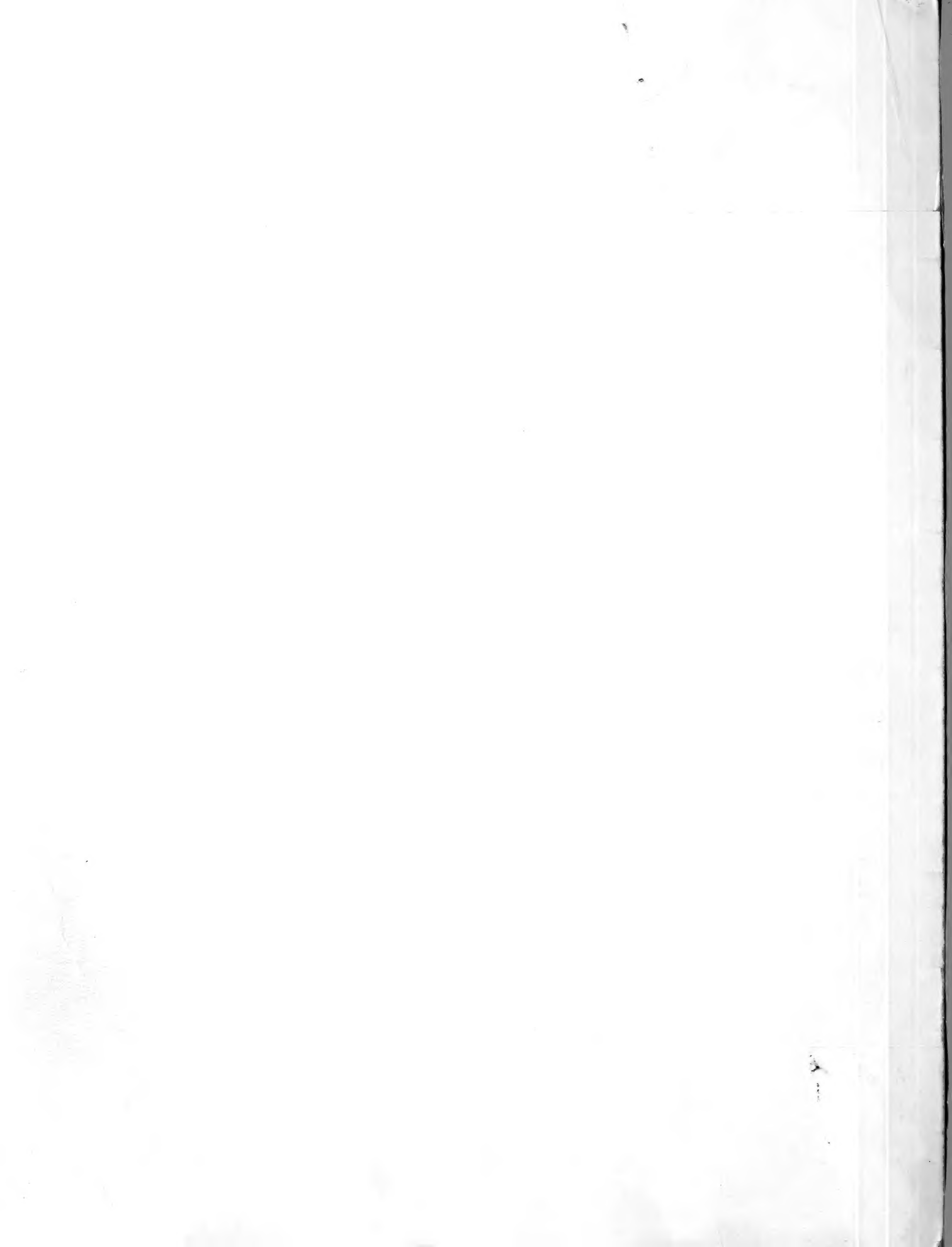

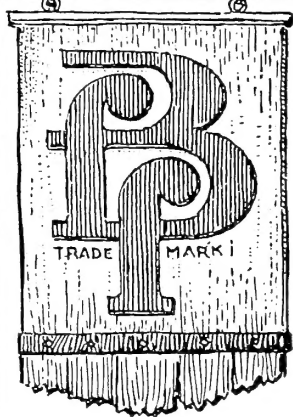

GIANT MAY-FLOWERING TULIPS

Giant May-Flowering Tulips are well known to gardeners as Darwin, Breeder and Cottage Tulips. Of recent years constant inter-breeding of Darwin and Cottage Tulips has produced the newer Hybrid Tulips, of which Carrara and Dido are such excellent examples. These are identical to the Darwins in size and shape of flowers, as well as habit of growth, so that for practical laying out of both formal and informal gardens, it is best to consider them as one class. Viewed in this light, one has a much wider selection to choose from, with a color range including almost every known shade and tint. (The true Breeder and Cottage Tulips have their own special uses in the garden, and are offered separately on the following pages.)

May-Flowering Tulips have large cup-shaped flowers, growing on stems from 24 to 36 inches tall. All flower in mid-May, and give a glorious display for two weeks or more. Plant them 6 inches deep and 6 inches apart.

6 bulbs of a variety may be purchased for one-half the dozen price;
25 bulbs for one-quarter the 100 price.

