In becoming a member of Students' Association of Flora Macdonald College, I promise that I will respect and uphold the regulations of the Association and by my life and influence strive to maintain the high ideals of the college.

CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION OF F. M. C.

Preamble

We, the students of Flora Macdonald College, desiring to express our loyalty to our Alma Mater, and believing that by sincere cooperation we may develop an efficient means of self-government and thereby form a more desirable community, do hereby organize ourselves into a Student's Association.

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Students' Association of Flora Macdonald College.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

The purpose of this Association shall be to unite the students of Flora Macdonald College in an earnest and loyal effort to hold personal honor as the only true standard for efficient social living; and to develop the sense of personal responsibility.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Every student matriculating is a member of this Association and shall be subject to this Constitution.

ARTICLE IV

Organization

The legislative power shall be vested in the Association subject to the approval of the Advisory Board. The executive and judicial powers shall be in the hands of the Student Council and the Advisory Board.

SECTION 1. The Student Council.

The Student Council shall consist of:

President of Student Body.

Vice-President of Student Body.

President of Senior Class.

Vice-President of Senior Class.

President of Junior Class.

Vice-President of Junior Class.

President of Sophomore Class.

President of Freshman Class.

President of Flora Macdonald Christian Association.

President of Athletic Association.

President of Zetesian Society.

President of Epsilon Chi Society.

President of Day Students.

SEC. 2. The Advisory Board.

The Advisory Board shall be composed of:

President of the College.

Dean of Women.

Dean of Faculty.

Dean of Conservatory.

The Class Advisers.

A Faculty Member appointed by the President.

The President of the College is ex-officio chairman of the Advisory Board.

SEC. 3. The Cooperative Committee.

The Cooperative Committee shall consist of:

- A. Representatives of Administration:
The President of the College; Dean of the Faculty or the Dean of Women; three other members of the Government Committee.
- B. Representatives of the Student Body:
The President of the Student Body; The Vice-President of the Student Body; three other members of the Student Council.

SEC. 4. Proctor Committee.

The Proctor Committee shall be composed of a chairman, who shall be the President of the Junior Class, and eight Proctors, one from each hall who shall be elected by written ballot at required hall meetings, and the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be presented to the Student Council, one being chosen. The Student Council shall have the right to reject both candidates if it is felt that such measures are necessary. No Proctor may serve two successive terms or serve more than twice a year, preferably once each semester. These Proctors are elected to cooperate with the Faculty and the Students' Association in the preservation and advancement of the Honor System.

ARTICLE V

Election of Council Members

SECTION 1. The President of the Students' Association.

At a called meeting of the Association nominations for the incoming President of the Association shall be made.

(1) Nominees shall be members of the rising Senior Class.

(2) The suggestions for nominees are voted upon by written ballot.

(3) The two students receiving the highest number of votes, if approved by the Government Committee, shall be considered nominees.

(4) At a designated time and place the two nominees shall be voted upon by secret ballot. The nominee receiving the majority of votes cast shall be declared elected President of the Association.

The retiring President of the Association shall be an honorary member of the council and serve as such until the end of the school year.

SEC. 2. Vice-President.

At a called meeting of the Association nominations for the incoming Vice-President of the Association shall be made.

(1) Nominees shall be members of the rising Junior or Senior classes.

(2) The suggestions for nominees are voted upon by written ballot.

(3) The two students receiving the highest number of votes, if approved by the Government Committee, shall be considered nominees.

(4) At a designated time and place the two nominees shall be voted upon by secret ballot. The nominee receiving the majority of votes cast shall be declared elected Vice-President of the Association.

SEC. 3. Other Council Members.

The other members of the Student Council shall be elected by the organizations which they represent.

SEC. 4. All of these elections must be approved by the Government Committee, which may refuse to ratify such elections, on account of lack in either scholarship or conduct.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers and Boards

SECTION 1. Duties of Officers.

(1) The President of the Association. The President shall call and preside over all meetings of the Association, and Student Council, and shall perform all duties pertaining to that office.

(2) Vice-President. The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President in her absence or at her request, and at other times fully cooperate with her in the performance of her duties.

