"3 TO 4 FEET" means that the tree or plant will be 3 feet or over, but under 4 feet; and throughout the list the same.

STOCK SPECIALLY SELECTED by customers at the Nurseries will be charged according to the value of the stock chosen, irrespective of catalog price.

VISITORS WELCOME. You are invited not only to visit the office, but to go over the extensive grounds as well. There are more than 500 acres in the farm.

OUR LOCATION. Now on Friendly Road, via Guilford College school, 6 miles west of city limits, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile east of highway 421 to Winston-Salem. Our shipping point is Guilford College, N. C.

PRICES INCLUDE PACKING, EXCEPT ON SPECIAL BULKY PIECES, for which cost of packing will be extra, and f.o.b. our shipping station, or for local delivery on our regular routes.

TERMS, CASH WITH ORDER, except to persons who satisfy us as to their responsibility, when for their convenience accounts will be opened, due in 30 days from date of invoice.

AUTO-TRUCK DELIVERIES, based on actual cost, if no Government regulations to interfere, are made within a reasonable distance of our Nurseries. The advantages of truck delivery are many. Boxing is eliminated, stock arrives in much better condition, and the goods are landed on the ground within a short time after being dug.

GUARANTEE. Lindley Nurseries, Inc., exercise the greatest care possible to keep their varieties true, and hold themselves in readiness to reship any tree or plant that may prove otherwise, or refund the original sum of money paid therefor, if reported to them within five years from date of order. It is mutually agreed that they are not further responsible in any case.

REPLACEMENT POLICY. When planting is not done by us, our responsibility ceases upon delivery of the stock in good condition. However, if it has been properly cared for, and if the bill was paid as agreed, we will resupply at half list price.

Where we do the planting under a replacement guarantee, we will resupply once any plants that die within the specified time PROVIDED the account is paid as agreed and reasonable care has been taken.

OFFICIAL INSPECTION. We furnish with each shipment a certificate that our Nurseries have been examined by the State Entomologist of North Carolina and found free from contagious diseases.

BLACKBERRY PLANTS

These require but little attention, producing good crops of fine berries. They are native to the Piedmont section, and will give excellent results with but little care except keeping the weeds and grass out, in addition to removing the old canes. No staking required.

Alfred. One of the best sorts; the berries are large and nearly coreless. Productive.

Eldorado. A strong, upright grower; large juicy berries.

BOYSENBERRY PLANTS

The berries are very large, delicious flavor. The plant is a very vigorous grower, and for this reason should be planted on medium to rather poor soil, well drained; tie up to a wire fence of about three strands, handling carefully.

DEWBERRY VINES

Not suited to mountain country, but do well in eastern and Piedmont sections. Advisable to tie the vines to a stake.

Lucretia. The old stand-by. Early bearing, large, delicious.

Young. A newer sort, considered better than Lucretia by some people.

RASPBERRY PLANTS

More difficult to grow in Piedmont section, and of but little value in eastern section unless given special attention. The plants do much better if kept mulched. The soil must be good, and the deeper the better.

BLACK

Black Beauty. Thrifty, disease resistant.

Cumberland is the standard black sort, and is a favorite where black raspberries are desired.

RED

Flaming Giant does well in this section, we think perhaps the best, though not well known.

Latham is recommended as being one of the good ones; a thrifty grower, bright red berries.

Newburgh has proven to us to be one of the best. Large bright red berries of good quality.

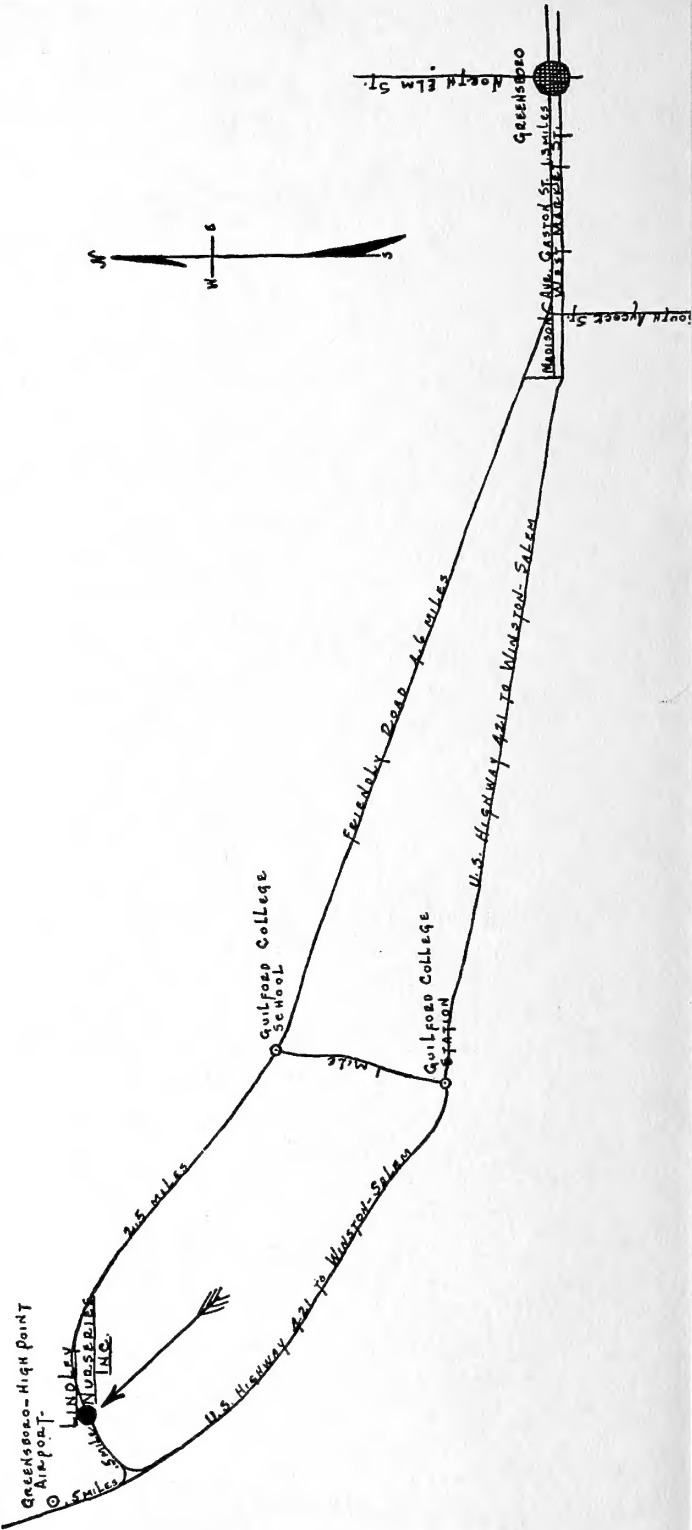
