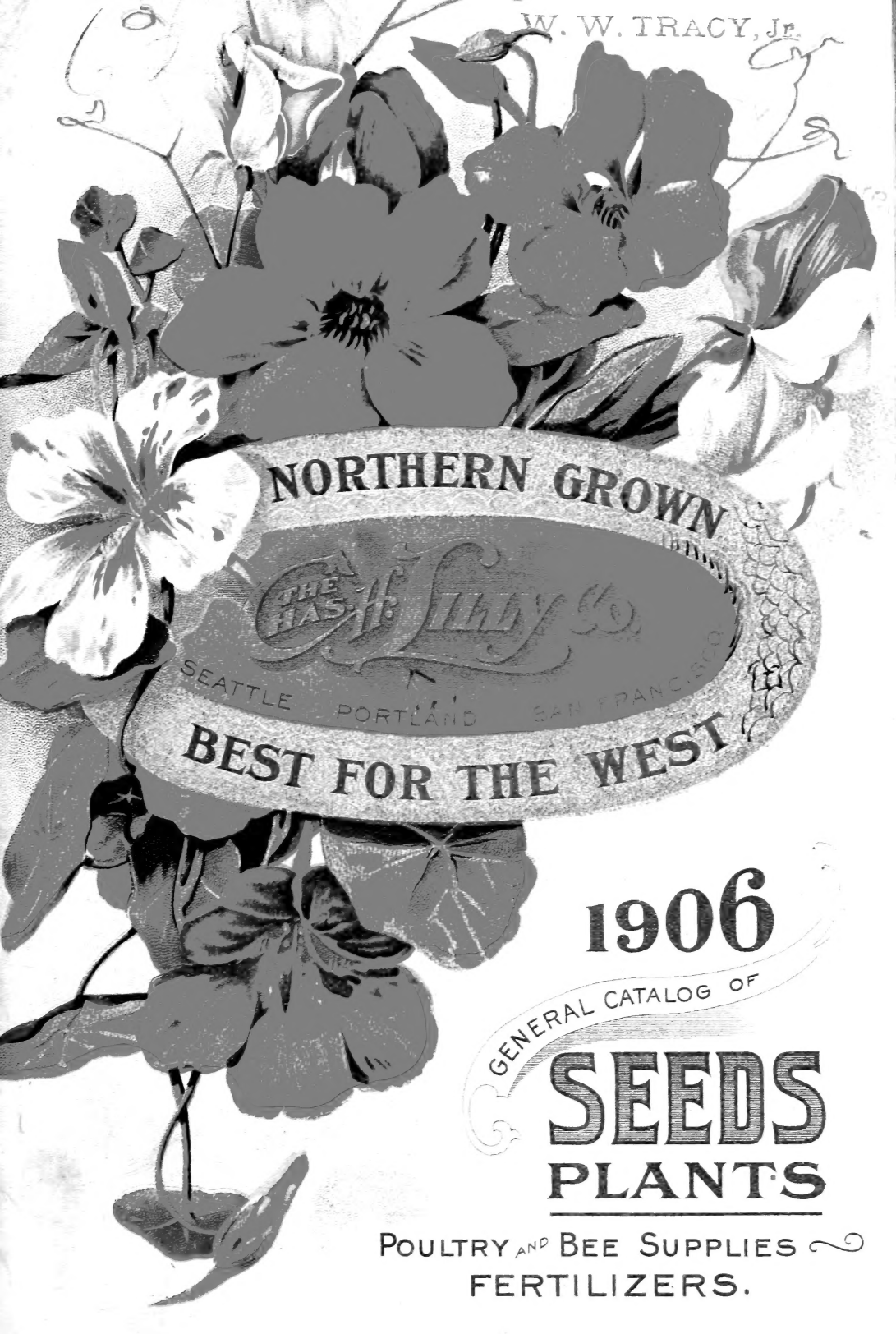

NONPAREIL LAWN MIXTURE

Nonpareil Lawn Grass is a well proportioned mixture of seven different native and imported grasses. This gives a superior lawn for two reasons. First, a mixture makes a solid turf, each grass having its own peculiarities of growth, some deep rooting and others of a spreading habit. Thus a mixture makes a compact sod closely interwoven and will not wash by rains or punch full of holes when walked on.