(3) Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a record of all the meetings of the Association and Student Council, and shall attend to all the necessary correspondence of the Association.

(4) Treasurer. The Treasurer shall have charge of all finances of the Association.

(5) Chairman of Proctors. The President of the Junior Class shall act as Chairman of Proctors, and shall have general supervision of the Proctor Committee.

SEC. 2. The duties of Student Council.

(1) The duties of the Student Council shall be to execute the will of the Association as expressed in this Constitution.

(2) To appoint Proctors for each hall.

(3) To summon before them any student reported to them as disregarding regulations.

(4) To fix the penalty that may be in their judgment wisest, except upon such offenses as may incur either suspension or expulsion, such offences to be referred to the Cooperative Committee immediately.

(5) To work constructively for the betterment of the Association.

(6) To see that rules are enforced by those responsible for this phase of work.

(7) Should a council member learn of any violation of the rules she is honor bound to report same to proper authorities.

Note: A member of Student Council who commits an offense for which she is campused, except for breaking busy notice, shall not be permitted to sit on the Council during her campus.

SEC. 3. The duties of the Proctors shall be:

(1) To have oversight of the conduct of all students on her hall, whether rooming there or not, and to maintain quiet during study hour and after light bell.

(2) To grant house permission at the following times:

a. To students having closed study periods to speak for not longer than 10 minutes during study periods.

b. To spend Saturday and Sunday nights in other than their own rooms.

(3) Proctors are honor bound to report any violations of rules promptly.

SEC. 4. The duties of the Cooperative Committee.

(1) To cooperate with the Student Council in all of its aims and endeavors for upholding the administration of the College, rendering such service and advice as to them may seem wise and helpful.

(2) To remove any member of the Student Council from office if she has in their judgment rendered herself unfit for the position. The organization electing her shall be requested to fill her place.

(3) To consider and act upon any amendment of this constitution that may be suggested to them by the Student Council.

SEC. 5. The duties of the Government Committee.

To consider problems which arise and to make recommendations to the Government Committee and the Student Council.

SEC. 6. Student Organizations.

All Student organizations handling money must have an audit of their books each semester.

ARTICLE VII

Installation

At the installation of any officer the President shall read that portion of the Constitution having reference to the duties that pertain to that office. Thereupon the President shall say: "You have heard the nature of the duties assigned to you by the Association. Do you promise to execute them faithfully and with impartiality to the best of your ability? If so, answer, 'I Promise'."

ARTICLE VIII

Impeachment

Any six members of the Association may offer a written petition to the Council for the impeachment of any of the Student Council. If approved by the Government Committee, it shall be presented to the Association and if it be sustained by a majority vote, she shall be removed from office.

ARTICLE IX

Appeals

SECTION 1. A student shall have the right to appeal from the decision of the Student Council touching a minor penalty to the Dean of Women.

SEC. 2. A student shall have the right of appeal from any decision of the Student Council to the Chairman of the Government Committee.

SEC. 3. A student who wishes to reopen a case before the Student Council is required to appeal within a week after her case has been considered.

ARTICLE X

Meetings

SECTION 1. Of Association. Meetings of the Association may be called by the President whenever she may deem it necessary and must be called by the President upon the request of the Dean or the written request of ten members of the Association.

- a. Attendance at meetings of the Student Government Association is required and all students are held responsible for announcements made at such a time.

b. Girls must sit in regular seats at these meetings.

SEC. 2. Of Student Council. The Student Council shall meet regularly each week. Special meetings may be called by the President.

SEC. 3. Of Proctor Committee. The Proctor Committee shall meet regularly once a week. Special meetings may be called by the Chairman of Proctors.

ARTICLE XI

Quorum

Two-thirds of the members of the Association, or of the Student Council, constitute a quorum of their respective bodies.

ARTICLE XII

Amendment

Any amendment to the Constitution may be proposed to the Student Council by ten members of the Association or by five members of the Student Council. If approved by the Government Committee it shall be presented to the Association where a two-thirds vote of the Association shall be necessary for its ratification.

