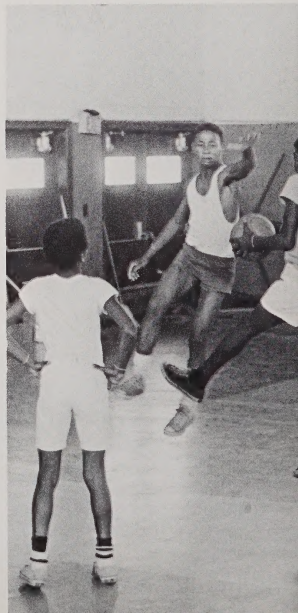


Bruce Honeycutt, journalism student, discovers through personal experience that drawing yearbook layouts is a tedious and exacting procedure.

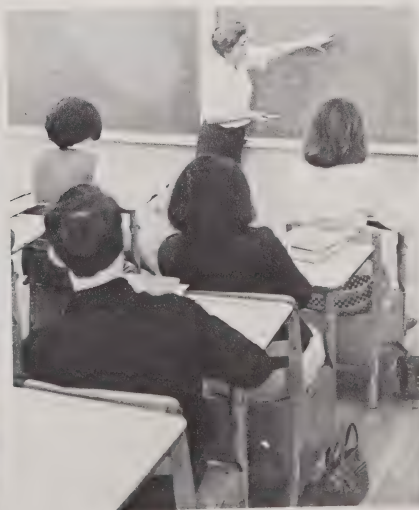


Variety In Classes Sparks Student Enthusiasm

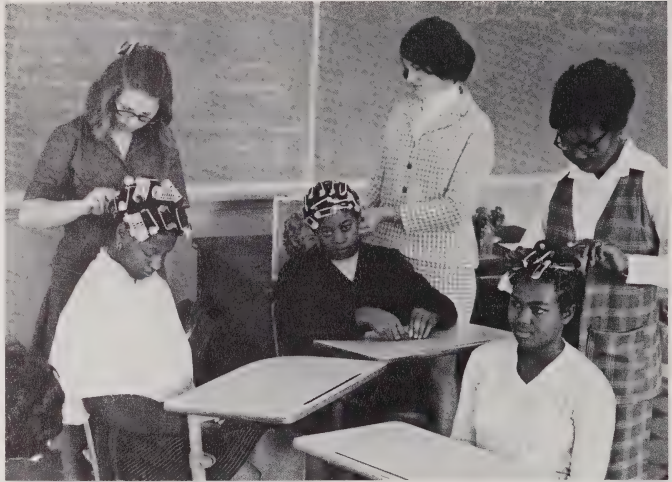

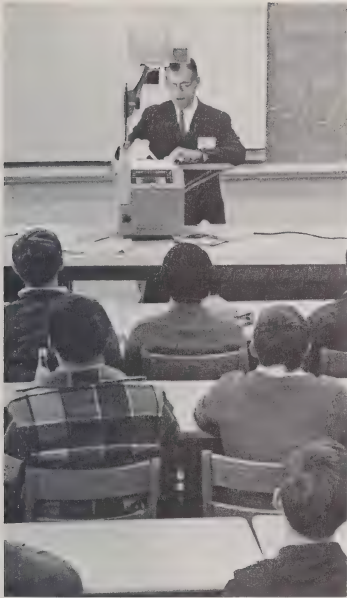

Classes, Activities, Special Events Make F.H.S. Unique



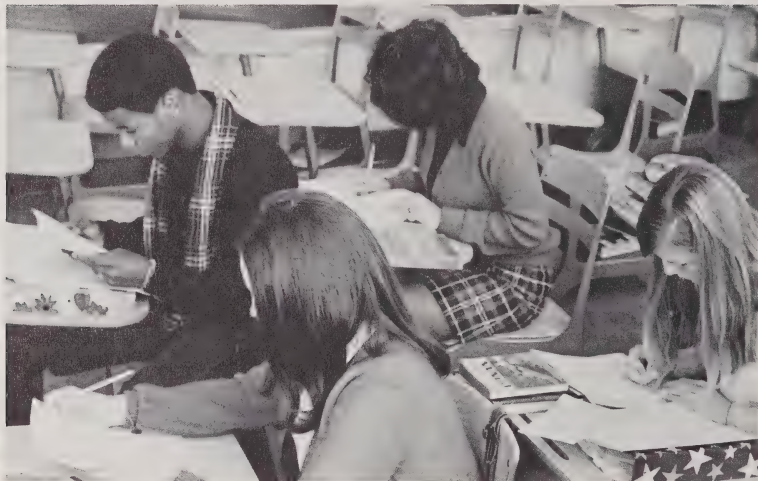

Where would the world be without love? F.H.S. just wouldn't be the same without its many couples.



