







We explored the backdrops of the stage and learned not to feel strange in a behind-the-scene session with our contemporaries. Our associations with the leading characters increased, and we began to feel that we were more a part of things. We examined the stage on which we were to perform with assurance once we had mastered its strangeness and were amazed to see that its vastness shrank strangely with the progress of familiarity.

Then, in accordance with the theme, the G. C. students and their dates enjoyed a delicious picnic supper.