BY-LAWS

I—Penalties

1. A report of the work and penalties given by the Student Council shall be made known to the Dean of Women.

2. Campuses shall be posted on the bulletin board.

3. When a student has received four call downs she shall be campused for one week.

4. No student who is campused is allowed to leave the campus to represent the college in any activity.

5. Offenders may be brought before the Student Council at any time for a reprimand or restriction when the Student Council deems it necessary. Upon the second campus parents are notified.

II—Standing Committees

1. The Welfare Committee shall be in charge of all plans concerning the training of freshmen at the beginning of the College year.

2. The Findings Committee shall keep in touch with the progress being made and constructive work being done by Student Government Associations throughout the country.

3. The Hand Book Committee, composed of joint chairmen from Student Government Association and Flora Macdonald Christian Association, shall edit the Hand Book for the following year.

4. Candidates for Fire Chief, College Cheerleader, and Recorder of Points shall be nominated from the rising Junior or

Senior Class by the Student Council and presented to the Association. Other nominations may be made from the floor. The nominee receiving a majority vote shall be elected.

III—Fire Drill

1. Remaining in the building during a fire drill shall be considered a minor offense.

2. There shall be at least eight fire drills a year, preferably one each month. The fire squad appointed by the captain must be approved by the Student Council and the Dean.

IV—The Point System

To prevent a small group of students from holding all the student offices, a point system has been adopted.

1. No student shall hold offices amounting to more than ten points in one college year.

2. The point system shall be under the direction of a Student Recorder of Points.

3. It shall be the duty of the Student Recorder of Points to keep an up-to-date copy of the Point System, to keep in touch with all student elections, and to see that no student carries more than the allowed number of points.

V. Honor System

1. Students are on their honor to abide by the rules of the Student Government Constitution, and to uphold its ideals and principles.

2. Any conduct which is injurious to the reputation of the individual or the college will not be tolerated including such items as bridge playing, smoking, and dancing with dates.

3. Dishonesty on tests, laboratory work, classroom work, assignments, themes, or any other phase of college work or activities will not be tolerated.

4. Any violation of the honor system coming under students' observation shall be immediately reported to the Student Council.

5. When one girl suspects another of cheating it is her duty, with the assistance of another girl, to investigate at once.

6. If at any time during the session a student is found to be lowering either the intellectual or the moral tone of the institution, she will be asked to withdraw.

VI—Amendments

Amendments to the By-Laws may be made by a majority vote of the membership of the Student Council. Upon approval of the Government Committee, such an amendment shall become part of the By-Laws.

REGULATION

1. Dormitory

SECTION 1. Quiet.

- a. Classes. 8:20 A.M. to 12:50 P.M.; 1:40 to 3:40 P.M. Except on Monday.
- b. From 10:50 P.M. to 7:30 A.M. At the 10:50 bell the student must be in her room. No permissions to visit can be given after this time.
- c. Quiet hour from 8:05 to 8:20 A.M. except on Sunday. It is then observed from 2:00 to 3:00 P.M. Quiet hour rules. Only two in a room. Five minutes allowed to get to room.
- d. During all religious meetings.
- e. Students who disturb others with any unnecessary noise during these hours will receive a call down.

SEC. 2. Study Hour. 7:15 to 10:30 P.M. on school days. 9:30 to 11:30 A.M. Monday.

- a. This period is for study and quiet must maintained.
- b. Study Hour must be observed as follows:
 1. Seniors and Juniors may have open study hour.
 2. Sophomores must observe closed study the first semester.
 3. Freshmen are to observe closed study.
- c. During study hour no deliveries shall be made from the stores.
- d. Those having closed study must secure permission to speak from the Proctor

or Council member on the hall on which they desire to speak. Permission to study with anyone must be secured from the Dean of Women.

- e. Those having open study hour must have permission to speak in rooms of those having closed study.
- f. Students are not allowed to leave the building during study hours (week nights or Monday morning) except with special permission from the Dean.

SEC. 3. Lights.

- a. Lights out and in bed at 11:00 P.M. except the nights preceding tests days each quarter. On those nights at 12:00 midnight.
- b. Lights may be turned on at 5:30 A.M.
- c. Radios must be played softly after light bell.
- d. When the occasion makes it necessary, permission may be obtained from the Dean of Women to study until 12 P.M. in a designated classroom.

SEC. 4. Chapel.