The second reason why Nonpareil Mixed Lawn Grass Seed is to be desired is because the varieties of grass seed are selected on account of the time of growth. Everyone knows that some grasses being deep rooted are at their best during the dry summer, others of a different nature are at their best during the fall or winter, thus a lawn containing all of these desirable varieties is always in good shape and one avoids having in the late summer and fall one of those thin lawns which you can see through.

Always prepare your land thoroughly and have it well enriched before sowing seed. Lawns will not only make a better growth but will have a far better color where plenty of nourishment is supplied.

1 lb. of Nonpareil Lawn Grass Seed will sow a space 20x20 ft. The more seed you use the better lawn you will get. Full directions on each package.

We strongly recommend a commercial fertilizer such as Holly Lawn Dressing. As stable manure does not contain any potash, one of the most essential elements, especially on the Pacific Coast, and besides being unpleasant to handle and have round the yard, it also has the disadvantage of being full of weed seeds. When the stable manure has to be bought, Commercial Fertilizer is the cheapest.

A Lawn Roller is very necessary if you wish a smooth solid lawn. It levels down any little bunches or tufts of grass and makes the lawn much easier to mow.

OLD LAWNS.

Should have an application of Holly Lawn Dressing and about 1 lb. of Nonpareil Lawn Grass to every 20x40 feet, it will be found an advantage to sow the seed early and it is not necessary to rake it in as the shade from the growing grass will protect the seed until it takes root.

WHY A MIXTURE SHOULD BE SOWN.—Whether for hay or for pasture, there are many advantages to be obtained by sowing a mixture. The up-to-date farmer, as well as the agricultural college, advocates sowing a number of species at one time. Each grass lives, to a great extent, on different constituents. The season that would completely check the growth of one variety of grass will act as an encouragement to some other variety, so that with a mixture failure is practically impossible. This mixture must be so composed as to make a solid turf. If a large portion of tufted or bunchy grasses are used bottom grasses of more spreading habit must be intermingled so as to fill the spaces and make a compact, even growth. It is also desirable to use those kinds that make a rapid growth after each cutting. In a mixture for hay, such grasses should be used that will all mature about the same time, while for a pasture mixture the chief requisite is that early, medium and late varieties should be used together, so as to furnish continued grazing the entire season. About 15 lbs. of either mixture will be sufficient to sow an acre, but for an extra good stand 20 to 25 lbs. could be used to advantage.

HOW TO SOW—The L. B. Pasture Mixture will produce one good crop of hay each season and can then be pastured the balance of the year. Before sown it should be thoroughly stirred, as the heavy seeds will settle to the bottom during transit, and unless the seed is thoroughly mixed your field is apt to be spotted. At least 20 pounds should be sown per acre and twice this amount will give better results. Although this mixture will do well sown early in the spring, results will be much better if sown in the fall. The grasses composing this mixture are deep, fibrous rooting, thus insuring a good pasture during the driest spells, and a tough matted sod that will stand twice the pasturing that the ordinary sod will; in fact, almost impossible to kill out by over-grazing.

The L. B. Hay-Mixture has the same good qualities as the pasture mixture, but the grasses used are tall growing and all mature at about the same season, so that they are all ready to cut at the same time.

