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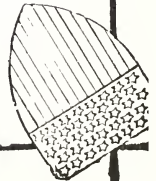
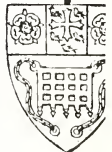

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## PREFACE.

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This volume needs very few words of introduction from me, but I may perhaps be permitted to enumerate some of the valuable genealogical facts which are recorded in its pages. Mr. G. W. Watson has appropriately followed up his learned article on "The Families of Lacy, Geneva, Joinville and La Marche," which appeared in last year's volume, by a paper on the foreign branch of the great house of Mortimer settled at Poitou and Saintonge. Their lordship of Couhé in Poitou has, as Mr. Watson points out, been persistently corrupted by Dugdale and later English writers into "Cowyth," "Cowich," and in Burke's "Extinct Peerage" even into "Towyth."

Mr. G. J. Turner's article on Richard Fitzroy may, without exaggeration, be characterized as one of the most important that has been published in THE GENEALOGIST during recent years. It gives for the first time the marriage of the Countess of Angus to Richard Fitzroy's son Richard de Dover, and also shows that Isabel Countess of Atholl, whose tomb is so well known to visitors to the crypt of Canterbury Cathedral, was granddaughter, not daughter, of Richard Fitzroy, being the daughter of the above mentioned Richard de Dover and the Countess of Angus. The daughters of Richard Fitzroy, who have hitherto been confused or omitted, are proved by records to have been Isabel, wife of Maurice de Berkeley, and Lauretta, wife of William Marmion.

The collection of Pedigrees from the De Baneu Rolls *temp.* Henry VII commenced in this volume, referring as it



does not merely to a single locality but of interest to all genealogists alike, is a most welcome contribution to our columns, and the thanks of the Subscribers are due to Mr. H. J. T. Wood for the great labour and pains which he has expended upon his task.

Our established reputation for fearless criticism of inaccurate works on the subject of genealogy is well maintained by Mr. C. Poyntz Stewart's review on "The Red and White Book of Menzies." Major Poynton's paper on "The Pedigree of Ringesdune and the Manor of Blaysworth" calls attention to some errors in the recently published "Victoria History of the County of Bedford."

The Diary of Christopher Sanderson of Eggleston, which, though alluded to and partially incorporated by Hunter in his "Familie Minorum Gentium," has never before been printed, will, with its curious details of family life, greatly amuse our readers.

I feel sure that all the Subscribers will agree with me that no more suitable frontispiece could have been chosen than the portrait of Dr. Marshall, the founder of the original series of this Magazine, which by the kindness of his son, Mr. Isaac Marshall, and by permission of Messrs. Maull and Fox of Piccadilly, we have been able to produce. Dr. Marshall's loss has been sincerely deplored not only by all his personal friends, but also by innumerable readers of his most useful books, both in this country and America. The memoir of him which appears in this volume is from the pen of one of his intimate friends, and has been recognized as the most faithful and accurate obituary of Dr. Marshall which has been published.

# The Genealogist.

## GEOFFREY DE MORTEMER AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

BY G. W. WATSON.

The third son of Roger de Mortimer,<sup>1</sup> first Earl of March, by his wife, Jane de Joinville, was named Geoffrey. He was knighted at the coronation of Edward III, 1 Feb. 1326/7 (A. Murimuth, *Chron.*, edit. E. M. Thompson, 51), and in 1330 received large grants of manors in divers counties, late the property of Edmund, Earl of Kent, attainted.<sup>2</sup> The History of the Abbey of Wigmore (*New Monasticon*, vi, 352) calls him *comitem Juhmensem et dominum de Cowyth*. He was taken prisoner with his brother Edmund at Nottingham, 20 Oct. 1330, and sent to London (H. Knighton, *Chron.*, edit. J. R. Lumby, i, 453; T. Walsingham, *Hist.*, edit. H. T. Riley, i, 193). These particulars were collected by Dugdale

<sup>1</sup> The correct spelling is Mortemer, the name being derived from the castle of Mortemer-en-Bray in the extreme East of Normandy. Mr. Stapleton (*Rot. Scacc. Norm.*) always employed this spelling; but the form "Mortimer" occurs at an early date on this side of the Channel. There is a place called Mortemer in Poitou (near Lussac-le-Château, Vienne), which is in no way connected with the family. It belonged in the earlier part of the fourteenth century to Guy Sénéchal, who was occasionally called De Mortemer, and has therefore sometimes been confused with the Mortemers of Conhé. There is also a Mortemart in La Marche (possessed for many centuries by the House of La Rochechouart), owing to the existence of which French authors frequently write the name Mortemer wrongly, "Mortemart."

(*Baronage*, i, 117), who is silent as to Geoffrey's subsequent history.<sup>3</sup> Later writers have not added to his remarks,<sup>4</sup> beyond changing *Jubmensem* to Jubien,<sup>5</sup> and *Coweyth* to Cowich, or (Burke, *Extinct Peerage*, 384) to Towyth. This latter alteration—or misprint—is not a fortunate one, for, as it is evident from the notice of Jane de la Marche, grandmother of Geoffrey, in the preceding volume of *The Genealogist*, p. 212, the place indicated is really Couhé (*Cohée*) in Poitou. It is proposed to give here an account of Geoffrey de Mortemer and his descendants, the Mortemers of Poitou and Saintonge.

The task is not easy, for no genealogy of the family has hitherto been printed. They are not mentioned in the first edition of Beauchet-Filleau's *Familles de l'ancien Poitou*, 1840-54, and the second—and much more elaborate—edition of that work is still in progress, and has at present only arrived at the letter G. In the *Notes sur Couhé*, 1869, by A. F. Lièvre, there is a list, for it is nothing more, of some of the seigneurs of Couhé. P. de Lacroix (*Chron. de l'Angoumois occidental*, 1876, 200-208, 273-274), and B. de Cugnac in an article on Ozillac (*Archives hist. de la Saintonge*, xx, 1892, 90-93), give a few (very inaccurate) particulars of the Mortemers. The MSS. of Dom Fonteneau, in the Library at Poitiers (tom. xlvi, 301-311), furnish a meagre pedigree, destitute of any proofs, founded on the MSS. of MM. de Ste. Marthe and M. du Pourny in the *Bibliothèque du Roy*, the account of the later generations, the Mortemers of Ozillac, being more complete, and derived from the MSS. de Gaignières, no. 678, pp. 465-485.<sup>6</sup> Dom Fonteneau's extracts (tom. lxxxi) from the cartulary of the Abbey of Valence contain many notices of the successive seigneurs of the neighbouring châtellenie of Couhé.<sup>7</sup> In the following account these MSS. have been made use of, with the addition of information obtained from printed sources and from original records in the *Archives Nationales* and elsewhere.

I. GEOFFREY DE MORTEMER, Seigneur de Couhé, Peyrat,<sup>8</sup> Pontarion, Salles, and Genté. His grandmother, Jane de Lusignan or de la Marche, Dame de Couhé and Peyrat, by her will dated . . . 1321,<sup>9</sup> made him her universal heir. She died between Aug. 1322 and 11 Sep. 1323.<sup>10</sup> In 1312, 21 July, the French King commanded the Seneschal of Poitou or his lieutenant to hear the action brought by Peter Cherchemont, knight, against Geoffrey de Mortemer, Seigneur de *Cohec*, and others, although, by a royal letter of 19 April preceding, the parties had been summoned to appear at the Parliament of Paris.<sup>11</sup> The clause in the grant of Couhé to Jane de la Marche, dated 22 Feb. 1309/10, —*tenebant eodem Johanna et ejus successores ab eodem domino Rege et a suis successoribus predicta Castra Castellanus et Villas [de Cohec et de Peyrat] ad unam fidelitatem et unicuique homagium duntaxat*<sup>12</sup>—had afforded her and her grandson a pretext to omit the homage due for that seigneurie to the Abbey of St. Maixent. But by *arrêt du Parlement*, 20 May 1349, stating that, at the death of Guy de la Marche, *Cohec* had been given to Jane, niece (*nepti*) of Guy, and grandmother (*avia*) of Geoffrey de Mortemer, it was decided that Geoffrey owed homage to the Abbey of St. Maixent for the castle of *Cohec*,<sup>13</sup> and, 10 July 1350, the King ordered the Seneschal of Poitou to make Geoffrey pay to the monks of this Abbey the sum of £365 15s. *parisis* which he owed them, in consequence of the above decision, for their expenses in the case.<sup>14</sup> 18 Apr. 1354, the Parliament sent to the seneschal's court at Saintes a cause between Geoffrey and the monks of St. Maixent, the latter claiming that a transfer had been made to them by John Boulateau of the *herbergementum* of La Ronze.<sup>15</sup> In 1363 and 1364, the feudatories of Poitou and Aquitaine did homage for their fiefs to Edward, Prince of Aquitaine and Wales. The homage of Geoffrey de Mortemer, as *seigneur de cok baron pour les terres quil tient en la chastellenie de comphar [Cognac] et de boteville*, was made in the Cathedral Church of Saintes, 24 Aug., and, as *seigneur de cok*, in the Cathedral Church of Poitiers, 13 Sep., 1363 (*Chapter House, Books*, no. 188, pp. 109,

102, no. 189, pp. 27, 30). In 1363, 15 Dec., William de Vezançay, Abbot of St. Maixent, who had made homage at St. Maixent, 13 Sep. (*Ibid.*, no. 188, p. 103, no. 189, p. 31), rendered *aveu* for his temporalities, including Couhé.<sup>16</sup> 24 March 1361/5, Geoffrey de Mortemer sold his castles, towns, and châtelennies of Peyrat and Pontarion to Guy Aubert,<sup>17</sup> Seigneur de Bulbon, for £26,400 of money current in the principality of Aquitaine.<sup>18</sup> 16 Oct. 1367, he rendered *aveu* to Edward, Prince of Wales, for his seigneuries of Salles and Genté, held of the châtelennies of Cognac

Et nobilis vir Gaubertus de Sancto Exuperio domicellus procurator et nomine procuratoris nobilis et potentis viri Guidonis Alberti domicelli domini de Bulbone diocesis Aveniouensis . . ." The said Geoffrey, with the consent of Prince Edward, sold his castles, towns, and châtelennies of Peyrat and Pontarion to Guy Aubert "in et pro pretio et nomine pretii videlicet vigenti viginti sex millia et quadringentarum librarum monete hodie currentis in principatu Aquitanie expensis omnibus ratione dicti contractus factis in eadem sonna computatis et inclusis," the sale to be ratified and confirmed by "nobilis et potens domina Joanna de Lazaco uxor dicti domini Gaufridi ac mater dicti Joannis ipsiusque domini Gaufridi et ejusdem domine Joanne filio eorumque mariti . . . Acta fuerunt hec predicta in capella episcopali hora prime vel circa die decima quarta mensis Martii Indictione tertia pontificatus sanctissimi in Christo patris et domini domini Urbani divina providentia Pape quinti anno tertio . . . anno Incarnationis domini millesimo trecentesimo sexagesimo quarto" (Édit. *Bulletin de la Soc. archéol. et hist. du Limousin*, xlv, 1897, 158-500, from an official copy made 12 Apr 1704. and Merpins.<sup>19</sup> He died between 1372 and 5 May 1376. By his wife, Jane de Lezay,<sup>20</sup> he had a son, John, his successor, and some daughters, one of whom, Jane, married John, Seigneur de l'Île Bouchard in Touraine.<sup>21</sup>

II. JOHN DE MORTEMER I, Seigneur de Couhé, du Plessis-Sénéchal, de Salles and Genté. Hugh X, Count of La Marche, in founding the Abbey of Valence, 6 Aug. 1230,<sup>22</sup> gave it an annual rent of 240 *preventiers* of corn, levied on the neighbouring chàtellenie of Couhé. The Abbot and monks sued John de Mortemer for the arrears of this rent, 1640 *preventiers*. John pleaded that he had obtained only a small part of his revenues *pour les guerres et stérilités qui ont esté* and for other reasons. 5 May 1376, a compromise was made, by which he agreed to pay 800 *preventiers* of the arrears by instalments.<sup>23</sup> He rendered *aveu* for Couhé to the castle of Lusignan, 18 May 1407.<sup>24</sup> He married, before 1369, Indie, daughter of Bernard-Jourdain IV, Baron de l'Isle-Jourdain, by his third wife, Selille, daughter of Arnaud de Durfort.<sup>25</sup> She was born in 1340 or 1341.<sup>26</sup> She and her husband prosecuted, 10 May 1398, Peter de Bretefort, who had detained certain sums of money belonging to her.<sup>27</sup> She was dead before 28 Dec. 1408, when the proxy of John de Mortemer, Seigneur de Couhé, and of John de Mortemer, his son, acknowledged the receipt from Louis, Duke of Bourbonnais, and John, Count of Clermont, his son, of 500 *écus d'or* on account of the sum of 1000 *écus d'or* due to Indie de l'Isle, according to an agreement made with her mother and John-Jourdain, Count of l'Isle.<sup>27</sup>

III. JOHN DE MORTEMER II, Seigneur de Couhé, du Plessis-Sénéchal, de Salles and Genté. He rendered *aveu* for Salles and Genté to Charles, Duke of Orléans, 8 Nov. 1410,<sup>28</sup> and occurs as seigneur of Couhé, 20 Nov. 1409,<sup>29</sup> 6 June 1410,<sup>30</sup> 1 Jan. 1410/1, 17 July 1418, and 8 Feb. 1421/2.<sup>31</sup> Some of the earlier of these notices may refer to his father, the date of whose death does not appear. A dispute again arose between the monks of Valence and the seigneur of Couhé, concerning the rent in corn, before mentioned, which the monks said had been given them by Hugh [X] Count of La Marche, and acknowledged to be due to them by Jane de la Marche, Dame de Couhé, and which they had enjoyed in her lifetime, and *apres ladite dame de feu noble homme messire Geoffroi de Mortemer yeul dudit messire Jean de Mortemer lequel en son vivant fut seigneur et tient ladite terre de Coue et apres son trepassement de feu messire Jean de Mortemer son fils pere du deffendeur et aussi dudit deffendeur apres le trepassement de son dit pere*, and they claimed this rent and the arrears.<sup>32</sup> By deeds dated 24 June 1422<sup>33</sup> and 23 Jan. 1422/3<sup>34</sup> John de Mortemer agreed to give the monks certain tithes, paying only 100 *prevendiers* of rent for the future. Some months later, Monday, 20 Dec. 1423, the monks prosecuted him and Briant Meschin, his captain of Couhé, stating that he had committed sundry excesses against their goods and persons, having seized three oxen and a horse belonging to the Abbey, refusing to restore them without payment: and in Dec. 1423 having met the Abbot, who had been on his way to ask on his knees that the ill-treatment should cease, he had struck him on the head with a sword. Two *arrêts*, dated 3 and 25 Jan. 1423/4, followed, and both the accused regained their liberty.<sup>35</sup> After many years the quarrel broke out afresh, the monks saying they had received nothing since the agreement of 23 Jan. 1422/3, and they claimed, moreover, *moyenne et basse justice* and other seignorial rights which, they affirmed, belonged to them in the chàtellenie of Couhé. The affair was terminated by an agreement, dated 19 March 1413/4,<sup>36</sup> John de Mortemer conceding to the monks most of their claims.<sup>37</sup> He had a dispute with the town

of Poitiers in 1444.<sup>34</sup> In June 1451, as *Jehan de Mortemer seigneur de Couhe et du Plesseis Seneschal en la chastellenie de Lezigneu*, he received from the King *congie licence et auctorite de fortifier et emparrer ladite maison et place du Plesseis Seneschal*.<sup>35</sup> He occurs many times in the cartulary of Valence after 1422 as seigneur of Couhé,<sup>36</sup> the last notice being 10 Apr. 1454.<sup>37</sup> He died before 10 Feb. 1451/5. He married, firstly, before 13 Jan. 1402/3,<sup>37</sup> Perronelle de Parthenay, daughter of Louis l'Archevêque, Seigneur de Taillebourg, by his second wife, Jane, daughter of Peter de Beaumont, Seigneur du Bois-Charruyau.<sup>38</sup> She was living 30 June 1415,<sup>39</sup> and died before 6 March 1422/3.<sup>40</sup> In 1416, many years after her death, her husband received the third part of the land of Soubise, in succession to her brother, John l'Archevêque, who died s.p.<sup>41</sup> She had an only child:—

IV a. JANE DE MORTEMER.<sup>42</sup> She married firstly, 1123 or 1124, Robert le Maçon, Seigneur de Trèves in Anjou, sometime Master of

Requests and afterwards Chancellor of France,<sup>43</sup> to whom she was second wife. He made his last will 2 June 1440, died s.p. 2 [not 28] Jan. 1442/3, and was buried in the parish church of Trèves.<sup>44</sup> She married, secondly, before 19 March 1443/4,<sup>45</sup> Guy d'Aussigny, or Auxigny, knight, Chamberlain to the King, and, 20 July 1445, his Lieutenant in Poitou, Saintonge, Rochelle, and Angoumois.<sup>46</sup> She was living his wife in 1454.<sup>47</sup>

John de Mortemer II married, secondly, by contract dated 3 Feb. 1437/8, Philippe, daughter of Guy de la Rochefoucauld, Seigneur de Verteuil and Barbesieux, by his third wife, Jane de Rougemont, Dame de Château-Guilbert.<sup>48</sup> 10 Feb. 1451/5, being then his widow, she rendered *aveu* for Salles and Genté.<sup>49</sup> She was still guardian of her infant children 2 Feb. 1459/60,<sup>50</sup> but in 1461, 15 Dec., the guardianship had devolved<sup>51</sup> on her brother *Guy de la Roche, chevalier, Seigneur de Verteuil et de Montendre*.<sup>52</sup> She had three children:—

IV b. PHILIP DE MORTEMER. He appears as seigneur of Couhé from 12 Feb. 1466/7 to 15 June 1484.<sup>51</sup> He did homage for Salles and Genté to the Count of Angoulême, 6 June 1469,<sup>52</sup> and rendered *aveu* for Le Plessis-Sénéchal to the seigneurie of Lusignan, 13 Oct. 1478.<sup>53</sup> The four barons of Poitou, the seigneurs of Lusignan, Parthenay, Châtellerault, and Couhé, were each entitled to an honorary canonry in the Church of St. Hilaire at Poitiers, and had to furnish a cope on being installed. Philip de Mortemer was admitted 13 Jan. 1478/9.<sup>53</sup> Four years after, as he had deferred payment, on 3 June 1483 the chapter deputed two of their number *adire locum de Cohiaco erga dominum temporalem dicti loci pro ei loquendo de quadam capta quam alias et die qua fuit receptus in canonicum presentis ecclesie ut unus baronum de Pictavia promisit dare dicte ecclesie.*<sup>54</sup> In Nov. 1480, there was a suit between the mayor and échevins of Poitiers and the seigneur of Couhé, *requerant estre receu a faire exposition du lieu de la Pourrest.*<sup>55</sup> Philip de Mortemer married, before 1482, Guyonne, daughter of John de Pérusse, Seigneur de la Roche-de-Bors,<sup>56</sup> and died s.p.

IV c. JOHN DE MORTEMER III, Seigneur de la Faye and du Plessis-Sénéchal. He did homage for Salles and Genté to the Count of Angoulême, 20 Sep. 1475,<sup>51</sup> and rendered *aveu* for Le

Plessis-Sénéchal to the seigneurie of Lusignan, 15 May 1479 and 8 Dec. 1483.<sup>57</sup> He was living in 1502.<sup>9</sup> He married Rosine de Pérusse,<sup>58</sup> by whom he was father of:—

V a. JACQUES DE MORTEMER, Seigneur de Couhé, in which quality he appears 24 May and 9 June 1509.<sup>59</sup> He died s.p.

V b. ANNE DE MORTEMER. She married, by contract dated at Couhé, 12 Oct. 1490, Guichard de Saint George, Seigneur de Vérac, Boissec, and Pannœuvre.<sup>58</sup> She was living in 1542,<sup>10</sup> and was buried at Couhé.<sup>9</sup> Her eldest son, Gabriel,<sup>60</sup> was seigneur of Le Plessis-Sénéchal,<sup>61</sup> and of Couhé *en partie*.

V c. MARGARET DE MORTEMER. She married Gabriel de Saint George, Seigneur de Fraïsse, Périssé, and Vauzelles.<sup>58</sup> Her will was dated 5 Jan. 1524 [1524/5], she being then a widow.<sup>24</sup>

V d. MARY DE MORTEMER, who was, 17 July 1498, wife of Louis de Roullignac, Seigneur de Gourville,<sup>62</sup> was perhaps a daughter of John III.

IV *d.* GUY DE MORTEMER, Seigneur de Salles and Genté, Villeman, Gensac, Roissac, and Marville.<sup>63</sup> He rendered *aveu* for Salles and Genté to the Count of Angoulême 20 Sep. 1487,<sup>64</sup> and for Ozillac to the castle of Saintes in 1495.<sup>65</sup> He occurs in 1495,<sup>66</sup> 1502,<sup>67</sup> and 1509,<sup>68</sup> and died before 18 Feb. 1511/2. He married Frances, Dame d'Ozillac, only child of Antony Bouchard d'Aubeterre, Seigneur d'Ozillac in Saintonge, by Helen, daughter of Jacques du Puy-du-Fou.<sup>68</sup> She, who rendered *aveu* for Ozillac, 18 Feb. 1511/2,<sup>69</sup> made her will at that place 11 Apr. 1532, desiring to be buried in the Church of Ozillac with her ancestors.<sup>70</sup> She died before 20 Dec. 1532. They had seven children:—

V *e.* FRANCIS DE MORTEMER, of whom subsequently.

V *f.* GUY DE MORTEMER. He died before 11 Apr. 1532, probably unmarried. He had an illegitimate daughter, Mathurine de Mortemer, to whom his mother left a legacy of £500 *tournois*.<sup>70</sup>

V *g.* CHARLES DE MORTEMER. His mother, styling him *religieux de l'ordre de St. Benoist et prieur d'Ozillac*, left him the usufruct of the lands which she had acquired at Couhé, the same to revert at his death to his eldest brother, Francis.<sup>70</sup> In the marriage contract, dated 21 Feb. 1569, of his grand-nephew Francis de Reillac, he is called *haut et puissant Charles de Mortemer son oncle seigneur de Villemont et de Chaupaignac*.

Vh. CATHERINE DE MORTEMER. She married, firstly, by contract dated 11 May 1502, Gaillard de l'Isle, Seigneur de la Rivière.<sup>71</sup> She married, secondly, by contract dated . . . 1511,<sup>65</sup> Claude, called Clinet, de Lanes, Seigneur de la Roche-Chalais. She died before 11 Apr. 1532, having had two children by her first and six by her second husband, all of whom are mentioned in the will of Frances d'Aubeterre, their grandmother, who left them—beyond their mother's dot of £3,000 *tournois* or more—all that the testator had acquired at Libourne and elsewhere from Jane George, widow of Bertrand de la Chassaigne (*de Cussaignes*), councillor to the parliament of Bordeaux.<sup>70</sup>

Vi. GUYONNE DE MORTEMER. She married John Poussard, Seigneur de Vaneau and du Haut-Vandré, who died before 6 Nov. 1530.<sup>72</sup> Her mother in 1532 revoked the donation of Courcoury in Saintonge, one of her purchases, which she had made her in a former testament, *a cause que ladite Guyonne depuis ladite donation avoit fait faire de fausses clefs a ses coffres et avoit pris son argent*, and she gave this seigneurie to Jacquette de Mortemer her granddaughter, but nevertheless added £2,000 *tournois* to the 1,000 which Guyonne had had in dot.<sup>70</sup>

Vj. JANE DE MORTEMER. She married Gabriel de Gain, Seigneur d'Oradour. Her mother's will added £2,000 *tournois* to the 3,000 or more which she had had in dot.<sup>70</sup>

Vk. JACQUETTE DE MORTEMER. She married, by contract dated at Ozillac, 18 June 1533, John de Mareuil, Baron de Montmoreau.<sup>73</sup> According to her mother's will she had received a dot of £10,000 *tournois*.<sup>70</sup>

Ve. FRANCIS DE MORTEMER, Seigneur d'Ozillac, de Coulé *en partie*, de Villeman, Salles, Genté, Roissac, Gensac, and Marville. He did homage 17 Jan. 1513 I, and rendered *aveu* 1 Feb. 1513, 4, for Salles and Genté.<sup>74</sup> In July 1521, being styled *François de Mortemer, seigneur de Vilemans*, he was summoned to an assembly

at Bordeaux, as guardian of the children of the late Gaillard de l'Isle, Seigneur de la Rivière.<sup>75</sup> 22 Nov. 1529 he did homage, and, 31 Dec. 1529, rendered *aveu*, for Salles and Genté.<sup>76</sup> As *seigneur d'Ozillac*, he did homage to the King, by proxy, for that castle, 20 Dec. 1532.<sup>77</sup> He occurs as seigneur of Couhé 26 Feb. 1535/6 and 24 May 1538,<sup>78</sup> and held the ban of Saintonge 30 May 1536.<sup>78</sup> He rendered *aveu*, 18 Dec. 1548, and did homage by proxy, 20 Feb. 1548/9, for Ozillac.<sup>79</sup> Rendered *aveu* for Salles and Genté,<sup>80</sup> and also for Roissac, Gensac, Masdorel, and Marville, 15 Feb. 1556/7.<sup>81</sup> He was still living 15 Apr. 1559.<sup>78</sup> He married, by contract dated 27 Apr. 1515,<sup>82</sup> Frances, daughter of Odet d'Aydie, Seigneur de Riberae in Périgord, sometime Seneschal of Carcassonne, by Anne, daughter of Guy, Seigneur de Pons in Saintonge, Vicomte de Turenne. She had £11,000 [*alias* £8,000] *tournois* in dot. Her mother-in-law left her the seigneuries of Pérignac and Echebrunes, which she had bought from the late Francis, Seigneur de Pons, and Catherine de Ferrières, his wife, and also £60 *tournois* of rent in the seigneurie of Touverac (*Thoinoirac*), which she had acquired from Artus Goulard, Seigneur de Barges (*Garges*).<sup>79</sup> She was living 30 Apr. 1540.<sup>83</sup> Francis de Mortemer had by her two daughters only, his coheirs:—

VI a. ANNE DE MORTEMER, Dame d'Ozillac, de Couhé *en partie*, and de Villeman. Her grandmother, Frances d'Aubeterre, left her the

seigneurie of Cosnac.<sup>70</sup> She married, by contract dated . . . 1540, Francis de Reilhac, Vicomte de (Méréville or Mérinville) in Beauce, Seigneur de Brigueil in Poitou.<sup>81</sup> Her will was dated 18 May 1543, to be buried in the Church of Brigueil.<sup>82</sup> Her husband made his will 2 Dec. 1560, being then on a sick bed at Ozillac, and chose his sepulture in the seigneurial vault in the Church of Ozillac.<sup>83</sup> He died shortly afterwards,<sup>84</sup> leaving four children:—(1). John de Reilhac, Vicomte de Méréville, Seigneur de Brigueil, Ozillac, and Villeman. He did homage to the King 6 June 1561 for Méréville, and 17 Nov. 1561 for Brigueil. He married, by contract dated 6 May 1562, Catherine, Dame du Bourg-Archambault, daughter of Mark de Mallesec (or Malleset), Vicomte de la Mothe-au-Groing in Limousin, by Catherine de Gazette.<sup>85</sup> He was mortally wounded at the Battle of St. Denis 10 Nov. 1567, and expired at the house of a bourgeoisie in the Rue St. Denis,<sup>86</sup> s.p. His widow married, by contract dated 16 March 1572,<sup>87</sup> Antony des Monstiers, Seigneur de Roches, who was assassinated a few months afterwards. She married, thirdly, by contract dated 27 March 1574,<sup>88</sup> Francis Pepin, Seigneur de la

Ruelle. Her will was dated 15 Jan. 1580.<sup>92</sup> (2). Francis de Reilhac, Seigneur de Brigueil and Ozillac, who married, by contract dated 21 Feb. 1569,<sup>93</sup> Bonaventure, daughter of Antony de Sainte Maure, Seigneur de Mosnac, by Mary, daughter of Nicholas Arnoul, Seigneur de Chantillac.<sup>94</sup> Her dot was £25,000 *tournois*. He made his will at the castle of Monterollet, 10 June 1572,<sup>95</sup> and another, at Brigueil, 7 Feb. 1581,<sup>96</sup> and died s.p. 5 Apr. 1582.<sup>97</sup> His widow married Peter de la Boissière, Seigneur de Rochebrune, and died s.p. Her first husband had left her Ozillac, which she bequeathed to her brother, Geoffrey de Sainte Maure, ancestor of the Marquises of Ozillac. (3). Jacqueline de Reilhac, Dame de Brigueil, who married, by contract dated 20 Feb. 1561/2, Louis de Crevant, Seigneur de Cingé and Azy-le-Feron in Touraine.<sup>98</sup> Her dot was £25,000 *tournois*. She died before 11 Aug. 1597, her husband being then living.<sup>99</sup> (4). Frances de Reilhac, Dame de Méréville, who married, by contract dated at the castle of Monterollet, 1 May 1566,<sup>100</sup> Eusèbe des Monstiers, Seigneur du Fraisse and de Rochelidoux (who died at Le Fraisse in Dec. 1600, aged 52<sup>101</sup>), ancestor of the present Marquis des Monstiers Méruville. VI b. JACQUETTE DE MORTEMER, Dame de Salles, Genté, Roissac, Gensac, and Marville. She married, by contract dated 8 Feb. 1534/5, Louis de la Rochefoucauld,<sup>102</sup> Seigneur de Montendre and Montguyon. He had eight children, of whom were Francis, ancestor of the Marquises of Montendre and of Surgères, Gaston, Seigneur de Salles and Genté, and Louis, Seigneur de Roissac, Gensac, and Marville.<sup>103</sup>

#### ARMS OF MORTEMER.

The arms of the Mortemers of Couhé were the well known arms of the English Mortimers, the escutcheon Argent being charged with a bendlet Gules. These arms, cut in stone, still exist in the castle of Couhé.<sup>10</sup> The tinctures are given by the Herald Berry, in his *Armorial*, compiled about 1455.<sup>104</sup> The arms of the Mortemers of Ozillac, as depicted in a window of the Church of that place, are the same, except that the escutcheon is Azure, charged with a bendlet Argent.<sup>105</sup>

THE DIARY AND PEDIGREE OF CHRISTOPHER  
SANDERSON, OF EGGLESTON.