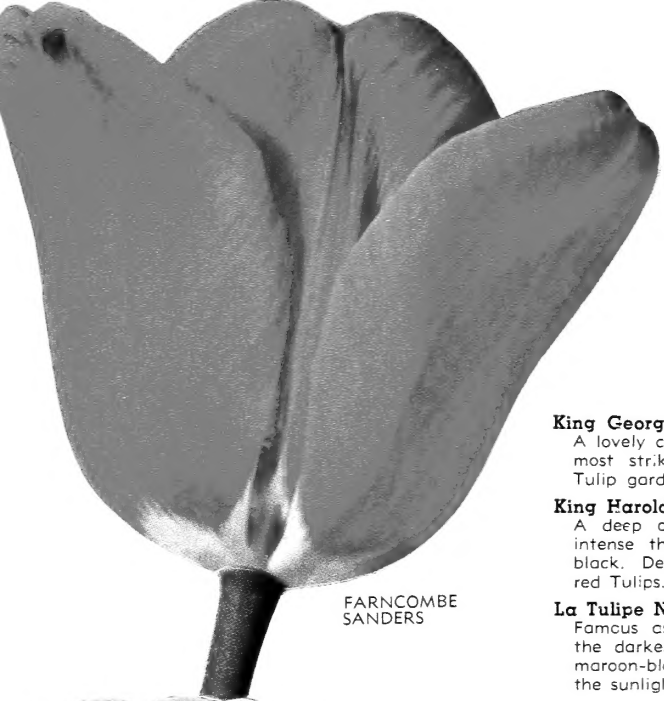

A splendid new Ideal Tulip of clear brilliant pink with lighter edges and white base. Strong, large flowers of exceptional substance, and a marked improvement over older varieties. 29 in.

A deep rosy orange, with lighter toning of delicate salmon, and the inside of the flower shaded deeper orange. A most unusual blending of colors that is excellent for striking garden effect. 29 in.

Large full flowers of pure clear white, with ivory colored anthers. Of excellent substance and perfect for cutting. Its moderate height (22 in.) fits it for the front of a border planting.

Large, globular flowers of pure rich yellow edged with scarlet dots marks this lovely variety. As the flower ages these gradually suffuse the entire flower, making it vivid orange. 26 in.

Good sized flowers of somewhat egg-shape with the petals turning inward at the tips. Rich bright rose in color, turning to blush-rose at the edges. 26 in.

Of perfect form and pure color. The large flowers are pure lavender throughout, and splendid for bedding. They are carried on strong, stiff stems and have great lasting qualities. 27 in.

Cup-shaped flowers of great size and of rich, brilliant, intense deep purple that is particularly striking when in the full rays of the sun. The anthers are pitch-black, the base is deepest blue. 29 in.

Lovely pure heliotrope, somewhat darker on the inside of the flower. The blooms are of good size, carried on fine strong 26-inch stems. One of the finest varieties in this distinct color.

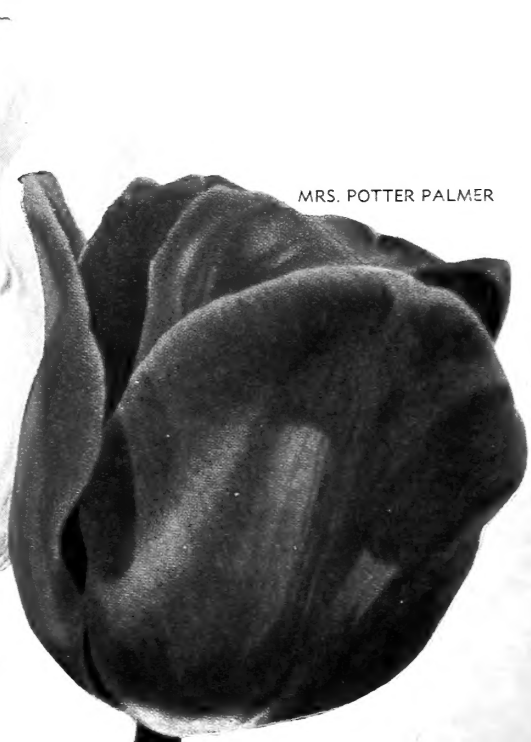

 Deep plum-purple, with the dusky reddish overtone of a rich, ripe plum. Dark, handsome flowers of enormous size on long stems. One of the best. 31 in.

Inglescombe Yellow Doz. 90c, 100 for \$6.00
 Deep canary-yellow blooms, unmarked with any other color when first open. As they age they become flushed with scarlet at the edges, creating a lovely two-toned effect. 22 in.

 A lovely cherry-rose Tulip of great size and most striking color. An addition to any Tulip garden. 26 in.

 One of our finest Tulips in a pure, even color, difficult to match in any other variety. A clear, appealing pink, with just a suggestion of deeper tone, that is rich and warm. 27 in.

 A rich bright crimson flower, unique among Tulips. The petals are peculiarly fringed and serrated, giving a feathery, sometimes even a barbed effect. 26 in.

Old English Cottage Tulips

True Old English Cottage Tulips are somewhat smaller than the Giant May-Flowering varieties, but are of more graceful habit. Flowers are slender and urn-shaped, with tops of the petals reflexing. Many carry a deep, sweet fragrance. The stems, averaging 18 to 24 inches, are slender and graceful. They are ideal for grouping in borders and informal plantings.

