FORMAL OPENING CONVOCATION

On October 11, 1989, students, faculty and staff listened intently as Dr. Marshall Bass delivered the keynote address at the 123rd Formal Opening Convocation. JONATHAN BUSH VISITS THE "AUG"

Jonathan Bush, brother of the president of the United States, board member of the United Negro College Fund, investment banker and philanthropist, visited the Saint Augustine's campus on Saturday, November 18, 1989. He came at the invitation of Dr. Prezell Robinson to address the fall meeting of the college's Board of Associates. He also spoke with a group of fifteen Honor Students as part of the first annual Educational Awareness Seminar.

Mr. Bush has been active in supporting the UNCF for many years and his philanthropic deeds were acknowledged as he was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters Degree by Dr. Robinson, president of the college. Further recognition included the planting of a tree in his honor.

BAHAMIAN PRIME MINISTER KEYNOTES HONORS CONVOCATION

His visit was due in part to the large number of Bahamians that help to make up our student body. The Prime Minister was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree by Dr. Prezell R. Robinson, president of Saint Augustine's College.

Why the light has shone my way.

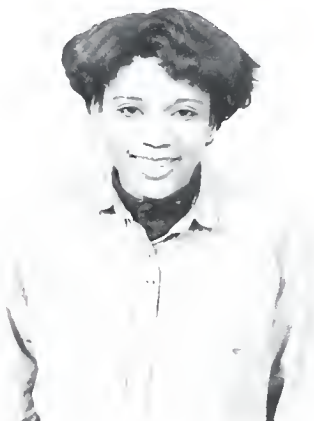

NCAA Outdoor

Going into the final day's competition, Saint Augustine's trailed Cal State Northridge, but took first in the High Jump, 1600-meter relay, the 400-meter hurdles and the 400 meter relay to win its second consecutive Division II Outdoor Track and Field Championship. The Mighty Falcons captured the field with 111 points, Cal State Northridge was second with 60 points. Saint Augustine's scored most of its points in the jumps and the short sprints. Kenneth Brokenburr took second place in both the 100 and 200-meter dashes, as well as running legs on the winning 400-meter and 1600-meter relays. Terrell Carpenter, who also ran a leg on the 400-meter relay took second in the long jump. Other winners for the Falcons were Darrin Moore in the long jump, Charles Johnson in the 110-meter hurdles and Fitroy Morrison in the 400-meter Hurdles. Moore's and Johnson's marks both set stadium records at Hampton's Armstrong Field. The women finished with 44 points and a sixth place in the championship. Cynthia Badgett won the long jump and Gladys Milton took third in the 400-meter hurdles. Irish Holmes and LaTanja Hall finished fourth and seventh respectively in the long jump.

NCAA Indoor

The Falcons didn't match their record 94 points and 63-point victory margin of a year ago, but they came up with 70 points, which was enough to outdistance Abilene Christian by 24, and capture the National Indoor title for the third consecutive time. Leading Saint Augustine's was Kenneth Brokenburr, who won the 55-meter dash with a winning time of 6.28. Terrell Carpenter won his second straight title in the long jump with a leap of 24 feet, 8¼ inches. Brokenburr also ran on





the winning 4x400 relay which was anchored by Duane Johnson with a time of 3:12.85.

The Saint Augustine's triumph also featured runner-up efforts in the long jump (24-6½) and triple jump (50-8 ¾) by Xavier Donaldson and a second place performance by Darrin Moore in the high jump (7-0¼). In the women's scoring, the Falcons finished fourth with a total of 25 points. Cynthia Badgett won the long jump with a leap of 18 feet 10¼ inches; Teammates LaTanja Hall (18-8¼), Irish Holmes (18-5¼), and Gladys Milton (18-4 ¾) took second, fifth and sixth respectively.

In the triple jump, Irish Holmes finished fourth with a jump of 39 feet 2½ inches, LaTanja Hall (38-1¼) placed seventh, and Tara Burns (37-6½) finished ninth.

