cents retail. They soon had a monopoly of the business. It was soon determined to manufacture the oil at the source of supply, and in 1861 he organized the "Downer Kerosene Oil" Company of Boston, New York and Corry, of which he was elected the president. Going out to Pennsylvania, in company with W. H. L. Smith, he "roughed it" in the oil-producing regions for six years. Corry, a town founded and named by themselves, was chosen as the base of operations. The life and the excitement were congenial to the new president. The popular oil fever raged with extraordinary severity. The country was full of prospectors—strong, athletic, good-natured men—each of whom carried from one to fifty thousand dollars in his pockets. This money changed hands once a week or oftener. The proprietors were well armed with revolvers and bowie-knives and did not hesitate to use them as occasion required. Tramps were numerous and sometimes dangerous. Mr. Downer was an exception to the general rule. His credit being good along the whole line of operations, he carried but little money and no weapons. He was, however, on one occasion mistakenly arrested as a deserter from the United States army by a Pittsburg police officer, who was in quest of two runaways, one of whom had just been taken. The other resembled Mr. Downer, whose personal appearance at the moment of arrest was not particularly prepossessing. He was in the third day of his journey from Oil City to Titusville. His clothing was soiled, and he had "curled up" under a tree and was fast asleep, when the officer awoke him and inquired if he had seen another man about there. The drowsy but curt reply was that he had not; whereupon the officer arrested him and he was not released until he had submitted his papers, pocketbook, &c., to the officer's inspection.

up and preserved the accumulation, which for many years has been in the charge of Chief Justice Shaw and his descendants. Major Melville was further distinguished as the last wearer of the old-fashioned cocked hat. Only three of these antique articles were known, in Boston, to be in existence some sixty years ago. One of them was worn by a gentleman named Eaton, and another by a prominent political writer known as "Honey" Austin, from his *nom de plume* of "Honestus." Melville survived both, and thus became the last wearer of the universally discarded headgear. His hat is now in possession of his g dau, Mrs. Downer. Major Melville entered upon active military service at the commencement of the Revolution, and was afterwards appointed Naval Officer of the Port of Boston by President Washington. He continued to discharge the duties of that office under the administration of Washington, Jefferson, Adams, Madison, Monroe and John Quincy Adams, and was at length relieved, at a very advanced age, when General Jackson assumed the Chief Magistracy of the Republic.



- Mr. Downer was greatly interested in the Female College at Fox Lake, Wis, which bore his name, and for many years contributed largely toward its current expenses. Three-fourths of the sum required for the erection of the new chapel was donated by him, and at his death he made the college the residuary legatee of property amounting to sixty-five thousand dollars, upon condition that it should remain a college exclusively for women. In 1897 the college was rem to Milwaukee and consolidated with another institution of like character, and the two are conducted under the name of Milwaukee Downer College. He left other generous bequests to relatives and friends and to other institutions of learning in which he was interested.
- In character he was an active Christian man, maintained the family altar faithfully, and was loyal to his Puritan ancestry. He lived honored and beloved, and died at peace with God and his fellowmen. Both Judge Downer and his wife found delight in entertaining clergymen at their home in Milwaukee, and early formed a plan to provide for needy and aged ministers. In carrying out this plan, on Feb 12, 1890, the "Downer Home," at Prospect ave and Juneau st, was opened, having been provided for by the will of Mrs. Downer. Here veterans in the ministry, whose advancing years and infirmities have unfitted them for self-support, may find a quiet and comfortable home. Mrs. Downer was a self-made woman, whose aim was to be useful. She was the first woman

introduced to the meeting he was received with a round of ap-
plause, and responded with an address which in part was as
follows: "Mr. President and Fellow-Citizens—I appear before
you as a soldier of the Revolution, having served in the ranks
two years, and have come here to celebrate the memory of the
brave patriots whose names are inscribed on the tablet of this

monument and to bow over their ashes. With most of those who served under Ledyard, I was personally acquainted and spent many months in dressing the wounds of the survivors and in ministering to their necessities. Their bravery was not excelled by the Spartan band at Thermopylæ, etc., etc." It is stated that he spoke with much emotion, as, in his own language, he did not expect to participate in another similar occasion, being ninety years of age. He was a prominent member of the Masonic body, and his portrait (a copy of which appears in this work) still hangs in the Masonic temple at Norwich.



