

How to Order.—We do not send seeds, Plants or Bulbs C. O. D. Write your Name, Post Office, State and your Express Office plainly with black ink, on every order and every time you write to us. Give plain shipping directions; where none are given we use our best judgment, but it must beat your expense and risk.

Prepaid.—Prices given in this catalogue usually include prepayment by mail on Bulbs and Plants (not tools, unless so marked) excep where offered "by express," or marked otherwise then the purchaser is to pay charges.

Remember, sometimes in the busiest season others may have orders ahead of you, which must be filled in rotation. Order early.

Cost of Remitting.—Our customers may select additional bulbs free, with every order of \$1.00 or more, to the amount of the cost of the money order, registered letter, or other remittance.

Very Important.—You can greatly aid us by using Order Sheet, as follows:

1. Place the quantity wanted before each article.

2. Use one line for each kind ordered.

3. As nearly as possible make out your list in the same order in which the goods are catalogued, beginning at the front.

Prompt Delivery.—If goods are not received in a reasonable time, send exact copy of order, date sent, stating amount of enclosure, kind of remittance (draft or money order) and the same will be investigated.

How to Pay.—Send cash with order (as we do not open book accounts for small amounts, and can only set do value of money received) by New York or Chicago Draft, Registered Letter, Money Order, Express Order in any of these ways at our risk. Postage stamps in small amounts are taken as Cash, but they must be sent so they will not stick together. Registered letters are generally very safe and you can send that way from any postoffice and get our receipt by return mail. Postal Notes are not safe.

Errors.—If stock is not as expected, compare with order, read catalogue rules carefully and if we are in the wrong write us at once, giving all particulars as in paragraph above, but do not complain to others until we have had a chance.



By planting early, flowers may be had at Christmas or sooner: a succession can be kept up by potting bulbs at intervals. When the bulbs are planted, set away in a cellar or other cool location until vigorous root growth has been made. Three bulbs can be planted in a 5 inch pot. Most bulbs throw up from 3 to 5 spikes of bloom, which do not all come to perfection at the same time, thus prolonging the flowering season. We import Roman Hyacinths in immense quantities from the South of France, which enables us to supply the very best bulbs. The flowers are dainty, graceful and delightfully fragrant.


### GRAPE HYACINTH.

THE TULIP, for its gorgeous colors, its pretty cup-like shape and its early flowering, is one of the oldest Spring favorites; planted in beds or borders, it is unrivaled for brilliant effect. As with most flowers, single varieties succeed better than double when forced; for this purpose they should be planted as early as possible; they need not be buried in ashes or earth like the Hyacinth, but should be kept in a cool, dark place until well started, after which the same treatment applies to both. The single dwarf Duc Van Thol varieties are especially adapted to forcing, and can be brought into bloom by January 1. For outdoor planting, bulbs should be selected which will bloom about the same time, and as with the Hyacinth, they will be more effective if massed in contrasting colors.