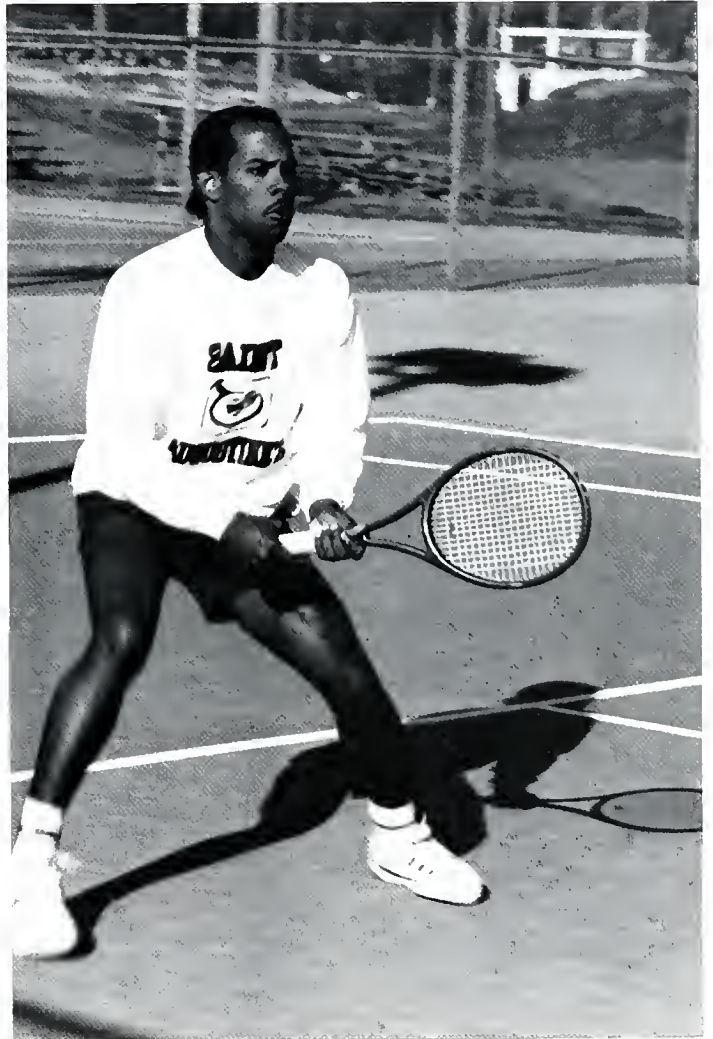




TENNIS

The Falcon Netters finished the 1989-90 season with an 16-4 overall record winning thirteen of seventeen matches played in the CIAA Conference, good enough for a second place finish in the Southern Division.

In the finals of the conference championships, Saint Augustine's met Livingstone College who proved to be the stronger team. Team captain Christopher Mamman and teammate Sigismund Sanyaolu shared identical records of 16-4, singles team competition.





VOLLEYBALL

Saint Augustine's College won its second straight CIAA Volleyball Championship and its 11th in 12 years under the guidance of Head Coach Freddie Bennett, who was named CIAA Coach of the Year, and his assistant, Debra Dove. The Falcons defeated North Carolina Central University 10-15, 6-15, 15-3, 15-11, 15-6 in the championship game after beating Hampton University in the semi-finals 10-15, 16-14, 15-4. The team finished the 1989 season with a record of 25-11, and of the sixteen conference matches in the regular season, the Falcons lost only one, that to foe Winston-Salem State.

The lady spikers posted the best record in Southern Division play (11-1) to capture the CIAA Southern Division title. Hitter/Blocker Annise King was named to the Southern Division All-Conference team, while teammates Donya Coles and Teressa Sanders made the CIAA All-Tournament team selection. Sanders also received Most Valuable Player honors for the tournament.

