## Senior Class History

WOULD it be asking too much of you to play upon your imagination long enough to visualize the intelligent seniors of ' 43 who were once a host of silly, empty-headed young freshmen? In
$\star$ the year 1938 there was nothing on our minds but nonsense and gaiety. From the well-bred, intelligent faces that you see today, would you have ever had such a thought? Be that as it may, you now see before you the finished product, and you may wonder as you gaze. Whatever we have gained scholastically we owe to our beloved teachers.

We confront you today with all the knowledge and strength that was gained during our five years here in this hall of learning. When entering this school we did not possess the fine qualities that have later been acquired through directed guidance.

Time has brought about many changes, for during our freshman year, the shortest boy in our class was Clarence Hunter whose favorite occupation was having fun. Since then he has taken an especial liking for reading and creative writing. As a result he is developing into one of the best newspaper reporters of Raleigh.

As we look back over our five years in high school, our greatest puzzle is how Susie Moore, disliking the turmoil of public office, acquired the position as the president of the Freshman Class. The ever-occurring question is, where did she find the time?

Looking back to our sophomore year, we recall how we were determined to make a name for ourselves. As a result of our determination the class of ' 43 has produced proficient football players, players who were at one time nothing but bench warmers (Ollie Crump, Ben Cumbo, James Joyner, and Leslie Wright).

Not only during this period were we interested in athletics, but during this time, as a result of strenuous study, we found ourselves represented in the honor society, the Crown and Scepter. The dominant students of that organization are Elizabeth Wallace, president; Elizabeth Gill, vicepresident; Gwendolyn Ligon, secretary; Charles Farrar, Clarence Hunter, James Walker, Adele Christmas, Pauline Cole, Susie Moore, Adarine Buchanan, Clara Sanders, and Nathaniel Sorrell.

Amazing events have apparently followed us thus far through life. This was especially true in the year 1941 when we were sophisticated juniors. After a joyful summer ninety-seven eager, lighthearted juniors returned to school. Our high spirit soon fell, however, with a big laugh when we learned that we were not really juniors. The new twelfth grade had been added to our curriculum. Nevertheless, we readily adapted ourselves to the trying situation under the leadership of our capable president, Charles Farrar and our advisers, Mrs. E. M. Clark, Mrs. S. V. Perry and Mrs. G. H. Harris. Again we had a commendable representation of members on the honor roll and extra-curricular activities. We were represented in the Glee Club by a large number, but our greatest voice was the basso, Alphonso Powe. It was during this year that Melba Boykin displayed her ability as a speaker and was outstanding as a member of the Debating Society. We left school feeling quite pleased, but realizing that a much greater job than ever was yet to be performed.

Upon returning to school in the fall of 1942 we had many fears that our group would be diminished because of the war. Our class at present has a representation of two in the armed forces. ## Brief History of Max Yergan Hi-Y Club

On April 3, 4, 5, in the year 1925, the Y. M. C. A., through the leadership of H. T. Fesperman, Boys' Secretary, conducted at A. and T. College, Greensboro, the first annual Older Boys' Conference for colored boys in North Carolina. Prof. J. L. Levister, who was at that time Principal of the Washington High School, selected three of the boys to represent the school at this conference. These boys were Louis Haywood, Frank Blalock, and Henry Thomas Johnson. On the program of this conference was an address, "Our Hi-Y Clubs," by Rex Lee of the Charlotte Colored High School.

Shortly after returning from the conference, Henry Thomas Johnson, inspired with the address given by Rex Lee, called together twenty high school boys and organized the Hi-Y Club of Raleigh. These boys held their first meeting in the Sunday school room of the First Baptist Church. The name of the club was selected in honor of Max Yergan who rendered such valuable service as a Y. M. C. A. worker in Africa. The purpose of the Hi-Y clubs is "To create, maintain, and extend throughout the school and community high standards of Christian character."

The first leaders of the club were Rhodes Herndon Toole, Joseph Bernard Christmas, and Henry Thomas Johnson. The first president of the club was Harry Irvin. Very soon after its organization the club received its certificate of affiliation. The club has made much progress and has served to stimulate a high type of conduct and scholarship in the high school. A number of graduates who were members of the $\mathrm{Hi}-\mathrm{Y}$ Club are now filling responsible positions in many places.

In the school year 1933-34, another club was organized for the high school boys in West Raleigh. The members named this club the Joshua Levister Hi-Y Club in honor of Prof. J. L. Levister who was in a very large way responsible for sending the representatives of the high school to the first conference.

In the school year 1934-35, the Hi-Y clubs sponsored the eighth annual Older Boys Conference under the direction of the faculty adviser, Henry Thomas Johnson. Since that time four conferences have been conducted here.

One of the first appearances of the Glee Club under the new music teacher, Mr. Collins, was a Christmas concert given at the Memorial Auditorium with all Negro public schools of Raleigh taking part. The Christmas concert and spring concert have been given annually since 1940.

On numerous occasions the Glee Club won the approval of music lovers in Raleigh and elsewhere. We sang for such groups as the Lions Club, Rotary Club, and Woman's Club. Also the Glee Club sang several times at the Sir Walter and Carolina hotels.

During this year the annual music contests were held at Durham and Greensboro. The Mixed Glee Club, Boys Glee Club, Mixed Quartet, Girls Glee Club, trio, and solos, all received high ratings and first places.

After the spring concert the Glee Club accepted an invitation to sing at the Hugh Morson and later the Needham Broughton High School. These initial programs at these schools were received highly and the Glee Club was invited to sing there again.

The last two appearances for that year were made at the First Baptist Church in observance of the seventy-fifth anniversary of its founding, and the graduation exercises of the high school.

## 1941-42

During the next year the organization which had about ninety members, sang at several his-tory-making events.

We gave a Christmas program at the Woman's Club during the Christmas season and later sang at the United Church. The Glee Club sang for welcoming home exercises for the former ambassador to Mexico, Hon. Josephus Daniels, and at the Edenton Street Methodist Church for the inter-racial meeting. The main speaker for the meeting was the author and playwriter, Richard Green, who spoke on Native Son.

Later we sang at St. Augustine's College, Meredith College, and Shaw University.
1942
We participated in a concert with the Deep River Boys and were presented as the main attraction at the Lincoln Theater on two occasions. We also sang for the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration.

The annual Christmas concert was given at the Memorial Auditorium for the third successive time. Following the contest at Durham we made a series of broadcasts from our school auditorium which had been recently wired.

1943
This year the Glee Club made several appearances along with a smaller group called the Schola Cantorium consisting of twenty-two members. The Schola Cantorium made its debut at the Christmas concert and has made several appearances. These two groups also gave a broadcast during the Christmas season from the new broadcasting station, WPTF. On the Negro history program, the Schola Cantorium and Glee Club sang at St. Augustine's College for the Les Elites Club on February 21. On Monday, March 8, the Glee Club and Schola Cantorium sang at the Carolina Hotel for the Lions Club.

On April.2, we sang for the dance group at St. Augustine's College, and on April 15, at the City Auditorium for a meeting of the N. A. A. C. P.

We were guest singers for vespers at Shaw University on April 11, and participated in the spring concert along with other glee clubs of Raleigh Negro public schools.
