

Apart from the body of the letter, to facilitate execution and prevent errors. Shipments of seeds and plants are made in one parcel, to avoid additional express charges.



Strawberry Plants.

In presenting this list, we desire to call the attention of our customers to our facilities for growing Strawberry plants, at our Nursery and Trial Farm at Riverton, where all the varieties are tested under our personal supervision.

POT-GROWN STRAWBERRIES.




Our pot-grown Strawberry plants are ready for shipment about the middle of July, and can be supplied as late as October in such varieties as are unsold at that time. Plants set out this summer will produce a full crop of fruit in June, 1892.


The illustration at the head of this page is taken from a photograph of the Sharpless berries gathered from plants supplied to one of our customers in October last. It is better, however, to procure the plants in August or September, as earlier plantings will develop larger and more vigorous plants and produce a greater crop of fruit next year, besides we are usually sold out of many varieties later in the season.

Potted plants may appear expensive, yet when the labor necessary to grow them into proper condition and the time saved in the result of the crop are considered, they will be found much cheaper than ordinary layer plants. They may be planted after a crop of early summer vegetables has been harvested, and a crop of fruit secured in eight or ten months after planting.

All varieties offered in this list have perfect or bi-sexual blossoms, except those marked (P), which are destitute of stamens, and are termed pistillate or imperfect flowering varieties, and must be planted near some perfect flowering sort, or they will produce little or no fruit.




Planted too Shallow.

Directions for Garden Culture.


To cultivate the Strawberry for family use, we recommend planting in beds four feet wide, with an alley two feet wide between each bed. These beds will accommodate three rows of plants, which may stand fifteen inches apart each way, and the outside row nine inches from the alley. The beds can be kept clean easier and the fruit gathered without setting the feet upon them. The ground should be well prepared by trenching or plowing at least ten or twelve inches deep, and be enriched with well-rotten manure, ground bone, wood ashes, or any good fertilizer. In setting out POT-GROWN PLANTS, press the soil firmly about the plants and scarcely any will fail to grow. If the weather is hot and dry, wet the soil thoroughly and mulch with some coarse material until the plants are established; keep well cultivated and free from weeds. When the plants begin to throw out runners, they should be cut off, to establish strong plants. When the ground freezes in the early winter, cover the entire bed with salt meadow hay to the depth of one or two inches. If this cannot be had, use straw, which is improved by being cut; cornstalks, long manure, leaves, shavings or other material that will not pack and smother the plant, will answer the purpose. In the early spring remove part of the covering, and place as much as possible under the foliage of the plant, to keep the fruit clean and the weeds from growing.

Plants by Express.



Plants by Mail.


It is not desirable to send POT-GROWN PLANTS in this way, as the earth must be removed, and the plants packed in damp moss to carry safely; but we will do so when ordered, and also send out LAYER PLANTS by mail, POSTAGE PAID AT DOZEN RATES. *When plants are ordered at hundred rates to be sent by mail, twenty cents per hundred must be added for postage.*

CELERY PLANTS.

Now Ready.



GIANT PASCAL CELERY.

Celery requires a moist, rich soil, and will not thrive in poor soil and dry situations. After the plants have attained a height of 5 or 6 inches they should be set out in rows three feet apart and six inches in the row. When twelve to fifteen inches high, the soil should be loosened by the use of the plow or hoe and the plants be "handled." This operation consists of drawing the stems upright with one hand, and pressing the soil firmly against the plant with the other; by this process the plants grow upright and can be easily cultivated and blanched by drawing the soil close up to the plant. Celery should receive thorough cultivation if good results are desired. To store for winter use, select well-drained ground, dig trenches 1 foot wide and deep enough to cover the tops of the plants. Pack the stalks in this in an upright position, covering with boards to shed the water, and in severe weather protect with straw or leaves.