WOMEN'S SOFTBALL

The Lady Falcon Softball Team finishing with an overall record of 41-11 took their show on the road the early part of the 1990 season battling such Division I and II powers as Barry University, Villanova, Florida A & M, and the University of Bridgeport as a tune-up for the all-important CIAA Conference race. The Lady Falcons went to Charlotte, NC for their first Southern Division meeting with Johnson C. Smith, annihilating the opposition (30-0), and setting a team record for most runs in a game. But what was most significant about the game was the fact that all the runs were scored in only three innings of play.

Coach Bev Downing, along with Assistants Dot Neal and Debra Dove formulated a team that ranked 3rd in the NCAA South Region, finished undefeated in the conference with a record of 23-0, captured for the fifth consecutive year the CIAA Southern Division title, and were runner-up in the CIAA Softball Championship. The Lady Falcons were in true form the opening day of the CIAA Softball Championship held in Winston-Salem, NC eliminating Northern Division foes Virginia Union University (17-0), and Hampton University (12-3). But the gods were not as kind the second day as the team fell to Norfolk State (6-4), in a game that sent the Lady Falcons to the loser's bracket with a match-up with Hampton and the opportunity to make it back to the main draw, Hampton lost 10-6.

Winning that contest set the stage for the Norfolk State and Saint Augustine's match-up, with the Lady Falcons needing two wins to claim the championship. The team won the first game (6-1), but fell in the championship game 10-2.

