IMPORTANT NOTE—The weight limits in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd zones have been increased to 70 pounds; in other zones the limit is now 50 pounds

Parcels Post — Since the installation of the new parcels post law seeds, bulbs, tools, plants and garden supplies (excepting poisons and liquids) may be sent by mail to all parts of the United States, including Alaska, Canal Zone, Guam, Hawaii, Porto Rico and the Philippines. Packages are subject to a limit of maximum weight in the first and second and third zone of 70 pounds; in all other zones of 50 pounds. The maximum size of a package is 84 inches for length and largeness of the girth combined.

Zone Rates — May be had by applying to your postmaster, who will tell you which zone you are in with reference to Los Angeles or upon application we will tell you if you supply us with the name of your postoffice.

For Parcels Weighing 8 Ounces or Less, containing seeds, bulbs or books only, the rate of postage to all zones is 11/2 cents for 2 ounces or fraction. (Over 8 ounces the parcels post rates apply.)

Packages of seed weighing 8 oz. or less can be forwarded anywhere in the U.S. at a cost of one and a half cents for each two ounces, or fraction thereof.

On shipments weighing 20 pounds or more beyond the 2d postal zone it is cheaper to ship seeds by express. As the express companies give a receipt for each package, it amounts practically to insurance without cost, whereas it costs extra, according to value, to insure a parcel post package. We guarantee the safe arrival in the U.S. of all seeds shipped by express or insured parcel post.

To foreign countries the parcel post rate is 14 cents per lb. Registration where possible is 10 cents. O.O.D. orders can now be sent to Mexico.



GARDEN AND FARM HELPS

THE SOIL

The soil is an important factor in successful gardening, yet all that is needed in the average garden is thorough spading up or plowing of the soil, and the addition of a little plant food each year to compensate for the crop which has been removed.

has been removed.

Occasionally, however, soils are found to be entirely too heavy or too sandy, or to contain too much alkali at the surface. Strangely enough, the best remedy for all these conditions is one and the same, namely: the addition of humus or decayed vegetable or animal matter to the soil. Organic matter prevents close packing of the soil particles in heavy soils, correcting stickiness and baking.

In light soils it helps to retain moisture, adds fertility and in time builds up a sandy loam which is the best of all soils for general purposes.

soils for general purposes.

IRRIGATION AND CULTIVATION

Irrigation and cultivation are closely related, for indeed the first is of little real value without the other. Furrow irrigation is very generally used for all kinds of crops in California. The water is allowed to run, in a furrow irrigation is very generally used for all kinds of crops in California. The water is allowed to run, in a slow stream, between the plant rows, in a ditch or furrow prepared for that purpose.

Irrigation by flooding is resorted to when the plants are grown rather closely in beds. Ridges six or eight inches high are raised around the beds and they are then flooded

until the soil is thoroughly soaked.

Frequency of irrigation is largely a matter of soil and exposure, but the soaking must be thorough and the effect should be made to last by persistent cultivation. The depth to which the hoe may be allowed to go is governed by the crop. In cultivating deep rooting plants, stir the soil to a depth of five or six inches. For crops with shallow, spreading roots, three or four inches is the limit.

SEED SOWING

Seed should be sown in soil which has been thoroughly moistened by recent rains, by irrigation or watering. As soon as the soil is again workable, stir up the surface and pulverize it very thoroughly with a rake. Then sow the seed, covering it according to its size and the vigor of its kind. Most garden seeds may be covered ½ to ½ Inch—a few, such as Peas, Beans, Corn, etc., one to two inches, and some small ones only ½ inch. Press the soil firm after rowing. Seeds sprout better when the soil is pressed smally sowing. Seeds around them. Seeds sprout better when the soil is pressed snugly

Vegetable crops are usually planted in double rows on ridges about eighteen inches wide. Btween the ridges a furrow, five to six inches deep and one foot wide, is left for

irrigation.

Generally the seedlings will appear above the ground

Generally the seedlings will appear above the ground before more water is needed.

Flower seeds, for the most part, require shallow planting and many are of slow germination. It is best to provide shade where these are sown, or a mulch of fine moss or similar material may be spread thinly on the ground. Sometimes a piece of burlap is placed on the surface and allowed to remain until the seeds sprout underneath. Watering must be carefully done, with a fine spray from the hose or watering can, and never by flooding.