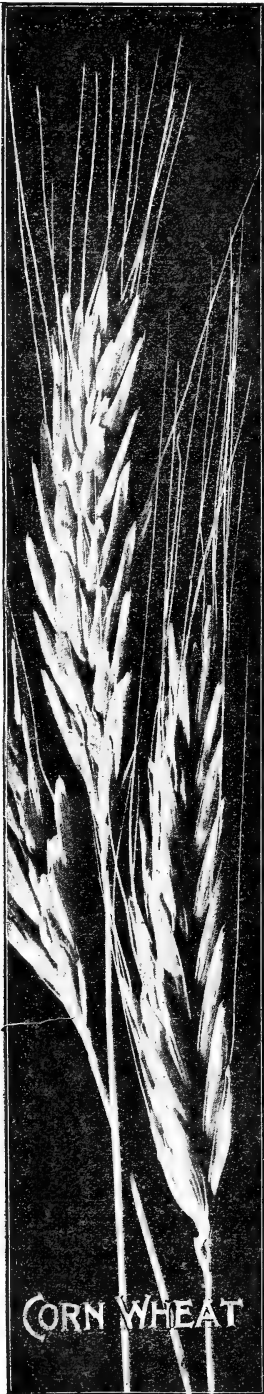

AGROSTIS STOLONIFERA (Creeping Bent, or Fiorin). The distinctive feature of this species is, as the name implies, its compact, creeping, rooting stems. It prefers low bottom-lands, especially if they are somewhat sandy. It is of rapid growth and spreading habit, and the stoloniferous roots form a strong, enduring turf, that is positively improved by constant trampling. hay. If cut before it flowers it is less hard and the pith of the stem is soft and sweet. It blossoms about the same time as Red Clover, and is therefore desirable in mixture with that plant. Stock of all kinds are very fond of it, either dry or green, and it endures constant cropping better than any other grass. After being mown it grows up quicker and yields a heavier aftermath than any other variety. It can stand considerable shade, and is recommended as a pasture grass for woodlands. PHALARIS ARUNDINACEA (Reed Canary Grass). A very hardy perennial, preferring stiff, wet land, but also doing fairly well in dry, sandy soils. It grows well in ditches and by riversides, where its strong, creeping rootstocks render it valuable for binding the banks. Its seed also affords food for trout and wild fowl. When young it may be cut for green forage for cattle, but in its more matured state it is too coarse for this purpose. One of the very few grasses that will live on overflowed land. The flowers must be seen to appreciate their profusion of growth and great beauty. 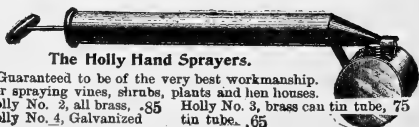

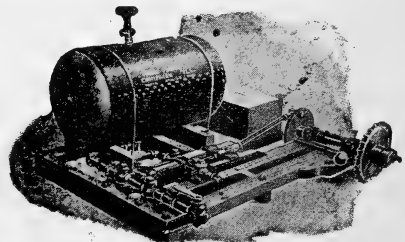

WHY YOU SHOULD USE COMMERCIAL FERTILIZER.

1st. Because it costs no more to prepare, plant, cultivate and harvest a full crop than it does a half crop.

2nd. The crop that is healthy and a vigorous grower is not nearly so apt to be troubled with insects, scale and other pests.

3rd. On a crop where fertilizers have been used the product is not only greater in volume, but is much better in quality and will sell for more per bushel or hundred weight.

THE COMPOSITION OF FERTILIZER.

In all forms of Fertilizers there are three essential elements, without any one of which the full value of the others cannot be had. These necessary elements are Potash, Nitrogen and Phosphoric Acid, and they must be present in some form in every complete fertilizer.

POTASH. On the Pacific Coast Potash is to be had in only one form, that of Potash Salts. There are three kinds of these, i. e., Kanit, Muriate of Potash and Sulphate of Potash. Wood ashes also contain available potash, but usually it costs more to gather and apply than the Potash can be bought for in the form of Potash Salts. The function of Potash is to produce fruit. It is a very essential item, especially on land west of the Cascade mountains, which is very deficient in this element. The use of Potash will give a heavier and better yield. For instance, when used on hops the crop will have a better color and be much heavier in weight. On strawberries and other fruits the berries will be much larger and of better color. On potatoes and root crops the yield will be very largely increased and the quality will also be improved.

