## Colophon <br> Thank You

Josten's Printing and Publishing Division at State College, Pennsylvania printed the 650 copies of the 1999 Euclidian. The book was printed on Gloss 191 paper stock and included 48 pages of full color. All pages were created using the Aldus PageMaker® 5.0 program running on a Macintosh IIsi computer that had 17 megabytes of RAM, a 540 megabyte hard drive and a Daystar Powercache 50 megahertz accelerator card with math coprocessor installed. The pages were backed-up onto a 100 megabyte Iomega ${ }^{\circledR}$ removable Zip disk. A 21" black and white, two page monitor made page layouts much easier. A second Macintosh Ilsi computer with 17 megabytes of RAM and a Video Spigot card was networked to the first. Both computers were running System 7.1. Digital images were imported either directly from a Sony Mavica MVC-A10 Still Video Camera into the Video Spigot or were scanned in from a photograph using a 600 dpi scanner. The images were processed using Adobe Photoshop ${ }^{(8)}$ which had Kai's Power Tools® plug-ins installed Graphics were produced using Aldus Freehand ${ }^{8}$, Type Styler® and Microsoft Works®. The index was made using the Josten's program, Last Name First®. The pages were recorded on 3.5 inch floppy disks and 100 megabyte lomega ${ }^{8}$ Zip disks and hard copy was printed on a Hewlett Packard LaserJet III printer. The hardcopy and disks were sent to Josten's who stripped in the photos and produced the final copy on a Linotronic printer. The first deadline was submitted on a lomega ${ }^{\circledR}$ disk since there was so much memory needed. The rest of the deadlines were submitted on 3.5 inch floppies. The cover was designed by the Josten's Art Department. Pages were submitted to the plant on six deadlines: November 2, November 24. December 18, January 29, February 26 and March 12. The pages were submitted as double page spreads. All the color pages had to be in the first deadline since their production entailed so much work. Since the final deadline was in early March, nothing that occurred after that time could be included in the book. The picture patron option has gained in popularity with eighty seven students having their baby pictures included. The Name Stamp option that was begun last year has also increased in popularity

The staff of the 1999Euclidian would like to extend thanks to all who helped to make this book possible. First and foremost, thanks have to go to the adviser, Mr. Von Benken for the many long hours of hard work and planning that had to be put in to get the entire operation going and to keep it going. Others to be thanked are: Ohio School Pictures, Inc, for supplying film and processing for the many pictures that appeared in the book and for taking many of the team pictures, senior and underclass pictures. Josten's Yearbook Company for putting it all together in such an artistic manner, Charlotte Elston for all the time she spent arranging photography dates and supplying needed materials. Joannne Hodder and Joan Beuoy and Marilyn Foote and Michael Barnes for all the time and work they did trying to get the senior pictures arranged and taken, all the writers and photographers who contributed their time, and last but not least, the entire student body at Euclid High School without which this book could not exist.

Many people helped in some way with the 1999 Euclidian. Some wrote stories while others worked on the laying out of the book while others helped in the mailing of letters. Aaron Carpenter is shown riding his Trials bike on the rocks along the lake shore. He is participating in a sport called Observed Trials.
Observed Trials is a sport of European origin and involves riding over obstacles without putting one's feet down. The obstacles can be shipping pallets. logs, rocks, spools, cement blocks, cars, etc. Perfect balance, smooth technique and strength are required. Organized competitions usually involved a series of four to ten "sections" which had specific lines and directions the riders had to proceed through to complete the section. Riders got points for putting their foot down. The rider with the least points at the end was the winner. There are two types of trials bikes. The "Stock" bike was basically a normal 26" mountain bike with at least five working gears. Good brakes and a light, strong frame was highly recommended. The "Modified" bike is what Aaron is shown riding. It consists of a frame with custom geometry, $20^{\prime \prime}$ wheels, a "bashguard" below the crank and brakes front and rear. These bikes are NOT BMX bikes.


The great thing about Trials was that you could ride on almost anything, almost anywhere. Aaron and his friends rode in Downtown Cleveland. local parks and even at the high school or wherever there was a wide variety of urban terrain, including walls, benches, cement blocks, stairs, etc. One important factor on their rides was to kep a watchful eye out for the police who sometimes take a dim view of riding in strange places.