Avis Kennicott

Very large, chrome-yellow flowers, with striking black bases and anthers. When fully open, this deep black interior stands out. The blooms are quite long, with a decidedly elongated shape. 25 in.

Ellen Willmott

Beautifully reflexed flowers of soft creamy yellow, becoming lighter as the season advances. The blooms are long and narrow, probably three times as great in length as in width, intensely fragrant. 20 in.

Of great beauty and striking color, brilliant orange-red throughout. Flowers are large and very sweetly scented. Excellent for both beds and borders. 24 in.

Really a Bunch or Multi-Flowering Tulip. The main stem is unusually thick. About half way up it parts into individual stems, each carrying its own flower of pure ivory-white. Usually four to five flowers from a single bulb. Likes very rich soil. 26 in.

Sirene

First of the "Lily-Flowered Tulips," with tips of the petals spread out almost to the point of being flat, then coming to a sharp "waist," rounding out once more in lily fashion. Rich rose-pink slightly paler at the edges, with a striking white base. 24 in.

Just the thing to give an appealing, informal and dainty effect in a secluded nook of the garden. Properly balanced in color to give an excellent assortment for cutting.

Giant Breeder Tulips

In size, shape and time of flowering, Giant Breeders are identical to Darwin and Hybrid Tulips, but they are entirely different in color range. Lovers of full, rich colors will be enchanted by their glorious tones and artistic blendings of purple, brown, bronze, orange, violet and old gold.

Bronze Queen

In first blush of bloom the large flowers are of somber golden bronze. With age they become brighter, increasing in size and beauty, dominating the border during the later flowering period. 28 in.

Dillenburg

Giant flowers of brilliant salmon-orange, deep at the center and turning brighter at the edges. Intensely black anthers. Startlingly lovely as cut flowers in a bowl. 28 in.

Louis XIV

Immense goblet-shaped flowers that, when first open, are dark bluish violet, with dusty over-bloom, and edged with golden brown. As the season advances, the bluish tone becomes brighter and more intense, in marked contrast to the golden edge, which has also brightened and taken on a more vivid hue. 34 in.

Panorama

Splendid coppery orange color, almost identical to that of a copper penny, with no trace of any other color. Splendid to add a different note to the border. The blooms are long and of strictly formal shape. 27 in.

The dominant color is the same delightful pure salmon found in Darwin Tulip, Clara Butt, of which it is a sport. This is heightened and enlivened with a glorious suffusion of rich rose, in some seasons almost assuming a true reddish tone. Waxlike petals are heavy and thick, deeply crinkled, fringed and lacinated at the edges and crusted in the centers. Backs of the petals are marbled with delightful pale green. Truly a most distinctive Tulip.

Early Flowering Tulips

BRILLIANTLY ARRAYED HERALDS OF YOUR GARDEN

The first Tulips to flower, blooming a full month before the taller May-Flowering varieties. Some are in bloom as early as April 10th, though the more usual time is about April 20th. Bright, cheery colors of the Single Earlies make them ideal for bedding. The Double Early or Peony Tulips open particularly well when the weather just begins to turn warm. The huge size of the flowers is most welcome so early in the spring, a time of smaller flowers. Both kinds are easy to force in greenhouses, flowering readily in January if started in September. Grow 10 to 15 inches high. Plant 5 inches deep and 6 inches apart.

