Under those bare, gelid figures reclines a panorama of celestial exhilaration and Stygian dejection, one tinged by individual successes and tainted with individual short-comings. Enclosed therein is a gamut of a coachis trials and tribulations, his thrilts and triumphs.

Reposing therein are the long-lingering recollections of an over-time Juniata defeat, a last-minute field-goal that stilled Susquehama, and that cogent overthrow of the sempiternal Nemesis Maryland State.

Buoyant also as those thrills is a series of disappointments that went a long way toward preventing a counterpoise on the records. There was the two-point subjugation inflicted by Pharmacy, a 15 -point victory claimed by Bridgewater, and the recovery Moravian made of its bearings when defeat hovered leeringly above it.

The Blue and Grey struck its, lirst impasee in the gruise of Buchnell - Bisonon Deember ' in a $^{5} 5-32$ sethach. Then folloned the dislueartening 32-30 reversal by Pharmaes. Bridgewater altorded a 10 3: victors. but Albright abseonded with a $60-49$ verdict. Woravian then took its first step toward the league diadem with a 12-23 win, Pharmaey cradled a 15-13 defeat and Ensquehama: defens turned diaphanous in the waning seconds th permit a $36-35$ Ghos werthron.

Juniatas llaceid palisades allowed an orettime 15 - 13 victory and (allaudet withered before a 12-32 drive. Bridgewater qreased the chutes for a $5:-32$ debacle but Gallaudet took a $29-25$ quietus. In the colorful duo of Shirk and Disnes. Coach fomed offensive strength that merited recognition on the leagues all-star teams. In the phacid and eflective Ross Coulson there was a Gibraltar of defensive strength also given league recognit on. In the low-slung Wihmer Fridinger and the voluble Emory Stoufter was discovered a sangfroid that evidenced itself time and again.

Behind the starting guintet there operated a troupe of serviceable performers. Wilbur Raffensperger sprung full-panoplied from the high school ranks: Paul Reed. a tricky speedster from Tower City. Paul Leicht. valuable at guard or center. Curtis Gerhart, the only Senior to merit the spangles and Charles Walker, a sure shot from almost any point.

After weather conditions prevented the fulfilment of the first engagement against Lebanon Valley, Moravian put in its appearance and sent the Blue and Grey upon the dechivious paths with a $6-3$ defcat. Leicht and Eekroth accounted for two singles vietories and then combined to make off with a doubles match.

## Campus Donated Building

On the evoning of Uetoher 31, 1938, a small building of Gothic architecture was prespnted to Elizabethtown College. Perhaps it was a gilt from the gots, many speculated, or posibly some puhlic-spirited philanthropist saw the need oll a new college library. Many and diverse were the stories which enshrouded the mysterious coming ol this stately structure. but at any rate we did know that it was there, appropriately placed in the vicinity of other buildings of similar design. It a subsequent meeting of the powers that lee the problem of naming the building was disensed at areat length. Ater considering such suggestions as "Perry Hall." "Vouch Castle," and others, it was linatly decided to christen the pavilion "Reidy Nemorial Hall" in homor of its probable domor. Regarding the probable use of the new hall came much bitter controversy. some said it hat been intended to be a new library. while others claimed that it should have bern the much-needed music huilding. The latter used as their argument the fact that the very design and construction of the hall was conducive to the best acoustical effects. A number of other uses were sugrested, hut no conchusion ultimately reached. As did the ancient Trojan horse disappear, so did this esteemed structure vanish into ublivion, but the legend will live on in the annals of the schorel.