NITROGEN. This is also an essential element. It produces the leaf and the stalk of the plant. Nitrogen is the most volatile of the three elements and, therefore, must be applied every season. It is required in almost all soils, except where crops of clover, peas or other legumes are being or have been grown. We derive Nitrogen from fish guano, dried blood and nitrate of soda.

PHOSPHORIC ACID. This element enables the plant to make full use of the Nitrogen and Potash. While this is a necessary element, yet it is not as conspicuous by its absence in our soils as either of the other two elements above mentioned. Yet, strange to say, about the first thing the average person thinks of applying on soil is bone meal, which is practically nothing but Phosphoric Acid. We derive Phosphoric Acid from the following sources: Bone meal, blood and bone, acid phosphate, fish guano and tankage.

In using Commercial Fertilizer we are benefited not only by the direct result of their use, but also by the fact that they put the ground in better mechanical condition and the chemical action that takes place when this fertilizer is mixed in the ground releases other elements which are in the soil, but which are otherwise unavailable. We have often had objection made to the use of chemical fertilizer, the claim being made that the fertilizer has to be applied every year. This can be easily answered as follows: If you apply the fertilizer and then take off a crop representing as many pounds of Phosphoric Acid, Potash and Nitrogen as you have added, naturally another season you would have to apply the fertilizer again. As the old saying is: "You cannot keep your cake and eat it, too." But for every dollar's worth of fertilizer that you put on your land you should get two dollars' worth of product off it, in addition to what you hitherto had been getting.

With the exception of Potash, which we must derive from mineral sources, all our complete fertilizers are made up from animal matter, the Nitrogen and Phosphoric Acid being derived from animal substances instead of mineral. This makes the fertilizer of much greater value than where these elements are derived from minerals or chemicals. The animal fertilizer retains its value for a greater period of time than does the mineral, and, in addition, has the value of giving a certain warmth to the land, creating in it a tendency to produce not only a larger crop but also an earlier one.

Potash does not perceptibly leach out of the soil, but Nitrate of Soda and Super Phosphate, however, will not remain long in the ground and, unless there exists plant growth to make immediate use of them, will soon be lost. By the use of animal matter to supply the Nitrogen and Phosphoric Acid, a complete fertilizer is furnished that may be applied early and worked into the soil, and if plants do not make use of the full supply the remainder is retained for another season.

It is well to use lime on lands that have a tendency to become sour. This will apply to most of the soils west of the Cascade mountains. Lime sweetens the soil and makes available those elements which, without its use, usually remain in the soil as an unavailable compound.

We cannot too strongly advise the use of Complete Fertilizers, containing the three essential plant foods, unless it is absolutely known that the soil has a sufficiency of any of these ingredients. While we are perfectly willing and glad to supply any of the ingredients separately, yet we are satisfied that better results will be had by the use of our Complete Mixed Fertilizer, as we are well equipped with special machinery for thoroughly mixing. This enables us to prepare a fertilizer of more uniform quality and cheaper than can be done when mixing by hand.

In addition, we are always pleased to make any special mixture where special needs exist. We issue a guaranteed analysis on all our fertilizers, which means that they will usually run over the analysis published, but never under. In shipping to points east of the Cascade mountains we change the formula by adding more Nitrogen and leaving out some of the Potash. Right here we would like to say one word in reference to following formulas published by Eastern fertilizer manufacturers. Our conditions here are peculiar. We do not believe there is another section in the United States where land is

as deficient in potash as in that section west of the Cascade mountains. Therefore, it is necessary that our fertilizers be made strong in this ingredient, while, on the other hand, the land in the Yakima and the Wenatchee country and, in fact, all that section east of the Cascade mountains has, as a rule, a very good supply of potash, but is very deficient in nitrogen. We always bear this in mind when shipping to various points and take into consideration the needs of the various localities to which we are sending.