PRUNING PRUNING

Fruit Trees.—From the start the young tree should be given an open and rather low headed form. It should be cut back and only enough branches allowed to grow to cut back and only enough branches allowed to grow to make a well-balanced, symmetrical specimen. Four or five branches are sufficient to begin with, and they should be well distributed on the trunk. The pruning is done when the trees are dormant in late fall or winter. Branches are shortened according to their vigor, suckers removed, and all crowding prevented. As the years pass, less pruning is necessary, except to remove dead wood and weak or crowded branches. Any appearance of disease is better out out then

necessary, except to remove dead wood and weak or crowded branches. Any appearance of disease is bettr cut out than any treatment that could be applied. A tree once in good bearing condition seldom needs extensive pruning.

Berry Plants.—Brambles of Blackberries and similar small fruits should be made to keep within their allotted space. The current year's growth may be curtailed and the resulting side branches may also be cut back. They will bear as well the next season as if allowed free scope. In fall all old fruiting wood is removed entirely, leaving only enough fresh canes to make a well furnished bush.

Grape Vines.—Young vines need no pruning until the second year. Prune any time after the leaves have fallen. At the first pruning remove all shoots but one, shortening the remaining one according to the growth it has made. If strong, allow eighteen inches; if weak cut back to two eyes. strong, allow eighteen inches; if weak cut back to two eyes. Thereafter, pruning will be guided by the shape desired. If trellised, several branches are trained up at once, all being cut back somewhat each year to induce strong growth, and side branches are completely removed. For field culture, the plants are cut back very severely to one stem which, in time, acts as a trunk. Where vines branch out too vigorously, they may be kept in check during the summer by pinching or cutting above the fifth leaf joint, all fruit appearing below this joint.

THE CONTROL OF GARDEN PESTS
While the control of harmful insects and plant diseases
has become a complicated science, enough information upon this subject can readily be acquired by the layman to enable him to protect all usual crops and guard against frequent and apparently unwarranted failures, so depressing to the home gardener.

nome gardener.

General speaking, there are two methods of pest control. The first consists of the application of sprays, the second of dusting materials. The insecticide ingredients used are the same in both, and the difference resides merely in the mode of application. It is a matter of opinion and personal convenience to the gardener whether the materials shall be used wet, in the form of sprays, or dry, in the form of dust. In the main, there are four insecticides which should be kept on hand wherever gardening is attempted. They are: Arsenate of Lead, Nicotine, Sulphur and Bordeaux Mixture.

For Spraying.—Dry Arsenate of Lead and dry Bordeaux may be mixed with water. Nicotine should be in the form of Nicotine Sulphate (commonly known as "Black Leaf") and Sulphur in the form of Lime-Sulphur Solution.

may be mixed with water. Nicotine should be in the form of Nicotine Sulphate (commonly known as "Black Leaf 40") and Sulphur in the form of Lime-Sulphur Solution. All to be diluted with water according to directions.

For Dusting.—Obtain dry Arsenate of Lead, dry Bordeaux Mixture, Nicotine Dust and Dusting Sulphur.

According to the method selected, obtain a hand sprayer or a hand duster. Whether dust or spray is applied, it must be thoroughly done covering both upper and lower sides of

be thoroughly done, covering both upper and lower sides of the leaves over the entire plant. The pests to be controlled belong mainly to the following classes:

Chewing insects, which actually eat the leaves-Beetles, Caterpillars, etc.

Chewing insects, which actually eat the leaves—Beetles, Caterpillars, etc.

Sucking insects, which feed upon the plant by sucking the juices—Aphids, Plant Lice, Thrip, etc.

Fungous and Bacterial Diseases, caused by minute fungi or bacteria developing on the surface or in the tissues of the plants—Mildew, Rust, Wilt, etc.

Scale insects, or "Scale"—scale forming insects, clinging closely to the stems and other parts of plants.

Treatment—Examine plants closely. If small insects, often quite minute, are present but leaves are not eaten, follow instructions given below for sucking insects. If no insects can be found, but leaves are discolored or wilted, this is probably due to a fungous or bacterial disease, and must be treated accordingly. Scale is most troublesome on fruit trees and other hard-wooded plants and vines.

