"Run to the office for a few more pointers. . ." So often I heard this saying from Mr. Adrian Buerger`s solid geometry class. Here students learned in an informal, interesting way. They applied the principle of "seeing is believing and added such new words to their wocabulary as prisms. polyhedrons and icosahedrons. What they have learned will ke the basis for higher mathematics. the foundation of enginecring.