Some time ago, while constructing the Pedigree of Sanderson, of Hutton in the Forest and Dalston, co. Cumberland, the above Diary and the earlier Sanderson wills at Durham fell into my hands, enabling me to enlarge the Pedigree of Sanderson, of Eggleston, printed in Hunter's "Familie"; the result will be found in the Pedigree annexed and such extracts from the Diary as are genealogical or characteristic are given below.

It will be seen that Bartholomew Sanderson, of Kirkby Stephen, appended to his will an armorial seal:—*Paly of six [Argent and Azure] on a bend [Sable] a sword [Argent, pommelled Or]*. In the Visitation of Durham 1666, in the College of Arms (C 41, folio 17 b), giving the pedigree of Sanderson, of Hedley Hope, there is a memorandum:—"This sword upon the bend was granted to Henry Sanderson, Esq<sup>r</sup>., Constable of the King's Castle of Brancepeth, as an augmentation to his coate by Will<sup>m</sup> Segar, Garter, and Richard St. George, Esq<sup>r</sup>., Norroy, 27 Feb., 1<sup>o</sup> Jac., 1603," and in the same Visitation (C 41, folio 3 b), the Sandersons, of Eggleston, were disallowed this coat:—"This coate was granted by S<sup>r</sup> W<sup>m</sup> Segar, Kn<sup>t</sup>., and Richard St. George, Esq<sup>r</sup>., to Henry Sanderson, of Brancepeth. Therefore this family can have no right thereto."

In addition to the extracts here quoted, the Diarist makes copious notes as to the weather, prices of produce, harvests, floods, droughts, wrecks, fights with the Dutch, dreams, comets, eclipses and controversial religious matters.

The book is crown 8vo, half bound calf. Marginal figures represent the page in the Diary.

The first entry is on the fly leaf:—

"It is to be remembered that my somme[s] Cutlib: & Philip begunne to learne with the Usher July the 12th 1682."

[Then follow miscellaneous entries, a piece of poetry, notes as to freemen (of what town not stated), weights and measures, etc.]

1. "Memorandum that I was married the 4th day of March 1610 to Chris Thursby."

2. "My father Sand'son departed this life upon Munday ye 22th of Feb. 1657 about 8 in the morninge and was buryed under that side of the great marble stone that Joynes of Mr. Bowes pue upon the right hand as y<sup>e</sup> goe up into the quire."

2. "My somme Philip Sand'son departed this life upon Wednesday ye 11<sup>o</sup> of June 1684 . . . and was buryed upon the Friday following."

3. "My somme Cutlibert Borne at Woolhouse 6th of December Beeinge Munday 1644 . . . Christened the Sabbath day after by Mr. Giles Foster my Cossen Ambrose Appleby beeing one of his god-



fathers, and gave him 10s, my uncle Roger Branskell the other and gave him 5s/- my Cossen Mary Hutton Robt[']s] wife his god-mother giving him 5s and Christened in the Church att Barnard Castle."

3. "My sonne Phillip Borne the 23th day of June (in my father's house at Barnard Castle [over-written]) beeing Friday 1643 . . . and Christened the Thursday after in Barnard Castle Church by Mr. Giles Foster, my Father Philip Sand'son beeing one of his god-fathers . . . my Cossen Robt Jackson the other . . . and Barbara Dobson John Dobson's wife of Newcastle his godmother."

3. "My Daughter Kathrine Borne in Mr. Marmaduke Tonstall's house of Wickelife the 25th day of June 1645 . . . and Christened in the same house the same day by Mr. Charles Bainbridge, person Mr. Tho: Wickcliffe beeing her godfather . . . and Mrs. [blank] Rookeby of Morton her godmother & my sister in law Anne Stodart the other . . ."

4. "4 child: My some Francis Borne in Barnard-cast in Wm: Wharton's house the 21th of May 1647 . . . and baptized on Wednesday ye 26th day of may by Mr. John Rodgers minister of Barnard Castle."

1. "My 5<sup>th</sup> Child named George was borne in Barnard Castle in W<sup>m</sup> Wharton's house the 11<sup>th</sup> of January 1648 . . . and baptized by M<sup>r</sup> Tobias Sidgewicke the next day ith forenoone in ye same house."

5. "My 6<sup>th</sup> child Hanna: borne in Wm: Wharton house the 7<sup>th</sup> of September beeing Saturday 1650 and baptized by Mr. Sidgwick the 12<sup>th</sup> day after in ye same house shee departed this mortall life on friday the 15<sup>th</sup> of October 1652 . . . and was buried in B.C. Church in the pue where wee sitt."

5. "November 2<sup>th</sup> 1652 It is to be remembered that my Grand-father Tho. Allenson departed this life the day above sayd beeing Tuesday . . ."

6. [The Diarist now records an eclipse on 29<sup>th</sup> of March 1652 and a drought in that year "and people went dry shod over the Tease." In the previous March he records his horse had cast him into the river, probably then a little damper.]

6. "March ye 29<sup>th</sup> 1653 . . . my deare wife Christian Sand'son departed this life in B. Castle in Wm. Wharton house . . . and was interred in B.C. Church ye 31<sup>th</sup> day in ye pue or stall where my Father sitts Mr. Geo: Sand'son preached her Funeral sermon."

7. "It is to be remembered that my second wife was called Margaret Webster daughter to Robert Webster of Hartenpoole merchant wee were married att Longley Hall att my Cossen Gab. Jacksons upon ye 15<sup>th</sup> day of September 1653 and that night went to Hartenpoole . . ."

[The Diarist here records "The names of those that did send her certaine p'sents" upon her return apparently from the honeymoon, consisting of geese, cheeses, turkeys, linen, etc.]



8. "September 6<sup>th</sup> 1651 my wife was delivered of a daughter and ye child died in ye birth and was buryed in B. Ca Church in R. Hutton pue."

8. "My 8<sup>th</sup> child was borne in B.C. in my Unckles house . . . the 4<sup>th</sup> of March 1655 . . . and was baptized ye 11<sup>th</sup> day . . . by Mr. Spencer minister at Starford."

[Here are recorded "Fifteene Short Sentences left by Rob: Smith martyr, to his wife"—pious axioms.]

10. "In ye yeare 1664 in December for about a moneth together was scene a Blazing Starre, after it followed a most violent frost, and in ye yeare 1665 a warre with ye Dutch and in ye yeare 1665 followed a great plague in London and in 1666 London was burnt."

12. "My 13<sup>th</sup> Child was borne in Eggleston-hall ye 27<sup>th</sup> July 1663 . . . and was baptized upon Tuesday ye 4 August, witnesses my Cossen Mr. Tho. Daile, my brother Robt. Shawe & Mrs. Frances Fielding Mr. Wm. Fielding his eldest daughter, and was named Robert."

12. "My 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> Children beeing Twynes was borne in Eggleston hall ye 19<sup>th</sup> of Decembre beeing Mundy 1664 at night about ye houres of 3 or 4 in ye morning and was baptized . . . ye 29<sup>th</sup> Instant by Mr. Timothy Tully, the eldest was named James Mr. James Darcy & Sir William Huddleston & Mr. William Fielding[s] wife witnesses to him; and ye younger named Joseph, S<sup>r</sup> Joseph Cradock & Mr. Cutlib. Carre & Mrs. Anne Bowes Jun<sup>r</sup> witnesses, Capt: Wm. Darcy did stand for his unckle Darcy, my Cosin John Dale for S<sup>r</sup> Joseph Cradock and Mrs. Bowes Sen<sup>r</sup> for her daughter."

11. "1666 my 16<sup>th</sup> Child was borne at Eggleston ye 21<sup>st</sup> May . . . and was baptized ye Thursday sennet after beeing ye last day of May by Mr. Francis Gregson minister, and was named Elizabeth witnesses my some in Law Aubony my sister Elizabeth Webster, my moth<sup>r</sup> Webster standing for her & my Cosin Elizabeth Aubony and dyed the 30<sup>th</sup> March following 1667 and was buryed in Eggleston Chapel in ye Chancell."

16. "My somme Franke."

19. "February 10<sup>th</sup> 1667 my deare wife Margaret departed this life at Egleston . . . and was interred in Egleston Chappel in ye quire ye 13<sup>th</sup> day."

20. "Memorand. that the 27<sup>th</sup> Febr, 1671 my somme Christo: dyed at Great Strickland . . . and my sommes Cutlib: and Fra: with my 2 Serv<sup>ts</sup> . . . went ye next day to bring his corpse to be buryed at Egleston and came ye 29<sup>th</sup> Feb to Egleston: we kept him in ye Low parlor till Munday which day he was interred in Egleston chaple . . . in ye Chancel lyeing upon ye left side of his deere Mother & his Sister Elseb: on his left side."

22. "My mother Sandfson dyed on Munday ye 20<sup>th</sup> of Octob<sup>r</sup> 1673 and was Interred on ye North side und<sup>r</sup> ye great blue stone going up into ye quire in Barn: Castle Church."



25. "In Feb 1673/4 was a peace Concluded by ye Spanish Ambassador & ye King at London. Those that treated with him were ye Duke of Monmouth ye Duke of Ormonde, Osborne Lord Treasurer S<sup>r</sup> Henery Finch Lord Keeper of ye Great Seale, Secretary Arlington and Secretary Trevers."

30. "June 21<sup>o</sup> 1675 The Election for p<sup>l</sup>am<sup>t</sup> men was at Durham. S<sup>r</sup> James Clavering, Joh. Tempest Esqr & Tho. Vane Esqr stood for Knights of the sayd County the[y] Begun on Munday & ye pole was not ended till Wednesday ith evening and then S<sup>r</sup> Gilbert Gerrard ye high Sheriffe gave it for Colo. Tempest & Mr. Tho. Vane."

30. "Mr. Tho. Vane dyed ye Friday following."

[Christopher Vane was elected 25 Oct. 1675.]

37. "The 16th of September 1676 beeing Saturday p<sup>t</sup> of ye great Church at Beverley in Yorkshire was beate downe with Thund<sup>r</sup> & Tempest of Raine & Lightning & ye great Bell throwne out of yr Timber & broken in peeces."

[In this year the Diarist records that having been to sacrament, while subsequently smoking, his "Breeches was some way by the Ashes sett on fire & . . . 3 or 4 holes were burnt." He resolves never to smoke on any day upon which he had fulfilled this religious duty.]

43. "September 3<sup>d</sup> 1677 My Lord Bp. Crew came to Barnard Castle and lighted off] Horse at my House . . . went to confirmation . . . and dined at my house . . . he confirmed in my stall or pue."

46. "This year—1678—was a plott discovered against ye king & Govern<sup>t</sup> in Church by ye papists in October."

46. "24th of Febr 1678/9 My Grandchild Tho. Aubone died at Ba: Castle and was buried ye next day besides my pue."

"Our Triall about Alnage in the Excheq<sup>r</sup> was on Thursday ye 13th Feby 1678, 9."

49. "Ye 22<sup>o</sup> September 1679 my daughter was marryed at Eglestō Chapel and her husband and shee went to Newcastle ye 30th S<sup>r</sup>bris 1679."

"October 15<sup>o</sup> 1680 My daughter Margar<sup>tt</sup> Milburne was brought to Bed of her First Child in Newcastle in son Aubone's House & was called Hen:."

"Mr. Newton & some Aubone were Godfathers & Sister Jane Robson Godmother."

53. "Sir Chr. Musgrave came to Ba: Castle Saturday 15th Oct. 1681 and dined with mee."

57. "Friday ye 5<sup>o</sup> May 1682 the Gloucester frigate wherem ye Duke of Yorke was goeing for Scotland was runne upon Lemonds Sands & Saturday morning . . . there was 3 persons of quality drowned & about [erasure] seamen 130 and severall of ye Dukes officers drowned, after ye Duke was gone out of her she rould into 15 fathoms water and psently after sunke downe."





57. "Thursday July 27th 1682 Mr. Brokett dyed and Mr. Chapman entered July 30<sup>th</sup> being Sunday and preached."

58. "Parson Roberts died at Rumballdkirke ye 6th September 1682."

58. "Parson Hilton was inducted to ye said parsonage ye [blank] of October being Sunday & preached his text ye 1 Corinthians 4<sup>o</sup> v. 1."

61. "My some in Law Alderman Will: Aubone was Elected Alderman at Newcastle Munday ye 11<sup>th</sup> June 1683."

75. "Friday St. Andrews day [1683] broth<sup>r</sup> Wm. Fielding carried his daughter Susanna from hence for Yorke Coach."

81. "In Feb. [1683/4] It was in ye Gazet that at ye Downes the sea was frozen a mile into the sea which was never known before."

92. "I went to Newcastle with my some James the 20th March 1683 which day some showers of snow and had been frost ye night before soe that It was ye worst Rideing over Spenny-moore that ever I Rid in my whole life."

102. "Son Franke and wife returned to Carlisle the 9th June 1684."

111. "Oct. 11th 1681 . . . and daughter Fras delivered of a some ye same night."

113. "The Earle of Carlisle Govern<sup>r</sup> dyed at Hendersk [Hinderskelf] in January [1Feb.] 1684/5 and S<sup>r</sup> Christo: Musgrave made Gov<sup>r</sup>."

114. "Friday ye 6 Feb. 1681/5 King Cha. the 2<sup>d</sup> dyed at Westminster between 11 & 12 in the forenoone the Duke of Yorke spoke these words following ye same afternoone now the Crowne is descended upon mee I doe declare never to alter the Government as is now established in Church & State, and I [will (*sic*)<sup>1</sup> sacrifice ye Latst Drop of my Blood to—*erased*] maintaine ye p<sup>t</sup>estant Religion, and as farr as in mee Lyeth I will follow my late brother's example & more not here sett down . . . was proclaimed . . . at Barnard Castle ye 18th foll<sup>s</sup> 1681/5 where now onely 3 Justices S<sup>r</sup> Will Bowes Mr. Wm. Robinson & my selfe & severall gentlemen in both in [*sic*] Yorkeshir in ye adjacent places towards Ba. Castle and in ye County neere Ba. Castle and had a dinner at Blagraves [?] & spent towards 20<sup>s</sup> we had 2 Trumpeters with silver Trumpets and 1 drums It cost me at that dinner 23<sup>s</sup> 00<sup>d</sup>."

115. "Mr. Byerley & Mr. Lambton now chose[u] p<sup>l</sup>ument men for ye county of Durham March 16<sup>o</sup> 1681/5."

116. "Duke of Monmouth came in at Lyme in Dorsetshire on Thursday ye 11th June 1685.

"And was routed about Bridgenorth Monday ye 6th July."

"Was taken Wednesday ye 8th July and brought to London & executed the 15th July 1685."

116. [N.D.] "My daughter Katherine Aubo: sailed in . . . [!] Friday ye 23th July & was 9 or 10 days at sea."

"Aug. 24th 1685 My daughter Kath: Aubone beeing then Mrs. Mairis [*sic*] of Newcastle dyed at London in ye Fore noone in a flux of Rume that choaked her in her throat begun about 10 a Clocke and dyed about 12 she was shamefully neglected by her Husband's sister Besse white (*alias* Elliott) that went up to London to attend her she had but the opinion of one surgeon."

123. "1685 9ber 21<sup>o</sup> my Grandchild Christiana was buried in Egleston Chappel where the Alter table stands on the South side."

137. "My brother Wm. Fielding & his wife went from Egleston & there son W<sup>m</sup> Munday the 22th [Feb.] 1685."

143. "Deane Tho: Musgrave dyed about ye 26th March 1686 and Sr Joseph Cradock dyed Sunday fore Noone being Easter day ye 4th April 1686."

"1686 my son Aubo: & John Gill went away Wednesday morning ye 21st Aprill."

"1686 July 29th I went y<sup>d</sup> day to ye Assizes at Durham with Sr W<sup>m</sup> Bowes in his Coach and I went Saturday ye last of July to Newcastle . . . dined at Justice Carrs & came & Layd at Streathā Castle all night & got home ye next day about 6 a Clocke."

161. "1686 My daughter Frances was delivered of a sonne upon Tuesday ye 5 Octob<sup>r</sup> 1686 my broth<sup>r</sup> Basil fielding came hither ye 1<sup>o</sup> Octob<sup>r</sup>."

"1686 My son William went to Gathrop 10 Oct."

"1686 daughter Dorithy went fro Bar: Castle to Stockton with her broth<sup>r</sup> James ye 15 Octob<sup>r</sup>."

"1686 My daughter Anne was marryed to Tho Wickelife the 28th Octob<sup>r</sup> beeing Thursday."

"My son Aubone & daughter Bette [*! Besse*] came to Egleston Munday the 25th of Octob<sup>r</sup> [1686]."

163. "1686 Saturday ye 30 October my wife begun not to be well in her legges."

"My nephew Israel Fielding came to Egleston Saturday ye 13th November."

167. "1686 Decer. 29 My son Wm. went from hence . . . for Garthorp."

173. "1686/7 January 13th beeing Thursday my sonne Wm. was marryed at Galthropp Hall with Cosen Joh: Tempest daughter Mrs. Dorithy and came to mee at Bar: Castle Saturday the 5th of Feb. following."

184. "1687 May 2<sup>d</sup> My Grandchild Chris: Sand'ron set forwards for Oxford betwixt 9 & 10 in ye morning his father went along with him and for a servant Pinkency Junior and returned the 14th June."



"1687 May 16<sup>o</sup> At sunset my son Wm. and his wife came to Eggleston."

187. "1687 May 23 I rid to New: Ca: & my son Wm. & his wife came that night . . . & went away on Tuesday [31<sup>th</sup>] to Old Durham & I came away Wednesday [1 June] with my son Aubo. Wednesday the 1<sup>st</sup> of June 5 ships were aground & 2 more sunke, Thomas Reed ship was splitt a peeces wherein was Mr. Robt. Heslop & his wife but both saved, yet 6 women and 3 children were drowned in Reeds Ship."

187. "June 11<sup>o</sup> 1687 Saturday My daughter Dolly Fielden [sailed] in Mr. Mason ship from Sheeles the Noontide and got into Lyn Road Munday night following."

187. "Wednesday July 27<sup>o</sup> 1687 My son Robt. and daughter Dolly came to Eggleston."

188. "1687 June 18 My son Wm. & wife came to Egl<sup>n</sup>."

"June or July [1687] S<sup>r</sup> Ch<sup>r</sup> Musgrave was put out of all employment at Court."

188. "July 27 1687 S<sup>r</sup> Rich. Shuttleworth dyed at Gawthrop on [*sic*] ye small pox."

191. "Joseph came [to] Eggleston Tuesday ye 25<sup>th</sup> of Octob<sup>r</sup> 1687."

191. "Robt. ye [*blank*] of Aug 1687."

191. "Israell dyed ye 15<sup>th</sup> Decemb<sup>r</sup> 1687 . . . and was Inter'd ye 16<sup>th</sup> in Eggleston quire."

193. "Michalmas Term 1685 a man gave false evidence for his M<sup>r</sup> and psently after it beeing discovered fell down dead."

193. "My brother Wm. Fielding came hith<sup>r</sup> . . . Friday the 16<sup>th</sup> of Decemb<sup>r</sup> 1687 . . . and brother Basil & his wife came hither ye 21<sup>o</sup> December . . . S<sup>r</sup> Rich. Musgrave dyed St. John Day beeing Tuesday ye 27 Decemb<sup>r</sup>."

193. "My son Wm. & wife came to Eggleston the 12<sup>th</sup> March 1687/8."

193. "March 15<sup>th</sup> 1687/8 Joseph returned by way to New. Ca. for Camb."

194. "My son James came to Eggleston the 28<sup>th</sup> March 1688."

194. "My sun Robert went to New Castle the 29<sup>th</sup> March 1688 . . ."

195. "April 8<sup>th</sup> beeing Sunday 1688 my wife Kathrine dyed . . . and was buryed in Eggleston Chapel under ye Communion Table . . . was carryed to Church by S<sup>r</sup> Wm. Bowes, Mr. John Bowes, Mr. Edward Huddleston, Mr. John Dale, Mr. Tho. Watson, my some Mr. Tho. wickeliffe and my 4 sonnes Cutlitt S: Wm., Robt. & James and had all Alamood [*sic*] scarfes 3 yards apeece and Mr. Chancellor Tully had likewise a scarfe & all ye Gentry had sweet meates."

196. "May 10<sup>th</sup> 1688 the Queene was del: of a prinse of wales."



196. "I came to Forcett ye 10th July 1688 with James & Martha came ye Thursday next after."

197. "Wednesday ye 25 July 1688 Robt. & James did rise out of Bed & went & lay out all [night] & on Thursday i th Evening Robt. came in and James came not in till Friday night and they both gave mee a promise under there Hande never to doe ye like but to abhorre drinking which writinge I shall keepe as a Recognition against them if ever they doe ye like againe."

197. "Thursday Aug. 2<sup>d</sup> 1688 James did sweare unto mee that hee never would receive any money of any p'son whatsoever without my Consent."

198. "1688 May ye 2<sup>d</sup> . . . My sonn Robt. Sand<sup>r</sup>son went to Table with his brother William Sand<sup>r</sup>son att Forcett-hall."

"And upon Tuesday May ye 15th 1688 having paid for all of Tableing I entred & begun of a new score, my selfe, my son James & my mayd servant Martha Sand<sup>r</sup>son and came away from Egleston as aforesayd."

198. "Munday ye 10<sup>o</sup> Decemb. 1688 the Queen . . . [?] went from Whitehall . . . [?] and ye King went ye 11th . . . [?] unto Rochester and rid from there abt 3 in ye morning, Sunday ye 23<sup>d</sup> of December, the pr: & prs: was p'claimed Kg & Qn of England France & Ireland the 13th Feb. 1688/9."

"And went to ye 2 houses in his Robes."

199. "October ye 30th 1688: beeing Tuesday, In ye Evening was scene west & by North a great opening in [the] sky of Fire, and there appeared as itt were men with pikes in there Hands and then both sides disapeared."

199. "My Nephew Israell Fielding in a Lettre Dated ye 1<sup>o</sup> November 1688 writes the p: of Oranges Fleet Sayled from Maas mouth on Tuesday morning ye 30th October in 2 divisions & sayled Northwards ye wind fair for them but itt appeared that they sayled otherwyse. The 5th of Novemb<sup>r</sup> 1688 beeing Munday ye pr: of orange Lauded or came to an anchor at Torbay & landed some men neere ye Bay."

"November 24th Saturday the King came from Salisbury & came to whitehall Munday ye 26<sup>o</sup> and ye prince of orange march'd into Salisbury Smday Novemb<sup>r</sup> 25th."

"Friday November 30<sup>o</sup> the King put out a proclamation to call a plant<sup>d</sup> to sett ye 15th of January next, and ye pr: orang called a convention to meeete ye 22th January."

205. "The pr: of orange first declation [*sic*] for a convention was dated ye 31th of December to meeete ye 22th January at westminster hall."

208. "Wednesday Jan. 16th 1688/9 My son Wm. & his wife set forwards to Weston to Lady Shuttleworths."





213. "March 1<sup>o</sup> Friday . . . this day I came in Sr Wm. Bowes coach with son James in it to Strea[tlam] . . . and stayed there all night . . ."

"March 4 1688/9 my Grandchild Christopher went for Oxford."

[Last entry 20 March 1688/9].

"Memorand: yt in August 1648 when ye Kinges party marched through Barnard Castle I hetro Replit ðel vey god adunfound ell the acualcers." [I heard Raphe Fel say god confound all cavaleers.]

"May 24th 1649 Memorand: I hetro wullmci w vey that if prinat Ahe came into England in a hostile manner he hoped they would give him the same sauce they gave his father for he deserved it better &c. ss, me ntu; ssull; ssright." [I heard William W say that if prince cha . . .]

The simplicity of this cypher is amusing.

SOME NOTES ON BARSHAM JUXTA BECCLES,  
CO. SUFFOLK.*(Continued from Vol. XXI, p. 250.)*

Sir Edward Echingham, elder son of John Echingham of Barsham by Anne Wingfield, became a distinguished commander both on land and sea. He served in the naval expedition against the French before Brest in 1513, and his letter to Cardinal Wolsey, announcing the loss of the English Admiral, Sir Edward Howard, is to be found in the State Papers.<sup>1</sup> In September of the same year he was knighted at Flodden.<sup>2</sup> He died at Barsham, 8 July 1527,<sup>3</sup> and in his will expressed a desire to be buried in Barsham Church, on the north side under the foundation of the chancel wall. This Will, dated 18 June 1527, was proved P.C.C. 7 Feb. 1527-8 (28 Poreh). I.P.M. taken at Beccles, co. Suffolk, 1 Sept. 1539. His first wife, Mary, was buried on the north side of the Lady Chapel in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin.<sup>4</sup> His second wife was Anne, dau. of John Everard, of Cratfield, co. Suffolk (by Margaret Bedingfield, his wife), and widow of Edward Lewkenor, of Kingston Bowsey (or Buci), co. Sussex.<sup>5</sup> By her first husband, whose will is dated 22 Dec. 1522,<sup>6</sup> she had a son, Richard Lewkenor, and three daughters, Elizabeth, Dorothy and Eleanor. She died at Barsham, 14 Nov. 1538;<sup>7</sup> her nuncupative will made on the day of her death, was proved P.C.C. 3 July 1539 (15 Crumbwell).

Sir Edward Echingham left two daughters and coheirs, both probably by his second wife:—

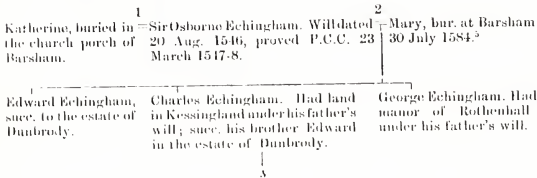


I. Anne, aged 14 years and upwards at the I.P.M. to her father, 1 Sept. 1539, and so born about 1525. She married Sir Owen Hopton,<sup>1</sup> of Westwood, co. Suffolk, Lieutenant of the Tower of London, son of Sir Arthur Hopton of the same place Knt., by Anne, dau. of Sir David Owen, of Cowdray, co. Sussex, Knt.,<sup>2</sup> by whom she had issue.

II. Mary, aged 12 years and upwards at the I.P.M. to her father, 1 Sept. 1539, and so born about 1527. She married, as his second wife, John Blennerhassett, youngest son of Sir Thomas Blennerhassett, of Frenze, co. Norfolk, Knt., by Margaret, his second wife, dau. and heir of John Braham, of Wetheringsett, co. Suffolk. The descendants of this marriage will be given below.

In addition to his two daughters and coheirs, Sir Edward Echingham was almost certainly father of an illegitimate son, Sir Osborne Echingham, who became Marshal of the Army in Ireland, was knighted at Whitehall 1529, and received from Henry VIII. a grant of the Monastery of Dunbrody, co. Wexford, 1 Oct. 1545.<sup>3</sup> Sir Edward in his will does not expressly call this Osborne his son, but the relationship may be considered as proved by the will of Sir Osborne, who calls Anne Hopton his sister.

The pedigree of this illegitimate branch of the Echinghams appears to be as follows:—<sup>4</sup>

Inquisition taken at Beccles co. Suffolk on Monday next before the feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary 31 Hen. VIII [1 Sept. 1539] before William Woodhows Esquire, Eschaetor, after the death of Edward Echyngham Knt., by oath of William Bumpsted gent., John Jernyngham gent., Robert Mannyng gent., Robert Skete gent., Robert Bakon, John Wroote, Thomas Moore, Henry Pawe, Richard Barker, Nicholas Thakker, William Sparham, and Adam Craske.

