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# DREER'S IMPERIAL JAPANESE IRIS, One of the most valuable early Summer cut flowers

The improved forms of this beautiful flower have placed them in the same rank popularly as the Hardy Phloxes and Paeonias. Coming into flower about the middle of June, and continuing for five or six weeks, they fill in a period when flowers of this attractive type are particularly welcome.

They succeed in almost any soil and position, but respond quickly to liberal treatment, rich soil and plenty of water, when they are forming their buds and developing their flowers.



We offer fifty-six varieties; one of the choicest and largest collections every offered; each one distinct and desirable. These are divided into two classes, three and six petaled; the six-petaled sorts having the heaviest, showiest flowers, while those with three petals are, perhaps, the most artistic. Both are equally valuable as cut flowers, for which purpose they should be cut in the bud state, permitting the blooms to expand after being placed in water.