THE NORTH CAROLINA DOWNERS.

No reliable account of this Branch can be obtained. That the first North Carolina settler came from New England is possible, and the recurrence in his family of the names of John and Joseph, which were so very common to the early New Englanders, some of whom "went South" and were lost sight of, makes it quite probable. From correspondence with Mr. John H. Downer, of Emory, Miss., Mr. William H. Downer, of Lilesville, N.C., and others, the following rather confused traditionary information is gathered.

1540 + JOHN DOWNER, the first of whom anything is known, settled in Anson Co., N. C., before the Rev War. He is supposed to have "come from the North somewhere," first to Georgia, and later, to Anson Co. He, or his ancestors were of English origin. He was twice m. They were borne along with the popular current and when their "*County voted to go out*," their duty was plain—they went with it, and, *before* the Confederate Conscription Act was passed, the whole family volunteered, and went to the front. One of the sons was killed at Gettysburg and another died from the effects of prison life.



His w Jemima Thompson was of Orange Co., N. Y. She had two brothers, John and David Thompson. John Potter and w Jemima had Stephen, David, John, Jabez, Rachel, Jemima and Hannah. Of these John rem to Fayette Co., Pa., and d there about 1830.

* Samuel was probably led to go to Elizabethtown by the fact that others of his friends and acquaintances from Connecticut had already preceded him, and also that some years before a number of his father's old Newbury neighbors, through the influence of Gov. Carteret, of New Jersey, had likewise gone thither and founded a new settlement within the town limits, which they named after their old Newbury minister, the Rev. John Woodbridge. Among them was John Robinson, who in 1634 had come from Stanton, Wiltshire, to Newbury, and thence later to Woodbridge. With Samuel Robinson, a descendant of John, Samuel Downer, at a later time, became associated in the blacksmithing business. It is also of interest to add that his son, ¹⁶²³Samuel, m Sarah, a g dau of Samuel Robinson, thus pleasantly consummating the intimate business and social relations which for so long a period had been maintained between this branch of the Downers and their old-time friends from Wiltshire. It is not definitely known just where in the town Samuel first located. Like his father, he was a blacksmith, and at the beginning of the war, and probably preceding it, his house and forge was situated on the point of land where the old road from Elizabethtown forks to Westfield and Connecticut Farms. It was near the old Potter place—perhaps Hannah Potter's home—and there his children were doubtless born. It was along this old road, in 1780, that the British advanced to attack Gen. Washington, encamped in the Short Hills. They were, however, checked at the Farms by the New Jersey Militia, of which both he and his s Samuel were members, and driven back. On their retreat, in a spirit of vengeance, they burned every building, including his house and forge, along the way. After the war, probably in 1783, he rem to Rahway, locating on the highway leading to Rahway Neck.

He is described as having been of a genial temperament, full of life and activity, the possessor of more than ordinary physical strength and a great lover of music. It is said that to the end of his long life he found much delight in playing upon a violin of his own manufacture. His early life had in part been spent in Sunderland, Mass., near Deerfield, the scene of Indian troubles, and stories of his experiences with the Red men have come down to us. One of these relates that on one of the expeditions

He, like his father, of the same name, was of an active, nervous temperament. Born in 1760, his boyhood was passed at a time when the murmurings of discontent against the tyrannical legislation of the Mother Country were growing loud throughout the colonies, and it was natural that he should have felt their influence. Hence when the war broke out in 1776, although too young to regularly enlist, being but 16 years of age, we find him acting as a drummer boy to Capt Pierson's militia company, which was attached to Col Crane's Elizabethtown regiment. For a time he was stationed at Morristown, Jersey City and other points. He afterwards regularly enlisted (return entered at Trenton, July 11, 1780), in Capt Scudder's company, 2d Reg Vols, Essex Co., Col. Phillip Van Cortlandt. The original enlistment paper may still be seen in the Adjutant General's office at Trenton. It describes him as being 19 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches in height, of rather dark complexion, black hair, and his residence Elizabethtown. That he took an active part in some of the exciting scenes, which were constantly transpiring around him, is evident. It is said that in company with others he lay in

against the Red men both he and his father were captured, but afterward released.