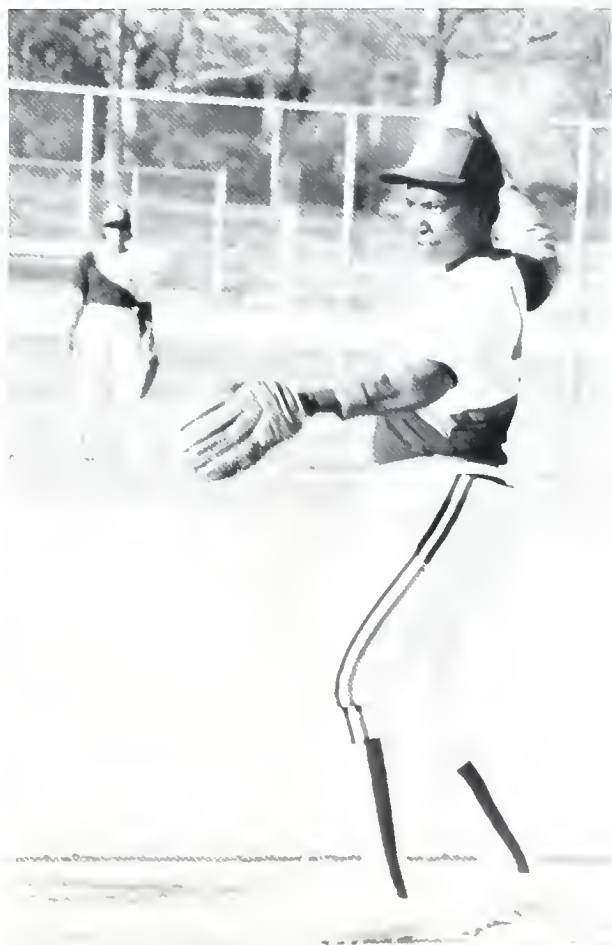

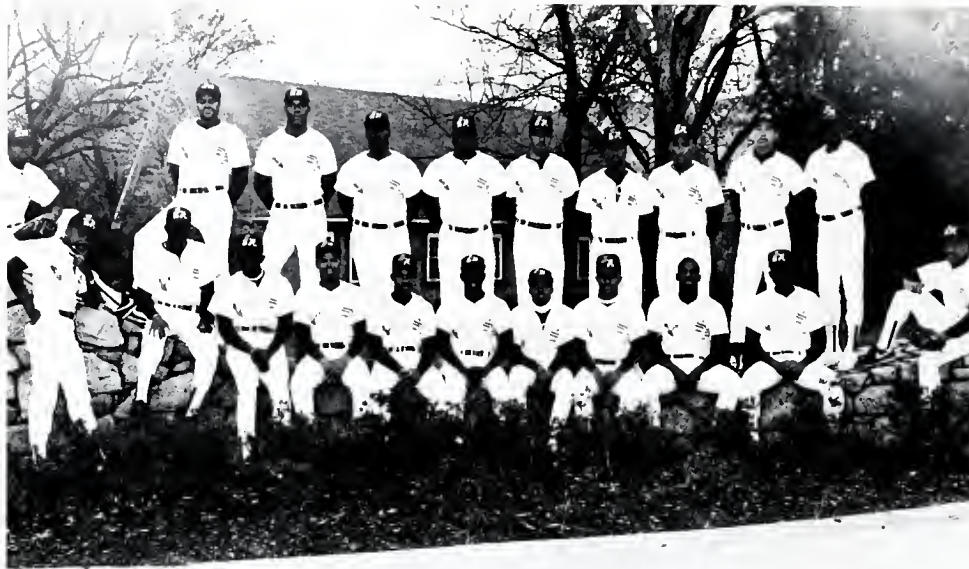

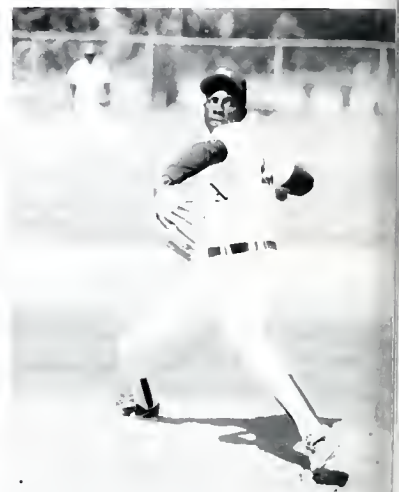
BASEBALL

The 1990 season saw Head Coach Henry White and the Falcon Baseball Team bounce back from a dismal showing last year with an overall record of 26-17. White and Assistant coach Frank Logan led the "Men with Bats" to a second place finish in the CIAA for the regular season and a third place finish in the CIAA Conference tournament.

In highlighting the season, the Falcons established some new team records:

- 9 Home Runs against Elizabeth City State
- 20 steals in a Double Header against Bowie State
- 15 runs scored against Norfolk State in one inning
- 45 Home Runs in a season
- Julian Pratt led the team in Stolen Bases with a team record 43 of 48 for a .895 percentage.

The team had a Batting Average of .371 with a total of 12 players having averages above .300. The CIAA also acknowledged the conference's best in Baseball by honoring St. Augustine's **Greg Bobbit** — Pitcher; **Julian Pratt** — 2nd Base; **Jerry Waters** — Outfielder; and **Ricky Sanders** — Outfielder, as ALL-CIAA. GOLF

Saint Augustine's Men's Golf team capped off a banner season by winning the 1990 CIAA Golf Championship held in Winston-Salem, NC on April 27-28, 1990. The Falcons won in convincing fashion as they scored a two day total of 640 on the par 72, 6,540 yard course. Individual medalist honors went to Chris Brown, who had a final round 4-over-par 76 and a total score of 147 for the two day event. Brown is regarded by many coaches as the most talented black golfer in the USA.

Results for the year saw the Falcons winning 5 tournaments, finishing second once and third in another of the 11 tournaments scheduled. All-CIAA honors went to Greg Blanks and Chris Brown, with Brown being selected CIAA Player of the Year. Our own Lawrence "Peaches" Coleman was voted 1989-90 Coach of the Year in the CIAA.

In post season play, the team finished third in the National Minority College Golf Championship held in Cleveland, Ohio on May 21-22, 1990. Chris Brown finished third in individual medalist play and was one of six players to be awarded All-American honors. The 36 hole tournament brought together top golfers from 18 black colleges and universities throughout the country.

