## Flowerfield's History "Since 1874"

IXTY-FIVE YEARS AGO, John Lewis Childs established a seed and bulb business on Long Island that eventually became one of the outstanding and most reputable distributors of its time. His products were known the world over for their superior merit. The business subsequently settled in the section of Long Island known as Floral Park. In 1909, a branch of the business was established at Flowerfield, Long Island. The Flowerfield branch later became the main office and only place from which the bulb, root and seed farms of that now famous concern operated. The present ownership purchased the business at Flowerfield, lock, stock and barrel, during the early part of 1937 and started

## Call Bearded Jrís

## GROWN AT FLOWERFIELD

There are so many varieties of Tall Bearded Iris offered that it becomes confusing to one who endeavors to make a selection from the long general lists. In an attempt to be of assistance to our cus, tomers, we have selected the following as a choice cross section of all the varieties available. Each one has been grown here at Flower. field; some are comparatively new varieties, some are older ones, however, all have been tried and found very satisfactory.

## Cultural Directions

The cultural requirements are simple for this Iris. The plants can be grown in any average well-drained sweet soil in a sunny location where the plants will be assured all the sunshine possible. Bonemeal has been proven a satisfactory fertilizer. Manures can be used in rotted form, only if well spaded under so that no humus will come in contact with the rhizomes. It has been found that the best time to plant this Iris is from midsummer to the last part of September, so that the roots will become well established before freezing. We prefer to plant during July and August.

If the soil appears dry at planting time, thoroughly soak the dug. up area to be planted, spread the roots over the moist surface, and replace the soil over them. The rhizome should be just below the surface with the soil tamped down around it, so that it is firmly held in position by the packed soil.

In an endeavor to trace its origin, one will find it mentioned in the early writings of the Greeks and Romans, who believed the Peony roots possessed a curative power. Centuries ago the Chinese grew Peonies for their glorious decorative qualities. At that time the Chinese were considered one of the most cultured races in the Far East

A new Wealth of Color and Size. Credit for the develop. ment of the Peony to its modern state belongs, first, to the great gardeners of France, who, during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, by their botanical genius, developed the modern, richly colored, fragrant, double Peony of today; second, credit to no small extent, belongs to our own American originators, who during the past century have introduced many new Peonies, which possess a wealth of color, elegance and charm never dreamed of by our European and Far Eastern brothers of centuries ago.
Hardy and Easy to Grow. Peonies are now concidered one of the most hardy and easily grown of all garden flowers, and
can be planted from September until the ground freezes; most growers, however, prefer to plant during September or early October. They withstand severe cold winters, and thrive much better in localities where the climatic conditions bring, at the very least, a heavy frost. Their soil requirements are modest: they do well in all kinds, but do best in a deep, rather moist loam, with a clay subsoil. In practice, it has been found that its root should be planted in well spaded soil, with the eyes toward the surface, with not more than two inches of soil covering the topmost eyes.

Fertilizing. Peonies are very heavy feeders and require some fertilizing. It is impossible to say how much should be applied to your soil; we would suggest using bonemeal at the time the root is set, and in the spring, apply commercial fertilizer to each plant, remembering that commercial fertilizers are highly concentrated, and should be used sparingly.

As many of the varieties were little known, except to the students of floriculture, it has taken some time for the garden lovers to generally appreciate the range of beauty available in this species, and to further realize that with a relatively limited number of Lilies
a continuous show of flowers may be enjoyed from early June until October.

Once established, Lilies increase in beauty each year. They will thrive in any fairly good moist but welldrained garden soil. Most kinds delight in a sunny location but should be mulched to keep the hot sun from the ground around the base of the plants. Lily bulbs differ greatly in size according to kind and variety, and we therefore offer sizes that will give the best results under average conditions.

## LILY VARIETIES

## Lilium Auratum

An important milestone in floricultural history was marked with the commercial introduction of this Lily in London in the year 1862. This flower, familiarly referred to as "The Golden Rayed Lily" and "The Golden Banded Lily" is still one of the most beautiful and most sought-after members of the family. The flowers, which bloom in August, are white, studded with crimson spots. A gold band passes through the center of each petal. # Give Ctunual Slower Seed, 

## GENERAL LIST OF ANNUAL FLOWERS

Annual flowers live a short but resplendent life. The seeds germinate, produce the mature plants, flower, and die all within the first summer season. They are sown where they are to flower, and do not require starting in artificial heat with its subsequent transplanting outdoors

Most annuals prefer a sunny and open position in deeply cultivated soil. It is im portant that the earth be thoroughly forked, broken up, and then raked finely in order that the tiny, hair-like rootlets can get a good start in their growth.

Plant annual flower seeds on a clear, dry day if possible, and distribute the seed very thinly. The seed can be sown in shallow grooves made with a hoe or a piece of wood, or they can be scattered broadcast over the area, and then covered lightly with fine soil.
