We are fully aware of the fact that the general opinion is that there have been too many varieties of plumed Nephrolepis, but we are positive that you will agree with us that there is not only ample room but a need for this variety. Its merits are so apparent that they appeal at first sight, and continue to grow on closer acquaintance; in fact, there is no room for comparison with its forerunners.