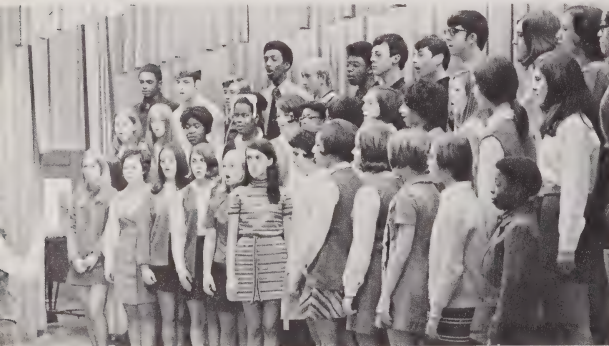

Club Activities Mold

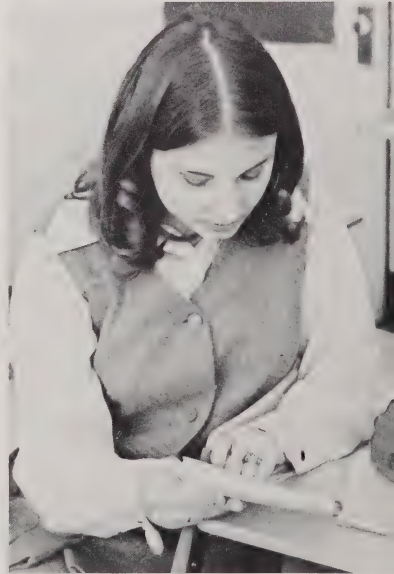

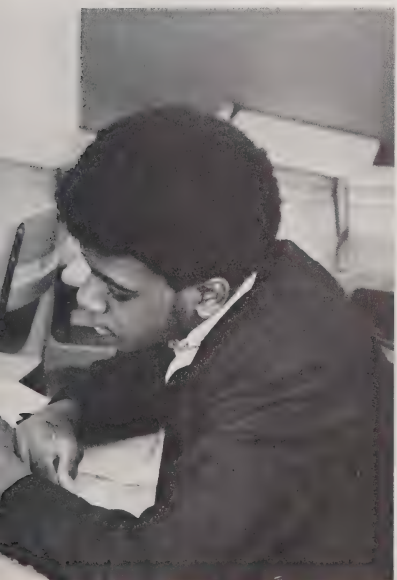

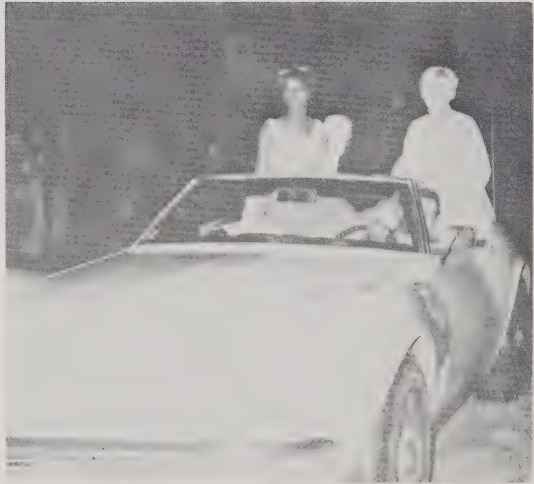

Two touchdowns and two queens were the distinguishing factors of Homecoming 1970-1971. At halftime the Rams left the field tied 6-6 with Norlina's Blue Waves. While team members listened to instructions of Coach J. C. O'Neal, fans eagerly watched the introduction of Homecoming candidates and the crowning of two queens, seniors Judy Wilson and Patricia Edgerton. Tenseness returned as 11 determined Rams strode back onto the field. The game seemed doomed to end in a tie until senior Donnie Beckham pushed through for a touchdown late in the fourth quarter, for a final score of Franklinton 12, Norlina 6.

