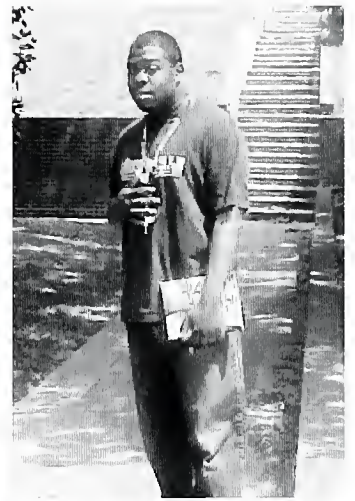
Sophomore Class of 2004

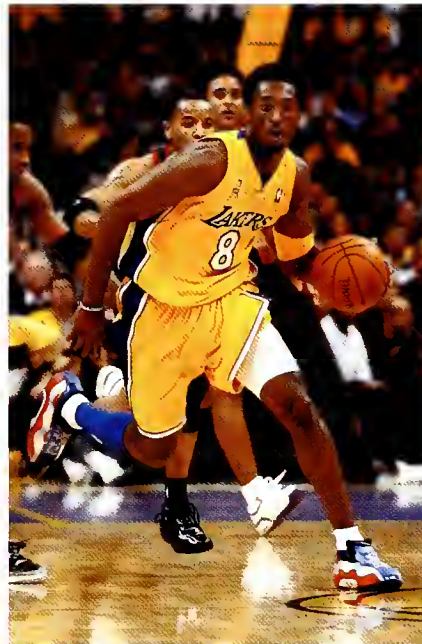