PREPARATIONS TO USE

Chewing Insects—Spray with Arsenate of Lead, two level tablespoonfuls to one gallon of water, or two teaspoons to one pint, or dust lightly with dry Arsenate of Lead. Antrol Syrup. A Cottage Set is ideal for the home and garden.

Sucking Insects—Spray with Nicotine Sulphate (known as Black Leaf 40), one teaspoonful to a gallon of water (rarely a little stronger), or dust with Nicotine Dust.

Fungous and Bacterial Disea es—Spray with Bordeaux Mixture, 11 to 12 level tablespoonfuls of dry Bordeaux to one gallon of water, or dust with Bordeaux Mixture dry or spray with Lime-Sulphur Solution—¼ pint of Lime-Sulphur to one gallon of water, or dust with dusting sulphur.

Scale—on trees, when dormant, spray with "winter strength" Lime-Sulphur Solution, one pint to one gallon of water; on growing plants and trees use "summer strength," ¼ pint of Lime-Sulphur to one gallon of water.

CONTROL OF MISCELLANEOUS PESTS

Ant Control—The Argentine Ants are a serious pest, carrying scale and aphids which cause most of our insect troubles. They must be controlled. Use the Antrol Method, consisting of glass lars with aluminum tops, and filled with Antrol Syrup. A Cottage Set is ideal for the home and garden.

Cut Worms—Soft brown or gray worms of various kinds, feeding on the roots, crown or stems of plants, usually near the surface of the ground. Encircle the stem with heavy paper or tin, and sprinkle a poison bait, composed of bran mixed with 10 per cent Arsenate of Lead and 10 per cent Molasses, by weight, add enough water to make a mash.

ance. Wherever possible, destroy by burning all plants or parts of plants affected. Lemon Oil, Whale-Oil Soap or Carbolic Acid (in weak solution) with soap, are beneficial—Cyanide Fumigation is dangerous, consult an expert before undertaking it.

Wire Worms—Slim, brown larvae, feeding upon the roots of various plants. Sprinkle poison bait (as for cutworms). Plow land in early fall and practice short rotations of the roots of the r

Scab—on Potatoes and Gladiolus, or similar flower corms. Dip Seed Potatoes and Corms, before planting, in Semesan Solution, one ounce dissolved by stirring in three gallons of water. 

SHIPPING. Express shipments of Nursery Stock travel under what is known as the "General Special" Rate, which is 20 per cent less than the first-class rate. We would advise having shipments too large for parcel post go by express, as we consider freight too slow for goods of such a perishable nature.

NON-WARRANTY. We exercise the greatest care in the selection, packing and labeling of plants and trees, but give no guarantee, express or implied, as to their growth, productiveness, quality, or any other matter of any trees, plants or seeds that we send out, and will not be in any way responsible for crops. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these terms, they must be returned at once.

SUBSTITUTION. Where particular varieties are ordered and particular ages and sizes of trees, kinds of stock, etc., it should be stated whether and to what extent substitution will be allowed in case the order cannot be filled to the letter. Where no instructions in this respect accompany the order, we shall feel at liberty to substitute other varieties as nearly similar as possible. If the selection of varieties is left entirely to us, we shall endeavor to send only such sorts as are acknowledged to give general satisfaction.

AS USUAL, six of any one certain variety will be furnished at dozen rates; 50 at 100 rates; 500 at 1,000 rates. CLAIMS. Should any errors occur we desire to be informed upon receipt of goods, that we may rectify them without delay. All claims must be filed within ten days after the arrival of shipments. No plants shipped C. O. D. PLANT AND SEED ORDERS should be kept separate, as during our rush season we may run short of some varieties of plants or trees and this sometimes causes a slight delay in receiving consignments from our various growing grounds. The rush of business is terrific during the winter and spring in the Nursery Department and orders cannot always be shipped at once. With our present facilities we hope to have but few delays in filling orders, but in cases where th follow when ready. HINTS ON ROSE GROWING



Aphis or Green Fly: A small sucking insect that gathers on the tips of growth and buds. This can be easily exterminated by the use of Black Leaf 40.

Black Spot: A fungous disease appearing on the leaf, which eventually turns yellow and falls off. This can be checked by spraying with Bordeaux

Mixture.