In his religious character, Samuel was true to his Puritan antecedents. The Westfield church records show that he was a member there previous to 1759, back of which no records exist. From his personal and family relations with the old First Church at Elizabethtown*, whose people had founded the Westfield church, we think he may have been a member there, before uniting at Westfield, but of this we may not be certain, as the old Elizabethtown church records were burned with the church in the Rev War.

Samuel joined the militia as a minute man, and his name, together with that of his s Samuel, appears on the official roster of the State. Both father and son belonged to different companies and regiments, at different stages of the struggle, and were called upon for service as emergency required. It is impossible at this late day to state just what special service they performed, but we know, from tradition and from the circumstances in which they dwelt, that they were almost constantly in the service and their life was full of continued excitement. The published accounts of the time state that the community where they lived, and its vicinity, for five years were the scene of the most exciting military events. The main British army was encamped on Staten Island directly opposite the town. The enemy held New York City and aimed to occupy Philadelphia. Elizabethtown lay between the two points. Its patriotic citizens opposed every effort made to cross their territory. Detachments of British troops were constantly coming over from the Island to ravage the country. The inhabitants suffered terribly, not only from the soldiers, but from parties of tories who, having been driven out by their more loyal neighbors, had sought the protection of the enemy, and frequently returned under cover of darkness for revenge and plunder. The lines between friend and

* The old church has a most interesting Revolutionary history. Dr. Hatfield's history states that from its flock went out forty men who became prominent as officers in the patriot army, and others also who were famous in the councils of the State and Nation.

ambush along the river (presumably the Staten Island Sound) awaiting the arrival of a boat, belonging to the enemy, which they captured. The boat and cargo was sold and a considerable sum realized by the captors. It is also of interest to state that the renegade "Morgan," who shot and killed the Rev. Mr. Caldwell, the honored pastor of the Elizabethtown church, was a member of his military company, and a later pastor, the Rev. Dr. Murray, in referring to the sad incident in a newspaper article, stated that "Samuel Downer, under whose command Morgan had kept guard of the road leading from Elizabethtown to Westfield, had said that Morgan was a very bad man."

As a business man Samuel was shrewd and successful, but withal of strict integrity. His first venture in life was the opening of an inn at Westfield, for the convenience of the travel by a New York and Philadelphia stage line, which had established a relay station there. It was probably here that he entertained General Washington, which tradition fixes about the time of the General's flying camp in New Jersey.

foe were sharply drawn and the bitterest resentments engendered. Nor was this all. To add to the general distress, the Indians were in a state of disquiet and a constant source of fear and trouble. To meet this state of affairs, it was found necessary to embody all the loyal citizens into military companies, who held themselves in readiness for instant service. They were required to furnish their own arms and ammunition, and in case of alarm to repair at once to the residence of their captain. It is said that Samuel was for a time with Washington at his Morristown camp, and that both father and son participated in the battles, or rather skirmishes, of Connecticut Farms, Springfield and Elizabethtown. At Springfield it is related that the elder Samuel became separated from his company during the engagement, owing to the irregular manner of fighting, and for a time was in a position of great danger between the fires. Samuel was patriotic to the last. He never tired of rehearsing his Rev experiences. He found willing listeners. For years previous to his death, as the oldest surviving hero of the war, in Westfield, he had the honor of carrying his country's flag on the annual training days, which after the war became important town celebrations, and were kept up to a time within the memory of the present generation. After the destruction of his home by the soldiers in 1780, he apparently settled for a time at Rahway, later locating near Westfield, on the road from Rahway, and finally purchasing a tract on the "Jerusalem road" in Westfield, where he re-established his forge and shop. He soon became famous in the country roundabout for the manufacture of agricultural implements, such as plows, scythes and axes. People came far and near for them. Money was scarce and payment was mostly made in flax and other farm products.