Clashing head-on with tough conference competition, the Ram football team ended the season with four wins and six losses. For their efforts, the Rams ranked third in the Franklin Area Conference, and seven won positions on the all-conference team: co-captains David Thompson, Jerry Simmons, and Dannie Preddy; Donnie Beckham; Royal Pergerson; Ronnie Morgan; and Buck Pearce. Coaches J. C. O'Neal and Hew Dorssett agreed that the team's best performance of the season was against Littleton, a game in which the Rams' teamwork paid off for a final score of 26-8.

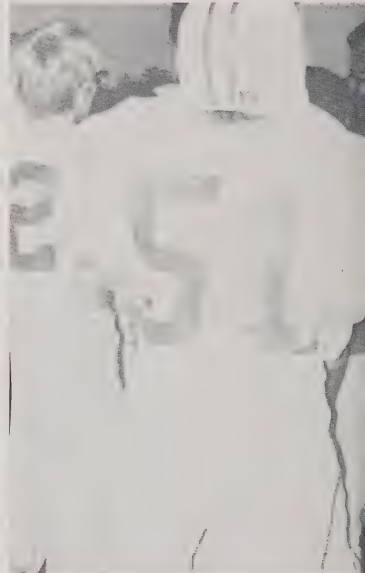

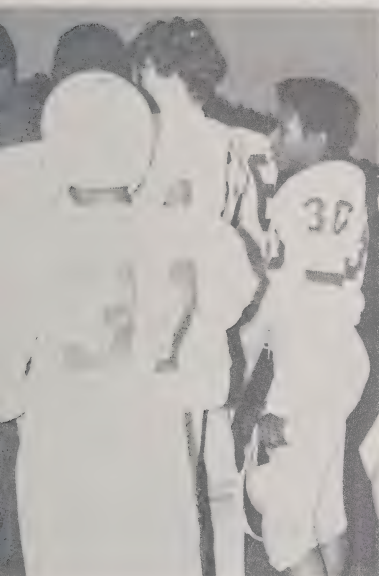

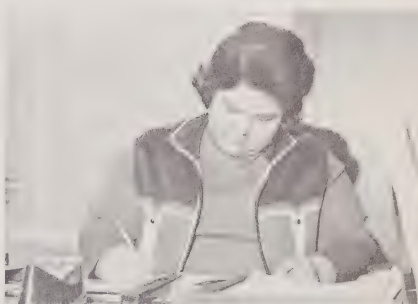


ESEA Works for Students Through School

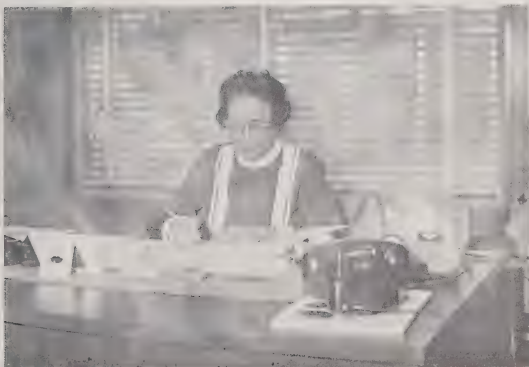


As head of the ESEA program, Mrs. Gordon directs all ordering, evaluations, and organizing of ESEA projects or equipment.