Mildew: This disease attacks the leaves and stems, causing a whitish crinkly condition. Lack of sunshine or too much overhead watering are the chief causes. Spraying entire plant with Fungtrogen immediately after it appears will check it readily. Sulphur dusted on in the morning when the foliage is somewhat damp is commonly used.

PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS

On receipt of shipment unpack it immediately, and if not planted at once place the roots of the trees in a trench, cover them with soil, and water thoroughly, so as to settle the dirt well about the roots. For this purpose it is well to open the bundle. If on account of delay enroute the trees look withered, bury them entirely in wet soil for a few days until they have recovered.

It is of great importance to dig holes deeper and larger than is necessary to admit all the roots in their natural position, keeping the surface and subsoil separate. While we exercise the greatest care possible in digging and packing the trees the loss or injury of the roots is sometimes unavoidable. Any injured roots should be cut off with a sharp knife. Fill the hole with the surface soil, so that the tree after the earth has settled will stand about as deep as it did in the nursery, a line which can usually be noted by a difference in color. Settle the soil well around the roots by filling the hole with water. Never let manure come in contact with the roots, but it can be used as a top dressing. Grass or weeds should never be allowed to grow around the trees. The ground should be thoroughly cultivated, so that the finely pulverized soil forms a mulch over the whole surface of the ground.

Apples, Apricots, Peaches, Pears, etc., should be pruned back according to the size of the tree. Tree protectors should be used against sunburn.

The use of manure is advisable but should be used sparingly as it might make the plant run too much to vine. There is no plant more sensitive to cold and wet than the bean. We therefore advise not to plant until the ground has become dry and warm. The largest returns will result in planting in drills from 2 to 3 feet apart. Cover the seed one and one-half inches deep and thin the young plants 3 to 6 inches apart in the row. If planted in hills, about 2 feet apart each way.

A THE REPORT OF THE PROPERTY O CONTROLLING BEAN PESTS

Beans in California are troubled at various times with insect pests like Aphis, Red Spider, Weevil, and Fungous troubles such as mildew and rust.

Aphis can be controlled by a nicotine spray or with tobacco dust; Red Spider and Mildew by dusting with sulphur, and Rust by spraying or dusting with Bordeaux Mixture. See page 86

The most serious pest is the Bean Weevil, which only becomes apparent after harvesting. The only remedy is to fumigate the beans with Carbon Bisulphide at the rate of two ounces to 100 pounds. A cool, moist climate seems to be the most suitable of all for the culture of cabbage which generally grows to greater perfection in the coast region, as heat and drought are injurious to them.

Sudden changes of temperature have a tendency to make cabbage go to seed and growers should watch them carefully to see that their field is moist but properly drained. Sudden check in growth is prevented by this care.

It is only logical that a climate that is good for man would be good for insects also. California has a greater variety of insects which live longer and reproduce more generally than any other State in the Union. On that account we have found it advisable to maintain an insection of the compartment which devotes itself to garden troubles of all kinds. 



CULTURE—Sweet corn should not be planted until in the spring when all danger of frost is past. The soil preferred is one rich and moist. Corn is not a lazy man's crop, as continual cultivation is necessary.

Plant in hills 18 inches apart with rows 3 feet apart. Three or four seeds may be planted in each hill but not more than two allowed to stand. 



CULTURE—A world wide grown vegetable because it can be quickly and easily grown, is extremely palatable and very nutritous. Every garden deserves a lettuce plot. The quickest growing types are the loose leaf varieties and we suggest for the home garden a plot of loose leaf and a bed of the heading type. The loose leaf varieties will have matured and be used up by the time the heading types are matured.

The loose leaf Lettuce does not form heads but where the plants are grown a distance apart they make a large rounded cluster of leaves. Leaves are heavily crumpled and attractive in appearance, crispandtender. We advise the planting of two ounces of seed for a 150 foot row and if the lettuce is too thick, thin after it has attained a size which can be pulled and used for salad or it can be thinned out when young and transplanted to another section of the garden. Heading varieties should be sown the same as loose leaf except that it should by all means be thinned out when the fourth leaf appears leaving plants in the row 10 inches apart.