The said Sir Edward Echingham was seised of the manors of Barsham, Kesynghond and Blauncharde with appurtenances and of seven messuages, five hundred acres of land, forty acres of meadow, two hundred acres of pasture, forty acres of wood, three hundred acres of marsh and ten librates of rent with appurtenances in Barsham, Shipmedowe, Rynghesfeld, Reddesham, Beccles, Great Wurlyngham, South Cove and Kesynghond, also of the advowson of the parish church of Barsham. The said Sir Edward Echyngham being so seised, Thomas Lord Laware Knt., by the name of Thomas West Knt., Edward Lewkenour, Ralph Everard, Esquires, John Baker, Henry Everard, William Everard, John Everard, son of the said William, and John Tasborough in Trinity Term 15 Hen. VIII (Ro. 357) at Westminster by a certain writ *super disseisinam in le post* recovered against the said Sir Edward Echyngham the said manors of Barsham, Kesynghond and Blauncharde &c. and the advowson of the parish church of Barsham and all other the premises Which Recovery was had to the use of him the said Sir Edward Echyngham his heirs and assigns. By virtue of which recovery they the said Lord Laware, Edward Lewkenour, Ralph Everard, John Baker, Henry Everard, William Everard, John Everard & John Tasborough were seised thereof to the use of the said Edward his heirs and assigns. And they being so seised the said Edward Lewkenour and William Everard died and the survivors of them held the premises *jure accrescendi*. And the said Edward Echyngham afterwards, namely on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of June 19 Hen. VIII, made his last will and declared that the said feoffees should after his death be seised of the said manors and premises to the use of Anne Echingham, wife of the said Edward, for the term of the life of the said Anne, and after her death to the use of Anne Echyngham and Mary Echyngham the daughters of the said Edward and the heirs male of the bodies of the said Anne and Mary, and in default of such

issue to the use of Francis Echyngnam brother of the said Edward Echyngnam and the heirs male of his body, and in default of such issue to the use of Osbert (*sic*) Echingham and the heirs male of the body of the said Osbert, and in default of such issue to the use of Humfrey Wyngfeld Esquire and the heirs male of his body, remainder to the right heirs of William Echyngnam, knt.

And the jurors say that the said Edward Echyngnam afterwards died at Barsham in the said county, and after his death the said Lord Laware, Ralph Everard, John Baker, Henry Everard, John Everard, and John Tasborough were seised of the said manor and premises to the use of the said Anne Echyngnam wife of the said Edward, for the term of her life until the 4<sup>th</sup> day of February in the 27<sup>th</sup> year of the now King (Hen. VIII), on which 4<sup>th</sup> day of February the said Anne wife of the said Edward was seised of the said manors and premises in her own right of free tenement according to the form of the Statute thereof made and provided [Statute of Uses, 27 Hen. VIII, chapter 10].

And being so seised, the said Anne, wife of the said Edward, died at Barsham aforesaid on the 14<sup>th</sup> of November in the 30<sup>th</sup> year of said now King [A.D. 1538]. After her death the said manors and premises remained to the aforementioned Anne Echyngnam and Mary the daughters of the said Edward Echyngnam, who entered on the said manors and premises, and were and still are thereof seised. And further the said jurors say that the said manors of Barsham and Blauncharde and the advowson of the church of Barsham with appurtenances are held of William Duke, Esquire, as of his manor of Elys and Stratton in the county aforesaid by fealty and a rent of four shillings by the year. And that the said manors of Barsham and Blauncharde with appurtenances are worth by the year in all receipts beyond deductions £38. And that the said Anne Echyngnam is of the age of fourteen years and upwards, and the said Mary is of the age of twelve years and upwards. And further the jurors say that neither the said Edward Echyngnam, nor any person to his use, was seised of any other lands, &c., in the said County on the day of his death.

The above Will was proved at London 3 July 1539 by the oath of John Thorpe proctor of the executors.

This patent of Armes was exhibited  
 at Cheddle by [William] Wedgwood  
 of Haracles Esqr. 2 April: 1663.

John Wedgwood, of Haracles, the grantee, married Margaret, daughter of William Bowyer, of Knypersley, in co. Stafford. He died 6 April 1589, and was buried at Horton. It is interesting to note that in 1614, Richard St. George, Norroy, entered John Wedgwood, the grantee's son, as "Ignobilis," because he had "a coate given by Clarenceux, being in the province of Norroy." For his descendants see the pedigree entered at the Visitation of Staffordshire in 1663 (Wm. Salt Historical Collections, vol. v, part ii, p. 300).

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## Notes and Queries.

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ELIZABETH, LADY LEIGH, WIFE OF EDWARD REDMAN.—In the notice of Mr. W. Greenwood's interesting work, "The Redmans of Levens and Harewood," in the last number of *The Genealogist*, it was said that if this lady was daughter of Sir John Huddleston, of Millom, by Joan Stapleton, she could not have been mother of Edward Redman's two sons, Henry and Richard Redman. A subsequent examination, made for quite a different purpose, of the Escheator's Enrolled Accounts, 21-31 Hen. VIII (Exchequer, L.T.R., 112), clearly proves, however, that she *was* mother of these sons. The date of the settlement on the marriage of Henry Redman with Alice Pilkington is there given as 7 Sept., 22 Hen. VII, 1506, and that on the marriage of Richard Redman with Elizabeth Ryther, daughter of Sir William Gascoigne, Knt., as 8 Aug. 1510. It follows that it is improbable that the widowed Lady Leigh was daughter of Sir John Huddleston by Joan Stapleton, for the latter's first husband Christopher Harcourt is said in the Harcourt pedigrees to have died 1474, and he even appears to have been alive 1477 (De Banco, Trin. 17 Edw. IV, m. 315). No daughter of Joan Stapleton's second marriage could therefore have been born at all events before 1475, which is only thirty-one years before the marriage of Henry Redman, who was not then a mere child, for his daughter Johanna was aged sixteen at the death of her grandmother Lady Leigh, 10 Feb. 18 Hen. VIII, 1526-7.

THE DIARY AND PEDIGREE OF CHRISTOPHER  
SANDERSON, OF EGGLESTON.

The following is the pedigree printed in Hunter's "Familie Minorum Gentium" (Harleian Society Publications xxxix, 872), as "from the collections of Edward Protheroe, Esqre," with the additions alluded to in the prefatory note to this article, in italics. Protheroe evidently had access to the Diary, but does not seem to have exhausted it.

. . . . . SANDERSON had issue:—

I. Bartholomew Sanderson of Loupe (*? Loupe House 3 miles N.W. of Barnard Castle*) and of Barnard Castle in Durham. Will, 8 April 1607, mentioned in the wills of his brothers Christopher 1587, William 1609, Thomas 1615. Will dated 28 [*not 8*] April 1607, proved Durham C.C. 8 July 1608: to be buried in the churchyard of Barnard Castle. He left issue five children all of whom are mentioned in his will.

1. Philip Sanderson, of Barnard Castle, d. 22 Feb. 1657 [1657-8]; bur. under that side of the great marble stone that joins Mr. Bowes' pew on the right hand of the Quire in Barnard Castle Church. *Proved his father's will 1608, and his uncle Thomas' 1616. Will as of Barnard Castle, haberdasher, dated 10 Feb. 1656-7, proved P.C.C., 498 Wotton, 13 July 1658. He married Phillis, dau. of Thos. Allanson, merchant in Barnard Castle. Proved her husband's will 1658, d. 20 Oct. 1673, bur. under the great blue stone going up to the Quire in Barnard Castle Church, and by her left issue, all mentioned in his will.*

(1). Francis Sanderson, a merchant at Dantzick 1676, mentioned in the will of his brother Bartholomew 1662.

(2). Bartholomew Sanderson, of Kirkby Stephen, co. Westmorland, yeoman. *Proved his father's will 1658. Will dated 29 Nov. 1662, proved at "Apylby," 18 March following (Carlisle Probate Registry), with armorial seal—Paly of six (Argent and Azure) on a bend (Sable) a sword (Argent, pommeled Or). He married Margery . . ., who proved his will in 1662-3, and by her left issue five children, all of whom he mentions in his will, viz. :—*

- iii. *Robert Sanderson.*

- i. *Phillis Sanderson, proved her father's will 1662-3.*

(3). Christopher Sanderson (*the Diarist*), of Eggleston, co. Durham, Esq., J.P., *et.* 48, 18 Aug. 1666, bur. in the Quire of the Chapel of Eggleston, 11 May 1693. Assessed 7 hearths, 1674, Lay Subsidy, Durham,  $\frac{10}{5}$ . Mentioned in his brother Bartholomew's will 1662. His own will is not to be found at Durham, Carlisle, York, or P.C.C. Married, firstly 4 Mar. 1610 [1610-1], Christian, dau. of Cuthbert Thursby, of Woolhouse in Durham; she died in William Wharton's house in Barnard Castle, 29 Mar. 1653, and was buried in her father-in-law's pew in Barnard Castle Church 31st following (*Diary*). By her he had—

- i. Cuthbert Sanderson, *et.* 24, 16 [sic] Aug. 1666, b. at Woolhouse 6 Dec. 1611, baptised at Barnard Castle Church 12th following (*Diary*), d. 1 April 1690. He married . . . and left issue—
  - (i). Christopher Sanderson, sold Eggleston about 1698 to . . . Baker. There is at Durham a marriage bond . . . Sept. 1692, "Christopher Sanderson and Jane Hutton, widow." (*J. S. Howe's MSS.*)

- ii. Philip Sanderson, b. at his paternal grandfather's house in Barnard Castle, 23 June 1643, baptised at Barnard Castle Church 29th following [*Diary*], bred at Brough, co. Westmoreland; admitted at St. John's Coll., Cambridge, 15 June 1659 (*Admission Reg. of St. John's Coll.*), d. 11 June 1684.



- iii. Francis Sanderson, b. *in William Wharton's house in Barnard Castle, 21, and bap. there 26th May 1647, living 1666. The Diary shows he was living as late as 1683.*
- iv. George Sanderson, b. *in William Wharton's house in Barnard Castle, 14 Jan. 1648-9, and bap. in same house next day; living 1666.*
  - i. Catherine, b. at Mr. Tunstall's at Arncliffe<sup>(1)</sup>, 25 June 1645, *and baptised there (Diary); mar. William Aubony of Newcastle, merchant, Alderman and Mayor, d. 4 (24th in Diary) Aug. 1685 in London.*
  - ii. Hannah, b. *in William Wharton's house in Barnard Castle, 7 Sept. 1650, and bap. in same house 12th, d. 15 Oct. 1652, buried in her father's pew in Barnard Castle Church (Diary).*

Christopher Sanderson's second wife was Margaret, dau. of Robert Webster of Hartlepool, merchant, mar. at Langley Hall, 15 Sep. 1653, d. at Eggleston 10 Feb. 1667 [1667-8], *bur. in Eggleston Chapel in ye quire 13th following (Diary);* by this wife he left issue—

- i. Christopher Sanderson, b. 12 March 1658, d. at Great Strickland 27 Feb. 1671 [1671-2], *bur. in ye chancel of Eggleston Chapel.*
- ii. William Sanderson, b. 26 Sep. 1660; of Old Durham, Esq., in 1698; died at Kentish Town 5 Sep. 1727, *bur. in Red Lion Fields burying ground, s.p. Will us of "Bernard" Castle and Armathwaite, co. Cumberland, dated 3 July 1725, with codicils 5 July 1725 and 14 Aug. 1727, proved P.C. York 1 March 1728-9; he married firstly 13 Jan. 1686-7 [Diary—not 15 Oct. 1686, as stated by Hunter] Dorothy, dau. of Col. John Tempest, of Old Durham, at Gawthorpe ["Galthropp hall" (Diary)], 15 Oct. 1686. He*

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- married, secondly, Elizabeth, daughter of William Howard of Corby, co. Cumberland, Esq., d. s.p.; *Marriage bond, Durham, . . . Feb. 1724 (J. S. Howe's MSS.) Mentioned in her husband's will.*
- iii. Robert Sanderson, b. at Eggleston 26 (*27 Diary*) July 1663, and was bap. Aug. 4th; of St. John's Coll., Cambridge, 1687; Clerk of Rolls Chapel, etc.; d. s.p. 1741 (see my Biographical Collection). *Mentioned as of the City of London in his brother William's will 1725. Succeeded to Armathwaite and Patron of that living which he presented to William Sanderson of Flatbank, co. Cumberland, one of the Sandersons of Hutton in the Forest, M.A., of Glasgow (Bishop Nicholson's Register 1702-1734, pp. 733 & 790; and original document now in possession of a Sanderson). He married Elizabeth daughter of Richard Hicks of London, druggist, by Elizabeth, his wife, daughter and sole heiress of Henry Esday of Canterbury, Esq<sup>r</sup>, by Elizabeth his wife dau<sup>r</sup> of Sir Adam Spracklyn [Sprackling] of Canterbury, Kent. Decisee of Armathwaite, etc., for life in her husband's will, which she proved. She died 26 March 1753 in her 49th year. (M.I. next east window of Carlisle Cathedral, post). His will, as of Chancery Lane, dated 5 Dec. 1741, was proved P.C.C., 29th following (362 Spurway).*
- iv. James Sanderson, b. at Eggleston, of St. John's Coll., Cambridge, where he was admitted pensioner 24 Aug. 1683, tutor and surety Mr. Wilkinson, school "Chatterhouse" (Admission Reg. of St. John's Coll.); died s.p.
- v. Joseph Sanderson, twin with James, b. at Eggleston 19 Dec. 1664, and





*hap. 29th (Diary)*, of St. John's Coll., Cambridge, where he was admitted pensioner 3 April 1683, tutor and surety Mr. Wilkinson, bred at Brigwall, co. York, under Mr. Johnson (*Admission Reg. of St. John's Coll.*); died s.p.

- i. Margaret, b. 15 July 1657, mar. at Eggleston, 22 Sep. 1679, to Henry Milbourne. *Issue mentioned in their uncle William's will 1725 and in Diary.*
- ii. Dorothy, b. 26 Dec. 1661, mar. Edmund Norton, gent. *Mentioned as Dorothy Norton in her brother William's will 1725 and (?) as daughter Dolly Fielden 1687 (Diary).*
- iii. Elizabeth, b. at Eggleston 21 May 1666, died 30 March 1667, bur. 30 March 1667.
- iv. Anne, mar. Thomas Wickeliffe 28 October 1686 (*Diary*).

## "THE RED AND WHITE BOOK OF MENZIES":

## A REVIEW.

By C. POYNTZ STEWART, F.S.A. Scot.

The title of this work is happily chosen, for it ought indeed to blush for its own existence. It would be difficult to find in the entire range of Family Histories anything to equal the wonderful statements it contains, unless, perhaps, those in the Coulthart, Bonar and Dearden Pedigrees. We can say with De Thou, "Nullum similis exemplum . . . evolutis gentium annalibus, reperiri."

Our Author has evidently the deepest reverence for his "Chief," as we find that title prefixed almost invariably to the Head of his Clan, so that we have it repeated on page after page; yet this devotion is exemplified in a curious way by the frontispiece facing the title page. There we should expect to see the grand, athletic form of the late "Chief," Sir Robert Menzies—but vain hope!—we only find *him* after searching through 132 pages, plus xiv pages of introduction and preface, etc., and it is a small photograph of six inches by four; whereas the frontispiece occupies the entire page and represents the compiler of the book in full Highland garb, with the words, "D. P. Menzies, F.S.A. Scot." But other surprises are in store for us, and as a new edition is announced, a review of the work may be of interest, and we would note in passing that on the circulars now being sent out, the writer still uses the letters "*F.S.A. Scot.*:" though he ceased to be a Fellow after 1899,<sup>1</sup> and we think it is high time that a protest be made, not only against this assumption, but against the work itself, if indeed anyone be found to take it seriously, even though it is described by the compiler, at p. xiv, as "an accomplished production" and (p. vii) "a work as near perfection as possible." We have termed it a compilation, for it is easy to identify the original part by its composition: in the introduction for example, we find "*Lord*" Robert the Menzies "*to be a man of high and learned culture*": as he lived temp. Alexander II, "*to have been*" would be more appropriate, and the adjectives are crowded.

Mr. Menzies says further on, "*It is very remarkable the numerous and different ways the name of Menzies has been spelt . . .*": "It was considered a mark of *great learning* to be able to spell a name in a great many ways and still to be recognized" (what! the name, the scribe, or the ways!) "as one and the same name." This is new to us. A translation is given at p. xii, "in modern British," presumably by Mr. D. P. Menzies, in which we get the following Grammar, ". . . with us *was he* and *they*"<sup>2</sup> then we find "oral history" (p. xiv), to us unheard of except as

"tradition"—"a distinguishing difference" is also bad in heraldic parlance. But though these phrases might have been expressed more accurately and grammatically, it is, perhaps, heretical to think so, as we find that these "traditions handed down from one generation to another in the family of the author, and of which many have been verified by the records, combine to make the work as exhaustive as possible." Yes! to the serious reviewer and genealogist it is exhausting and melancholy to expose its glaring defects.

Moreover, he claims to be chieftain of the Comrie Sept, but at the annual meeting of the Menzies Society at Weem, in September, 1901, "it was agreed . . . to delete his name from the books of the Clan Society as Chieftain of the Comrie branch until he satisfy the Chief, Captain Niel Menzies, and the rest of the family that he is such." We have not heard that he has done so.

We now come to the commencement of the book, we may say to the beginning of all things, and certainly to "pre-historic times" as far as family history is seriously concerned.

To go back 333 years *before* the Christian era (mark, Gentle Reader, that it is not A.D. 333, but B.C. 333) absolutely staggers the strongest intellect, for let us just recall some contemporary names: Alexander the Great, Darius, Demosthenes, Aristotle, Apelles, Ptolemy I, Diogenes and Lycurgus, are the first that occur to us. There was no writing in Scotland so early: Britain was not discovered by the Romans till about two centuries later; and authorities on the early history of Britain fix the reign of Fergus I from A.D. 503 to A.D. 506, *i.e.*, 800 years later than the era so jauntily assumed in this book, which in its first line also vouchsafes the startling information that he was "the first King of Scots who began to reign over *Albion*"! Yet it is to the year 300 B.C. we are referred for the "first founder" of the Menzies family, Manus; his elder brother Ferlegus having " fled from *Scota* (*sic*). From this mythical person, who we are told "*held the throne of Scots* (*sic*) about 300 B.C.," we have a pedigree of no less than thirty nine generations before coming to Anketillus de Meyneis or Maynoers, who seems the first of the line respecting whom we have any semblance of documentary evidence, but he is stated to have lived A.D. 1120-90. No reference is given as to where the charter mentioned as witnessed by him is to be found, nor its date; and without verification we are not prepared to admit the evidence of this or any other deed mentioned in the earlier parts of this work. There is absolutely no proof of the identity of Maynus with Menzies, nor whether such a person ever existed. He does not appear in any one of the known chronicles of the Scots or of the Picts, though he does in the fabulous portion of Hector Boece's work, which no sane person accepts as history.

Yet he is here proclaimed to be the "Great Progenitor of the Clan Menzies which . . . has been acknowledged *by all writers* to have always been a peacefully disposed Clan!" The details given in this work do not support this view and we have not yet found one writer who does.



According to learned, experienced authors, we learn that "Manners, Mayneris, Meners, Maneris, which afterwards by vulgar transformation became Menzies, were originally the same. The armorial bearings of all these were the same" (G. Chalmers's "Caledonia," vol. ii, p. 584; Nisbet's "System of Heraldry," p. 215, Appendix).

Dr. Forbes Skene, Historiographer of Scotland, in his "Highlanders of Scotland" (second ed., 1902, p. 377), begins his account of the Clan Menzies thus: "The original name of this family was Meyners, they appear to be of Lowland origin. Their arms and the resemblance of name point them out to be a branch of the English family of Manners, and consequently their Norman origin is undoubted."

This is the evidence of sober, authentic history. But the evidence on which we are asked to believe in Mr. D. P. Menzies' descent of thirty-nine generations is as remarkable as the genealogy itself.

Buchanan, Fordun, Boece, Holinshead (presumably Holingshed or Holinsled) are drawn on *en bloc*, as also "Hist. Eccl. Gents Scot." (*sic*). All these may satisfy the "Gents," though not the *gentlemen* of Scotland in the twentieth century. But to add stilling to his buckram authorities, we find our author uses on every page phrases such as these:—

"Metellanus (fourteenth in descent) *is said* to have succeeded to the kingly office B.C. 13; . . . "if the syllable *tell* be taken from Metellanus, we have Meanus . . . ;" "Metellanus, Mainus<sup>1</sup> and Menzies are simply different ways of spelling the same name . . . ;" again at p. viii, ". . . Take out the syllable tell inserted to make the difference between *he* (*sic*) and the first Menzies (Mainus), and we have Meanus almost the same as the first." This is a delicious specimen of etymological criticism, and if this patent process were extensively applied, the results would be indeed interesting, for there has been no literary discovery equal to this plan during a thousand years at least! "Mansuetus (fifteenth) *was son or nephew* of Metellanus . . . he *may* have died A.D. 89 . . . The successor of Mansuetus (Menzies) *appears to be* Medanus (sixteenth) or Meanus *probably* his son . . . *is said* to have flourished about A.D. 100, but *may* have died about 150, *possibly* born about A.D. 69."

"Meanus (seventeenth) *appears* to have been son of the former. . . Mellanius or Meanius, now Menzies of *Scotus* (please note the word "Scotus!") was his successor and *possibly* his son (eighteenth): he is recorded to have belonged to . . . the Highlands of *Scotus*. . . Menna (nineteenth) *apparently* son of the above. . . Meinius or Merinatus (twentieth) *possibly* the son of Menna"—and so forth down to (the twenty-second) Menzies, Menachus or Menachus, for whom there is no pretence of filiation; the same misfortune happens

<sup>1</sup> Throughout this book there is hardly anything funnier than the embassy sent by Caesar Augustus to "King" Mainus; a fact for which Boece and Strabo are made answerable; but over and above this, "tradition says this ambassador was father of Pontius Pilate, who was accompanied by his wife, and who while sojourning in the land of the Menzies, bore the Roman Ambassador a son at Fortingall, this son afterwards becoming Pontius Pilate, the Governor of Judea in the time of our Lord."





to the twenty-fourth Menzies, and the words "probably," "may have been," "possibly," "may have died," "appears to have been," are used to each "Menzies" down to Anketillus A.D. 1120, on every page.

Of Menenius, thirtieth in descent, "it is recorded that he was a bishop or pastor of the church in the country—which *must have been* his native highlands of Dull . . ." The boldness of unsupported inference should be noted, as also the wonderfully naive remark, "when the letter *d* is removed from the name Medanus, the name becomes very similar to the modern (Gaelic Meanrich) *Meanus*." Of course it does, for by cutting out, you may make any word "similar to" some other word; but why make Mackenzie ("Scots Writers") responsible for this pantomime transformation scene?

We have introduced to us *Rabanus Maurus*, alias Menrus or Maurus, "born possibly at Rabanus or Rarus near Dull in the uppin of Menzies in the Highlands of Scotland where he doubtless was educated in the College of Dull." The exactitude of location leaves nothing to be desired, but that he came thence is a considerable surprise, as most of us associate him with Mayence, where he was born 766; with Fulda, where he was educated; and again with Mayence, of which See he became Archbishop. There is no evidence we know of for believing Rabanus was ever in Scotland or a Scotsman. He might have heard of Scotia through Meinin.

We have already noticed our author's opinion that it is "a mark of great learning to spell a name in a great many ways and still to be recognised as one and the same name." Though the English is obscure, we think we understand what it is intended to convey, and must acknowledge that it would be difficult to find any work with such marvellous transmutations; the change from Menrus to Rabanus Maurus is, perhaps, the most wonderful, but whether such juggling shows "great learning," we leave to the reader to settle.

We soon arrive at the fight between Maeduff and Macbeth "now so celebrated in *song*, story, play, and *poetry*," and the historian Holingshed or Holinshed is again quoted as *Holinshed*; while we are informed that ". . . there *was* in 1770 in the possession of Sir Robert Menzies other *Charters* of Anketillus," and that a preceding Sir Robert (1177) was one of the "*magists of Scotland*"—a reference is given to an authority "Shelm. Lamark, p. 166, Regm., Glasgow, p. 15, vol. i," (possibly Sheriffdom) which we cannot explain, any more than "*justiciaris*" probably intended for *justiciarius*. "Wילו de Ramesay, *Vicount* of Forfar" (why spell it *Vicount*?) is probably a bad translation of "*Vice Comes*," which meant Sheriff, of Forfar, as such a peerage is unknown to us. Our author naively, but ungrammatically remarks, "what wondrous *changes* has been wrought in Scotland . . .;" also that London Parliaments "do not appear to *have had almost if any attraction* or charm to the Menzies . . . as few have ever sat there . . . *much different* was it . . ."—"must have held his lands by Charter." Of course, how else could he?



Mr. Menzies speaks (p. 24) of the lands in Athole, "Loch Tay, then called Discher and Toyer," but this is an *office* which he has himself *attempted* to explain elsewhere (p. 49) as spelt by him "Tosach Dorership," he alone can elucidate it: but its usual form is Toscheoch Doraach or Deorach, viz., an office equivalent to that of Thane, and with the additional word meaning, the chief officer of the King in that region—at a later period the Earl. The office was frequently sold, like many such posts, but the emoluments were never considerable.

Our author states (p. 31) that this "*Lord*" Robert was appointed Regent, and he so dubs him at the beginning of the chapter, but the real purport of the document given (a letter from King Alexander to his father-in-law Henry of England) declares that at the instance of the King of England and Alexander's own Council, he had dismissed certain bishops and councillors and appointed others, *one* being "Robert of Meyners, who should be appointed by the Council, Regents of the Kingdom and Guardians of the King and Queen." The King was in his minority, and the term Regent is not taken in the usual sense, as when applied to one person (see Bain's "Calendar of Documents relating to Scotland," vol. i, 386-7).

Equally faulty is the summary (p. 32) of another document from the same source, the gist of which is that the King of England accredited certain nobles to act with the Scottish Councillors, to counteract certain Scots rebellious against the Queen of Scots.

Our author repeatedly says "the *signature* of Robert de Meyners (or other 'Chiefs') is appended to charters by the King," but this could not be so, for Royal Charters contain only the names of witnesses as *written by the scribe* in the testing clause; the witnesses did not themselves sign.

Because Robert de Mayners is termed *Dominus*, which did not mean a Peer in 1247, he is ever after called *Lord Robert Menzies* and *Lord Menzies* by our author, and still worse he entirely omits a most important word (Knights) in his transcription of an entry of 1266 in Exchequer Rolls of Scotland, where after the signatures of Robert de Meyners and John de Cambrun, the appellation "*Knights*" distinctly appears. This should have blown "the baseless fabric" of a peerage to atoms. But there is mis-statement and also mistranslation as to this quotation (pp. 33-34). The "audit" referred to was *not* instituted "into the accounts of Gameline and Richard Bishops of St. Andrews and Dunkeld, the abbots of Dunfermline, Lindors, Holyrood, Scone and Cupar," but they and "R. de Meyneris and John de Cambrun Knights have audited this account," and the account was not that of Churchmen, but that of the Earl of Mar, Chamberlain, and Robert de Meyneris was not sole auditor, but one of several!

Yet on the same page, poor Sir Robert is again hoisted into the peerage as Lord Menzies and a little further on as Lord Robert, leaving us to wonder whether he was a Peer or the son of a Duke or Marquess! This accounts for the incriminating word "Knight" being dropped out, though used the very year in which this Sir



Robert died, but we can give no reason for the extraordinary phrase:—“The record of such entries show *how careful and business-like* the affairs of the Crown were managed by Lord Menzies in his time.” More carefully we hope than grammar and composition have been attended to in this wondrous compilation!

But we now come to the crowning absurdity which surpasses even the statements we have already animadverted on, possibly at too great length.

At page 35 we read Sir Alexander Menzies (1235-1320) is “*acknowledged as Earl Menzies in an Act of Parliament of Scotland on the 29th October, 1312, at Inverness.*”

Our readers will be as surprised as we were when, on investigating the reference, we found there was no such “*Act of Parliament*,” that on the date and occasion referred to, King Robert I and his Council met at Inverness on 29th October, 1312, to confirm with Haco V, King of Norway, the “*Agreement*” entered into at Perth in 1266 between Alexander III and Magnus IV of Norway, auncle the Isles. The original Agreement had been sealed with the royal seal; also with those of certain Bishops, and of Alexander Comyn, Earl of Buchan, Patrick of Dunbar, William of Mar, Adam of Caryk, Earls; and Robert de Meygners, Baron, but not Earl, nor necessarily a Peer. No entry is found therein of Sir Alexander and of his son Robert de Meygners as “*Comes et Earl Menzies and Robert de Meygners baronis . . .*” viz., of two different persons, father and son, as stated by our author, but of one Menzies only, and he not a Peer, simply Robert de Meygners, *baronis* (laird).

Let us investigate the transcription by our author (p. 18) of this “*Act of Parliament*,” 29th October, 1312, and compare it with the original as given in the “*Acts of Parliament of Scotland*,” vol. i, 103.

He distinctly asserts that the following signatures and wording are to be found there, viz.: “*Alexi Comyn Earl Comitibus de Buchan, Patricij de Dunbar, Willi de Marre, Ade de Carr, Comitum (sic), et Earl Menzies, and Robtj. de Meygners baronis est appointum.*”

To the Confirmation dated 29th October, 1312, are appended (“*appositum*,” not *appointum*, as given twice by Mr. Menzies) the seals of the King; of Henry, David, Thomas and Ferquhard, Bishops of Aberdeen, Murray, Ross and Caithness, and of William, David and Thomas Raulphus, Earls of Ross, Athole and Murray. There is no seal of any Menzies.

