SPOON CHRYSANTHEMUMS

ASTILBE - Spiraea

Graceful feathery varieties

Long-lived perennials with flowers borne in graceful plumes. Spiraea requires a deep, rich, moist soil. They do best in shady and moist locations and flower in June or July.

PREPARING SEED BEDS

An open seed bed should not exceed 4 feet in width, it can be any convenient length desired. Dig the area over well and make sure the soil is completely broken up. Add a generous amount of fine peat moss and sand. To protect beds from sharp winds, surround it with boards 12 inches high.

Sow perennial and biennial seeds thickly between May and August in shallow drills or rows 5 to 6 inches apart across the bed, cover lightly and press the soil gently over the rows. Labels should be inserted in front of each row.

Do not allow the bed to become hard and dry at any time nor should it ever be kept too wet. Lack of water or excessive water are very harmful.

The seed should be protected from direct sun rays by burlap or thin strips of wood placed 1½; inches apart. The bed should also be protected from very heavy rains.

Note This Key Know What You Buy

A - ANNUAL

These annuals are the easiest to raise and earliest to flower. They require from 2 to 3 months. The seed should be sown directly in the garden after the danger of frost has passed.

A - ANNUAL

These annuals require 3 to 6 months to bloom and a little more care in handling. For early bloom start indoors or in hotbeds from January to March, transplant to outdoors after danger of frost has passed.

B - BIENNIAL

Seeds sown during July and August will flower the following year. Unlike perennials, the plants die after their first blooming season. The seed should be sown in flats or seed beds and transplanted during September and October.

P - PERENNIAL

Seeds grown during July and August and transplanted out in September and October usually bloom the following year and each year thereafter. Many, however, will bloom the first year from seed if sown indoors, during February and March, and good strong plants produced for planting out during April and May. The bloom will usually be out of season. The following year, however, they will bloom in their proper period.

AGERATUM - Floss Flower (A) Superb for Edging





FOR EARLIEST BLOOM HOW TO PREPARE YOUR SEED BOXES, POTS OR FLATS FOR EARLY PLANTING OF ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS

Select a shallow receptacle or flat, 3 to 4 inches deep, having a hole or holes in the bottom for drainage.

Make a mixture of good garden soil and an equal amount of clean sand to which add some leaf mold or fine peat moss. Sift the mixture free of all roughage and stones. Fill your receptacle about 3/4 full, gently pressed down.

The seed should be sown on the surface and lightly covered with sandy soil. After sowing, gently press down. Do not cover very fine seed, just press down gently into the soil. Be sure to label each variety for future identification.

Plunge the receptacle into water allowing the water to soak up from the bottom. If it is necessary to water from the top, do it carefully with a fine gentle spray. Keep your flats moist but not wet. To keep dark, cover with a sheet of newspaper, but remove the paper as soon as the seeds have sprouted and place the seed box in a light location.

Transplant after seedlings have made their second leaves, and have become large enough to handle. Allow each plant about 2 inches of space or plant singly in 2-inch pots until you are ready to plant in the garden.



A New Deal for Cannas

TO BE VALUED NOW FOR THEIR ATTRACTIVE COLORING AS WELL AS FOR THE TROPICAL EFFECTS OF THEIR FOLIAGE

A strong suspicion that Cannas have long been among our most abused and unappreciated flowers is justified in spite of the fact that the humped and variously shaped beds that embellished parks, railroad stations and the like some years ago are no longer prevalent. Unprejudiced consideration of the Cannas to be found on the market today prove how wrong we have been in our estimate of them.

Long prized as a foliage plant, we can grow them now for their exquisitely colored flowers as well. A wide range of shades has been developed, leading far from the harsh reds and yellows. Today flowers of unbelievable size growing in graceful and stately clusters, rival, if they do not outstrip, the foliage as an inducement for growing Cannas.

Choose the height, then your color preference from a constantly growing list, and finally bring in a foliage contrast. We have been so accustomed to seeing Cannas used exclusively for mass planting in beds that most of us

have failed to realize that the plants have a graceful habit of growth. This natural grace of individual plants can be displayed only when they have been planted far enough apart to permit spreading of the plants as they attain full size. For example, Cannas are sturdy enough to hold their own with shrubs and provide a colorful summer display when skillfully interplanted in shrub borders or groupings. Bare spaces inevitably show up in perennial borders, too, and such spots might be given definite interest from a carefully selected clump of Cannas. If there is a terrace or formal pool, large pots each containing one or two Cannas could be strategically placed.

Cannas should be allowed to stay in the ground in autumn as long as they will grow. If bulb planting does not interfere, they should be left until the tops are killed by frost. Dig up the roots in the morning, permit them to dry all day in the sun, then store in a warm dry place to prevent decay. They may be buried in sand if this is convenient.