We employ our own chemist and know exactly what is contained in each brand that we put out. We are making the following special mixtures:

HOLLY BRAND VEGETABLE MIXTURE.

Contains Nitrogen, 3 per cent; Potash, 5 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 11 per cent.

This is a Complete Fertilizer for general use in gardening or truck farming. It is properly balanced and if from 600 to 1,000 pounds per acre be applied early in the season, at the time of first plowing, the yield of the vegetable garden can be increased from 2 to 5 times the former crop. There is no place where it pays better than in the vegetable garden. As a rule the vegetable garden is cultivated by hand. At any rate, there is always considerable hand work, which is by long odds the most expensive part of the vegetable garden and if, by the use of Complete Fertilizers, one acre can be made to produce as much as two or three formerly did the cost of the fertilizer is paid for in the saving of the labor alone. Not only will the production be vastly increased, but there will be very few weeds to fight, as the weeds come very largely through the use of stable manure.

Where experiments have not been carried out and the specific needs of the soil determined, it becomes necessary to assume that all the constituents are required, and to apply the amounts and proportions of those which the general consideration of the soil, season, climate and crop would seem to demand. Except in special cases, such as celery, where it is well known that Kanit is the most valuable, a Complete Fertilizer containing Nitrogen, Phosphoric Acid and Potash should be used. It will not only increase the yield, but will also give a much earlier maturing crop.

HOLLY BRAND LAWN DRESSING.

Contains Nitrogen, 5 per cent; Potash, 5 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 8 per cent.

This is particularly adapted for use on lawns. It is odorless, and, while part of it is quickly available, yet by the use of animal fertilizer good results will be shown for two years after applying. This fertilizer is also adapted to the flower garden, and will show good results in the vegetable garden, although if a fertilizer is wanted in large quantities for vegetables it would be better to make use of those made for special crops. One hundred pounds of our Lawn Dressing is equal to one load of stable manure and should be used in the quantity of about one sack to the ordinary city lot. As the Complete Fertilizer is very strong and concentrated, care should be used in applying to see that it is not put on the lawn in lumps or handfuls, but should be spread evenly.

New lawns should receive a heavy application, which should be raked into the soil thoroughly. Old lawns should receive one application in the fall and another in the spring. If, however, it is impossible to do this, both applications can be made in the spring, from thirty to sixty days apart. Much better results will be had from either of these methods than to apply a large quantity at once. Old lawns should have a light sowing of grass seed once a year. To maintain a good lawn apply the fertilizer once a year, as lawn grass is a heavy feeder and will not keep its beautiful dark green color and velvety appearance unless a sufficient amount of suitable plant food is supplied. One great advantage in the use of the Complete Fertilizer is the absence of weeds and foreign plants that always follow where barnyard manure is used.

It is better to use the Complete Fertilizer during the fall, winter or early spring, but it may be safely used at any time (except in very hot weather) if the lawn is well sprinkled every day for two weeks after the Fertilizer is applied.

HOLLY BRAND HOP MIXTURE.

Contains Nitrogen, 4 per cent; Potash, 10 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 8 per cent.

This is a Complete Fertilizer mixed especially for hops, and should be used in the proportion of about 500 pounds to the acre. The composition of this mixture is a formula used for the White River and Willamette River Valleys. For the Yakima Valley we add Nitrogen and use less Potash. An average crop of hops takes out of the land 53 pounds of Potash, 23 pounds of Phosphoric Acid and 34 pounds Nitrogen. In order to continue getting big crops it is necessary to replace all three of these elements. It is quite evident that if only one of these elements is replaced, the Nitrogen, for instance, by the use of Dried Blood, in order to produce a crop larger than ordinary, the soil is robbed of phosphoric acid and potash. This can not be kept up indefinitely; in fact, for not more than two or three years, without showing serious results.