Upon the death of his wife, Hannah Potter, in 1804, he took up his residence in Orange with his dau Jemima. Two incidents are related as showing his wonderfully preserved physical powers. It is said that on his one hundredth birthday he rode an untrained colt from Orange to Westfield, and that soon after he carried a bag of buckwheat weighing 125 lbs. from his daughter's house in Orange to the barn. Both incidents occasioned much interest and were noted in the papers of the day. He died at Orange 22 Oct, 1824, aged 101 years 7 months and 21 days. The remains were brought to Westfield on the following Sabbath and placed by the side of those of his wife in the old cemetery.

Two large drinking glasses, which were used on the occasion, are preserved in the family of his son, the late Rev. Edwin Downer. The opening of the inn seemed, however, to have been but a temporary undertaking, for previous to the formal closing of the war in 1783, and while the British were still in the country, he established himself in the mercantile line, in the same place. It is said that during this period he made occasional trips to New York and Philadelphia on horse back to replenish his stock of goods, and upon one of these trips, while returning from New York, he was fired on by a party of soldiers and barely escaped with his life. At another time, when the British held New York, while returning from Philadelphia on horse back, and not being recognized, he was stopped at New Brunswick by the patriot officials and not released until his identity was established.

For a number of years his store in Westfield was the only one in the large section of country of which that was a centre. People living miles away came to barter their farm products for such goods as they needed. The business was first conducted in a room in his dwelling house, which had been set apart for the purpose, (the house was situated on the east side of the street and was the same subsequently occupied for so many years by the late Mr. Isaac H. Pierson) but it so increased that in 1812 he builded, and removed to a more commodious structure on the opposite corner of the street. About 1835 his g s William H. Pierson assumed charge of the business and from him it subsequently passed into other hands by whom it is still conducted.

Samuel was an original director in the old State Bank of Elizabethtown, having been elected in 1812, and remained such until he died. He was also one of the original stockholders of the Elizabethtown and Somerville R. R. (now the Central of New Jersey), was postmaster at Westfield from 17 Feb, 1825, until his resignation, 24 May, 1833, the anniversary of his 73d birthday. He united with the church at Westfield in 1785, was elected to the office of elder in 1822, and continued in office until death. His health was good almost to the last. During a carriage ride to Elizabethtown, he contracted a cold, which shortly resulted in his death 29 May, 1846. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. James M. Hunting, pastor of the church, and the remains placed by the side of his wife in the old burying ground at Westfield.

He anticipated the service with anxiety and made careful preparation for it, expressing the hope that he might, in what he felt would be his last public effort, say something which would be blessed to the impenitent. With a sermon from Luke xix, 41 and 42, he ascended the pulpit in great feebleness. He offered the invocation, and sitting down passed away with a slight groan. A large congregation was present. Many exclaimed, "How beautiful thus to die!" "It is not death, but translation!" The funeral service was held in the church on the following Wednesday, the sermon being preached by the Rev. Luther Littell, of the Mt. Hope Church, and interment was made at Westfield.

He was a Presbyterian minister. He prepared for college at Dr. Armstrong's school at Bloomfield, N. J., entered Yale in 1824, graduated in 1828, studied theology at Auburn, was ordained and installed by the Third Presbytery of New York, as the first pastor of the West Presbyterian Church, New York, then in Carmine st., 25 March, 1832; resigned in consequence of ill health, 23 Oct, 1841, and d at Westfield, N. J., 28 Nov, 1841. A funeral service was afterwards held in his New York church, at which his life-long friend, the Rev. Henry A. Rowland, then pastor of the Pearl St (New York) Church, officiated. The sermon was published and copies are still preserved. In speaking of his work, Mr. Rowland said that at the beginning of his pastorate the church had been but recently organized, and everything was to be done. In addition to preaching three times every Sabbath, and the usual weekly lecture, besides attending the two weekly prayer meetings, he made many pastoral calls. During the nine years of his pastorate he attended more than 1100 funerals, a large proportion of which were out of his own congregation. The services he rendered in this way were very great and contributed to wear out his strength. The church enjoyed frequent revivals during his ministry and received 815 new members, 503 of whom were on profession, while many others, who were converted there, united elsewhere. The labors of few men have been more blessed, yet these labors were carried on in the simplicity and sincerity of the gospel and by the legitimate influences of the pastoral office. He entered into active sympathy with all the benevolent efforts of the day.