Culture.—Muskmelons must not under ordinary gardening conditions be planted until all daner of frost is past. This is usually March, and planting may continue until July 15th. Warm ground is essential to the germination of the seed, for if planted too early in the Spring it will rot. It is highly important that your soil should be in proper planting condition. First, it must be thoroughly soaked or irrigated. Second, as quickly as the moisture has thoroughly penetrated and the soil is in a tillable or workable condition, spade or plow the ground and see that it is thoroughly pulverized. Third, prepare furrows 6 to 8 inches in depth and 5 to 7 feet apart according to space you can spare. Fourth, plant the seed in the furrows about 6 feet apart, covering the seed not more than 1 inch deep and as the plant grows, gradually fill up the furrow about it with soil until level with surface.

Continuous cultivation is now necessary and where soil conditions require, systematic irrigation should be followed. Do not, however, irrigate close to the plant as the vine, close up irrigation is not necessary and in cultivating see that these roots are not disturbed as it would ruin the plant. Practice frequent shallow cultivation. Plant 8 seeds to the hill and when thoroughly established pull out all but three. Two





CULTURE—The same culture as applied to the Muskmelon is employed in growing Watermelons. Furrows of about 8 inche depth are prepared and 6 to 8 seeds are planted about 1½ inches deep every 10 feet in the furrow; furrows about 8 feet apart.

This plant assumes a more rapid growth than Muskmelons, consequently more frequent cultivation and care must be given while the plants are young. As the plants grow in the furrow, fill in the soil about them so as to establish roots well into the deeper soil and when the plants are securely established pluck out all but two of the most hardy and healthy ones. The furrows in which the plants are growing want to be filled gradually as the plants grow until level with the surface, and then in early cultivating throw the soil towards the plant until a slight knoll or hill is formed.

In irrigating soak ground thoroughly and follow by cultivation as quickly as practicable, in order to keep a permanent mulch and maintain the moisture. Use one and onehalf pounds of seed to an acre.

CULTURE—Many different methods of planting onions are in practice but the one most practical to the general market grower is the following method:



Planting in this section usually starts in December, January and February unless the season is exceptional and then possibly earlier. The primary requisite is good seed and in this we excel, our seed being produced by experts who have been growing for us for years and our trade has been greatly increasing due to the excellence of our seed.

Sow onion seed with a seed drill in rows 14 inches apart, using on this basis from 4 to 4½ pounds of seed per acre. The land must be thoroughly plowed, disked, and harrowed when necessary. It is impossible to prepare your land too carefully in growing the onion as it responds readily and in order to get maximum yields, thorough preparations must be made.

As soon as the plants appear, hand weeding must start both in and between the rows. From this point on the plants must have a steady even growth as a check whether from disease or drought will cause them to go to seed extensively. When the onions are ready for harvesting the tops will be well ripened down. If, however, the tops are still green we would suggest running a light roller or plank over the field to press them down. In ten days after this operation the onions should be pulled and left in the field one deep to dry. When thoroughly dried the tops can be removed. However we do not recommend this until ready to ship to market. If the onions are to be kept any period of time they should not be sacked but put on a floor or in a bin where there is a complete circulation of air. In some localities the transplanting system is followed. If this is done the seed should be planted in beds during August and September and transplanted to permanent field during February and March. The land chosen for onions should be done to clore up as well nor are they as even in shape as on lighter soil. Never pick weedy leand for onions and avoid lands just free of grai







CULTURE—For early market peppers, seed should be planted in hot beds during November and December, and when the plants are of proper size and the danger of frost is passed they should be planted in the open field or garden or the plants may be planted direct to the open ground before the frost period is over if they are given proper protection.

To harden off plants before setting out remove covering of hot bed during warmer part of the day, being sure to replace same as it starts to turn cool in the evening.

For main crop, plant in the bot bed during February, March and April; in later planting cold frames may be utilized. As pepper seed demands ideal conditions for growing, do not attempt to plant the seed in the open unless it be in the summer when the air and ground are warm. A loose sandy loam soil is best. One half pound of seed will produce enough plants for an acre.

RED MEXICAN. Grows like the Mexican Pink bean, but is a much heavier yielder under extreme heat, and for that reason is gradually replacing the pink variety.

SMALL WHITE BEAN (NAVY). This is grown extensively on truck soils. It is especially adapted to coastal valleys as the intense heat of the interior valleys is somewhat detrimental to its growth.

