GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THE work to be done in the garden this month greatly depends on the state of the weather. Should frost and snow prevail, the protection of plants with litter, dry leaves, cinder ashes, Russia mats, etc., is the chief thing to be attended to. After each fall shake the snow off evergreens, as they are seriously damaged by the alternate thawing and freezing of snow-water. If the weather be favourable, sow early peas in the beginning of the month, and on slight hot-beds may

be sown salads, carrots, and kidney beans. In fine weather edgings may be laid. Mignonette, stocks, etc., should be sown in pots, and sweet peas and a few hardy annuals on a warm border. In houses, cinerarias, primulas, carnations, hyacinths, etc., will now be in flower. Train neatly roses, clematis, honeysuckle, and other creeping plants. Should bees be kept, feed them if the weight of the hive shows that they require feeding.

The Sudden Death of President Faure.

M. FÉLIX FAURE, President of the French Republic, died suddenly in Paris from congestion of the brain on the night of February 16th, 1899. At six o'clock in the evening he was in his study, and he then opened the door leading to a room occupied by M. Le Gall, and said to the latter:—

"I do not feel well; come to me."

M. Le Gall immediately ran to the President and assisted him to the sofa standing in the room. He then summoned General Bailloud, M. Blondel, and Dr. Humbert, who happened to be in the Elysée at the time. M. Faure's condition at first did not appear extremely grave, but Dr. Humbert saw he was growing momentarily worse.

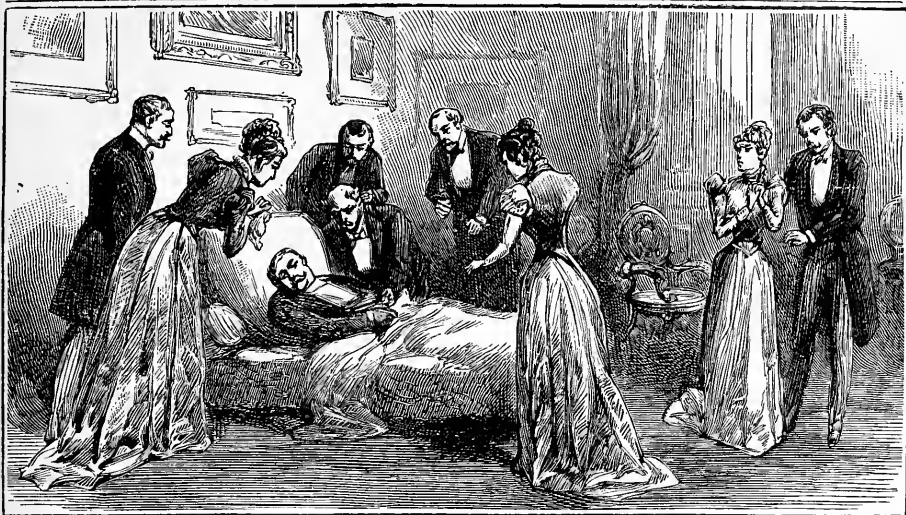
Towards eight o'clock Madame Faure and M. Faure's daughters were told of the President's desperate condition. They all entered the room where he was still lying on the sofa, which had been transformed into a temporary bed. M. Faure began soon after to lose consciousness, and notwithstanding the care which was lavished on him, breathed his last at ten o'clock exactly.

The President had just completed his 58th year, having been born on January 30th, 1841.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THE gardener now bestirs himself: his work for the year begins in earnest. In the kitchen garden, in the beginning and end of the month, he sows peas and beans, and transplants to the bottom of a south wall a few of the peas sown in November for a first crop. He also plants chives, shallots and horseradish, and early ash-leaved potatoes. In the last week he sows red cabbage and savoy. He plants strawberries about the end of the month. He takes care, before the buds are much swelled, to prune apricots, peaches, nectarines, and plums, and also apples, pears, cherries, gooseberries, currants, and raspberries before the end of the month. It is to be noted that pruning after vegetation has commenced,

except summer pruning, is not to be thought of. In the flower garden, if the weather be fine, he plants dried roots. In the last week of the month he sows mignonette and hardy annuals in a warm border for subsequent transplanting. Creepers with drooping flowers are trained by him horizontally, whilst roses and others are trained upright. He pricks over the soil in shrubberies and between evergreens, and dresses it with manure if required. His attention is given to the box edging, which he renews. He also keeps the gravel walk in order, and sweeps and mows and rolls the grass. Wall trees should be protected when the buds begin to swell, during the prevalence of east wind.

1900 is Not a Leap Year.

CONTRARY to the general rule that years whose numbers can be divided by four are leap years, the year 1900 is not one.

A little explanation will make it clear why this is so. The old Roman calendar, with its kalends, nones, ides, and intercalaries, was almost as cumbersome and puzzling as the Chinese alphabet, and it seems strange so enlightened a people could have retained it so long. But in the time of Julius Cæsar the year had got about three months out of place, and he made the year 47 B.C.—called the year of confusion—445 days long, and ordered that in future the year should contain 365 days for three consecutive years, and 366 days on the fourth, which for simplicity was made the year divisible by four.

But this made the average year eleven minutes and nearly fourteen seconds too long, so that in the sixteenth century the civil year was ten days in advance of the solar year. Pope Gregory XIII. in 1582 dropped these ten days from the calendar, and determined that in future only those centesimal years which can be divided by 400 without a remainder, should be leap years.

Thus, 1600 was a leap year, while 1700 and 1800 were not, and 1900 will not be.

Rochester Castle.

ROCHESTER CASTLE is one of the finest examples of Anglo-Norman architecture in the kingdom. It stands on the Medway, being built on the brow of a hill with its chief tower so placed as to command both the river and the adjacent country.

It is highly probable that there was a Roman fortification here at one time, but the Castle of which the remains still exist was built about the year 1088 by a bishop of Rochester, who was one of the most celebrated architects of his age.

