





Farquhar's Giant Darwin Tulips

The Giant Darwins combine immense size with perfection of bloom, and are carried gracefully erect on fine stems 2 to 3 feet tall. Colors range from purest white to blush, pink, salmon, shades of red, maroon, purple and almost black; recently some very fine yellows have been introduced of which we offer the choicest varieties. Darwins bloom with the columbines in late May and make a glorious display for several weeks. Effective grouped in front of shrubbery and evergreens, or planted in beds or perennial borders.

The bulbs we offer are of the finest quality and will produce magnificent blooms. Plant them in October or November, 5 to 6 inches deep and 5 to 6 inches apart; a light much should be provided after the first hard freeze.

When forcing Darwins indoors, the soil and general treatment recommended for hyacinths may be used. Plant three to five bulbs, according to size, in a 5-inch pot, or ten to twelve in an 8-inch pan. The varieties marked with an asterisk (*) are best for forcing,

and are equally desirable for outdoor culture.

Six bulbs at dozen rate; 25 at 100; 250 at 1,000. If wanted by Parcel Post, add postage at zone rates; weight per 100 bulbs, 7 lbs.



Culture of Hyacinths

HYACINTHS IN POTS.—The soil for bulb-forcing should be a compost of ordinary, rich garden loam, well-rotted manure, leaf-mold, and sand—if manure is not available substitute Fine Ground Bone. If bulbs are to be potted singly, standard 5-inch clay pots are the proper size, or four or five bulbs for an 8-inch bulb-pan. Provide drainage with pieces of broken pots. Break off any offsets which may appear at the base of the bulbs and cover with the soil so that the top of the bulb will be about half an inch below the surface. The filled pots may be placed in a coldframe or buried in a bed of sitted ashes and watered occasionally. When well rooted, which should be in from six to eight weeks, the bulbs may be brought indoors and forced, keeping fairly cool for two to three weeks, after which they may be given gentle bottom heat and liquid fertilizer, with plenty of water, sunshine, and ventilation on mild days.

HYACINTHS IN THE OPEN GROUND.—The bed should be well spaded and plenty of well-rotted manure or Fine Ground Bone may be thoroughly worked in. The bulbs may be planted from October to early December; the early planted bulbs produce the largest flower-spikes. Set the bulbs at least 6 inches below the surface and about 6 inches apart. Protect during winter with leaves, straw, and pine boughs.



LILIES FOR FORCING

The bulbs may be potted from August onward in a compost of equal parts turfy loam, leaf-mold, rotted cow-manure, and sand. It is best to start them in pots not exceeding twice their own diameter, in which they may remain until started 8 inches or more. They should be transferred then to larger pots in which to bloom, exercising great care not to disturb the roots or break away the soil from about them, and setting them considerably deeper in the larger pots. This method prevents the soil from becoming sour, and enables the roots forming at the base of the stem to become feeders, greatly increasing the number and size of the blossoms.





POT-GROWN STRAWBERRY PLANTS

The Strawberry is easily cultivated: abundant crops can be obtained from a variety of soils, differing widely in character, from a light sand to a heavy clay. The best soil is a deep sandy loam, but any soil suited to the growth of ordinary field or garden crops may be trusted to grow the Strawberry successfully. The soil should be broken up and pulverized by spade-trenching or subsoil-plowing, enriching with good stable manure to a depth of fully 2 feet, the quantity of manure to be determined by the condition of the soil. The plants may be set in beds of three rows 1 foot apart and 1 foot distant in the rows, with a space of $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet between the outside rows of adjoining beds left for a pathway. They may also be planted in single rows 3 feet apart and 1 foot apart in the rows.

Vigorous plants will throw out six or more runners in a season. A limited number of these should be allowed to set and form new plants, but the majority must be hoed out or the bed will rapidly degenerate into a matted, unweedable tangle.

It is a good plan to pull out the old plants after they have borne one good crop and depend upon successive crops from the new runner plants and their descendants. About every third year a new bed should be planted in order to maintain tidiness and high quality fruit.