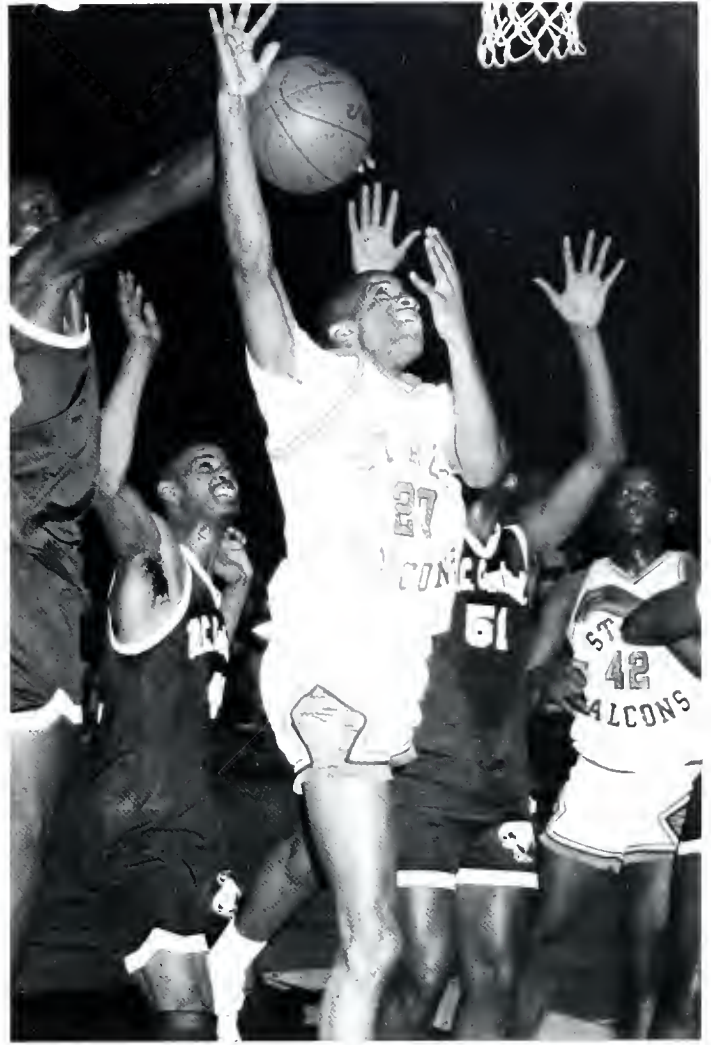
MEN'S BASKETBALL

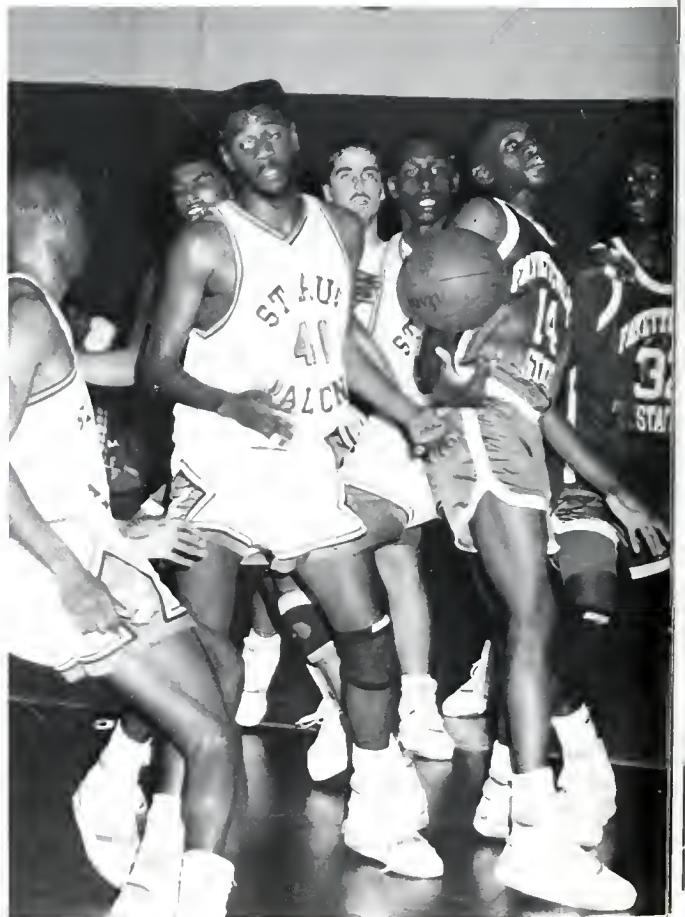
The 1989-90 season was a long one for the Saint Augustine's Falcons and their loyal supporters. It was a season of struggle highlighted by occasional flashes of brilliance. Raw talent was evident as usual and the Falcons' brand of basketball, exciting and gut-wrenching, was in effect. Yes, the Falcons did fly, but inconsistency and questionable discipline did not allow them to soar. Coach Heartley led his charges to an overall record of 8-15, and 8-11 in the CIAA Southern Division, good enough for fifth place.