LADY WASHINGTON. Commonly known as Large White bean. It might be known as an all round bean, especially adapted to bottom lands, and where moisture is easily obtained. It is also freer from attacks of mildew than the other common varities of beans.



STOCK BEETS

Stock Beets are one of the finest fat and milk-producing crops we have today and when fed in conjunction with grain they are worth nearly as much, pound for pound, as the grain itself. This statement may seem a little strong, but experience has shown that Stock Beets aid digestion and assimilation by keeping the animals in extra good condition. By feeding the same in conjunction with grains it increases the feeding value of the grains.

CULTURE

Stock Beet seed should be sown about one-inch deep, in wel Stock Beet seed should be sown about one-inch deep, in well-cultivated soil in drills eighteen inches to three feet apart (deending upon the method of cultivation). When the plants are sufficiently large, thin out to to stand ten to twelve inches apart in the rows. The seed is generally sown at the rate of eight to ten pounds per acre. Beet seed is very hard and does not germinate as easily as other seeds, therefore, the soil should be very moist at the time the seed is planted. If the soil should be dry it is advisable to soak the seed in luke-warm water for twenty-four hours before planting.



The hill or row system may be used in planting. If in hills, they may be three feet apart each way or thirty inches one way and thirty-six inches the other way. The rows are usually three to three and one halffeetapart. The distances between the hills in the row varies from 12 to 16 inches apart for early varieties and 17 to 20 inches for late ones according to the soil. On light soils early varieties may be planted four inches deep and late varieties five inches deep. Early varieties are planted any time after the middle of January, but there is danger of their being caught by frost if planted before February first. Usually it is best to plant the main crop of potatoes about the middle of February, as early planting usually gives better results than late planting. The cut seed should be as blocky in shape as possible. Long thin pieces are more likely to rot in the ground. A good method is to begin cutting of pieces at the stem and diagonally across the tuber until just enough is left at the blossomend to make two pieces, when this part should be cut in two so that all the eyes on the end will not be left on one piece.

When the rows are three feet apart and the space between hills is 15 inches, 800 to 1000 ibs. of seed potatoes are required per acre, if the seed pieces are cut 1 to 2 eyes. This is about the average rate per acre for this region.

FLOWER SEED DEPARTMENT

A FEW CULTURAL SUGGESTIONS

Few people are aware of the great number and variety of flowers that can be raised from seed. In this glorious Southland, the time taken to obtain fine flowering specimens is not nearly so long as in colder climates, while varieties grow to splendid perfection, if given a reasonable amount of care. We have followed the usual course of catalog makers in classifying into hardy, half-hardy and tender annuals, biennials and perennials, but this need not be taken too literally in California, for many things tender in the east, middle west and north, are perfectly hardy here and will grow outdoors the year around without protection of any kind.

HARDY ANNUALS may be sown in the open air at any time. The name "Annual" indicates that they live only one season.

HALF-HARDY ANNUALS should be sown in a frame or given some protection until the seed germinates if needed early. By the middle of April, it is quite safe to sow in the open.

TENDER ANNUALS is a term used to distinguish those plants usually grown in greenhouses or frames. Speaking generally, they need more skillful treatment than the hardier kinds, though it is getting quite common now to see such plants as Cyclamens. Cinerarias and others flourishing outside in Southern California

HARDY BIENNIALS are those that flower in the second year from sowing the seed.

HARDY PERENNIALS are among the finest of our border plants. They do not usually flower till the second year after sowing, but may be relied upon to produce larger clumps of flowers year by year for many years.

HALF-HARDY PERENNIALS are those which require some protection during the coldestweather, as they will not stand frost.

TENDER PERENNIALS are those species that require greenhouse or other protection during the greater part of the year. See also tender annuals.

HARDY ANNUALS. The best time to sow is in the fall months, as they will make much stronger plants and flower much more abundantly when wintered over. They may be sown in any finely-prepared shady border, and transplanted when large enough, to where they are to flower. Do not cover the seeds too

deeply. A good rule is to cover each seed its own depth with soil, at the same time taking care to water carefully. Never water so much that the soil gets 'soggy,'' i. e., saturated; nor ever let the top get dry. Most varietles will germinate within ten days. They may also be sown at any time during the spring months for summer blooming, care being taken to shade the young plants after transplanting, in hot weather.