- a. Chapel attendance is required of all regular students unless excused by Dean of Women or Nurse.
- b. Students will be allowed two cuts each semester.

SEC. 5. Busy Signs.

- a. Breaking an Official Busy Sign necessitates a call down.
- b. Busy Signs are to be used only in case of studying.
- c. Only two in a room behind a Busy.

- d. Any communication with persons behind a Busy is breaking the Busy.
- e. A Busy Sign is broken when left on the door of a vacant room.
- f. Only printed Busy Signs issued by the college may be used.

SEC. 6. Meals.

- a. Breakfast is served on school days at 7:30 A.M.; on Sunday and Monday, 8:00 A.M.; Lunch at 1:00 P.M.; Dinner at 6:00 P.M.
- b. Students are expected to be at meals unless excused by the Dean or Nurse. On Sunday and Monday breakfast is not required.
- c. No crockery, glass, or tableware may be taken from the dining hall.
- d. Students eating away from regular table must notify their hostess.

SEC. 7. House Guests.

- a. No student is allowed to entertain visitors in the college without permission from the Dean.
- b. Any student desiring to invite a guest to a meal must get permission from the Dean and report to the Dietitian.
- c. Guests are expected to conform to the regulations of the college.
- d. Students are responsible for the conduct of their guests.

SEC. 8. Infirmary.

- a. Any student who is ill must report immediately to the infirmary. (Class absence may be excused for illness only when the student is in the infirmary.)

- b. A Busy on the infirmary allows students to talk through the door to the patient.
- c. No one must enter the infirmary over a Busy sign except with permission from the college nurse.

SEC. 9. General House Regulations.

- a. No student is allowed to talk to boys from a dormitory window.
- b. Everyone is held responsible for all announcements made in chapel, Student Body Meetings, in the dining room, and those posted on the bulletin board. If concerning the day students it must be announced in chapel or posted on day student's bulletin board.
- c. On Saturday and Sunday nights Students are allowed to spend the night with four in a room by signing with the Proctor before 10:50 P.M.

- d. Students are required to attend special services, concerts and lectures. Two cuts a semester are allowed. Absence from any Monday night concert or lecture will be considered a cut. Cuts will be registered with council member on your hall.
- e. Students may cook any afternoon from 3:40 until 6:00 and on week-ends until 11:00 P.M., except during quiet hour and study hour.
- f. Only safety matches may be kept in the dormitory.
- g. Campus flowers and shrubbery are not to be cut except with permission from Dr. Vardell.
- h. Married students may not live in the dormitories.
- i. Students may put locks on the doors of their rooms if they desire; with the understanding that the locks become the property of the College. One key must be left with the Dean of Women, and doors are to be locked only when the students are not in their rooms.
- j. Materials for smoking, drinking, and playing bridge may not be kept in the dormitories.
- k. No signs or writing may be on room doors except name cards.

2. Social Regulation

SECTION 1. Written Permission.

- a. A general permission must be filed with the Dean of Women for the following:

1. Spending the day, or week-end away from the college.
 2. Receiving men callers.
 3. Dining out.
 4. Making trips in automobiles.
 - (a) This relieves college and owners of cars of all responsibility.
 5. Riding Horseback.
- b. Special permission must be filed with the Dean of Women for the following:
1. Spending the week-end away from college, when not going home.
 2. Riding with dates.
- c. All permissions must be sent from parent or guardian directly to Dean of Women.

SEC. 2. Chaperonage.

- a. Chaperonage is required for underclassmen for trips out of town unless with parents.
- b. Students are to bear the expenses of their chaperons.

SEC. 3. Dates.

- a. Students may have dates on Saturday and Monday nights until 10:30 P.M. and any afternoon from 2:40 to 5:45 P.M.
- b. Juniors and Seniors may date on Sunday night until 10:00 P.M. by signing in the Date Book before 6:00 P.M. also underclassmen whose friends are from a distance and who get special permission.
- c. Students, by signing out, may go to town with their dates in the afternoon.