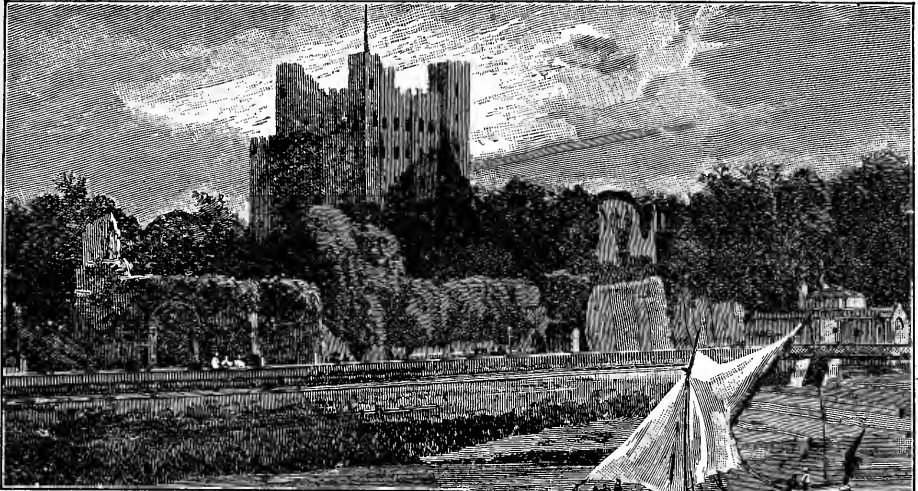
The noble tower which stands at the south-east angle of the Castle is so lofty as to be seen distinctly twenty miles distant. This tower was rebuilt in the place of the original square one destroyed when King John besieged and took the fortress.

After the siege by King John, Rochester Castle was besieged by Simon de Montfort in the reign of Henry III., and by a party of rebels during the insurrection of Wat Tyler. It was repaired by Edward IV., but soon afterwards fell into decay, although the massive keep is still in good preservation. The interior was demolished after James I. came to the throne, for the sake of the timber, but the walls defy destruction, and are likely to stand yet and bear witness to the past for many a long day.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THE main crop of all vegetables—peas, beans, cabbages, onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, etc.—should now be sown. Sow asparagus, cauliflower, sea-kale and celery in the last fortnight, and plant the main crop of potatoes. These last should be set in rows two feet apart and ten inches between the sets. Finish the pruning of fruit trees. Fruit trees and shrubs may be transplanted; but that work should have been done in November. The operation of grafting is to be begun in the third week of the month. In the last week sow hardy

annuals in the borders. Autumn planted bulbs and spring flowers will now be making some show in the garden. Several of the early rhododendrons will be in flower. The sowing of several annuals may be proceeded with. The hardy annuals sown this month should be sown in small patches and covered with a little dry earth. Transplant last year's layers of carnations in beds or large pots at the end of the month. Place dahlias in a hot-bed to start. Sow borage for bees.

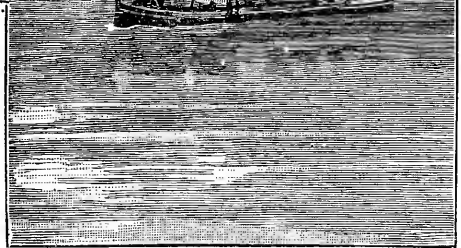

Maudy Gifts.

A Turk's soldier lying on the operating table was having his lower jaw cut away (as usual without an anæsthetic); in the middle, and at the most painful moment of the job, he stopped the surgeon, and pointing to a comrade who was lying hard by smoking and waiting his turn, "Never mind me," he said, "look after him; he wants a light."

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THERE is much work to be done this month in the kitchen garden. Asparagus, sea-kale, beet, carrots and onions should now be sown on heavy soils. The planting of cauliflowers, cabbages and lettuce is to be attended to, and that of the main crop of potatoes is to be finished. Hoe and thin spinach, onions, turnips, etc., and earth up cabbages, cauliflowers, peas, beans, and early potatoes. Early Dutch turnips may be sown. In the fruit garden disbudbing—that is to say, relieving the shoots of wall-trees of some of their buds just when they begin growing—is now to

be attended to. The sowing of all sorts of annuals is to be proceeded with. Plant and prune roses. Tender deciduous trees and shrubs raised in pots should now be planted out. During the month remove gradually the coverings of all tender shrubs and plants. Transplant hardy biennials, such as wall-flowers, Brompton stocks, hollyhocks, etc., if this was not done in autumn. Garden pests—caterpillars, beetles, red spiders, ants, etc.—are now very numerous and active. Walks should be turned up and rolled and grass plots dressed.

The Queen's Eightieth Birthday.

THE eightieth birthday of Queen Victoria was celebrated on the 24th of May, 1899, all over the world with a spontaneous display of affectionate reverence unsurpassed in recorded history. At Windsor, where her Majesty was able to participate in them in person, the celebrations had a special character.

In the course of the morning the Queen received congratulatory addresses. A serenade was given in her honour in the grand quadrangle of Windsor Castle by the local musical societies and the St. George's Chapel and Eton College choirs, under the direction of Sir Walter Parratt.

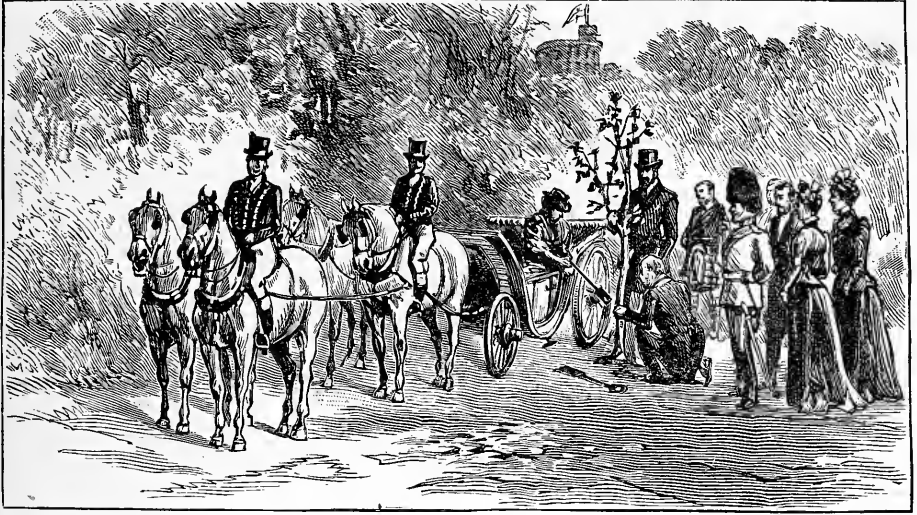
A birthday parade of the 2nd Scots Guards was held at noon, opposite the East Terrace of the Castle, and the Queen drove to the place in her garden chaise and saw the troops march past. She afterwards planted an oak in the Park in commemoration of the day. In performing this ceremony she was accompanied by the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, Princess Henry of Battenberg, the Duchess of Connaught, the Duchess of Albany, and several of the younger princesses and princes.