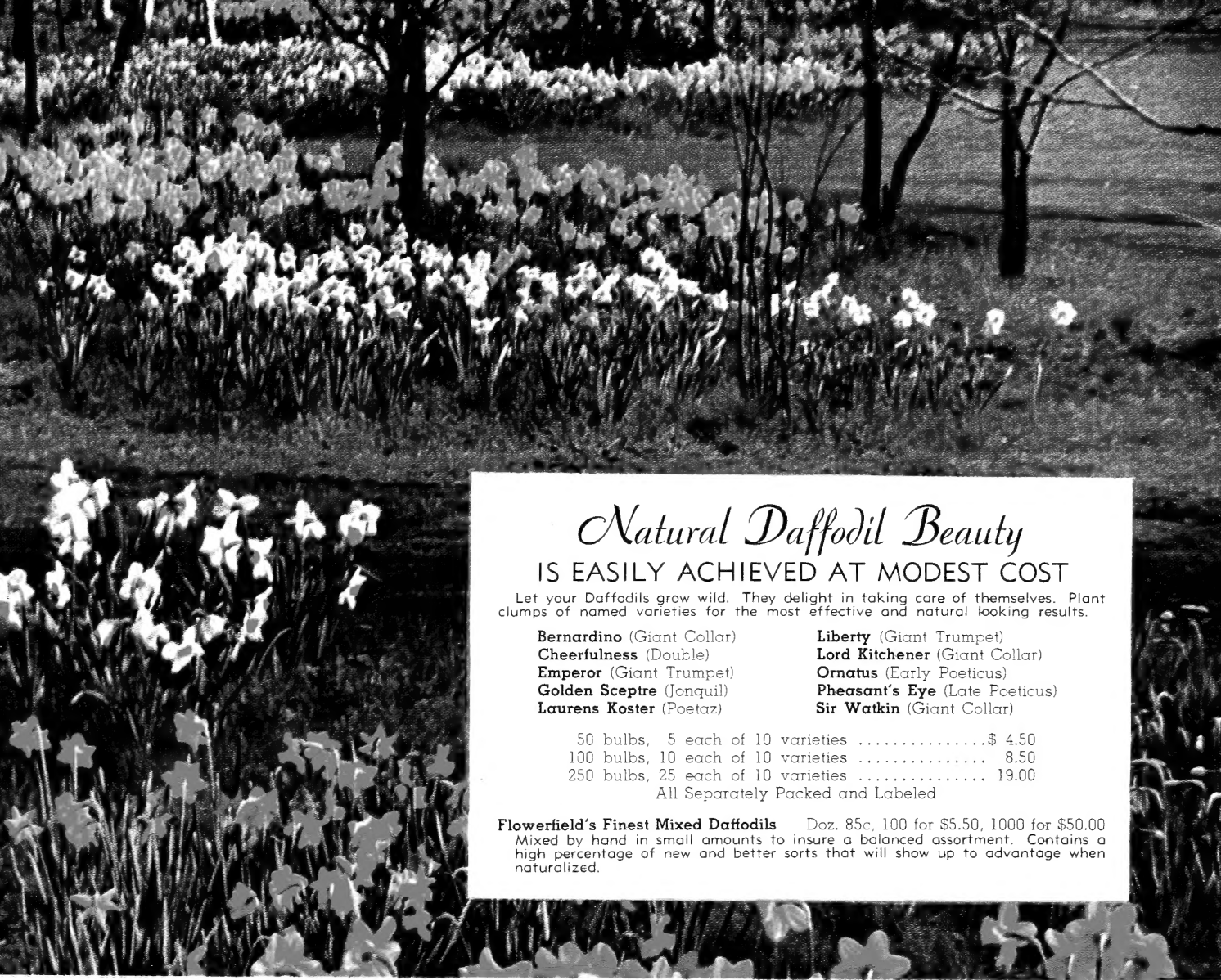
Tulipa Kaufmanniana

One of the earliest Tulips, blooming in early April. Large flowers of creamy white, tinged rosy red, markings varying from a light flush to tones of deep, rich color. Petals reflex, and as the flowers age, open wider, resembling Nymphaeas to such a marked degree that Kaufmanniana is called the "Water Lily Tulip." Stems about 8 inches tall. Perfect for rock gardens, and also suited for forcing in pots.

PROLONG THE DAFFODIL SEASON

Just as the Daffodil season is about to close, the Poet's Narcissus, loveliest and sweetest of all, comes into bloom and gives us another two weeks of Daffodil time. Their flowers of immaculate white have a pure, simple beauty that appeals to all. The petals are sharply defined, forming a perfect corona for a center "eye" of gleaming scarlet.

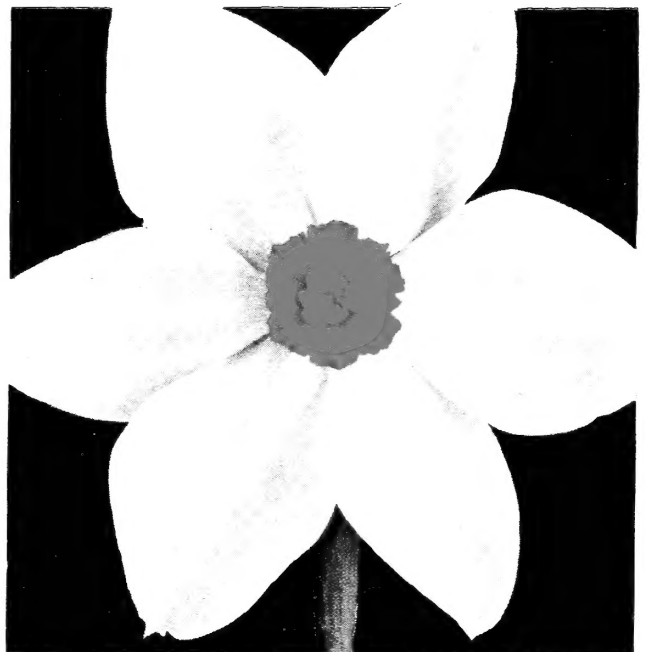
Dante Three 35c, Doz. \$1.25, 100 for \$8.00
 Typical Poet's Narcissus blooms of pure white with gleaming scarlet eye. One of the easiest Narcissus to force indoors, flowers by January 15th not being unusual.

Eagle Three 35c, Doz. \$1.25, 100 for \$8.00
 Gleaming "eye" of bright yellow edged with bright scarlet, set in the center of a large perianth of broad overlapping pure white petals.

Horace Three 35c, Doz. \$1.25, 100 for \$8.00
 Flat cup of canary-yellow, rimmed with bright red. Perianth is pure gleaming white, made up of broad star-shaped petals.

Ornatus Three 30c, Doz. \$1.10, 100 for \$7.00
 Quite flat saffron cups margined with deep orange-red. Perianth petals purest white. Blooms are freely produced, making it an excellent garden and naturalizing variety.

Pheasant's Eye Three 30c, Doz. \$1.10, 100 for \$7.00
 The old, original Poet's Narcissus, and still the favorite of many. Perianth pure white with reflexing eye margined deep orange-red. It flowers after all the other Daffodils have faded.

GIANT TRUMPET DAFFODILS

Emperor Three 35c, Doz. \$1.25, 100 for \$8.00
Before the advent of King Alfred, this was the finest all-purpose Daffodil. The perianth is primrose with a stocky trumpet of darker yellow. It is still unexcelled for naturalizing, being much superior for that purpose to King Alfred.