Our Hop Mixture contains more potash than would seem to be necessary on first thought, but when one comes to consider that Nitrogen is present in considerable quantities in most of our soils, being placed there by the decaying of vegetable matter, barnyard manure, etc., it will be evident to the hop farmer that the above formula will answer in 99 cases out of 100. Our Hop Mixture can be used in connection with stable manure to excellent advantage.

HOLLY BRAND CLOVER MIXTURE.

Contains Potash, 11 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 12 per cent.

This is especially adapted for use in fertilizing the plots that are to raise Clovers, Beans, Peas, and other legumes. Where clover is grown year after year it is unnecessary on most soils to apply fertilizers, as the clover and other plants of a similar nature, such as vetches, peas, beans, etc., are themselves soil enrichers. But in starting a crop of clover 500 pounds per acre of our Holly Brand Clover Mixture will show handsome results. On land that is deficient in potash and phosphoric acid a yearly application of the above Mixture will give a much heavier crop of peas, beans, or other grain than where no fertilizer is used. It should be remembered the ingredients contained in this Clover Mixture are those ingredients not furnished through the agency of the clover itself.

HOLLY BRAND POTATO MIXTURE.

Contains Nitrogen, 3 per cent; Potash, 11 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 6 per cent.

Particularly adapted for Potatoes, Mangels, and other root crops. You will notice it is very high in the percentage of Potash, which is an essential element for those crops. The

proper amount to use is between 800 and 1,000 pounds to the acre, to secure best results.

One ton of our Potato Mixture contains as much available Nitrogen as six tons of mixed stable manures, as much Potash as eighteen tons of manure, and as much Phosphoric Acid as twenty-one tons manure. If the different elements in stable manure were properly proportioned no less than 15 tons would be necessary to equal one ton of our Potato Mixture, but on account of the excess of Nitrogen and the great shortage of Potash and Phosphoric Acid more and better results are secured from one ton of the Potato Mixture than from twenty tons of stable manure, the excess amount of Nitrogen being wasted. This excess of Nitrogen makes tops, but not roots. It also has the tendency to prevent the ripening of plants, and, especially in the case of potatoes, a heavy application of stable manure will cause scabby, misshapen tubers.

The complete Potato Mixture should be applied one week before planting early potatoes, and if possible should be applied at least a month before planting a late crop.

HOLLY BRAND GRAIN MIXTURE.

Contains Nitrogen, 2 per cent; Potash, 6 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 8 per cent.

This Fertilizer is adapted to all varieties of grains. It contains a large proportion of both Phosphoric Acid and Potash. Use from 300 to 500 pounds per acre to secure the best results. It is well known that to produce grain abundantly a fertilizer must be used proportionately rich in Potash and Phosphoric Acid, and for this reason barnyard manure does not form a complete fertilizer, but may be used to advantage with our complete Grain Mixture. An excess of Nitrogen, such as is contained in barnyard manure, causes a tall, rank stalk, which is of poor color and has a light yield of grain. Also, in land that lacks potash and phosphoric acid plants will not stool out as they should, and what grain does mature will be thin and light. The potash is absolutely necessary for flowers and seed and the phosphoric acid hastens the maturity of the grain and furnishes the starch, sugar and fat content.

HOLLY BRAND STRAWBERRY MIXTURE.

Contains Nitrogen, 4 per cent; Potash, 9 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 8 per cent.

Peculiarly adapted to the fertilization of Strawberries, Raspberries, Tomatoes, and the various fruit crops. An application of from 400 to 700 pounds per acre on land to be devoted to the cultivation of berries and fruit will give a largely increased yield. The Potash which is present in this Mixture will give the fruit a much better color. This Mixture also makes a fertilizer that can be used in connection with barnyard manure to excellent advantage. It has been proven that the lack of color in apples and other fruit grown in Western Washington and Oregon is due more to the absence of potash than to the lack of sunshine. With the proper use of the right kind of fertilizer, apples can be grown in this section that for color will nearly equal those grown east of the mountains. There is also the advantage that the scale and insect pests will not be half as troublesome where a good fertilizer is used in generous quantities. On small fruits it is hard to estimate the advantages to be derived from the use of a Complete Fertilizer. The crop is of much better quality and always sells at the top figure of the market, and when prices are low will sell when poorer grades are hard to dispose of. Fruit grown on land that has been furnished a dressing of Complete Fertilizer is harder and stands shipping better than ordinary.