- d. In the evening dates may use the parlors, porches, and terraces to the drive from Vardell entrance to the conservatory, recreation hall, and tea room. When entertaining dates in gymnasium or recreation hall, there must be not less than two couples.
- e. Students having dates during college entertainments are required to attend the entertainments.
- f. Any two or more girls with their dates may go to town on free Monday nights.
- g. Students must sign in the Date Book for dates. Callers are expected to see the Dean or her representative before having engagements with students.
- h. Callers are expected to enter and leave by the main entrance.
- i. Students are expected to behave with good taste at all times. Those who violate dating regulations shall lose dating privileges.

SEC. 4. Off Campus.

a. Town Regulations.

1. Students may go to town any afternoon except Saturday and Sunday. Juniors and Seniors may go to town when necessary during vacant periods on school mornings. Any student is permitted to go to town on Saturday morning.
2. Students may go to the show any afternoon except Saturday provided no classes or laboratories are missed.
3. Girls must sign out when leaving campus and sign in on returning.

4. Students must not leave campus after dinner without permission from Dean.
 5. Students must get permission from Dean to visit houses used as dormitories at night.
 6. Students must get permission from Dean to visit faculty houses at night.
 7. Students may not make over-night visits in Red Springs except in the company of their parents.
 8. While visiting in town students are under college regulations.
- b. Out of Town.
1. When a student is spending the day in her own home, she is under the authority of her parents.
 2. Students may go to Fayetteville or other near-by towns on Monday after study hour by getting permission from the Dean. They are to go with a Council Member or Faculty Member.
 3. Students may take meals with friends in near-by towns and return with them if they are signed in by 6:00 o'clock. This is to be granted at the discretion of the Dean and only when written permission from the parent has been sent directly to the Dean of Women. This permission must specify the name of escort, and a new permission is required for each occasion.
 4. Students away for the week-end or an evening must sign in at the Dean's office by 10:45. A student

arriving after 10:45 P.M. must report in person to the Dean immediately and give reason for the delay. Neglect involves penalty.

5. When a student goes home for the day, she should return to the college by 6:00 P.M. unless she is accompanied by her parents, in which case she may return by 10:00.

SEC. 5. Week-ends.

- a. Students who have a grade of B or above on the preceding semester's work in each course may have six week-ends away from school each semester.
- b. Students who have a grade of C or above on the preceding semester's work in each course may have five week-ends away from school each semester.
- c. Students who have a grade of D on one course and C or above on all other courses may have four week-ends away from school each semester.
- d. Students having lower than those described above, and all first semester freshmen or transfer students, may have three week-ends away from school each semester.

e. Closed Week-ends.

The following week-ends are closed to everyone:

The first three week-ends of the year, the week-ends before quarterly tests, and May Day week-end.

The week-end of the Freshman-Sophomore banquet will be closed to Freshmen and Sophomores.

The week-end of the Junior-Senior banquet will be closed to Juniors and Seniors.

- f. Students may not leave the college for a week-end after 6:00 P.M. Students may not leave or return on Sunday, except with parents.
- g. Permission slips for the week-end must be in the Dean's office before 3:00 P.M. Friday. If taking cuts they must be in the day before leaving.
- h. Signed cuts slips must be returned to the Dean's office within a week after classes are missed. Neglect involves penalty.

SEC. 6. Sunday.

Students are expected to attend church services regularly, and to observe the spirit of Sunday throughout the day.

- a. Students are not allowed to leave the campus without permission except for church.
- b. Church attendance is required unless excused by the Dean or Nurse. If excused for illness the student must remain in the infirmary.
- c. Each student is allowed two church cuts each semester. Cuts must be registered with the Council Member on her hall before 10:30 A.M. Sunday.
- d. All students are permitted to ride to and from Church each Sunday morning.
- e. A student may go riding with her parents on Sunday afternoon and may take two other students with her.
- f. By invitation received through the Dean's office, students may have dinner with friends in town on Sunday.

- g. Refreshments are not to be purchased in town on Sunday, nor deliveries made.
- h. Refreshments from the Tea Room may be purchased on Saturday for Sunday use. They will be delivered by the Tea Room Manager to the second floor at a designated time on Sunday.

SEC. 7. Dress.