Robert, who sealed the previous Agreement of July, 1266, was father of the so called “*Earl Menzies*,” and died the latter end of the same year (p. 31).

We prove, therefore, that in neither of these documents is there any mention of a Comes or Earl Menzies, nor of Sir Alexander, falsely called Earl, but only of his father Robert, baron or laird (not a Peer), in the earlier deed.

No trace of the words Comes or Earl, or peerage of any degree as applied to Sir Alexander or to his son, Robert de Meyners, exists in this or any other deed.



Moreover our Author says (p. 48). "Sir Alexander the Menzies and his son Sir Robert of Menzies appears (*sic*) on the list of barons where the Chief was acknowledged as *Earl Menzies, Comitum*" (29 October, 1312).

But Sir Alexander's name does *not* appear in this document at all. Yet it is unblushingly stated that "the chief," viz., Sir Alexander, was by this document acknowledged as Earl Menzies, and that the names of *two* of the Menzies, Sir Alexander *and* Sir Robert are there, which is not the case. In fact the insertion of "*Alexander*" and of the word "Earl (or Comes)" as applied to him, are misreadings of the original record.

"Earl" Menzies is termed only "Sir Alexander" in several places, and forgetful that he had, according to our author, become a Peer in 1312, his name (or signature) as *Alexander de Meyners* is given in subsequent deeds of 30th October 1313 (p. 50) in 1314 (pp. 55 and 56), and in 1315 (p. 57).

But the "ruling passion strong in death" re-appears, and the unfortunate Sir Alexander Menzies goes to his grave with the mendacious notice "*Earl Alexander the Menzies must have died about the year 1320, being born (not having been born) about 1235.*" Why the poor Knight should be made away with in that year because of "being born about 1235," is not apparent, and the only thing certain about his obituary notice is that he was never an Earl, nor was any one of his successors ever a Peer.

We now come to the son of our pseudo "Earl," viz., Sir Robert, whose titles have evidently proved a great puzzle to our compiler, who in the heading to this chapter confers on him the following honours, "Lord Robert the Meylmeis, knight, Viscount or Earl Menzies, Fifth 'Baron' of Menzies, Lord High Sheriff of Edinburgh."

Of course had his father been an Earl, his son would have inherited the title, but as his father was not an Earl, Robert had no Earldom to inherit: neither was he *Lord Robert*, the term *Dominus* not implying a peerage, any more than "Baron" does, nor was he "Viscount," as we shall presently shew. Therefore of his five titles, "Knight" is the only real one.

But of all the appalling historic blunders in this work, the most terrific is the one at page 64, where it is stated that "we find the Chief Sir Robert the Menzies designated as *Vi-Count or Earl Menzies of Edinburgh.*"

There is no such word as "Vi-Count," but Sir Robert was *Sheriff* of Edinburgh, the Latin for which was then *Viccomes*, an official dignity only, having nothing whatever to do with our modern title of Viscount. Sir Robert is repeatedly designated in this work as "Sheriff" or *Viccomes* of Edinburgh, but how in the name of common sense he could be "Earl or Viscount" (*utranque mavis accipe*) "stagger humanity" and lands our compiler into a jumble of titles, such as Earl Robert, Viscount Robert, *Vice Comitibus* (not even *Viccomes*) and Sheriff all on one page (65), and on page 66, the humbler ones of "*Commissariat or Purveyor*" as late as 1329, and merely *Knight* in many deeds down to the year of his death, 1316.





Mr. Menzies has misread the deed he gives at page 28, line 3. The witnesses are “Will<sup>o</sup> [for William] de Ramsay, Vicecomite [*Sheriff*] of Forfar, et Dn<sup>o</sup> [for *dominus*] Roberto de Mayners” [for Sir Robert of Meyners not “Lord” Robert]. Moreover, Sir Robert was only appointed “Chamberlain” in 1249, not “re-appointed Lord High Chamberlain,” and the mightiness of the post is beautifully fanciful.

Our compiler says (p. 26), “We find Sir Robert of Menzies a witness to a Charter confirming a grant of land by the King to the then Earl of Athole—*terris de Inaath*—dated 1232.” This is a total misrepresentation: the document is a Charter of Confirmation to the Monks of Cupar Abbey, of the lands of Inaath, which the late William of Olifard gave to them. There is no date.

On the next page there is a quotation from a Latin writ, which, as here given, can only be translated by the Editor, for it surpasses the abilities of mere ordinary Latin scholars, who are put to a standstill by such terms as: “. . . Uxtri de Perth habentem, in quadram quator pollices.” Again at page 29 we find a grand display of ignorance, for Mr. Menzies desecrates an Act of Parliament by misspelling “tynsal” as “tynful,” and translating it as “title,” whereas it means loss!

Mr. Menzies is not satisfied with having created and bestowed on his “Chiefs” two Peerages (an Earldom and a Viscounty), besides throwing in a “*Saint* David Menzies,” but says (p. 413), “the genealogy of the House of Bothwell . . . clearly shews that the present Chief is entitled to the title of Lord Holyroodhouse.”

To prove this he says Niel Menzies, a Doctor in Perth, “married his cousin Mary Bothwell, *only child* of Henry Lord Holyroodhouse, by whom he had an only son Robert . . . fifth Bart.” (p. 366). Had Mary been “only child” of Henry Bothwell, it is not apparent that the title of Holyroodhouse, which he claimed (but did not obtain), was to pass to females: but she was *not* “only child,” though she was “*only daughter*,” which is acknowledged at page 414: she had several brothers, the youngest of whom, Robert Bothwell, married and had a daughter Margaret, who married a Colin Drummond (M.D.) and left descendants, amongst whom the heir to the title might be found,

- (1) if the title were transmissible through females,
- (2) if the male line of Bishop Adam Bothwell be extinct.

Under these circumstances it is as well that the Menzies Baronets have not assumed this or any of the other titles conferred on them by the “Fountain of Honor,” the author of this book.

The successor of the false “Viscount” Menzies, was Sir John Menzies, and though our author is pretty liberal in the conferring of peerages, he has not conferred one on this Knight, fortunately for the reputation of both.

This is unspeakably modest, for both the father and grandfather of Sir John were created peers—by Mr. D. P. Menzies—and peerages were then hereditary, yet no explanation is vouchsafed as to their cessation.



Confusion in titles is "twice confounded" by a lordship or a barony or *Dominus* being taken throughout this volume as a Peerage.

The *barony* ascribed (A.D. 1061) to one Menyeis (1043-1132), solely on the authority of Boece and Holinshed (*sic*), does not answer to the definitions of a Peerage given in the "Complete Peerage," vol. ii, 423, where the whole matter is clearly explained; nor do we find any charter quoted by Mr. Menzies conforming to such definitions.

Notwithstanding this, each successive Chief is dubbed Baron, "writ large," so we have twenty-four of them, all mentioned in such a way as to lead the unwary to believe they were Peers, beside calling a certain Chief, "*Lord Robert the Menzies*," Lord High Chamberlain, because he was "*Chamericus*!"<sup>1</sup> Yet we find Mr. Menzies mentions (pp. 90-91, *et passim*) numerous grants of baronies without any claim to peerages founded thereon.

A striking word occurs at page 91 where, in a Charter *A.D. 1385*, by Robert II, Robert Meigners is termed "his Beloved Shield-Bearer," and the deed is referred to as "transumpt of 1439 Castle Menzies Charters No. 13."

But five lines further down we are favoured by the original Latin words, "*speciali armigero nostro*," said to be contained in another Transumpt of a Charter 1387 (now at Castle Menzies) of a grant of lands by Robert II to the same Robert Menzies.

The term "Shield bearer" sounds strange to us and recalls the time of "Saul and his armour bearer," Greeks and Romans.

The word means a man of war and bearing weapons, or a man entitled to bear the heraldic shield of his family. This is the interpretation put by Chief Justice, Sir Edward Coke on the "*Statutum de Militibus anno primo Edwd. II.*" viz., as early as 1307. He says, "They are noble who bear the gentle (hence 'Gentleman') arms of their Ancestors. Therefore they are called *Scutiferi, armigeri*," and Du Cange says, "*Scutifer* (a shield bearer) *apud Anglos penultima est nobilitatis descriptio inter Equitem et Generosum*." How *shield-bearer* can be got out of *Armiger*, not *Scutifer*, is a conundrum we will not discuss, but let it join the Peerages and myths we are sending to "limbo."

Our author,<sup>2</sup> not content with creating three Menzies Peers (*Vires acquirit eundo!*), canonizes Sir David as a *Saint*, only on the evidence that the church at Weem is called "St. Davids," that he is locally known as such, and that a large trough, hewn out of the rock, is known as "St. David's Well." We find no trace of him in any "Hagiology."

<sup>1</sup> The reference at page 25 to the Deed of King Alexander (1216) is a blunder, as usual. It should read thus:—"Litera protectionis per Alexandrum II. Regem Willielmo Episcopo Glasguensi concessa." "Roberto de Meyners *Chamerico*," should, of course, be "Camerario" = chamberlain, and the date of this writ is 1231, not 1216. Robert de Meyners was not, however, appointed Chamberlain by Alexander III till 1249, so that "*Chamerico*" must be an interpolation. (See Nesbit's "Heraldry," app. 245, and Chalmer's "Caledonia," vol. i, 285, note.)

<sup>2</sup> He terms the *daughters* of the Earls of Huntly and Athole, who respectively married Menzies Chiefs—"Countesses!" (picture at p. 113).



But we must pass over minor inflations of Menzies pride and note some wonderful blunders in the deciphering of Monumental Inscriptions, and also in their translations for those supposed to be as ignorant as their translator.

"Quid. Quid. Fit. Sine Pinde. Est. Pace. A T V. M" (p. 113).

This no doubt is meant for the words of St. Paul, though the copy of the inscription is all wrong, and should run, "Whatsoever is not of Faith, is Sin."

The translation given is, "Verily, verily faith will bring peace."

Above this "is the figure of a *rude* Highlander," which suggests terrible ideas of impropriety, while "the awakening trump of the spirit" is, to say the least, confusing.

But further comes an absolutely undecipherable riddle: "Viev. & Venite. A.D. Judi," rendered for us most kindly, "Have power and preach of the death of Christ!" Then "Gloria Deo Pax H' C' Minibus," "Glory to God and Peace to Man," and "Trivni Deo . . ." is rendered "To the three-in-one God . . ."

The inscription on Lady Christina Menzies's<sup>1</sup> tomb has " . . . atavia *digiti* conditoris," signifying ancestress of a founder already named; as there is no question of "digits" or fingers, the word should doubtless be "dicti," or "before mentioned." This is bad enough, but the translation is worse, viz., "Alas! this chronicles her death!" The same translation for the identical words is also given page 146 and page 364.

This, however, is surpassed by the rendering of the familiar words, "Sancti (here spelt *santis*) mors janua vitae est: memento mori," viz., "The death of the righteous is entrance into Life: Remember thou must die." Our F.S.A. Scot. boldly renders this "a saintly death lives in living memory of the dead." This is a magnificent proof of the inventive faculty, for we are not aware that the "living memory of the Dead" has been thought of before, any more than "Cherubims!" (page 113).

An equally astounding transcription and translation are found at page 276, constituting ten lines of mis-spelt nonsense. The well known letters D(eo) O(ptimo) M(aximo) S(acrum) being also condensed into the one word "Lordly," and "Stirps Alta" into "stripsalta."

A part of this inscription is said to be "the composition of Chief Sir Alexander Menzies, who for his attainments as a composer of Latin verse in his youth, at the University of Glasgow, was created Poet Laureate." The authority for this is an extract from the "Registrum Glasguense" 1582, in which the word "Poet" does not occur, for though wrongly given by Mr. Menzies, it is intended for the usual form of granting a Degree or Laureating—indeed it is so mutilated as to be untranslatable the words "Poet Laureate" are our author's own invention and insertion, who also turns Glasgeua into Glaseugna.

<sup>1</sup> She is persistently called "Lady Campbell," and her arms are said to be *hulced* with those of Menzies "in token of marriage." We were taught in our youth to use the word "impaled."



We believe this to be the first and only instance of a *University* creating a Poet Laureate, and then by the grace of Mr. D. P. Menzies!

As to bad composition, grammar and spelling, we find a fine specimen (p. 115) of *nine* lines, without any termination for the nominative, except a full stop; the author forgot the beginning of his phrase and has made nonsense of it—paragraphs end with prepositions—"Viscount" for Viscount—"the *cure* of insanity and other diseases *were* wrought"—a bell "was stolen by an Englishman to England"—A Deed "to which *is* appended 27 *small signets*," presumably seals—"who, after insulting him they marched . . ."—"treasure" for the heraldic tressure, and the anachronism "*Miss*" Menzies of Menzies, as early as 1546 (p. 175) and p. 189)—another unfinished phrase of five lines (p. 179); and another equally unfinished phrase of seven lines (p. 201).

An escutcheon is described as shewing the "male" arms "on the *right*" and the "female on the *left*," though *dexter* and *sinister* are the only appropriate heraldic words, and the error is repeated (p. 201). Barbara, daughter of the Earl of Atholl, though called "Countess" in this work, page 113, is on page 204 styled "the Honourable Barbara Stewart," both being wrong, as she was "Lady Barbara."

Because Sir James Menzies is termed "ane honorable man" in a receipt, and "traist friend" by Queen Mary, he is ever after called "The Honourable" and "The traist friend of Queen Mary," but both these were the ordinary terms of courtesy then in use. Indeed the latter is found in several government letters to other persons, a little further on. A similar use is made of the equally ordinary greeting, "trusty and well-beloved" (p. 295); at page 247 we read of "MacGregor's Leap," being so called "from *he* being chieftain of a band of MacGregors," and also of a coat of arms "*grouny* of 8 pieces," intended probably for "gyromy."

Then we get Christian, daughter of Lord Niel Campbell (p. 339) styled "*the Houble*" Christian Campbell at page 313—"The Commission who adjudged . . ."—"the *Chassic* Highland dress"—the daughter of the Duke of Athole is styled "*the Houble* Charlotte Stewart"—"*Miss*" Menzies in 1536 is painful—"a funeral escutcheon" should be "hatchment"—"the marchioness was *won plus* . . ."—"The fame of the young chief's and his brothers prowess still *linger* . . ."—"Red and White . . . conjectured to have been the colors adopted by the first King Maynus . . ." Heraldic tinctures 300 *B.C.*, in the days of Euclid and the Punic Wars, constitute a deeply interesting discovery!

Exception must also be taken to the statement about the late Sir Robert, "not only is he Chief of Clan Menzies but the Chief of almost all the men of Strath Tay . . ." As he had no property in the district properly so called, for it ends where his property begins (*viz.*, at the west boundary of Killiechassie, which is in the parish of Logierait) it is impossible that either he or any of his predecessors could have ever been designated as "Chief of Strath Tay."





It is strange that "The Chief" should have signed himself "Sir Robert Menzies" at the close of his letter of 18th May 1892 (p. 418), and we should like to see the original!

Such, however, are some of the chief defects of this curious product of Menzies glorification and adulation, of which we have only selected the most prominent examples.

We trust the forthcoming edition will be an improvement on the first and—if so—would suggest that the latter be "called in" and exchanged for the new one, or for some volumes of "Punch" and "Baron Munchausen."

### RICHARD FITZROY.

The descendants of Richard, the bastard son of King John, who took a prominent part in the great naval battle off the Kentish coast in August 1217, have been the subject of several serious errors in our county histories and other works of reference. Richard was the son of John, by a daughter of an Earl de Warenne, probably Hamelin, a natural brother of Henry II. On 13 May 1216, the King ordered the Sheriffs of Kent and Sussex to cause the young Richard to have a lawful aid for making himself a knight,<sup>1</sup> and as he was then engaged in warfare, it is probable that he attained his majority within a few years of that date. He had already married Rose, who is known to have been the daughter and heiress of Robert of Dover; for on 11 June 1214, William Briwere was ordered to deliver to Richard, the King's son, all the land which fell to Rose, his wife, hereditarily.<sup>2</sup> Through her grandmother, also called Rose, Richard's wife inherited the manors of Lesnes, in Kent, and Great Wendon, in Essex. She also inherited the castle and honour of Chilham, in Kent, from her father.

Richard was sometimes known as Richard de Warenne, sometimes as Richard of Chilham, sometimes as Richard of Dover, and sometimes as Richard Fitzroy. In the Cotton Collection there was formerly one of his charters, which seems to have been since either lost or destroyed. Fortunately a fac-simile of its seal, bearing the legend, "Sigillum Ricardi de Varenna," appears in Francis Sandford's "Genealogical History," from which we learn that he used as his arms two leopards.<sup>3</sup> The date of Richard's death has not been ascertained. He was a party to a fine dated 1 July 1245;<sup>4</sup> and on 18 November in the same year a Richard of Dover was pardoned twenty marks, in which he had been amerced before the justices in eyre for pleas of the forest at

Northampton,<sup>1</sup> and on 21 June 1216, the King informed the Sheriff of Kent that he had taken the homage of Rose of Dover, for all the lands which Richard Fitzroy, formerly her husband, held of the King in chief of her inheritance, and ordered him to allow her to hold the same in peace.<sup>2</sup> It is, therefore, probable that Richard died in the first half of the year 1216.

Mathew Paris records the deaths of Richard, the son of Roger of Chilham and Richard of Dover, his son, among the events of the year 1215.<sup>3</sup> It is almost certain that Roger is the outcome of a clerical error, the contracted word Reg' representing Regis, having been read as Rog' and extended erroneously into Rogeri. In any case the statement of Mathew Paris is not to be trusted, for many other persons whom he mentions as having died in the year 1215, undoubtedly died in other years.<sup>4</sup>

On 14 July 1250, the King for a fine of 100 marks, granted Rose licence to marry whom she would,<sup>5</sup> and shortly afterwards she married William of Wilton, one of the King's judges, who was slain on 11 April 1264, at the battle of Lewes.<sup>6</sup> Rose survived her second husband for a short while only. Pursuant to a writ now missing, Fulk Peyforer, the sub-eschator of Kent, was directed to ascertain how much land Richard of Dover and Rose, his wife, recently deceased, held of the King in chief.<sup>7</sup> The wording of the extent shows that it was made on the Wednesday after the feast of St. Mathew the Apostle, and an endorsement that this day fell within the escheatorship of William of Wendling. William was twice escheator south of Trent, the first time from 2 June 1259<sup>8</sup> till 15 July 1261,<sup>9</sup> the second time from 23 July 1261<sup>10</sup> till 24 September 1265.<sup>11</sup> But Fulk Peyforer is known to have been sub-eschator of Kent on 8 February 1263<sup>12</sup>; and another person is known to have held that office towards the close of the first escheatorship of William of Wendling.<sup>13</sup> It is, therefore,

highly probable that, St. Mathew's Day falling on a Sunday in 1264 and on a Monday in 1265, the extent was made either on 21 September 1264 or 23 September 1265. In this case Rose must have died late in the summer of one or other of these years.

In Edward Hasted's "History of the County of Kent," it is stated that Rose of Dover married first Richard, the son of Roger of Chillham, afterwards called Richard of Dover, who died before 16 Henry III, and that she shortly afterwards married Richard Fitzroy, a natural son of King John.<sup>1</sup> These statements are inaccurate and seem to be based on the passage in the chronicle of Mathew Paris, which have been mentioned above. Some doubt also seems to exist about Rose's parentage. She was the daughter of Robert of Dover, and her mother was probably Isabel, the second daughter of William Briwere, the elder. On the Pipe Rolls of 24 Edward I, John Wake is described as the son and heir of Baldwin Wake, the heir of Isabel of Dover, the second daughter and heiress of William Briwere.<sup>2</sup> On 21 July 1213, the King delivered to William Briwere the custody of the land and heirs of Baldwin Wake, together with the marriage of Isabel, his daughter, sometime the wife of the same Baldwin.<sup>3</sup> Again, on 17 December 1233, William Briwere, Bishop of Exeter, who is believed to have been nephew to William Briwere, the elder, had a grant of the custody of the land and of the son and heir of William d'Avranches, with liberty to marry him to one of the daughters of Richard of Chillham and Rose of Dover, his wife, the cousin of the Bishop.<sup>4</sup> These facts suggest that it is not unlikely that Isabel, the daughter of William Briwere, the elder, had for her first husband Baldwin Wake, and for her second husband Robert of Dover, Rose's father.<sup>5</sup>

Richard Fitzroy left as his heir a son named Richard, of whom more presently, and two daughters, namely Isabel, who married Maurice of Berkeley and Lauretta, who married William Marnyon. The marriage of Maurice with Isabel has for long been denied, and G. E. C. in his "Complete Peerage," states as an undoubted fact "that Maurice married Isabel, the daughter of Maurice de Creon, the husband of one of Henry the Third's half-sisters. G. E. C. seems to rely on the opinion of John Smyth, of Nibley, who wrote his "Lives of the Berkeleys" about the year 1618.<sup>7</sup> The opinion of Smyth, however, is not supported by the original authorities which he cites. My own investigation has failed to discover a single entry on any of our public documents, which

even suggests that Maurice married a daughter of the King's half-sister. On the other hand, the chronicler who has been named Robert of Gloucester, states that Maurice married a daughter of Richard, the bastard son of King John. The words of the chronicler are as follows:—<sup>1</sup>

Sir Richard fiz le rei of wan we speke biuore  
 Gentil man was inou þei he were abast ibore  
 Vor þe cles douzter of wareine is gode moder was  
 & is fader þe king Ion; & biyete him a porchas  
 Sire Morisso of Berkeleye weddede sulþe bicas  
 Is doylter & biyēt on hire þe kniȝt Sir Tomas

Internal evidence shows that the author of the chronicle was very well informed about events in Gloucester; and his words upon the Gloucestershire family of Berkeley would, if uncorroborated, be entitled to credence. Fortunately corroboration is not wanting. One of the manors of which Richard Fitzroy was seised in right of his wife was Great Wendon, in Essex. By a fine dated 18 November 1251, and made between Maurice of Berkeley and Isabel, his wife, as plaintiffs and William of Wilton and Rose, his wife, as impediens (William having, as we have seen, married Richard Fitzroy's widow), a carucate of land in Great Wendon was assured to Maurice and Isabel and their heirs.<sup>2</sup> The limitation to the heirs of Maurice and Isabel instead of to those of Maurice only, suggests very strongly that the land was granted as Isabel's marriage portion by her mother Rose. Moreover, on 12 July 1264 the King directed that his kinswoman Isabel, the wife of Maurice of Berkeley, should have seisin of the manor of Wendon which was of *her inheritance* for the support of herself and family.<sup>3</sup> That Isabel was niece to Henry III is proved by the fact that on 10 August 1261, out of compassion for the poverty of Isabel, the wife of Maurice of Berkeley, *his niece*, the King assigned to her for the support of herself and her children the manors of Marietslam and Trottscliffe.<sup>4</sup>

Probably genealogists have been induced to deny that Richard's daughter Isabel married Maurice of Berkeley because they were under the impression that she married first David, Earl of Athol (by whom she had issue a son and heir), and secondly John de Bailleul of Cavers (in whose lifetime she died). It is perfectly certain, however, as will be seen presently, that the Isabel who made these two marriages was not the daughter but the granddaughter of Richard and Rose.

Richard, the son and heir of Richard Fitzroy, was engaged with his father in the year 1243 in the King's service in Gascony; and little else is known of him.<sup>5</sup> He is stated by Mathew Paris to have died in 1245, but there is an entry on one of the rolls of

letters close which suggests that he was alive as late as 27 November 1217. He married the Countess of Angus, and left issue an infant son, Richard, and a daughter Isabel. There can be no doubt about his marriage, though it has hitherto escaped the notice of genealogists. By letters close, dated 2 December 1217, the King directed that the Warden of Eleham Park, in the county of Kent, should cause the Countess of Angus, the wife of Richard of Dover, to have four bucks of the King's gift.<sup>1</sup> Moreover, on 22 November 1265, Richard of Dover, described as the King's kinsman, received letters of protection; and the next entry on the roll of letters patent states that Gilbert de Humfraville, his *brother*, received similar letters on the same day.<sup>2</sup> At this date Gilbert de Humfraville was Earl of Angus.

The inquisition held on the death of Rose, the date of which has already been discussed, shows that her heir was Richard, the son of Richard of Dover, who would attain the age of twenty-one years on 1 February then next to come. There can be no doubt whatever that this Richard was not Rose's son, but her grandson. An assize<sup>3</sup> of last presentation was brought by the King at the Northamptonshire eyre of Trinity 1261 against William Marmyon and Lauretta, his wife, to recover the presentation of the church of Lutton. The verdict of the recognitors shows that Richard, the son of Richard Fitzroy, left as his heir a son Richard, who at the date of the assize was in the King's ward. It also shows that Lauretta, the wife of William Marmyon, was a daughter of Richard Fitzroy. About the time of the assize the King granted the custody of the infant Richard and his lands to his Queen, who presented her clerk, John of Wells, to the church of Lutton.<sup>4</sup>

Richard, the grandson of Richard Fitzroy, married Joan, the daughter of Simon of Cray, who afterwards married Gilbert Peccle.<sup>5</sup> Richard died in 1265 or 1266, leaving no issue, his heir being his sister Isabel, who was then the wife of David, Earl of Athol. By letters close, dated 4 December 1266, the King ordered the Barons of the Exchequer to cause the Earl to be quit of the sum of £100 in which he was bound for his relief and that of his wife for the lands and tenements which they held of the King in chief.<sup>6</sup> As already stated, the Countess has been wrongly described as the daughter instead of as the grand-daughter of Richard Fitzroy and Rose his wife. The mistake is again made clear by the record of a case heard at the Kent eyre of Easter 1271, when Isabel of Dover, Countess of Athol, was summoned to answer William Marmyon in a plea of covenant made 3 May 1239, between Richard de Warenne, the son of King John, and Rose his wife, the *grand-*

mother of Isabel, whose heir she was, and Robert Marmyon, father of William Marmyon, whose heir Robert was, concerning the manor of Lesnes.<sup>1</sup>

David, Earl of Athol, died at Tunis in the seventh Crusade in the year 1269, and not long afterwards his widow married again.<sup>2</sup> At an inquest held in 3 Edward I the jurors of the hundred of Felborough, in Kent, stated that Isabel of Chillham (meaning the Countess of Athol) who held of the King in chief, had married Sir Alexander de Bailleul, without the King's license.<sup>3</sup> She died in the spring of 1292 and was buried in Canterbury Cathedral. On 1 May of that year the King ordered the goods and chattels of Isabel, Countess of Athol, to be delivered to her husband Alexander de Bailleul.<sup>4</sup> Her heir was her son John, who is stated in the "Complete Peerage" to have died in 1284 and to have been succeeded in the earldom by a son also called John, who was executed for treason on 7 November 1306. These statements are not quite accurate. The Earl of Athol, who was executed, was not the grandson, but the son of David and Isabel; and no John, Earl of Athol, died in 1281.<sup>5</sup> This is evident from the documents next cited. By a writ of Privy Seal, dated 2 August 1305, the King informed his Chancellor that John, Earl of Athol, son and heir of Isabel, sister of Richard of Dover, had done homage for the manor of Lesnes, which Joan, widow of Richard, held in dower.<sup>6</sup> On 5 March 1310, the King granted to Bartholomew of Badlesmere and Margaret, his wife, the castle and manor of Chillham, which Alexander de Bailleul had held by the courtesy of the inheritance of Isabel, his wife, whose son and heir John, late Earl of Athol, had been hanged for treason.<sup>7</sup> Bartholomew of Badlesmere also committed treason, and on 28 November 1321 the King granted the castle and honour of Chillham to David of Strabolgy, Earl of Athol, the grandson of Isabel of Dover.<sup>8</sup>

this realme of England from the ryver of Trent Southwardes  
Sendeth greetinge in our lord God everlastinge: That whereas  
ANDREW NOUELL of Dalby in the County of Leyecester  
Esquire doth by right of inheritance preheminance of birth and  
by just descent beare the Armes of his ancestors who by the

admitted by letters patentes und<sup>r</sup> the greate seale of England  
have assigned gyven and graunted unto the said Andrew Nouell  
to his said auneyent Armes for his Crest as followeth, vizt:  
Upon the headme on a Wreathe silver and gueules a Roe bucke  
silver hornes gold, mantelled gueulles doubled silver, as more  
playnly appeereth depieted in the margent herof. Which Crest  
I the said Clarencieux Kinge of Armes do by these presentes  
ratify confirme gyve and graunt unto the said Andrew Nouell  
and to his posteritie and to the posteritie of Andrew Nouell  
his father with their due difference: he and they the same  
Armes and Crest to use beare and shew foorth in shilde Cote  
Armure or otherways at his and their liberty and pleasure,

Armes have heereunto subscribed my name and sette to the seale

Sir Andrew Noel, the grantee of the Crest, was descended from the ancient family of Noel, lords of Elenhall and Ranton in Staffordshire, and was the second son of Andrew Noel, of Dalby on the Wolds, co. Leicester, Esquire, by Elizabeth his second wife, daughter and heiress of John Hopton, third son of William Hopton of Shropshire. Andrew Noel the father, who was the King's feodary in Leicestershire, had purchased the manor and estate of Dalby in 1543-4, and on his death in 1562 it came to his second son Andrew (the grantee). This Sir Andrew was thrice sheriff of Rutland, and represented that county as knight of the shire during several Parliaments in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and received the honour of knighthood. He married Mabel, sixth daughter of Sir James Harrington, Knight, of Exton, co. Rutland, and sister and coheir of John, Lord Harrington of Exton, and from this marriage the Earls of Gainsborough are in the female line descended. Sir Andrew Noel died at Brooke, in Rutland, on 19 October 1607, and was buried with great pomp at Dalby on 8 December. In Dalby Church is a handsome canopied monument, with the sculptured effigies of Sir Andrew and his wife, shield of Arms, and this inscription:

"In Abitum illustrissimi viri domini Andree Noel,  
Equitis aurati, et domine Mabilie uxoris ejus,  
Epitaphium.