HOLLY BRAND FOOD FOR FLOWERS.

Contains Nitrogen, 2 per cent; Potash, 4 per cent; Phosphoric Acid, 6 per cent.

This is a special preparation for fertilizing the soil in which are grown flowering plants, either in the pot or in the garden. It is to be dissolved in the water used to water the plants, and its effect will be to make the plants take on a more healthy growth, attain a greener and more beautiful appearance and throw out a greater profusion of flowers. It is also valuable for cut flowers, as it will keep them in fresh condition much longer and preserve the color. When flowers are to be repotted the Food for Flowers should be used to fertilize the new soil, rather than to use stable manure.

IN CONCLUSION.

Remember that the fertility and the usefulness of soils are not measured by the most abundant fertilizing element therein, but by the one that is most lacking. Just as a chain is measured by its weakest link, so is the producing capacity of the land measured by the fertilizing element that is most lacking.

DIRECTIONS

In raising chicks we all know that with one of the modern incubators, it is no trick to hatch them, but where the rub comes is in successfully brooding them for the first 4 or 6 weeks of their existence. A little chick just out of the shell is a very delicate thing. When just hatched the least draft is liable to give them a cold from which they will never recover. The best plan is to leave them in the incubator for 24 hours, then have your brooder all prepared, thoroughly warmed, and move them from the incubator to the brooder in a basket, or other receptacle, lined with an old blanket. Do not feed them a thing for 48 hours, and it is just as well if they do not get anything to eat for another 24 hours. Do not handle them, and do not expect them to run around for the first one or two days; they are better off under the hover of the brooder. Their first feed should be a sprinkling of Holly Chick Feed, giving them just what they will pick up. This with water, so placed that they cannot get into it, and a little green stuff is all they will need for 5 weeks. The first few days they should be fed about 5 times a day, then you can begin feeding more at a time, and about three times a day, always scattering the Chick Feed in straw or chaff, so they will have to scratch for it. 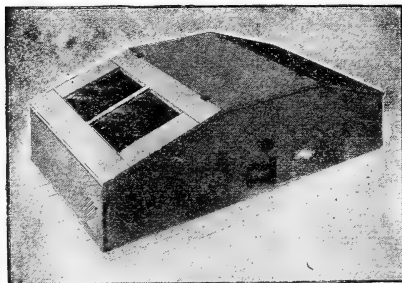

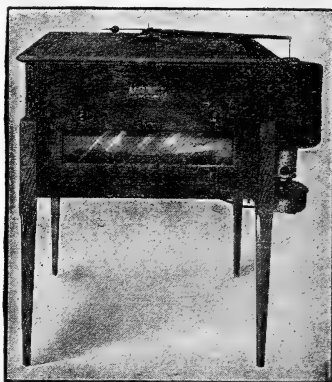
Double Indoor Brooder.

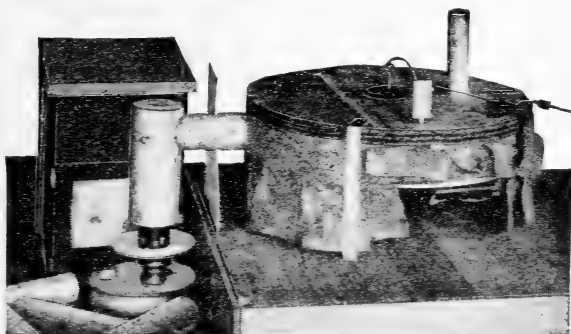