Imperator Three 80c, Doz. \$2.75, 100 for \$20.00
Of the newer pure white Giant Trumpets there is none we can recommend more highly. Pure white throughout, with flowers of good substance that last until late in the season.

Kimberly Each 55c, Three \$1.50, Doz. \$5.50
A new and most welcome pastel color, with one even tone of delicate pale sulphur-yellow throughout its gracefully formed flowers. A large one, definitely to be recommended.

King Alfred Three 45c, Doz. \$1.50, 100 for \$10.00
In truth a king among Daffodils. A huge trumpet and perianth of rich lustrous golden yellow, seemingly sprinkled with pure gold dust. Flowers often measure four inches or more across

Lord Wellington Each 55c, Three \$1.50, Doz. \$5.50
One of the largest and finest of the deep yellow Trumpets, with flowers of rich golden yellow, of fine even texture, and no trace of coarseness. The perianth is broad, and the trumpet is long and full, slightly frilled at the edges.

Mrs. E. H. Krelace Three 80c, Doz. \$2.75, 100 for \$20.00
Often called the "White King Alfred" and indeed a fitting companion. Large trumpet slightly flushed yellow when first open, quickly changing to pure white. Perianth of good substance, and purest white during the life of the flower.

Spring Glory Three 40c, Doz. \$1.40, 100 for \$9.00
Extremely early in the garden, and the best bi-color for forcing. Trumpet deep yellow, of long, even shape, reflexing at the edges. Perianth petals creamy white, loosely placed.

Perfectly huge wide-open trumpet of bright rich yellow. The perianth petals of delicate cream are somewhat irregularly placed, but gracefully turned and twisted.

Youth Three 80c, Doz. \$2.75, 100 for \$20.00
Quite distinct among light and delicate yellow varieties; clear lemon-yellow throughout the entire flower. The trumpet is long, of smooth, even texture, coming to sharply cut edges.

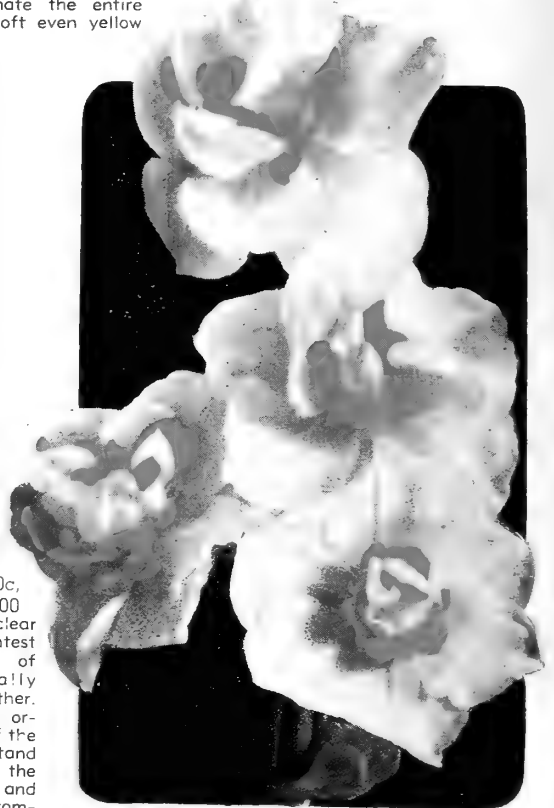

The subjects described are all of easy culture and will thrive unattended, giving an ever increasing number of flowers year after year.

MERTENSIA VIRGINICA - Virginia Bluebell

Large clusters of clear blue bells, tinged with delicate pink, in April. One of the finest plants for woodland, shady places, and shrubby borders. They definitely prefer moisture and grow in any kind of soil. They may even be grown in more open positions, if one will water heavily during the summer. Plant in clumps of six or more. Height 1 foot.

Bluebells and Daffodils make the perfect pair in any shaded location. The soft yellow and white pastel shades of the Narcissus blends in an appealing suffusion of color with the pinkish blue of the Bluebells. Allow half as many Bluebells as Daffodils. (Naturalizing Daffodils on page 7.)

HARDY ORCHIDS

Orchids grown by florists have long been admired as the Queen of flowers. Their hardy cousins, though not so large, are fully their equal in grace and beauty. Their charm is greatly enhanced when planted in the shade, or in open woods, where surrounding greenery provides a cool, restful background for the colorful flowers. They like abundant moisture at all times.