Qui quidem Andreas animam Christo reddidit

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GRANT OF ARMS AND CREST TO THOMAS BAKER  
OF SWANEY, CO. SALOP, ESQ., 14 OCTOBER 1649.

(From the Ashmole MS. 558, fo. 136, 137, in Bodleian Library).

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To all & singular unto whom these presentes shall come William Ryley, Esqr: Norroy King of Armes sendeth greeting. Whereas THOMAS BAKER of Swaney in the County of Salop Esqr: high Sheriff & Justice of Peace in that County, hath requested me to declare what Armes he may lawfully beare. And





whereas I have received credible testimony that he is originally descended of an auncient family of the Bakers in that County of Kent. I doe by these pntes signifie & declare that the said Thomas Baker may beare the Armes & Crest hereafter menconed (vizt. :) Azure on a Cheveron Or, three cinquefoyles Gules, between as many Swans neckes erased of the second, And for his Crest, on a Heaume & wreath of his Colours, an Arme & Hand proper yssuing out of a Wreath of Laurell holding a Swans neck erased or, mantled gules, doubled argent, as in ye margent more lively is depicted, wch Coate and Crest I the said Norroy doe by these p'sentes allow & confirme unto the said Thomas Baker & the heires of his body lawfully begotten to be borne by them with their due differences for ever. In wittnes whereof I have hereunto affixed the Seale of myne office & subscribed my name the 14th day of Octob: Anno D'ni 1619.

WILLIAM RYLEY Norroy King of Armes

Thomas Baker, the grantee of the above Coat of Arms and Crest, was of Sweeney, co. Salop (a township two miles south of Oswestry), being the son of Thomas Baker who purchased Sweeney from Andrew Chambre in 1623, and died in 1639. He was born about 1608, and was an active adherent of the Parliamentary party during the Civil Wars. Gough, in his quaint *History of Myddle*, gives some very interesting particulars about Thomas Baker. He tells us that his wife was "Elizabeth Fenwicke, descended of a good family and well educated," a sister to the wife of Judge Mackworth. "He erected a new fair house in Sweeney, a handsome pile of buildings, in sixteen weeks." Mr. Baker "was made a justice of the peace in the Parliament time, and so continued till the Restoration of Charles II, and wrote himself Esquire. He was made High Sheriff of the County (1649), and left a very noble Sheriff's house: he behaved himself among the gentlemen of the County with much commendation and even to admiration. He was a great patron and benefactor to all independent preachers, . . . kept good hospitality, and was very charitable to the poor." "And now I come to the apex of Mr. Baker's dignity. He was chosen by the Protector to be a Parliament man." Some of his preachers would pray and preach for four hours together in the dining-room at Sweeney; "and when the people departed, they had every one a quarter of a twopenny bun or cake and about half a pint glass of beer." Mr. Baker was also a member of the Parliamentary Commission for propagating the gospel in Wales. He died without issue 19 March 1675, aged 68 years, and was buried in a private graveyard in his own garden, where is a stone thus inscribed: "Thomas Baker, Esqr., deceased, March 19, 1675, aged 68." In the same private graveyard are also inscriptions to Mrs. Abigail Chetwode, daughter to Sir



Richard Chetwode, died 1 May 1658, and to Jane, wife of Ambrose Mostyn, died 26 July 1651. Thomas Baker entered his pedigree at Dugdale's Visitation of Shropshire in 1663, but *n.p.* (*nulla probatio*) is added, as the College of Arms after the Restoration refused to recognize the validity of Ryley's Grants of Arms. Excepting the pillars of the entrance gates, and a little oak panelling, nothing now remains of Baker's "new fair house" at Sweeney, which he built in 1610. He devised his estates to one Thomas Browne, a distant relative. Sweeney Hall was for many years the property of the late Mr. Stanley Leighton, M.P., F.S.A., and now belongs to his son Captain Parker Leighton.

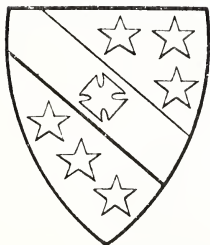

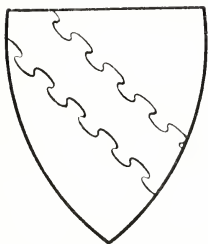

Item I geue iij of my mares of the best and iij horse coltes by their sides to maister Paget the kynges secretary And other iij of my next best mares w<sup>th</sup> other iij coltes by their sides vnto sir Anthony Wyngfeld knyght All the residewe of my good<sup>e</sup> movable and ymmovable leases for term of yeres mony Plate and Juell<sup>e</sup> in England Irelande or ell<sup>e</sup>where I geue them holly vnto Mary my wiffe she therew<sup>th</sup> bryngyng me honestly to the ert<sup>h</sup> and see my debtes paid. Item all my manners Landes tenementes rentes Reversions services and hereditamentes what so ever they be w<sup>th</sup>in the Realme of Englande, I geue them to the said mary my wiffe for terme of her liffe and after her decease I will that my manners Landes te<sup>n</sup>tes, Rentes, reversions services and hereditamentes in Kyssynglande only remayn vnto my sone Charles to haue to him and his heires of his body lawfully begotton and for lacke of such heir then the said manners Landes tenementes rentes reversyons services and hereditam<sup>ts</sup> in kyssyngland aforesaid to remayn to my sone George to haue to him and to the heires of his body lawfully begotten after the decease of my said wiffe And yf yt shall fortune the





said Charles and George to decease w<sup>th</sup>out heires of their boddies lawfully begotton then I will that the said manners Lands tenementes &c in Kyssynglande shall after the decease of my saide wiffe Remayn vnto Edwarde my eldest sone and to theires of his boddy lawfully begotton and for faulte of such Issue to Remayn vnto Anne Hopton my sister and to her heires for ever. Item I will that after the decease of my said wiffe that George my sone shall haue my man<sup>r</sup> of Rothenhall w<sup>th</sup> thapp<sup>t</sup>teñeç and all other my Landes tenementes Rentes Reversyons services & hereditam<sup>tes</sup> in Charleton barneby and Mutfo<sup>rth</sup> To haue & to hold to him and to his heires of his body lawfully begotton and for defaulte of such I will that after the decease of my said wife that all that man<sup>r</sup> of Rothenhall w<sup>th</sup> thapp<sup>t</sup>teñeç and all other my said Landes teintes Rentes reversions & services and hereditam<sup>te</sup>ç in Charleton Barneby and Muttforth shall remayn vnto my sone Charles and to theirs of his body lawfully begotton And for lake of such Issue the remaynder thereof after the decease of my said wife shalbe vnto the said Edwarde and to the heires of his boddy lawfully begotton And for lacke of such Issue the remaynder thereof after the decease of my said wiffe to the said Anne Hopton my syster and to her heires And of this my last will and testament I make the said Mary my wiffe my sole executrix she to ordayn and do for me as she shall thinke best to the plesure of godd Wyttnes of this will declared and reade in the presence of John Hacon George Wentworth gentyman George Mannell Thomas Thorton, William Stonne John Bonde and William Woode.

The above written Will was proved at London xxiiij<sup>th</sup> Marcij Anno Domini 1517-8 by the oathe of Edward Echyngham as proctor of the Lady Mary the relict and executrix.

John Blennerhassett, or Blevchassett, who married Mary, younger daughter and coheir of Sir Edward Echyngham, came of an ancient Norfolk family, originally seated in Cumberland, whence it took its name of Bleverseta, or Blevchayset. The effigy of Sir Thomas Blennerhassett, father of this John, in complete armour, having a surcoat of his arms, and under his head his crest, a fox passant, remained in the church of Frenze in Blomefield's time.<sup>1</sup> Blomefield also gives the following inscription upon a brass plate to the memory of John Blennerhassett's mother in the same church:—<sup>2</sup>

"Here lyeth Dame Margaret Blevchayset, Wedowe, late Wyf to Syr Thomas Blevchayset off Frens, Knyght, dowghter to John Braham of Wetheryngset, Esquier, who had Yssue by the said Syr Thomas, two Sonnes, Thomas a Pryst, and John Blevchayset of Barsham, by Beclys in Sull. and fyve (*sic*) dowghters, that ys Elizabeth fyrst married to Lyonell Lowth, after to Francis Clopton, Agnes married to Syr Antony Rows, Knyght, Anne married fyrst to George

Duke, after to Peter Rede, Margaret fyrst married to John Gosnold, after to Antony Wyngfyld, who dyed the xxiii of Julye in the Yere of our Lorde, 1561.<sup>7</sup>

John Blennerhassett, the husband of Mary Echingham, had been previously married to Elizabeth, one of the daughters of Sir John Cornwallis, of Brome, co. Suffolk, Knt.<sup>1</sup> She was living at the date of her father's will,<sup>2</sup> 10 April 1514. On his second marriage, with Mary Echingham, John Blennerhassett appears to have taken up his residence at Barsham, buying out, as will be seen by his will, the share of his wife's sister Anne, Lady Hopton. The arms of Blennerhassett—[Gules] a chevron Ermine between three dolphins embowed [Argent]—still remain carved in stone, with the date 1563, over a door at Barsham Hall. Mary Blennerhassett, who was living in 1566, predeceased her husband, and was buried at Barsham 20 March 1571-2. He died in 1573, and was buried there 13 July of that year. His will, dated 29 June 1573, was proved P.C.C. 3 Feb. 1573-4 (5 Martyn). They had issue:—

- I. Thomas, of whom hereafter.
- II. Edward, had lands in Ringsfield under his father's will 1573, probate of which he renounced.
- III. John, under 21 years at date of his father's will 1573, living at date of his brother Thomas' will 1 May 1599. He may have been the John Blennerhassett of Lincoln's Inn, who appears in a deed of mortgage, dated 5 May 37 Eliz., of a close called "Rushe close," and a meadow in Beeches.<sup>3</sup>
- IV. George, under 21 years at date of his father's will 1573.
- V. Ralph, baptized at Barsham 27 March 1558, buried there 13 March 1563-4.
- VI. Richard, baptized at Barsham 24 April 1566; living at the date of his father's will.

Thomas Blennerhassett, the eldest son of John Blennerhassett by Mary Echingham, married Mary, daughter of Sir Christopher Heydon, Kut., who survived him. On 18 Nov. 1598 he sold the manor of Barsham and his estates in the neighbourhood to Robert Lee, Alderman of London, for £3,600,<sup>1</sup> but he appears until his death to have continued to reside at Barsham, where he was buried 4 May 1599. His will dated 4, was proved P.C.C. 24 May 1599 by Mary his relict (35 Kidd). They had with other issue:—

- I. John, baptized at Barsham 9 Feb. 1576-7, living at his father's death.
- II. Arthur, baptized at Barsham 11 Dec. 1578.
- III. Thomas, baptized at Barsham 7 Feb. 1590-1.<sup>2</sup>
- IV. William, baptized at Barsham 25 Feb. 1592-3.
  - I. Anne, baptized at Barsham 21 July 1575, bur. there 19 Dec. following.
  - II. Mary, baptized at Barsham 30 Sept. 1582, named in her father's will.
  - III. Rachel, baptized at Barsham 23 July 1587, named in her father's will.

Suckling's "Suffolk" (vol. i, p. 42) says that "An altar-tomb of richly moulded brick stands against the north wall of the chancel (of Barsham Church). It bears no inscription, but most likely covers the remains of Thomas Blennerhassett." The same work also states that he died s.p., which is clearly a mistake, and the pedigree given is singularly lacking in dates.

The various legends connected with "old Blennerhassett" and his headless horses, still current in the district, were not long ago recounted by Mr. Walter Rye in a lecture delivered by him at Norwich, including the story that "the ghost of old Blennerhassett drove every Christmas Eve, just before midnight, in a coach and six to visit Hassett's Tower. His horses were headless, but yet had fire flashing from their nostrils." It would be interesting to trace the origin of this tale, for John Blennerhassett appears to have "lived and died respected," but it may be that his son Thomas, actuated by remorse for the sale of his mother's patrimony, revisits the home of his youth. Since he has not been seen of late, his ghost may have been scared by the ugly new roof recently placed upon his "Tower" by the present lord of the Manor.<sup>3</sup>

The Thomas in the text was then an infant of but seven days old!, but it is possible that there may have been an elder son also named Thomas.

29th of June 1573, 15 Eliz.

In the name of god the flather the sone and the holle ghost, so be it. I John Bleverhaisett of Barsham by Beckellē in the Countie of Suff. Esquier do ordeine and make this my last will and testamēt in forme following. First I bequeath my soule to Allmightie god, and my bodie to be buried at Barsham aforesaid so nere my late wief as maie be. And I will haue written vpon my tombe or grave stone here lieth John Bleuerhaysett of Barsham and Marie his wief which Marye was yongest daughter and coheire of S<sup>r</sup> Edward Echingham, knight which Marie hadd yssue Thomas, Edward, John, George, and Richard five sonnes And daughters, Helen, Katherin, Fraunce and Anne. Item I giue and bequeath to my eldest sone Thomas Bleuerhaisett all my plate stuffe and utensiles of house and corne and catell vpon condition that he be loving naturall and kinde to all his brothers and systers in their necessyties. And if he shall refuse so to doe, I will the same equalle to be denyed amongst the resydue of my Children, for the better doing wherof I will that a perfit Inventarie be made therof the one parte to remaine with my executors, and the other with my superuisor. Item where S<sup>r</sup> Xpofor Heydon knight oweth me fliue hundreth markē for the mariage of my sone Thomas, and that Nicholas Mynne and William Mynne doe owe me likewise two hundreth markē and diners other debtē be due to me by dinerse other psons, I will that my executors in consideracon therof shall giue vnto my daughters nowe vnmarrid, viz. to Katherin Fraunce, and Anne at the daie of their mariage twoe hundreth poundē apeece. And if anye of my said daughters shall die before they come to mariage then the parte or porcon of suche as die shall goe to the survyvoor. Item I will and my mynde is that my said three daughters now vnmarrid shall haue yerlie towardē their fydinge and maintenance so longe as they shall be so vnmarrid fve poundē apeece to be paid halfe yerlie by my executors. Item I will and my mynde is if anye of mine executors or legataries shall willinglie or wittinglie breake or disannull anye parte of this my last will and testament then I will that he or they so breaking this my saied last will shall lose the vse and benefit of such legacies as be to them giuen. And then I will that it goe to the rest of my children. Item I giue and bequeth to my sone Thomas Bleuerhaysett my Mannor of Barsham with all the landē members and apurtinēce to ye same belonging in as large and ample manner as I purchased the same of S<sup>r</sup> Owen Hopton knight. And also all other my landē in Beckellē which I purchased of Robert Bowier, And all other my landē w<sup>ch</sup> I haue assured to my saied sone called Braham in Wetherynsett in the saied Countye of Suff vpon the mariage of the daughter of S<sup>r</sup> Xpofor Heydon knight in such sorte as by the assurance therupon made apeareth. Item I giue and bequeath to

Item I giue and bequeath to my sonnes John, George, and Richard, my lease of the Scite and demesnes of the mannor of Pittesey which I haue of the graunt of the late Duke of Norff the profitte therof cominge equalle to be denydel betwene them which lease I will shall remaine in the custodie of Sr Xpofer Heydon knight to the vse of the saied John, George, and Richard vntill they come to the age of xxj<sup>o</sup> yeares, yelding an Accompte yerlie of the profitte of the same to myne executours or ouerseer till they accomplishe their saied ages of xxj<sup>o</sup> yeres. Item I will and my mynde is that if god shall call me before the comeneent of the saied Lease Then my saied sone Thomas shall paie yerlie to euerie of my saied sonnes John, George and Richard the some of tenne pounde a peece towarde their fynding till the said lease be in Esse. Item I giue to Robert Haiseboroughe my seruante ye gelding that he nowe rydeth on and vj<sup>o</sup> in money. Item I giue to Robert Bradie my seruante the geldinge he rydeth vpon and fortie shillinge in money. Item I giue to my saied sone Edward the gelding that he rydeth vpon and tenne pounde in money. Item I giue to euerie one of my sone Throckmortons children fliue marke a peece. Item I giue to my daughter Gurney and to hir sone either of them fliue marke. Item I ordeine and make my saied sonnes Thomas and Edward and my sone in lawe Lyonell Throckmorton the executours of this my last will and testament, And supuisor of the same Sr William Cordell knight M<sup>r</sup> of the Rolls, to whom I giue for his paines therein tenne pounde. I will also that all other my lande and tenemente not before giuen or bequeathed shalbe soude by myne executours towarde the performance of this my last will and testament. In witnes hereof the parties hervynder named haue subscribed their names, the daie & yere aboue writen -p me Will<sup>m</sup> Dix, William Babham, W<sup>m</sup> Cantrelle John Gaylpin, W. Grene.

The above Will was proved at London 3 Feb. 1573-4 by Thomas Bleuerhaisett, one of the executors. Power reserved to Lionell Throckmorton, also an executor, Edward Bleuhaysett, the other executor, expressly renouncing.

ABSTRACT OF THE WILL OF THOMAS BLENNERHASSETT, 1599.  
(P.C.C. 35 Kidd).

1 May, 1599.

I Thomas Bleuerhaisett of the parish of Barsham in co. Suffolk, esq.

First, I declare myself to be a "member of Chryste comytting my soule into the hands of the everlastig Trynitye, three persons and one eternall God," &c. &c.

My body to be buried in Christian manner.

I will that the lands which I purchased in the names of my



brethren John Cornewallis & John Bleuerhaissett esq<sup>rs</sup> shall be sold by them at the best price, & the money arising thereof shall be paid over into the hands of Mary my wife, so that she give bond with sureties that all the said money after her decease shall be wholly given to my eldest son John Bleverhaissett; but if she refuse, then the said John Cornewallis & John Bleverhaissett shall bestow all the said money to be best proof they can & shall give that which shall arise of the use of it, allowing her after the rate of £10 for every £100 during her natural life, & after her death the whole stock to be given to my said John.

I give to Mary my wife 2 of my best beds with all the furniture thereof, & all her apparell & jewels; also my "Coche & Coche horses."

I give to my dau<sup>s</sup> Mary & Rachel Bleverhaissett all their apparell & jewels, 2 kine, 8 yearlings & 9 weaning calves, to be divided equally between them.

I will that after my debts are paid all the residue of my goods shall be sold & the money divided amongst all my children.

I make Mary my wife sole executrix.

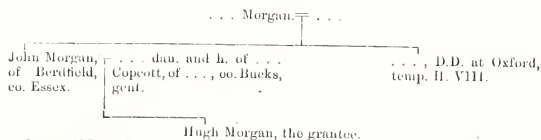

## Notices of Books.

THE SCOTS PEERAGE. Edited by Sir James Balfour Paul, Lord Lyon King of Arms. Vol. ii (Banff-Cranstoun). Edinburgh (David Douglas), 1905.

The second volume of the Scots Peerage acquires especial interest from the fact that three of the titles which it contains, Bellhaven, Borthwick, and Breadalbane, have since the date of Wood's "Douglas" been the subject of searching investigation by the judicial committee of the House of Lords, while a fourth, Caithness, though it has not yet been dealt with by that body, has passed to a distant heir, whose claims seem to require authoritative confirmation. In all these cases much light has been thrown upon the male line of the ancient Scottish houses which possess these historic peerages.

The territorial character of Scottish dignities has been little understood by Englishmen—it is to be feared even by English judges—and many instances may be found in this volume of those curious resignations into the hands of the sovereign, and regrants with a different remainder, which have resulted in so many apparently contradictory judicial decisions.





The student of history will on taking up this volume doubtless turn first to the articles on the ancient feudal Earldoms of Buchan, Caithness, and Carrick, which he will find treated with much perspicuity and learning. In the account of the Moray lords of Bothwell, Mr. W. B. Cook has made many changes in Wood's pedigree, removing the ancestor of the Earls of Sutherland from a later generation to Hugh, son of the original Freskin, and discarding John, son of Sir Andrew Moray, of Bothwell, whom Wood makes ancestor of the Drumsargard line. The early pedigree of the Lords Colville of Culross, which was left by Wood in an inchoate condition, has been skilfully handled by the Rev. J. Anderson.

Two of the articles in this volume, "Hepburn, Earl of Bothwell," and "Kennedy, Earl of Cassillis," have been wisely intrusted to writers who have a personal interest in the subject, and have devoted considerable labour to its investigation. Colonel Boyle has exhaustively worked out the younger branches of the house of Hepburn, and has made several important changes in the marriages of the family. He shows also that the celebrated Patrick Hepburn, Bishop of Moray, was not a son of the first Earl of Bothwell, but was of the Beinston line. It is remarkable that no evidence appears to exist of the original limitation of the Earldom of Bothwell, conferred in 1488—at least there is no allusion to it here. Lord Cassillis has given a lucid account of the house of Kennedy, which forms a concise and extremely interesting family history. The claim of the Kennedys to descend in the male line from the ancient Earls of Carrick is more modestly stated than in Wood's edition, being removed from the domain of certainty to that of probability or even possibility. The information given in note 6 on p. 445 seems to afford a clue of which more might perhaps have been made.

The copious references to authorities in footnotes give to this work a value to which no Peerage has as yet been able to lay claim, and the armorial illustrations by Mr. Graham Johnston are very artistic. One or two slips which should be rectified in the *Corrigenda* may be noted. On p. 232, "the bold Buccleuch" is said to have been born in 1565, though on the previous page the date of the marriage contract of his parents is given as 19 January, 1567-8. Under "Belhaven," on p. 44, the marriages of the daughters of James Hamilton, of Pencaitland, are omitted, and of one of these daughters, Rachel, wife of Sir William Weir, Bart., there is no mention.

THE PLANTAGENET ROLL OF THE BLOOD ROYAL. The Clarence Volume. By the Marquis of Ruvigny and Raineval. London (T. C. & E. C. Jack).

The author of this goodly tome has set before himself the truly formidable task of compiling a table of all the living descendants of Edward III, estimated by him in his preface as "some 50,000," though it is more probable that twice that number would be greatly below the mark. To a trained genealogist it will be apparent that such a scheme can never be completed in its entirety, but we have nothing



but praise and admiration for the manner in which it has been conceived and so far carried out. Unlike other works dealing with royal descents, this at all events aims at being exhaustive, and that is a great point. "The Blood Roll of Britain," which we noticed on its appearance some time ago, contained all the descendants of Edward IV and Henry VII whom the author was able to trace, and is now to be called the "Tudor Roll," while that under our consideration is to be termed the "Clarence Roll," and consists of the known posterity of Edward's unfortunate brother, George, Duke of Clarence. English readers will doubtless find it of much greater interest than the previous volume, which, to a great extent, is filled with the names of foreign princes and princesses, for the families recorded here are almost entirely English. The senior coheir of the Duke of Clarence is the Earl of Loudoun, being the representative of Katherine Pole, elder daughter of Henry, Lord Montagu, the eldest son of Margaret Plantagenet, Countess of Salisbury. The descendants of the younger sons of this celebrated princess are left much in the same condition as they were by Long in his "Royal Descents," the line of Arthur Pole, the second of these sons, being involved in much obscurity. To us, the most valuable and interesting feature of both the Tudor and Clarence Rolls is the attempt which has been made to indicate persons entitled to quarter the royal arms, a far greater distinction than the mere possession, derived through numerous families, of a feeble strain of royal blood.

Throughout the Roll there are several mis-spellings, misprints and typographical errors, which we have no space to enumerate, and which may well be forgiven in a work containing so many names, and involving so much labour. The illustrations include photogravures, beautifully executed from portraits, representing George, Duke of Clarence, and Isabel Nevill, his wife, Margaret, Countess of Salisbury, and Cardinal Pole.

SUFFOLK IN 1674, BEING THE HEARTH TAX RETURNS. Woodbridge (George Booth), 1905.

In this volume we have a further addition to an important series entitled "Suffolk Green Books," several of which have been noticed in previous numbers of this Magazine. The Hearth Tax, one of the most unpopular taxes ever levied in this country, furnishes the names of occupiers of houses in every parish of a county, and for Suffolk it appears that some 30,000 names appear upon the Return. The task of copying and indexing such a list requires patience and application, and is by no means an enviable one, yet the result brings into useful existence a record that is otherwise a hidden treasure. The transcript in this case has been made from the Return in the Public Record Office by Mr. J. J. Muskett, so we may rest assured that every effort has been made towards accuracy. The history of the Hearth Tax is given in the preface, and the Editor, to whom we are indebted for the excellent index, recites more or less *in extenso*, the Acts of Parliament which gave it effect, and attempts the difficult problem of arriving at an estimate of the population of the county at this period, from the



Return of its house-occupiers. Many curious names appear, of which Lingbolinge, Acoie, Itcheuer, Alewinckle, Alefounder, Sussum, and Sussimis may be cited as peculiar.

**THE FAMILY OF MULOCK.** By Sir Edmund Thomas Bewley, M.A., LL.D., Dublin. (Printed by Ponsoby & Gibbs, at the University Press.)

This is a carefully written family history, containing the descendants of Thomas Mulock or Mullock, of Ballynakill, in the parish of Dononaughta, County Galway, who was living in the middle of the seventeenth century. The pedigree has been drawn up in paragraph form on a somewhat novel system, which when it has once been mastered is simple enough, though a little difficult of comprehension at first sight. A tabular index is prefixed to the work, which will materially assist the reader. Among the descendants of this family was the late Mrs. D. M. Craik, authoress of that popular novel, "John Halifax, Gentleman," and an engraved portrait of this lady forms the frontispiece. Another descendant is Sir William Mulock, K.C.M.G., Postmaster-General of Canada. In the Appendix will be found a highly amusing letter, dated 9 Nov. 1770, written from London by Thomas Mulock, afterwards a member of the Irish Bar, describing the customs at that time in vogue at the Middle Temple, at which ancient Inn of Court he was then "eating his dinners."

**THE HERALDRY OF THE JOHNSTONS.** By G. Harvey Johnston. Edinburgh & London (W. & A. K. Johnston), 1905.

The scheme of this little work is well arranged, and the illustrations help to show at a glance the various coats used by individuals of this name. The accounts given of the best-known families go to make the collection interesting, but as no authorities are quoted, they are not of much value. The compiler believes that all Johnstons are descended from four groups which he names, and perhaps this fancy is shared by others, as we notice arms recorded to "other Johnstons," all of which suggest nearness of kin to the Johnstons of Annandale, in fact, a crest granted in 1901 is apparently identical with that of William, second Earl of Annandale. The collection includes official and assumed arms, and when the blazon is given it is peculiar, and must be unpleasant to those conversant with the science of heraldry.

**SUFFOLK MANORIAL FAMILIES,** being the County Visitations and other Pedigrees. Edited, with extensive Additions, by Joseph James Muskett. Vol. ii, Parts 5 and 6. Exeter (William Pollard & Co.).

At this moment when all Englishmen are thinking and talking of our great national hero, Horatio, Lord Nelson, attention may appropriately be called to these two parts of Mr. Muskett's "Suffolk Manorial Families," which contain an elaborate pedigree of the great Admiral's maternal ancestors, the Sucklings, of Woodton in Norfolk, and Barsham, in Suffolk, together with more than one royal descent which Nelson obtained through his mother, Catherine Suckling. In Part 6 is also



given, we believe for the first time, a pedigree of the Boltons, of Woodbridge, from whom the present holder of the Nelson title is in the male line derived, the lineage being carried back to Thomas Bolton, of Boyton, in Suffolk, whose will was proved in 1587, and whose son obtained a grant of arms from Camden in 1615 (*not* 1610, as appears, by an evident misprint, in the copy of the grant on p. 214). Part 6 includes a long pedigree of the Kemps of Gissing and Beccles, with transcripts of numerous evidences—a most acceptable feature of this valuable work, as it enables the reader to test the accuracy of the statements made in the tabular pedigrees. An Indenture enrolled on the Close Roll, 6 Edward IV. printed on p. 226, shows very clearly the relationship between the Kemps and the Butvilleins, from whom they acquired the manor of Gissing.

THE KNIGHT OF THE NEEDLE ROCK AND HIS DAYS, 1571-1606. By Mary J. Wilson. London (Elliot Stock).

