

'T will not cost you e'en a twopence,
Shall we hasten? Are you with me?
Coming, Wonderland—Let's go!

Scene: Wonderland. The King and Queen of Hearts are sitting on a raised platform, center. Clerk's table is below. At right is jury box; left is place for defendants and witness.

Time: 1934

(Two guards bring in the red and white Knights and stand at attention before the throne.)

King: Herald, read the accusation.

Herald: (Blows three blasts, unrolls scroll)

The red and white knights

Both had a fight

All on a summer's day;



'Twas an awful sight.
Claimed both were right
On taking the prisoner away.

King: Consider your verdict.

Herald: Not yet, not yet. There's a great deal to come before that.

King: Call the first witness.

Herald: (Blows three blasts) First witness.

Hatter: (Enters carrying tea cup and piece of bread and butter) I beg pardon, your majesty, for bringing these in, but I hadn't quite finished my tea when I was sent for.

King: You ought to have finished. When did you begin?

Hatter: Fourteenth of March, I think it was.

Tweedle Dee: Fifteenth.

Tweedle Dum: Sixteenth.

King: (To jury) Write that. (To Hatter) Take off your hat.

Hatter: It isn't mine.

King: Stolen?

Hatter: I keep them to sell. I've more of my own. I'm a hatter.

King: Give your evidence and don't be nervous or I'll have you executed on the spot.

Hatter: (Trembling) I'm a poor old man, your majesty, and I hadn't but just begun my tea—not above a week or so—and what with the bread and butter getting so thin—and the twinkling of the tea.

King: The twinkling of what?

Hatter: It began with the tea.

King: Of course twinkling begins with "T". Do you take me for a dunce? Go on.

Hatter: I'm a poor man, your majesty.

King: You're a very poor speaker.

Hatter: While drinking my tea, I was most rudely interrupted by a stupid quarrel of the two Knights. After that I cut some more bread and butter, and I can't remember any more.

King: If that's all you know about it, you may go.

Queen: And outside, just take off his head.

King: (To knights) You both observed the rules of battle, of course? (Confusion heard. King and Queen and Duchess with baby are dragged in R.) Order, order! Why this interruption? Who are these people?

1 Guard: King and Queen of Chess.

2 Guard: Duchess.

King: Why are they brought here?

1 Guard: They refused to pay their taxes.

Queen: Off with their heads!

Herald: Wait, a trial there must be.

King: Very well. King and Queen of Chess, why don't you pay your taxes?

Queen of Chess: We are too busy playing around.

King of Chess: We have no money, your majesty.

Tweedle Dee: They drive a swell car.

Tweedle Dum: They wear fine clothes.

King: And you have a fine time, giving parties all the time.

Queen: Off with their heads!

Herald: The Duchess.

King: Duchess, why haven't you paid your taxes?

Duchess: I must save my money. I have to think of the future. Sonney boy will soon be old enough to go to school and I must be able to send him.

Tweedle Dee: If she doesn't pay her taxes, there won't be any school to go to.

Tweedle Dum: Some folks are so dumb they don't think it takes taxes to run a school.

Queen: Off with her head!

(Confusion)

Senior enters noisily through the tunnel.

King: (Indignantly) What do you mean by interrupting this trial?
Who are you?





Senior: I? I am Senior, representing the class of '33 of Boyden High School.

King: Well? What are you doing here?

Senior: I have just finished High School and started on a journey of conquest when by accident I stumbled into a hole and fell down, down, down.

Queen: (Interrupting loudly) Off with his head!

Senior: (Frightened) Such a journey I've never made. It seemed as if I were falling down a very deep well and I thought I'd never stop, when *bang* I fell amongst you.

Queen: (Interrupting) Off with his head!

Senior: It was a terrible journey, but I was not afraid. I love to fight and I will obtain much.

King: (Rising and facing jury) What shall we do with such a radical? A man with such a fighting nature as this should suffer.

Queen: (Interrupting) Off with his head!

Jury: (In chorus) Off with his head!
(Senior cowers in the center of the stage)

Herald: (Advancing to front)
No! A trial there must be;
Of his deeds on earth we cannot see;
Maybe some were good and some were bad,
But we cannot kill this lad

—For—

A trial there must be;
A trial there must be;
Hi, Ho, the merry O
A trial there must be.

King: Very well then, a trial there shall be. Prepare the evidence.

(Confusion) Order, Order, proceed with the trial. Call the first witness.