Forward Gary Mattison led the Falcons' "run and gun" offense with a 21.1 ppg. average. He was ably assisted by point-guard Donte Blanton (15. ppg., 84% FTA, and 3.2 assists), John Hunter (2.3 assists), and 6'7 Shawn Garrett who averaged 10.0 ppg., 7.3 Rebounds, and shot 59 percent from the field. Six-foot-five Michael Dearman was chairman of the boards as he pulled down 194 rebounds for an 8.8 per game average.

Statistically, the Falcons averaged 79.0 points/game, shot 45 percent from the field, (33% 3-Point FGA), pulled down 41.9 rebounds/game (964 total), and made 66% of free throws attempted. This has been a learning-season for the Falcons and the experience should allow them to be much-improved in 1991 thus allowing them to reassume their perch in the upper half of the conference standings. Watchwords for the coming season are: PICK, SCREEN, PASS, HUSTLE, DEFEND and WIN!

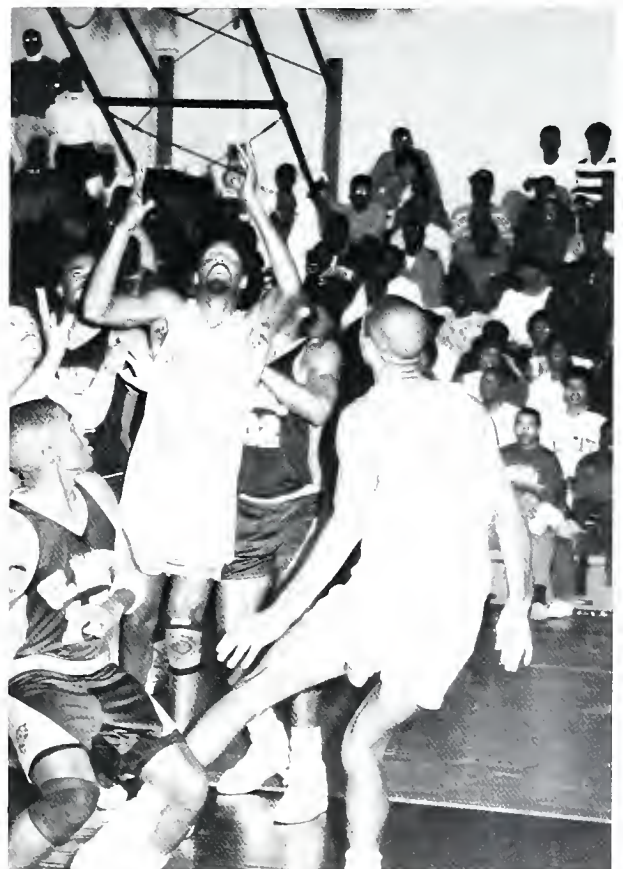

Fourteen St. Augustine's College students were among the 120 member contingent from Historically Black Colleges and Universities that participated in the mock United Nations General Assembly on April 6-7, 1990 at Charlotte, North Carolina. The program, which is sponsored by the N.C. Consortium for International and Inter-cultural Education (NCIIE), is composed of Historically Black Colleges in North Carolina and committed to promoting interest in and the study of International Affairs.