As a rule works of fiction are not noticed in *The Genealogist*, but an exception may well be made in favour of this quaintly written tale, based as it is on family papers and authentic documents, including some original letters from the Loseley MSS., which have been deftly interwoven into the story. Never once does the writer lapse into modern ways of speaking or modes of thought, which is far more than can be said of the majority of authors of historical novels of much greater pretension. The scene is laid in the Isle of Wight, and the *dramatis personæ* are chiefly members of the families of Dingley, Leigh, Worsley, More, and Lyte.

THE PEDIGREE OF RINGSDUNE AND THE MANOR  
OF BLAYSWORTH.

In vol. xviii of *The Genealogist*, N.S., pp. 216-8, Mr. J. H. Round criticised a pedigree of the family of Ringsdune I had drawn from the Sempringham Charters and other records which up to that time had come to my knowledge. Accuracy being the first essential of genealogy, my thanks are due to him for that criticism, more especially as it has led to considerable research and to the discovery of further interesting facts about the family. The greater part of these I must reserve for a future occasion, and I will only now mention that there seems to be indisputable evidence of the existence of an Elyas de Ringsdune who disappears about the end of the reign of King John, and that Hugh was probably a younger brother; but that this Elyas was the husband of Orabilis, or was ever married, I have no proof, though probability favours that deduction. Yet there is no impossibility in a young Domesday tenant [A.D. 1086] having a son born late in life, and for that son to have lived far into the reign of Henry II [*e.g.* A.D. 1175] and shortly before his death to have wedded a young wife who was alive in 1243. Indeed it was pleaded in a case of dower in Mich. Term 53-4 Hen. III<sup>1</sup> that Mabel who had then married John Gubaud, a near neighbour of the Ringsdunes, was not 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> years of age when Gilbert, her first husband died, and consequently was not entitled to her dower. Thus considering the custom of the period and the undoubted fact that even in those days some persons lived to attain an advanced age, an interval of "nearly 160 years" between a Domesday tenant and the death of his daughter-in-law need not necessarily cause historians anxiety.

With a further identification from the *Oblata Roll*, 3 John, m. 12, which may have escaped Mr. Round's notice, through Adam de Ringsden being printed as Ada de Kingsdeñ, viz., in the list of Knights of the Bishop of Lincoln.—Adam de Ringsden holds *feoda c. militum*.—I pass to a later date.

It will be remembered that I stated in the note to the pedigree that at the time of his death (A.D. 1265) Sir Hugh de Ringsdune "was asserting a claim in Somerset."<sup>2</sup> We shall see from the following extracts that this arose from his marriage with Dame Isabella.

p. 145. At Ivelcestre in the quinzaine of St. John Baptist; between Nicholas son of Martin, claimant; and William Marescall tenent, in Haselberg—"and the same William, who Hugh de Ringesdon and Isabella his wife called to warrant."

41 Hen. III (A.D. 1256-7).

p. 179. At Exon in the quinzaine of St. Martin; between Nicholas de Boleville, querent; and William de Boleville and Ela his wife, deforciant; for two Knights' fees and a quarter in Sok Deneys.

Lastly in a fine levied—

42 Hen. III (A.D. 1257-8).

p. 180. At Westminster in three weeks of Trinity; between William de Bolevill, querent; and Nicholas de Bolevill, deforciant; for the fees of two Knights and the fifth part of the fee of one Knight in Sock Deneys.

We discover, that Ela was dead, and that there is an endorsement to the effect that Richard Pauncefot and Isabella his wife, Hugh de Ringesdon (printed Kingesdon) and Isabella his wife put in their claims.

With this clue we must retrace our steps towards Lincolnshire, and in the Counties of Cambridge and Huntingdon we shall be able further to elucidate our problem by the assistance of the Plea Rolls.

A suit relating to Blaysworth in Huntingdonshire runs as follows<sup>1</sup>:—

In a similar suit between the same parties relating to Hildersham in Cambridgeshire,<sup>4</sup> William le Daneys gives this pedigree:

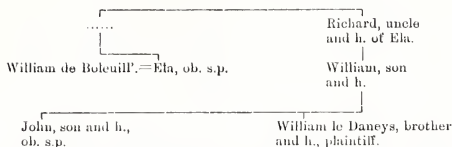

The case has also been entered on Ro. 5 d., but is erased with the word "alibi"; here Richard's son is given as John and not William.

In another suit with William le Moyne concerning land in Magna Stocton,<sup>1</sup> Richard and Isabella Pauncefot claim to hold "de hereditate que fuit cui<sup>o</sup>dam Ele la Danesch consang<sup>ne</sup>e ipius Isabe<sup>t</sup> ⁊ nepte cui<sup>o</sup>dam Isabe<sup>t</sup> de Ryngesdon ꝑticipis ipius Isabe<sup>t</sup> de he<sup>r</sup> ꝑd<sup>ca</sup>."

Also in the same roll William le Deueneys claims land in Uiford against Robert de Herefford, and in Bleyswre<sup>h</sup> against the Pauncefots, and we find a successful exception taken because "ide Wi<sup>l</sup>ls in narrac<sup>o</sup>e sua no<sup>i</sup>at ipm Wi<sup>l</sup>lm le Daneys ⁊ in b<sup>r</sup>i suo Wi<sup>l</sup>lm le Deueneis."

Up to the present, unfortunately, no pedigree has come to light which clears away all doubt, but whatever may be the correct descent, or the correct spelling of the name, we can at any rate clearly see whence Isabella de Ringesdune derived her origin, and with how many families of note she was connected.

Turning to the Victoria History of the County of Bedford, vol. i, in the hope of further assistance, at p. 386, under the endowments of the Priory of Bushmead, my attention was attracted by the statement—"with the manor of Blisworth, Northants<sup>9</sup>," and the note—

Now when there is any question it is always well to clearly set out the references from which the conclusions are drawn, so I will first cite those to be found in the Monasticon and which relate to that Priory.

Of what genealogy is this latter charter a proof? Why, that the three sisters were daughters not of Isabella Pauncefot, but actually, that they were the daughters of Matilda de Kuriel.

We will now see if greater reliance can be placed on the statement relating to the Manor, as deduced from the sources below.

This exhausts the references afforded by the note; even these, however, would seem of themselves sufficient to raise a doubt in the mind of a reader, and lead to the consultation of other authorities lying ready at hand, before the Manor of Blaysworth in Hunts was confused with that of Blisworth in Northants. What then does Bridges' History of Northamptonshire (Whalley), vol. i, pp. 334-5, say about Blisworth in that county? We are informed that the Domesday name was Blidesworde, that the manor with the advowson of the church was granted, in the first year of King John, by William de Ferrers Earl of Derby to William de Briwere, and that through this family they eventually passed to Baldwin Wake and his descendants, and that Lenton Priory had a portion there.

But lest it be said that my reference is taken from an old history not to be relied upon in these days of research, I will add yet another from vol. ii of the *Rotuli Hundredorum*, where at p. 680, under Huntingdon, we shall find:—

“MAGNA STOUTON CUM HAMELETT' BLAYSWORTH & MORA.”

Here for the present I end my paper, and I must leave my readers to judge for themselves whether the extract and note from the Victoria History are amongst those “whereby the history acquires a completeness and definite authority hitherto lacking in similar undertakings,” or whether they are not such as will cause future generations of historians and genealogists “at least to rub their eyes.”

This indenture made 18 November 1598 between Thomas Bleverhassett of Barsham in co. Suffolk, esq., of the one part, & Robert Lee, citizen & Alderman of London & Mary his wife of the other part, witnesses that the said Thomas Bleverhassett in consideration of the sum of £3,600 to him in hand paid by the said Robert Lee, has granted to the said Robert & Mary & the heirs of their bodies, and for default, to the heirs of the said Robert for ever, all that the manor of Barsham by Beckles with appurt's in co. Suffolk, and all the messuages, tofts, mills, dovehouses, barns, stables, gardens, lands, woods, underwoods, heaths, moors, fishings, fowlings, liberties of hawking, fishing, fowling & hunting, rents, free warrens, courts leet, &c., &c., &c., situate & extending in Barsham by Beckles, Ringesfield, Reddisham, Shipmedowe, Beckles, Ingate, Weston, Worlingham, & Northcove in co. Suffolk, to the said manor of Barsham in anyway belonging ; also all the manors, lands, tenements, meadows, feedings, pastures & other hereditaments lying and extending in Barsham aforesaid between the Queen's highway leading from Beckles to Bungay on the south part & the common river dividing the counties of Suffolk & Norfolk on the north part, which late were of John Bleverhassett, esq., deceased, late father of the said Thomas ; also all other the manors, lands, tenements, meadows, feedings, pastures, woods, underwoods, rents,



reversions, services & other hereditaments of him the said Thomas in Barsham, Ringesfield, Reddisham, Shipmedowe, Beckles, Ingate, Weston, Worlyingham & Northcove, with all their rights, members & appurt's, also the advowsons & right of patronage of & in the Churches & rectories of Barsham by Beckles & Shipmeadowe in co. Suffolk; together with the reversions & remainders of the said Thomas in the premises; & all the deeds, evidences, charters, Letters Patent, &c., &c., concerning the premises: all which said deeds the said Thomas Beverhassetts covenants to deliver to the said Robert & Mary before the feast day of Pentecost now next ensuing at the now dwelling house of the said Thomas in Barsham uncanceled, undefaced or made void. To have & to hold the said manor of Barsham & other the premises to the said Robert Lee & Mary his wife & the heirs of their bodies, & for default, to the heirs of the said Robert Lee for ever.

The said Thomas B. grants that he at the sealing & delivery of these presents is lawfully seised in his demesne as of fee of a good estate of inheritance in the law in fee simple to the only use of him the said Thomas & his heirs without any conditions or other alteration of use in the said manor & other the premises; & that all the said premises now are & for ever after shall continue to be to the said Robert & Mary & their heirs for ever free & discharged of & from all former bargains, sales, grants, uses, entails, &c., had, made or done by the said Thomas Beverhassetts & his heirs, or by John Beverhassetts his father, or by Owen Hopton, knight, de'ed., & Anne his wife one of the daughters & coheirs of Sir Edward Echingham, knight, de'ed., or by the said Sir Edward Echingham or any other persons claiming from the said Thomas Beverhassetts, the grant of the next avoidance of the rectory & parsonage of Barsham made by the said Thomas to Edward Tayesborowe & John Bacon, gent., the yearly sum of 20s. payable to the hospital of Beckles, & the rents payable to the chief lords & lords of the fee thereof only excepted.

And the said Thomas B. further grants that he & Mary his wife & John B., gent., son & heir of the said Thomas, & all other persons claiming any lawful estate in the said premises, except the said Edward Tayesborowe & John Bacon claiming the next avoidance of said rectory, & the Master & wardens of the said Hospital of Beckles, claiming only the said yearly rent of 20s., & the chief lords claiming only by virtue of their seignories shall from time to time hereafter at the request of the said Robert & Mary for 5 years next ensuing make & do any such further acts & deeds as by the said Robert & Mary shall be required, provided that the said Thomas B. & Mary his wife be not compelled to travel further than the counties of Norfolk or Suffolk or the City of Norwich for the making of any such further assurances.

Memorandum that on the day & year abovesaid the said Thomas Beverhassetts, esq., came before the Queen in her Chancery & acknowledged the said indenture & all things therein contained.

Robert Lee, afterwards Sir Robert, the purchaser of the Barsham estates, was a native of Bridgnorth, in Shropshire, an Alderman of



London, and a prominent member of the Merchant Taylors' Company. He resided in the parish of St. Andrew Undershaft, in the city of London, where by his will, dated 20 April 1602, and proved P.C.C. 21 Feb. 1605-6 (69 Stafford), he desired to be buried.<sup>1</sup> The Inquisition taken after his death 21 Feb. 4 James I. 1606-7,<sup>2</sup> shows that he was possessed of considerable property in the city of London, including a capital messuage in the parish of St. Mary-at-Hill, formerly belonging to Richard, late Earl of Kent, and a house in the parish of St. Andrew Undershaft; also of the manor of Lawcell, otherwise Lawshall, in Suffolk, which he had purchased for £4,400 from Edward Rookwood, of Euston, Esq., and others, 15 May 40 Eliz. (1598), various properties in the counties of Middlesex, Northampton and Warwick, and also of the manor and advowson of Barsham, together with lands in several neighbouring parishes, which last, as stated above, he had acquired from Thomas Blennerhassett, by deed dated 18 Nov. 1598. Sir Robert Lee died in London, 22 Dec. 1605, leaving his second wife, Mary, dau. of Sir James Hawes, Kut., surviving him, and four sons and two daughters, viz. :—

- I. Sir Henry Lee, who was aged 27 years and upwards at his father's death, and succeeded him in the possession of the manor of Lawshall. The I.P.M. taken upon his death shows that he died 21 Jan. 1619-20,<sup>3</sup> leaving by his first wife, Mary, two sons, John<sup>4</sup> and Thomas, both under age at their father's death.
- II. Sir Robert Lee; upon him and Anne his wife his father, by fine levied 13 Eliz., gave certain interests in the manor and advowson of Billesley, co. Warwick. He had issue.
- III. Sir John Lee, under the age of 21 at date of his father's will, and of whom hereafter.
- IV. Hugh Lee, under the age of 21 at date of his father's will.

- I. Joane, married before the date of her father's will, William Gore, Citizen and Merchant Taylor of London.<sup>1</sup>
- II. Anne, born about 1587, mar. in 1605, Thomas Cecil, son of Thomas, 1st Earl of Exeter.<sup>2</sup>

Sir John Lee, the third of these sons, was born in or about 1588, and was probably by his father's second marriage. He was of Whitehorse Street, in the parish of Stepney, co. Middlesex,<sup>3</sup> and was made Keeper of the Ordnance Stores at the Tower of London in 1618. He was twice married, first to Sarah Woodward, who was buried at Stepney, 27 Dec. 1625, and secondly (licence from Bishop of London, 5 Nov. 1633), to Joane,<sup>4</sup> widow of Henry Lott, of Stepney. By an Indenture, dated 18 April 1602, which is set out in the Inquisition taken upon the death of his father, Sir Robert Lee, the latter settled upon him and the heirs of his body (with certain remainders) the manor and mansion house of Barsham, commonly called Barsham Hall, together with the lands held therewith, and the advowsons of the churches of Barsham and Shipmeadow. All these properties he sold by the following deed, to Sir John Suckling, Knt., Comptroller of the Household of King James I, 22 July 1623. Sir John Lee died in 1642.<sup>5</sup> It is doubtful if he ever resided at Barsham,<sup>6</sup> and no entries relating to the family of Lee can be found in the Parish Registers.

On the 23rd of July in the said year the said Sir John Lee came & acknowledged the said indenture & all things therein contained.

Or a lion rampant gules, a crescent upon a crescent for difference, and the Crest, on a wreath of the colours A leopard's face gules, differenced as the Arms.



GEORGE BLACKMAN, OF DURDENS, CO. SURREY, ESQ., 16 May 1803.

Grant, dated 16 May 43 George III, 1803, by Sir Isaac Heard, Knight, Garter, to George Blackman of Durdens in the parish of Epsom, co. Surrey, Esquire, of these Arms, vizt., Ermines three lions rampant 2 and 1 or, within a bordure of the last charged with eight crescents azure, and for his Crest, on a wreath of the colours a demy gryphon wings elevated argent, semée of crescents azure beaked and membered or collared gules.

ROWLAND, BARON HILL, 28 May 1812. (SUPPORTERS.)

Grant dated 28 May 5 Victoria, 1812, by Sir William Woods, Knight, Garter, to Rowland Baron Hill and to his successors in title of these Supporters, -on the Dexter side, A lion gules murally crowned and gorged with a wreath of oak or; and on the Sinister side, A horse argent gorged with a mural crown, the bridle and saddle gules.

ANNE, 2ND VISCOUNTESS HILL, 16 December 1811. (ARMS FOR CLEGG.)

Grant dated 16 December, 8 Victoria, 1811, by Sir J. C. 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[The three last Grants are in the possession of the Hill family, and were exhibited at the Exhibition of Shropshire Antiquities, held at Shrewsbury in May 1898. The Grant of Supporters was made to the celebrated General Lord Hill; he died unmarried, 10 December 1842, but had obtained in his Patents the insertion of a remainder of his titles to his nephew, Sir Rowland Hill, who married Anne Clegg, and became second Viscount Hill.]

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JAMES BELLAERS, OF STAMFORD, CO. LINCOLN, GENT., 30 April 1776.

Grant dated 30 April, 16 George III, 1776, by Thomas Browne, Esquire, Garter, and Ralph Bigland Esquire, Clarenceux, to James Bellaers of Stamford and of Ullington co. Lincoln, gentleman, son of James Bellaers of St. Martin's Stamford Baron, co. Northampton, gentleman deceased of these Arms, -Quarterly Gules and Azure a Lion Rampant Argent dueally crowned, in chief two garbs or, and for





his Crest, on a wreath of the Colours, a Horse's head coupé Argent, in the mouth a Leaf of oak vert,—to be borne by him and his descendants and by the descendants of his father James Bellaers aforesaid.

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ABEL WALFORD BELLAERS, OF STAMFORD, CO. LINCOLN, ESQ.,  
9 March 1782.

Grant dated 9 March, 22 George III, 1782, by Ralph Bigland Esquire Garter and Isaac Heard Esquire Clarenceux, to Abel Walford Bellaers of Stamford, co. Lincoln, Esquire, eldest son of James Bellaers of Ullington, Esquire, by Mary his first wife, elder daughter and coheir of Abel Walford of Birmingham co, Warwick, gentleman deceased,—he being desirous of having some alteration in the Arms of his family, and of exemplifying the Arms of Walford, Argent a Fess and in chief a Lion passant Gules, to be borne by the descendants of his mother, and by those of her only sister Susanna late wife of John Clark of London gentleman,—of these Arms, Quarterly 1 and 4. Argent a Cross gules on a chief azure an Eagle displayed between two cross-crosslets fitchy or, for *Bellaers*, 2 and 3. Argent a Fess and in chief a Lion passant gules for *Walford*. And for his Crest, out of a mural crown or a Demi-Lion rampant gules in the Paws a Staff proper thereon a Banner displayed of the Arms of Walford. To be borne by him the said Abel Walford Bellaers, and his brothers John and James, and their descendants, and the Coat of Walford to be borne also by the descendants of Susanna Clark aforesaid.

Grant dated 7 April, 25 George III, 1785, by Isaac Heard, Esquire, Garter and Thomas Lock, Esquire, Clarenceux, being an alteration in the Crest granted to Abel Walford Bellaers on 9 March 1782, to the said Abel Walford Bellaers, of this Crest, Out of a mural Crown gold a demi Lion rampant gules holding between his paws a Cross-Croslet fitchy or, to be borne by him the said Abel Walford Bellaers and his descendants, and by his brothers John and James Bellaers and their descendants.

ABEL WALFORD BELLAERS, ESQ., 16 May 1786. (ALTERATION IN ARMS.)

Grant dated 16 May, 26 George III, 1786, by Isaac Heard, Esquire, Garter, and Thomas Lock, Esquire, Clarenceux, to Abel Walford Bellaers, Esq.,—being an alteration in the Arms granted to Abel Walford Bellaers Esquire on 9 March 1782, and exemplifying the Arms to be placed on any monument to his grandmother Catherine, daughter and heiress of John Lea of Braceborough, co. Rutland, gentleman, by Catherine his wife daughter and heiress of — Foote,—of these Arms, vizt., Quarterly, 1, Ermine a Lion rampant gules on a chief engrailed sable a Leopard's face between two Cross Croslets fitchy or, for *Bellaers*. 2, Azure a chevron Erminois between three Grillins passant gold, for *Lea*. 3, Gules a Fess vair Erminois and Azure between three



Escallops Argent, for *Foote*. 4, The Coat of *Walford*; and on an Helmet of his Degree the Crest of his Family as the same is in the margin depicted [*i.e.* a demi Lion rampant gules holding between his paws a cross crosslet fitchy or].

On the Grants of 7 April 1785 and 16 May 1786, is endorsed a memorandum, dated 28 July 1788, and signed by Roger Bigland, Richmond Herald, that the within named Abel Walford Bellaers Esquire and his brother James Bellaers now write their name Bellairs, as appears by an entry made in Register 7th D. 14, fo. 40, in the Heralds' College.

[The last four Grants are in the possession of Colonel George Clarke Bellairs, V.D., late of the Newark, Leicester. They display in a marked degree the changeableness of Mr. Abel Walford Bellaers, as regards his armorial bearings. The Grants successively give his motto as "*Nihil sine cruce*," "*Virtus dum patitur vincit*," and "*Virtus tutissima cassis*." Pedigrees of this family are given in Blore's "*Rutland*," and Fletcher's "*Leicestershire Pedigrees and Royal Descents*."]

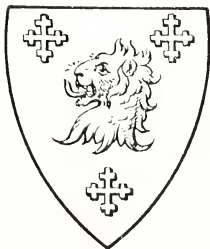

GEORGE WILLIAM MARSHALL,  
YORK HERALD.

George William Marshall was the only child of George Marshall, of Ward End House, in the parish of Aston-juxta-Birmingham, Warwickshire, and Eliza Henshaw, his wife, daughter of John Comberbach, of Langley Hall, Salop; and he was born at Ward End House on the 19th April 1839.

His father and grandfather were both partners in the Birmingham banking house of Spooner and Attwood. The former will be remembered by some numismatists as the author of *A View of the Silver Coin and Coinage of Great Britain from the year 1662 to 1837 . . . and Silver Coins struck in Scotland from 1662 to 1707* (London, 1837, 8vo, pp. 152). He formed a considerable collection of coins which were sold at Sotheby's in 1852.

Having been educated privately and at St. Peter's College, Radley, Marshall entered Magdalen College, Cambridge, in 1858, but migrated to Peter House in the following year. He graduated as a Bachelor of Laws in 1861, subsequently took the degree of LL.M. and became LL.D. in the University of Cambridge in 1874. In 1862 he entered as a student at the Middle Temple, was called to the bar on the 9th June 1865, and practised for a short time on the Oxford Circuit.

On the 30th May 1872 he was elected a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries. He was also a Corresponding Member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society of Boston, U.S.A., a Member of the Council of the Harleian Society since its foundation, and one of the founders of the Parish Register Society.

In the year 1887 he was appointed Rouge Croix Pursuivant of Arms, and became York Herald in 1901. He was present officially at the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria, at the Queen's funeral, at the Coronation of the King, at the marriage of the Princess Maud, now Queen of Norway, and at the funeral of Mr. Gladstone.

In 1891 he was placed in the Commission of the Peace for the County of Hereford, and served as High Sheriff of the same County in 1902, when he was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant.

Marshall was for a number of years much interested in Freemasonry. He was initiated in the Isaac Newton University Lodge, Cambridge, and raised to the degree of a Master Mason in the same lodge in 1862; joined the Euclid Chapter, Cambridge, in 1866; was subsequently Master of St. Michael's Lodge, Tenbury, Worcestershire; became a member of the lodge of St. Ambrose, London, in 1891; and was Principal of the Bard of Avon Chapter, London, in 1887, as well as a Provincial Officer for Middlesex.

His interest in genealogy, it is believed, was very early developed; but it was as an undergraduate at Cambridge, with the advantages of the University Library, that he first seriously commenced those genealogical investigations which were, during the rest of his life, to form his chief working interest and hobby. Like most other



genealogists, he began by elucidating the history of his own family, and his *Miscellanea Marescalliana*, which fills 744 closely printed pages, is a record of the most elaborate and exhaustive research ever made and published by one person in regard to the history of any name of average occurrence. Of this work fifty copies were printed for private distribution, but much of the more generally interesting matter which it contains had already been contributed by the author to various genealogical serials.

The collection of manuscripts formed by Marshall was of considerable extent and, besides many volumes of abstracts of wills, pedigrees and miscellaneous genealogical extracts and notes, chiefly in his own clear handwriting, contains a complete series of the Nottingham Marriage Licenses during a great number of years. All these manuscripts were either given by him to the College of Arms during his lifetime or passed to that corporation under his will. It is fortunate that such important collections will be preserved in so appropriate a resting place; more especially as it is understood that a copious index to them is now being made under the supervision of the Officers of Arms. His extraordinary industry in collecting genealogical materials from a multitude of sources enabled him to communicate to his friends and correspondents many unpublished facts of value, which were most willingly given and always highly appreciated on account of his well known accuracy and the wide extent of his experience. In his work thoroughness and accuracy were almost intuitive and he held laziness and carelessness in contempt. Spare time of even a few minutes duration was generally occupied by him in writing up his manuscript collections, in annotating the *Genealogist's Guide*, in making some index, or the like, so that a large quantity of purely clerical work was accomplished almost imperceptibly.

A list of the printed works of York Herald will be found at the end of this memoir, and it is believed that this list is practically a complete one. He was formerly, however, a frequent contributor to *The Genealogist*, *Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica*, *The Reliquary*, *Notes and Queries*, and *The East Anglian*; some of his early articles may also be found in the journal of *The Anthropological Society* and *The St. James's Magazine*.

The work by which his name is best known to antiquaries is his *Genealogists' Guide*, a monument of laborious effort which could only have been performed by a man of indomitable perseverance and industry. In every part of the world where the history of English families excites any interest this book is well known and highly appreciated. It serves the purpose of a ready means of reference to printed pedigrees of three or more generations in all the well known genealogical and topographical works and also in a multitude of out-of-the-way or forgotten books, many of them seemingly not suggestive of genealogical information.

His extensive experience in examining old wills and his practical knowledge of the places where particular records might be found, enabled him to print his *Handbook to the Ancient Courts of Probate*, a work which few, if any, other among living genealogists could



have made so complete, and in which his thoughtfulness and accuracy are apparent.

In 1877 he founded *The Genealogist*, wishing to supply a means for the publication of more lengthy genealogical papers than those for which the *Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica* was intended, and to print from time to time readable communications such as had previously appeared in the *Herald and Genealogist*. Seven annual volumes of *The Genealogist* were issued under his editorship and found much favour among students of history.

He resided at various country houses in different counties before he finally, in the year 1891, bought the Sarnesfield Court estate in Herefordshire, formerly the seat of the Morningsons and previously that of a family bearing the local name, one of whom, Sir Nicholas de Sarnesfield, was a Knight of the Garter and Standard Bearer to King Richard II. His London houses in Onslow Gardens and at Barnes will be agreeably remembered by many of his genealogical friends, who will also recall the pleasure they derived from an examination of his extensive collection of armorial china, his specimens of mediæval armorial glass and, above all, his rich heraldic and genealogical library, all now preserved at Sarnesfield Court.

In the country, outside his genealogical pursuits, his real interest lay in the improvement of his property and the welfare of those around him, with the result that he left his estate in every way in a greatly improved condition as compared with that in which he found it. He was fond of shooting as an amusement for himself and his friends, and until late years, being a good walker, he found much of the pleasure of his out-door life in this pursuit. Those who visited him in the country sometimes joined in excursions to the old churches, for the most part unspoiled by restoration, in which Herefordshire abounds; excursions usually productive of something in the way of monumental inscriptions and heraldry which could be added to his manuscript collections.

In politics, Marshall never took a very active interest, but he was a consistent Conservative.

He died at Holmbush, Barnes, on the 12th September and was buried at Sarnesfield on the 16th September, 1905. The coffin, covered with his family pall, on which was placed the tabard of York Herald, with the collar of SS., sword and cap, being borne by the tenantry and workmen among whom he had lived to its resting place in the family vault. To the little Early English Church of Sarnesfield he was much attached, and one of the improvements, which his regard for it and antiquities in general had long made him determine to perform, was the removal of the objectionable work, inserted during a so-called restoration in 1870, and the true restoration of this interesting building, as nearly as possible, to its original state. This was actually occupying his attention almost up to the time of his death, and it may be hoped that his wishes in this respect will not long remain unfulfilled.

He was twice married and leaves issue six sons and two daughters.

A few words as to the personal characteristics of Marshall, as one of his most intimate friends knew him, may not be out of place.





Beneath a quiet, somewhat reserved demeanour there was much real character and power of observation, the existence of which might well remain unsuspected by a casual acquaintance. Strong convictions guided his conduct and he was not readily influenced by contrary opinions, though always willing to discuss questions fairly. Anything like acrimonious argument, however, he was at pains to avoid. Very pronounced likes and dislikes regulated his communications with his fellow men. For genealogists he had an especial liking, and he derived real pleasure from affording help to *bona-fide* workers. His interest in heraldry and genealogy was to obtain unequivocal facts, to record and make them available for the use of others, and so to arrive, when possible, at the plain truth. He had no "axe to grind." A diligent worker after truth, he had scant patience with shams, ostentation, carelessness, inaccuracy and laziness, and he could speak quite plainly in condemning these faults; but his really kindly disposition, largely concealed under a quite undemonstrative exterior, led him to perform many friendly acts, and these were usually done with a quiet, rather quaint, diffidence of manner. He greatly appreciated little kindnesses from others and remembered them.

A cheerful and genial host, blessed with a keen sense of humour, there ran through his conversation a vein of sarcastic jocularity, never unkindly aggressive, and invariably attractive, which lent savour to his remarks. Oftentimes his way of relating stories of some of his heraldic and genealogical experiences would afford amusement that created a lasting impression.