In the matter of temperance, which was then for the first being prominently brought to the attention of the church, he took much interest, and in 1841 preached a sermon which was repeated by request in many of the New York churches and subsequently published and given wide circulation.

In the midst of his work he contracted a severe cold, which amid his multiplied duties he neglected, and which developed into a dangerous attack of inflammation of the lungs. He recovered somewhat and appeared at the October communion service. He was very feeble and, to the surprise of all, arose to remind his people of their former communion seasons and how deeply he bore them on his heart. If he was never to appear before them again he wished to bear his solemn testimony to the reality of Christian consolations in trial and to the power and triumph of Christian hope. While the assembly was dissolved in tears he stood before them as one who had returned from the borders of the invisible world to communicate to them his confidence in the grace of God and his conviction of the power of religion to sustain the soul while sinking in the arms of death. The scene was deeply impressive and never to be forgotten.

He soon after went to Westfield, and on Saturday evening, Nov 21, conversed with Mr. Rowland, and during the night, without waking from his slumber, breathed his last. Interment was made in the old family ground at Westfield.

*Cyprian and John Downer, sons of ¹⁶²Stephen, of Norwich, Ct., rem to Shaftsbury, Vt., some time previous to 1768 and were first settlers there. Their brother, Stephen, doubtless soon followed them, and their other brother, Elisha, did so after the Rev War, and lived for a time at Stephentown, N. Y., an adjacent town. The Preston, Ct., records give John's birth, 16 Feb, 1745, which closely agrees with the date furnished by his Williston descendants. The difference of eleven days being exactly accounted for by the change made by Parliament in the calendar in 1751. His tombstone, at Shaftsbury, states that he, John, d 12 March, 1819, in the 75th year of his age.

Local history tells us that Shaftsbury, the adjoining town to Bennington, was settled in 1763, largely by people from Norwich, Hebron and Bozrah, Ct. In 1768 Cyprian Downer headed a list of constituent members of the First Baptist Church of Shaftsbury, which was the first church in the State of Vermont, organized in 1768. The name of his brother John does not appear in the list, but later he was a member of the church organized at the centre of the town, known as Bennington Centre. He was probably the Deacon John Downer, who is recorded as going with his pastor to assist in the great revival at Bennington, in 1802. The two brothers bought land in the northern part of the town, respectively in 1785 and 1789, cleared it and each had a farm. Cyprian, although never regularly ordained, did much preaching in Shaftsbury and the towns adjacent. He was, however, licensed as a lay preacher and approved by his church, and as such was in charge of the first Shaftsbury church from 1793 to 1800. He was a captain in the Rev Army, and the only one of the Vermont Downers who held a commission, as shown by the State records. His grave at Shaftsbury Centre is still marked every year with the stars and stripes, and with flowers.

At one time a band of Indians had gone up Sandy Creek toward his home. He immediately set out with a squad to intercept them, but when he reached the place, fourteen miles distant from the fort, he found the Indians dancing around his burning barn. His feelings may well be imagined, and we are told that not an Indian escaped. His stock, hay, grain, farming implements were destroyed. He sent to Bennington—the mail at that time being carried on horse-back—for his father, John, a carpenter and builder, who came in two sleighs, bringing nails, bolts, etc., to rebuild the barn. At the “raising” was one Allen (Avery’s father-in-law), who unworthily claimed relationship with the noted General Ethan Allen, of Ticonderoga fame. Allen was lamenting that we did not make peace with Great Britain by conceding all they asked. John, whose loyalty was intense, climbed down the ladder, tossed Allen into a snow bank, and resumed his work without making any comment. John Downer built several churches and public buildings in Vermont, which were in a state of good preservation in the sixties.



2159 JOHN DOWNER, of Pownal, Vt., has the distinction of having been the ancestor of a large line of descendants, and it is a matter of much regret that no reliable account can be had of him. He was born 25 Oct, 1744, but where, is not known—perhaps New York City. He d at Pownal, 10 Dec, 1815, in his seventy-second year. He is said to have come from Schenectady, N. Y., to Pownal about 1763. The name of his father is unknown, but is surmised to have been William, from the fact that his eldest s was so named. In consequence of the importance of this branch of the Downers, the following rather confused traditionary accounts of John Downer are given:

Mrs. Celinda (Downer) Knox, dau of Almer L., of Shasta, Cal, writes that her father always stated that his ancestors were of English origin, and there was no doubt of it.