In the afternoon a special thanksgiving service was held in St. George's Chapel, and later, the Queen drove through the streets of Windsor, and was enthusiastically cheered.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THE work of hoeing and earthing up the different crops is to be gone on with. Cabbages, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, peas, beans, etc., should now be sown for late crops. The peas that are in progress must be staked. One must keep on the look-out for weeds, and when seen they must have no mercy shown them. Keep up a crusade against caterpillars on gooseberry bushes and wall trees. Plant out annuals raised in pots and sow annuals for succession. Herbaceous

border plants should be thinned out and staked. Pansies, dahlias, and double wallflowers should now be propagated by dividing the roots. If heartsease be now propagated in cuttings and placed in a shady border it will flower in the autumn, and the largest flowers will be produced by these young plants. May is a month of danger for the garden, in consequence of the hot sunny days being often succeeded by cold frosts at night.

In Havana.

IN Havana, the capital of Cuba, the promenades, drives, and public gardens form a remarkable feature which wins the admiration and praise of every visitor. The Prado or Pasco Isabel, shown in our illustration, is a long and handsome boulevard laid out in the 18th century.

From the sea especially, Havana presents a picturesque appearance. The background is rather tame, but the long lines of fortifications, the numerous church towers, and the shipping, do much to relieve the somewhat tawdry effect of the gaily coloured houses. Most of the houses have flat roofs after the manner in vogue in Southern Spain.

His Simple Style.

ONE of Dickens's contributors to *Household Words* being sent for by his chief, appeared in trepidation, thinking he was to be found fault with for something or other.

He found, however, that Dickens wished to compliment him. "I am constantly struck by your admirably simple style, Mr. X. How have you attained it?"

"Well, you see, Mr. Dickens," he said, "there are so many words I don't understand, and so many words I can't spell, that I have to use a very simple set of words."

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

TURNIPS are to be sown for succession in the first week of this month, and for a full autumn crop in the third week. Peas and beans should be sown for late crops. Early in the month gourds, pumpkins, vegetable marrows, etc., should be got out. Birds now begin to attack cherry-trees, so, for the protection of the fruit, the trees should be netted over. Continue the destruction of insects; this is best accomplished by frequent washings, and by directing tobacco smoke against them, or by strewing snuff or the

fine powder of tobacco upon them. All planting out in beds and borders should now be finished. Perennials for planting out in the spring should now be sown if neglected last month. Young plants of pelargoniums, fuchsias, etc., which will be required for autumnal window plants, should now be moved into well-drained pots, and plunged into a border. Take up the bulbs of tulips, hyacinths, etc., as soon as the leaves grow yellow. Standard and pillar roses should now be staked.



For Cyclists.

CYCLING is healthful or not according to its use and abuse.

For cycling long distances the secret is an even, steady pace.

If climbing hills is the hardest, so descending them is the most risky part of cycling.

Always remember, if you cycle ten miles into the country, you have ten miles to come back.

When using resin for tightening nuts, handles, etc., be careful that none gets into the bearings or on the tyre.

Riding a bicycle is a most effective cure for melancholia. The change of scene diverts the attention, and the brain receives a splendid tonic by the temporary change.

Uphill cycling can be made much easier by sitting erect in the saddle, following the revolution of the pedal right round, and giving a slight pull on the handles each time.

A Curious Decoration.

On the ceiling of one of the rooms in Sans Souci, the world-renowned palace of Frederick the Great, is painted a spider with its web. The origin of this strange decoration is as follows:—This apartment was the great king's breakfast-room. Every morning, when his majesty entered the room he drank a cup of chocolate, and on one occasion, just as he was about to drink, discovered that a huge spider had dropped from the ceiling into the cup, and he naturally cried out for fresh chocolate to be prepared. The next moment he was startled by the report of a pistol. No sooner had the cook received the order than he blew out his brains. Not because the king had refused the chocolate did he do this, but because he had poisoned the cup, and had thought himself discovered. It was in remembrance of this escape that his majesty ordered the spider and its web to be painted on the ceiling.

The Duke of Devonshire.

THE present Duke of Devonshire is the eighth to hold that title. He is the son of the seventh duke and Blanche, the daughter of the sixth Earl of Carlisle.

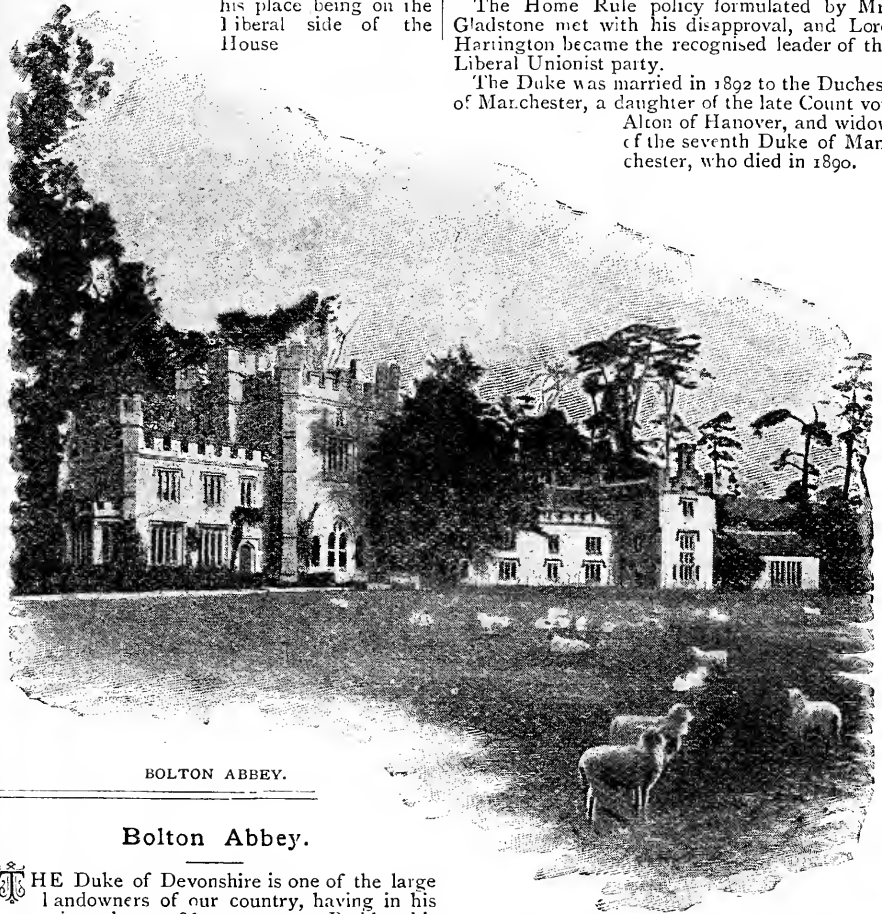
Previous to his succeeding to the dukedom in 1891 he had been long well-known to the world as the Marquis of Hartington. He entered on political life in 1857 as Parliamentary member for North Lancashire, his place being on the liberal side of the House