Herald: (Swears in Miss Historian)

Miss Historian, do you on honor swear, the truth to tell, or bear the consequences that result from falsehoods that invoke insults?

Historian: (Repeats oath)

Herald: What can you say of Senior's early days?

Historian: The Freshmen entered B. H. S. one hundred and seventy-five strong, and chose at the first of their career an able man, Elmer Hoke, to lead them.

Caterpillar: Yes, Elmer was a great ole boy and we in Wonderland greatly admired him but just look at the influence of his leadership on the various members of the class.

Frog: Why, yes, the most outstanding event of the early winter was the English theme written by their most promising author—Bill Cashwell. It read: "A geese is a low, heavy set boid which is mostly meet and feathers. His head sits on one end and he sits on the other. A geese can't sing much on account of dampness of the moisture. He ain't got no between-his-toes, and he's got a little balloon on his stomach to keep him from sinking. Some geeses when they gets big has curls on their tales and is called ganders. Ganders don't haff to sit and hatch, but just eat and loaf, and go swimmin'. If I was a goose, I'd rather be a gander."

Historian: However, you must remember that finally these babes in the wood finished their Freshman year with flying colors.

Frog: Oh. yeah?

Historian: Yes, in one last romp. They won field day from the upper classmen.

Caterpillar: They may have been able to run fast on field day, but when it came to getting to class in a hurry, they were as slow as the Mock Turtle.

Turtle: And you have to suffer for being slow. If the hours that the pupils stayed in for being tardy had been bricks, they could have added two new wings to B. H. S.

All: (Applaud) (Senior rebels and storms around).

King: Order, order in the court room.

Herald: Order in the court room! Order!

King: Order, order, order!

Queen: Off with his head!
Herald: Order, order.
All: Order, order, rah-rah-rah
Order, order, sis-boom-bah
Chickalocka-boom-boom
Chickalooka-bah
Order, order-ray, rah rah.
King: (Rising) Who in all this land so dumb has caused this rank confusion to come?
All: (Pointing to Senior) He, he, see, see, see,
He, he, see, see, see.
Herald: Order!
Queen: Off with his head!
(Guards rush toward Senior)
Herald: Not yet, the trial must be finished.
King: Proceed.
Historian: And so this class embarked in the boat of learning, choosing as its mighty consellor, Burns Beaver, to guide the skiff to another victorious field day.
Walrus: That year they were "wise fools"; that's what they were—and—
Horse: They threatened bloody murder to that most honored and revered of all patriots—Julius Caesar—and—
Gryphon: They called down all sorts of vengeance on the head of that illustrious smart guy, Pythagoras—and—
Historian: Please, please calm yourselves and let me go on with the history of this famous class. These faults you have mentioned were childish ones and were quite overcome in later years.
All: Boooo—Booo—etc.
Historian: (Yelling loudly) Quiet! Quiet! I will have quiet.
Giraffe: Look at her! Look at her! That's the way the class of '33 acted. They were so wild and caused so much commotion that the most illustrious Professor Knox was called upon time and time again to warn them of their misbehavior.
All: Here! Here!
Historian: Yes, that's all true, but this was only practice for the inter-class debate in which their debaters, Marguerite Morrison, Burns Beaver, and Frances Garrett walked off with first honors. Now what have you to say to that! (Silence) And to further their already very worthy ability in their Junior year, Russell Kerr and Carolyn George made Boyden High's affirmative triangular debating team.
Walrus: That's all very nice, but by close observation the teachers of the Junior Class found out that their students were well versed in the art of casting their eyes about the room and gaining information from different papers.
Historian: That's not true! Five members of that class were elected to the National Honor Society, namely: Caroline Lauchman, Frances Garrett, Carolyn George, Margaret Thomason, and Sarah Peeler.
Frog: What of the low average in citizenship—"D"? (Sarcastically) Isn't that good and we also know that they developed the art of giggling and acting smart to the *nth* degree.
Historian: And lest ye forget, let your incapable minds dwell on the elaborate banquet at which the Juniors gave the Seniors a good time.
Gryphon: Being Seniors certainly made you all conceited and snooty. You should see the "schnozzles" that some have developed from snooting underclassmen.
Historian: That's natural, though, isn't it when it was proved they were superior? Remember they won Color Day, and it certainly took superior minds to select Nell Choate as president.
Walrus: I thought I'd die laughing when the would-be-adult seniors marched in with those babylike dunce hats perched on their heads. We've noticed how childish they acted all year.



