

The 1991-92 school term marks an important milestone in the history of Saint Augustine's College. We have every reason to rejoice in song as we celebrate the 125th Anniversary of the founding of our beloved institution. We celebrate a century-plus of educating, enlightening, and enriching the lives of generations of students and the rendering of an invaluable service to the community-at-large. We celebrate with the offering to hold fast to our dreams and to pass onward greater opportunity to all who shall follow us.

Since its founding on July 19, 1867, (classes commenced on January 1, 1868) Saint Augustine's College has been a beacon to a significant portion of the populace. The growth and ensuing prosperity have not come by happenstance, but rather by staying abreast of change, commiting to academic excellence and by maintaining accountability to a constituency — individuals and families who have made attending Saint Augustine's a tradition. 




Out of the night that covers me, Black as the pit from pole to pole, I thank whatever gods may be For my unquerable soul.

CELEBRATING TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF PRESIDENTIAL LEADERSHIP

Dr. Prezell R. Robinson, President of Saint Augustine's College, has given over thirty-five years of dedicated service to "the Aug". Having served in the capacity of Academic Dean (1955-66), professor, and President (1967-Present), Dr. Robinson has left an indelible impression on the institution and had significant impact on the lives of many students who have passed through the halls of academia.

A native of South Carolina, Dr. Robinson graduated from Voorhees High School and Junior College before matriculating here at Saint Augustine's, where he was graduated in 1946. He honed his leadership skills by becoming involved in numerous organizations while here at the college. Advanced degrees were attained from Cornell University, Ithaca, New York (M.S., Ed.D).

In February 1967, Dr. Robinson took office as the eighth president of Saint Augustine's College. His elevation to the presidency ushered in a new era in the life of the college. His keen sense of purpose and indefatigable spirit have allowed Saint Augustine's to broaden its basic mission and address the needs of today's society as relates to its work force and future leadership. A greater emphasis on character development, broad-based instruction, and a more-global perspective have become imperatives as the college looks toward the 21st Century.

"Prexy", as we fondly call Dr. Robinson, has played no small part in seeing to it that Saint Augustine's College maintains her place at the vanguard of educating "the brightest among us", as well as many of those "somewhat less prepared" — for indeed, many diamonds have been hewn from rough stone.

The naming of the Prezell R. Robinson Library in his honor, a few years ago, is testimony to achievements of Dr. Robinson. The honor speaks to his commitment to his alma mater over the years and of his stature as an educator. Additionally, he has received honorary degrees from Columbia University, Cuttington University College, and Voorhees College, among others. Dr. Robinson has also been recognized as one of the most effective Presidents of colleges and universities in the nation.







SAINT AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE GRADUATE BEATS OBSTACLES


Sunday, May 10, 1992 was a red-letter day for Charles L. Walker. The Sociology major and Raleigh-native graduated with honors (cum laude), from Saint Augustine's College. The accomplishment is particularly noteworthy in that he preserved after having lost his sight in 1987. At age two, Charles was diagnosed with glaucoma and spent kindergarten through the second grade attending the Governor Morehead School for the Blind. He entered public school in the third grade, and was reluctant to wear his thick glasses for fear of being teased by his schoolmates. This caused his studies to suffer. He would later drop out of high school and go to work. He finished his high school studies at Wake Technical Community College.

An eye infection resulting from being hit in the eye during a game led to his eventual blindness. The ordeal took its toll on his family life but with the encouragement of his grandmother, he got past the lowest points of that period.

Charles made the decision to further his education at Saint Augustine's College. He had already received his associate's degree from Rutledge College. The Special Services Program at St. Aug's helped him arrange his courseload and found people to assist him in his pursuit of the degree. He was somewhat independent from the beginning, accepting some of the givens and making the most of the available resources, both human and physical. His drive has enabled him to outdistance the odds. He's got to be a winner.







ANTONIO PETTIGREW 1991 WORLD CHAMPION — 400 METERS

Antonio Pettigrew may have surprised a few people during the 1991 track season, but never did he demonstrate a shortage of confidence in his own capabilities. The fact is that he met the challenge and came up the big winner against tough competition, garnering a healthy measure of respect in the process.

The NCAA Division II Championships saw him win the 400 meters and anchor the Falcons' winning effort in the 1600 meter relay as St. Aug's again won the overall men's team championship for 1991.

At the 1991 U.S. Nationals, held in New York, Pettigrew won the 400 meters. The victory was a repeat of his winning effort in the 1989 U.S.