After holding several minor offices he attained to Cabinet rank in 1866, when he became Secretary for War. He was Postmaster-General in Mr. Gladstone's first administration, and held that office till 1871, when he was made Chief Secretary for Ireland.

When Mr. Gladstone retired after his defeat in 1874 Lord Hartington was by unanimous choice made leader of the Liberal party. He served, however, again under his old chief on Mr. Gladstone's coming once more to power.

The Home Rule policy formulated by Mr. Gladstone met with his disapproval, and Lord Hartington became the recognised leader of the Liberal Unionist party.

The Duke was married in 1892 to the Duchess of Manchester, a daughter of the late Count von Alton of Hanover, and widow of the seventh Duke of Manchester, who died in 1890.

Bolton Abbey.

THE Duke of Devonshire is one of the large landowners of our country, having in his possession about 186,000 acres. Besides his London residence he has Chatsworth House and Hardwicke Hall, in Derbyshire; Holker Hall, Milnthorpe, in Westmoreland; Compton Place, at Eastbourne; Lismore Castle, in Waterford; and the well known Bolton Abbey, shown in our illustration, in Yorkshire. This Yorkshire seat forms a charming domain of seven hundred acres, the park containing a large herd of red deer.

The great sight here is the magnificent monastic ruins of Bolton Priory, exquisite remains of the twelfth century. They are situated on the romantic banks of the Wharfe, near its wild,

rocky defile of the Strid, the river passing here amidst the leafy recesses of Bolton Woods, ever associated with Wordsworth's patriotic ballad, "The Boy of Egremont." This was a favourite painting-ground of Turner, the great master of English landscape; and Landseer has immortalised the fine perpendicular gateway of the ruin by his fine painting "Bolton Abbey in the Olden Time."

We must not forget, either, that Wordsworth's romantic poem of "The White Doe of Rylstone" is founded upon a tradition connected with Bolton Priory

At the Battle of Omdurman.

THE battle of Omdurman, on the 2nd of September, 1898, was a scene of slaughter which on one side at least was as grim and terrible as anything in modern warfare. When the victors came to count the dead, 10,800 Dervish corpses lay on the battle field, and 16,000 were reported wounded. The loss on the victorious side was, by comparison, insignificant. Of white officers one was killed and thirteen were wounded; of men twenty-three were killed and ninety-nine were wounded. Of Egyptian officers one was killed and eight were wounded, and of men twenty were killed, and two hundred and twenty-one were wounded.

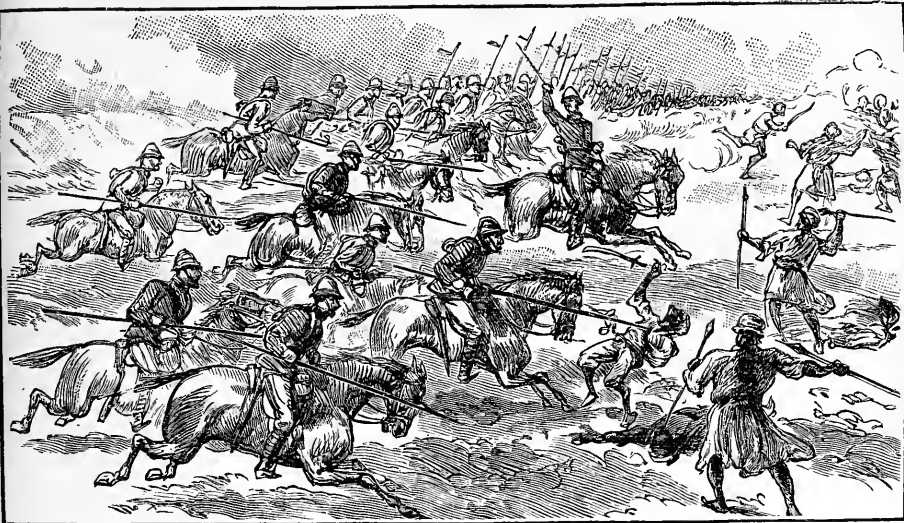
The great incident of the battle undoubtedly was the charge of the 21st Lancers, under Colonel Martin, against enormous odds. The Lancers, not more than 300 strong, rode through 2,000 Dervishes, losing several of their number in the charge, every man who fell being immediately hacked to pieces by the swords of the Dervishes.

It is told that when they got to the far side of the lanes they had cut for themselves in the enemy's ranks, they reformed as coolly as if they had been on parade. One corporal, who was covered with blood, and reeling in his saddle, when ordered to fall out, shouted, waving his bent lance, "Never form up, No. 2!" meaning his squadron.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

ABOUT the middle and end of the month full crops of celery, celeriac, and endive are to be planted. Early in the month French beans should be sown, and in the last week late crops of broccoli, colewort, and cauliflower. Medicinal and pot herbs should now be gathered and dried, and such herbs should be propagated by slips and cuttings. Plant strawberries in pots for forcing next winter. Prune and train wall-trees and destroy insects. Budding—both of use in the case

of many fruit-trees and the chief means of propagating roses—is the chief operation of the month. Hedges and evergreens require cutting at this time. Spring bulbs, such as hyacinths, tulips, narcissi, etc., that have died down may be taken up and stored till November. They should be kept dry in paper bags till the season for planting comes round again. In showery weather thin out annuals; they will supply the plants wanted for filling up.