- a. Students are expected to dress neatly and appropriately at all times.
- b. Formal dress is worn when attending concerts and lectures followed by receptions.
- c. Students are expected to be freshly dressed for dinner each evening.
- d. Hose are to be worn on all dress occasions, and all day Sunday until bedtime, except in dormitory halls.
- e. Shorts or slacks are not to be worn on first floor or on campus except under the following conditions:
 - 1. When going out for physical education exercises.
 - 2. By special permission of the Dean. When wearing shorts or slacks, students are requested to use side or back entrances to the building.
- f. Gymnasium suits are not to be worn on the front campus, in the library, or in any public room.

SEC. 8. General Social Regulations.

- a. Four girls may go hiking without a chaperon or two girls may go bicycling.
- b. Girls may skate on College Street and Third Avenue as far as the Methodist Church.

SEC. 9. Privileges.

Seniors:

- a. Are permitted to ride in town except on Sundays, until 6:00 P.M.
- b. May leave campus, four for walking beyond city limits, two for walking within city limits on Sunday.
- c. A senior may have two open nights a week, aside from week-ends, provided her grades are C or better.
- d. May go to town at night in groups of three except Saturday or Sunday nights.
- e. A Senior and her date may attend the first show in the evening by registering with the Dean's office before leaving and after returning. They may stop by the drug store or cafe.
- f. First four week-ends of school year are not closed to Home Economics girls in the Practice House the second six weeks.
- g. Seniors are allowed to ride home on week-ends without special permission on each occasion. (With standing permission from home.)
- h. Practice Teachers may return on Sunday when necessary.
- i. Seniors living on Senior Hall have lights out at 11:30.
- j. Two Seniors rooming together, and required to room off Senior Hall, have the same privileges as those on Senior Hall, unless those privileges are abused.
- k. Seniors are on their honor to observe ten-minute bell and light bell.

1. By invitation received through the Dean's office, Seniors may visit in town on Sunday afternoon.

Juniors:

- a. Two open nights a week other than Monday and Saturday, if grades are C or better.
- b. Two Juniors with their dates may attend the first show in the evening by registering in the Dean's office on leaving and upon returning. They may stop by the drug store or cafe.

Sophomore Privilege:

Second semester sophomores who have made all A's and B's the previous semester may have one open night a week.

3. Academic Regulations

SECTION 1.

- a. When a student matriculates and has arranged her schedule, no change may be made without first securing permission from the academic dean. Each student is required to have two hours of physical education per week for three years. It is the responsibility of the student to see that this course is included in her program of work. Also, each student is required to take not less than forty-five minutes of outdoor exercise each day.
- b. In order to return to college for a second year, the student must have passed during her first year a total of eighteen semester hours with grades sufficient to entitle her to nine quality

points. Summer school credits may be counted in this total.

In order to return to college for a third or fourth year, the student must have passed during the previous year a total of twenty-four semester hours with grades sufficient to entitle her to eighteen quality points. Summer school credits may be counted in this total. In meeting these requirements, all totals must represent the number of semester hours actually passed with a grade of "D" or above. No grade of "E" ("Conditional failure") may be counted.

- c. The classification of a student depends upon the amount of college work and the number of quality points she has to her credit, and not upon the length of time she has been in college. A student is classified:
 1. As a Freshman, upon the presentation of a certificate showing the completion of a four-year course of not less than fifteen units in an officially accredited high school, or upon standing entrance examination on an equivalent amount of preparatory work. Second year regular students who have not been admitted to Sophomore standing are also classified as Freshmen.
 2. As a Sophomore, upon the completion of twenty-four semester hours, with grades sufficient to entitle her to twenty quality points, provided that seventeen hours be taken each semester of the current session. No student will be admitted to the

Sophomore class who has not removed all entrance conditions.

3. As a Junior, upon the completion of fifty-four semester hours, with grades sufficient to entitle her to forty-five quality points, provided that seventeen hours be taken each semester of the current session.
 4. As a Senior, upon the completion of ninety semester hours, with grades sufficient to entitle her to seventy quality points, provided that seventeen hours be taken each semester of the current session.
- d. A student having a failing grade in any subject required for graduation is ineligible for a major office.

SEC. 2. Class Cuts per Semester.