Mr. Luke W. Downer, of Peterboro, N. Y., the oldest living member of this branch, states that tradition takes his ancestors back to five brothers, who went from Germany with the Prince of Orange. They fought with him at the battle of the Boyne in Ireland, where they remained and settled. John above came from Ireland with a brother to this country. John located at Pownal, and the brother "went further East."

Mr. Silas T. Downer, of Appleton City, Mo., states that his father, William, always said that John was a German, and talked broken English.

Mrs. Harriet (Downer) Hatch, of Cazenovia, N. Y., says that a William Downer, born about 1710, went from England to Londonderry, Ireland; thence he came to New Amsterdam, and m Amy Goff, from Holland. They had three children—John, Molly and Sally. Molly m a Ritchie and had a son, Andrew, who died in 1818, leaving children. Molly d by being scalded when but two years old.

Another account current in this branch (furnished by Mr. Abner P. Downer, of Chicago), is that two brothers, names unknown, lived in England, took sides with Charles I. against Cromwell, fought at Culloden, were defeated, escaped to Londonderry, whence they came to Maryland.

The late Rev. William B. Downer, of Cazenovia, is authority for the following: "William Goff, a wealthy bachelor in Mary-



MISCELLANEOUS NOTES.

THOMAS DOWNER, of Ouray, Cal, came from Kirdford, Sussex, England, to this country in 1876. He was followed in 1889 and 1890 by his three nephews, John and Alfred Downer, now living in Cincinnati, and Thomas Downer, now living in Vincennes, Ind. These three are brothers, and sons of John, of Kirdford. A letter from Mr. George W. Butt, of Littlehampton, Sussex, England, a member of this family, states that the earliest record they have, is the baptism at Kirdford, of Sarah, dau of John Downer and Margaret his w, in 1710, and the burial of John, (s of John Downer), in 1712. This John was probably the eldest s of the latter, who d in 1733, aged 79 years. He was the ancestor of the Kirdford Downers, and the earliest one of the family of whom they have knowledge. Whether there was a generation living at Kirdford back of the John, who d in 1733, they do not know. The name Downer is common in that part of England, and they live but a comparatively short distance from Salisbury, Downton, etc. It is interesting to state that from the time of the earliest date above, viz, 1710, to the present, this family have occupied and cultivated the same farm (Marshall's farm) at Kirdford.

CHARLES DOWNER, of the Industrial School at Boston, Mass, states that his g g f (name unknown) came from Scotland with (he thinks) the 69th Reg., to rendezvous at Brighton, Eng. While there he m, and had two children, a boy named William T., and a dau, name not known. Soon after the g g f's marriage, his reg. was ordered to America, and he was killed in one of Braddock's engagements. William T. remained at Brighton and d there about 1816. He left a s, William, b at Brighton, 2 Jan, 1802 and d there 9 Sept, 1850. The latter, William, m Mary Stent, of Brighton. She d 19 May, 1843. Had the above Charles, b at Brighton, 29 May, 1832. Mr. Downer further mentions a well known school at Brighton known as "Swan Downer's School." It was founded in 1819 under Mr. Swan Downer's will dated 1811, by which he left £10,106, 15s and 3d for paying the expenses of a proper school house for instructing and clothing poor girls. The school is still in existence.

JOHN W. DOWNER, of Adelaide, Australia, writes under date of 23 Nov. 1893, that his father came from Hampshire, England, where he and his father lived. They came to Australia in 1838. Prior to that the family belonged in Surrey, England, and had been somewhat large land holders, but lost their property. There was a tradition, that some generations back, one or more had gone to America, but it is not known who they were or when they went. (From a letter to Mr. Benj. Downer, of Hopkinsville, Ky.)