Assassination of the Austrian Empress.

ONE of the most dastardly and foolish crimes recorded in the annals of any country was committed on the 10th of September, 1898, at Geneva. As the Empress of Austria, accompanied by one of her ladies, was making her way on foot from her hotel to the steamer by which she proposed to return to Territet, she was fatally stabbed by an Italian Anarchist.

The terrible nature of the deed that had been done was not at first suspected by the spectators, or apparently by the victim herself. She was able, with the help of the lady who was with her, to walk to the boat.

It was not until the steamer had left the quay that the attendants of the Empress realised the awful truth. Traces of blood were observed on her dress, and it was speedily ascertained that she had been stabbed with a stiletto or some similar weapon in the region of the heart.

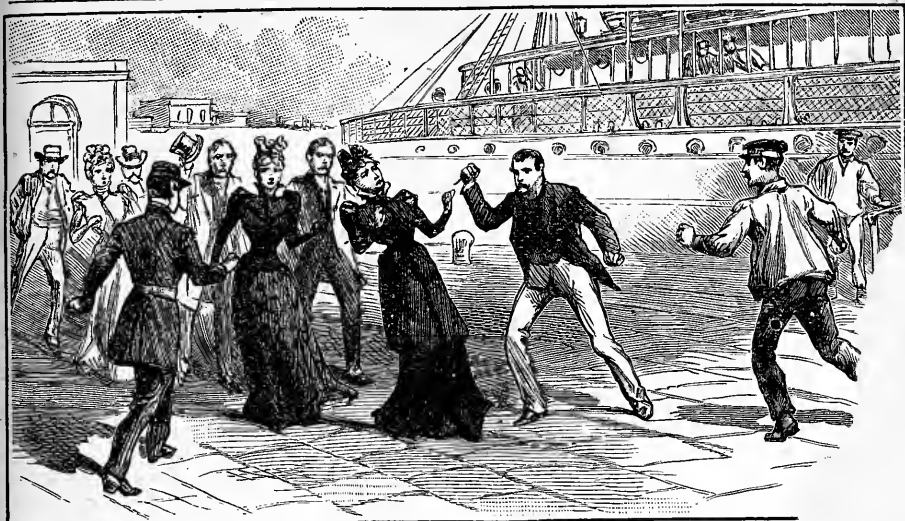
The boat returned to shore, and the dying Empress was carried to her hotel in an improvised litter, where she lived just long enough to receive extreme unction.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

HOE and thin out turnips. Sow winter and spring spinach in the beginning and end of the month. Begin to earth up first-planted celery and leeks. Plant out broccoli, savoy, curly kale, and Brussels sprouts. A few coleworts may still be planted. Caterpillars should be looked for and destroyed. Savoy and cabbage, which are particularly subject to their attacks, should be sprinkled with lime on dewy mornings. In dry weather, gooseberry and currant bushes should be netted over

to save the ripening fruit till late in the autumn. Destroy wasps' nests, and take all necessary steps to save the fruit on the walls from insects. Pick off dead leaves and reduce stray growths. All bands tied round buds and grafts should now be loosened and removed where they are no longer required. According to some, it is better to pot auriculas now than in May. Carefully attend to carnations and picotees, and water them till they have taken fresh root.

"Albert," she cried, "what would you do? Pray do not kill yourself! Throw your revolver away and let us forget our quarrel."

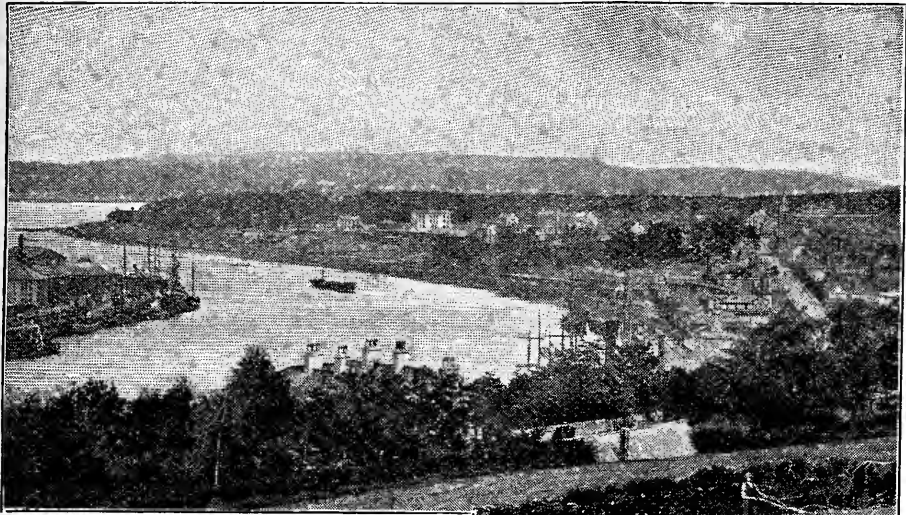

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

THE temperature of the year now takes a turn: last month the mean temperature was 61° 28', this month it is 60° 14'. In the kitchen garden earth up celery; plant cauliflowers, cabbages, broccoli, and small saladings. Sow lettuce and spinach, if not done in August, for spring crops. Lift onions and lay them on a dry shady border or gravel walk. About the end of the month take up the most forward potatoes. In the fruit garden the chief work is the gathering and storing of autumnal sorts of apples and pears. The

summer pruning and training of fruit-trees should now be finished. Plant strawberries for a main crop. In the flower garden remove at once all dead leaves and dead flowers. Keep down weeds: this is a lively time of the year with them. In the beginning of the month sow all half-hardy annuals if not done last month. Place auriculas under shelter for the winter at the end of the month; but they should still have as much light and air as is consistent with shielding them from frost and heavy rain.



Huge Loaves.

THE largest loaves of bread baked in the world are those of France and Italy. The "pipe" bread of Italy is baked in loaves two or three feet long, while in France the loaves are made in the shape of very long rolls four or five feet in length, and in many cases even six feet.

The bread of Paris is distributed almost exclusively by women, who go to the various bake-houses at 5.30 a.m., and spend about an hour polishing up the loaves. After the loaves are thoroughly cleaned of dust and grit, the "bread porter" proceeds on the round of her customers. Those who live in apartments or flats find their loaves leaning against the door.