NCCIIE co-sponsored the event with the Triangle Universities Security Seminar (TUSS), a consortium consisting of Duke University, North Carolina State University, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel-Hill. Participants simulated fifty delegations and negotiated six resolutions.

Augustine's received distinguished delegate awards: Rouchell Chesson for negotiating a Palestinian rights resolution as Ambassador from Liberia; Lovell Saunders as Cuban Ambassador for achieving a realistic resolution on the repayment of foreign debts by developing countries; Kenneth Woodberry, acting as delegate from Cuba, for building consensus for a resolution on global

environmental protection; and Eugenia Smith, honorable mention, for presenting a resolution as U.S.S.R. delegate to transform the Declaration on the Rights of the Child into a legally binding treaty.

Dr. Daniel W. Figgins served as programs coordinator and advisor to the Saint Augustine's College group.



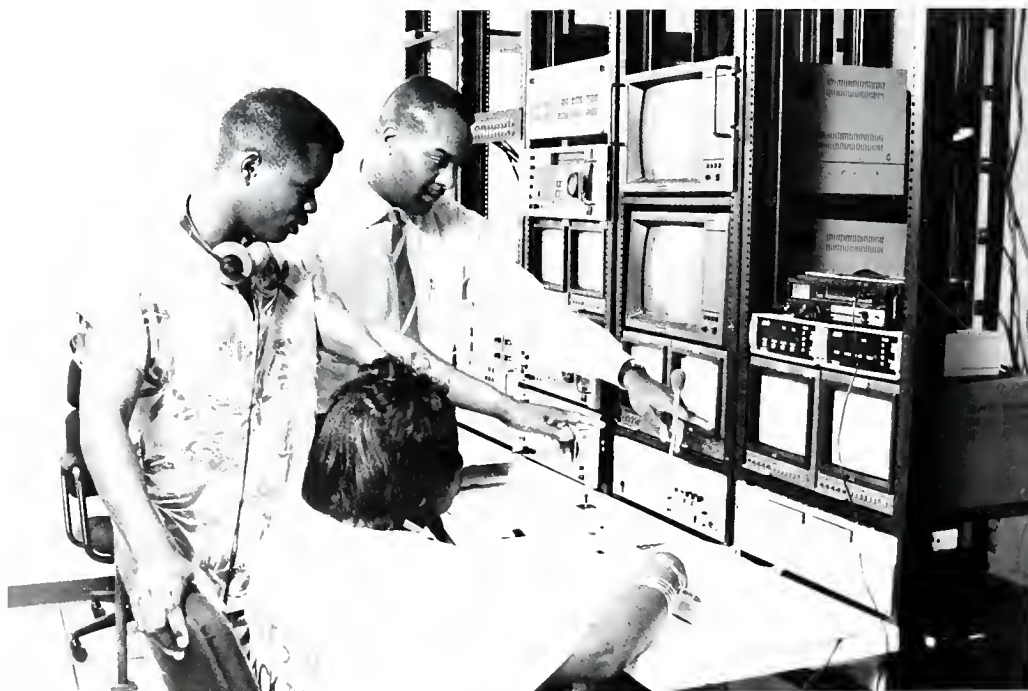

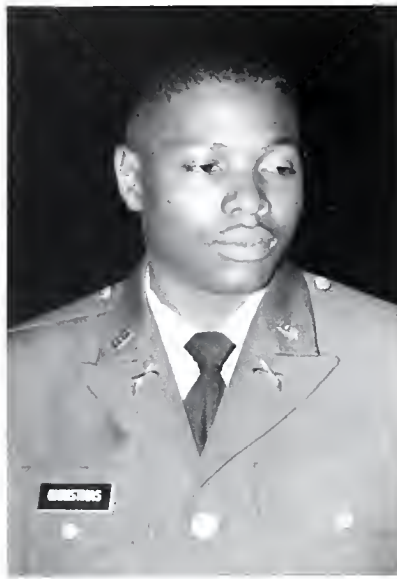


16TH ANNUAL COMMISSIONING CEREMONY