National Championships. Even so, there was no time to rest on his laurels. Tokyo awaited.

On the 29th day of September 1991, at the World Championships in Tokyo, Japan, Antonio Pettigrew brought honor to himself and to "the Aug" as he won the 400 meters in a time of 44.57, thus becoming the 1991 World Champion. No doubt, it was the high point in his career.

All-ClAA, All-America, World Champion! Antonio Pettigrew is a world-class performer. More importantly, he's a class act. We salute him



The idea of Saint Angustine's College originated from within the Protestant Episcopal Church in the period immediately following the American Civil War. At the general conference in 1865, the Church chose the Rev. J. Brinton Smith — then head of a school for poor children in Jersey City, NJ — to lead the new Freedman's Commission, one of three departments of the Board of Missions of the Episcopal Church. Rev. Smith believed that what the freedmen needed most was "teachers of their own color" to educate themselves and, thereby, become productive citizens.

In a letter dated March 20, 1867, Rev. Smith — then Secretary and General Agent of the Freedman's Commission — appealed for increased support from the Northern Congregations to establish schools, buy books, and to "occupy many places that were presented", for use in helping freedmen. He noted that other religious groups were engaged in such efforts and might secure religious control and influence, should the Episcopal Church not exert itself more.

In the September 1867 issue of the *Spirit of Missions*, it was announced that the Executive Committee was about to establish a school at Raleigh — The SAINT AUGUSTINE'S NORMAL SCHOOL AND COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE. The sum of \$25,000 had been secured from the estate of the late Charles Avery of Pittsburgh, Pa. who had devised a large sum of money to be devoted to the elevation of colored people in the United States and Canada. Dr. Smith resigned from the commission to accept the principalship of the new school. According to Dr. Smith there were enrolled on the first day only four students. The session opened in the *Howard School House* which was located in the area currently occupied by the NC Division of Motor Vehicles on New Bern Avenue.

The site of the present day campus encompasses 110 acres, which includes the Jones-Seawell property, also known *as WELCOME* and/or *SEVEN SPRINGS* — which was purchased for the permanent campus. The institution was named for the fourth-to-fifth-century saint, Augustine, Bishop of Hippo.

The Delany Family is an important part of the Saint Augustine's tradition. The Rev. Henry B. Delany, D.D., patriarch of the family, was an educator and Episcopal Bishop who gave many years of service to the college. Born in St. Mary's, Ga., he enrolled in St. Augustine's School in 1881 to prepare for the ministry. He was already a mason by trade. After completing the academic course in 1885, he remained on the faculty of his Alma Mater serving as teacher, chaplain, and vice-principal (1889-1908). He was also supervisor of several building projects on the campus. He resigned on October 15, 1908 to become Archdeacon of the colored work in the Diocese of North Carolina. On November 18, 1918 Rev. Delany was consecrated Suffragan Bishop of North Carolina in the College Chapel. He died on April 14, 1928.

Mrs. Nannie Logan Delany, wife of Bishop Delany, came to St. Augustine's as a student in 1877. She was graduated in 1884 and married Bishop Delany in October 1886. They had ten children, all of whom were born and attended school on the campus. Mrs. Delany served as an instructor in cooking and domestic science and was matron for over thirty years. The Delany Building was named in her honor. Several of the Delany children worked as teachers on the campus, with Dr. Lemuel T. Delany serving as college physician and on staff of St. Agnes Hospital.

The Boyer Family's affiliation with Saint Augustine's College dates back to 1896 when Charles H. Boyer came to serve as teacher of mathematics, Greek, and physical education. A graduate of Yale (A.B., 1896; M.A., 1915), he gave over forty years of dedicated service to the college. He became the school's first Dean and was largely responsible for the elevation of the college to the senior college level when its first degrees were granted in 1931. He was active in every part of the institution's life.

Dr. James Alexander Boyer, President — Emeritus, and one of the seven Boyer's children, graduated from the Junior College Department in 1927. After matriculating at Morehouse College ('31), he returned to Saint Augustine's as a teacher in 1934. Like his father before him, he also served as a coach. He later became Dean, and served as President from 1955 through 1966. He is presently a Professor of English, and has rendered over Fifty years of dedicated service to Saint Augustine's College. Dr. Boyer's sister, Ruth Boyer Walker, served the college for many years as Assistant Registrar and college librarian.