SAMUEL WARREN, the author of "Ten Thousand a Year," had a weakness: he seldom felt comfortable except when he sat at the table of a person of quality.

Of this trait in his character the following story is told:—

"Really! I am sorry for that, and so will be the Chancellor. I'll tell him how sorry you are."

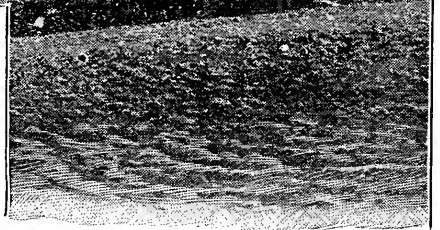
After a little more talk the visitor rose to go.

The German Emperor at Jerusalem.

The weather was everything that could be desired. The Empress and the ladies of the Court went to the Church in state carriages, the Emperor, who wore the magnificent mantle of the Teutonic Knights, going on horseback, attended by a brilliant cavalcade of knights, also wearing the mantle.

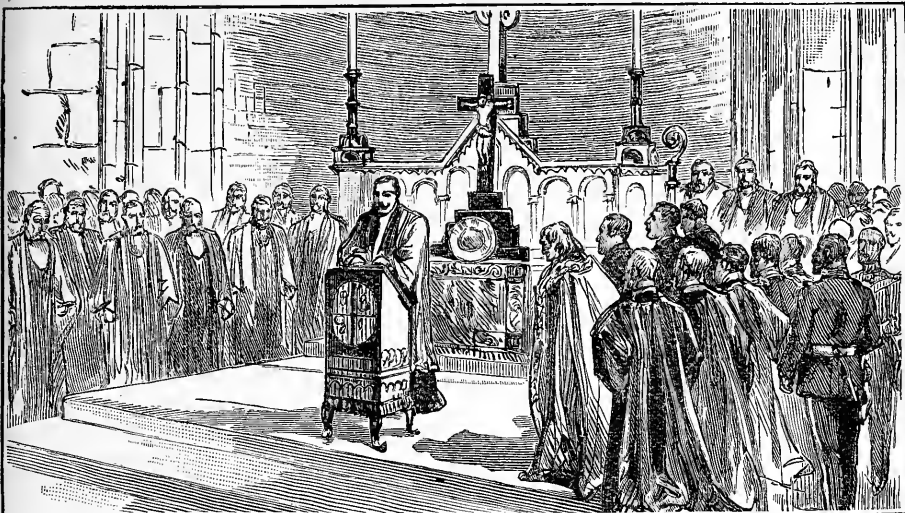
At the close of the ceremony of consecration, the Emperor delivered an address to those present, pointing out how Jerusalem testified to the common work which united all Christians, regardless of creed or nationality, in the Apostolic faith. The Emperor then renewed the vow of his ancestors: "I and my House will serve the Lord."

The Emperor then returned to camp in great state with his own escort of German sailors.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

DIG up and store carrots and potatoes. Parsnips may be kept in the ground till next month. Sow small salads and radishes in the first week, and mazagan beans and early frame peas in the last week. Continue to plant out cabbages for spring use, and all kinds of apples and pears should now be carefully stored. Pinks, carnations, auriculas, etc., should now be placed in their winter quarters. Propagation by cuttings may still be proceeded with, but it is to be observed that spring cuttings are far better than those taken in autumn. Gather

hollyhock seed and dahlia seed if ripe. Prepare beds for tulips, hyacinths, etc. They should be dug to the depth of eighteen inches, and well-drained. Take up scarlet lobelias: divide them and place them in pots for the winter; they are apt to decay if left out. The temperature of this month is considerably—about 7°—colder than that of September. Towards its close frosts are often frequent. Flowers begin to fade. Repair fences, clean drains, and house wood for firing in winter time.

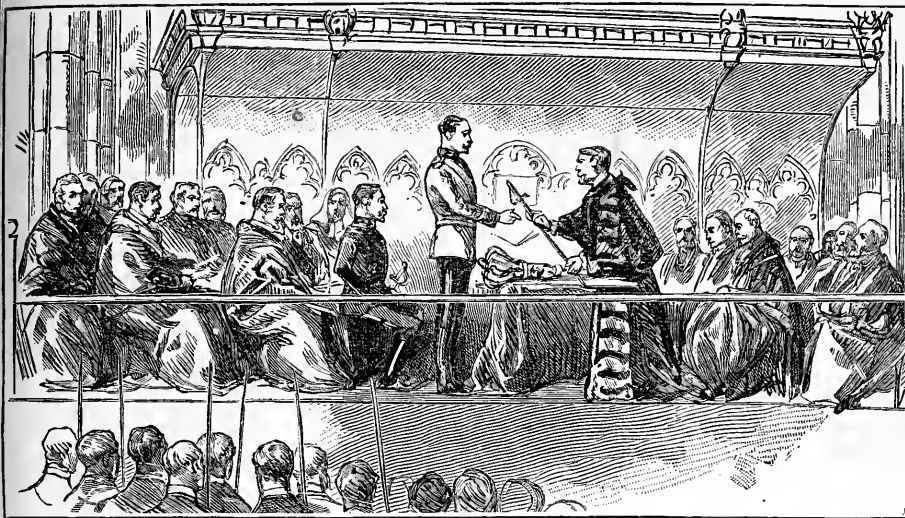

The Lord Mayor next presented the sword of honour, after which Lord Kitchener made a short speech, tendering his sincere thanks for the honours done him as representative of the army recently engaged in the Sudan.

In the evening the Lord Mayor entertained Lord Kitchener and a brilliant and representative company of guests at a banquet in the Mansion House.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

FINISH taking up potatoes, carrots, beet, and parsnips. Take up early broccoli, endive, late cauliflower, and lettuce, and lay them in an open shed or in o'd cucumber or melon pits, which will protect them from frost and afford a supply during the winter months. Sow early frame peas and mazagan beans for an early crop in the second week of the month. Strawberry beds should have all runners and dead leaves removed. In fine weather, and the earlier in the month the better, plant all sorts of fruit-trees. Generally speaking, November is the best time for transplanting trees and shrubs. When the weather

is favourable attend to the work of pruning and nailing. This is also the best season for making alterations in the flower-garden which has now lost its beauty. There may, however, be flowers in the garden both in this and the following month. The common monthly rose and several varieties of laurestine are in blossom. Hyacinths should be planted the first week if possible, and set them four inches deep and six apart. They should be protected from heavy rains until they have taken root. Evergreen trees and shrubs are now in great beauty. Repair drains and renew fences.

