The Library Committee therefore, have directed me to ask you what claims you have, if any, for work done by you, for the Expedition. They wish to see the publication completed, and desire information to enable them to act understandingly.

Dr. Sir,

Your letters of  
the 12th. 14th. 15th & 16th. inst. have  
all been received. I would have  
written you before, but I thought  
it would be well to wait until  
the phg. mentioned had been  
received. Immediately on the  
receipt of yours of the 12th. I wrote  
to the Express Agent, in Washington,  
and the day after received a letter  
from him, saying, that the matter  
at Cambridge had been arranged,  
which yours of the 14th. confirmed.  
On the receipt of yours of the 15th.  
I wrote again to Washington, requesting  
the Express Agent to forward the phg.  
from Cambridge, to me, at this place.  
Hearing nothing from him, on the  
21st. I telegraphed to Washington,

leaving that by the next day. I would get the phg. It did not come, however. And on the 23rd. I write again. And still no information from that quarter. I am getting quite uneasy about it. Would it be too much trouble for you to enquire if it had reached its destination in Washington.

I think there will be no difficulty in getting a few copies of the Lichen and Algoæ reports. Will you be kind enough to ascertain how many of each will be wanted, both of text & plates. I suppose, of course, they will not be bound. I take this occasion to ask you to say who will read the Lichen & Algoæ proofs. And when the proofs are to be sent. Is there to be an introduction or preface to the Lichen, additions. Is it intended to color Algoæ & Fungi. Mr. Sullivan has these plates? Neither, in the Musci. I suppose each will have an index or contents both for text and plates. And that

there will be prepared while the proof is being read. Will you be kind enough to arrange this matter? We will finish the printing of Mr. Sullivan's report this week, and on Tuesday next, if I get the phg. the printer will take hold of Mr. Tucker's report - which is the next in order, then comes the Algoæ and lastly the Fungi. I suppose Mr. Curtis will read his own proof? Is he in Billsboro N.H.

As you say, I have the M. S. of Algoæ.

Mr. Sprague will be back on Lichens shall be attended to. Shall I send you proofs of the Lichen plates when we have engraved the additions. Is it intended to color

I, yesterday, rec'd.  
a letter from the Messrs Sherman  
informing me that you had in=  
structed them to add to the Algae  
text, "the explanation of plates". Of  
which I wrote to you on the 24th  
of April last. I was under the  
impression the explanation referred  
to had been prepared for the Atlas.  
and asked you if it was not so.  
It appears you did not so intend.  
I have forwarded the "Explanation of  
plates" to Mr. Sherman who will  
set it up as you request and  
send you a proof at once. Now in  
regard to an explanation of the

plates for the Atlas. for uniformity &  
sake we will have to have one.

In your letter to me, dated 6th.  
March you provide for the  
Sistemes, and altho' is in  
keeping with the Musci. Perhaps  
the explanation of plate which you  
have instructed Mr. Sherman  
to add to the text will answer  
for the Atlas. Will it?

Although Mr. Sherman does  
not say so. I presume you have  
furnished an Index for the  
Alga report.

When I was in Phil<sup>a</sup> last, a month  
ago, Mr. Sherman had the "Fungi"  
report set up and ready to send  
to gov. I told him you would send  
Dr. Curtis the proof after you had  
overhauled it. If you think best  
you might return the first proof  
to Mr. Sherman. and request him

to send both yourself and Dr. Curtis  
a revise - An Index will, of course,  
be required. You have given me  
your views about the Atlas.

I fear Dr. Ferry is getting impatient.  
I told him when I was in New  
York, that he could receive a proof  
of his work in a few days - Nearly  
two months ago. But we can't  
help delays. I shall be glad  
to hear from you.

Nothing done in Congress yet  
about the Ex. Ex affair - I fear  
no appropriation will be made  
this year. And the Park will  
have to stop.


Dr. Secy:

Yours of Jan'y came  
duly to hand, and was immediately for-  
warded to Admiral Wilkes. I regret so much  
delay has occurred, in applying to you. But  
I suppose the work on your report, has been  
going on. There is no objection to the course  
you suggest, in regard to Dr. Gray and his  
assistant. Of course, you will be responsible.  
It is expected that the report when ready  
for the press, will be pretty much in the  
shape you originally submitted it. We  
want our activity, and the quicker the  
winter is set to work the better. Much  
of our future success, will depend upon  
present movements.

You ask whether you can get  
a few extra copies of your report when

print, for private distribution - there will  
be no difficulty about that I am quite  
sure, any number under 150 expenses you to

In regard to the plates, I am certain only