The establishment of St. Agnes Hospital in 1896 was due primarily to the faith and work of Mrs. A.B. Hunter, wife of the President. At the general Convention held in 1895 in Minneapolis, Mrs. Hunter made a plea to the Women's Auxiliary for funds for a much-needed hospital for Negroes in the community in which St. Augustine's College was situated. Reading her speech prompted Mr. I.L. Collins to give \$600.00 which he had set aside as a memorial to his late wife. That gift along with an anonymous gift of \$500.00 represented the original capital for St. Agnes Hospital — the name having been selected as a memorial to Mrs. Collins, whose Christian name was Agnes. The residence of the late Dr. Sutton was taken over and enlarged to serve as a hospital building and nurses' home. The first Commencement of the Training School for Nurses was held April 21, 1898. A new and larger four-story stone building was dedicated by Bishop Joseph B. Cheshire on May 25, 1909.

St. Agnes Hospital served the minority community in Raleigh and surrounding areas until 1960. It was among the larger hospitals serving the colored race between Washington and Atlanta and the nursing school provided many of nurses who served the more remote areas. The Hospital Building has been designated an Historic Site and is scheduled to be renovated in the very near future. It is deserving of such attention.








125TH OPENING CONVOCATION

highest and the endowment has


grown significantly from what it was several years ago". Saying that there is still an unfinished task, he reiterated that education is the key to upward [] mobility.


A FOCUS UPON WELLNESS

Many were fans coming to get a first-hand glimpse of the NBA Super-Star. The game, this time, was about something more serious than basketball — it was about life and the ramifications of the deadly A.I.D.S. virus.

Magic Johnson arrived to thunderous applause and spoke candidly about A.I.D.S. — the disease and the phobia that sometimes surrounds it. "It's nobody's disease", he said, indicating that, he didn't think he would be susceptible to contracting the HIV virus either. He, noted for the broad smile which was in evidence, emphasized that life goes on; that he would continue to get the message out — as AIDS afflicts many in the minority community. Equally significant was his message of self-empowerment through ownership/partnerships—the point being that as long as we are simply consumers, we will always find ourselves at the mercy of somebody else's whim.





NCAA DIVISION II CHAMPIONS — 1992 TRACK & FIELD

Coach George Williams' culinary skill may be suspect, but he definitely has the recipe for success on the track . . . and his charges keep winning again, and again, and again. 1992 saw the Falcons win their eleventh straight CIAA crown and their fourth consecutive NCAA Division II Outdoor Championship. They also repeated in the NCAA Indoor Championships, winning their 6th title.

In the CIAA, the Falcons bested 2nd place Norfolk State 231 to 93pts as world champion Antonio Pettigrew won in the 400 and anchored the 4x100 and 4x400 relays. Among the other winners were Keith Holley in the long (26-71/4) and triple jump (55-1/4), Burnice Cross in the Discus (157-8), and Gilbert Hashan in the 400 intermediate hurdles (51.95). The Falcons swept the top four spots in the 100 as Cedric Jackson and Mark Mason tied for first (10.4).

The Falcons won a record fourth straight 4x100 relay at the NCAA Outdoor Championships at San Angelo, Texas. Emmitt Higgins won the triple jump title with a leap of 51-6½ and Gilbert Hashan won the 400 hurdles in a season-best 50.52.

The team made it to the championship game of the CIAA Tournament before falling to Norfolk State, 84-78. Coach of the Year Beverly Downing did an excellent job of blending experience and youth.




THE MIGHTY FALCONS

The 1991-92 season was one of rebuilding for the Saint Augustine's Falcons. The inexperience told as the team posted an 11-15 overall record, 5-7 in the CIAA Southern Division. Youthful exuberance could not sustain the Falcons down the stretch as inconsistency proved to be their achilles' heel. Discipline remained a question mark.










In 1962 officials at Saint Augustine's College began considering the possibility of establishing a Senior Army ROTC Program on campus. Formal application was made to the Secretary of the Army in June 1967 and subsequently approved for a program to commence with the 1972-73 school year. Upon request, the program activation date was delayed until 1974. During the initial semester, one-hundred and forty students enrolled in the program.

Since 1974, the SAC Falcon Battalion has had a cross-enrollment agreement with Shaw University, and with North Carolina Wesleyan College since April 1987. The Military Science Curriculum offers both the two and four-year ROTC programs. In August 1983 the detachment fully implemented the Army's Military Qualification Standards I. Over 339 cadets have received commissions as Army Second Lieutenants since the Falcon Battalion was established. The emphasis continues to be providing excellent leadership for today's Army.



I've shut the door on yesterday And throw my key away — Tomorrow holds no doubt for me, Since I have found today.