The ship was again tacked, the holes plugged up—not, of course, without difficulty—and she was then put before the wind, pumped out, and eventually taken into port.

On one occasion a French nobleman, walking in the square of Saint Mark, had his pocket picked of a very valuable watch. Angry and scornful he went straight to the head of police, complaining bitterly of the neglect and ineffectiveness of the force under his command.

Arundel Castle.

THE town of Arundel is one of the most picturesque in the south of England, and consists mainly of one steep street leading to the castle which is its crowning glory and attraction.

The castle, which gives to its possessor—the Duke of Norfolk—the title of Earl of Arundel, is so situated as to have been impregnable in ancient times, since it is precipitous on one side, while a deep ditch protects it from attack on the other.

The most ancient portion of the building is the Keep, in which we see traces of Saxon work. It is built upon a mound rising upwards of 70 feet from the fosse around it, has an average diameter of 65 feet, and walls from 8 to 10 feet thick. This is the portion which was besieged by Stephen in 1139. A gateway flanked by two square towers leads to this remnant of mediæval times: below these towers are the dungeons.

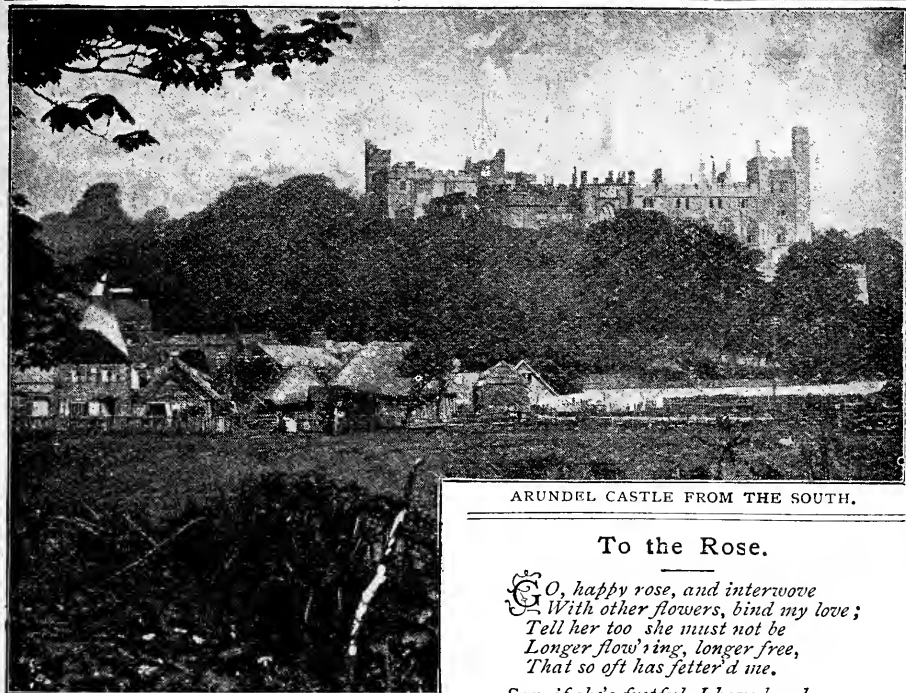
There is a beautiful view to be seen from the ruined window of an ancient oratory, near the Keep. It is said that a subterranean passage once led to Amberley Castle five miles off, from the centre of the ruins.

The park at Arundel is one of the grandest for natural scenery in the land. It was enclosed in 1786, and is about twelve miles round, containing 11,000 acres. One of its interesting features is the number of fallow deer within its bounds.

GARDENING FOR THE MONTH.

MANY of the labours of last month, such as transplanting, altering, and laying down lawns, may be continued this month if the weather be open. In the kitchen a few peas and beans may be sown. Turn up the ground thoroughly for exposure to the frost and snow. If the weather be mild attend to the operation of pruning. The roots of tender trees, such as the apricot and peach, should be mulched over, as they are often so far affected by frost as to be barren during the ensuing year.

Inspect the fruit in the store room at regular and frequent intervals, and remove whatever is found to be in a state of decay. Collect dead leaves and rubbish. Old shrubberies should be cleared and top-dressed and dug. Tea-roses that are in exposed situations should be taken up and placed safely out of the reach of frost. In frosty weather sprinkle a little litter, by way of protection, over any choice things which may happen to be in open beds.

Notes by a Traveller in Siam.

DD numbers are lucky. There are three, five, seven, etc., rungs of the ladder (which does duty for a staircase) of the house. Houses are built on an odd number of piles, and inside an odd number of windows will be found.

Babes are supposed to have supernatural powers. A relative leaving the house on a journey without having spoken a word or two to the babe—sleeping or awake—will meet with misfortune on the journey. If the child cries inordinately during his absence, the misfortune is of a serious kind, and the household is put into a state of unrest till his return.

No woman may pass a male member of the family or a visitor without making a low obeisance. Neither may a woman ascend or descend the house ladder without first asking the permission of men or elderly people near by.

If shortly after the arrival of a visitor, betel nut were not brought out and offered, or if he were not informed that the stock of betel nut had run out, it would amount to a serious breach of etiquette.

Women may not have their meals before the male members of the family. In the case of children this rule is relaxed.

At meal times the members of the family and visitors who must be invited—men first and women next—assemble near the fireplace in a circle. Each is given a large saucer, into which he ladles out as much rice as he wants. In the centre of the circle are dishes of fish, paste, herbs, etc., from which each helps himself as he pleases.

He was Certainly Extravagant.

ONE of the most amazing examples of hare-brained extravagance and dissipation to be found anywhere is that of John Mytton of Halston, who, within the last fifteen years of his life, squandered full half-a-million sterling, and sold timber—"the old oaks of Halston"—to the amount, it has been stated, of £80,000.

One characteristic incident of his career ought to be related.

"After heavy liabilities had been incurred, but previously to the disposal of the first property he sold, Mr. Longueville, his agent, assured Mr. Mytton that if he would content himself for the following six years with an income of £6,000, the fine old Shrewsbury estate—the earliest patrimony of his ancestors—might be saved; and he besought him to listen to his warning counsel. 'No, no,' replied Mytton, 'I wouldn't give a straw for life if it was to be passed on £6,000 a year.'"

