STANDARD SEEDS.-I have freed my lists of Vegetables and Flowers from the incumbrance of undesirable sorts, consequently they are much easier to make selections from than longer lists, where poor and worthless varieties are intermingled with the good and valuable. These lists I call Standard Seeds.