Bletilla hyacinthina

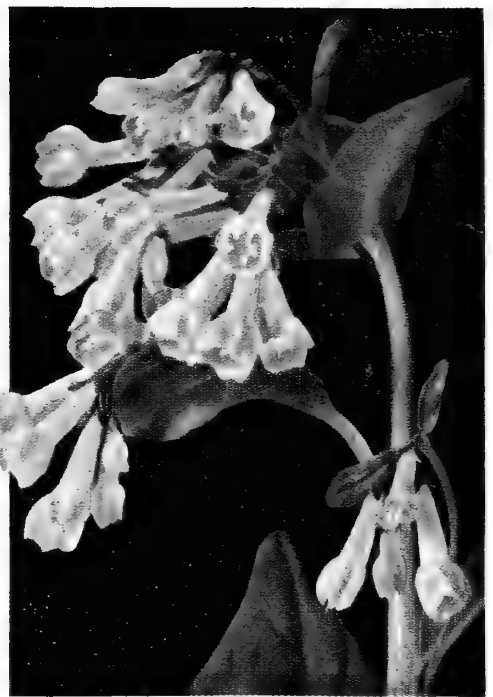

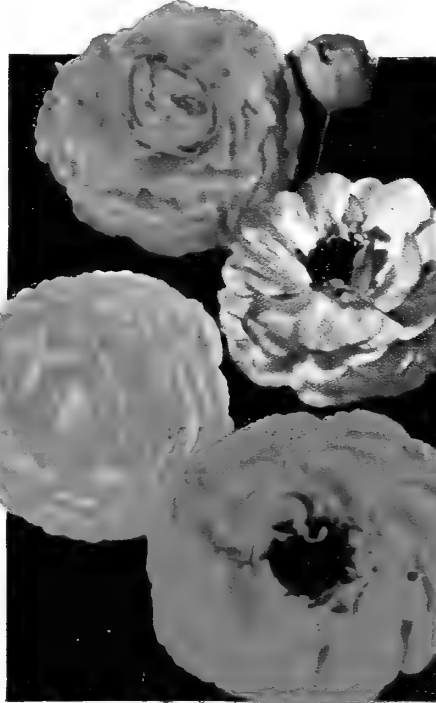

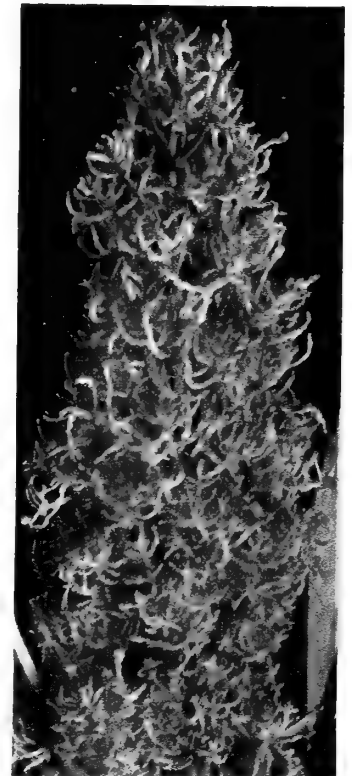

If cut and placed in water, the flowers may keep for as long as a month. Plant three to a 5-inch pot.

TULIPS FOR INDOOR GROWING

For early blooming the Single Early and Double Peony Tulips are best. Those particularly suited are General De Wet, Keizerskroon, Cramoisi Brilliant, White Swan, Peach Blossom and Couronne d'Or. See page 6.

For later blooming use the Giant Darwin and Hybrid Tulips. Best varieties are Bartigon, Princess Elizabeth, William Pitt, Carrara, Dido and Dream. See pages 3 and 4.

FRENCH ROMAN HYACINTHS

Graceful, slender Hyacinths throwing several spikes to a bulb, each with many delicate sweetly scented bells, a bit smaller than those of Dutch Hyacinths. Excellent for pot culture, blooming indoors by Christmas if planted early. Set four bulbs to a 5-inch pot. May also be grown outdoors with light protection. Plant 5 inches deep and 8 inches apart.

Plant five to a 6-inch pot in August or September, setting them 1 inch deep. Stake the stems as they grow.

Of extremely simple culture, they are one of the easiest and most inexpensive of indoor plants. Start the bulbs early, preferably by mid-September, planting 3 to a 5-inch pot.

Plant 4 to a 5-inch pot, setting them one inch deep.

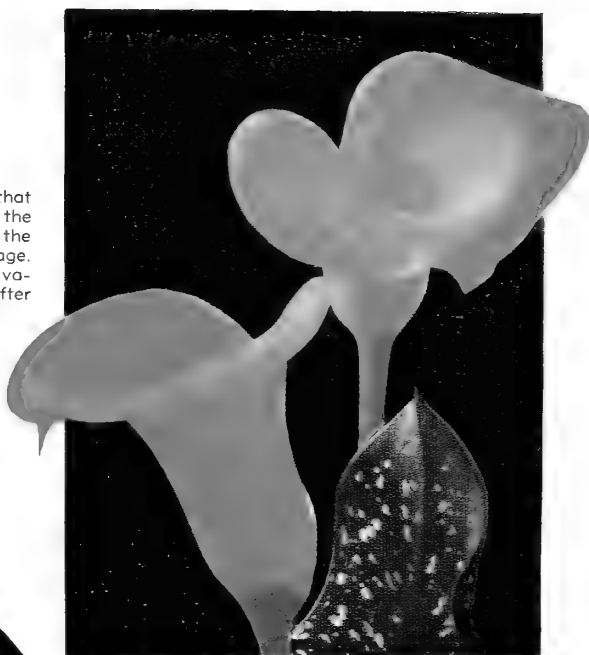

Flowerfield offers an exceptional group of the finest Lily varieties, outstanding in the unusual colorings and exotic charm they bring to the garden. Their steady progression of bloom from June to late September is a delight to all. Thanks to the advance of horticultural skill, most varieties are in the easy-to-grow class. Although Lilies in general are scarce because of the war, Flowerfield is happy to be able to supply your needs from its American-grown bulbs.