¹⁷¹⁴EDWARD DOWNER, of Greaterville, was a volunteer in the Civil War. In 1862 he raised a company, was first lieutenant, then captain of 117th N. Y. Vols. After time of Reg. expired he was transferred with two officers and 365 men to the 48th (Brooklyn) N. Y. Vols. He participated in the following engagements: Dury's Bluff, Bermuda Hundred, Petersburg, Fort Hell; was with 10th Corps at Grant's flank movement at Cold Harbor; was with the Army up the Peninsula from Yorktown; was in both attacks on Fort Fisher, and with Sherman's Army in North Carolina.

MASSACHUSETTS.

BENJAMIN DOWNER—Name appears in statement of Continental balances (rank not given) in Col. Smith's (late Col. Wigglesworth's) Reg., enlisted for three years. Certified 2 June, 1789.

CALEB DOWNER—Name appears with rank of private, on return of Capt. Wright's Co., Col. Brewer's Reg. belonged to Windsor. He enlisted for eight months and was entitled to the bounty of a woolen coat, or its equivalent, which he received, as appears by his name among signatures to an order for same made payable to Lieut. Simon Larned, dated at Roxbury, 2 Nov, 1775.

DANIEL DOWNER—Name appears on muster roll of Capt. John Vinton's (Independent) Co. colonel not given. Enlisted 30 May, 1775; served 7 months, 19 days; town, Middleborough. His name also appears in a list of men mustered in Plymouth Co., to serve in Capt. Joshua Benson's Co., Col. Putnam's Reg; return made March, 1777; age 24 years. Place of residence, Middleborough; enlisted for three years. His name also appears with rank of corporal on Continental Army pay accounts, Capt. Benson's Co., Col. Putnam's Reg., for service from 3 Feb, 1777, to 31 Dec, 1779; residence, Middleborough. Also appears rank of corporal on Continental Army pay accounts, same co. and reg., for service from 1 January, 1780, to 3 Feb, 1780. Also appears in a descriptive list of enlisted men from Hampshire county, age 30 years, stature 5 feet 4 inches, complexion and hair light, occupation farmer; time three years from 10 April, 1781; residence New Salem. Also appears signed to a receipt for bounty paid him by David Holt for a class for town of New Salem to serve in Continental Army for three years; receipt dated 24 March, 1781.

ELIPHALET DOWNER—Name appears on a receipt dated Roxbury, 30 May, (year not given), for ammunition; signed by himself. Also appears in list of officers in Col. (Gen.) Heath's Reg. as surgeon; examined and approved 12 July, 1777. Also appears in a letter dated 9 July, 1779, notifying him of his appointment as surgeon general. Also appears with rank of surgeon general in muster and pay roll of the field and staff officers of the Mass. Reg., (name of colonel not given) for service in Penobscott expedition, engaged 8 July, 1779; discharged 8 Oct, 1779; served 3 months and 1 day.

EZRA DOWNER—Appears in a return of men enlisted in the Continental Army. Lieut. Mecomthey's Co., Col. Moseley's Reg. Dated 26 Oct, 1780. Enlisted for town of Blanford for six months.

GIDEON DOWNER—Residence Newbury. Enlisted Capt. William Rogers' Co., Col. Samuel Gerrish's Reg., but was sick and absent when return was made from Chelsea, 11 Aug, 1775.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

ZACHEUS AND JOSIAH DOWNER in Col. Jonathan Chase's Reg., who marched from Cornish, N. H., in Sept. 1777, to join the Continental Army under Gen. Gates near Saratoga.

JOSEPH DOWNER drafted from Lebanon, N. H., in 1777.

ZACHEUS, AND WILLIAM DOWNER (Col. Chase's Reg.) reinforced Continental Army at Ticonderoga, 7 May, 1777.

WILLIAM DOWNER, JR., private in Capt. House's Co., Sept, 1776.

DR. ABRAHAM DOWNER, of Charlestown, N. H., paid for dressing wounds of soldiers wounded at Ticonderoga, 6 Mar, 1778.

NEW YORK.

ISRAEL DOWNER—Enlisted from Dutchess Co., town not given. (N. Y. Rev. War Archives.)

NEW JERSEY.

SAMUEL DOWNER—(Father and son of same name.) Capt. Scudder's Co., 2d Reg., Essex Co., Col. Philip Van Cortlandt. Capt. Scudder's Co. was also attached to 1st Reg. Essex Co. State troops, and to 2d and 3d Middlesex.