He regarded heraldry as a serious science and one in which there was hidden interest as well as instruction. "I believe most of the old coats *cant*," he said, "and if we only knew how and why, they would be a good deal more interesting than they are. We can get at some of the *cants*, and though they may seem rather far fetched to the average man, we must remember that the power of language is limited in heraldry, and that many words and allusions have been quite obsolete and forgotten for a very long time."

His loss to the Heralds' College, in which he felt the warmest interest, is undoubtedly great. He was a keen antiquary and yet wishful to move with the times, eminently businesslike and true in his dealings, endowed with an intuitive power of research and a genius for taking pains, possessing a lawyer's carefulness for accuracy and conciseness, and a gentleman's aversion to whatever seemed to him extravagant or inappropriate. He was, moreover, a courteous acquaintance and a true friend.

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## Notices of Books.

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THE GREAT ROLL OF THE PIPE FOR THE TWENTY-THIRD YEAR OF THE REIGN OF KING HENRY THE SECOND, A.D. 1176-1177. (Pipe Roll Society.) London (Spottiswoode & Co.).

It would be superfluous to insist on the value of the Pipe Rolls to students of early genealogy. The mere fact that a single entry sometimes gives the Christian names of three generations and so, where the identification is complete, carries back a pedigree for nearly a century at a period when we have little other evidence



than these fiscal records, is alone sufficient to establish their importance. It is, moreover, in several cases possible to trace from the Roll before us the owner of a particular manor, as for instance, where Robert de Dudanville pays a relief for his land at Glatton, co. Huntingdon. The numerous payments for having custody of minors are of great value, but the entries relating to marriage are not so interesting as in the Roll of the previous year, referring chiefly to further instalments of sums already partially liquidated. Taking Mr. Round's necessarily brief preface to this volume as our guide, but not confining ourselves entirely to his remarks, a few instances of the valuable evidence as to relationship which this Roll affords, may here be enumerated. Under Dorset and Somerset, Thomas *nepos* of the Earl of Gloucester and Richard, his son, return an account of twenty marks *pro foresta*, part of which the King pardons by writ to Richard de Grenville, the father of Thomas. On p. 61 there is mention of Robert and Henry, uncles of Earl Ferrers, and on p. 107, of Helyas de Amundeville and his brothers William and Walter. Under Shropshire, Roger de Powis is found holding *per regem* the land which had been held by his brother Jonas. Under Devonshire, Oliver de Tracy returns an account of £299 13s. for his part of the honour of Barnstaple, while under Sussex we find William de Braose recorded as owing 1,000 marks for his share of the same honour. Under Sussex, too, is an entry relating to a fine between Richard and William de Cahagnes concerning a partition of their lands. Under Lincolnshire, Drogo, son of Ralph, accounts for sums paid to his deceased brother Walter de Grimsby, who had been Sheriff of the County.

The following persons are on the Roll recorded as dead:—Fulke de Horselega, Philip de Cailloei, William de Insula, Walter de Grimsby (above mentioned), David Archdeacon of Buckingham, Galfridus Bursarius (of London), and Peter de Sancto Medardo.

The following (excluding those mentioned on the previous Roll) were charged for reliefs:—

HONOUR OF WILLIAM PEVERELL.—Ralph, son of William.

HONOUR OF EARL CONAN.—Nigel, son of the Chamberlain (*filius Cam'*).

ESSEX AND HERTS.—Eustace, son of Eustace, son of the Count (*quam nondum habet*).

Mr. Round in his Introduction alludes to the interesting discussion which has arisen concerning the Forest Fines, which some antiquaries of great experience have considered to have been in reality inflicted as a punishment for rebellion. The whole subject is worthy of further investigation and of being treated at greater length.

The volume closes with a most satisfactory Index, which includes the names of both persons and places.



COLLECTIONS FOR A HISTORY OF STAFFORDSHIRE, edited by The William Salt Archeological Society, Vol. viii, New Series. THE REGISTERS OF THE BISHOPS OF COVENTRY AND LICHFIELD. Book V, being the Second Register of Bishop Robert de Stretton, A.D. 1360-1385, abstracted by the Rev. Rowland A. Wilson, M.A. London (Harrison & Sons).

This volume will appeal to a larger class of readers than do those ordinarily issued by the Salt Society, for the original Diocese of Coventry and Lichfield was far more extensive than the County of Stafford, including also the whole of Cheshire and Derbyshire, as well as considerable portions of Lancashire, Shropshire and Warwickshire. It has, therefore, been wisely decided to issue these Diocesan Registers separately, so that they may be acquired by persons who do not desire to become members of the Salt Society.

It would be a mistake to suppose that the Episcopal Registers contain a mere record of ecclesiastical events, for in the Middle Ages the laity were almost as much under the Bishop's jurisdiction as were the clergy. The numerous dispensations relating to marriage, of which there are a considerable number scattered throughout this volume, are invaluable to genealogists. Some of these were granted to permit a wedding ceremony to take place in a particular place named, and others to allow persons of kin to marry, always a source of revenue to the Church. One of the most curious is the dispensation of John de Halun and Joan, his wife, who had "contracted a clandestine marriage and consummated it. Afterwards fears arose as to its validity, because Joan's first husband had once received a boy of the said John from the font at baptism." A dispensation granted in 1366 for the marriage of Peter, son of Hamon Fyton, with Joan, daughter of Sir John Danvell, Knt., related in the fourth degree, was expressly desired to put an end to a family feud.

Most interesting also are the cases in which the Bishop was directed to report to the Judges at Westminster in questions of legitimacy, and these often explain difficult points of pedigree which are to be found recorded on the Rolls of the Court of King's Bench. A good example occurs in the proceedings relating to the legitimacy of Henry de Torbok, which commencing in the King's Court in 1341, were at length determined by the report of the Bishop in favour of Henry's claims 25 April 1373.

An illustration of the way in which youthful heiresses were often forced by designing relatives or guardians to take religious vows, is afforded by the petition, recited on p. 149, of Margaret de Prestewych, who complains that, when about eight years of age, she had been compelled to enter the Priory of the Nuns of Seton as a novice and was detained there against her will. After being carried to church and blessed by a monk, she managed to escape, becoming afterwards the wife of Robert de Holand, and obtaining release from her vows. The Episcopal Registers were sometimes made use of for the purpose of recording facts of importance which might otherwise have been forgotten, as where William Thiknes





appeared on 22 Sept. 1378 and made a disclosure as to his three marriages, in order to establish the succession of his heirs after his death, the circumstances narrated being not a little curious.

Other entries, which relate more particularly to ecclesiastics and conventual establishments, must not be passed over without notice. Evidence is obtained that the local clergy were taken from much the same classes of the community as they now are in the English Church, some of them possessing landed property of their own, and being of good social status. A statement on p. 98 concerning the "notorious" condition of Kenilworth Priory, and the decree on p. 118 issued to the Prioress and Convent of Farewell, show the commencement of those irregularities which contributed so greatly to the suppression of the Monasteries nearly two centuries afterwards. The frequent dispensations to clerics to hold benefices though born of a priest and "a single woman," seem to prove how prone the English clergy were to contract clandestine marriages.

The Ordination Lists which fill so large a portion of this volume, are of comparatively little interest and might well have been omitted, in favour of the Institutions to Benefices, which would have been far more acceptable.

Mr. Wilson's abstracts appear to have been made with great judgment, and his Introduction displays considerable acquaintance with ecclesiastical history.

THE RUTHVEN OF FREELAND PEERAGE AND ITS CRITICS. By J. H. Stevenson. Glasgow (James MacLehose & Sons).

The Barony of Ruthven of Freeland was conferred on Sir Thomas Ruthven, a cadet of the ancient family of Ruthven (which had enjoyed the earlier peerage of Ruthven, together with the Earldom of Gowrie), between 30 March 1651 and 24 May of the same year—that is, a few months after the coronation of Charles II at Scone. It may be owing to the disturbed state of the political atmosphere at the time that no record of the patent can be found in the Great Seal Register. As long ago as 1716, only fifteen years after the death, s.p., of David, the second Baron Ruthven of this line, Crawford in his Peerage expressed an opinion that the title had become extinct through failure of male issue of the grantee, though we gather from a footnote on p. 36 that in 1731 he changed his mind, possibly on better information as to the terms of the patent, which may then have been in existence, though it has long since disappeared. In 1833 John Riddell made a trenchant attack upon this title in his *Remarks upon Scotch Peerage Law*, and in 1881 he was followed on the same lines by Mr. J. H. Round in *Collectanea Genealogica* (part xiii, pp. 167-186), and more recently in his *Peerage Studies*. G. E. C. in the *Complete Peerage* has also forcibly maintained the view that the Ruthven of Freeland title has ceased to exist. All these learned writers impute bad faith to those who assumed the dignity after the death of David Lord Ruthven in April 1701, and Sir Robert Douglas, who retained the title in his Peerage, his editor John Philip Wood, the Union



Roll of 1707, on which the Barony appears, and even the Report of the Court of Session to the House of Lords in 1740, which expressed no doubts as to its existence, came in for a share of blame. Hitherto the controversy has been more or less one-sided, but Mr. Stevenson, well known on the other side of the Tweed as an antiquary of approved ability and judgment, now comes forward as a champion for the defence. There can be no doubt that he has stated his case with cogent reasoning, great lucidity and commendable moderation of language; his remarks concerning the value of the Union Roll and the Report of 1740 being deserving of careful consideration.

It appears to be admitted both by Mr. Round and Mr. Stevenson that the assumption of the title on the death of David, second Lord Ruthven followed, rightly or wrongly, the limitations of an entail which he executed of his estates, by which he postponed the issue of his two elder sisters to his youngest but only surviving sister Jean, who was, as Mr. Stevenson shows, in legal documents and processes frequently styled Jean, Lady Ruthven. But if this assumption was lawful, Lord Ruthven must either have resigned his Barony into the hands of the Crown and obtained a re-grant with the limitations of his entail, in which case some evidence of such a transaction should be forthcoming; or the original patent must have provided that the dignity should follow an entail not in existence at its creation, which does not seem probable. It by no means follows, however, that Jean Ruthven's successors, who were heirs of line as well as heirs of entail, had not a more valid claim to the peerage.

THE PEDIGREE OF HUNTER OF ABBOTSHILL AND BARJARG. Compiled by Andrew Alexander Hunter. London (Elliot Stock).

The Hunters of Abbotshill appear to have derived from the Hunters of Hunterston, but although as early as 1685 one of them is stated to have descended from that family, and in spite of "a thorough investigation" made at the instance of the late Mr. Robert Hunter of Hunterston in 1880, evidence has not as yet been found to prove the connection. The volume sets out the genealogy from James Hunter, who acquired Abbotshill in 1569, and is brought down to date, including the cadets who founded houses of their own, namely, Hunter of Bonnytoun and Doonholm, Hunter-Blair of Blairquhan, Hunter of Auchterarder, and Hunter of Thurston. In arranging his work the author has pursued a simple and concise plan which is to be commended. First appears a chart pedigree of Abbotshill and Barjarg (the present estate of the head of the family), then follow a short history of the estate acquired, the armorial bearings, the "lineage," and lastly the family portraits. This arrangement is used in each case, and so we have the parent stem and its four cadet lines distinct one from the other.

The illustrations are numerous and well executed; the matriculations of arms, of which eight are given, as also a page of book-plates, being well worth studying as examples of the Scottish system



of heraldry. Some of the portraits, the majority of which can only appeal to the Hunter family, might we think, have been reproduced by a better process than that employed.

BLAKE FAMILY RECORDS 1600 TO 1700. SECOND SERIES. A CHRONOLOGICAL CATALOGUE WITH NOTES, APPENDICES, AND THE GENEALOGIES OF MANY BRANCHES OF THE BLAKE FAMILY. By Martin J. Blake, of Lincoln's Inn, Barrister-at-Law. London (Elliot Stock).

Though hardly so interesting as the unique collection of deeds contained in the first series of the Blake Family Records, which appeared in 1902, the documents catalogued in this volume will be very welcome to Irish genealogists. They are arranged strictly in order of date, and consist of deeds of settlement, marriage articles, mortgages, bonds, wills and family letters, preserved in the Blake collection, together with some Inquisitions Post Mortem and other evidences from the Public Record Office at Dublin. The will of Sir Thomas Blake of Menlough or Menlo, Bart., dated 10 Oct. 1674, is specially valuable as it was never proved. Records 86-89 contain the petition of John Blake *alias* Caddell to the Commissioners for the plantation of County Galway in 1640, supported by a long pedigree of the said John up to Richard Caddell, living in the reigns of Edward I and II, who acquired the additional name of Blake, or, in Latin charters, Niger, and is stated to have been the common ancestor of all the numerous Blake families in Connaught. This work includes several carefully compiled pedigrees of his descendants carried down to the present day. These pedigrees are followed by a brief account of the fourteen ancient families or "tribes" of the town of Galway. Of these, the Darcys are considered by the author to be descended from the Irish tribe of O'Dorchaidhe and not a branch of the Anglo-Norman house of D'Arcy of Plattyn, co. Meath.

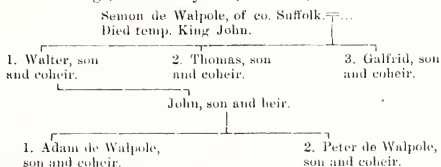
An Index to the records in the First Series has been added, and will be found very useful, but, unfortunately, the documents and genealogies contained in this volume are left unindexed.

## Notes and Queries.

WALPOLE FAMILY (*Genealogist*, O.S., iii, 79).—I am reminded by the above reference that it is many years since Mr. Walter Rye in one of his brilliant articles on "Doubtful Norfolk Pedigrees," attacked the traditional account of the Walpole pedigree. Perhaps the following Plea Roll pedigrees from Plantagenet Harrison's Abstracts now in the Record Office, may throw light on the real origin of the Walpoles, but I speak with reserve, for if I remember rightly Mr. Rye considered that there were Walpole families in Norfolk of totally distinct origin deriving the same surname from different places.

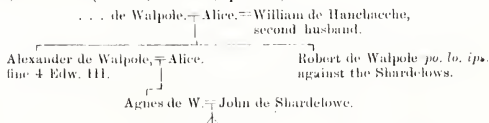

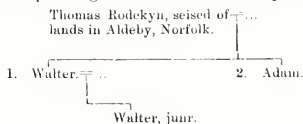

THE ROCHESTERS, OF SELMESTON, AND JEVINGTON,  
CO. SUSSEX.

The license from the Bishop of London's office for a marriage between Robert Rochester, gent., of Highgate, Middlesex, bachelor, aged 22, and Mary Fisher, of Covent Garden, spinster, aged 23, is dated 1 Sept. 1642. Soon after the marriage Robert Rochester (A) must have purchased and gone to reside on the manor of Ludlay, in Selmeston, co. Sussex, for in the chancel of the church there a memorial was erected to his son Henry Rochester, who died 25 May 1646, in early infancy. Mary Rochester, the wife, was buried at Selmeston 6 Jan. 168 $\frac{1}{2}$ , and Robert Rochester (A) described as senior and gent., was buried there 6 Sept. 1689.

The Registers of Selmeston only begin in 1677, and the Bishops' Transcripts are very deficient for sometime before that date. But from the will of Robert Rochester (A) dated 15 May 1688, and proved at Lewes 9 April 1690 (Book A, 40, fol. 2), it appears that his issue living when it was executed, consisted of two sons Robert Rochester (B) and Henry Rochester, and five daughters, viz., one unnamed, married to John Tucke; Sarah, married to . . . Cressingham; one unnamed, married to Abraham Cruttenden; Cecilia, married to Richard Pilbeame; and Constance Wood, the daughter married to Abraham Cruttenden was named Judith, her marriage having been solemnised at Wilmington 3 Feb. 167 $\frac{3}{4}$ . Cecilia, who was married to Richard Pilbeame, at Selmeston, 20 Feb. 168 $\frac{3}{4}$ , was buried at Chiddingly 9 Dec. 1708, her husband being buried there 6 Sept. 1721, and one of their children was Richard Pilbeame, the younger, baptised at Chiddingly 1 April 1686. Constance was married thrice, first to John Oshaldiston, gent., who, described as a recusant, was buried at Aleiston 17 May 1669, secondly at East Hoathly, 1 Dec. 1671 (the license at Lewes being dated 28 Nov. 1674) to Magnus Byne, gent., of Framfield, where he was buried 8 Nov. 1680, and thirdly to John Wood, of Iwood, in Warbleton (the license in the South Malling Deanery Licenses being dated 17 May 1683), and she had issue by each husband.

Robert Rochester (B) matriculated at Oxford 6 June 1660, as of Wadhams College, and married at Jevington 2 Oct. 1673, with Elizabeth, daughter of William Markwick, gent., of Wannock, in Jevington. By her he had (1) Robert Rochester (C), baptised at Jevington 12 July 1675; (2) Mary, baptised there 11 Sept. 1677, and buried at Selmeston 9 March 1683; (3) Ralph Rochester, baptised at West Fife 1 Oct. 1679; (4) Katherine, baptised there 28 Feb. 168 $\frac{1}{2}$ ; (5) Anne; (6) William Rochester, baptised at Selmeston 1 Feb. 168 $\frac{3}{4}$ , and buried there 22 Aug. 1697; and (7) Thomas Rochester, baptised there 21 Sept. 1690, and buried there as of London 21 Sept. 1720. Robert Rochester (B) was buried at Selmeston 1 Oct. 1700. He died intestate, and 24 Oct. 1700, administration of his effects was granted at Lewes to his son Robert Rochester (C), the relict Elizabeth having renounced



(Book B, 13, fol. 32). The relict was buried at Selmeston 19 May 1725, having by her will, dated 9 Nov. 1714, and proved at Lewes 1 July 1725 (Book A 52, fol. 38), in which she is described as of St. Olave's, Southwark, widow, given all her estate real and personal to her daughters Catharine Rochester and Anne Rochester equally, and appointed them executrices. In the entry of her burial she is described as of Southover.

It was under the will of William Markwick, of Jevington, the brother of Elizabeth Rochester, which is dated 23 Oct. 1689, and was proved at Lewes 7 Oct. 1699, the testator having been buried at Jevington 22 April 1699, that the property of Wannock devolved on the Rochester family. By that will the testator after bequeathing pecuniary legacies to "my brother-in-law Robert Rochester, of Selmeston, gent., my sister Elizabeth Rochester and their four children, viz.: Ralph, Catharine, Anne, and William," and to "my brother-in-law Henry Rochester, of Selmeston, gent., my sister Susanna, his wife, and their three children, Catharine, Anne, and Susanna," gave "my household goods in my house at Wannock wherein I now dwell to my nephew Robert Rochester, eldest son of my brother Robert Rochester," and devised all his freehold and copyhold properties in Willingdon, Jevington and Folkington to the same nephew absolutely.

Robert Rochester (C) married at Jevington 13 May 1701 with Jane, second daughter of Nicholas Eversfield, Esq., of Charlton Court, in Steyning, and dying 15, was buried at Jevington 20 Aug. 1725. His widow was buried at Jevington 25 March 1747. They had issue four children (1) Charles Rochester; (2) William Rochester, who was baptised at Jevington 26 April 1701 and buried there 20 Sept. 1710, having had issue an only child Robert Rochester (D), who died 26 Sept. 1739, aged 10 years; (3) Robert Rochester, baptised at Jevington 8 June, and buried there 21 Sept. 1708; and (4) Robert Rochester, baptised there 3 Nov. 1710, who died 31 March 1738, and was buried in the burial ground of St. George the Martyr, Queen Square, London.

Charles Rochester, who was baptised at Jevington 17 June 1702, married at St. Paul's Cathedral, 5 Aug. 1731, with Leonora, third daughter of Charles Eversfield, Esq., of Denne Park, Horsham, but had no issue. She was buried at Jevington 11 March 1756, and her husband was buried there 28 Nov. 1758. By his will, dated 26 June 1758, in which he is described as of Jevington and also of "Guldeford," co. Surrey, he directed that he should be buried at Jevington, near his late wife, and left £100 for a monument, and subject to an annuity of £50, he devised all his freeholds and copyholds in Jevington, Willingdon and Folkington to his sister-[in-law] Olive Eversfield, spinster, absolutely, and gave his manor of Ludley, in Selmeston, to her for life, with remainder to his cousin Richard Rideout, and made Olive Eversfield residuary legatee and executrix. She proved this will 28 Nov. 1758 in P.C.C. (316, Hutton).

Henry Rochester, the younger surviving son of Robert Rochester (A), married at Jevington 9 Sept. 1678, with Susanna, another daughter



of the first abovenamed William Markwick, and was buried 13 Sept. 1703 at Selmeston, where his widow was buried 26 May 1725. They had issue six children, viz., (1) William Rochester, baptised at Selmeston 29 July, and buried there 1 Aug. 1679; (2) Henry Rochester, baptised there 29 April, and buried there 1 May 1681; (3) Catharine, baptised there 30 June 1682; (4) Anne, baptised there 1 Nov. 1683; (5) Susanna, baptised there 26 Jan. 168<sup>5</sup>/<sub>6</sub>; and (6) Mary, baptised there 26 July 1688, and buried there 28 Sept. 1689. Administration of the effects of Henry Rochester was, 23 Oct. 1703, granted to his widow Susanna, at Lewes (B. 13, fol. 98). Of these daughters:—

Catharine was buried at Selmeston 8 Oct. 1716, having by her will, dated 1 Aug. 1716, in which she is described as of Selmeston, spinster, given legacies to her nephew Richard Rideout, "son of my brother Rideout, by my sister Anne," to her niece Susanna Acton, and to her cousin the abovenamed Richard Pilbeame, the younger. This will was proved at Lewes by her sister Susanna Rochester, the executrix, 28 Sept. 1717 (Book A, 49, fol. 289).

Anne was married twice, first at Selmeston 6 June 1710, to John Acton (the license at Lewes being dated 12 May 1710), who was buried at Ripe 18 Jan. 171<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, having had one child, the abovenamed Susanna Acton, baptised at Ripe 20 April 1711, and married at Framfield 20 June 1732, to Nicholas Gilbert, of Eastbourne; and secondly to Richard Rideout, who was buried at Framfield 1 Oct. 1753, his wife Anne having been buried there 11 Dec. 1734. Their son Richard Rideout, who was baptised at Framfield 16 June 1715, is the beneficiary under the wills of Charles Rochester and Catharine Rochester.

Susanna died a spinster at Framfield and was buried at Selmeston 29 August 1738, and administration of her effects was granted 2 Dec. 1740 to her brother-in-law Richard Rideout, out of the South Malling Deanery Court (vol. vii, fol. 28).

There are monumental inscriptions in the church at Jevington to "Robert Rochester, of Wannoek, who dyed 15 Aug. 1725, aged 51"; also "to his second son William, who dyed 16 Sept. 1710, aged 35"; also "to Robert, youngest son of Robert Rochester, who dyed 31 March 1738, in his 27<sup>th</sup> year, and was buried at the burying ground of St. George the Martyr"; also to "Robert, only son of William Rochester before named, who dyed 26 Sept. 1739, in his 11<sup>th</sup> year"; also to "Jane, widow of Robert Rochester, who died 21 March 1717, aged 69"; also "to Charles Rochester and Leonora, his wife, third daughter of Charles Eversfield, of Denn in this county. She died 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1756, in her 49<sup>th</sup> year, and he died 20<sup>th</sup> Nov. 1758, aged 56."

In and after 1728 there existed at Wadhurst a family named Rochester, descending from Henry Rochester, of Lamberhurst, who married at Frant 21 Nov. 1727, with Elizabeth Carver, of Frant, but he apparently had no connexion with the Rochesters settled at Selmeston.



SOME NOTES ON BARSHAM JUXTA BECCLES, CO.  
SUFFOLK.

(Continued from p. 154).

Sir John Suckling, who was next to possess Barsham, had from the commencement of the century been owner of the adjoining Manor of Roos Hall, and the new purchase appears to have been made merely for the extension of his estates and for the acquisition of the sporting rights, which were exceptionally valuable for that period, as may be seen by a Deed entitled "A pticuler of the Manor of Barshame Hall," and drawn up at the time of transfer, whereby it appears that while the whole estate produced but £240 per annum, "the fishinge, Swannes, & Swanne game, fowlinge and other royalties were valued at £10 a year."<sup>1</sup>

According to the historian of Suffolk,<sup>2</sup> on the day of his purchase (13th July 1613),<sup>3</sup> in writing to his brother Charles, of Woodton, Sir John said "I am resolute not to lett the house & demeanes under £240, & I hope by your care & diligence in providinge me with a good tenant I may have £250 per ann. . . . I am confident that ere long landes will beare a better & higher price, & therefore my purpose is, not to grant any lease above seven yeares; besides I mean to keep all the royalties & fishinge in myne own handes . . . . It is a thinge that lyes more convenient forr mee, by reason of the vicinity of Rose Hall, then it doth for you, or any els but had I broken for it, I had rather you had it than any els." . . . .

Apparently Charles was supervising his brother's manor of Roos Hall, for Sir John says in another letter of about the same date, "I recieved a letter from Burlingham who complains that they were punished by reason of Todd's<sup>4</sup> hay being in the barn which should have been taken out before this time. Speak or send to Todd for mee. I am angry with him in that he is short, & behinde £20 att the least for rent with the £8 which he oweth mee."

The writer, who had been returned M.P. for Dunwich in 1601, was, on the death of Sir Anthony Aty, made Receiver of Fines and also Collector of Customs, December the 13th and 24th 1604, and subsequently Master of Requests, Privy Councillor, and Comptroller of the Household of King James I. About the year 1605-6 he had pur-

chased Whitton Park,<sup>1</sup> near Twickenham, on the Thames, where his son, John Suckling, the poet, was born, and there baptised, being thus entered in the Parish Register for 1608-9: "John, son of Mr. John Suckling, February the 10th."

Sir John Suckling and his brother Charles were sons by different wives of Robert Suckling, who, in 1554, inherited under the will of his great uncle, a property at Woodton, in Norfolk, some nine miles from Barsham, where his family had been seated from the thirteenth century.<sup>2</sup>

John was son of the first wife, Elizabeth Barwick, who (according to the Suckling pedigree in the British Museum<sup>3</sup> and also in that in Suckling's "History of Suffolk"<sup>4</sup>) was daughter of William Barwick,<sup>5</sup> by Elizabeth, daughter of William Cornwallys, of Brome,<sup>6</sup> niece of Sir John Cornwallys, Knight, whose daughter, Elizabeth, was first wife of John Blennerhassett.<sup>7</sup>

Charles Suckling was eldest son of his father's third and last wife, Joan, daughter of William Cardinal<sup>8</sup> (married 19 Nov. 1577).

An interesting survival of this marriage still exists in one of the windows of Barsham Rectory, where may be seen some good examples of mediæval heraldic glass, long since removed from the original Hall at Woodton. The shield of Suckling impaling Cardinal (Sable a fesse engrailed between three door hinges Argent) is surmounted by the Suckling crest, a roebuck courant Azure. This colour,<sup>9</sup> together with the fact that the buck has nothing in its mouth fixes the date of these Arms as prior to 1578-9, when the augmentation of a sprig of honey-suckle proper was given to Robert Suckling on the occasion of Queen Elizabeth's visit to Norwich in August, 1578.<sup>10</sup> Possibly, as the gift was a pun on the recipient's name, there may be some foundation for the tradition that the suggestion was the Queen's own.<sup>11</sup>

Some amusing Chancery proceedings arose out of Robert Suckling's bequest to his son Charles in 1589 of his Manor of Woodton. His doing so is explained in the deposition of his stepson.<sup>12</sup> William

Vesey, who also gives a long account of his gifts to his son, John. "The cause why Robert Suckling desired to benefit his younger children was, in performance of a promise made before marriage to Mr. Wm. Cardynall his brother in law in that she brought him so great a living and had no jointure."<sup>1</sup>

Joan retired to Woodton with her eleven-year-old son, and in due time sent him to complete his education under Mr. Stephen Drury, of Aylsham, with the following result, as described in a Chancery proceeding brought against her by Drury's wife (Bridgett), on the 4th of January, 42 Elizabeth (1599-1600): "The answer of Joane Sucklinge widdowe. . . . About fyve yeares since she did place her said sonne in service with Stephen Drurye, gent., late husband of complayment. But comy<sup>th</sup> then the wyfe of said Stephen, and by flatteringe words did allure & provoke said Charles to become a suitor to Marye Drurie one of her daughters, he, the said Charles, being then not above sixteene yeare at most & did suffer them to proceed so farre that a maryadge was in a sorte complicated betweene the said Charles & Marye before this defen<sup>th</sup> had knowledge thereof. After w<sup>th</sup> tyme perceivinge that good likinge was betweene the said Charles her sonne & the said Marye Drewery and that it could not well be broken this defen<sup>th</sup> havinge an especyall lykinge of the said Stephen Drewerye was contented to give her consent that a mariage should be had betwene them wh<sup>th</sup> shortlie after was solemnized."

Thus it came to pass that Charles Suckling and Mary Drury had been married and seated at Woodton for eighteen years when Sir John addressed his letter in July 1613 relative to his purchase of Barsham Manor, their eldest son, Robert (destined later to inherit it) being twelve years of age. The date of Sir John Suckling's marriage to Martha, daughter of Thomas Cranfield, has not been discovered, but it probably took place about 1603-4.<sup>1</sup> She was sister of his friend and political colleague, Lionel Cranfield, Earl of Middlesex, and Lord

Treasurer, whose daughter, Lady Frances, by Richard, fifth Earl of Dorset, was mother of the sixth Earl of Dorset, best known by his song, "To all ye ladies now on land."