TENUIFOLIUM

Amabile Each 50c, Three \$1.35, Doz. \$5.00
An early flowering variety producing in June three to six large bright red Turk's Cap Lilies with sharply reflexed petals, the backs often toned to yellow. Suited for full sunlight or partial shade. It is quite easy in culture, growing 3 to 4 feet tall. Prefers a gritty, well drained soil.

Auratum Each 60c, Three \$1.65, Doz. \$6.00
(The Gold-Barded Lily.) Often growing five feet high, with individual blooms ten inches across, of pure white, thickly studded with maroon specks, with a golden stripe running through the center of each petal. Intensely fragrant, with tremendous clusters atop the strong, leafy stems. Somewhat susceptible to Lily mosaic disease, which may be controlled by a simple Bordeaux spray. Blooms in July and August. For an eye-filling display of rich, brilliant colors and graceful form, nothing quite equals Oriental Poppies during their period of flowering. They bloom in May and June, just after the Peonies have given their burst of color, and remain to bloom with the magnificent Hybrid Delphiniums. Their startling color effect and the satiny soft quality of the petals are fascinating almost beyond description.

Best set out in clumps of three or more, spaced a foot apart. They are adapted to most garden soils, but care should be taken to avoid low, wet spots. During the winter, a light loose covering is advisable to prevent extreme exposure, without, however, matting them down and smothering fall growth. Planting in September is definitely recommended, and we suggest that orders be mailed as quickly as possible. Poppies benefit greatly by becoming well established in the fall.

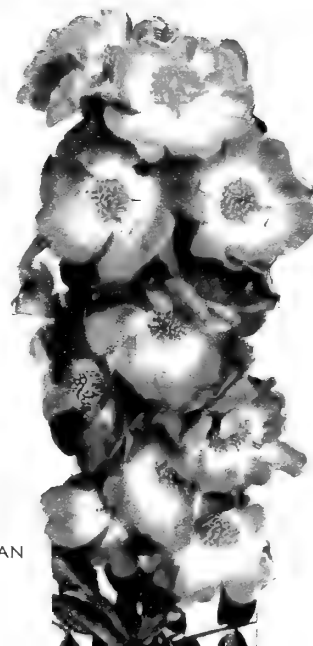

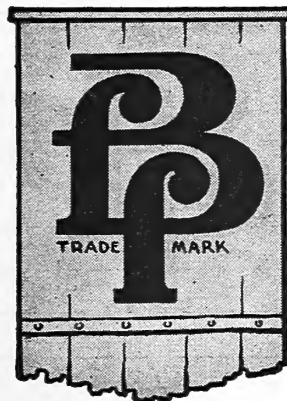

While not quite a clear yellow, this is by far the sturdiest, most reliable, and best variety in that class. Flowers are of yellowish buff, tending toward pink at the edges. Absolutely ideal in form, with stiff stems, perfect for cutting. At its best in the cool days of fall.

Mme. Jules Bouche Each 75c, Three \$2.00, Doz. \$7.50
Perfectly formed, long pointed buds and high-centered flowers of pure white, with a slight pink tint in the center when the flowers first open. Moderately fragrant. Healthy plants, always in bloom. Considered by many to be the finest white Rose.

Mrs. E. P. Thom Each 75c, Three \$2.00, Doz. \$7.50
Pure, unfading fragrant flowers of bright canary-yellow, somewhat deeper in the center. The slender shapely buds open into large, well shaped blooms.

Mrs. Pierre S. DuPont Each 75c, Three \$2.00, Doz. \$7.50
A yellow Rose which blooms all the time and supplies good flowers. Nicely formed buds and double flowers of rich red-gold, almost orange in the depths. Plants are bushy with attractive glossy foliage.