- a. Seniors, Juniors and Sophomores who have a grade of B or above on the preceding semester's work in each course may be allowed three cuts per semester in each course.
- b. Seniors, Juniors and Sophomores who have a grade of C or above on the preceding semester's work in each course may be allowed two cuts per semester in each course.
- c. Seniors, Juniors and Sophomores who have a grade of D on one course and a grade of C or above on all other courses may be allowed one cut per semester in each course.
- d. Freshmen may have no cuts during the first semester except under the following circumstance:

If travel conditions make it necessary for a Freshman to leave col-

lege before her last class on Saturday in order that she may spend the week-end at home, a special travel cut may be granted once a quarter upon a written request from the parents or guardian and upon the approval of the Absence Committee.

Freshmen may be allowed the same cut privileges during the second semester as those extended to the students in other classes.

- e. During the first semester of residence, transfers may be allowed to have their cut privileges based on their previous semester's college record.
- f. Students with an Unsatisfactory in any subject at mid-term shall lose the privilege of all cuts for the remainder of the semester.
- g. Cuts taken the last meeting of each class in each course before a holiday and the first meeting of each class in each course after a holiday shall count as double cuts.
- h. Three unexcused tardies shall count as one cut.
- i. A list of students having cut privileges will be given each teacher as early as as possible at the beginning of each semester.

SEC. 3. Unexcused Absences.

- a. For each class cut taken in excess of the maximum allowed for the semester the student shall lose 5 points' credit on the semester grade for the course.

SEC. 4. Excused Absences.

- a. Excused absences may be granted by the Committee on Absences when a valid reason is presented in the case of (1) a student who has used her maximum number of cuts and (2) a student who does not have cut privileges.
- b. Excused absences for illness may be granted to a student by the College Nurse, or by the Committee on Absences upon the presentation of a written statement from her parent or guardian in the case of a day student.
- c. A student returning late after a holiday because of illness must bring a physician's certificate or a written statement from her parent or guardian to be filed with the Committee on Absences.
- c. Students representing college organizations may have necessary absences excused by the Committee on Absences.
- d. A student granted an excused absence for all reasons except illness or death in the family, or when a student represents a college organization, must make up the classes missed under the supervision of the respective teachers. A fee of one dollar will be required for each class made up. A laboratory period will count as one class.
- e. The receipt for one dollar paid must be presented to the teacher within one week after the return of the student to class. If this procedure is not followed, the absence automatically becomes an unexcused absence.

SEC. 5. Library Regulations.

Use of Books:

a. Reserves Circulation.

1. Books on reserve are to be signed for by name at the desk. The card must be signed with the borrower's name and the book returned personally by the borrower to the desk.
2. Reserve books are to be read in the Library until the Library closes. After this they may be signed out for overnight by day-students, or on campus by boarding students.

b. Fines.

1. General circulation books—two cents a day.
2. Reserve books—twenty-five cents for the first hour over due; five cents for each succeeding hour or part thereof.

SEC. 6. The Bursar's Office Hours:

Monday—11:30 A.M. to 12:30 P.M.

Tuesday to Friday—3:00 to 4:00 P.M.

Saturday—2:00 to 3:00 P.M.

Book Room Hours are as follows:

Monday—11:30 to 12:00 A.M.

Tuesday to Friday—3:40 to 4:10 P.M.

Saturday—12:00 to 12:30 P.M.

Read the College Catalogue carefully, bring it to the college with you, and keep it for reference.

Be sure to have your name plainly written on your baggage.

The first thing to do on arriving at the college is to go to the Dean of Women to register your arrival and get the number of your room.

Take any seat in the dining hall the first few days.

Your closet will require a curtain of burlap or cretonne the width of a door and two and one-quarter yards long.

Sash curtains for the windows should be one yard long and full length curtains two and one-fourth yards long. There is one pillow for each bed, which is 19 x 27 inches.

Bring bureau scarfs, table covers, curtains, and a rug or so, as they will make

your room much more pleasant and the college does not furnish them.

All laundry is done by the College laundry on the campus. A student may put as many pieces as is necessary in the laundry, but she must keep them down to a reasonable number.

Each girl is assigned a laundry number a few days after her arrival. Do not write for laundry numbers during the summer, as it is impossible to supply them.