Mytton died in the Fleet Prison of *delirium tremens*, aged 37.

Post Office Telegraphs.

The charge for telegrams throughout the United Kingdom is 6d. for the first twelve words, and 1/2d. for every additional word. Addresses are charged for. Figures are counted at the rate of five figures to a word. For the rates charged for foreign telegrams, see the Post Office Guide.

Letter Post.

To and from all parts of the United Kingdom, the prepaid rates are:—

Not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, rd.
For every additional 2 oz., 1/2d.

No letter may exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless it be sent to or from a Government office.

A letter posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage, and a letter posted insufficiently paid is chargeable with double the deficiency.

Foreign and Colonial Postage Rate is 2 1/2d. per 1/2 oz.

Imperial Penny Postage.

A letter postage of rd. per 1/2 oz. is now established between the United Kingdom, Canada, Newfoundland, India, Natal, and other British Possessions and Protectorates.

Inland Book Post.

The Book Post is now limited to packets not exceeding 2 oz. in weight. For this weight the charge is 1/2d.

Every Book Packet must be posted either without a cover or in an unfastened envelope, or in an easily removable cover. No Book Packet may exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in breadth or depth.

Beyond the weight of 2 oz. there is now no distinction between letters, samples, and books. All go at the rate of rd. for not exceeding 1/2 oz., and 1/2d. for every additional 1/2 oz.

Parcel Post.

Parcels not exceeding 11 lb. in weight are received at any post office for transmission between places in the United Kingdom. The rates of postage are:—Not exceeding 1 lb., 3d.; 2 lb., 4d.; 3 lb., 5d.; 4 lb., 6d.; 5 lb., 7d.; 6 lb., 8d.; 7 lb., 9d.; 8 lb., 10d.; 9 lb., 11d.; 11 lb., 1s.

The dimensions allowed for an inland postal parcel are:—

Greatest length .. 3ft. 6in.
Greatest length and girth combined .. 6ft. 0in.

A Parcel Post has also been established between this country and many foreign countries and the British Colonies and possessions generally. For rates and regulations, see the Post Office Guide.

Postage on Inland Registered Newspapers.

Prepaid Rate.—On each Registered Newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more Registered Newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be chargeable on a Book Packet or Letter of the same weight—viz. one halfpenny for 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz.

Foreign and Colonial Patterns and Samples.

This post is absolutely restricted to *bona fide trade patterns and samples*. The rate of postage is 1/2d. per 2 oz., except that the *lowest charge is rd., for which sum, however, a weight of 4 oz. may be sent*.

Post and Letter Cards.

Post Cards, bearing a halfpenny impressed stamp, are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom only. They are sold at 10 for 5 1/2d., or of finer quality, 10 for 6d. They can also be had in

small numbers or singly. Reply Cards are also sold.

Letter Cards are sold at 8 for 9d. Smaller numbers in proportion. Foreign Postal Cards, rd.; reply, 2d.

Money Orders for the United Kingdom.

Money Orders are granted in the United Kingdom at the following rates:—

For sums not exceeding £1 .. 2d.
Above £1, and not excog. £3 3d.
" £3 .. £10 4d.

Money may be sent by Telegraph Money Order at the following rates:—

For sums not exceeding £3 .. 4d.
Above £3, and not excog. £10 6d.

In addition to the commission a charge is made at the ordinary inland rate for the official telegram of advice and its repetition.

Money Orders payable Abroad.

Money Orders, payable abroad, are issued in the United Kingdom at the following rates:—

If payable in France, Switzerland, Belgium, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Italy, &c. &c.—

On sums not exceeding £2, 6d.; £2 to £6, 1s.; £6 to £10, 1s. 6d.

Postal Orders.

Postal Orders are issued at the following rates: on those for 1/- and 1/6, the charge is 1/2d.; for 2/-, 2/6, 3/-, 3/6, 4/-, 4/6, 5/-, 7/6, 10/-, 10/6, the charge is 1d.; for 15/- and 20/-, 1 1/2d. Broken amounts may be made up by affixing stamps to the face of the Order.

Registration and Compensation.

By the prepayment of a fee of twopence any postal packet (parcels included) may be registered to any place in the United Kingdom. Every packet to be registered must be given to an agent of the Post Office, and a receipt obtained for it. The Postmaster-General will give compensation up to a maximum limit of £120 for the loss and damage of Inland Registered Postal Packets of all kinds. The ordinary fee of 2d. secures £5; the payment of 3d. £10; 4d. £20; 5d. £30; 6d. £40; 7d. £50; 8d. £60; 9d. £70; 10d. £80; 11d. £90; 1s. £100; 1s. 1d. £110; 1s. 2d. £120.

Post Office Savings Banks.

No deposit of less than a shilling is received, nor any pence, and not more than £50 in one year. No further deposit is allowed when the amount standing in depositor's name amounts to £200 inclusive of interest. Interest is allowed at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent. (or sixpence in the pound) per annum—that is, at the rate of one halfpenny per pound per month.

At every Post Office in the United Kingdom forms for making small deposits are issued gratuitously. Each form has twelve divisions, in each of which a penny postage stamp can be placed; when the twelve are filled in, it is received at any Post Office Savings Bank as a shilling.

Any person can invest, at any Post Office Savings Bank, small sums in Government Stock. Not more than £200 can be invested in any one year. The amount held by the investor must not exceed £500.

REGISTERS OF BIRTHS, MARRIAGES, AND DEATHS.

Copies of these are kept at Somerset House, and may be searched on payment of a fee of one shilling. If a certified copy of any entry be required, the charge for that, in addition to the shilling for the search, is two shillings and sevenpence, which includes a penny for stamp duty. The registers contain an entry of births, deaths, and marriages since 1st July, 1837. Copies can always be obtained from the Registrar for the district, or the Superintendent Registrar who has the custody of the registers (including those of persons married at the churches) when filled.

MARRIAGES.

In the case of marriage by banns, if the contracting parties reside in different parishes, the publication must be made in the churches of each parish for three consecutive Sundays. If three months be permitted to elapse after the third time of publication, the banns become useless, and the parties must either obtain a licence or submit to the republication of the banns. Civil marriages can be performed before a duly licensed Registrar. Particulars of such can be obtained at all Registry Offices.