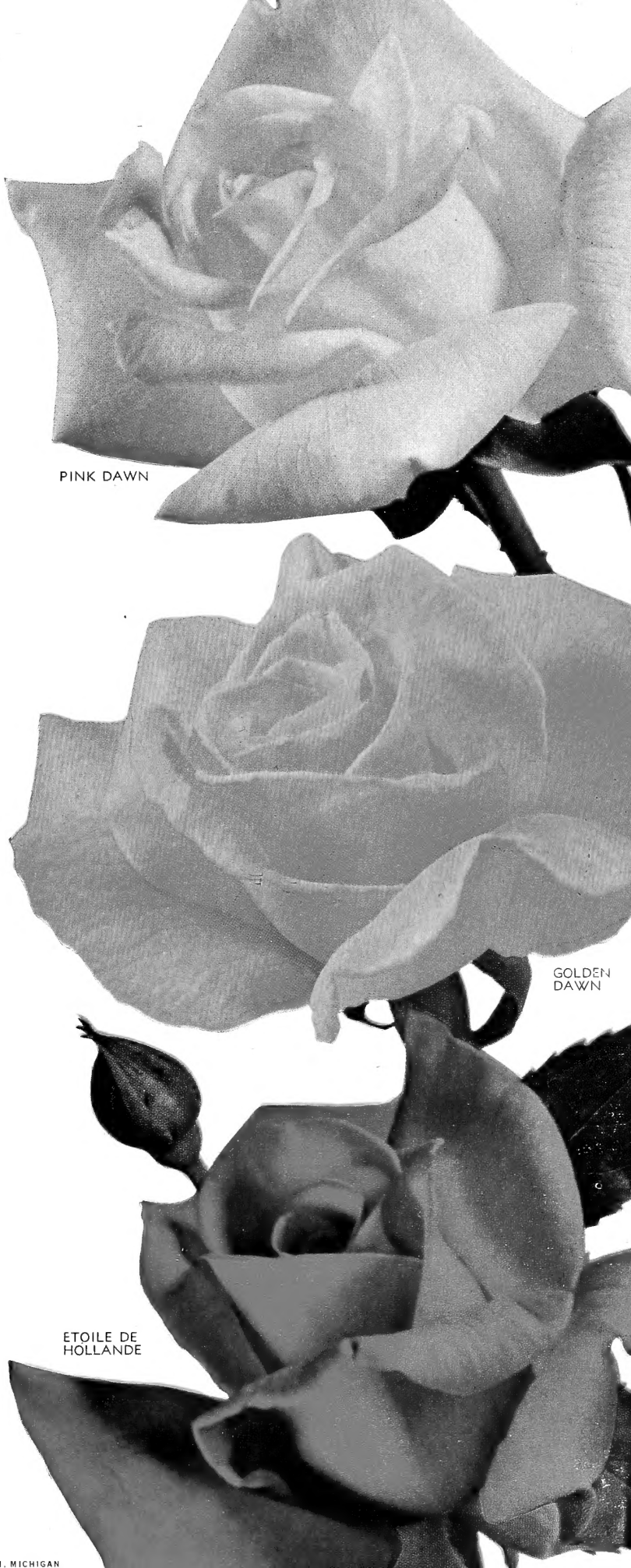

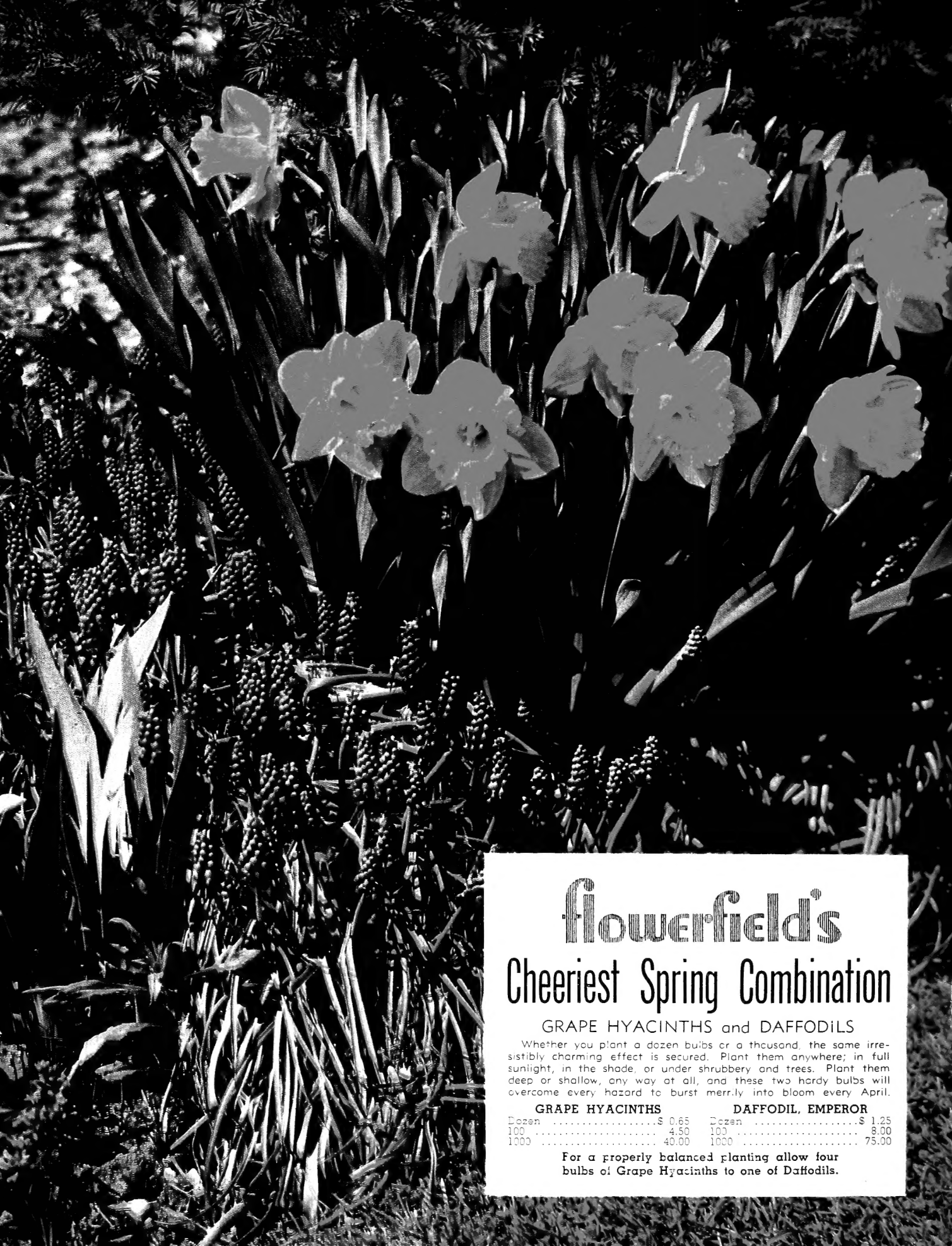