HALF-HARDY ANNUALS may be sown in April out-of-doors, or in boxes, in March or earlier. If sown in boxes, the boxes should have an inch of rough soil or gravel at the bottom for drainage; the remainder of the box should be filled within an inch of the top with sifted, light, rich soil, firmly pressed, and watered.

TENDER ANNUALS should be sown in pots as follows: Take a five or six-inch flower pot, put an inch of drainage in the bottom, then two inches of finely-sifted soil, firmly pressed, with a sprinkling of sand on top. Then sow the seed, and do not cover, but press into the soil. Water with a very fine sprinkler, and cover the top of the pot with a sheet of glass. Remove the glass for an hour daily to dry up the damp.

HARDY BIENNIALS and PERENNIALS should be sown in September. Many varieties, if sown then, will flower the next year. If sown in spring they will not flower till a year later. They may be sown in a shady border, and, when large enough, transplanted to where they are to remain.

HALF-HARDY and TENDER PERENNIALS should be sown in boxes, and treated as recommended for Half-hardy Annuals till plants appear, when they should be transplanted to two inch pots, and shifted afterwards when necessary.

We have arranged our list of flower seeds according to the various classes: Annuals, including separate lists of Everlasting Flowers and Ornamental Gourds; Climbers, Annual and Perennial; Biennials and Perennials; Ornamental Grasses, Annual and Perennial.

ABBREVIATIONS. Hh means Half-hardy, Annual or Perennial: T means Tender, Annual or Perennial. When no abbreviation is used, the variety will prove hardy in this climate. The letter B affixed to a variety means that it is useful for bouquets and cut flowers.

HOW TO GROW SWEET PEAS

Sweet peas are deep rooting. The soil where they are to be planted should be dug to a depth of eighteen inches. They are also gross feeders and a liberal amount of fertilizer will insure luxuriant growth and large flowers. Dig the fertilizer well under and see that the soil has settled and is firm before the seeds are planted. This result can be quickly obtained by tamping and watering. The seeds are usually sown in shallow trenches about three inches deep and corered only one or 1½ inches. The balance of the earth is filled in after the young plants have grown a few inches. In certain heavy soils it is best not to cover the seed more than one inch at any time. Seeds may be spaced one or two inches apart in the trench and the young plants gradually thinned to six inches to prevent crowding.

A support for the vines must be provided early. They require a liberal amount of water. The flowers must be gathered often and should any seed pods form, these must be immediately removed to insure a prolonged blooming period.

In growing sweet peas out of season, the vines are protected with cheese cloth or other light material. If the cloth is stretched above the plants it provides sufficient protection against strong sunshine in summer and chilly nights in winter.





But to sow them thickly as is frequently done and then leave the little plants alone to fight for a position—eventually running straight up, flowering once and then dying—is not the right way to treat them. Each plant must have room to develop its branches as they are produced, and in order to obtain this, they must be thinned severely and often, so that each stands at from 6 inches to 1 foot apart, according to the kind sown. Some, as noted under the separate headings, are better sown in boxes or pots and transplanted. Others do well sown where they are to flower. But in all cases, prepare the ground well by deeply spading and incorporating, as the work proceeds, good, well prepared manure. If natural manures cannot be obtained, we have the best commercial fertilizers always in stock, and these are equally effective. 

As soon as sown, cover with about one-eighth of an inch of fine soil and over this place a piece of burlap or old gunny sack and keep moist. Watch closely and remove the covering at once when the seedlings appear and gradually shift to sun to harden. In a few weeks, the little plants will be large enough to transplant.





CULTURE-To have pansies in perfection, sowings should be made every month from the end of July to the end of April. Young, vigorous stock always gives the best results. Sow in pans or frames and transplant when large enough to a border of rich soil. Water must be given freely in bright weather and the flowers gathered as soon as they begin to wilt in order to keep up a succession and prevent running to seed. which injures the plants and tends to small flowers.

WORMS IN POULTRY

It is claimed that fully 90% of all fowls are wormy.

Worms in a chicken sap the fowl's vitality until it has not the strength left to resist colds, cholera, influenza and such diseases.