Historian: But surely you can't condemn the actions of the cast in "All of a Sudden Peggy."

Giraffe: It was easy enough for those girls to act; they practice "putting on" all the time. And it was natural for them to wear all that paint, 'cause 400 compacts were used during the year.

Historian: You creatures would misrepresent these people with your talk of paint and powder. How about some facts for the other side? The most outstanding squadmen on that year's victorious football team were men of the class of '33.

Herald: Is that all your evidence?

Historian: As well as I can remember that completes the history of the class of '33.

Queen: Off with her head!

All: Yes, yes, off with her head! *

King: (To jury) Give your verdict.

Frog: This radical, representing the class of '33, who calls himself Senior shall on the morrow die.

Senior: No, no, we meant no harm.

Herald: Not yet, not yet. There's a great deal more to come before that.

King: Bring forth the second witness.

Herald: (Blows three blasts) Second witness. (Swear him in)
Mr. Statistician—

King: We have heard the history of the class of '33; now give some statistics about Senior.

Statistician: (Unrolls scroll) I have it all down in black and white, your honor. By careful calculation I found that the average height of the class was 5 feet 8 inches.

Giraffe: Yes, I know Daddy Miller was most as tall as I am.

Caterpillar: And Peggy Wallenborn was only 1 foot 2 inches.
(Laughter)

King: Order, order.

Statistician: The average weight was about 140 pounds.

Humpty: How could that be possible with fat and sassy Harvey Bernhardt with his several tons and Franklin—

Gryphon: What about Rachel Crowder and her several ounces?

Statistician: And the shoe size was number 7.

Horse: There's some mistake; Charles Chase's feet alone would make it more than that.

Statistician: The average finished school after four years strain, but some were influenced to stay on longer to play foot-ball. Also this class was about evenly balanced with blondes, and brunettes. Eyes were from azure blue to jet black mounted by penciled black eyebrows.

Walrus: With the exception of Margaret Kern who seemed to like "Brown."

Giraffe: We'll have to look over the bad judgment some people show in political matters.

Tweedle Dee: (Running up) Remember the "alamo". Oh, beg your pardon, I mean remember the Gas Bag of the class, Ralph Earnhardt, better known as Oxygen.

Tweedle Dum: Please don't leave out the best known group in the class—the gum chewers and gigglers. Its leading members are Beulah Armistead, Ruth Walser, and Ruth Camp.

King: Enough, enough, let the jury prepare its verdict.

Guards: (Bring Senior Center).

Queen: Off with his head!

Frog: We, the honorable jury, after hearing the evidence against this radical, and disturber of a trial at the famous court—

Queen: Off with his head!

King: Shut up!

Queen: Off with his head!

King: (Crams paper in queen's mouth) Order, Order. I approve the verdict of the jury and do hereby condemn Senior to die at sunrise. Throw him in chains.

Guards: (Chain Senior.)

Senior: Oh, if I had known death were so near, I would have written my last will and testament.

Lawyer: (Coming forward) Kind Sir, I sympathize with you. Since the beginning of the trial, I have seen that you were to be convicted; therefore I have prepared your last will and testament.

Senior: Read it, my friend; read it.

Lawyer: We, the class of '33 of B. H. (Simultaneously War, Depression, Death, and Dollar fall in with a great deal of noise).

War: Ah, my pretty maid, at last I have you here within my iron clutches. What can your cunning resources bring you now?

Dollar: Don't be in such a hurry to capture Peace. I want to make some investments first, I tell you.

(Scornfully)

War: Investments! Ha! Ha! (To Peace) My pretty one, long have you escaped my cruel grasp, but now—ha. Ha. (Advances threateningly toward her)

Peace: Save me! Save me!

Queen: Off with his head! Off with his head!

Peace: Is there no one in this wide domain that is able to save me from this monster, War?

Senior: (Breaking chains and rushing toward her)

Oh, fair one, I am here! (To War) And what do you want, you and your ugly creatures of destruction, you and your companions?

Death: In my youth, my friend, Dollar, I feared I might injure my brain but now that I'm perfectly sure it's hollow, I do it again and again.

King: Order in the court. (To Death) Get up, you fool. Who do you think you are anyway? And who are your companions?

Death: (After rising) I'm Death—the most destructive thing on the face of the earth.

Tweedle Dee: (To another creature) If the earth has a face, where are we?

Tweedle Dum: We're in her heart.

Death: And one of my companions is Depression who always follows war.

Queen: Off with their heads!