Aubrey, on the authority of Mrs. Bond, the wife of the poet's friend and companion,<sup>1</sup> says that "Suckling derived his wit from his mother, for that his father was but a dull fellow." The Rev. A. I. Suckling, author of "The Antiquities of Suffolk," in 1836 printed "A Selection from the Works of Sir John Suckling, prefixed by a Life of the Author,"<sup>2</sup> wherein he gives a slight sketch of the poet's father, and confutes Mrs. Bond's assertion by quoting some verses from his pen, printed in 1611, and prefixed to "Coryat's Crudities."

Since then, much further information regarding Sir John Suckling's public and political life has come to light from documents at the Record Office, State Papers, and the various Histories of Court Life of the period,<sup>3</sup> which would be out of place in an account of Barsham.

His personal appearance and private character are described in a paper in the handwriting of his brother, Charles: "He was a man of grave deportment, a very comely person of a faire complexion, with good features & flaxen haire." This coincides with the portrait of him by Adriaen Hanneman, which depicts him in a plain lawn collar, turned down over a black velvet dress, fastened on the shoulder by a jewel. His reddish hair, thin on the temples, falls to his shoulders, with the moustache and imperial flecked with white.

This portrait, which has come down to the present time through the descendants of his brother Charles, may possibly have been in his own collection, and one of a pair to the picture of his first wife, which is thus named in his will: "To my loving brother in law the Earl of Middlesex my picture of my late deere wief, hanging in my country house, in the little room next the great hall, for the love he bare my late deere wief, his most loving sister."<sup>4</sup>

She died 28th October 1613, when her son, the poet, was four-and-a-half years old, possibly at Roos Hall, for at that time a virulent fever decimated London. The inscription on the fine monument, which her husband erected over her remains in St. Andrew's Church, Norwich, bears witness to his affection for her, and to his estimate of her abilities:—

“Mirror of time bright starre of Pietie,  
 A peerless Peece, moulded by chastitie,  
 Rarest of witts, cannot give thee thy due,  
 Thou wert so good so chaste, so wise, so true  
 Heaven hath thy soule, ye world thy living fame  
 A tomb in Norwich London gave thy name.”

For the upkeep of this beautiful canopied alabaster tomb, inlaid with coloured marbles and rich gilding, Sir John Suckling charged his Manor of Barsham with £18 per annum. It is surmounted by the Arms of Suckling, impaling Cranfield quartering an unknown coat, viz.: First and fourth—Or, on a pale Azure three fleur-de-lis Argent (CRANFIELD).<sup>1</sup> Second and third—Or, on a bend Azure three martlets of the first.<sup>1</sup>

Sir John remarried at St. Olive's, Hart Street, on March 2nd, 1616, to Jane, daughter of John Reve, of Bury St. Edmunds, but as there were no children of this marriage, she was not concerned with the future of Barsham. It may be mentioned that her sister, Mary Reve, was wife of John Busbridge, of Echingham, in Sussex (the old home of the Echingham family, who were sometime of Barsham), which descended to her son, another John Busbridge, of Echingham.<sup>2</sup>

Under date of January 28th, 1626, Blomefield<sup>3</sup> gives an account of Charles Suckling's representing his brother, Sir John, before the Town Council of Norwich relative to his inability to be present to take up his Freedom of that city owing to his attendance at the Coronation of the King.<sup>4</sup>

Charles Suckling had lost his wife, Mary, in June 1621, and had remarried on the 10th July 1623 at St. Luke's Chapel, in Norwich Cathedral, to Dorothy, daughter of Sir Anthony Drury, of Besthorpe, in which same year his eldest son, Robert, had entered at Gray's Inn, and been received into his uncle, the Comptroller's house at Dorset Court.

Sir John Suckling died on the 1st of March 1627, and was succeeded in his estates by his son, John, aged nineteen. There is little evidence of the poet's residence at Barsham, although, from the family papers, it is evident that he was on intimate terms with his uncle and cousins at Woodton. According to Aubrey, “He was the greatest gallant of his time, and soon grew famous at Court for his readie & sparkling wit . . . he was incomparably readie at repartying & his wit most sparkling when most set upon. . . .” “He was of middle stature & slight strength, his haire a kind of sand color, his beard turned up naturally so that he had a brisk & graceful look.” He goes on to

describe in detail the costly entertainments given by the poet, one of which "cost hundreds of pounds." He also mentions the expedition to Scotland in 1638, when "Sir John, at his own charge rayseed a troope of 100 very handsome young & very proper men whom he clad in white doublets & scarlette breeches scarlette coates hattes & feathers well horsed & armed." Under date of 1662-3, in the State Papers,<sup>1</sup> is a "Humble petition" to the King from the poet's brother, Lionel, which

"Sheweth that your petitioner's brother in the late expedicon of the Scottish warrs went himself in person & rayseed a Troope of Horse at his own proper cost, for your Majesties deere father of blessed memory, to the value of thirteene thousand at the least."

On February the 7th, 1637, in the Stafford Papers, is a letter from Mr. Gerrard, as follows:—"Two of the Kings servants, privy chamber men both, have each writ a play—Sir John Sutlin (*sic*) & Will Barclay, which have been acted in Court with much applause. Sutlin's play cost three or foure hundred pounds setting out. . . ." This was the play of "Aglaura," said to be the first to be acted in England with scenery.

Vandyke painted several portraits of the poet, of which two are still in the possession of the family, one having been engraved for Suckling's "History of Suffolk." The other is similarly framed to the portrait of him as a younger man, now in the Ashmolean Museum, at Oxford, and is supposed to have been acquired from the Davis family. This picture, which is unsigned, is thought to be by Cornelius Neve, painter of several portraits at Knole, and also of Ashmole himself. The portrait at Hartwell House is undoubtedly the best likeness of the poet, and is described by Aubrey.

"My Lady Southcot," whose husband hanged himself, was Sir John's sister, to whom he writes a consolatory letter.<sup>2</sup>

"At her house in Bishopsgate St., London, is an original of her brother, Sir John, by Sir An<sup>o</sup> Vandyke, all at length leaning against a rock, with a play book, contemplating. It is a picture of great value."<sup>3</sup>

This picture descended to the poet's niece, Anne, daughter of Sir John Davis, of Pangbourne, who married, in 1660, to Sir Thomas Lee, of Hartwell, and died 1708.

The final scene in Suckling's chequered career is told in the Historical MSS. of the Earl of Egmont (vol. i, part 1, p. 131) in a letter dated May 8th, 1641.<sup>4</sup> "Here has been the greatest treason discovered this week that was in England since the Powder Plot. The design was my Lord Stafford's escape the bringing of our English army upon the

Parliament . . . . The Conspiritors were Mr. Jermyn, Mr. Percy, Sir John Suckling, Davenent the Poet, & such . . . . They are all fled & Colonel Goring is suspected to be of the party. . . ."

Space forbids further notice of the poet Suckling,<sup>1</sup> whose death in exile about 1611-2 is variously inaccurately described. The account preserved in the archives at Knole is probably the most correct, and ascribes his death to murder at the hand of a traitorous valet.

His connection with Barsham had been severed about 1640 by its sale to his uncle, Charles, who appears as Lord in that year.

The story of the final transfer of Barsham from nephew to uncle is told by the lawyer, Christopher Barrett,<sup>2</sup> who thus fixes not only its date but shows that the poet was actually in Norfolk at that time:—

"On the 8<sup>th</sup> daye of September [1610] I came to Woodton at the request of Sir John Sucklinge Knighte, to the house of Mr. Charles Sucklinge wher Sir John was, when I found them both together. And at my coming, after a little conference," etc.

Part of the "conference" related to the price of the land called "Kapons' *dole*,"<sup>3</sup> in Barsham.

In 1635 the county of Suffolk had been rated at £8,000 for the support of a ship of 800 tons, manned by three hundred and twenty seamen.<sup>4</sup>

This sum was afterwards reduced to £6,400, but even then the Sheriffs could not collect, through the alleged inability of the inhabitants to pay it.

The High Constables of the Hundred, in 1640, in the general return, certify:—

“That the reason why the Shipp monyes is not well paid now as in former yeares is, that the inhabitants are not able to pay the money charged upon them, being much improvised by the former payments for Shipping, lying for the most part upon Farmers for the landes in their occupaeon, whereas the Landlords, & other the most able & wealthiest men pay but little for their grete estates, for wch they have formerly used by the way of subsidye to bear the greater parte of the charge upon the county.”

Only those who refused to pay the ship money appear to be included in this list, as there were several other families undoubtedly residing in Barsham parish at that time who are not named, although it is difficult at the present day, to imagine where they could have lived.

Among these were the Cokes and the Eachards. The latter Suckling in his “History of Suffolk”<sup>1</sup> says, “were settled in this village for several generations, as many tomb stones in the churchyard record.”

Probably the “Mr. Eachard” who paid for seven hearths in Barsham at the time of the Suffolk Hearth Tax (1674) was father of Lawrence Eachard, Prebendary of Lincoln, and author, with other works, of “The Ecclesiastical General History”; baptised there in 1671.

Of the brothers Cocks,<sup>2</sup> George, appointed Rector of Barsham in December 1636, by Sir John Suckling the poet, married Charles Suckling's daughter Anne, at Blofield, June the 2nd, 1628. She was buried at St. Andrew's, Norwich, Feb. 16th, 1636. His brother, Samuel Cocks, married her sister Lucy at Oby on

June the 6th, 1636, and settling at Barsham there baptised his four children:—

Charles, 5th of August 1637; Lucie, 25th of June 1638; George, 27th day of May 1640; and Lydia 15th of May 1641.

And was there himself buried on October the 20th, 1647.

This family continued to reside at Barsham for some years, during which time Lucy Cocks was married there on December the 8th, 1659, to Mr. John Smith.<sup>1</sup>

"Lydia, daughter of Samuel Cocks, gent., and Lucy, his wife, was buried Februarie the 14, 1618."

"Charles Cocks of this parish and Elizb<sup>th</sup> Warner,<sup>2</sup> of St. Margaret's, Iketsball, were married the 3<sup>rd</sup> of January 1660."

Two other daughters of Charles Suckling were married at Barsham, Ruth, on Sept. the 10th, 1636, to Mr. John Reeve,<sup>3</sup> and Elizabeth Suckling, married June 29th, 1647, to "Peyton Bacon, gentleman."<sup>4</sup>

There is no record of Charles Suckling's own residence at Barsham between the years 1610 and 1644, "when, in the time of his last sickness whereof he died at Woodton in the month of December and by word of mouth did declare," etc., making no mention in his short nuncupative will<sup>5</sup> of the wife whose marriage is thus entered in the Barsham Registers:—

"Charles Sucklinge, Esq., and Katherine Richman were married Dec. the 9<sup>th</sup>, 1612."

This entry was the subject of several queries in the private notes of the author of "The History of Suffolk," who questioned if it related to the father or to his younger son.

Since then the marriage licence of Charles, junior, has been discovered, dated the 6th of April 1644—"Charles Suckling and Mary Aldrich, marriage to take place at Siseland." Also, recently, there has been found at Norwich the nuncupative will of "Katherine Suckling widdowe," made in August 1660 at Barnham, Norfolk,<sup>6</sup>

relict of Charles Sucklinge, Esq., late of Wutton (*sic*), deceased, "Being weake and verie aged and inferme in bodie," etc. By this will she devised her property to her "cozen" Henry Edgar, of Eye.

The Charles Suckling, junior, aforesaid, and Mary Aldrich, settled at Bracondale, where the former died of the great plague and was buried at Trowse, July the 15th, 1666. His widow removed to Barsham with her four daughters, and there the eldest, Mary,<sup>1</sup> was married to Mathew Leman, of Weston, gent., on the 14th of Sept. 1668.

"Mary, widow of Charles Suckling, Esq., late of Bracondale," dated her will at Barsham 8 April 23 Chas. II, and was buried at Trowse the 18th of April 1671.

About that time there went to reside at the Hall, Robert Suckling,<sup>2</sup> the grandson of Charles, the purchaser of the Manor, who had married at Barningham on the 16th of November 1669 Sarah, daughter of Maurice Shelton,<sup>3</sup> and there continuing to reside (until he succeeded his father at Woodton in 1690), he baptised many of his children. At the time of the Suffolk hearth tax<sup>4</sup> in 1674, among other names the following paid the tax in Barsham:—

Robert Suckling, Esq., Robert Suckling, Mr. Eachard, Widow Edwards, Thomas Edwards,<sup>5</sup> John Woolnow,<sup>6</sup> and Thomas Page.

Of the sons born at Barsham to Robert Suckling and Sarah, his wife, the third, Maurice, became Rector there in 1711; and Robert, their son and heir, on his marriage with Dorothy, daughter of John Berney, of Swardeston in 1700, until he succeeded his father at Woodton in 1708, resided at Barsham Hall and baptised several children in the church. In his time a most beautiful old map was made of the "Estate of Robert Suckling, Esq., in Barsham, Shipmeadow and Ringsfield," by which it appears that there were two nice houses that are no longer in existence, also two at Shipmeadow, gubled in the manner of the present Rectory of Barsham. The hall stands out well in the form of the letter E and has fine timber in its vicinity. Horace Suckling, the unmarried son of Robert and Dorothy Suckling, died at Barsham and was buried in the church in 1741.

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RETURNS OF MARRIAGES AT OUT-STATIONS IN THE PRESIDENCY OF MADRAS, RECORDED IN THE REGISTER BOOKS OF ST. MARY'S, FORT ST. GEORGE, BETWEEN 1783 AND 1805.

Before the victories of Eyre Coote in the Carnatic, the only out-garrisons of importance were Trichinopoly, Tanjore, and Cuddalore. These three stations were served in spiritual matters by Missionary-Chaplains, who kept their private register books of all the baptisms, burials, and marriages they solemnized. In 1782 the number of such garrisons and out-stations increased, and to each station of importance was sent a Civil Resident for political, commercial, magisterial, and revenue purposes. The Residents had authority from the Government to baptise, marry, and bury, and were ordered to send a return of all such events to Fort St. George. These were sent very irregularly between 1783 and 1793, when more stringent orders were issued on the subject,<sup>356</sup> and a registration fee instituted for the benefit of the Fort St. George Chaplains.

Many marriages must have taken place at out-stations before 1793 which are not registered at St. Mary's. A few can be traced in the mission register books of the places already mentioned, and of Palamcottah.

In places where there was a Civil Resident the marriages were performed by him. If the marriage was that of a soldier, the return was made and signed by the commanding officer. If there were no Civil Resident, the marriages were performed and the returns made by the commanding officer. When the Chaplains visited the various stations, of course they both solemnized the marriages, etc., and made the returns. After 1805, a Chaplain was stationed at the headquarters of each out-garrison, and kept a register of all the sacred events locally. With their advent, the registration of out-garrison events at St. Mary's ceased.

The entries have been made irregularly and without regard to time or sequence, as will be observed. They are given here in the order in which they occur in the books.

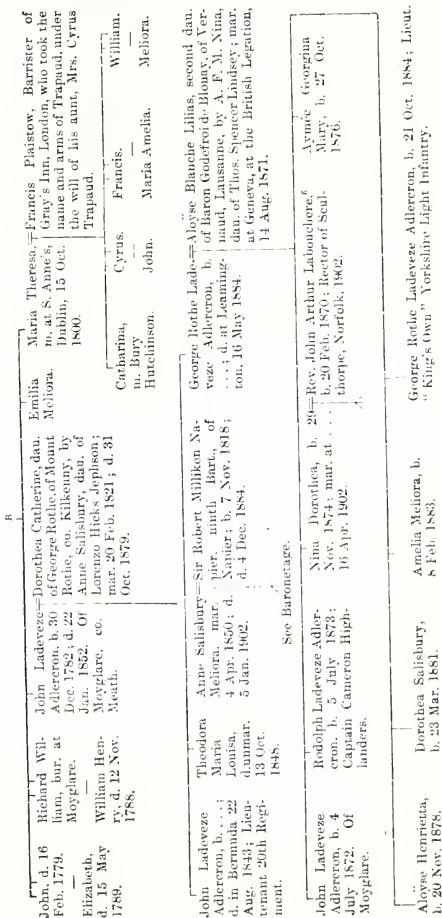

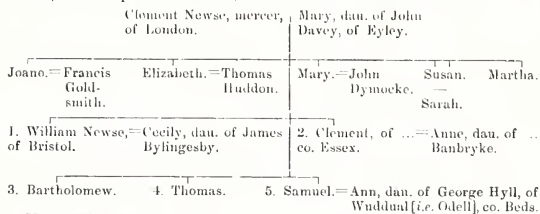

## THE 4096 QUARTIERS OF KING EDWARD VII.

(A CORRECTION.)

THE ANCESTORS OF ELEANOR DESMIER :— It appears from the recently published instalment of M. Beauchet-Filleau's *Familles du Poitou*, where the pedigree of Gaillard has been investigated with great care, that there is an error in *The Genealogist*, N.S., xx, 190, owing to the omission of a generation. The text on this family should read :—

L543. Lancelot Gaillard, Seigneur de St. Dizant ; living 20 July 1601.

L544. Jaquette de l'Isle ; living 23 Aug. 1610.

M1085. William Gaillard, Seigneur de la Leu et de St. Dizant.

N2169. Guy Gaillard, Seigneur de la Leu. (210.)

N2169 was son of John Gaillard, Seigneur de la Leu, and Mary Perron or de Peyron [not Perrau], the persons mentioned in the text.

In this connexion it may be noticed that the emendations (vol. xx, 266-7) of the dates for K270, 1538, and 1540 should be cancelled, the text they refer to being correct, taking the year to commence on 1 Jan. Similarly, Alexander Desmier (I 135), was baptised 13 March 1608 [1607 8], not 1608 9 as stated in the *addenda*.

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## Notices of Books.

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INDIAN MONUMENTAL INSCRIPTIONS, Vol. iii, Madras. By Julian James Cotton, I.C.S. (Deighton, Bell & Co., and others).

This book forms one of a series in which the monumental inscriptions relating to Europeans buried in India are being preserved by the Indian Government. No praise can be too high for the policy of preserving the memorials of those civil and military servants of the East India Company, and those soldiers of the British service who laid down their lives in the faithful discharge of their various duties. The task of collection and annotation was given by the Madras Government to Mr. J. J. Cotton, of the Civil Service, who has thoroughly justified the selection. For the book is not merely a list of inscriptions. He has industriously gathered information from many different sources, including standard books of reference and parish magazines, and under his able and sympathetic editorship it has become a rich mine of social



and family history; as such it should be gratefully welcomed both by historians and genealogists. The editor has written a lucid and fascinating introduction, which completely shows the literary necessity of the work he has so ably accomplished. It is not too much to say that the editorial matter throughout is such as to give an abiding interest to the volume.

Nearly one-third of the book is taken up with the monuments in Fort St. George and the city of Madras; the rest includes all those in the British Districts, in Pondicherry, and in the Native States of the South. The Presidency is exceptionally rich in memorials of other western nations than our own; some of the Portuguese, Dutch and Danish inscriptions are of high interest as well as considerable antiquity. But the chief interest of this "Book of the Dead" is in the memorials of the British departed, among whom were merchants, statesmen and soldiers of more than average worth.

In the seventeenth century, among the servants of the Company on the Madras establishment, there were some whose names are well known at the Herald's College, such as Yale, whose daughters married into the North and Cavendish families, Proby, the ancestor of the Earls of Chyrsfort; Fleetwood, a royalist relation of the notorious regicide; Winter, Davers, and others mentioned in Mrs. Penny's *History of Fort St. George*: all of whom left monumental evidence of their temporary abode on the Coromandel coast. The eighteenth century saw the conflict with France and the Ruler of Mysore, and the consequent entrance upon the scene of the soldier, the sailor, and the politician. In that period of conflict the number of memorials vastly increased, and the interest of the record increases accordingly. For Mr. J. J. Cotton gives in many cases short genealogical notices of those commemorated; he mentions not only some marriages which were celebrated between British subjects but also those which took place between the British and the daughters of the French, Dutch, and Danes. It is only necessary to mention such names as Hastings, Addison, Thackeray, Macaulay, Roebuck, Jodrell, Wahab, Westcott, De Morgan, Malcolm, Prendergast, Lushington, Broadfoot, Sale, Carnac, Harris, Bird, Wedderburn, Turing and Rumbold to show what a valuable source of family history and genealogical lore is to be found in this record.

GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN ENGLAND, SCOTLAND AND IRELAND. A Handbook for the Student, by J. Henry Lea. Boston, Mass. London (Mitchell, Hughes & Clarke).

This little handbook may safely be recommended as a compendium of almost everything which a genealogist ought to know. To beginners it will prove an invaluable guide, and even the skilled antiquary will find much to assist him in his labours. It makes, of course, no claim to originality, for much has admittedly been borrowed from other and larger works, the chapter on English testamentary records being based on the late Dr. Marshall's well-known work on the Ancient Courts





of Probate; but in all these cases the information supplied has been brought down to date, and in addition Mr. Lea has given to his readers the benefit of his twenty years experience of records and record searching. The list of Heralds' Visitations and copies thereof will be much appreciated, containing, as it does, references to all printed Visitations, which now happily form the majority. While considering the vast collections of public documents at the Record Office, Mr. Lea recommends certain classes of records to the searcher; to these should be added the Close Rolls, or Indentures in Chancery, which chiefly deal with the affairs of private individuals and afford most valuable information to the genealogist. A list of Chartularies and their place of deposit might with advantage have been included, for that in Sims' *Manual* is incomplete, and many of these treasuries of early genealogy have lately been printed and made accessible to students. The concluding chapters of this work deal with Scottish and Irish records, and contain some useful hints.

**HISTORICAL TOMBSTONES OF MALACCA.** By Robert Norman Bland. London (Elliot Stock).

The interest of this quarto volume lies in the series of photographs of memorial stones which commemorate Portuguese and Dutch, chiefly the former. Mr. Bland in his introduction gives a short account of the several occupations of Malacca, and draws attention to the fact that the Javanese founders of the kingdom and the Malays who succeeded them, have left no remains, so that the earliest inscriptions are those of the Portuguese, dating from the sixteenth century. Many of the stones here illustrated have armorials upon them, and on some the carving is rich. We cannot imagine a better form of presenting historical tombstones to the notice of archaeologists than that adopted by Mr. Bland, and sincerely wish that all our ancient churches could be treated in the same way.

**A SHORT CALENDAR OF DEEDS RELATING TO NORWICH, ENROLLED IN THE COURT ROLLS OF THAT CITY, 1285-1306.** Edited by Walter Rye. Norwich (Printed for the Norfolk and Norwich Archaeological Society by Agas H. Goose).

In his introduction to this useful Calendar, Mr. Walter Rye enumerates some of its more important features; among these he mentions that it records the names of no less than sixteen Norfolk rectors and vicars unknown to Blomefield, and gives a reference to eleven testaments relating to real property in Norwich, which are to be found enrolled on the Court Rolls of that City. Mr. Rye also notes that in several instances wives retained their own surnames; it would be interesting to know if the property conveyed in these cases had belonged to the wife or her family before marriage. Rolls 1 and 2 have been compiled by the Rev. W. Hudson, F.S.A., a well-known student of the Norwich archives, who has prefaced to the Calendar a lucid description of the mode of enrolment and its effect, which had the nature of a recognizance or final agreement.



ABBERLEY MANOR, WORCESTERSHIRE. By the Rev. J. Lewis Moilliet, M.A. London (Elliot Stock).

For Abberley is claimed the distinction of being the spot where St. Augustine held conference with the Celtic bishops, and certainly a famous old oak within the parish, no longer in existence, was traditionally known as "St. Augustine's oak." Mr. Moilliet, who was Rector of Abberley from 1865 to 1901, has done good service to his former parishioners in telling pleasantly the history of the village from the earliest times to the present day, and has also given the pedigrees of the families of de Tony, or de Todenai, Beauchamp, Neville, Walsh, Bromley, Moilliet and Jones, who have successively held the lordship of the manor. The genealogical tables have for the most part been taken from Nash, and in no case have the pedigrees been very scientifically compiled, being without proofs and often lacking dates. Some rather scrappy notes relating to the de Tonys have been added from various sources, authorities not having been always supplied. The manor was conferred by Henry VIII on Walter Walsh, one of the Grooms of his Chamber, and the descendants of this Walter held the estate for 175 years. Of this family was William Walsh, Master of the Horse to Queen Anne and M.P. for Worcestershire, a friend of Addison and Pope.

Abberley Lodge, the old home of the Walshes and Bromleys, has long been replaced by the modern Abberley Hall, and the parish has since 1848 also lost its ancient Norman church. On pp. 84-86 are a few notes from the parish registers, among the burials being that of Algernon Coote, son of Richard, second Earl of Bellamont, 5 May 1730.

GENEALOGICAL ABSTRACTS OF WILLS, PROVED IN THE PREROGATIVE COURT OF CANTERBURY. REGISTER "WOOTTON," 1658. VOLUME II. By William Brigg, B.A. (Privately printed for the Subscribers.)

In our notice last year of Mr. J. Henry Lea's excellent abstracts of Register "Soame," a hope was expressed that Mr. Brigg, to whom is due the inception of the idea of printing short epitomes of all wills proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury during a given period, would feel encouraged to continue his abstracts of Book "Wootton." It is a great pleasure to find that this hope has been so speedily realized, and we can only repeat the advice given to our readers many years ago on the first appearance of Mr. Brigg's venture, to subscribe to a scheme of such manifest importance and utility. The records of the Prerogative Court during the Commonwealth have a peculiar interest, as all wills throughout the country were proved before the Judges in London, and if for that period only abstracts could be printed on the plan of the present work, a service would be rendered to genealogists of inestimable value. Those who are familiar with the records at Somerset House will be aware that at this time the wills in the Register books are often, though not by any means always, grouped together in counties, and this is often very helpful to those who are specially interested in any particular locality. Mr. Brigg's plan has been to give all names and particulars likely to afford clues to genealogists,



avoiding all unnecessary verbiage, and his abstracts will be found to be models of brevity and lucidity. Vol. ii covers folios 53-105 of the Register book, and contains epitomes of 721 wills. It only remains to add that there are comprehensive indices of both persons and places, without which indeed a work of this character would be of little value to anyone.

STUDHAM, THE STORY OF A SECLUDED PARISH. By the Rev. J. E. Brown, Vicar. London (Elliot Stock); Dunstable (Miles Taylor).

Studham lies within two counties, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire. Its present Vicar has set out to write the history of his parish in the only right fashion, namely from records, and on the whole may be considered to have successfully accomplished his task, but unfortunately he has given few references to authorities and the particulars he supplies as to the principal families connected with Studham in past times might well have been made fuller and more interesting. Among these families were the de Stodhams, of whom a very slight conjectural pedigree is given, the le Mareschalls, Botlesfords, Spigornells and Bellfields. A chapter on the lands held by monastic bodies in the parish before the dissolution of the monasteries, has evidently been compiled with great care, and is of considerable interest. In writing of one of the Hundreds of Hertfordshire, Mr. Brown is evidently unaware that "Dancis" and "Dacorum" have an identical meaning. The question—"What is a mortuary?" can easily be answered by reference to a good glossary.

MONUMENTAL BRASSES IN THE BEDFORDSHIRE CHURCHES. By Grace Isherwood. London (Elliot Stock).

Between the dates, August 1893, and April 1897, Mr. H. K. St. J. Saunderson contributed to the pages of the *Transactions of the Cambridge University Association of Brass Collectors* a paper entitled "The Brasses of Bedfordshire," and as far as we have examined this small volume it appears to be a reproduction of Mr. Saunderson's work. No allusion, however, is made to the source from which the present collection is derived, nor is it a coincidence that the same work has been done by two individuals, as an examination of page 37 with page 169 in Volume ii of the *Transactions* will show. The illustrations drawn from rubbings by the "authoress" are not so satisfactory as reproductions of original rubbings, and although the frontispiece, which represents the figure of Sir "Jarrate Haryye," and the illustration facing page 16, representing his wife, look imposing, yet we must confess to a preference for the reproduction of the entire brass as it appears in the C.U.A.B.C., Vol. i, Part x, p. 14. It is more than a pity that authorities are not quoted for this compilation, as at the first glance we were led to think it contained a collection of inscriptions on brasses made by the authoress herself, which it evidently does not. Unlike the *Transactions* there is no index.



## Notes and Queries.

WALPOLE FAMILY OF NORFOLK (*ante*, p. 207).—I think Mr. W. F. Carter must have meant, not my short note on the family in my "Doubtful Norfolk Pedigrees" series, but the longer analysis in "Norfolk Antiquarian Miscellanies," vol. i, pp. 267-284. The entries he cites from the late Plantagenet Harrison's notes apparently relate to a different family taking its name from Walpole in Suffolk, not from the Walpole in the marshland of Norfolk. Much new material has come to light during the thirty years which have elapsed since the writing of the two above-mentioned articles, and I hope soon to publish comprehensive accounts of all the best known Norfolk families.
